#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brentwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Brentwood Fire House in said Brentwood on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To answer the following question with a 'yes' or 'no':

"Shall we adopt the new provisions of RSA 72:43-c relative to expanded exemptions on real estate for the elderly, changing the eligibility requirement that a person may own no more than \$35,000 in assets of any kind to a requirement that a person may own no more than \$50,000 in assets of any kind?"

3. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Zoning Ordinance entitled "Requirements for siting septic systems."

No building permit will be issued for a building lot that will not meet the minimum standards imposed by the State of New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission and the requirements listed below. The Selectmen and Building Inspector shall be notified at least fifteen (15) days prior to the percolation test and the fee shall be paid at that time.

- A. No test pits or percolation tests shall be performed during the period 15 June to 15 September. The Selectmen may waive this requirement upon sufficient evidence that the soils to be tested are such that the data obtained by testing at that time would not be misleading.
- B. The bottom of the proposed leaching bed or trench and the floor of a leaching cesspool or leaching pit shall be a minimum of eight (8) feet above the top of any hardpan layer, bedrock or impermeable sub stratum.\*
- C. Any soil with a seasonal high water table at the natural ground surface or within two feet of the natural ground surface shall not be used for the disposal of septic tank effluent.
- D. The bottom of the proposed leaching bed or trench and the floor of a leaching cesspool or leaching pit shall be a minimum of four feet above any seasonal high water table.\*
- E. Any soil with a percolation rate of over 60 minutes per inch shall not be used for the disposal of septic tank effluent.
- F. Any land area having a natural slope of 15% or greater shall not be altered or used for the disposal of septic tank effluent.

- G. All sub surface sewage disposal systems must be designed and constructed to meet the minimum standards as set forth in the regulations of the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission in force as of 1 March 1976. These regulations are set forth in the manuel "Guide for the Successful Design of Small Sewage Disposal Systems" published, 1974 and amended 5 January 1976.
- H. Each lot shall contain at least 6,000 square feet of contiguous land area which will meet all of the requirements set forth above and which will be located in close proximity to the logical placement of a dwelling. Such land should not be built on but reserved for subsurface disposal systems.
- I. A member of the Board of Selectmen or their agent shall witness all percolation tests and test pits and sign the building permit certifying that said person was present during the tests. A Fee of \$10.00 will be charged. Ninety percent (90%) of the fee will be retained by said witness and ten percent (10%) to be paid into the Town General Fund.
- \* FILL MAY BE ADDED TO MEET THE STANDARDS IMPOSED BY PARAGRAPHS B AND D ABOVE, BUT MAY NOT BE ADDED TO CORRECT FOR ANY OF THE OTHER LISTED CONDITIONS.
  - 4. Proposed Planning Board Amendment re: Junk Yards

Article III, Section 4 should be amended to provide:

No junk yard or place for the storage of discarded machinery, vehicles, or other scrap material shall be maintained in any district except the Commercial Industrial District upon Special Exception granted by the Board of Adjustment and in accordance with the provisions of Article VI hereof.

Article VI, Section 2 should be amended to provide:

Permits for motor vehicle and or/ machinery junk yards shall be issued by the Board of Selectmen. No permit shall be granted until the applicant has obtained a Special Exception from the Board of Adjustment and unless said site is more than 250 feet from any residential or business building. Prior to issuing said permit, the Board of Selectmen shall be satisfied that all State Statutes and local standards will be observed. No accumulation of motor vehicles or any other junk will be allowed within sight of any road whereby the value of any other property is lowered. The Selectmen upon receipt of a written complaint shall investigate, and if the complaint is found valid, will notify the offender in writing to clean up within three weeks. If not complied with, the Police Chief will be notified in writing, and he shall at once make out and serve a warrant. The Selectmen in all cases shall be the complainant.

5. Proposed revision of Article IV, Section 1, paragraph C of the Zoning and Land Use Ordinance:

C. In-Home Occupations and Tradesmen: May be permitted in the

Residential/Agricultural District without a variance or special exception requirement provided that they meet the following condition:

- a. Occupational use of the dwelling unit will not utilize more than twenty-five (25) percent of the gross floor area (excluding the garage).
- b. Not more than one (1) non-family employee may be involved.
- c. The dwelling must maintain the appearance and use of a residence.
- d. All signs displayed in the Residential/Agricultural District shall not exceed four (4) square feet per side. This sign must not be illuminated.
- e. Adequate off-street parking must be provided and used.
- f. The occupation or trade will not offend by emitting smoke, dust, odors, gas, noise, fumes, or refuse matter.
- g. Not more than one (1) commercial vehicle will be housed at the premises.
- h. An annual, cost free, permit to operate is obtained from the Board of Selectmen.

