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

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

One concern that lately has brought many citizens before the Board of Selectmen is taxes. No matter how often assured that the high taxes are due to increased school costs, ever increasing county taxes, road improvements, as well as higher costs for materials and services; none leave without suggesting that we lower the tax burden. The Board of Selectmen shares the concern of the citizens. In formulating the Town Budget, the Selectmen carefully weigh each spending proposal. We work to create as low a budget as we can without reducing necessary and required Town services. The budget, along with petition articles, is brought before the citizens at Town Meeting. At that meeting, the budget can be trimmed or adjusted as the citizens deem best.

Fire Chief Bill Edes, the Firefighters, and the Fire Wards have submitted a very reasonable budget. The Fire Department is to be commended. One proposal Chief Edes has submitted is to make necessary repairs to the Fire Station, Company 3, at the Town Hall. Do we wish to patch this building up? repair it comletely? or take some other action. The choice is clearly up to the citizen.

The Highway Department is often praised by persons appearing before the Board. Road Agent Peter Beard again has submitted a proposal to rebuild the hard surface road in West Deering. This is part of Agent Beard's plan for continued road improvement. The Highway Department would like to purchase another truck. The old GMC that they have been using is wearing out. A new truck would increase the efficiency and ability of the Highway Department. considerable thought ought to be given to this proposal. Agent Beard has to make repairs to the Bartlett Hill Road Bridge. He has included an Article to complete these repairs. The Highway Department has completed the year and their projects in a wise and timely manner. Our compliments to Peter Beard and the Highway Workers.

The Police Department has reduced their budget request from last year. Some citizens have suggested that it is time to go to a full-time Police Department. There is merit in this idea, but it will cost more, and keeping taxes down is important. The Board of Selectmen know that our Police Officers spend much time insuring good police protection. The Board thanks them one and all for this effort.

The Board of Selectmen continue to support the concept of a southern by-pass around Hillsboro. This highway would set the stage to generate taxes on commercial enterprises and would help lower the tax burden.

The Board of Selectmen again extends its thanks to all those members of the various regulatory boards. We know that service on the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, the Conservation Commission, and the Solid Waste Committee, takes a lot of personal time, pits the members against very competent professionals, and often goes unthanked. The Board of Selectmen gives a loud THANK YOU to each member knowing that this thank you is a small token for the dedicated services each individual gives.

GREETINGS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday the 14th of March next, at 11:00 AM in the morning to act upon the following subjects:

. ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

(Articles 2 thru 4 are submitted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment and are supported by the Planning Board. Additions to the existing ordinance are underlined, deletions are enclosed by brackets [].)

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of adopting the following changes in the Deering Zoning Ordinance: Section 1 Para A. Substitute the following definition "Cluster Development: A residential use which divides land into not more than the number of lots permissible in a conventional subdivision of the same property in the same zone, but where the size of individual lots may be reduced in order to gain common open space." Section 1 Para D. Correct grammar "Special Exception: A special allowance granted . when conditions . exist[,] which permit[s] a use of land or buildings in a manner that is otherwise prohibited." Section 2 Para G. Change to read "Private schools, nursing homes and [sanitariums] long term medical care facilities may be maintained by special exception, . " WETLANDS CONSERVATION DISTRICT (passed by voters in 1988 as an amendment to the Deering Zoning Ordinance) TO BE INSERTED AS SECTION 5. Re-number the parts of this section and remaining sections as needed. Section 2 Para K. Cross-reference to new Section 5, as follows "Cluster development shall be permitted if the density does not exceed the provisions of Section 1, [and] 2 and 5 apply . . . "?

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of adopting the following change in the Deering Zoning Ordinance under present Section V, paragraph B of the Wetlands Conservation District: "No area of contiguous wetland in excess of 20,000 square feet may be used in determining required acreage or density under the provisions of this ordinance."?

ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of adopting the following addition to present Section 5, paragraph A of the Deering Zoning Ordinance: "All current zoning requirements will apply to any non-conforming use which has been abandoned for twelve consecutive months or more. Notification to the Selectmen by registered letter within twelve months after a nonconforming use becomes inactive, and every twelve months thereafter, or intent to reactivate that use shall be deemed sufficient evidence that the non-conforming use has not been abandoned."?

ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of adopting the following change in the Deering Zoning Ordinance under Section 2B: "Two apartments or dwelling units for permanent residence shall be the maximum allowable in any one given building. For purposes of new construction, the minimum acreage per dwelling unit must be 2 acres." ? - SUBMITTED BY PETITION, SUPPORTED BY PLANNING ROARD

ARTICLE 6. Are you in favor of adopting an Occupancy Permit process to be included in the Deering Building Codes? - SUBMITTED BY THE SELECTMEN. SUPPORTED BY PLANNING BOARD

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$215,100 for the maintenance and general expenses of the Highway Department, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$194,950 for the reconstruction of the following roads in West Deering (from Wilson's corner including approx. 100 feet s.w. on 2nd NH Turnpike to the Iron Bridge on Contoocook River; from 2nd NH Turnpike to Holton Crossing and continuing on Longwoods Road to the vicinity of Fish & Game Road), or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45,000 for the repairs to the Bartlett Hill Bridge, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$70,000 to make the necessary improvements to the Class Six (6) portion of the Old Henniker Road (so-called) to bring it up to Class 5 standards. - SUBMITTED BY PETITION

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,988 for the purchase of a new dump truck with plowing & sanding equipment, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 for an independent engineering survey of the Town of Deering roads and highways, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$34,400 for the Police Department current operating expenses, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,500 for the Fire Department current operating expenses, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for the refurbishing of 84M2 (1963 International Pumper), or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for payment of interest expense, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,095 for the Concord Regional Solid Waste/Resource Recovery Cooperative (Town's share based on annual tonnage) or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$42,500 for the continued use of the Hillsboro Landfill (Deering's share to be determined by dividing the sum of the equalized evaluation of both Deering & Hillsboro into the cost of the landfill's operation and multiplying the result by Deering's equalized evaluation) and for refuse removal or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 membership dues to the NH Resource Recovery Association, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the permanent full time

employees to belong to the NH Retirement System, including retroactive payments, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to St. Joseph Community Services, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to have the Selectmen appoint a Historic District Commission to determine what, if any, areas of the Town of Deering should receive special protection. - SUBMITTED BY ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town's representative to the General Court to respond to our solid waste crisis by taking all necessary measures to insure that New Hampshire adopt legislation that will permit consumers to return for refund of deposit within New Hampshire all soda, beer, wine cooler and liquor containers and that all unclaimed deposit monies shall be collected by the state and no less than 80% shall be returned annually to local municipalities for the sole purpose of implementing, expanding and reimbursing community recycling projects. - SUBMITTED BY PETITION

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95B or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept or purchase on behalf of the Town any Federal or State surplus fire, police, or highway equipment, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus Town property, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept any land donated to the Town, or to take any other action relating thereto.

ARTICLE 33. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNOS

In 1988 we were unable to continue the cemetery grave stone restoration due to the extensive vandalism in the East Deering Cemetery this past summer. A total of forty-one (41) stones were either tipped over or broken. At least a third of the stones were broken in some way. Only a few of the newer stones were damaged, with the brunt of the vandalism being inflicted on stones over 100 years old.

Estimated damages amounted to over \$5,000. Fortunately, we were covered by town insurance and the stones were repaired, some temporarily, by the Keene Monument Co. The balance of the insurance money will be used for the continual maintenance that the damaged stones will require. We have since learned that we will no longer be covered for such damage under the town insurance. Any additional damage must be paid for by using town funds.

Due to the high cost of expanding East Deering Cemetery, we will put the emphasis on the expansion of the Wilkins Cemetery on Old County Road. The sections are within the walls on the west and south. The two sections will be approximately 150' x 30' and will be mapped based on the needs of those purchasing lots. Excavation work will be at a minimum as there are no large trees. Fill will have to be brought in to level the area and any rocks will have to be removed, then a covering of topsoil added.

In addition to the expansion, repair work will continue with the Goodall Cemetery on Driscoll Farm Road. Brush and debris have been removed. This cemetery had been vandalized over 20 years ago and needs serious attention. There are approximately thirty-five (35) stones that need to be reset with new bases and breaks repaired.

