# TOWN WARRANT

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Antrim, in the Country of Hillsborough, and said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Antrim Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, 1979, at 10 o'clock in the morning to act upon the following subjects:

The polls will open at 10 o'clock in the morning and close at 6 o'clock in the afternoon.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers, Agents and Trustees for the ensuing year.

2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendments to the existing Antrim Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board. (Ballot Questions)

Additionally, pursuant to RSA 39:2a and the vote of the Town at the March 4, 1975 Annual Meeting, you are hereby notified to meet at the Antrim Middle School Gym in said Town on Thursday the 15th day of March, 1979 at 7 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Hundred Twenty-Three Thousand Dollars (\$123,000.00) for the purpose of constructing a new fire station at a site to be determined by vote at this meeting, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed One Hundred Twenty-Three Thousand Dollars (\$123,000.00) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA 31:1 et seq., as amended), and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town, and to authorize and allow the Selectment to accept and expend such monies as may become available from any Federal, State or private agency or individual, or take any other action thereon.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) for the purpose of acquiring the Herbert Harvey, Jr., property on Main Street, consisting of a building and four to seven (4-7) acres, more or less, to demolish the building located thereon and remove the remains of same, and to fill and grade said property, all for the purpose of using said property as a site for the construction of a new fire station, or take any other action thereon.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act of 1972, as amended, and appropriate the following sums of money for the following purposes:

- (a) Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for the purchase of a new police cruiser
- (b) Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the removal of trees
- (c) Five Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$5,600.00) for the purchase of a new sander for the use of the Highway Department
- (d) Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of updating and adjusting the Tax Map and Land Inventory System
- (e) Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of making necessary repairs and renovations to the Town Hall
- (f) Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for the purpose of making necessary improvements to the ball field
- (g) Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) for the employment of additional clerical help for the Town Offices.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the old police cruiser and appropriate any funds raised by said disposal for the purpose of equipping a new cruiser, or take any other action thereon.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Nineteen Thousand Six Hundred Forty-One Dollars and Eighty-Nine Cents (\$219,641.89) to pay normal operating costs of the Town (as set forth in the Town Budget), or take any other action relating thereto.

10. To hear the reports of the Auditors of the Town Officers' accounts and act thereon.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower its Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept and expend, on behalf of the Town, any and all grants or other funds available for Town purposes, including but not limited to Disaster Aid and Highway Funds, which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any Federal, State or private agency or individual, or take any other action relating thereon.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to collect taxes in advance of the issuance of the Tax Warrant and/or tax bills, or take any other action relating thereon.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to sell and convey by deed the title to real estate taken by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed, on the condition that the property be sold at public auction or by sealed bid to the highest bidder following due notice and publication, or take any other action thereon.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to support and help defray expenses of the Antrim Rescue Squad, or take any other action thereon.

**ANTRIM RESUCE SQUAD**

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Eighty-Two Dollars (\$382.00) for the support of the Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto. This sum is based on the formula of five per cent (5%) of the Rooms and Meals Tax funds distributed to the Town by the State of New Hampshire in 1978. (\$7,640)

**MONADNOCK REGION ASSOCIATION**

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand One Hundred Thirty-Eight Dollars (\$3,138.00) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurses Association, or take any other action thereon.

**MONADNOCK COMMUNITY VISITING NURSES ASSOCIATION**

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Three Hundred Dollars and Eighty-Four Cents (\$1,300.84) as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, or take any other action thereon.

Explanation: These funds will be used for financing the staff, operating expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other state and federal funds available for planning purposes.

**PLANNING BOARD**

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred and Eight Dollars (\$908.00) to support the services of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, or take any other action thereon.

**MONADNOCK FAMILY AND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE**

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to establish a full-time police force rather than the part-time force now in existence so as to afford greater protection for property and reduce burglary and vandalism, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money to carry out this article or take any other action thereon.

**BY PETITION (GREGG LAKE ASSOCIATION, INC.)**

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Dry Hydrants on Gregg Lake to reduce property loss due to fire, or take any other action thereon.

**BY PETITION (GREGG LAKE ASSOCIATION, INC.)**

22. To see if the Town will vote to do a complete plowing of all roads during winter snow storms so that easy access can be made by police to all cottages to reduce burglary and vandalism and to raise and appropriate the sum of money to carry out this article, or take any other action thereon.

