To the inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said state,qualified to vote in the Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Barnstead Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday,the eighth (8th) day of March,next at 10:00 A.M. of the clock in the forenoon,to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. The second session for purpose of discussing and voting upon the articles of the Town Warrant shall be held on Saturday, March 12, 1994 at 9:00 A.M. at the Barnstead Elementary School. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to discuss all other business to come before the meeting.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to apply for accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property which may be offered to the town for any public purpose, pursuant to RSA 31:95-e. The Selectmen must hold a public hearing before accepting such gift, and the acceptance shall not bind the town to raise, appropriate, or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair, or replacement of any such personal property.

6. Shall the Town accept the provision of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing

indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to reconvey the property on tax map #35 known as lot #151 in section one in Center Barnstead, Locke Lake Colony, to Karen and Gino Iolli on payment of all taxes, interest, costs and expenses of the town in maintaining the property. This property was acquired by tax deed in August of 1993.

8. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw all funds from the Grader Capital Reserve Fund and deposit said funds in the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. The purpose of this action is to eliminate the Grader Capital Reserve Fund. (Majority vote required)

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal of all funds from the Town Hall Restoration Capital Reserve Fund and deposit said funds in the General Account. This action is to delete the Town Hall Restoration Capital Reserve Fund. (Majority vote required)

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars, (\$85,000.00), to purchase a backhoe/loader for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars, (\$85,000.00), from the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars, (\$7,000.00), for the purchase of a highway sander for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of Seven Thousand Dollars, (\$7,000.00), from the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

12. To see if the Town will approve withdrawal of the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$10,000), from the Library Capital Reserve Fund to be used as needed to complete the Library parking lot and to begin development of the handicapped access on the Library lower level. (Submitted by Library Trustees). Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$10,000), and same to be placed in the Library Construction Capital Reserve Fund, created for this purpose.

14. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public library trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Six Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-five Dollars, (\$36,235.00), for the purchase of a new computer system for the Town Offices.

16. To see if the Town will vote to place the sum of Eight Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-nine Dollars, (\$8,329.00), in the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund. Three Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-nine Dollars, (\$3,329.00), from insurance receipts for fire damage to cruiser and Five Thousand Dollars, (\$5,000.00), to be raised by taxation.

17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars, (\$40,000), to install a concrete preformed box culvert with attached wings or equivalent culvert, pipe or bridge, that will have the longevity, load stress factors and span to accommodate a 24 foot road surface, in Crooked Run on the Hartshorn Road, as recommended by the Roads and Bridges Committee, and to authorize the withdrawal of Forty Thousand Dollars, (\$40,000), from the Bridge Construction Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. (Submitted by Road & Bridge Committee). Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars, (\$40,000), to install a concrete preformed box culvert with attached wings or equivalent culvert, pipe or bridge, that will have the longevity, load stress factors and span to accommodate a 24 foot road surface in the Little River on the Welch Road, as recommended by the Roads and Bridges Committee, and to authorize the withdrawal of Forty Thousand Dollars, (\$40,000), from the Bridge Construction Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. (Submitted by Road & Bridge Committee). Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of One Hundred Five Thousand Dollars, (\$105,000), from the Bridge Capital Reserve Fund and deposit One Hundred Five Thousand Dollars, (\$105,000), in the Bosco Bell Bridge Capital Reserve Fund and to

authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw One Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$110,000.00), from the Bosco Bell Bridge Capital Reserve Fund and enter into an agreement with the State of New Hampshire Department of Transportation for the purpose of replacing the Bosco Bell Bridge. (State share \$440,000, Town share \$110,000). This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3 IV and will not lapse until the bridge is completed or in five years whichever is less. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required)

20. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars, (\$15,000), to use in reconstructing the Class VI section of the Garland Road to Class V specifications as set forth in the Planning Board's requirements for roads built by developers, except no asphalt surface will be required. (Submitted by Road & Bridge Committee)

21. To see if the Town will vote to change the classification of the Welch Road from Class VI to Class V. (Submitted by Road & Bridge Committee)

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the committee voted at last Town Meeting (1993) to study the Highway Department, roads and bridges to continue those studies for the ensuing year, 1994. (Submitted by Road & Bridge Committee)