Due to the increases in town expenses, we are asking for \$1,000 less than last year. The 1989 appropriation request will be for \$3,500 for 1989 operations.

ARTICLE 2. It was voted to have the Office of Town Clerk combined with the Office of Tax Collector thereby creating a new Office of Town Clerk/Tax Collector to be held by one individual. Yes - 117; No - 65

ARTICLE 3. It was voted to adopt Zoning Amendment I as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Deering Zoning Ordinance as follows: "The establishment of a Wetlands Conservation District using soils and vegetation and hydrology as selection criteria. The purpose of the Conservation District shall be one to protect the public health and well being and guide sensible development around areas of wetland classification. Yes - 116; No -74

ARTICLE 4. It was voted to adopt Zoning Amendment II as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Deering Zoning Ordinance as follows: "add "National Flood Program requirements" to Section 2.C, add Clarification on road frontage to Section 2.D add new section 2.D.6 minimum road frontage for any lot shall be 200 feet, Section 4 heading change from Commercial Exceptions at Commercial Exceptions and variances, Section 4.C Signs (sizes, illumination and setback requirements), add Section 4.F on Site Plans, Section 4.G add sanitary requirements for retail food sale, Section 4.H add parking requirements for delivery and removal operations, Section 4.1 add provision for preliminary consultation. Yes - 116; No - 71

At 7:30 PM Charles A. Gaides, Moderator, opened the Meeting with a salute to the flag, followed by a prayer by the Reverend Stanley Keach.

ARTICLE 5. It was voted to accept the reports of the Town Officers, Agents, Committees and Auditors for the year 1987.

ARTICLE 6. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for payment of interest expense.

ARTICLE 7. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to auction property taken by Tax Collector's Deeds in accordance with the provisions of RSA 80:42.

ARTICLE 8. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,067 for the Contoocook Valley Center.

ARTICLE 9. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of 1,000 for the support of the Hillsboro Park Board.

ARTICLE 10. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of 5,000 for the support of the Hillsboro Youth Services Director.

ARTICLE 11. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,275 for the current operating expenses, allocated as follows: \$775 for the Planning Board, \$750 for the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and \$750 for the Conservation Commission.

ARTICLE 12. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of 10,000 for the updating, revising and publication of the Master Plan.

ARTICLE 13. It was voted to adopt the following, in accordance with the regulation powers established in RSA 155-E pertaining to excavations and gravel pits: "The 'Regulator' shall have the authority to investigate and determine upon permit application for new excavations, performance bonds to guaranty proper restoration of all disturbed areas". At this time it was requested from the floor that the Town Council state the definition of "new excavations". According to RSA 155E(I) "Any excavation existing as of 8/24/79 does not need a permit".

ARTICLE 14. It was voted to adopt the following, in accordance with the regulation powers established in RSA 155-E per-

taining to excavations and gravel pits: "The 'regulator' shall have the authority to investigate and determine upon permit application for new excavations, performance bonds to guaranty the protection and maintenance of town roads, specifically exposed to the potentially damaging effects of heavy trucking".

ARTICLE 15. By amendment, it was voted to adopt the following in accordance with the regulation powers established in RSA 15-E pertaining to excavations and gravel pits: "The 'regulator' shall upon such permit application have the authority to levy a \$50 excavation fee.

ARTICLE 16. It was voted to authorize the Planning Board to prepare and amend a recommended program of municipal capital improvement projects projected over a period of at least 6 years. The capital improvements program may encompass major projects being currently undertaken or future projects to be undertaken with federal, state, county, or other public funds. The sole purpose and effect of the capital improvements program shall be to aid the Selectmen in their consideration of the annual budget.

ARTICLE 17. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to the Conservation Fund as authorized by RSA 36-A:5 and authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land, or money to be deposited into the Conservation Fund for the purpose of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the NH Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriated or donated funds and state matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the Conservation Commission.

ARTICLE 18. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850 for the membership fee for the Central NH Regional Planning Commission for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 19. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the continued use of the Hillsboro Landfill, (Deering's share to be determined by dividing the sum of the equalized evaluation of both Deering and Hillsboro into the cost of the landfill's operation and multiplying the result by Deering's equalized evaluation) and for refuse removal.