**BY PETITION (GREGG LAKE ASSOCIATION, INC.)**

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money and request money from the State to properly repair and maintain Gregg Lake Road, including the installation of a sufficient amount of culverts to reduce flooding of the road during the Spring time thaw, or take any other action thereon.

**BY PETITION (GREGG LAKE ASSOCIATION, INC.)**

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) for the purchase of nine hundred feet of four inch plastic pipe with a bursting strength of not less than two hundred (200) pounds per square inch, to be installed on the so-called Hill Road at White Birch Point, to be run from the edge of White Birch Point Road at a point opposite the dry hydrant at Gregg Lake dam, up the Hill Road to a dry hydrant to be installed at the dead end of White Birch Point Road, a distance of 900 feet, or take any other action thereon.

**WHITE BIRCH POINT ASSOCIATION**

25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate and enter into a contract with a recognized data processing firm for the purpose of computerizing tax records and bills and to raise and appropriate a sum not exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for this purpose, or take any other action thereon.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

26. To see if the Town will vote to pay the Tax Collector a sum equal to one-half of one percent (.5%) of the annual Tax Warrant, or take any other action thereon.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of surplus Town Office Equipment by publicly advertising for and accepting sealed bids for the purchase of same, or take any other action thereon.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

28. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Parks and Recreation Commission, consisting of five (5) members to be appointed by the Selectmen as follows: two (2) members for three-year terms, two (2) members for two-year terms, and one member for a one-year term, this Commission to replace the three (3) member Park Board established by vote of the Town at the 1970 Town Meeting, and to responsible for the care, maintenance and overall operation of the Town Beach, tennis court, ball field, skating rink and any other facilities relating to recreational activities, or take any other action thereon.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the system of house numbering as prepared by CETA personnel in 1978 and on file at the Selectmen's office and to authorize the Selectmen to assign the designated number to each building or unit of occupy therein established, or take any other action thereon.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

30. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its action taken at the 1966 Annual Town Meeting in establishing a three (3) member Conservation Commission and in place thereof establish a seven (7) member Conservation Commission, consisting of seven (7) members to be appointed by the Selectmen as follows: three (3) members for three-year terms, two (2) members for two-year terms and two (2) members, for one-year terms, with the powers and duties provided for in NH RSA 36-A:4, and further to ratify and affirm all actions taken by the Conservation Commission in the Town since its establishment in 1966, or take any other action thereon.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

31. To see if the Town will vote to accept Contoocook Drive, as shown on a Plan entitle: "Part of Property (Section I) of Contoocook Valley Development Corporation in Antrim, New Hampshire, Scale 1" = 50', Survey by J. M. Attridge & Wm. A. Bean, Jr., October, 1973, Revision Jan., 1975" as a town road, provided

however that said acceptance shall be contingent on the receipt of written certification from the Road Agent and Planning Board that said road has been constructed in accordance with the Road Specifications set forth in the Town Subdivision Regulations and/or the continued holdings of the sureties presently held by the Town assuring the completion of the road as specified, or take any other action thereon.

**CONTOOCOOK VALLEY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION**

32. To see if the Town will vote to close subject to gates and bars the following roads:

- (a) Meetinghouse Hill Road from its beginning off Route 31 near the Grange Hall to the Cemetery.
- (b) Liberty Farm Road from the Liberty Farm barn to the Swett cellar hole.
- (c) That part of the Old Concord to Keene Road which starts at a point on Elm Avenue across from Adolf Baer's house and runs past the Old Goodell Company power plant site to Franklin Pierce Lake.
- (d) That part of the Old Concord to Keene Road which lies on the north side of Route 9 and which goes over English Hill, also known as Tuttle Hill, to the River Road near the Henry and Mary Colton property.
- (e) That part of the Milk Road so-called, which lies on the southerly side of Route 202 and which runs from new Route 202 to Old Route 202 a/k/a Old Concord Road.
- (f) That part of Mountain Road, formerly known as Lawson Road or Harve White Road, which runs from the Hillsborough Town line to the point where it was closed previously.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

33. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue its practice of having the Road Agent elected at the Annual Town Meeting and, in place thereof, authorize the Selectmen to appoint said Road Agent in accordance with the provisions of RSA 245:6, or take any other action thereon.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

34. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a Town Manager system, and raise and appropriate the necessary funds to carry this out for the ensuing year, authorizing the Selectmen to make such an appointment, or take any other action thereon.