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Road Agent to start using the Road Surface Maintenance System (RSMS) computer program to create an inventory of all roads and bridges in the Town road network, and to establish daily reports which will make it possible to update the RSMS computer program on a timely basis of all maintenance to said roads and bridges. (Submitted by Road & Bridge Committee)

24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following town ordinance - Ordinance # 22 - 94.5 Relative to Dog Control Law. Said ordinance was publicly heard and accepted by the Board of Selectmen February 15, 1994. (Ballot vote required)

25. To see if the Voters of Barnstead will vote to amend the Code of Building Regulations of the Town of Barnstead by adding after Section 2000.13 the following new Section 2000.14 to read as follows:

Section 2000.14 Notwithstanding any other provisions of the Code to the contrary, small structures, such as sheds, gazebos,

etc., not attached to a dwelling unit, not used as a dwelling unit, having no plumbing facilities whatsoever and not exceeding 250 square feet of floor space shall be exempt from the provisions of this Code. (By Petition)

26. To see if the Town will vote to deposit 10% of the revenues collected pursuant to RSA 79-A (The Land Use Change Tax) in the Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5III as authorized by RSA 79-A 25III, in any tax year with the balance if any to be used to reduce the tax rate. If approved this article would alter the vote of the Town Meeting of March 14, 1992 as authorized by RSA 79-A 25IV. If approved this change shall take effect April 1, 1994.

27. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

BARNSTEAD POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Barnstead Police Department covers an area of 43 square miles with over 100 miles of roadway. The department serves approximately 3,150 citizens year round and nearly 2 1/2 times that with seasonal population.

The town is protected by four full-time officers and one part-time officer who are dedicated and resourceful. Even in the face of increasingly difficult conditions, the department has met the demands placed upon them and have continued to provide excellent service.

Several events in 1993 were extremely challenging and stressful for department personnel. Among these were the suicide deaths of three individuals, two by gunshot and one by carbon monoxide asphyxiation, which were a tragic loss to the families, friends and community as a whole. A motor vehicle accident took the life of a fourth. Not only does the department investigate horrible, senseless losses, but also provides information and assistance to surviving family members in their hour of need in a timely and compassionate manner.

Department personnel spent many hours in a rape investigation and subsequent trial that required delicate handling and professionalism. Officers met the challenge but were unsuccessful in the prosecution.

The investigation resourcefulness of officers was exhibited when information uncovered led to the conviction of a child molester on 5 counts of felonious sexual assault, 2 counts of child pornography and 1 count of child endangerment.

A part-time police officer resigned in March, prior to being indicted by a grand jury, on charges of aggravated felonious sexual assault. The facts that were revealed after the indictment have shocked all who knew and worked with the former part-time officer.

A full-time police officer resigned in September which placed an enormous burden on the rest of the department. The officer was out of work a month prior to his resignation due to an injury sustained during an arrest incident.

Officers resignations resulted in a campaign of recruiting persons to replace these officers. The process of screening, hiring and training a person to become a police officer is extremely time consuming and costly. The following is a report on the hiring process for one full-time and two part-time officers to the date of this report:

The department's continued commitment to crime prevention programs and other community based programs, that foster understanding and cooperation with groups and organizations, was realized throughout 1993.

There were citizens who voiced disappointment at the 1993 town meeting of not having a neighborhood watch program. The neighborhood watch program is a citizen's based program where residents are taught how to recognize and report crime and suspicious activity, and how to make their homes less of a target to the criminal.

The department introduced the program to all interested citizens of Barnstead on July 31, 1993. Six general meetings were held where citizens received training and organized the program. Some of the most vocal critics of the department at the 1993 town meeting did not avail themselves to attend a single meeting. However, the department stands ready to continue it's support of this most worthwhile program.

The D.A.R.E. program continues to be an integral part of the elementary school curriculum. No other program, does the individual officer make such an impact on our youngsters. The guidance and influence the D.A.R.E. officer has over these students, have been major factors in giving the students the knowledge to make sound decisions regarding drugs and alcohol. This highly successful anti-drug abuse program involves many hours to prepare and administer, in addition to numerous volunteer hours spent preparing for special events like the International Raceway outing in Loudon. The commitments made by everyone involved is an investment in the future of our young people. Approximately 320 grade school children have completed this three month format that led to their graduation and hopefully life-long commitment to avoid illicit drug use.