6. Proposed amendment to Article XIII of the Zoning And Land Jse Ordinance. Proposal is to add a Section 12 to the Article to read as follows:

Section 12. <u>Tradesman</u>. A self-employed person offering services outside the home.

7. Proposed - to amend Article IV, Section 1, paragraph F of the Zoning and Land Use Ordinance. Proposal is to amend paragraph F, by by adding within sub-section (1) the following: (Light commercial to be known also as light industrial). Said section to read:

> (1) "Light industrial (light commercial to known also as light industrial) uses may be approved by Special Exception of the Zoning Board of Adjustment subject to the following conditions:"

8. Proposed - to amend Article IV, Section 1, Paragraph F, subparagraph (a) to read as follows:

> (a) The applicant attaches to the application for Special Exception a written statement from the Planning Board that site reveiw is approved for the proposed light idustrial use.

9. Proposed - to amend Article IV, Section 1, Paragraph F, subbaragraph (j) to read as follows:

> (j) The lot on which such use may be allowed must have a minimum of three hundred (300) feet of frontage. The lot must be five (5) acres or more. If the use is to located within the dwelling, the five (5) acre requirement may be waived by the Board of Adjustment. Such use shall not occupy more than twenty-five (25) percent of

the gross floor area of the dwelling.

10. Proposed - to amend Article IV, Section 1, Paragraph F, to include sub-paragraph (n) to read:

(n) The number of employees and commercial vehicles on the premises shall be limited by the Board of Adjustment.

11. Proposed - to amend Article IV, Section 1, Paragraph F, to include sub-paragraph (o) to read:

(o) The dwelling must maintain the appearance and use of a residence.

12. Proposed - to amend Article IV, Section 1, Paragraph F, to include sub-paragraph (p) to read:

(p) Light industrial use of the dwelling unit will not utilize more than twenty-five (25) percent of the gross floor area.

13. Proposed - to amend Article IV, Section 1, Paragraph F, to include sub-paragraph (q) to read:

(q) A sign displayed will not exceed four (4) square feet per side and will not be illuminated.

14. Proposed - to amend Article IV, Section 1, Paragraph F, to include sub-paragraph (r) to read:

(r) An annual, \$25.00 permit to operate is obtained from the Selectmen.

15. Proposed - to amend Article IV, Section 1, Paragraph F, to include sub-paragraph (s) to read:

(s) As a provision of this ordinance, all businesses operating at the time of passage will be granted annual, cost-free, permits by the Board of Selectmen. Any change in business size after passage of this ordinance will constitute a need for a special exception from the Board of Adjustment.

16. Proposed - to amend Article IV, Section 1, Paragraph F, to include a sub-paragraph (3) to read:

- (3) USES NOT ALLOWED IN THE RESIDENTIAL/AGRICULTURAL AREA:
  - a. Retail stores, restaurants, and other retail businesses.
  - b. Warehousing for sale on the premises.
  - c. Commercial garages and filling stations.
  - d. Commercial recreatioal uses.

17. Proposed - to Amend the Building Ordinance for the Town of Brentwood, New Hampshire by adding a new Section 1 under Article 1, thus resulting in Old Section 1 becoming Section 2, so that said amended Building Ordinance shall read as follows: Section 1. To control the growth of the Town in a manner not to create an excessive impact on its capacity for providing the expanded services to support such growth, the following requirements are set:

- A. Building permits for new dwellings are limited annually to 4% of the number of dwellings in the town at the start of each calendar year.
- B. Said permits will be limited to (3) three per developer and/or within a subdivision approved after the passage of this ordinance, in a calendar year.
- C. Permits for non-dwelling construction or permits for the expansion, alteration or replacement of existing dwellings, will not be affected by this Section.
- D. The calendar year for permits will be April 1 through March 31.
- E. The number of Building Permits allocated in each calendar year set by (A) under this Section 1 shall be prorated monthly over that calendar year. Any permits remaining unclaimed monthly will be added to the available permits for the next month. Unused portions of one years's quota will not be carried over to the next year. Permit applications denied will be carried over to be considered during the next month. Developers or permits within subdivisions will be limited to utilize their allocation set by (B) under this Section 1, at not more than (1) one per month, until the limit of (3) three per builder or developer is reached. In the event there are more applications than Building Permits, the applications will be ranked according to the following criteria:

Points will be granted for each of the following:

- 1. Walking distance from the elementary school 3 points
- 2. Within 2 miles road travel from Fire House 2 points
- 3. Frontage on existing Town Road
- 4. No variances from Zoning Ordinance needed 1 point
- 5. Length of time parcel has been owned by present owner l point per year

In the event that, after the above ranking, several applications have an equal number of points, land ownership as of April 1, 1977 shall be used as the data base for the following:

a. Application for permits for construction on lands for which no permits have been issued since April 1, 1977 shall have priority over applicants for lands or portions thereof, for which applications have been granted since that date. Applications for second permits shall have priority over third permits, and so forth.