**BY PETITION**

35. To see if the Town will vote to provide worker's compensation coverage for eligible employees by participating in the New Hampshire Municipal Association Self-Funded Worker's Compensation Program commencing at the end of the term of the present policy, and to authorize the Selectmen to take such action in furtherance of this vote as may be necessary.

**BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

36. To see if the Town will vote to grant a complete property tax exemption to the Antrim Grange #98, or take any other action thereon.

**ANTRIM GRANGE #98**

37. To see if the Town will vote to give and convey by quitclaim deed to Sidney W. Stockwell and Marianna M. Stockwell all its right, title and interest in an to a gravel knoll as reserved to the Town in a 40-acre tract described as Tract III in deed of Sidney D. Livingston to Sidney W. Stockwell and Marianna M. Stockwell, dated July 6, 1953 and recorded in the Hillsborough Country Registry of Deeds in Volume 1364, Page 372, or take any other action thereon.

38. To hear the reports of the committees and act thereon.

39. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

**SELECTMEN'S REPORT**

During 1978 the Board of Selectmen held 52 regular meetings and 4 special meetings at which many, if not all, of the town problems have been the subject of deliberation. Some of the problems have been remedied or improved as the result of this deliberation.

**FIRE STATION**

A committee appointed to study potential locations for a new fire station and to propose plans and specifications for the construction of the building are to report their findings at the 1979 Annual Town Meeting.

**POLICE STUDY**

A police study committee reviewing the feasibility of creating a joint Police Department with the Town of Bennington will also report their recommendations at the same meeting.

## HIGHWAY GARAGE

During the past year the Highway Department Garage was built and has been equipped and is presently in use for the storage and maintenance of the town road equipment.

## WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT AND COLLECTION SYSTEM

The Environment Protection Agency have given their approval of the Federal grant, the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission had previously signified their approval of the State grant and the Farmers Home Administration are prepared to fund their portion. These grants leave the Town's share of the total cost to be less than \$300,000.00

## PARK BOARD

At the year's end the Park Board have resigned thus allowing their replacements the opportunity to prepare plans for the coming year's activity. It is also planned to increase the number of members from three to five; this would become effective with a favorable vote on the article.

At this time we wish to extend our thanks and that of the town to the previous board for their unselfish service in the care and efficient operation of the town beach and the other areas under their jurisdiction.

## RETIREMENT OF POLICE CHIEF

The Selectmen have accepted the retirement of Police Chief Clark A. Craig, Sr., effective March 1, 1979. Chief Craig has been a member of the Antrim Police Department since 1959 when he became a Special Officer; in 1970 he was elected to the position of Chief and subsequently has been reappointed annually by the Selectmen. He was seriously injured last April in the line of duty and returned to work in late summer. The Board joins with the many friends of Chief Craig in extending to him the thanks of all for his years of service to Antrim and their best wishes to him in his retirement years.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT

It is expected that the action of Town Meeting will appropriately recognize the need of providing additional police coverage and will approve the requested funds in order to accomplish this purpose. The Board is also asking that a new cruiser be purchased with Revenue Sharing Funds. It is proposed to sell the present vehicle by offering it for sale to the highest bidder by sealed bids.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE JAMES A. TUTTLE LIBRARY

1978 was a busy and rewarding year for the James A. Tuttle Library Trustees. Thanks to the generous bequests of Dr. James Jameson in 1977 and Miss Alice Thompson in 1978, we were financially able to make several major improvements to the building.

In June, necessary and greatly needs roof repairs were completed. During December a new powder room, equipped for the handicapped, was built on the first floor in part of the stack room and improvements were made in several of the book shelves. At the same time, a new and efficient oil burner was installed replacing the old coal-converted furnace.

The Trustees of Trust Funds have invested for the library the largest portion of the two recent bequests. It is the income from these and previous bequests that wholly fund the library at the present time.