The Barnstead Police Department and the Barnstead Elementary School were presented with the fourth consecutive, Annual Gold Circle Partnership Award, by the Governor of New Hampshire, N.H. Department of Education and N.H. Partners in Education. The award recognizes exemplary partnerships made possible through the collaborative efforts of school and community. I would like to thank Principal Barbara McKinnon for the opportunity to bring the department's programs and services into the school.

The Barnstead Police Benevolent Association found another opportunity to help our communities youth, by sponsoring a Girls Softball League Team, called the Barnstead Police Cruisers." The Barnstead Police Benevolent Association is a non-profit organization for the advancement of professional law enforcement and the brotherhood of police officers and their families. I would like to personally thank

Richard and Joanne MacNeill, Leonard and Claire Jerlinski, Eleanor Smith, Joanne Heger, Anne Omundson, and all the members of the department. The volunteers spent countless hours organizing and assisting in fund raisers, donating materials and supplies, and assisting in many programs and projects which benefit the community and the police department. A total of 451.5 hours were devoted to community service programs in 1993 by police department personnel.

The department conducted a successful rabies clinic in 1993, where 180 animals were vaccinated. The raccoon strain of rabies is fast approaching Barnstead. A raccoon in Chichester was found to be infected in late December. Citizens should take the following precautions:

1. Vaccinate your pets
2. Stay away from stray animals
3. Avoid contact with wildlife
4. Discourage wild animals from dining around your homes
5. Teach your children to stay away from wild animals and pets other than their own
6. Don't touch dead animals
7. Let your doctor determine whether an exposure to rabies has occurred
8. Know that there are safe and effective vaccines for persons exposed to rabies
9. Know what to do if you are exposed to rabies

Animal calls for service increased 16.6% in 1993. The state veterinarian claims that once the rabies become epidemic proportion in a community, one can expect an increase in animal calls three times normal. This would suggest we can forecast over 1000 calls for service for animal complaints alone. The department hopes to organize additional rabies clinics in 1994.

Training is recognized as the single most important function in law enforcement today. Training standards not maintained result in loss of professionalism, effectiveness and efficiency. The department addressed the many challenges facing a public safety agency by providing training to department personnel.

The department purchased a new cruiser in 1993 which replaced a 1987 cruiser sold at bid. We also lost a 1989 cruiser because of a fire which ignited from a clogged catalytic converter. The 1989 cruiser had over 119,000 miles. We presently have in addition to the new 1993, a 1990 Explorer 4X4 for snow and mud seasons, and a 1990 cruiser with over 75,000 miles.

I would like to thank and recognize all of my officers and staff for their continued hard work and concern to make Barnstead a safer and better place to live, and to the citizens for their continued support.

I would also like to thank the many area departments and the New Hampshire State Police for their support and cooperation.

We look forward to 1994 with the hope that we can meet the continuing challenges that providing public safety brings.

BARNSTEAD POLICE DEPARTMENT

OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT CIVIL DEFENSE

EMERGENCY - Defined as any event which threatens to, or actually does, inflict damage to property or people. Large disasters can range from hurricanes, floods and tornadoes, to explosions, toxic chemical releases, and forest fires, up to and including nuclear attack.

MANAGEMENT - Defined as the coordination of an organized effort to attain specific goals or objectives. In Emergency Management, management means an organized effort to identify, steps to prevent or lessen the chance for, prepare for, respond to, and recover from, disasters.

An Emergency Management Program is of vital importance to the citizens of Barnstead. It can help prevent death and injury to citizens, save millions of dollars in repair costs, and build confidence that our community is prepared for natural, technological and nuclear disasters.

It is the law. Every local jurisdiction must have an emergency management capability which integrates into the State of New Hampshire's Emergency Management System, and the State's into the National System.

The Civil Defense Act of 1950: It is the policy and intent of Congress to provide a system of Civil Defense for the protection of life and property in the United States from attack and from natural disaster.

New Hampshire RSA 107-C Emergency Management Act: The purpose of the chapter is to provide a plan for carrying out the necessary emergency functions in order to provide for the common defense and preserve the lives and the property of the people of the state from threat of harm in the event of any natural or man-made emergency. Designed to insure the protection and welfare of the public by providing orderly procedures to be followed in the event of disaster.

