

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Boscawen on Tuesday, the Fourth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to have the State of New Hampshire, Department of Revenue Administration, audit the financial records of the Town for the years 1974-1975.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2,000.00 to purchase a used grader for the Highway Department.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the financing of the acquisition of a new fire truck.

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,900.00 to purchase a new cruiser for the Police Department.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 toward the purchase of a new ambulance for the Penacook Rescue Squad.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4,125.00 to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association.
- 9. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$39,443.00 plus interest earned from the revenue sharing trust fund to be applied toward the reduction of taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,519.20 for the continuation of services to low-income residents of Boscawen through the Concord Area Center of the Community Action Program.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 to develop a Little League ball park which will match funds to be provided by the Boscawen Athletic Association and matching BOR funds. The ball field is to be constructed on Town-owned land.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Concord Hospital.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Franklin Hospital.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Rolfe Park.
- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Penacook Youth Center.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the Town until the taxes are paid to the Treasurer.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer or sell property taken by the Town in default of Redemption from Tax Sale or otherwise acquired.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to transfer any unexpended balance of money from one appropriation to another.

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- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application for and to accept on behalf of the Town any advances or other funds coming from the U. S. A. or the State of New Hampshire or any Federal or State Agency.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to grant site plan review authority to the Planning Board in accordance with RSA 36:19a. This will provide the Town with an opportunity to review and approve or disapprove plans for non-residential development.
- 21. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

We are pleased to report to the Town that this year saw substantial accomplishments in fulfilling our obligations to manage the affairs of the Community in a businesslike manner; and to provide the very best in services at minimal cost to the taxpayer. Although we were faced with rapidly rising costs, we were able to realize a substantial reduction in the municipal tax rate. As you are aware, the cost to the taxpayer to operate the Town in 1974 dropped from \$1.11 per hundred dollars of valuation to \$.77 per hundred. We do not expect to be able to maintain this level of taxation, again due to rapidly rising costs and the fact that the demands for services by the people are increasing as our population continues to increase. In addition, in 1975 we must start paying debt service on our sewer bonds and sanitary landfill.

We would like to take this opportunity to highlight some of the accomplishments during 1974.

The Town can take considerable pride in the fact that it had the foresight to establish a Sanitary Landfill, in accordance with specifications, and have it in full operation by the July 1, 1974 deadline. Immediately after the last town meeting, land was purchased and approvals were received from the various State agencies; Marlborough Road was improved and land clearing took place at a very rapid pace. The Road Agent requested and received bids on compactors, and a Catepillar 930 was purchased. This machine was selected for its ability to work the landfill area as well as other road work and snow removal if required. The Selectmen and Highway crew appreciate the cooperation of the people during the transition to this new method of rubbish disposal.

The Contoocook River Interceptor sewer is 90% complete and is now taking sewerage to the new treatment plant in Penacook. The remaining work will be completed in the Spring, and the Town will have fulfilled its obligation to take its raw sewerage out of the river. Work was started in the late summer to separate the storm drains from the sanitary sewer. This is necessary so that the users will not have to pay for storm water going into the treatment plant. The money which was raised several years ago was insufficient to do the total project because of spiraling costs. We, therefore, are proceeding on the recommendation of the engineers with a revised plan in order to stay within the appropriation. The revised plan will take care of the bulk of the storm water, according to the engineers, but additional work will be required in the future to totally exclude storm water from the system. We are in hopes that additional Federal Funds may become available for this purpose. The bulk of the work has been completed along Route 3, and work will begin in the spring on the side streets West of Route 3. We are aware that the contractor on this job caused considerable inconvenience to the residents and businessmen and appreciate your patience on this matter. Since it is a State contract, we had no direct control over the conditions that existed.

The Highway Department had a busy year, devoting many hours to the landfill, sewer projects, road work, etc. Harvey Hollins, after over 25 years of

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New compactor in operation at the Boscawen Sanitary Landfill. This machine is also capable of doing highway work and snow removal.


service to the Town, announced his retirement as Road Agent. Our best wishes and deep appreciation are extended to Harvey on this occasion. The Selectmen have appointed Richard Hollins as Road Agent, and we are confident that he will continue the good work and service that we are all accustomed to. In addition to our normal TRA road construction and highway maintenance projects, for 1975, we are requesting funds to improve certain streets in lower Boscawen. This is long overdue, and if it is not started, each year that passes will produce higher costs to the taxpayer.