In the event, after this ranking, several applications remain tied, permits shall be granted by random lottery.

18. Proposed - To amend the Zoning Laws for the Town of Brentwood, New Hampshire by changing Article VII, Section 2 so that said Amended Zoning Ordinance shall read as follows:

The Building Inspector shall issue and a majority of the Section 2 Board of Selectmen shall sign in triplicate any and all Building Permits requested when such are in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance. These Building Permits shall be issued in accordance with Article I, Section 1, Part <sup>E</sup> of the Building Ordinance. One copy is to be filed in the records of the Building Inspector, one copy to be filed with the Town Clerk, and one copy to be issued to the applicant.

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brentwood in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Brentwood Fire House in said Brentwood on Thursday, the 16th day of March next, at 7:00 of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make apporpriations for the same.

2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Expenses in anticipation of taxes.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectment to accept and expend such sums of money as may become available through the Governor's Crime Commission Fund, The Federal Manpower Fund or any other Federal, State or Town monies or Private funds which may become available.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Fire Wards to accept and expend such sums of money as may become available through the Federal, State, County and Town and any other gifts or grants that may become available for the use of the Fire Department.

5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$12,000.00 for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V road within the Town: Deerhill Road. Such sums to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Brentwood. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Rockingham County Mosquito Control Program. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$20,000.00 for the construction of a Town Office Building. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the Revaluation of the Town. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for a snow plow. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21.60 for the Exeter Children and Youth Project. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,900.00 to insulate the Mary E. Bartlett Memorial Library to help defray the heating cost. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to have a private firm do the appraisal of new property and property that has changed in value in the previous year. The Selectmen will choose the firm to do this work from an approved list distributed by the State of New Hampshire. Submitted without recomendation by the Budget Committee.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400.00 in order to keep the changes in the tax map up to date by a firm to be chosen by the Selectmen. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16.00 for the Rockingham Child and Family Services. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the Exeter Area Youth Home. Recommended by the Budget Commitee.

16. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town Road Reginald Block Drive, Phase I, Riverside Development on its anniversary date in August 1978, such acceptance subject to the approval of the Brentwood Town Engineer.

17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Fire Pond as proposed by the Brentwood Cemetery Corporation, said pond to be located at the corner of Route 111A and Bartlett Drive.

18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of a Town Dog Ordinace, as follows: This Ordinance is established and governed by the Laws of the State of New Hampshire, RSA Chapter 466.

- 1. All dogs within the Town of Brentwood must be leashed or restrained at all times.
- 2. Failure to leash or restrain dogs will result in a warning for the first violation, \$5.00 fine for the second violation, and \$10.00 for each subsequent violation assessed against the owner of said dog. All persons refusing or failing to pay said fine shall be summoned before the Exeter District Court.
- 3. Any dog found not to be leashed or restrained shall be seized and held by the Police Department in humane and adequate facilities for a period of 10 days at the cost of \$5.00 for the first day or any portion thereof and \$3.50 per day for each additional day held. Dogs shall be held by the Police Department for a minimum of 10 days, said time period commencing with seizure; or, if the dog is carrying a license tag,

upon notification of the registered owner. Thereafter, said dog may be destroyed.

- 4. If a dog is licenses and a regustration tag is affixed to its collar, the Police Department shall make reasonable efforts to contact the registered owners.
- 5. All dogs must be licensed once a year, according to RSA Chapter 466, with the Town Clerk.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) to be used as a donation to the Brentwood Newsletter Committee to cover printing and mailing expenses of the Brentwood Newsletter for twelve monthly issues, from April 1978 through March 1979. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) to be used for the support of the New Hampshire Seacoast Region Association. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

21. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Forest under the provisions of RSA 31:110 as to the real property owned by the Town and located on Route 111A and Dalton Road, said real property being adjacent to Swasey School, the use of such Town Forest to be consistent with the use of such property by the Town for future municipal purposes.

22. To see if the Town will vote to designate Pickpocket Road from Exeter Town Line at the Pickpocket Bridge to Route 111A as scenic under the provisions of RSA 253:17, 18 for the purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of Brentwood and further, that the Selectmen shall, regarding such road or roads designated as scenic, file an appropriate request for suspension of public works and highways for town road aid funds under RSA 241:7.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$734.20 to be placed in a soil survey fund and the interest accrued be applied to cover any additional fees or cost increases that may occur. Said soil survey to be executed by the United States Soil Conservation Service in 1981. Submitted without recommendation by Budget Committee.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$764.00 for the production and printing of a Brentwood Master Plan. Submitted without recommendation by the Budget Committee.

25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action thereon:

Old Age Assist.	3,000.00
Police Dept.	2,500.00
Fire Dept.	2,500.00
	\$14,000.00

26. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund (Anti-recession funds) for the use as set-offs against the following: Library \$927.00.