Barnstead Ordinance #41 - Emergency Management Ordinance - Intent and purpose to establish an office that will insure complete and efficient utilization of all Barnstead facilities to combat disaster, natural or man-made, enemy attack or other disasters. Barnstead Office of Emergency Management will be the coordinating agency for all activity in connection with emergency planning; it will be the instrument through which the community officials may exercise the authority and discharge the responsibilities vested in them in RSA, Chapter 107, State of New Hampshire, Civil Defense Act of 1950, as amended, and this ordinance.

One needs only to review national events/incidents to see the value and need of a comprehensive emergency management plan. For example: The floods in the Midwest. Hurricanes in Florida and South Carolina. The earthquake in San Francisco. Nuclear power plant release in Three Mile Island in Pennsylvania. Toxic chemical release in Texas.

Tornado or windshear in Southeast New Hampshire that killed three and injured eleven. Forest fire in Epsom that drained the town's resources and threatened the life and property of the citizens. Yes, disasters occur in New Hampshire, too.

What kind of response could one expect from the emergency response system in Barnstead to any one of these hazards? Is Barnstead prepared to warn all the citizens of an impending disaster or the secondary danger from a disaster that has already hit? Does Barnstead have a plan for the evacuation of it's citizenry? Does Barnstead have a Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan to deal with every contingency in coordinating all resources at it's disposal to protect life and property? Is it every man, woman and child for himself/herself in an emergency disaster situation or attack? The answer to these questions is "no" in most cases, and uncertain at best.

Disasters have phases or lifecycles. Disasters don't just suddenly appear. A hazard exists, but it takes some event or accident to turn the hazard into a disaster. For example:

A river always flows through a town. Large amounts of rain, or a breaking dam can produce a flood.

Propane and toxic materials trucks pass through the town on the roads and highways. Equipment failure or human error, can turn a routine gas delivery or transport of hazardous chemicals into a disaster.

Until we identify the potential hazards that exists, identify the resources and shortfalls to handle potential disaster, and plan for response and recovery, the Town of Barnstead is in an uncertain position.

The Director of the Town of Barnstead's Office of Emergency Management has the responsibility for coordinating the plans and operations of the various components of the emergency management system, ie.: fire and police, emergency medical services, public works, volunteers, and groups contributing to the management of emergencies. The Director manages the application of resources during a disaster.

In 1994, I will be working hard to coordinate the efforts of all departments in developing a comprehensive emergency management plan for the Town of Barnstead. However, it is not just the various departments that must work toward the goal of a Town Plan. Citizens must become involved as volunteers. I would hope that all citizens who feel they can contribute to this critically important function, would call and volunteer their services.

This was a very special year at the Oscar Foss Memorial Library as 1993 was the 100th birthday of a library in the Town of Barnstead. Many different activities surrounded this event. We had a "birthday celebration" in the fall and were very pleased to have several local authors either attending the celebration or displaying their books. Many people dropped by to wish the library a very happy birthday! There was a sign up poster at the library for birthday wishes and we had many. In December a bookmark contest was held in cooperation with the Barnstead Elementary School. Two winners, Shi Wha Park and Joshua Huggins, were awarded prizes for their very inventive bookmarks and the bookmarks have been reproduced and are available at the library. We all hope and anticipate that the next 100 years at the Oscar Foss Memorial Library will be just as wonderful as the past. As one patron said, "If the next 100 years are as progressive as the last 10 years...watch out!"

The Friends of the Barnstead Library were once again a very important part of the library's success. The Friends had a very successful Mother's Day plant sale in May, book sale in August and a sell-out pie sale in November. The group continues to work to purchase things for the library. This year they donated funds to have cosmetic renovations done to the downstairs and to purchase a number of Disney classic videos. The Friends also made a donation of two rhododendron plants in memory of Ellen Grau and Helen Soulia. These two wonderful ladies were extremely important to the Barnstead Library for many years. We are very, very grateful to this group for all their hard work and support.

Along with the volunteers of the Friends group we are lucky this year to have several other regular volunteers. Shirley Berubee, Teresa Parra, and Verona Fraser come in on a weekly basis and help out. Their support is invaluable!