ARTICLE 20. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the investigation and engineering studies to determine the feasibility of possible sites on which to house a transfer station and septage disposal as required by RSA 149-M:13(I).

ARTICLE 21. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,781.65 for the Concord Regional Resource Recovery Cooperative, Town's share based on annual tonnage.

ARTICLE 22. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$161,945 for the general town operations allocated as follows:

ARTICLE 23. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$213,972 for the reconstruction of Old County Road (from Route 149 to corner - approximately 2.5 miles).

ARTICLE 24. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$87,395.64 to purchase a new Highway Road Grader and authorize the withdrawal of \$76,702.14 plus accrued interest from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of \$10,693.50 to come from general taxation.

ARTICLE 25. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$209,154 for the following Highway purposes:

1. Maintenance and General Expense 197,154
2. Road Sealing 12,000
(State Share Block Grant Aid \$58,108.65)

ARTICLE 26. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,500 for the Fire Department current operating expenses.

ARTICLE 27. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$78,105 for the purchase of the KMC Fire Truck authorized at the January 26, 1988 Special Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 28. It was voted to discontinue the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund created in 1979 and said funds with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal be returned to the general fund.

At this time (11:50 PM) it was voted to adjourn and reconvene on Monday, March 14, 1988 at 7:30 PM.

At 7:30 PM on Monday, March 14, 1988, Charles A. Gaides, Moderator, opened the meeting with a salute to the flag, followed by a moment of silence in memory of Howard Williams.

ARTICLE 29. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,800 for the Police Department current operating expenses.

ARTICLE 30. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 31. Negative vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,860 for the purchase of a new cruiser radio.

ARTICLE 32. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the support of the Deering Rescue Squad and \$200 for Civil Defense.

ARTICLE 33. Negative vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the support of Boy Scout Explorer Post 105.

ARTICLE 34. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, or any other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-B.

ARTICLE 35. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept or purchase on behalf of the Town any Federal or State surplus fire, police, or highway equipment.

ARTICLE 36. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus Town property.

ARTICLE 37. By ballot vote, Yes - 62, No - 3, it was voted to adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure. These statutes provided that tax sales to private individuals for nonpayment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which

only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes.

ARTICLE 38. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 for an upgraded computer system.

At this time, by a hand vote, Yes - 36, No - 26, it was voted to reconsider Article 29. An amendment was moved to change the amount to \$21,500. Negative vote on the amendment.

ARTICLE 39. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for a new copier.

ARTICLE 40. Negative vote to see if the Town would adopt an ordinance requiring fences to surround all inground swimming pools.

ARTICLE 41. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to join the NH Resource Recovery Association.

ARTICLE 42. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to St. Joseph Community Services.

ARTICLE 43. Negative vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the Grand Monadnock Arts Council.

ARTICLE 44. By amendment, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to improve the fire/police antenna.

ARTICLE 45. It was voted to accept an additional 320' of Hedgehog Mountain Road, (between the old McQuirk house to Belliveau's new driveway) as a Class V town highway.

ARTICLE 46. Under other business the following suggestions and or observations were made:

- Requested to have the Selectmen make a study to
- go with a full time Police Chief. Recommend more accountability and look into hiring 2. an Administrative Assistant.
- Look into having a Saturday Town Meeting.
- Selectmen were asked to comment on relationship 4. of school taxes to town taxes.
- We should have had better preparation on Articles and we would get through them more quickly.
- A question was raised on General Assistance and 6. District Nurse. On General Assistance we pay for heat, food and shelter, if necessary.

DEERING FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Deering Fire Department has had an increase of about 20% in the number of calls answered this year. We hope that this is not a continuing trend. With this increase, the Department has spent many hours preplanning, and working on Federal mandated programs. In the past year we have given mutual aid to the towns of Hillsboro, Antrim, Weare and Bennington.

This year myself, and members of the other boards of the town have written a master emergency plan for the Town of Deering. This plan has been approved by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and has been put into affect. A copy of this plan is available for review in the Selectmen's Office. We also have been mandated by the federal government to comply with the right to know act, pertaining to hazardous materials. I have been appointed to Chair the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) and organized the committee consisting of key personnel from the Town, including a member of our business community. We are working to come into compliance with SARA, and hope to do so in the next few months.