27. To see if the Town will vote to further define the following road which were "Closed Subject To Gates and Bars" by the Selectmen as per a Town Meeting Vote on March 8, 1966.

- 1 The Road leading from Deerhill Road to North Road is closed subject to gates and bars from the existing right-of-way line of Deerhill Road to the existing right-of-way line of North Road.
- 2 The Road leading from Lake Road to Old Route 125 is closed subject to gates and bars from the existing right-of-way line of Lake Road, at the property now or formerly of Kefferstan, to the existing right-of-way line of Old Route 125 at the property now or formerly of Whitehouse.
- 3 The Road leading from South Road to the Kingston Town Line, once referred to as Bartlett Road, is closed subject to gates and bars from the existing right-of-way line of South Road to the existing Kingston Town Line.
- 4 The Road leading from South Road to the Kingston Town Line, most recently called Little River Road, is closed subject to gates and bars from the existing right-of-way line of South Road to the existing Kingston Town Line.
- 5 To direct the Selectmen to have a portion of Haigh Road closed subject to gates and bars as per the vote of Town Meeting, March 8, 1966, bounded and described and recorded in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds as per the Planning Board Report of November 14, 1977.
- 6 To direct the Selectmen to have a portion of Rowell Road closed subject to gates and bars as per the vote of Town Meeting, March 8, 1966, bounded and described and recorded in the Rockingham County Registry of Deeds as per the Planning Board Report of November 14, 1977.

28. To hear the reports and recommendations of all Committees and Commissions and to take any action necessary in regards to said reports.

29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### PROPOSED 1978 BUDGET

#### REPORT OF THE TOWN MEETING

MARCH 10, 1977

At a legal meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Brentwood in the County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affaird, held at the Brentwood Fire House on Thursday, the 10th day of March, 1977, The following business was conducted:

The meeting was opened by Moderator H.R. Sherman at 7:00 PM.

A motion was made by C. Francis Thorsell, Sr. and duly seconded to waive the reading of the Warrant. Motion passed by voice vote.

Article 1. A motion was made by Robert 0. Sanborn and duly seconded to Table said Article until after Article 23 had been acted upon. Motion passed by voice vote.

Article 2. A motion was made by William Vahey and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town expenses in anticipation of taxes. Motion passed by voice vote.

Article 3. A motion was made by Robert O. Sanborn and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept and expend such sums of money as may become available through the Governor's Crime Commission Fund, the Federal Manpower Fund or any other Federal, State or Town monies which may become available. Motion passed by voice vote.

Article 4. A motion was made by John Gaynor and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,826.00 for a full time police officer, 95% of the appropriation to be funded by the Crime Commission and 5% to be raised by the Town. An amendment was offered by Donald C. Hunt and duly seconded that such officer to be appointed from among State certified individuals by the Selectmen upon the sole recommendation of the Chief of Police. The appointed individual need not be a citizen of Brentwood. The appointed full time police officer shall report to and be directed solely by the Chief of Police. At no time shall one individual hold the office of Chief of Police and full time officer simultaneously. The amendment was voted in the negative by voice vote. A written request for a 'yes/no' ballot was received by the Moderator with 12 registered voters' signatures. The main motion was voted in the negative, Yes = 89, No = 124.

Article 5. A motion was made by Donald C. Hunt and duly seconded to Table Article 5. The motion passed by a standing vote.

Article 6. A motion was made by Gilbert Tuck and duly seconded to Table Article 6. The motion passed by a standing vote.

Article 7. A motion was made by Gilbert Tuck and duly seconded to Table Article 7. The motion passed by a standing vote.

Article 8. A motion was made by John Richmond and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20.00 for the Child and Youth Project. Motion passed by voice vote. March 10, 1977 Town Meeting, cont.

Article 9. A motion was made by John Richmond and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center. Motion voted in the negative by voice vote.

Article 10. A motion was made by Gilbert Tuck and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the Towns participation in the expenses of the Exeter Area Youth Group Home. Motion passed by voice vote.

Article 11. A motion was made by John Gaynor and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400.00 to hire a private firm to do the assessing pickups in 1977. An amendment was offered by J. Clinton Stevens and duly seconded to strike out the words after "the sum of" and the words, "\$1,500.00 and have the Selectmen do the assessing pickups." The amendment and the main motion were both defeated by voice votes.

Article 12. A motion was made by John Gaynor and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to establish a capital reserve fund for the purpose of having a complete revaluation in 1981 by either the State or a private firm. The intent would be to add, by vote, the sum of \$3,000.00 each year with the total cost of revaluation estimated at \$15,000.00. Motion passed by voice vote.