We are delighted to have a "face lift" done to the downstairs of the library. Barbara and Jim Fegley spent numerous hours volunteering their time to renovate. We now have an expanded kitchen area and newly painted walls, complete with stenciling. It is our hope that we will soon have a new ceiling and maybe new carpeting. It certainly makes a BIG difference in the appearance of the downstairs and has been noted by the many, many people who hold meetings downstairs.

Another successful Candidates Night was held in February. This program continues to be well-attended and of great interest to many townspeople. Other programs offered this year were a music program with stories for preschools and an adult basket class.

The summer reading program this year was called, "Together is Better...Let's Read". The theme was to encourage families to read

together. We had 27 children complete the requirements for the reading program and they were awarded certificates at the end.

This year we expanded our McNaughton rental plan which enables us to keep almost all the best sellers on hand. We also are in 2 Co-op's with a video exchange and the State Library, which means we are able to change our video collection on a regular basis. We were astounded at the end of the year to see that 600 videos had circulated thru the library! Other statistics include 473 Inter-Library loan and Large Print books, which means we were servicing a number of individual requests and needs. Our total circulation was increased yet again with a year's end figure of 12,006. We have had an increase for nine out of the past 10 years!

Cheryl Guilbert, who had been assistant librarian for three years, left at the end of December. We were sad to see Cheryl leave as she had become a significant part of the library. We were very pleased however to hire Bonita Brannigan as the assistant. Bonnie comes to the OFML with several years of library experience and we know this will be beneficial to us all as we continue on the inventory and computerized circulation. I continue to serve as a Library Director and hope to see all of you at the Library. REPORT OF THE BARNSTEAD PLANNING BOARD

In 1993 the Barnstead Planning Board continued to see a reduction in subdivision applications as experienced in 1992. No major subdivision applications were filed during the year. Several minor subdivision applications were approved. For the most part, these applications reflected lots subdivided for family use rather than a trend of the economy.

During the year the Board has been refashioning the zoning ordinances. In their present form the ordinances are difficult to read and interpret. Therefore, the Board has been recodifying the entire set of ordinances. Since no fundamental change will result, a ballot vote is not required. The 1994 ballot will include two revisions to the zoning ordinance. These will modify the existing open space preservation development ordinances by decreasing the total area required to qualify for this classification.

The software package that will be used to update the Capital Improvement Plan is nearly complete. The State suggests that this plan be updated annually. Once it is complete, many hours of research will be eliminated thereby reducing cost. Another feature of this package is its income potential. Presently, a major subdivision applicant is required to submit a variety of reports to the Board. An applicant generally retains consultants to prepare them. The required data can be accessed from the program. The Town would charge a fee for the information which will be less expensive to the applicant.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1993, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were campfires left unattended, unsupervised children and debris fires that escaped control. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help!

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law(RSA 224:27 II) requires that,"No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open , except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildfire suppression during 1993 and participated in many fire prevention programs. This year, the nation is celebrating Smokey Bear's 50th anniversary. The State of New Hampshire Forest Protection Bureau will be working with many communities to spread the fire prevention message -"Remember...Only YOU can prevent forest fires. Fire prevention is the most cost effective fire suppression tool. Please be careful around fires and help us and our communities have a fire safe year.

REPORT OF THE ROADS & BRIDGES COMMITTEE

The Roads and Bridges Committee was created by a motion which was passed by the 1993 Barnstead town meeting. The committee is composed of volunteer citizens, an ex-officio selectman and the town road agent. The charter of this group includes the following:

To assess the current status of all town roads and bridges

To determine, to the degree possible, the cost of maintaining the roads and bridges in recent years

To acquire information concerning the cost of maintaining roads and bridges in towns similar to Barnstead in size and complexity

To examine the structure (ie. elected or appointed, municipal or contracted) of the highway department in comparable locales

To try to ascertain the most efficient way to maintain the existing roads and bridges and the implementation of new roads and bridges when required

To recommend to the town measures which will provide a more efficient means of maintaining and upgrading, where needed, the roads and bridges of Barnstead

To establish road maintenance priorities that could be useful to the Road Agent and in the Capital Improvement Plan

The Roads and Bridges Committee held its first meeting on May 6. Two working groups were created shortly thereafter. The first group was to look at the cost of maintaining roads and bridges. The second to try to determine what priorities might be established to guide the Road Agent in his work of maintaining the town roads. The committee subsequently examined the pro's and con's of paved versus unpaved roads in terms of maintenance cost and serviceability.