This past year has seen a change in the library staff. We regret that Phebe Lewan was unable to continue as Isabel Nichol's assistant. However, we are delighted to have Maddy Brzozowski join the library staff in her place.

## REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

Although circulation figures are not true indicators of library use, librarians will have to use them to measure the library's value to the community until such time as someone comes up with something better. Our total circulation for 1978 was 14,551 items. Our inventory remains around 10,000 books, and this was increased by borrowing 890 books from the bookmobile, and 127 books from the State Library and other libraries around the state. New acquisitions in 1978 amounted to 493 books, with an additional 100 received through the McNaughton rental plan. We carry nearly 50 magazine titles, covering a wide range of interests, from the weekly news magazines through sports and hobbies, and including 9 children's publications.

The 21 displays shown throughout the year included a children's art contest, hobby collections loaned by patrons, and the historical maps showing Antrim's industries from 1777-1977, made by the Caughey family. These maps will remain in the special collections room at the library.

A children's library club was held for 8 weeks during the summer, and several volunteers helped to make this an interesting experience. There were three visits from pre-school groups during the year, and three well-attended story hours were held on special holidays.

The school program continues to be a successfully venture. Classes, accompanied by their teachers, made 108 visits to the library during school days, taking out a total of 2737 books, with an infinitesimal loss. A short story contest for grades 5 & 6 was sponsored in May. Twenty-three entries were submitted, and three prizes were awarded.

Gifts of books and periodicals were received from nearly 60 individuals and organizations, and two donations of special interest are the Robert Frost collection given by Mr. & Mrs. Ernest McClure, and the Antrim scrapbooks compiled by Mrs. Maurice Poor, and put in order by our archivist, Ralph Proctor. The Frost collection includes several first editions and numerous clippings and pictures. Mrs. Poor's seven scrapbooks contain valuable information not readily available from any other resource about Antrim's schools, churches, celebrations, and individual families.

There was a considerable increase in the requests for genealogical and local historical information in 1978. During the summer there were visitors from several states, and written requests came throughout the year from all over the country. We are fortunate to have a large collection of resources in this field, due to the foresight of former librarians and interested people.

In April, the librarian, her assistant, and one trustee attended a meeting in Newport to hear Dr. Lowell A. Martin discuss his controversial report about N.H. libraries. The gist of this report, *A Chance for Every New Hampshireite*, is that libraries are not now providing full service to the people of the state, and goes on to outline needs in the immediate future and steps to accomplish better service. One suggestion is that small libraries should work toward more cooperation, and the Tuttle Library is proud to be part of one of the few functioning cooperatives in the state, the Nubanusit Cooperative, which includes 20 libraries in this area. We

should soon see positive results in service to the patrons of each town through cooperative buying of books and supplies, with a saving for each town, and the establishment of union lists, so that each library will have ready access to the holdings of other libraries.

Plans for the next year at the Tuttle Library include the establishment of an out-reach program, taking books to those who find it inconvenient to come in to the library, and updating the reference section. We always welcome suggestions from the people of Antrim about how we can improve library service, from the selection of books to the hours we are open. The hours now are Tuesday and Thursday, 2-8 and Saturday 10-4, but these could be changed to be more accommodating if the public indicated such a need.

As always, the board of trustees has been helpful in a variety of ways, supportive of programs, and truly committed to the challenges presented them. It is the wish of all concerned that we continue to grow in our service to the Town of Antrim, and we urge each citizen to come forward and make his needs known.

## REPORT OF DISTRICT FOREST FIRE CHIEF AND TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For more than 80 years, a cooperative effort between the State of New Hampshire and local forest fire authorities has created a forest fire prevention and suppression program that is recognized as superior throughout the United States.

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community governments have worked together to prevent and combat forest fires.

Today, 249 forest fire wardens and more than 1,800 deputy wardens are appointed every three years by the State Forester to work with the members of the State Forest Fire staff in this effort. State funds are used to pay one-half the cost of forest fire suppression costs incurred by local forest fire organizations, within pay rates established by the Governor and Council. State funds matched by local funds are used to purchase hand tools to suppress forest fires, to train local forest fire crews and in forest fire prevention work.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from your local Forest Fire warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or a jail term of up to one year or both.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT FOR 1978

REPORT OF THE SEWAGE STUDY COMMITTEE

The engineering and design work on the sewage collection system and treatment plant has been completed. Land acquisition for pumping stations and the treatment plant is now nearly finished.

## REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Activity of the Conservation Committee this year has centered around developing the Hurlin and Baker Lots and working on existing projects.

After snowshoeing the Baker Lot with Middle School students and David Blair from the Harris Center, a contest was run in the Middle School to name the property and to design a sign for it. The winners were Kim Roberts and John Lunderville and an excellent sign was constructed. The Baker Lot is now the "Meadow and Marsh Park".

In August, members of the Commission met with Dr. David Allan, state biologist; Grace Cody and Dick Dalhaus from the school; and Ed Hutchinson from the Soil Conservation Service and walked the Hurlin Property, Meadow and Marsh Park, and Lily Pond area. Dr. Allan and the group came up with many exciting uses for the lands which Dr. Allan summarized in his excellent report to the commission. On the basis of this report, a proposal has been submitted to the Helen Wood Hurlin Fund which will fund the construction of a trail linking the Hurlin Property, the Town Beach, the Meadow and Marsh Park, and Willard Pond. The project will start in spring and will hopefully be completed by December, 1979. David Blair and Meade Cadot from the Harris Center, an intern from the Antioch Environmental Program, teachers from the schools, and members of the Conservation and Park & Recreation Commissions will work closely with students from the Antrim Schools and youth groups in planning and clearing the trail. All are invited to participate in this exciting project.

The trail is the first step in a longer-term effort to develop Antrim's great conservation and recreation potential. Another proposal will be made to the Hurlin Fund next year probably to develop access, camping and/or picnicing areas, and maintaining open space on the Hurlin Land.

In on-going projects, the town wetlands have finally been mapped! This was made possible by the completion of the Soils Survey and the artistry of Commission Members on the blue soil maps. Ways are now being investigated to protect wetlands "critical" to town water supply, proper drainage, and recreational use and to insure that when wetlands are developed proper measures are taken so that town taxpayers and neighbors aren't hurt.

The annual Clean Up Day in May was again a success, although the number of participants was down from the Bicentennial effort. The Womans' Club again provided us with an excellent luncheon (especially the desserts!) which helped spur us on. Clean Up Day this year will be held in late April and will be co-sponsored by the Park and Recreation Commission which has come up with some novel ideas to increase interest.

The Elm Tree Project is on hold because of the great amount of time required to inoculate a tree and because some of the patients died. It was discovered that spraying along with inoculation significantly increases the probability of success. If you would like the equipment and instruction to do your own trees, please contact any Commission member. The best times are in the spring and early summer.

Goals for next year include continuation of programs to develop commission

land, reinstating the tree planting program as the sewer construction allows, starting a town nursery, assisting in dead tree removal, and working more closely with the Planning Board and Park & Recreation Commission on projects of mutual concern.

Commission meetings are held the last Tuesday of each month in Little Town Hall and the public is cordially invited.

### REPORT OF THE ANTRIM-BENNINGTON POLICE STUDY COMMITTEE

At the 1978 Annual Town Meetings, the voters of Antrim and Bennington voted to establish a joint committee, consisting of three (3) residents of each town, to study the feasibility of establishing a single police department for the two towns.

The committee, whose members included Clark Craig, Sr., Lloyd Henderson and Benjamin Pratt from Antrim and Paul Cashion, Elizabeth Chase and Donald Smith from Bennington, met fifteen (15) times during the year. At several of the meetings, past and present members of the Antrim and Bennington Police Departments and New Hampshire State Police representatives were in attendance to provide information and present their views on this issue. Also, information was received from police chiefs from neighboring towns.

Additionally, the Committee conducted a door-to-door survey of ninety-nine (99) households in the two towns with the following results in Antrim, where seventy-two (72) households were surveyed.

1. 89% of those surveyed had had no personal contact with the present police department in the past year, 5½% had had one or two contacts and 5½% had had more than three contacts.
2. 74% of those surveyed favored a joint Antrim-Bennington full-time police department, while 6% favored a separate full-time department, 16% favored an expansion of the present part-time department and 4% favored the part-time department "as-is".
3. 72% of those surveyed favored a joint full-time department at an approximate annual cost of \$75,000 and 74% felt that this cost should be apportioned at 60% to Antrim (\$45,000) and 40% to Bennington (\$30,000).
4. Approximately 88% of those surveyed felt that there was a need for greater visibility, faster response to calls, better trained officers and more patrolling.
5. 68% of those surveyed felt that there was a need for more special officers.