Article 13. A motion was made by Wilmon Grant and duly seconded to table Article 13. Motion defeated by voice vote. A motion was then made by Irving Cross and duly seconded to see if the Town will appoint a committee of three Brentwood citizens to assist the Selectmen by performing a study on increased building and land values since revalutation in 1971. This committee shall make a documented report to the Selectmen by October 1, 1977 and be prepared to substantiate said report at the 1978 Town Meeting. An amendment was offered by William Pottle and duly seconded to add after the words 'will appoint' the words, 'by their Moderator' and to add after the words 'Brentwood Citizens' the words, 'deemed qualified' so that the first sentence would read: To see if the Town will appoint, by their Moderator, a committee of three Brentwood Citizens, deemed qualified, to assist the Selectmen by performing a study on increased building and land values since the revaluation in 1971. The amendment was passed by voice vote and the main motion as amended was passed by voice vote.

Article 14. A motion was made by John Richmond and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 to rebuild the Haigh Road Bridge. The total estimated cost of the bridge is \$110,000 with the following breakdown: Federal Funds, &70,000; State Funds, \$20,000 and Town Funds of \$20,000 of which \$10,000 was appropriated in 1976. An amendment was offered by Richard Chamberlain and duly seconded to add the following sentence: 'And that the Conservation Commission be involved on a informal consultation basis in the asthetic design of the Haigh Road Bridge.' The amendment was passed by a standing vote, Yes = 95, No = 67. The main motion as amended was passed by voice vote.

A motion was made by Irving Cross and duly seconded to adjourn the meeting until Saturday, March 12, 1977 at 7:00 PM. Passed by voice vote at 11:25 PM.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Harold R. Sherman at 7:00 PM. Donald C. Hunt made a presentation of a gavel to the Moderator from the Brentwood Volunteer Firemen.

A motion was made by Wallace Nyberg and duly seconded to reconsider Article 4. The motion was defeated by a standing vote, Yes = 54, No = 102.

Article 15. A motion was made by William Vahey and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the purchase of a new HI-WAY 9 ft. Model E Dump Body Mount Sand and Salt Spreader. The town has rented this piece of equipment for three months for the sum of \$900.00 which sum will be applied against the actual purchase price of \$5,300.00 leaving a balance of \$4,400.00 to be paid. An amendment was offered by Stella Pevear and duly seconded to add the following sentence: 'It is required that the ration of de-icing salt to sand, as placed upon all raods under the jurisdiction of the Road Agent, be as close to one-to-twenty as is possible, and that such salt be stored in such a manner so as not to endanger any water supply. Nothing in this Article shall be construed to prevent said Road Agent, in time of emergency or where an extreme public hazard exists, from using a higher percentage of salt.' The amendment was voted in the negative by a voice vote. Said vote was challanged and then the amendment was voted in the negative by a standing vote, Yes = 62, No = 78. The original motion was then passed by voice vote.

Article 16. A motion was made by William Vahey and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations the following amounts:

Article 17. A motion was made by William Vahey and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund (Anti-recession Funds) for the use as set-offs against the following: Police Dept. - Permanent Man, \$113.00. An amendment was then made by Mr. Vahey and duly seconded to change the words 'Police Dept.-Permanent Man' to 'Library'. The amendment and then the main motion as amended were both passed by voice vote.

Article 18. A motion was made by Donald Pailes and duly seconded to table Artilce 18. Motion passed by voice vote.

Article 19. A motion was made by Robert O. Sanborn and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 as its share of repairs on the Pickpocket Road Bridge as proposed by the Town of Exeter. The motion was defeated by voice vote.

Article 20. A motion was made by Albert Belanger and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to adopt the seal designed by Mary-Lou Clinton (shown on the cover of the 1976 Town Report) as its official seal. Passed by unanimous voice vote. Article 21. A motion was made by John Richmond and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to require that the Selectmen, before disposing of real property, the title to which has been acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, first consult with the Conservation Commission, said Commission to reccommend if the retention of such real property would be in the best interests of the Town as provided in RSA 80:42a, subject to ratification at the next annual or special meeting. Defeated by voice vote.

Article 22. A motion was made by Helen Pierce and duly seconded to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission be empowered to manage Town Forest(s) under the provision of RSA 31:112 (II), and that any proceeds as might accrue from said forest(s) be palced in a separate conservation trust fund to be managed by said Commission. An amendment was offered by Irving Cross and duly seconded to strike all the words following 'be placed in' and to add the words 'the Town's General Fund'. The amendment was passed on a standing vote of Yes = 84, No = 66. The main motion as amended was passed by voice vote.

Article 23. A motion was made by Robert O. Sanborn and duly seconded to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Town of Seabrook to allow the Town of Seabrook to operate a Landfill Public Disposal Facility or Dump on land owned by Robert Webb on Route 101. Another motion was made by Richard Chamberlain and duly seconded to postpone Article 23 until the 1978 Town Meeting. The secondary motion was voted in the negative by voice vote. A written request for a 'yes/no' ballot was received by the Moderator with 9 registered voters signatures. The main motion was voted in the negative, Yes = 78, No = 98.