The Deering Fire and Rescue has responded to 94 calls as of October 24, 1988, with 2 months still to go this year. This is in comparison to 77 calls last year. With the increased growth in the Town of Deering, we believe that the calls will continue to increase.

The Fire Department wishes to thank the community for their continued support. As always, the Selectmen, Fire Wards and myself are here to assist you if you have any question or suggestion to make your Department a better one. This is your department, and your input is important to the continued growth and development of the Deering Fire and Rescue.

DEERING RESCUE SQUAD

The Deering Rescue Squad has had a fairly busy year. Calls for service were up approximately 30% compared to 1987. Approximately 75% of our calls were medical emergencies (illness related), the remaining 25% were trauma cases (injuries).

The Ambulance and other emergency equipment are in good

shape. We are hoping to be able to purchase a heart monitor and defilbrillator unit this year.

We would like to sincerely thank the citizens of Deering for their generous donations and support. Donations are the main financial support of our rescue operations. Donations may be made to the Squad through Bob Pragoff, Treasurer, RR 1 Box 106, Hillsboro NH 03244.

The Deering Rescue Squad lost two EMTs this year, but also gained 2, making manpower the same as last year. Approximately 50% of the Firefighters are CPR certified, leaving the manpower situation basically in good shape. However, we can always use interested volunteers.

I would like to personally say Thank You to the members of the Deering Fire and Rescue for a job well done.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with YOUR help. Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed. If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at 603/271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) went into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. For more information, contact one of the persons mentioned above.

REPORT OF THE CONCORD REGIONAL SOLID WASTE/RESOURCE RECOVERY COOP

Construction of the 500 ton/day refuse to energy facility has proceeded. The initiation of shakedown operations is scheduled for this April. Full commercial operation is anticipated in the late Summer/early Fall 1989.

The impact of Public Service of NH bankruptcy on the price to be paid for the power generated is not yet clear. The NH Dept. of Environmental Services revoked permitting to use the Concord Landfill for ash disposal in March, 1988. A 38 acre parcel was obtained in Franklin and construction of a double lined ash pit will be completed in time for operation in April. All Cooperative communities have been requested to consider and implement materials recycling to reduce anticipated excess tonnage.

Contract talks were initiated between Deerig and the Hillsboro Water & Sewage Commission for the disposal of Deering septage waste at the Hillsboro treatment facility.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

At Town meeting in March, voters adopted the Wetlands Conservation District as an amendment to Deering Zoning Laws. The ordinance was drafted by Commission members over the course of nine months. Research included an intense study of similar wetlands zoning around the state as well as input from the Planning and Zoning boards. Two public hearings were held on the proposed changes. The document will act as a key guide toward protecting valuable wetland areas.

The annual Clean-up Day was held on April 23 with the help of may townspeople, including a large crew from His Mansion.

In June, the commission sponsored a Deering high school student to attend Youth Conservation Camp. It marked the beginning of an annual essay contest for camp hopefuls.

Deering Lake was tested on three seperate occassions over the course of the summer. Participation of the Lay Lakes Monitoring Program will collect long term data on the general health of the lake and head off any problems before they get out of control. The program is co-sponsored by the Deering Association.

In August, conservation commission members went around the lake door-to-door handing out information rangeing from a lake user survey to the nuisance aquatic weed Bladderwort. Results of the survey are posted at the Town Hall.

The commission played an active role in a major subdivision in East Deering. Members worked with the developer to obtain a donated conservation easement for a large portion of the property. An essestial component of the document prohibits any further development of the land.

A "Water Resources Management Plan" has been completed toward the updated Master Plan for Deering. Members continue to work on another section, "Conservation, preservation and Recreation".

In the role of stewards of Deering's natural resources, the commission was involved in several dredge and fill violations. In most cases, culverts were installed without permits or wetland areas were filled in without State approval. Dredge and Fille Permit Applications are available at the Town Clerk's Office.

Currently, the conservation commission has vacancies for three members. The commission meets every third Monday of the month at 7:30 PM in the Town Hall. Interested residents are urged to attend.