In the area of social services, we are finding that needs exist amongst our citizens for additional services. We are, therefore, submitting two Articles for your consideration; Community Action and Visiting Nurses. The Community Action Program is currently sponsoring a food co-op in Town as well as providing bus service to many of our elderly. The Visiting Nurses Association will provide much needed health services to the community. Due to the current economic situation, we are finding increased demand for direct aid to residents. Our Overseer of Public Welfare is handling this service in a very efficient manner, and has instituted procedures for screening applicants for direct aid. We were very saddened at the death of Russell Mattice, who handled this position with dedication for many years. The Selectmen have appointed George Mullins as his successor, and we are extremely grateful for the way he is handling this important phase of town government.

The Boscawen Police Department has experienced another year of accelerated demands for service in all phases of law enforcement. It is anticipated that this pace will continue if the economic situation does not stabilize soon. Chief Downing has prepared an extensive report to the town which demonstrates the increased demand for police services. His report appears in this annual report. The Selectmen have taken a positive stand with the County delegation to maintain the County dispatch service. We consider this to be a vital part of our Police Department, since it provides us with radio and telephone communications 24 hours a day, seven days a week. To duplicate this service, it would cost the Town \$40,000 to \$50,000 per year which it cannot afford. We urge the citizens to express support for this service through their Legislative delegates.

Continuing their practice of the past several years, the Selectmen have spent considerable time reviewing and upgrading the assessed valuation of the Town. This is a very time consuming and painstaking effort which cannot be accomplished immediately in one year. We are very much aware that discrepancies exist, and hope to alleviate this situation by reviewing different sections of the Town annually.

The Fire Department was put to task on several occasions during the year when they were called to put out some major structural fires. The professional manner in which these fires were handled can be credited to the continuing training programs and operational techniques employed by the Department. As noted in Chief Bartlett's report, the new 1,500 gallon pumper is ordered and due for delivery in July. The Central Dispatch service is in full operation and



providing the Town with greater coverage, faster response to an alarm, extra men and equipment when needed, and full coverage by Penacook Rescue at a structural fire.

Commenting briefly on the Penacook Rescue Squad, the Selectmen are pleased to sponsor a special article this year to raise \$5,000 for a new ambulance. This volunteer service has faithfully provided ambulance and rescue service to the Town for many years and has never before requested public money. We are all aware and appreciative of the 100% response of the Squad to every citizen in need of their help in Boscawen.

As we pointed out in last years' report, the administration of Town Government has become so complex, that in order to handle your tax dollars and the affairs of the Town, we have had to obtain extra help. We are mandated by law to keep accurate public records, maintain good accounting practices, administer federal and state funds, oversee public works projects, etc. It came to our attention (early in the year) by the Division of Municipal Accounting that there were inadequacies and discrepancies in our bookkeeping procedures. We have taken steps to correct this problem by hiring, on a part-time basis, a professional accountant to handle our bookkeeping. For years, permanent Town records and documents have been scattered all over town in private homes. This is extremely dangerous and unbusinesslike, since we are required by law to keep permanent Town records, in some cases forever, and in other cases for 7 and 20 years. Although your Selectmen have been denied funds for adequate office and record storage facilities, we have made a concerted effort this year to maintain proper records, and have attempted to centrally index and house them for the future. To handle this monumental project we have hired a part-time secretary. In addition to setting up this important record system, she is establishing essential business procedures which are long overdue, such as personnel files, purchase order systems, indexing of all town maps, as well as other secretarial duties for the Selectmen, Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment. We cannot emphasize strongly enough, that the management of town affairs can no longer be taken lightly, and that the town must fulfill its obligations in this respect by providing the necessary manpower and office space.

By 1980 New Hampshire State law requires that all towns have a tax map showing boundaries and volume of all properties in the Community. In addition to the mapping, it is a requirement that each parcel be designated and referenced in a master index. The Boscawen tax map is pretty well completed and may be inspected by property owners to verify their lot sizes.

We would like to take this opportunity to express our appreciation to all Town employees, Town Officers, Committee members, and citizens who have cooperated and assisted us during the year. Without their help, many of our achievements would not have been possible.

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p. m. by Robert Johnson, Moderator, who gave a report of the balloting.

Moderator Johnson read a letter from the Governor of the State of New Hampshire requesting an expression of the opinion of the voters in our community on the following question:

"Do you favor the construction of an oil refinery in New Hampshire so long as it meets all environmental requirements?"

Such a vote, if taken, will not be legally binding on anyone, but would offer an expedient means of obtaining a statewide referendum to guide our elected representatives in Concord when considering legislation pertaining to the proposed refinery.

Mr. Rineer made a motion that we vote by a voice ballot. Mr. Steenbeke, Sr. moved the question that we vote on the refinery question by a voice vote. Motion is carried. The question: Do you favor the construction of an oil refinery in New Hampshire so long as it meets all environmental requirements Yes vote. Motion carred.