6. Of those favoring the expansion of the present part-time department, 39% favored spending an additional \$10,000 to \$20,000 for such expansion.

The results in Bennington, where twenty-seven (27) households were surveyed, were as follows:

1. 26% of those surveyed favored a joint Antrim-Bennington full-time police department, while 4% favored a separate full-time department, 18% favored an expansion of the present part-time department and 52% favored the present part-time department "as-is".
2. 15% of those surveyed favored a joint full-time department at an approximate annual cost of \$75,000.
3. Of those favoring the expansion of the present part-time department, 80% favored spending an additional \$5,000 to \$10,000 for such expansion.

Although a representative sample of Antrim residents was surveyed, it was the opinion of the Committee that the results were greatly influenced by the substantial adverse publicity which the Antrim Police Department received during this time period. Because of this, the results were considered to be somewhat unreliable and not sufficiently representative of the actual wishes of the residents to produce positive action on a warrant article proposing a joint full-time police department at the Annual Town Meeting.

The results in Bennington indicated that most Bennington residents did not favor a joint full-time police department, particularly at a total annual cost of \$75,000. The majority of the Bennington residents surveyed appeared to be reasonably satisfied with the present part-time department.

Because of the need for voters of both towns to make positive action at Town Meetings in order to establish a joint full-time police department, it was the consensus of the Committee that because of the lack of support for such a proposal in Bennington and the questionable reliability of the survey results in Antrim, a joint full-time police department was not feasible.

It was the opinion of the Committee that the continuation of the present part-time Bennington Police Department is feasible, with some additional financial support for a modest expansion of service.

In light of the apparent dissatisfaction of Antrim residents with the present part-time police department, the Committee and especially the Antrim representatives spent a great deal of time discussing the alternatives available to upgrade the department. Most of the discussion related to the choices available.

1. a full-time department;
2. a part-time department with a part-time chief or
3. a part-time department with a full-time chief.

Although the feelings of the Antrim representatives on the Committee were mixed, it was the opinion of the Committee that it should recommend to the Board of Selectmen that an article be included in the 1979 Town Warrant proposing the continuation of a part-time police department, but with a full-time police chief, thus giving the voters the opportunity to determine whether the establishment of such a position was both necessary and feasible.

The financing of the department with a full-time chief was considered at length by the Committee in collaboration with the Selectmen, and the following budget was proposed.

As a result of the foregoing proposal, a sum of money will be included in the proposed town budget for 1979 for the continuation of the part-time police department with a part-time chief, and the following warrant article will appear to enable voters to determine whether they want a full-time police chief:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire a full-time police chief and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed ten thousand five hundred dollars (\$10,500.00) to pay the salary of said chief for the remainder of 1979, or taken any other action thereon."

In conclusion, although the Committee feels that the time for a full-time Antrim Police Department or full-time joint Antrim-Bennington Police Department has not as yet arrived, this is a matter deserving of further study in the future.

The Committee wishes to thank all the police officials and citizens who contributed to its study by providing information and assistance.

200 new stacking chairs have been bought and delivered. Cost \$3,007.00 Freight \$305.00 Total Cost \$3,312.00.

New drapes and stage curtain are in the works, the cost approx. \$3,682.50. I was hoping the drapes and curtain would be farther along at this time, but upon calling the company we are doing business with I found the man handling our account has quit. Apparently he took his files with him.

## REPORT OF THE FIRE STATION STUDY COMMITTEE

At the 1978 Annual Town Meeting, the Town voted to set up a committee of five (5) members to locate a suitable site, secure an option or options, and obtain plans and specifications for the construction of a new fire station. This study was deemed necessary by the Selectmen and the Fire Department because of the inadequacies of the present fire station, both because of its size and condition, and the need for future improvements to support, literally, existing equipment in the old station.

The members of the Committee, appointed by the Moderator, included Fire Chief Henry Cutter, Assistant Fire Chief Jack Caughey, Everett Chamberlain, Donald Paige and Edward Clarke.

