#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough, in said State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To bring forward your ballots for the necessary town officers for the ensuing year and the ensuing three years. Polls are to open at 10:00 A.M. and are not to close before 6:00 P.M. At 8:00 P.M. action will be taken on the following Articles in the Warrant:

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, up to the sum of \$50,000.00 if needed, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for interest thereon.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,935.00 for the operation and maintenance of the Bedford Public Library.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to insulate the Bedford Public Library.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,327.09 for Construction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$8,847.24.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for the tarring of Class V Highways under the direction of the Selectmen.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the Town.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for damages and legal expense including dog damages.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Grader.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,800.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Tractor Loader.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new fire truck. Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the care of the New Cemetery; \$25.00 for pumping water for same; \$200.00 for care of Jeppa Cemetery; \$50.00 for care of Old Cemetery on Back River Road; and \$25.00 for care of the Beals Cemetery.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for maintenance of power equipment used in Town Cemeteries.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Loaming and grading that part of the New Cemetery just opened East of the black top driveway.

*Article 16.* To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to operate and maintain the Police Department.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the Planning Board.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the Board of Adjustment.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for Civil Defense.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the installation of a dry hydrant on Wallace Road near the George Merrill property.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to engage a professional consultant for the purpose of conducting an overall planning and development survey of the Town. This sum will be matched by a grant of one thousand dollars from the State of New Hampshire and six thousand dollars from the Federal Government. (Not recommended by the Budget Commission.)

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00, to supplement Material, Services and Property already pledged, for the construction and maintenance of a Civil Defense Control Center. (Not included in Budget Committee's Budget.) Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38.88 for the installation of a street light on the next to last electric utility pole on the left side of Savoie Street Extension. (By petition) (Not included in Budget Committee's Budget).

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars the old road leading from Bedford to Goffstown. Said road laid out three (3) rods wide by a vote of the Town in the year 1780 and listed in the records of the New Hampshire Highway Department as road No. 55-59 in the year 1954, hereinafter described. Beginning at the intersection of the New Boston Road and land of Rebert Dunlap on the East and land of William McAllister on the West thence Northerly to a division or intersection of said road thence North-Westerly to point No. 312 to land of Lindahl and Wright formerly of John McPherson. Again, from the point of intersection in a North-Easterly direction by land of Robert Dunlap, by point No. 309, to the West side of the Wallace Road.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept Elk Drive from a point beginning on the North side of Route 101 in a Northerly direction for a distance of 1,200 feet by 50 feet wide including a turn-around at the Northerly dead end.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept Strawberry Hill Road from a point beginning at Liberty Hill Road, westerly for a distance of 815 feet by 50 feet wide including a turn-around at the temporary westerly end of said Strawberry Hill Road.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the East end of Juniper Drive, beginning with the North side of Smith Road and continuing in a Northerly direction for a distance of 331 feet by 50 feet wide.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the East end of Horizon Drive, beginning at the South side of Smith Road and continuing in a Southerly direction for a distance of 813 feet by 50 feet wide.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept an extension of Savoie Street, from a point beginning on Savoie Street 1065 feet Northerly of Donald Street, Northerly 400 feet by 50 feet wide including a turn around having a 75 foot radius at the Northerly end of said Savoie Street Extension. (By Petition)

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Chairman of the Board of Adjustment to appoint one or more temporary members to serve on the Board in the event of the temporary absence or disqualification of one or more of the duly elected members.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article XII of the Zoning Ordinance adopted December 8, 1953, and subsequently amended by adding sub-paragraph E that any application for a hearing and decision by the Board of Adjustment shall be accompanied by a fee of \$10.00 to defray in part the expense of operation of the Board and the cost of legal publication as required by law.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to change the Road Ordinance passed in March 8, 1960, section III, paragraph E by substituting the word diameter for the word radius in the last sentence. This sentence will then read "This turn around should have a centerline diameter of 75 feet.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance adopted December 8, 1953 as amended by reclassifying a parcel of land formerly owned by Woodburys and presently owned by the Wayfarer Motel from Residential-Agricultural to Commercial. This parcel comprises opproximately 3 acres bounded on the East by the Everett Turnpike, on the West and North by the land Woodbury, and on the South by Bowman's Brook.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance adopted December 8, 1953 as amended by reclassifying a parcel of land approximately 1 acre together with a garage owned by Frank Moy located on Gage Girls Road from Agricultural to Commercial. This land is temporarily zoned Commercial under a variance No. 6101 granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment on April 8, 1961.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore, chosen and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting, Given under our hands and seal this 20th day of February in the year of Our Lord, nineteen hundred sixty-two.