Official Weighers: Mr. Roger C. Sanborn made a motion that the present incumbents be re-elected. It was noted that two of these people Richard Davis and John McPherson should be deleted as they had moved out of Town. Mr. Sanborn moved that Charles Scheys be elected to replace one and that no other was needed. The motion was seconded and carried.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber: Mr. Supry made a motion that the present incumbents be re-elected. The motion was seconded and carried.

Fence Viewers: Mr. James Steenbeke, Sr. made a motion that the present incumbents be re-elected. The motion was seconded and carried.

Article 2:

Mr. Steenbeke, Sr. Commended the Selectmen on their very comprehensive report submitted with the Town Report.

Moderator Johnson read the estimated appropriations for the ensuing fiscal year 1974 totaling \$175,035.53. Mr. James Steenbeke, Sr. made a motion that the Budget as printed and read be accepted. Motion was seconded.

Mrs. Dorothy Sanborn would like an explanation of why Town Officers salaries were up. Mr. Welcome gave the following salaries to be paid to the officers for this year.

Mr. Steenbeke, Sr. remarked that the Selectmen put in a lot of time and the amount of money hardly pay for their time.

The motion is that the Budget as printed and read be accepted. Voice vote. Motion carried.

Mrs. Sanborn asked to go to Article 22. Mrs. Bassett made a motion that we go immediately to Article 22. Motion seconded. Voice vote taken. Motion is defeated.

Article 3:

Mr. Butt made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$310.00 for the Concord Hospital. Motion seconded. Voice vote taken. Motion carried.

Article 4:

Motion was made that \$200.00 be raised and appropriated for Franklin Hospital. Motion seconded. Voice vote taken. Motion carried.

Article 5:

Mr. James Steenbeke, Sr. made a motion that the sum of \$200.00 be raised and appropriated for Rolfe Park. Motion seconded. Voice vote. Motion carried.

Article 6:

Mr. Amos Merchant made a motion that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for Penacook Youth Center. Motion seconded. Voice vote. Motion carried.

Article 7:

Motion was made that this article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded, Voice vote, Motion carried.

Article 8:

Mr. Steenbeke, Sr. made a reference to Article 20. The Town owns one lot called the Barnard lot with a considerable amount of timber and the Selectmen have had an offer to buy that land. He suggested a mandate to the Selectmen to sell the timber from the land or to sell this land to help pay for the land and expenses in Article 20. Motion was made that we accept the article as printed to add to the article that the Selectmen be given a mandate to sell between now and the next Town Meeting to the highest bidder the two lots known as the Barnard lot and Eastman lot to the highest bidder to best advantage of the Town. Amendment to direct the Selectmen to sell the Barnard and Eastman lots to the highest bidder in whatever manner is most advantageous to the Town of Boscawen, Mr. Johnson read a letter from the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests dated February 28, 1974. The report of this inspection recommended that the Town retain ownership of the wood lots and undertake selective cutting of timber. The report indicated that these lots have a potential. He urged the Town of Boscawen to resist the temptation to sell these lots, suggested that a committee be appointed, recommended Municipal Conservation Society for the protection of the New Hampshire forests. Mr. Steenbeke recommended the sale of these two lots, think there is no need of having these two wood lots. We have the Weir property and it is very adequate for this Town.

Mr. Millard would like to amend this so that it couldn't be sold to a developer. Amendment that this town land under consideration cannot be sold for housing development.

Mr. McCarthy was asked if the Zoning Ordinance as it stands controls the development of the land. He stated that the Board has the final say on the development. In this particular area the Zoning Ordinance only allows one dwelling unit to three acres of land. Mr. Steenbeke asked if this particular piece

of land would be acceptable by the water pollution board. Mr. Rineer called the question on the amendment. Voice vote. Amendment is defeated.

Article 8 to read to see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to sell or transfer property taken by the Town in default of redemption from tax sale or otherwise acquired such sale to be a public sale to the highest bidder and further that the Selectmen be directed to sell the Barnard lot and the Eastman lot on such terms as may be most beneficial to the Town of Boscawen. Motion seconded. Voice vote. Motion carried and it is so declared.

Article 9:

Mr. James Steenbeke, Jr. made a motion that the article be accepted as read. Motion seconded. Voice vote. Motion is carried.

Article 10:

Mr. Marshall made a motion that we adopt the article. Motion seconded. Mr. Marshall introduced the Fire Ward Committee and referred to their report on Pages 58 and 59 of the Town report. Their work has been to make recommendations and study problems to keep in tune with the times. He pointed out items No. 5-6 and 11 on Page 59.

The question was asked as to how we are going to know if we will get fire coverage under the Capitol Area Compact Dispatch Service. Mr. Carey spoke in favor of this saying that we were under this system for years for nothing and now we have reached the point where we have to pay for it. He thinks that it is the best for the whole Town of Boscawen to go under this system. Discussion followed regarding this article. Motion was made that we vote on the article now and this was seconded. Vote: Those in favor of Article 10 as written: Voice vote. Motion carried and so declared.