The Committee met several times during the year and considered approximately twelve (12) possible sites for the location of a new fire station. Owners of seven (7) of the potential sites were contacted concerning the availability of their land for this purpose.

After reviewing the various potential sites, the Committee came to the conclu-



sion that only one of them, the Herbert Harvey, Jr. property, located on Main Street between the Presbyterian Church and Davison's Texaco Station, was a good site for a new station.

As a result, the Chairman requested that an article be inserted in the 1979 Town Warrant to acquire this property, demolish the building located thereon and remove the remains, and fill and grade said property to prepare it as a site for the station.

The Committee also requested that an article be inserted to enable the voters to choose any other site agreeable to a majority of them in the event that they turned down the acquisition of the Harvey property.

Additionally, the Committee considered specifications for a new station and Jack Caughey prepared plans for the station and Henry Cutter constructed a model of it. Two local contractors provided the Committee with estimates of the cost of constructing the station and another local contractor provided the Committee with estimates of the cost of site work necessary at the preferred sites.

The proposed new fire station would be a building sixty feet (60') wide and seventy feet (70') long, with three (3) bays, including one for the Rescue Squad vehicle, and a meeting room upstairs. It has been designed to meet both the present and long-term future needs of the Town. The Committee requested the insertion of a warrant article for the construction of a new station, to be financed by a bond issue.

It is hoped by the Committee that the voters will support its proposals and that a new fire station can be constructed as expeditiously as possible to meet the needs of the Town.

The Committee wishes to thank everyone who assisted the Committee in its work.

# PRECINCT WARRANT

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

Hillsborough, ss.

To the inhabitants of the Antrim Precinct in the Town of Antrim qualified to vote in the town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Little Town Hall in said Antrim Precinct on Wednesday, March 21, 1979 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the year ensuing.
2. To choose all necessary Officers and Agents for the year ensuing.
3. To see if the Precinct will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$325,000) for the purpose of purchasing and installing a storage tank with necessary vales and fittings and connecting said storage tank with 12 inch pipe to the existing water system which is required by the New Hampshire Board of Fire Underwriters and the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 300f et seq.) and will qualify the Precinct for federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed three hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$325,000) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended), and to authorize the Commissioners of the Precinct to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Antrim Precinct, and to authorize and allow the Commissioners of the Precinct to accept and expend such monies as may become available from the Farmers Home Administration (FMHA) or any other action thereon.
4. To hear the report of the Auditors on the Precinct Officers' accounts and act thereon.
5. To hear the reports of the Commissioners and Agents and act thereon.
6. To see if the Precinct will vote to authorize the Commissioners to review the water rates and revise said rates to bring in a total revenue of about \$25,000 or take any other action thereon.

## REPORT OF STUDY COMMITTEE

Most of you know that the Federal Government passed a Clean Drinking Water Bill in 1976 which put very stringent regulations on all drinking water. Since then most of the regulars have been adopted by state legislatures to comply. The Precinct has been under pressure from the N.H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission to make certain changes in our water supply.

The regulations have been finally clarified by the Commission and sent out to all towns regarding the compliance to the Safe Drinking Water Act, on June 6th 1978 and consist basically of three phases:

1. That public water systems relying on surface water with chlorination as the only form of treatment may require additional treatment to assure fitness and safety and to provide adequate protection to the public.
2. That the extent of the treatment thus needed will vary on a case-to-case basis because of the individual characteristics of the source of supplies involved.
3. That the most rational and equitable approach to determine the type and magnitude of facilities required shall be a Preliminary Engineering Study and Report by a consultant to be engaged by the owner of the facilities affected.

This Report to include, but not limited to:

- A. An evaluation of the existing sources with regard to the capacity for meeting future needs of the community.
- B. A determination of the ability to meet the turbidity requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act.
- C. An analysis of the past, present and future conditions surrounding the source with respect to pollution potential, exposure to spills of hazardous materials, potential for development, and recreational activities.
- D. An estimate of the costs for full treatment if needed, which shall include chemical pre-treatment, flocculation, clarification, filtration and chlorination.
- E. A groundwater exploration program aimed at locating sources of water of suitable quality, with estimates of yield and capacity.
- F. Estimates of costs to develop one or more selected sources, including connection to the system.
- G. Estimates of costs for additional distribution storage facilities, if needed.
- H. Recommendations for purchase of other successfully tested well sites, if appropriate.
- I. Recommendations leading to the full compliance with Federal requirements and provisions of PL 93-523.