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE CIVIL DEFENSE AGENCY BEDFORD, N. H.

In event of war, emergency communications and radiological personnel shall coordinate their efforts by means of regular telephone service. If telephone service is disrupted, communications shall be set up by means of the regular Bedford Civil Defense Radio Network,

Since some of the Radiological team are also members of the network, it can then be determined whether it is safe for any coordinating personnel to proceed to Emergency Headquarters. At present, the Town Hall is the Emergency Headquarters and will be used as such by all Civil Defense teams unless other stipulations have been made.

It then becomes imperative for the members of the Executive Committee to pass on fallout clearance to their service personnel when so notified by the Chiefs of Communication and Radiological Units. NO ONE MOVES UNLESS SUCH CLEARANCE HAS BEEN GRANTED.

Welfare Service Units, in case of an emergency which disrupts telephone service, will report to the basement of th Town Hall as soon as clarance has been granted. These Service Units consist of:

Transportation and Fuel Unit will report directly to Paul Johonnett at his office and/or garage and shall maintain runner

Secretarial Staff will report to Emergency Headquarters for service or other communication with Headquarters.



#### AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness — our carelessness. This, we - you - and I can do somethink about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations — hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of vou -

- 1. Follow the warden's directions.
- 2. Secure the required burning permit.
- 3. Keep your fires under control.
- 4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
- 5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

Reports of the treasurer of the trustees and of the librarians give the taxpayer a fair picture of pragress made and funds expended during the year passed. However, the dramatic increase in the use of the library can best be illustrated with a brief summary of its growth during the past six years.

During the period above, the library building has been repainted inside and out. Inside, the lighting has been improved, shelving made adjustable. A new librarian's desk has been added, as have been steel card-filing cabinets, children's reading table and benches, new window shades and draperies. Running water was brought into the building and a small restroom built. Insurance on the contents has been doubled and is now \$5,000. Open hours have been increased from five on Friday to an additional five on Tuesday, and trustees hope to add, in 1962, three additional hours on Thursday.

The annual circulation of books and magazines has increased from 4,953 in 1956 to 21,647 from January 1, 1961 to January 1, 1962. The large increase in readers threatens to make the present library building inadequate to serve them properly; means to provide better service are being studied.

Rules and policies, first formulated in '56, have been several times revised. The resignation of Mrs. Minnie King. after 23 years of devoted service, resulted in the appointment of Frances Wiggin as librarian and as circulation increased, of Doris Peck as assistant. In October, 1961, selectmen appointed John Reilly, Jr. to serve on the board during the absence of Robert A. Bailey, re-activated into army service. With the help of Mrs. Rachel Sanborn, State Library Consultant, some 2,000 out-of-date books were culled from the shelves. The bookmobile service has continued to increase the loan of books through the State Library Extension Service. As rapidly as funds permit, this library is adding, by purchase and gift, basic and up-todate books. The long, tedious process of permanently cataloging the collection will soon be finished.

Reading interest has been stimulated and increased by printed publicity, open house hours, talks, children's book jacket contests, storytelling hours, observance of children's and national library weeks. A very successful children's summer reading program has been carried on in the past three years.

The librarian has attended two summer sessions for librarians held at UNH, and is now vice-president of the N. H. State Librarian's Association. All trustees are members of the State Association for Library Trustees. Librarians and trustees meet together monthly and in special session; have attended area meetings, and served as hosts when held in Bedford.

