To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookline in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Building in said Brookline on Tuesday, the eighth (8) day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year ensuing and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and all other Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to allow a 2% discount for payment of property taxes within thirty (30) days of the date of the billing, or take any action relative thereto.
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-B; provided that no additional Town monies be spent. (Recommends 2-0)
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,111.00 to purchase and equip a new Police Cruiser for the use of the Brookline Police Department, (this figure includes a new radar unit) or take any action relative thereto. (Recommends 2-0)
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to complete a Master Plan for the Town, or take any action relative thereto. (Recommends 2-0)

9. To see the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to be granted to St. Joseph Community Services, Inc. to help defray the cost of services rendered to persons from Brookline, or take any action relative thereto. (Not Recommended 2-0)

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,440.00 to defray the cost of operating the Max Cohen Memorial Grove for the benefit of all Brookline residents on a one year trial basis, or take any action relative thereto. (Not Recommended 2-0)

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$518.00 to secure state aid for Class IV and V Construction, Reconstruction or Betterment Aid (Chapter 241, Section 2, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended). (Recommended 2-0)

12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith: (Recommended 2-0)

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for the repair or replacement of the first bridge on North Mason Road, or take any action relative thereto. (Recommended 2-0)

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the rebuilding of a portion of Mason Road (approximately \$5,894.00 to be reimbursed by State Additional Highway Subsidy money), or take any action relative thereto. (Recommended 2-0)

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$192.00 to be used as the Town's contribution to a study which will identify aquifers and groundwater supplies. This study will be performed by the U.S. Geological Survey and sponsored by the Nashua Regional Planning Commission. (Recommended 2-0)

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in the Brookline Volunteer Ambulance Service Capital Equipment Reserve Fund or take any action relative thereto. (Not Recommended 2-0)

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in the Fire Department Capital Equipment Reserve Fund or take any action thereon. (Recommended 2-0)

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the Firemen's pay from \$4.00 per hour to \$4.75 per hour or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to hot top the section between Library sidewalk and Fire Station to Bond Street, or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

20. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Brookline, N.H. and to the health and welfare of the people of Brookline, N.H.

These actions shall include:

1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.
2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. (By Petition)

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,733.49 to be placed in the Cemetery Capital Reserve Fund, or take any action relative thereto. (Recommended 2-0)

22. To see if the Town will authorize the Finance Committee to set up a Salary Study Committee to recommend salary changes for Town officers and employees, and report to the Finance Committee for joint recommendations to be presented at the next public hearing of the Finance Committee in January 1984 and the March Town Meeting in 1984.

23. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following legacies:
1. The sum of One Hundred Dollars to be used for the perpetual care of the Gail M. MacDonald Lot #66 Lakeside.
 2. The sum of Two Hundred Dollars to be used for the perpetual care of the Alton C. Jensen Lot #274.
 3. The sum of One Hundred Dollars to be used for the perpetual care of the Edward F. McGinnis Lot #75 Lakeside.
 4. The sum of One Hundred Dollars to be used for the perpetual care of the Carl E. Anderson Lot #267-A.
 5. The sum of Two Hundred Dollars to be used for the perpetual care of the Earl H. Bergh Lot #257.
 6. The sum of Four Hundred Dollars to be used for the perpetual care of the Orville D. Fessenden Lots #311 and #315.

REPORT OF THE FIRE ENGINEERS

The Brookline Fire Department records show 52 calls for the year 1982. 15 were for chimney fires. 10 were for Mutual Aid calls to neighboring towns to either stand by at their station or to assist them at the fire scene. 8 were brush fires with a total of 4.4 acres burned. 3 automobile accidents and 3 car fires. 2 structure fires with one of the structure fires involving 2 fatalities. There were also 11 other calls and they varied from limbs on wires, flooded oil burners, smoke investigation and also we conducted a search on August 23 at 9:00 P.M. with Brookline Police, Hollis Police, Hollis Fire Dept., N.H. Fish & Game and N.H. State Police for 3 boys missing on the Nissitisset River. They were found approximately 11:00 P.M. on the river bank off the Pepperell Rd. in West Hollis.

We coordinated a Tanker shuttle with the aid of Fire Chief Alwin Hodson of Mason. Transported over the road approximately 65,000 gallons of water in 1 hour and 38 minutes, for an average of 663 gallons per minute. We were aided with tankers from the surrounding towns of Hollis, Mason, Wilton, Pepperell. Also pumpers from Townsend and Milford. The purpose of the tanker shuttle is to move water over the road to eventually attain a better Insurance rate.

At the time of making up this report the Souhegan Mutual Fire Aid Central Dispatch Committee is trying to finalize a figure for a warrant article to see if Brookline will vote to go into a Central Communication Dispatch System to be centrally located.

Nashua Fire Dept. has started building a fire training ground which has been offered to surrounding towns by appointment to help in training of firemen. We have used this twice this last year and feel that it will be very beneficial to us for training purpose in years to come.