Article 11:

Motion was made that we pass over this article as the red phones are not needed. Motion seconded. Voice vote. Motion carried.

Article 12:

This article relates to various roads in Town. Mr. Hartford said this article was put in strictly as a housekeeping article to once and for all establish the fact regarding the right of the Town to plow and maintain unaccepted roads. Delete from this article three streets which have been determined as having been accepted by the Town; Hardy Lane, Skyline Drive and Terrace Hill Road. These are accepted Town roads.

Mr. McCarthy spoke regarding the function of the Planning Board to approve or disapprove a road. He stated that they have some pretty strict road building regulations now. He stated that our road building regulations are second to none in the State. The Planning Board is trying to solve the problems in the best

interest of everybody involved. It is their opinion that the problems on Skyline Drive and Terrace Hill Road have been corrected. The Planning Board is recommending on the balance of these roads that we consider them in two groups: Group 1: Birch Street, April Avenue and Woodbury Drive are being recommended for acceptance by the Planning Board. Group 2: The Planning Board feel that Welcome Avenue, Fairbanks Drive and Lawrence Street should be brought up to specifications before the Town accepts them. Discussion followed regarding these roads.

Mr. McCarthy made a motion that the Town accept Birch Street, April Avenue and Woodbury Drive. Motion seconded. Amendment motion to add Blue Bird Lane. Motion seconded. Under the current standards Blue Bird Lane is an accepted street. Voice vote. Those in favor of including Blue Bird Lane with the original motion. The Town will accept the following streets: Birch Street, April Avenue, Woodbury Drive and Blue Bird Lane. Point of order was called while the vote was taken. A man who voted yes moved that the vote be reconsidered. Voice vote. The motion to reconsider is defeated.

Group 2: Welcome Avenue, Fairbanks Drive and Lawrence Street. Mr. McCarthy made a motion that they not be considered conditionally or otherwise at this time until they are brought up to the standards of the Town of Boscawen. Discussion followed regarding these streets.

Letter was read from Upton, Sanders & Smith, the Town Attorney, regarding the maintenance of unaccepted streets. Suggestion that the people get together with the Selectmen, Planning Board, etc. as a group and try to work out a solution.

Moved and seconded that the question be put, that Welcome Avenue, Fairbanks Drive and Lawrence Street not be accepted by the Town. Voice vote: Yes have it. Motion carried.

Article 13:

Mr. James Steenbeke, Sr. made a motion that \$3,000 be raised and appropriated. This motion seconded. Point of order raised: What kind of a truck are we buying for \$3,000. It was explained that the \$3,000 represents our purchase price through the State purchasing office, plus the trade in on the existing vehicle. Voice vote: Motion carried.

Article 14:

Mr. Welcome moved the article as read. Motion seconded.

Discussion: This is a new item of equipment to be placed in the back of the dump truck presently in use. Question: Is there a cheaper method of sanding. Mr. Hartford explained that this will be used for sanding and tarring roads. It is a hopper type and operates automatically. Ready for the question: Article 14 be adopted as read and that a sum not to exceed \$4,000 be raised and appropriated. Voice vote. In affirmative, Motion carried.

Article 15:

Mr. Supry made a motion that the article be adopted as read. Motion seconded. Question asked if this in any way effected Article 17. Answer No. Voice vote: Affirmative Motion carried.

Article 16:

Motion that this article be accepted as read. Motion seconded. Mr. Raymond Steenbeke spoke regarding this and explained their investigation of the matter. Voice vote in affirmative. Motion carried.

Article 17:

Chief Bartlett spoke regarding this article and explained the type of truck which the Fire Department would like. This would replace the 1951 pumper which has reached the age where it should be replaced. Motion made and seconded that the article be adopted as read. Discussion vs. Diesel and gasoline. Moved the question on Article 17 that Article 17 be adopted as read. Voice vote affirmative. Motion carried.

At a later time, due to a technicality, referred back to Article 17 relative to the purchase of the Fire truck because this is a bonding article this requires a record vote of at least two-thirds of the persons voting. Hand vote: Yes -209: No - none. Vote carried.

Article 18:

Mr. James Steenbeke, Sr. made a motion that the article be accepted as read. Voice vote affirmative. Motion carried.

Article 19:

Mr. Mazur made a motion to table the article. Voice vote affirmative. Motion carried. Hand vote requested: Yes -195: No -66. The motion is tabled.