As of March, 1962, the Bedford Public Library urgently needs the intelligent thought and support of the townspeople if it is to be the town's cultural center. Needed are larger appropriations (the state recommends \$3.50 per capita; taxpayers last year appropriated about 90c per person); more open hours and more space for books will have to be provided.

To sum it all up — with increase of circulation and patronage, we're REALLY "bursting at the seams."

As the Bedford Library completes the year 1961, its records show a circulation increase over last year of 2,403 volumes loaned and the names of approximately 50 families added to our files. Our cataloging project is showing fine progress and should be reaching its climax before another year has passed.

In addition to our routine services, these are some of the extra activities your librarians and trustees have undertaken:

1. National Library Week was observed in April. We chose as our theme, "Let's Get Acquainted with New Hampshire". To promote further interest in books with a New Hampshire locale or written by a New Hampshire author, our school children were requested to illustrate this theme by choosing a book fitted to this category from our collection and augmented by a number of books borrowed from the state library, selecting an incident especially interesting to them, and drawing a picture to illustrate their impression. The winners had their pictures on display at the Town Hall on the evening of April 20th, at which time the highlight of this week, Miss Shirley Barker, authoress and native New Hampshire-ite, spoke to our townspeople and to many from surrounding towns. Mr. Perley Colby, County Agriculture Agent, also displayed pamphlets and bulletins available from the Extension Service of UNH. We further had special display books throughout the week at club functions and two film programs.

- 2. At the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association at Conway, N. H., attended by both librarians, I was honored by my election to the 1st Vice-Presidency of this organization. I am also privileged to serve as a member of the Governor's Committee for Better Libraries.
- 3. Our third annual summer reading program for school children was again well attended. The winners received award certificates with blue ribbons and a party.
- 4. Children's Book Week in November was observed with special displays, such as Mothers' Club gift books given during the year, the honor books in the children's field for 1960 and story-telling at the lower grade schools.

Your librarians and trustees have had a pleasant and fruitful year, and anticipate continued interest and growth in the year ahead.

We take this means of expressing our thanks to our interested friends from whom we have received gifts of books and magazines, with special thanks extended to the Bedford Garden Club, Mothers' Club of the Bedford Presbyterian Church, and Bedford Women's Club for their gifts.

#### REPORT OF BEDFORD SEWER COMMITTEE

Article 24 in the Town Warrant passed at the Town Meeting held on March 14, 1961 directed that a committee be established to assist the Planning Board in investigating the possibility of some means of sewage disposal in areas in town served by city water and to render a report at a future Town Meeting.

The Committee has had several meetings and has met with various experts in the field including the Senior Sanitary Engineer of the State Department of Health, Mrs. Kennard the Town Health Officer, Mr. Hyland of the engineering firm of Fay, Spofford and Thorndike and City of Manchester officials.

The result of these meetings, conferences and other committee work have been written up in a full report to the Town of Bedford Planning Board, together with recommendations concerning the problems of sewage disposal in the Town. This Committee specifically recommended that the Town underwrite the expense of engaging the services of a Sanitary Engineer to conduct a house to house survey in the Boynton and Donald Street areas to determine the extent of the sewage disposal problem and the feasibility of rendering technical assistance to the residents in these areas in an effort to solve the existing problems. It was further recommended that the Planning Board be authorized to supervise this undertaking. Any persons interested in additional facts concerning the study made by this Committee are referred to the full report placed on file with the Bedford Planning Board.

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Bedford, New Hampshire qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 20th day of March, 1962, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to vote for Officers under Articles 1, 2, 3, 4. Polls will be open from 10:00 A.M. to 6:30 P.M. Action on the remaining Articles will begin at 8:00 P.M.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will vote to combine the School District election with the Town election in accordance with Chapter 134, Sections 197: 1a through 197:1d, which permits School District elections to be held on the same day as the Town election. 10. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to expend a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 for the purpose of placing a binder on property to be used for building purposes, the School Board to work with the Town Planning Board in the selection of such site or sites.

11. To see if the District will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the District the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 302 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$206.63 to defray the share of the cost thereof.