A motion was made by Donald Pailes to remove Article 18 from the Table. The motion was duly seconded and passed by voice vote.

Article 18. A motion was made by Donald Pailes and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote its approval for the Selectmen to enter into a contract of at least three years dumping privileges with the Town of Kingston. The motion passed by voice vote.

A motion was made by John Stevens to remove Article 1 from the Table. The motion was duly seconded and passed by voice vote.

Article 1. A motion was made by John Stevens and duly seconded to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$111,026.48 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. A secondary motion was made by James Fralic and duly seconded that the budget be gone through item by item. The secondary motion was defeated by voice vote. The budget was passed by voice vote.

Article 24. All reports from the Committees and Commissions as printed in the Town Report and given from the floor were accepted and a Thank you was given to all School and Town officials for their work in the past year and the excellant presentations at the meetings.

A motion was made by Carol Cross and duly seconded to adjourn. The motion was unanimously passed by voice vote at 11:25 PM.

#### REPORT OF THE BRENTWOOD CONSERVATION COMMISSION - 1977

The primary responsibility of your Brentwood Conservation Commission is to know how Brentwood's natural resources (the lands-watershabitats-the beauty around us in Town) can best be managed for the maintenance and improvement of the <u>quality of life</u> in our community.

#### The members of the Conservation Commission make four assumptions:

A. The quality of life in New Hampshire - in Brentwood - is desirable and our natural resources make it so. Water, space, clean air, flourishing woodland, abundance of wildlife....are all a part of the charm.

B. Community conservation is a matter of <u>local judgement</u>. The citizens ofBrentwood determine what happens to our community and we on the Commission are responsible to bring the findings to the total community - at Town Meeting, at monthly public meetings and in a variety of ways.

C. We are not a <u>regulatory body</u>... our purposes are to <u>inform</u> and <u>educate</u> and to <u>protect</u>.

- We <u>inform</u> and <u>educate</u> ourselves and you in Brentwood by talking, listening, reading, participateing in programs of the N.H. Association of Conservation Commissions and by being aware of legislative matters.

- We consult with the Selectmen, the Planning Baord, and other Town groups. As we become more knowledgeable we can be of more help to others and react with our particular knowledge/expertise.

- We protect the individual on his/her own land and the total community from the possibility of pollution; pollution of land, of air, of water. We raise concerns about the numbers of people an area or a total community can absorb without destroying the environment.

D. As members of the Conservation Commission we speak our own minds, hopefully after some education on the particular subject. We feel that we represent all of Brentwood for we have a diversity of opinion on the Commission. (Join us for a meeting and you will see and participate in our diversity!) We also recognize that some 80% of those who voted on the Brentwood Planning Questionaire of two years ago voted for a "moderate stance" in terms of conservation. We will keep that in mind! In the last analysis, whatever we have that might have major impact on Brentwood, is brought before you for Town consideration.

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1977 and now 1978 find your Commission concentrating in the following areas:

1. Compilation of an inventory of lands, waters, habitats in Brentwood so that we can better educate ourselves and you to what we have. 2. Participation with other Town Boards in the County Mosquito Survey Project. Many will study the findings and we anticipate that the Selectmen will bring recommendations to Town Meeting.

3. Serve in a consultative, non-decision-making capacity, as the future of the Haigh Road bridge is discussed.

4. Conducting our Annual Wild-Woods walk.

5. Secure and distribute information on Dutch Elm disease.

6. Participate in ongoing consultative and sharing sessions with the Selectmen, Planning Board and other Town groups.

7. Responsiblity for viewing Dredge and Fill operations...and perk tests.

8. Town Warrant Articles: sometimes the Commission proposes Articles, other times the Commission studies and reacts to Articles that affect Brentwood's natural resources.

Your Commission will be proposing the following Warrant Article at this year's Town Meeting:

"To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Forest under the provisions of RSA 31:110 as to the real property owned by the Town and located on Route 111A and Bean Road, said real property being adjacent to Swasey School, the use of such Town Forest to be consistent with the use of such property by the Town for future municipal purposes."

The proposed Town Forest has been the topic of primary concern to the Commission this year as Commission members have educated themselves to potential uses of the property through study, discussion, and 'walks' with various knowledgeable people. "This particular parcel is capable not only of supporting a forestry program, but also of supporting and education area for the school children at Swasey, recreational activities, park and picnic area with trails for those families who enjoy the outdoors. It is also large enough that should the Town need to build a municipal building in the future, it might well be located here." (Stella C Pevear)

Your Commission feels that the quality of life in New Hampshire - in Brentwood - is highly dependent on a creative balance of residential growth, commercial-industrial growth, and the maintenance and improvement of natural resources. When the balance becomes lop-sided, the community suffers.

