THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bristol, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bristol on Tuesday the fourteenth (14) day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, and choose all other necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the support of Highways and Bridges for the year ensuing, and make appropriation of the same.

4. To see if the Town will ask for Town Aid Road, and if so raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and twenty-eight dollars and thirty-six cents (\$328.36).

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Construction and Maintenance of Sidewalks for the year ensuing, and make appropriation of the same.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Construction and Maintenance of Sewers for the year ensuing and make appropriation of the same.

7. Agreeably to the vote of the Town at the annual Town Meeting March 8, 1921, to elect five (5) members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years, and fill any vacancies in said committee.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00). for the observance of Memorial day, and make appropriation of the same.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the purpose of tarring the road leading from the New Hampton or River Road to The Public Service Company of N. H. meaning the approaches to the Dam on westerly side of the River, and make appropriation of the same.

10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue and abandon the laid out road, beginning at the stone watering trough on the westerly side of Newfound River, near the old Mason-Perkins Paper Mill property, thence crossing the said river and continuing northerly on the easterly side of said river to the Sunapee Lake Trunk line road, near the Cement Bridge.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) for Band Concerts for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) to be used for the destruction of Caterpillars and Moths and their nests in the said Town, and make appropriation of the same.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate if any, for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars (\$120.00) to the Newfound Region Association to aid in advertising and other activities for the benefit of the Town, in cooperation with other towns of the Newfound Region.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and forty-two dollars (\$242.00) to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes region.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money, not exceeding seven hundred dollars for the purpose of purchasing Forest Fire Fighting equipment including Portable Pumper, Hose, Tools, etc.

It is understood the State will aid in the purchase of the equipment. (This article inserted by request.)

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to dispose of any real estate acquired by said Town through Tax Collector's deeds for such sums as in their opinion may be sufficient and to execute such deeds or other instrument in writing on behalf of the Town as may be necessary to transfer the Town's title to said real estate.

18. Upon petition of legal voters, the following Article is incorporated in this Warrant, to wit:

"Resolved that the Town authorize the selectmen to petition the State Highway Department, and the

Public Service Commission if necessary to relocate a section of 3-A highway in Bristol, N. H., leading from the upper automatic plant of Public Service Company of New Hampshire in Town of Bristol, to the foot of New-found Lake over the Mayhew Turnpike in accordance with the survey made by the said State Highway Department, and thus improve the congested conditions of the through traffic in the village of Bristol, N. H., and add to the safety of the traveling public and economical expense to both Town and State.

19. To see what action the Town will take to remove Town buildings and contents, in whole or in part, on Summer Street and dispose of the same at the discretion of the Road Agent.

20. To see what action the Town will take, relating to the widening the road six feet, from the New Hampton Bridge extending 25 rods towards Bristol Square, bordering land of the Public Service Co. of N. H., pursuant to a petition to the Selectmen and Road Agent, demanding this be done, and make appropriation of the same.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and/or appropriate money to apply on the emergency obligations incurred by the Hurricane and Flood of 1938, which now is a part of our indebtedness, determine the sum to raise or appropriate, also determine the method of so doing.

23. To see if the Town will vote to require the issue of a license for each and every dance held in the Town of Bristol, licenses to be issued by the Selectmen at their discretion, the charge to be fifty cents for each license issued.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

MINOT-SLEEPER LIBRARY—REPORT OF TRUSTEES

The year just closing has moved along with no outstanding matters to record. With the purchase of new books each year the library shelves are becoming more and more congested, a factor which causes considerable concern to the librarian as well as to the trustees. Some form of weeding out or acquiring more space for books seems imperative. A new rack to accommodate all the magazines will soon be placed in the room, which will give needed freedom for those patronizing the reading tables.

The book committee endeavors to reach all types of readers, those who desire the best of the non-fiction and fiction, as well as the more modest reader of light fiction. Small children, up to high school pupils, are also given special consideration, and the pupils are urged to the generous use of the library privileges. The committee welcomes the names of books especially desired or recommended for the public use. It is the sincere purpose to give as wide a service as possible to all classes of readers.

Acknowledgment has already been made of the gift some months ago of the very fine clock book by Wallace Nutting given by John T. Collins of Flushing, N. Y., in appreciation of a courtesy by the librarian.

Miss Mary A. Rogers, the librarian, makes every effort to serve the patrons with perfect fairness and every consideration. The trustees feel that she is doing excellent service. The number of books taken from the library increases each year, and invariably the increase is found in each department. This year, however, the

increase is found in both the adult fiction and non-fiction, while there is a slight falling off in both junior departments. The total increase this year over that of last year is 1,541.

The usual list of the best of magazines is still available at the library. Except for the current issue, these are loaned the same as books. The town has occasion to be justly proud of this library service, made possible through the Minnie Maria Day-Jackman fund. And there is every indication that this privilege is appreciated by the townspeople. The list of magazines is as follows: Atlantic, American, American Boy, American Girl, American Forest, Among the Deep Sea Fishers, Better Homes & Gardens, Child Life, Christian Century, Cosmopolitan, Dumb Animals, D. A. R., Embroideress, Flower Grower, Good Housekeeping, Harpers, Ladies' Home Journal, National Geographic, Home Arts Needlecraft, Popular Science, Popular Mechanics, Readers' Digest, Scribners, St. Nicholas, Radio and Modern Mechanics and Inventions, Pictorial Review, Nature, Boys' Life, Time, Mechanics Illustrated.

The librarian and some of the trustees attended the Book fair in Boston and the neighborhood library meeting in Hebron. The next meeting will be held with the Groton library trustees.

The report of the librarian:

January 31st brings to a close a busy year of service in the library. We have handled several traveling libraries from the Public Library Commission for rural teachers. We continue to use the State Library more and more, especially in connection with requests of the high school pupils, and a few private individuals.

I respectfully submit the following report as School Nurse of Bristol from Jan. 1, 1938, to July 30, 1938.

Inspection in Bristol schools showed the following defects:

- 340 pupils were examined
- 44 pupils were 10% underweight
- 11 pupils showed defective vision
 - 3 pupils showed a slight degree of anæmia
 - 1 pupil found in a nervous condition
- 34 pupils were in need of dental care
- 42 visits were made in homes
- 307 visits were made in schools
 - 5 eye defects were corrected privately
 - 9 pupils' glasses were changed

Girl in Grade I taken to Eye Clinic at Hanover for re-examination in April for operation on eyes. Funds for operation received from State Welfare Department.

High School girl taken to Eye Clinic at Hanover found to have a cataract and one eye was crossed. Fund for hospital visit was received from local Red Cross. Returned to hospital in April for operation. Eye was straightened and cataract removed. Returned in June for re-examination. Funds for operation were received from State Welfare Department.

Three children were taken to Franklin for eye examination and fitted with glasses. Funds for examination and glasses received from Mothers' Aid Society of Concord, American Legion, Overseer of Poor.

Boy in Grade VI taken to Cripple Children's Clinic

at Memorial Hospital in Concord for treatment of feet. Plates were secured to wear inside shoes.

A Dental Clinic was held in May with Dr. Sargent and Dr. Davis. Seventy-nine attended.

Thirty dollars was received from Red Cross for three tonsil cases.

Eight tonsil cases were removed at Hanover Hospital in July.

I wish to express my appreciation to Mr. Freese, Dr. Sargent, Members of the School Board, Mrs. Nell Lamson, Miss Mary Musgrove, Mr. Richard Walton, American Legion, Red Cross, and to thank the parents and teachers for their daily cooperation in making possible this health program.