Fortunately the Precinct had much of the material needed which was included in a Report on the water system done by Whitman & Howard in 1973. This report was updated and submitted last fall by Anderson-Nichols to the appropriate authorities. It appears that we have only two or three things to do to meet full compliance, since we do have a well and the water in Campbell Pond is of very high

quality. We must however add a sand filter system to the facilities at the pond and install a storage tank at this end of the system to meet the above regulations as well as the requirements of N.H. Board of Fire Underwriters of suitable flows for fire fighting.

The cost of the tank with suitable valves to store water from either the well or pond plus piping to the existing system will cost us an estimated \$325,000. This is a must and the longer we put it off, the more it is going to cost with an inflation rate of at least 10% per year. At this writing it is hoped that we might receive a grant from the FHA of about \$100,000 leaving \$225,000 to be financed by the Precinct. Assuming that the money can be borrowed at 6% or less and paying off the notes over a 20 year period, the first year would mean a payment of \$24,750 with diminishing amounts thereafter.

This will mean that the total expenses for the first year will be roughly \$40,000 again assuming that running expenses remain at about \$15,000 per year. Our income has to come from water rents and Precinct taxes. If the water rents were increased to about twice the present rate we might expect to collect \$25,000 and the balance of \$15,000 would have to come from taxes. A rate of \$2.10 per thousand would bring in slightly over that amount. Things would not be quite as dark as they seem for the average home owner would probably save some of this increased burden by a reduction in the amount now paid for fire insurance as the rate would in all likelihood be reduced.

The second phase would involve a sand filtering system adjacent to the dam at Campbell Pond which would cost about \$72,000 at present prices. This can be delayed for awhile, possibly two or three years until some of the first phase costs have been paid. With these improvements to the system the Precinct should be in compliance with all existing regulations except for sizes of pipe which should be updated as we can afford them.

We strongly urge the Precinct to proceed with phase one with all possible speed, taking advantage of any funds which might become available from Federal and/or state sources. We also recommend that the Precinct make a survey of the users of water to determine if they are being properly charged and that the rates be revised upward to bring in total revenue of approximately \$25,000.

## COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

We are happy to report that the water system is in good condition, the leak in the Contoocook River having been repaired in September. This was an expensive operation costing almost \$4,900 by the time the job was completed.

Pipe was purchased in May for the proposed Contoocook Valley Dev. in the area known as Proctor's Field. The pipe was finally laid with two new hydrants in October and early November. We have about 300 ft. left of the pipe after placing some 1,100 feet in ground. We hope this will open up this area to new homes and small businesses.

The pump at the well has been completely overhauled and is in first class condition. We have some minor repairs to the building to do this coming spring including painting the metal work and interior of the Pump House.

We were extremely fortunate this year that the water in Campbell Pond remained at a high level in spite of the very dry summer. Water use was not restricted in Antrim as it was in many towns of the area.

The Commissioners have met several times with the Special Study Committee appointed two years ago. The impact of the Federal Clean Water Act on the town was discussed along with the admonitions of the Board of Fire Underwriters of N.H. to update our water supply to the hydrants. We had two engineering companies who were good enough to submit estimates of costs with no obligation to the Precinct. Both estimates were carefully evaluated along with plans to pay off the costs. This is covered in a separate report by the Study Committee

We are saddened by the termination of the E. H. Edwards & Sons, Inc. as of Dec. 31, 1978. George Edwards and his father, Ellerton, who founded the company, have been very helpful to the Commissioners during the 35 years of their company. They have always stood ready to repair leaks and lay pipe when needed. They will be sorely missed.

We are anticipating quite a few interruptions in service this summer as the Sewer Project gets under way. We hope they will be minor and of short duration and hope that people understand and not complain too much as we will do our best to keep people informed in the areas which may be affected.

We hope that the recommendations of the Study Committee will be adopted and that we can move forward with the proposed changes to the system without delay.