Special thanks goes to Miriam Dodge who retired from years of active duty on the Commission. And this year we welcome John Carroll as a new member and Bill Vahey as Selectman Representative. Your Commission is eager to be aware of the needs of Brentwood and to respond to your hopes for our Community. We have welcomed dialogue through the Brentwood Newsletter and we welcome your presence in person at our monthly meetings.

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

Brentwood, N. H.

March 5, 1977

The Brentwood School District Meeting was called to order at 7:35 P.M. by moderator Harold Sherman who then read the warrant. The following business was conducted:

Article 1. A motion was made by Wilmon Grant and duly seconded that the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and any other officers or agents of the district be accepted as presented in the budget. The motion carried by a voice vote.

Article 2. Wilmon Grant moved and was seconded that all reports be accepted as written in the annual report. Motion passed by a voice vote. John Cummings requested to hear the report of the committee established to review the area plan with Exeter. Al Jensen reported that at the joint school board meeting the previous May, the school boards present were not in favor of reviewing the area agreement with Exeter. Mr. Cummings made a motion and was seconded for the committee to continue its efforts, go to the May council meeting, and follow for legislative change if necessary. Donald Pailes stated that the committee should define its concerns in writing, decide what avenues to follow, then investigate and prepare legislation. The motion carried in the affirmative by a light voice vote.

Article 3. Harold Sherman stated that this article had come in by petition and that he had a request for a ballot vote. Marilyn Grant made a motion and was duly seconded to see if the District will vote to provide transportation to all Brentwood Students who will be attending Exeter High School (grades 9-12) beginning with the 1977-1978 school year and to raise and appropriate a sum of money for this purpose not to exceed sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.). Mr. Pottle stated the budget committee voted 6 to 2 not to recommend the article due to economics for the town. Much discussion followed presenting reasons for and against a bus. Mr. Jim DeMeritt moved the question to a vote. This was passed by a standing vote of 116 to 1. The main motion was passed by a ballot vote. Yes -64 and No-59.

Article 4. Wilmon Grant made a motion to accept the article as read. He was duly seconded. The motion to establish a contingency fund of \$4,392. to meet unanticipated expenses was passed by a voice vote. Article 5. John Richmond made a motion and was seconded to accept the article as read. Mr. Grant made a motion to appropriate the sum of \$501,522.00 for the support of schools. An amendment was made by Mr. Chamberlain and duly seconded to increase the total budget by \$50000.00 (\$3000.00 for additional teachers salaries and \$2000.00 for contingency). Mr. Chamberlain withdrew his original amendment. He then moved and was seconded to amend the main motion by increasing the total school budget by \$3000.00. The intent being to keep the present certified teacher on the faculty instead of hiring two interns. The amendment passed by a voice vote. The main motion as amended was then voted on and passed.

Article 6. Article 6 was lost because of lack of motion.

Article 7. A motion was made and seconded to adjourn. The motion was passed and the meeting adjourned at 9:43 P.M.

#### Brentwood School District Report of the Superintendent of Schools

In starting this report I should like to quote Mary Lyster's report relative to this school year. As most of you know, Mary Lyster will be leaving us at the conclusion of the school year. It is with regret that I state this because she has made an outstanding contribution to the betterment of the school. Mary states:

"It is with mixed feelings that I write this second and final report as Principal of Swasey Central School.

I am much encouraged by the many improvements made and being planned for the school plant. The curriculum and structure of the school is working well under the direction of a hard-working and competent staff. Student achievement is high, morale is high and discipline problems too few to mention.

I will miss the staff, students and school board members who have worked with me to make Swasey Central a nice place to work and learn as well as play.

Special thanks to Thirza Deschambeault for her very competent help and support.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my tenure at Swasey Central and will be watching its future progress with interest."

A key position in any public school is that of the principal. The school principal occupies a 'Man-in-the-Middle' position between the superintendent of schools and the teachers. The role of the principal has changed in recent years, and has become more complex.

In order to attract a strong, well experienced leader Newfields and Brentwood have this past year joined together to employ such a person within reasonable financing for both schools. This has worked well. In spite of some problems I believe for the school that cannot afford a full time administrator, or the population does not warrant it, this is a good compromise.

The administrator's role today includes many tasks that no longer can be performed in "brief" free periods. Instruction and in-service education head the list. I believe we have an educational program that addresses itself to the needs of each student. It must be monitored and the staff must rally together under the principal's leadership to evaluate, improve, and continually change those items that will improve each student's performance. Materials, resources, equipment, and special programs must be carefully reviewed and arranged by the building principal. One benefit that has been shown between the two schools is the exchange of materials and services which otherwise would not have been available to both schools. Careful evaluation of the staff is important. This takes time. The principal must spend time in each classroom looking at methods, organization and how these effect student progress. Conferences with teachers, and written reports of these visits is essential in today's world. The use of Interns improves the pupil-teacher ratio, and saves tax dollars but this would not be possible without careful supervision from a well trained administrator.