Article 20:

Mr. Steenbeke, Sr. made a motion that \$62,000.00 be raised and appropriated. Motion seconded. Motion made that this article be tabled. Motion to table is defeated. Discussion: Is any of the land that the Town now owns appropriate for this purpose. The answer is "No". A Landfill requires sandy soil and gravel and a low water table. This land has been tested and is correct. We have access to it by a Town road and also have Town water available. We have been ordered to close our burning dump by July 1, 1974 of this year. Question was asked who owned the land. Reply: The Robert Upton Estate. It is conceivable that we can use the sand and gravel in our Highway department operations. Moved and seconded that article 20 be adopted. Two-thirds vote required. Hand vote: Yes — 194 no opposed. Motion carried.

Article 21:

Motion made and seconded that this article be adopted. John Hollins spoke regarding this and the additional traffic which would be a result of having the Towns of Webster and Salisbury use this new dumping area. Motion was made that this article be tabled. Motion seconded. Voice vote. Vote affirmative. Motion carried and article is tabled.

Article 22:

Mrs. Sanborn spoke regarding this article. She stated that the Library has the money and the Library Trustees have voted that they will refurbish the room down stairs and the Selectmen, Planning Board, etc. can have the use of it. Moved that the article be tabled. Motion seconded. Voice vote. Motion carried.

Article 23:

Mr. Steenbeke, Sr. made a motion to table this article. Motion seconded. Voice vote. Motion to be tabled carried.

Article 24:

Mrs. Rostron moved that the article be adopted as read. Motion seconded Voice vote. Motion carried.

Article 25:

Mr. Rineer made a motion that the Selectman be directed to look into the possibility of using the high school for the purpose of Town Meeting in future years. Seconded Voice vote: Motion defeated.

Motion that we have twenty-four hour police patrol. Not seconded.

Motion made and seconded that we adjourn. Voice vote: Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 11:00 p. m.

BOSCAWEN FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Boscawen Fire Department responded to 124 fire calls. This includes 30 mutual aid calls and 4 false alarms.

A truck committee consisting of Fire Department personnel traveled throughout the state surveying different types of fire-fighting pumpers. Following many hours of consultation, specifications for a new pumper were written. Specifications were then submitted to four different major manufacturers upon their request. The four interested companies then submitted their bids.

The bids were opened at a meeting of the truck committee and Selectmen. Bids were studied and the contract was awarded to the Mack Company of Allentown, Pa. Delivery date is tentatively set for July 1, 1975.

July 1, 1974, the Town of Boscawen entered the Capital Area Dispatch. The efficiency of the qualified dispatchers has helped greatly to cut down on response time.

Training for the firemen is conducted every other Monday night. Ten men attended the Fitzwilliams Fire Training School and some of the officers have attended N.H. Vocational Technical School for fire service and also for fire science courses.

The Town of Boscawen belongs to three mutual aids—the Suncook Valley Mutual Aid, the Twin Rivers Mutual Aid and the Capital Area Mutual Aid.

Please remember to call at the first signs of fire no matter how small. We can always return if not needed. People living in the Plaza (753) exchange should call 225-3355 and people in the Pyramid (796) exchange can use 1-225-3355 or 6-2222.

I wish to extend my sincere "thanks" to all members of the Fire Department and the Fire Ward Committee for their time, help, consideration and cooperation.

BOSCAWEN FIRE WARD COMMITTEE

We are happy to report that a second hydrant has been added at the Merrimack County Hospital complex, as recommended by the Committee in 1973. This will alleviate the water shortage situation. Members of the Committee will be watching this situation as further construction is being contemplated.

The repair of the Torrent Engine Company building was completed in 1974 at the direction of the Selectmen. This was recommended by this Committee and authorized by the Town at Town Meeting.

The Committee met with the Chief and Deputies to consider the 1975 Budget requests. Some \$4,800 was cut from these requests before the budget was submitted to the Town Budget Committee for action.

Boscawen joined the Concord Central Dispatch System as authorized by the Town at the last Town Meeting. All of the points mentioned in our 1973 Report seem to be holding true as the system seems to be working well and proving very worthwhile. In connection with this, the Committee recommended that Water Street in lower Boscawen be renamed to avoid any mistakes in dispatching equipment to a fire, as there is a Water Street in upper Boscawen. The Selectmen renamed this street, Eel Street, as it was once known.

REPORT of the FOREST FIRE WARDEN

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

POLICE COMMISSION REPORT

JANUARY 15, 1975

To the Citizens of the Town of Boscawen:

The Boscawen Police Commission met on a regular, monthly basis.

One of the innovations this year was the Police Cadet Training Program which proved to be highly successful. The program was made possible through funding from the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency. Valuable backup service by these cadets was afforded the Town at the minimal cost of \$44.50.

Involved in the program were four young men and women who completed ten weeks of cadet training. One week of the training was at the Cadet Academy in Gilmanton, New Hampshire and the remaining time was spent in on-the-job training and weekly classes.