A software package, acquired from the University of New Hampshire Technology Transfer Center, is designed to facilitate the cataloging of roads and their characteristics and condition. The program called Road Surface Management System (RSMS) was used along with a "fifth wheel" and a laptop computer, borrowed from UNH,

to accurately measure and evaluate all town roads. While the RSMS is not intended to replace detailed engineering analysis and evaluation of roadways, the system does provide a "screening" of roadways that should ultimately enable the Road Agent to schedule road maintenance needs.

An initiative of the selectmen and the town fire departments which calls for the "opening up" of existing class VI roads to facilitate access by fire equipment is endorsed by this committee. Possible funding mechanisms will also be explored.

Several initiatives have been developed by the committee. Included in these are warrant articles which would raise the Garland Road and the Welch Road to class V as well as articles calling for the improvement or restoration of bridges on the Hartshorn Road and the Welch Road. An offer to the committee to cut and chip new growth along the right of way on all class VI roads with no cost to the Town was passed to the selectmen.

The Roads and Bridges Committee has proved itself to be a dynamic group working to assist the Selectmen and Road Agent in helping Barnstead achieve the highest quality of roads and bridges with maximum utilization of the available resources. Membership on the committee is open to anyone interested in joining the committee. Please contact any of the members listed below for further information.

As a first time legislator, it has been a privilege to represent you in the New Hampshire House. I was appointed to serve on the House Committee on Wildlife and Marine Resources. This Committee, formerly called Fish and Game, has assumed greater responsibility in the overall state policy, not only with respect to hunting and fishing, but in the overall management of our State's natural resources. I led the fight on the House floor against mandatory hunter orange and this bill was soundly defeated.

I achieved a 94% attendance record and voted to support Governor Merrill in both the State Operating Budget and the Capital Budget. Additionally, I supported:

1. Term limits of office for the members of Congress;
2. Legislation establishing an animal population control program to combat the serious threat of rabies. The program will go into effect later this year;
3. More State funding for education; and,
4. Supported lowering the level for legal intoxication under DWI laws from .10 to .08.

I introduced several bills: One to study radon levels in New Hampshire with a report and recommendation due back this year from the Department of Public Health.

The second bill was the establishment of a state-local advisory committee to provide a mechanism for our State's Executive and Legislative leaders to better understand problems at our local level. This bill, which was sent to study, is coming back with a committee recommendation of ought to pass.

As a member of the Belknap County Delegation, I have worked to control County spending and insure that County services reflect the needs of our communities.

As a legislator, I had the unique opportunity to participate along with 12 other legislators and the Mayor of Nashua, in a sky dive for charity. Jumping out of a plane at 13,500 feet and descending at a speed of 120 miles per hour before the chute opened, was certainly a different experience. Collectively, we raised over \$5,000 for the Special Olympics.

I have also been involved in consumer issues, particularly with respect to what has been happening with cable t.v., and continue to work on this issue to protect the public interest.

Finally, I am always available to talk with constituents about concerns, problems, and suggestions which you may have.

SUMMARY OF 1993 WARRANT ARTICLES

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers of the year ensuing. The second session for the purpose of discussion and voting upon the articles of the Town Warrant, and for all other business to come before the meeting. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committee or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ACTION TAKEN: Total appropriation of \$1,394,591.00, Passed

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive, and expend Federal or State grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money, provided: (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditures of other town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA:32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95b.

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

5. To see if the Town will vote on the following: "That the Town of Barnstead reconvey to Kenneth M. Sheets and Charlotte F. Sheets title to the real estate located at Lot 348A Section 4, Tax Map 036, Lot 348-A. This reconveyance shall be made subject to a first mortgage on the premises granted to BankEast and now held by First NH Bank. This reconveyance is of the property which was deeded to the Town of Barnstead by Tax Collector's Deed dated April 30, 1992 and recorded in the Belknap County Registry of Deeds at Book 1209, Page 431." (by petition)

ACTION TAKEN: Amended to read " That the Town of Barnstead reconvey to Kenneth and Charlotte Sheets property which was deeded to the Town by Tax Collector's Deed and this

reconveyance will be made in exchange for all taxes, legal fees and other expenses. Passed by unanimous voice vote.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to Raymond Pelletier property identified on Tax Map 6, Lot 69 for all back taxes and related town expenses. Said property taken by Tax Collector's Deed dated April 30, 1992.