12. To see if the District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

13. To see if the District wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

14. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the District the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the District will designate the Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF THE BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD 1961-1962

The year 1962 brings us to a time of crucial decision in providing space for our rapidly increasing enrollment. In 1958 our eight grades were all dual classes, two classes to a grade, this year in September we will have three grades split into three classrooms, this pattern destined to follow on up through the eight grades.

As of September 1962, all classrooms including the basement room at Stevens Buswell and the two rooms at Donald Street School, will be filled. Although the Donald Street School has served as a port in a storm, the opening and closing of this building entails considerable expense with the separate maintenance of all facilities as, janitor service, the lunch program, insurance, heating, light and general repairs and upkeep of the building. Due to vandalism this past summer, about 24 panes of glass and 4 protective window screens were broken which must be repaired and replaced. To prevent further damage, we boarded up all windows.

Our summer maintenance program has been carried out effectively with painting and repairs being done at each school. Our buildings are in good repair generally, we may need to reroof the Stevens Buswell in the near future, according to the recommendation of roofers who have recently repaired leaks and the continued use of the Donald Street School may require new clapboard or other appropriate siding.

The procurement of a full time janitor for the Bedford Memorial School has been a very satisfactory arrangement.

With the intention of obtaining professional advice on the school building needs of the town, the School Board hired, with funds appropriated last March, the services of Dr. Englehart, Educational Consultant, of New York City.

Dr. Englehart did a survey last summer, submitted a printed report and discussed this report at an open meeting in October, I would like to include his recommendations with this report for the record briefly as follows:

1. To build a new high school with optimum capacity of 400 pupils and to include the 7th and 8th grades in this building, providing a much more diversified program for these grades than is now possible in the Bedford Memorial building.

- 2. Such a building would relieve the present elementary situation until 1964, when consideration should be given to adding to the Bedford Memorial School a 9 room and library addition, which would permit closing the Peter Woodbury and Stevens Buswell.
- 3. An alternate possibility. Continue sending our secondary pupils to Manchester, add to the Memorial and continuing to use the Peter Woodbury and Stevens Buswell schools.

As a follow up of this survey, the Board set up a committee of citizens to further study this report and also to look into all possible alternatives. Dr. Englehart also met with the Board and this committee in November. The School Board has been very fortunate in, and is grateful for the excellent cooperation and enthusiasm of the parents and citizens of the town who have worked so willingly and ably on these various committees.

The School Board has met with the Civilian Defense committee to discuss the question of what to do with our school children in case of an attack, and adopted their very sensible suggestion of transporting them home as per usual, the time allowed following an alarm for such an attack being considered adequate.

With the intention of establishing a more coordinated articulation between our Junior High curriculum and that of the Manchester High system and to avoid unnecessary repetition in the freshman class, the School Board has held very satisfactory meetings with the Manchester officials and a plan for future meetings has been set up.

Because of the increase of our student population this past fall we have needed to renegotiate our transportation contract and add a fourth bus. The present combined capacity, we feel, will serve for some time to come.

Another problem presented by our enlarged enrollment is the number of children in our system who need special attention, namely the slow learner, and those needing remedial lessons. Within the last three years the number of such children has increased considerably and to these children, we feel we owe an obligation equal to, if not more than the requirements of the average or rapid learner, who, given extra work or an enrichment of his subject matter, progresses accordingly while the slow learner may ride the coattails of the class from grade to grade never quite catching up because his assimilation of the same subject matter is geared to a slower pace. And to allow these children the same advantages of education, the Board feels the necessity of providing a special class for them with a three fold advantage, first to this child, giving him the opportunity to digest the subject matter at his own rate and ability, secondly to the teacher, who cannot adequately allow the time for these children to catch up and retain the progress of the grade level. Thirdly by allowing all groups to progress according to their ability. In many instances, this special class will allow a child, after remedial methods, to return to the regular classroom wellequipped to carry on his grade work.

The School Board is grateful to Mr. Ramsay, our Supt., for his assistance and acceptance of the many and late meetings of the Board, to Mr. O'Neil, whom we shall miss from our union, for the cooperation and faithfulness of our principals and teaching staff, our school nurse, our lunch program personnel, our janitors and our bus drivers.