The Cadet Program provides an insight into police procedures in general for a cadet who plans to enter the law enforcement field. It also provides the opportunity for the police officer to better understand the youth of the community.

Since the department had no turnover in full-time personnel, training was not as extensive as in past years. Chief Downing graduated from the New England Institute of Law Enforcement Management at Babson College, Wellesley, Massachusetts. Officer Smith graduated from the N.H. Police Academy. Corporal Russell, Officer Smith, and Special Officers Collins, Nixon, and Pillsbury completed the Standard First Aid Course. Special Officers Collins, Nixon, and Taylor attended the Special Officers School of Training at the N.H. Technical Institute.

One of the major tasks was a review of the 1975 Police Department Budget. This was done at a joint meeting of the Board of Selectmen, the Police Commission, and the Chief of Police. Careful consideration was given to the department's existing workload and its ability to maintain proper coverage to the Town. Since the department's inception in 1971, the demand by citizens of the Town for services has increased considerably. This fact can easily be substantiated by reference to the statistics in the Police Chief's report.

In order to cope with the demands of the public, coupled with the impact of inflation on operating costs, increases in the 1975 Budget were essential.

The Police Commission feels that 1975 was a successful and productive year for the Boscawen Police Department.

BOSCAWEN POLICE DEPARTMENT CHIEF'S MESSAGE

The Boscawen Police Department's service is still climbing in growth with an increase in crime and related activities requiring police attention. A good indication of this is a 20% rise in the number of requests and activities we received for police service in comparison to last year.

In 1973 we logged 4,400 as a total for calls and activities and in 1974, 5,307 were logged.

Because of our abiding obligation to the citizenry of Boscawen, we will persist in our efforts to provide the community with the best available police service available within the realm of judicious budgetary consideration.

This year I have made some major changes in the annual report to give you a better understanding of our operating budget and our current operating work load.

Although these figures do not relate every minor call of service, they do provide you with an insight of some of our more pressing and major problems.

In my budget report you will see that the Police Department operating budget shows an over-expenditure of \$1,080.95. Accounts realizing the largest over-expenditure were in cruiser operation, office expenses, and building maintenance. The cause of this over-expenditure is due to the same inflationary costs you experienced in 1974. Gasoline costs have doubled, paper prices skyrocketed, and the cost of electricity and heat almost tripled in the latter part of 1974.



CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

I. Services offered by the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association:

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association is a Home Health Agency, certified under Medicare, a member of the Community Health Care Association of New Hampshire and a member of the National League of Nursing as well as United Way of Greater Concord. The largest single area of direct service is professional bedside nursing care with orders from physicians. Supplementing such nursing services, the agency also employs Home Health Aides. A Physical Therapist, an Occupational Therapist, a Nutritionist and a Speech Therapist also contribute to the health care delivered by the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association. Furthermore, the agency sponsors a Family Planning Program, a Pre-School Health Clinic, health care services to children in Day Care Centers and Day Care Homes and parental classes. In addition, through an agreement with the Concord Hospital, the agency has placed a Referral Coordinator within the hospital to identify patients in need of home care services and make referrals to appropriate home health agency resources.

Examples of services:

- 1. Nurses: Treatments, dressings, injections, teach family care, bath
- 2. Home Health Aides: Light housekeeping, laundry, shopping, meal preparation, personal care
- 3. Therapists: Promote rehabilitation
- 4. Nutritionist: Works with special diets, promotes good basic nutrition
- 5. Day Care Health Program: First aid, nutrition, immunizations, hearing, vision and T. B. screening, dental services, home visiting, nurse-parent conferences, etc.
- 6. Family Planning Program: Clinics are held 5 times a month at the Concord Hospital; education, counseling, medical examinations and testing, birth control supplies
- 7. Pre-School Health Program: Clinic held monthly at the United Baptist Church; routine examinations, health promotion and education, normal growth and development.

II. How to get the Services:

Anyone can request the services — you need not wait for your doctor to refer. A nurse will make an evaluation visit to determine whether the services of the Visiting Nurse Association can be helpful. The services are available to all residents of the town, regardless of their ability to pay. Usually 60% of all services are reimbursable through Medicare, Medicaid, Special Grants or

private insurances. In addition, the agency has established a fee policy and utilizes a sliding fee scale, which is based on family size and income.

III. Additional information:

- 1. All towns which are contracted with will have a representative to the Board of Directors so have a decision in policy making.
- 2. Books are open to town representatives for review of fiscal policy.
- 3. The town's money is spent only on that town's residents.
- 4. If money from that town is left over at the end of the year, the budget request is decreased for next year, and if the budget is overexpended, the budget request is increased for next year. The agency does not request an increase in the middle of the year.

PLANNING BOARD AND ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The year 1974 showed many uses regarding the subdivision and zoning regulations in the Town of Boscawen.