We have placed an Article in the town warrant to raise \$10,000 to add to our capital reserve fund to help with the purchase of our next truck which we hope we will be able to purchase in 1984. This truck would replace the 1950 as a hose truck and our main pumper.

1982 saw a 150% increase in Motor Vehicle violation stops in Brookline. Police activity in this area is in response to increased nationwide awareness of the problem of drunk/drugged drivers. Motor Vehicle stops also serve as a deterrent to other crimes because they provide high exposure of Police presence in a community. This fact seems to be substantiated because other types of crimes show a 40% decrease for Brookline in 1982. This decrease is also a direct result of increased community awareness and involvement in helping the Police. Help and cooperation from the community are necessary if the Police are to continue their work effectively.

All of the Police officers have recently completed a twelve week course and are now certified by the State as police officers. Certification is required now by State law. This course was brought about by an enormous effort on the part of Don Shattuck who organized and oversaw the project. Our thanks go to Don. We also thank the Towns of Hollis and Milford, and the State Police for the excellent instructors they provided without cost to the Town. Also to Attorney Drescher for his time given to the school.

We thank the Towns of Hollis, Milford, Townsend and Mason for their assistance when needed and extend our willingness to assist them when called upon.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The Elementary School now has two Apple Computers purchased from Federal Grant monies. Two printers were donated by Integral Data Systems of Milford; and accompanying software has been purchased with funds from Student Council activities.

The acquisition of the second computer has helped tremendously, allowing more 'computer time' for more students. The second and sixth grade students continue with the 'Classroom Management System' in Math which provides diagnostic prescriptions for students for remedial work to reinforce basic skills.

A Computer Skills Continuum was developed this past summer by staff members from Brookline and Hollis. This Continuum provides guidelines for classroom teachers to teach skills necessary for our youngsters to become computer literate.

A Readiness Committee was formed last spring. This committee of community members and teaching staff personnel informed parents and townspeople about the 'Readiness Concept' through various means. The committee wrote newspaper articles, held an informal gathering for incoming students and parents, and sponsored a separate Open House in the fall for parents (and public) with guest speaker Nancy Richard from the Gesell Institute.

The Elementary School continues its practice of providing for individual needs with many activity/learning centers in each room, dedicated staff, and strong support from the Resource Room, Title I, and Volunteer Aides. Our efforts in this area would not be as successful without the continued support and understanding of the parents and community.

The increasing demands of education, whether it be computers, individual needs, or Special Education, would not be met without the combined efforts of the school and community. In the Town of Brookline, we are fortunate to have this essential ingredient: co-operation.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The skyline in Brookline has been altered during the past year by the new roof that has been added to the elementary school. The insulation under that roof, which was paid for by a federal energy grant of \$6,500, has been a major contributing factor in the reduction of the gallons of oil used in heating the building.

Over in Hollis where Brookline sends its secondary school students on a tuition basis, the high school construction project has been completed. Brookline's representative to the building committee was Rolf Bremer and he is to be congratulated on his contributions to that successful program.

Although we have achieved much progress in curriculum development, accountability, and maintenance of our facilities, this year's report will be philosophical in nature rather than a progress report on a variety of subjects.

We expect a great deal from our public schools - and we should. We have, for example, expected our public schools to help integrate our society. We require our public schools to provide learning experiences for the severely and profoundly handicapped. We expect our schools to prepare students to deal with the social, political, technological and economic problems our nation will face in the future. We expect our schools to provide students with a firm foundation in the basics. We expect our schools to provide that kind of education for **everyone**, and not just the chosen few.

For a period of time, test scores dipped as our nation's schools extended educational opportunities to those who had been neglected. The good news is that the tide has turned and statistics are showing that test scores are once again on the rise.

Despite the apparent success in providing education for all students we face a deep educational crisis which has been spurred on by a fast changing world. Our nation (as well as other nations) is moving rapidly from an industrial to an information based economy. To be truly literate in the future will require a new set of basics.

We must be sure our students are prepared, as citizens, to live in and prosper in a world heavily influenced by the new technology. They will need technical skills, to be sure, but they will also need critical thinking and problem solving skills. They will need special skills that will allow them to analyze, to organize, and to synthesize. Tomorrow's citizens must be able to apply what they know to real problems; be able to make decisions; understand how to make the most of their creative abilities; and be excellent communicators.

Many of us, regardless of our ages, may be caught up in careers that will become obsolete. We may return to school many times during our lives because lifelong education may also be a basic of the future.

Our schools are challenged to provide the education and training that will prepare today's students to live full, productive lives in a fast changing world. It is a challenge the schools cannot ignore and, as citizens, neither can we ignore the challenge.

Our schools must improve. We must encourage them to become even better. We must help them correct what must be corrected and assure that they are teaching the knowledge and skills that the people of our nation will need as we face the future. At the same time, we must support our schools. We must give before we can get. We must assure that education remains prominent on our local, state, and national agendas, because the one cost we cannot afford is - the cost of neglect.