ACTION TAKEN: Defeated

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a first mortgage in lieu of back taxes, interest and costs on the Everett and Gladys Parry property. Back taxes, interest and costs would accrue 5% per annum interest until discharged.

ACTION TAKEN: Amended to 7 3/4% , Passed

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town to enter into a lease-purchase agreement for the purpose of leasing a truck for the Highway Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,179 for the first year's payment. The lease shall be renewable annually at the request of the Town. (majority vote required)

ACTION TAKEN: Amended to purchase rather than lease , Passed

9. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw the sum of \$10,000 from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund, and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,100 by taxation for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser.

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

10. To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of an existing Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund to the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (2/3 vote required)

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$90,000 for renovation and alteration of the existing Town Hall as recommended by the Town Hall Study Committee, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$60,000 from the Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. The balance of \$30,000 is to be raised by taxation. The Selectmen are requested to appoint a committee of five residents of the Town to assist the Selectmen in accomplishing such repairs to the

Town Hall within the cost limitation stated. (submitted by Town Hall Study Committee)

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

12. To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the Town Hall Capital Reserve Fund to the Town Hall Building Capital Reserve Fund.(submitted by Town Hall Study Committee, 2/3 vote required)

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to be added to the Town Hall Building Capital Reserve Fund . (submitted by Town Hall Study Committee)

ACTION TAKEN:Passed

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000, the same to be placed in the Town Hall Restoration Capital Reserve Fund, created for this purpose.

ACTION TAKEN: Amended to \$5,000, Defeated

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000, and the same to be placed in the Reconstruction of Town Bridges Capital Reserve Fund, created for this purpose.

ACTION TAKEN: Defeated

The meeting was recessed at 12:45PM and reconvened March 27th at 9AM.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000, and same to be placed in the Library Construction Capital Reserve Fund, created for this purpose.

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000, and same to be placed in the Highway Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, created for this purpose.

ACTION TAKEN: Defeated

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 from Roland and Alice LaBrecque, with the interest to be used for the

perpetual care of the Rick and Karen Montgomery lot (No.17) in the Pitman Cemetery in Center Barnstead, N.H.

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

19. To see if the Town will vote to accept 41 trust funds, with the interest to be used for the perpetual care of lots in the Riverview Cemetery. The total of these funds are \$10,100. These are funds that have been given to the Cemetery Association in the last 3 years.

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, pursuant to RSA 80:80. The proceeds to be used to offset taxes.

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

21. To see if the Town will vote on the following: "That Pine Ridge Road be accepted as a town approved road and that the town provide all applicable services for the repair, maintenance, and plowing of this roadway from the point of Peacham Road to the end of the tarred section of Pine Ridge Road (approx. 650 feet); and that the town also accept the fire cistern on Pine Ridge Road and maintain it for the benefit of all taxpayers and homeowners in this area in case of a fire emergency. (by petition)

ACTION TAKEN: Defeated

22. To see if the Town of Barnstead will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Highway Agent in accordance with the provisions of RSA 231:62. (by petition)

ACTION TAKEN: Defeated

23. To see if the Town will vote on the following: The now appointed position of police chief should become an elected position by the voters of the Town of Barnstead on the official ballot for 1994. The term of this elected position to be 1 year. Candidates wishing to file for this office must meet standards, requirements and qualifications set forth by the State and Town. This petition article to be voted on by secret ballot. (by petition)

ACTION TAKEN: Defeated

24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of N.H.RSA 202-A:4C: Trustees Authority to Accept and Expend Gifts. Any Town at an annual meeting may adopt an article or include in its budget, a line item authorizing the Public Library Trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal or other Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year. Such article or item shall:

1. Be used only for legal purposes for which the Town may appropriate money.
2. Not require the expenditure of other Town funds.
3. Be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32, relative to limitation and expenditure of Town monies.

ACTION TAKEN: Passed

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ACTION TAKEN: A resolution vote was taken on the polls being open from 7AM to 7PM at future elections, Passed. A straw vote was taken on keeping the Town Meeting form of government, Passed. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 12:45PM.