It is the Board's feeling that, as we promised, new changes will be proposed to the townspeople to further refine some of the basic wording in the ordinance as well as put in definitions and height restrictions.

Public hearings will be held and published in the near future to further inform you of the changes to be made.

The Board members appreciate your cooperation and tolerance during this period of adjustment. It is our sincere hope that you will bear with us and work with us in the future.

Also because of our success, the Selectmen have designated the old New England forestry land as recreational space. We hope to utilize a portion of this land for two ball fields. One field will be regulation size, and the other will be Little League size. We have applied to BOR for matching funds and have commitments for volunteer labor and equipment.

Because of the lack of space, it's impossible to name all the people who gave their time and money, but we had a great Town effort; and with your continued support, we hope to have a program second to none within a few short years.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT FOR 1974

It was with deep sorrow that we learned of the passing of Russell Mattice, Precinct Commissioner; for many years he devoted a lot of time to Precinct affairs and will be missed by all those associated with the Precinct.

On September 6th, we appointed Maxwell Millard to fill the post for the remainder of the year.

We will have to elect two commissioners at our annual meeting this year, one for one year and one for three years.

Water consumption for the year was 294,774,640 gals., which was 55,908,940 more than 1973. We think the increase was due in part to the dry summer when people were watering lawns and gardens 24 hrs. a day. We had to restrict this use of water in August for the duration of the dry spell. There is no way we can use water on lawns around the clock and keep up with demand. We think if people would water their lawns and gardens for a couple hrs. per day we could meet this demand.

The contract for our new tank was signed. We had two bids, low bid was \$231,395.00 includes added piping, submitted by Pittsburg De Moines Steel Co. The foundation was completed in early November and the last word we had was the steel would be delivered sometime in April 1975. Completion date on contract was 530 days. The eminent domain proceeding is still pending at this time.

We had two problems develop that were not foreseen at the time of our last meeting. We had to lay a 2" main on Baker Street to overcome a shortage of water in that area. We also had a problem on upper Elm St., we have had 4 or 5 leaks in this area in the past 2 years so we decided to replace about 350' of 6" main pipe, pipe is on hand but time ran out for laying so this will be done this summer.

We have had a surveyor looking up titles and running lines on Marlboro Rd. to Queen St. and job is not complete at this time.

As everyone knows by this time our Supt. Harvey Hollins has retired and we cannot say enough about the service Harvey has rendered to the Precinct over the years. We hope he has a long healthy and happy retirement. We have appointed Richard Hollins to fill this position and feel confident that he will carry on the work in the same manner he has been accustomed to in the past, it is a responsible position which has to be supervised 24 hrs. a day 7 days a week.

Our work program for the year will consist mostly of building Maintenances and pipe line improvements.

We have been revising our rate schedule upward and also brought our Rules & Regulations up to date. These Rates, Rules and Regulations will be published in this report and take effect with the April billing. We hope these changes will meet with your approval.

We are planning to replace the Precinct truck this year, which is 10 years old and seen better days.

APPLICATIONS

75-1 Every person desiring a supply of water must make an application therefore at the Treasurer's office in such forms as may be prescribed for that purpose. Blanks for such applications will be furnished at the office.

75-2 The application must state truly and fully all the uses to which the water is to be applied and should any other use thereafter be desired, notice of the same must be given at the Treasurer's office and permission therefore be obtained.

SERVICE PIPES

- 75-3 Service pipes will be maintained by the Precinct from the mains to the lines of the street.
- Applicant shall deposit \$150.00 to cover estimated cost of labor and materials. Upon completion of the installation, if the actual cost is less than \$150.00, the applicant will be refunded the difference; if the actual cost is in excess of \$150.00, the applicant will be billed for the difference. The applicant shall pay the full costs of installation of service from main to building.
- 75-5 Every service pipe must be provided with a stop and waste cock on the inside of the cellar or foundation wall and near where the pipe passes through the same easily accessible and fully protected from freezing; and all pipes in buildings must be laid in such a way that they can be fully drained by the waste. When different families or tenants are supplied with water in the same building, a suitable stop and waste cock must be provided for each.
- 75-6 The pipes, fixtures and appliances provided by parties supplied with water must be kept by them in good order and repairs be made whenever required by the Board.

USE OF WATER

- No person supplied with water shall use or allow its use for any other purpose than stated in his application, or for which permission has been duly obtained. All persons taking the water shall prevent any unnecessary waste thereof. The water shall not be left running to prevent freezing or kept running at any time longer than necessary in its proper use. Connections between the water supply and any non-potable supply are forbidden unless properly protected. All connections able to cause backflow between the water supply and a waste outlet or a pipe connected to a waste drain are prohibited.
- No consumer shall supply water through his service to parties outside his premises.