My special thanks to Ann Van Loan and Parker Leonard for their understanding and teamwork in helping to make my term on the School Board such a pleasant experience.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bedford, I submit with pleasure my seventh annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Over the past seven years I have watched with you the growth of the Bedford School System. Your School Needs Committee has projected future classroom needs for the years immediately ahead, and if you will study the classroom requirements as indicated on Page 100, of last years Annual Report you will note we are on schedule with a need for 20 rooms for 1962-63. You will note too that your school district budget reflects these needs in the re-opening of the two room Donald Street School and the addition of two teachers to the system.

I am happy that the Bedford School Board is approaching the problems created by increased school enrollment realistically and sensibly with the aid of various committees that are studying the problems from many different angles.

In light of Dr. Nicholas Englehardt's Survey, conducted last summer, and the findings of the above mentioned Committees, plus a close look at our school housing problems for 1962-63 it would appear that Bedford must make a most important decision. The sooner that decision is made the better it will be for the educational opportunities provided for your children.

Whatever decision you make you may be sure it will mean one of two things, either increased expenditures or decreased educational opportunities. Whatever your decision may it be made with the best interest of Bedford's young men and women in mind.

Following is a list of teachers new to Bedford for the year 1961-62. It was unfortunate that two of these teachers requested release from their contracts as of December 22, 1961. With the current fluency in population such occurances are now accepted as an occupational hazard.

#### NEW TEACHERS

Miss Helen Andersen, B.Ed., P.T.C., 1958, with graduate work at P.T.C. and B.U. to replace Miss Nancy St. Lawrence, Grade 4, who resigned to accept a position in Durham, N. H. Miss Andersen has had previous experience in N. Woodstock, and New Hampton Schools.

Charles A. Colpitts, B.Ed., P.T.C., 1954, with graduate work at P.T.C. to replace Miss Ann Lowery who resigned to accept a posi-

tion in Amherst. Mr. Colpitts has had previous experience in the school systems of Gilmanton and Dunbarton, N. H.

Mrs. Maureen Dee Smith, B.S. in Ed., Framingham State Teachers College, 1956, to replace Mrs. Penelope Skeer who resigned to remain at home with her family. Unfortunately Mrs. Smith found it necessary to resign December 22nd because of the transfer of her husband to an out of state position. She in turn will be replaced by Mrs. Virginia Taylor, K.T.C., who has had three years experience in the Nashua School system.

Mrs. Winifred Hoskins Cote, B.S. in Ed., Framingham State Teachers College, 1960, as an additional Grade 3 teacher. Mrs. Cote resigned for personal reasons January 5th to be replaced by Mrs. Mildred Lyons, P.T.C., 1936. Mrs. Lyons has had previous experience in the schools of Lyme, Tuftonboro and New Durham, N. H.

Miss Judith Wildam, B.A., Mt. St. Mary's, 1961, to replace Miss Lucille Demers as Social Studies teacher, grades 7 and 8. Miss Demers resigned to do graduate work in Foreign Languages at the University of Pittsburg, Pa.

#### **INSTRUCTION**

The continued success of Bedford's young men and women in their college and high school programs reflects the continued high caliber of instruction in the Bedford Schools. I wish to take this opportunity to compliment the principals and teachers on their continued efforts to upgrade instruction in the Bedford School System.

I was indeed sorry to lose the services of Teacher Consultant Paul O'Neil as of January 1, 1962. Paul's interest and efforts toward promoting a forward looking educational program will, I'm sure, be carried on by our new Teacher Consultant, Mr. Raymond Edwards, formerly Supervising Principal of the E. G. Sherburne Elementary School, Pelham, New Hampshire.

#### SCHOOL LUNCH

I wish to congratulate once again the School Lunch Director and helpers for the quality of the program they are maintaining in their respective schools. Fortunately this year there has been a larger supply of surplus foods than in the past few years. This has aided materially in the ability of the lunch directors to maintain their program within the money allotted.