In the role as principal, the principal works with the staff to preserve and transmit to present and future students through programs the accumulated knowledge of study and research which has gone into making the current philosophy of the school. This tends to provide a certain stability to the on-going programs, and obviously instills a feeling of security and trust in those who work with the principal. It is an important role to play, and demands a person of experience and strong educational background with the addition of federal programs, special education needs, "levels" supervision, and other demands. The job calls for many hours of time and effort on the part of the administrator.

I could go on to speak of student-discipline demands, plant maintenance, in-service program planning, the staff meeting and all the other parts of a principal's role which leads to the kind of test results that was seen in both schools. Brentwood and Newfields have shown tremendous gains in student progress on the achievement tests this year and I believe good teaching and good administration are the basic reasons for these excellent results.

There is much going on in S.U. #16 in all of our schools, grades one to twelve, and this is the way it should be if we want the best possible education for every child. We cannot afford to sell the next generation short! I would appreciate your co-operation as I work with the various school boards to provide the programs and personnel necessary for a firm foundation in quality education for your children.

#### BUSINFSS ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT - Daniel C. Durgin

Occasionally, it is interesting to take a look at some statistics relative to public education. Obviously, statistics on the subject abound and one can easily become buried in detail and lose sight of the "big picture". With that cautious note, let me begin.

Contrary to what we are experiencing in some of our local schools, enrollments across the country are definitely on the decline. In some communities, the closing of schools is more explosive an issue than was passing the bond issue to build them. No one wants to see their neighborhood school closed and the controversy goes on.

While enrollments are declining the cost of educating these decreased numbers continues to climb. Projections indicate that total enrollments across the country will drop slightly this year while the total cost of education will increase by about \$12 billion over last year. Enrollment is currently 60.3 million students which is about a one-half of one percent decrease from the 60.6 million of last year.

Total expenditures at all levels are expected to reach 144 billion for the 1977-78 school year as compared with about 132 billion in 1976-77. This represents a 9% increase.

So we have a situation where corrollments are down .05% and costs for the same period, nation-wide, are up 9%. One could properly state, "Never have so few cost so much".

Certainly, it never has cost more to educate our children than it does today. But then, it has never cost more to feed our families, heat our homes, drive our automobiles or purchase health services then it does today.

In a word, inflation is the number one contributor to the disproportionate rise in educational costs. In addition to inflation, education has never been faced with more federal and state mandates that it is today. The following come quickly to mind:

a) The recent broadening of responsibilities in the area of education of the handicapped is adding new costs to educational budgets. While this is certainly a most worthwhile and justified expenditure of funds, the local New Hampshire school district is forced to carry nearly all the financial burden due to the lack of state funds. Beginning this year, federal funds are available for education of the handicapped but the current 552 per pupil is a small fraction of the total cost.

b) Beginning next year, New Hampshire school districts must pay the cost of living increases granted to all retirees, present and past, of the school districts. This cost has previously been paid by the state. c) Effective this year, school districts across the country will be required to pay unemployment compensation for their employees. Some districts facing declining enrollments and consequent lay-offs will be particularly effected by the law.

There are many others but the foregoing illustrates the point.

Nationally, there are more than 3.1 million persons employed as classroom teachers while another 300,000 will work as administrators, supervisors, and other instructional staff, both about the same as last year. Therefore, education in 1977-78 will be the major occupation or pre-occupation of 63.7 million Americans. Given a national population of 217 million, about 3 of every 10 persons will be actively involved in the education process.

The number of students enrolled in the nations elementary schools this past fall dropped about one and one-half percent to 33.3 million from last fall's enrollment of 33.8 million. This reflects the continuing decrease in the number of children 5 to 13 years of age, a phenomenon which has been characteristic of the 1970's.

High school enrollment, which peaked last year at 15.8 million, is just beginning to reflect the decrease in the school-age population. The number of high school students declined less than one percent this past fall.

More than 2.4 million elementary and secondary school teachers will be engaged in classroom instruction this fall. This represents a very small decrease from the number of teachers employed a year ago.

These statistics were obtained from the National Center for Education Statistics which is part of the.U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Locally, September enrollment in the schools of Supervisory Union # 16 was down slightly from September 1976, dropping 45 students from 3880 to 3835. This is in keeping with the national trend but the rapid growth of Rockingham County could easily reverse this in succeeding years.

Whatever the population trends might be, it seems clear that per pupil costs wull continue to rise. It is encumbent upon public officials at all levels of government to develop the most efficient and equitable mechanisms possible for funding educational costs.