Any person building a swimming pool shall make application to the Treasurer for the use of water.

INSPECTIONS

The agents of the Board must be allowed to inspect all pipes, fixtures and apparatus and to control the stop and wastecock whenever they may desire. They must also be allowed to make examinations to ascertain the quantity of water used, the manner of its use, and whether any improper use of water be made; and no concealment of its uses must be made by any party.

STOPPAGE

75-10 The Board and its agents will have the right to stop the water from any pipes for repairs or other purposes whenever they may deem it advisable without notice. The Board shall not be liable for damages to any hot water tank or any other fixtures on the customer's premises. All hot water tanks should be protected by proper vacuum and relief valves to prevent damage to the tank.

USE OF HOSE

75-11 Hose shall not be used unless it has been properly applied for and allowed by the Board. The Board may restrict or prohibit the use of hoses and/or sprinklers whenever necessary to conserve water.

ANNUAL RATES: PRIVATE FIRE PROTECTION CHARGE

75-12 The following rates are for customers having separate lines for private fire protection and cover only availability of such service lines. Actual use of water is not included in the rates:

4 inch service: \$60.00 per year 6 inch service: \$120.00 per year 8 inch service: \$200.00 per year 10 inch service: \$300.00 per year

WHEN PAYABLE

75-15 All rates, except for meters, will be due and payable semiannually in advance on the first day of April and October in each year. Bills for meters will be payable quarterly on January 1, April 1, July 1, and October 1, of each year. Payment will be received solely by person(s) authorized by the Commissioners. Check your water bill and/or tax bill for name and address of authorized recipient. All property owners shall be billed for water supplied, this includes property rented and trailers on owners property.

All bills remaining unpaid twenty days after becoming due will be chargeable with an additional ten per cent. The limit of time allowed for payment will not be extended beyond fifteen days thereafter; in all cases of non-payment of water bills within that limit, the supply shall be cut off without further notice and the water will not be turned back on until the payment of the rent due plus the sum of ten dollars for cutting off and turning on the water.

METERS

75-16 The Board reserves the right to put in a water meter and charge for measured water used whenever it shall deem such action to be in the best interests of the Precinct.

TRAILERS, ETC.

75-17 A temporary service is any service installed to trailer, or any type of building not placed on a permanent foundation, or to a stand pipe for garden use or any other temporary purpose.

The whole cost of such installation from the nearest available main and all maintenance shall be at the customer's expense.

WATER MAIN EXTENSION

75-18 Applicant shall pay the total costs for all extensions of the water main. Materials and methods of installation shall be specified by the Board to

include but not limited to pipe size and type. The Precinct has the title to all the water mains and appurtenances and may add to any main if it deems necessary.

SUBDIVISIONS:

75-19 The subdivider shall install the water supply, hydrants and/or distribution facilities in a manner and of the size and type specified by the Board.

ABATEMENTS

- 75-20 Abatements of water rentals may be given under the following regulations:
- 75-21 1. Whenever water is not used for a period of two months or more and the Board is notified and the supply is cut off at the curb box.
- 75-21 2. Abatement is given for whole months only and in the following manner: the regular semi-annual rental bill submitted on April 1st and October 1st each year must be paid in advance and any abatement due in the period already paid for will be credited in the next regular bill. For example: if after paying the October bill, you go away for the winter on November 15th and return on March 15th, you will be entitled to an abatement for four months or two-thirds of your October bill in the form of a credit in the proper amount on the April bill.

PRECINCT TAX

75-23 All taxable property located within the boundaries of the Precinct is subject to the precinct tax whether or not the owners are supplied with water.

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

In our opinion, the aforementioned statements present fairly the financial position of the Penacook and Boscawen Water Precinct at December 31, 1974 and the results of its operations and changes in financial position for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles for municipalities applied on a consistent basis.


NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounts of the Precinct are maintained on the accrual basis of accounting. Inventories are stated at lower of cost (first-in, first-out basis) or market. Property, plant and equipment are recorded at cost. Expenditures for renewals and betterments are capitalized. Expenditures for maintenance and repairs are expensed as incurred, since it is not practicable to determine the amount of, or duration of, future benefit. Depreciation over their estimated useful lives is determined principally on the straight-line method. Although still in use, assets that are fully depreciated are removed from the accounts.

- 2. In 1974, the Precinct borrowed by bond issue, \$250,000 for construction of an additional water storage tank.
- 3. There is litagation pending regarding a small piece of land taken by eminent domain for the location of the additional water storage structure.
- 4. Because Merrimack County paid for the construction of a new water main to the County Home, the Water Precinct Commissioners agreed to provide free water to the earlier of \$12,000 in water billing or six years. Then the County Home will be billed for water at the regular rates.