There is one area in the School Lunch Program that needs attention in the very near future. The time has come when careful thought should be given to hiring a person to give individual attention to the coordination of directing of the Lunch Program. Mrs. Gladys Smend has been carrying out the dual role of School Nurse and School Lunch Director for the district and has been doing a fine job. However, with the increased school enrollment and consequent increased need for Health Services there is too little time to provide fully adequate coverage for both services. I would recommend, then, that each of the two programs be handled by one person with increased time being provided for health services in all the schools.

#### MAINTENANCE

The electing of Mr. Gordon Ellison as full time custodian at the Bedford Memorial School is paying big dividends. Mr. Ellison can be justifiably proud of the appearance of his building. Being a man who can do many tasks well, he has been able to make many minor repairs in all the schools of the district. Mr. Cupples at the Peter Woodbury and Mr. Harrington at Stevens-Buswell have both shown pride in maintaining an excellent overall appearance at their respective schools. I wish to thank them all for their cooperation and interest.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

In my opening statement I indicated the problems we face, and what is currently being done to find an answer.

To be more specific I believe we can approach a solution by either one or a combination of two or more of the following procedures. The decision will be yours after thoughtful appraisal of the recommendations made by your School Board and Committee.

1. Follow the recommendations made by Englehardt, Englehardt and Leggett, Educational Consultants.

2. Add 9 classrooms to the Bedford Memorial and consolidate all grades.

3. Build a new school for a departmentalized program in Grades 6, 7, and eight and consolidate Grade 1-5 in Bedford Memorial.

4. Add on to each of the present buildings as increased enrollment requires. (Heaven forbid) 5. Form a cooperative high school district with one or more neighboring school districts.

6. Form a Cooperative School District, grades 1-12 with one or more neighboring school districts.

7. Above items 2, 3, and 4 based on the premise that Bedford continue to send high school pupils to Manchester.

8. Maintain a "Lets wait and see' attitude. (Again heaven forbid)

Whatever the decision, we can be sure of two things: (1) It won't be cheap; (2) It won't be permanent.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation to all school personnel and to the School Board for their cooperation in working for the educational advantages in Bedford's schools. It has made my work in Bedford a continued pleasure.

#### TEACHER CONSULTANT'S REPORT

Mr. Louis Ramsay Superintendent of Schools Bedford, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Ramsay:

The following paragraphs will constitute my final report as Teacher Consultant in the Town of Bedford, New Hampshire. On January 2, 1962, I will assume my new duties as assistant superintendent of the Portsmouth (N. H.) school system. My years spent in Supervisory Union No. 27 have been of great benefit to me. I shall miss the many fine professional associates with whom I have worked — the school board members, you, as superintendent, the school principals, teachers, and central office secretaries. One would need to go far to find as cooperative a "team" as that which serves our schools, and our school children.

I like to think that great strides in our educational system have been made over the past few years. Realistically speaking, we need to set our sights higher, indeed, we must keep moving. The challenges facing education today are complex and require one hundred percent cooperation from everyone who feels a concern that our students achieve to their fullest. The demands upon our schools are burdensome but should not be overpowering. Our teachers are well prepared but it must not stop there. They have a professional obligation to equip themselves so that they can do their jobs better. Education has no room for stagnation.

We, here in the Bedford Schools, feel that we have been doing our jobs as educators. An unusually large number of our teachers and administrators are working toward advanced degrees at leading colleges and universities. This they are doing at rather costly sacrifice, both physical and financial. In the next few succeeding years more towns the size of Bedford will be assisting teachers with tuition monies to help pay the cost of graduate courses. One would be amazed to know the large number of New Hampshire communities who are already providing such assistance. As our school system grows in size 1 would hope Bedford townspeople keep a careful eye on class size, *especially in the first grade*, but not solely. Many schools have a set policy in this regard, the bulk of which feel that a *maximum* of 30 pupils per classroom guarantees a greater degree of efficiency. I am of the opinion that twenty-five pupils per teacher in grade one is even more desirable.

Bedford citizens will be called upon to decide the future of its school building needs this Spring. These needs are pressing ones. As Mr. Ramsay has pointed out, Bedford, like many other southern New Hampshire communities, is experiencing a rapid growth pattern. The statistics contained in the Englehardt report command your serious attention. The problem of overcrowding will be with us in September, 1962 — just a few short months away! Consider, as you always have in Bedford, what you think your children deserve — educationally speaking, and let your conscience be your guide.

This year our school administrators have launched a full scale system of teacher evaluation. Periodic performance reports on each teacher are filled in each school and at the supervisory union office. This system of evaluation has been most successful and it has provided much in-service growth. This device protects us and you from unsatisfactory classroom experiences stemming from poor teaching ability. We must continue to improve that which we are new doing well.

Early in 1962 our schools will involve themselves with an expanded standardized testing program. These newer tests will measure many more curriculum areas than did the ones previously in use. We were fortunate to have been invited to participate in a testing revision program by a nationally known Test Company. This invitation will save the school district considerable expense and will provide teachers, principals, and guidance directors with a vast amount of information on each pupil. This new device will assist us in knowing the strengths and weaknesses of our school children so that we might keep the curriculum in healthy balance.

Teaching by television is not just a passing fancy — it is here to stay. Yet we need to take a searching look at the equipment on hand and be prepared to expand the services thereof.

There are other devices, techniques, and innovations presently going on in your school(s); all have potential and show promise. I urge parents to come into the schools often. Your presence is always desired. Our problems are complex but somehow their magnitude dwindles when sympathetic, interested, and cooperative parents frequent the schools.

,In closing, Benjamin Willis, one of our nation's top educators has said of teaching, "Generally, to speak of the school is to conjure up in the public mind an image of a building. It would be closer to the truth if the word SCHOOL were to bring to mind a picture of the teacher. THE TEACHER MAKES THE SCHOOL."

Let us not forget that quotation for it certainly speaks the truth.

Dear Sir:

The diligence and the conscientious efforts of the teachers has always been and continues to be the major reason for the success and constant improvement of the curriculum at the Memorial School.

The program in Modern Mathematics which was instituted this year in the seventh grade has proven highly successful. Plans have already been formulated to continue this course of study in the eighth grade for the coming year. An attempt is also being made to institute this program of studies for the talented students in the intermediate grades. Though this is, in many instances, still in the planning stage; we are very encouraged in the progress made thus far and feel confident that we will eventually develop a strong Modern Mathematics program in all grades.

The Jopplin reading program which was instituted two years ago continues to prove highly successful. It is proven especially valuable to those students who needed remedial help in reading.

Our efforts and thoughts have always been directed toward the goal of educating the children in this school in such a way that the needs and capacities of all our students would be met and challenged. Grouping and special programs, both for the talented students as well as for the so-called slow learners have been instituted during the past few years.

The needs however, of certain so-called slow learners and students who needed to do remedial work in grades four, five, and six has slowly and gradually become a major problem for teachers to cope with. This is due in large measure to the increased enrollment in these grades. In the past many of these students were helped by the teachers after school hours due to the fact that the teachers can only give them a limited amount of time and attention during school hours because of their responsibilities to the other

#### ANNUAL REPORT

members of the class. Some of them have been helped through tutoring whenever the parents were willing and able to pay for this service. We have also been able to help these students in reading through the use of the Jopplin plan. However, this leaves a wide area of skills and subject matter which students must master.

We now have many students who with special training and help could, over a period of time, master the necessary skills and progress in such a manner that many of them could return to a regular classroom and achieve at grade level. A large number of these students are presently enrolled in the fifth grade. This grade is presently very large, since it has a total enrollment of seventyseven students. Enrollment figures of the past few years indicate a strong possibility of an increase in the enrollment of this group by next year. This would probably necessitate the establishment of an additional sixth grade next year.

However, the creation of a special ungraded remedial class for next year would definitely alleviate the necessity of an additional sixth grade and of greater importance, would establish a program whereby we would be able to assist these students on an individualized basis, to achieve and grow at a rate commensurate with their abilities and capacity.

With these needs in mind we sincerely recommend this program for your consideration.