DEERING LAND TRUST TASK FORCE ANNUAL REPORT

The Deering Land Trust Task Force met on several occasions at the Town Hall over the course of 1988. As presented to voters at Town Meeting, the Task Force attempted to identify priority areas for protection and pursued land conservation easements in Deering. An initial mailing to target landowners yielded some interest and land protection ideas were discussed several landowners.

At the March 1988 Town Meeting, voters agreed to raise the sum of \$5,000 to be used toward the purchase of conservation land in Deering. That Conservation Fund remains intact.

Though the Task Force has yet to make any formal presentation to the town concerning specific lands for protection, it

has gained valuable information and formed solid contacts. The Deering Land Trust Task Force, together with the Deering Conservation Commission, will continue to pursue all options available for preserving unique areas in Deering.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

The Deering Zoning Board of Adjustment has experienced relatively little activity during 1988. Only a few variances and special exceptions were heard. However, in nearly all of the cases heard, the Zoning Board has had to deal in zoning ordinance areas that are open to interpretation. It is on that basis that the Zoning Board has propsed several changes to the town's zoning ordinance that will result in an ordinance more easily understood by citizen and Zoning Board members alike.

Of greatest concern to the Zoning Board is the area of enforcement. It is frustrating to the board that flagrant violations of the current, non-restrictive zoning do not appear to be aggressively pursued by enforcement authorities. It is the hope of the board that uses, not protected under the grandfather clause, that are in clear violation of the zoning ordinance will be addressed with greater vigor during 1989 than in 1988. CENTRAL NH REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION

During 1988, CNHRPC activities in Deering included: Provision of a sample capital improvements plan to the Planning Board. Consultations on proposed excavation regulations. Provision of school age children estimates in relation to a proposed development. Provision of traffic counts to the Planning Board. Attendance at and participation in a Hillsborough bypass public meeting. Provision of natural resources information to resident. Assistance to the Planning Board in planning the update of the Town master plan.

Also, in 1988, the Commission adopted the regional Housing and Community Development Plan, the regional Septage Management Plan, the Initial Transportation Report, the Regional Profile, the Transportation Facilities and Information Report, and the Guide to Municipal Plans and Regulations. The Guide contains models and outlines for master plans, capital improvements plans, zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations, and site plan regulations. We had contracts to help six towns with master plans or land use regulations and helped communities write grant applications.

PLANNING BOARO ANNUAL REPORT

The Deering Planning Board was involved with many of the same activities as in previous years with the exception of the Whittier/Neves cluster development. Cluster development allows a developer to situate housing in a "cluster" while still providing the two acres per structure as a common land area. The Planning Board, during 13 months of discussion, reviewed various

designs and considered numerous plans. The Board feels that the best engineering concepts and design techniques were used under the present scope of enforceable regulations. The Board feels this project will be of benefit to the Town of Deering for the following reasons:

- 1. A 50 acre conservational easement was established along Dudley Brook to forever protect this valuable watershed.
- 2. The project when all three phases are complete will raise total town property values by a considerable amount.
- 3. School studies indicate that the number of children per unit will be less than .2 children. This means that the development should "pull its weight" as far as taxes go.
- 4. Protective convenants were established to control the appearance and operation of the development.
 - 5. No more than two bedrooms are allowed in any unit.
- Secondary engineering reviews were conducted for regulation compliance and good engineering practices with a favorable outcome.

The Board during 1988 handled 9 minor subdivisions totaling 21 lots, 2 major subdivisions totaling 9 lots, 1 lot line adjustment and a conditional approval for the Whittier/Neves cluster development. In addition to subdivision applications the Board reviewed one gravel pit application. Two issues were passed along to the Selectmen for legal clarification; the Johnson junk yard and the Conference Center reservoir excavation/field reclamations. Two plats were signed for recording purposes and lot #7 of the Pierce/Page project was approved.

The Board worked on the Town's Master Plan with some good results. The Land Use Committee is tabulating present land use and is working towards better definition of future land uses. Water Resource Management and Protection Committee members are busy tabulating valuable town aquifers. The Town Services Committee has been busy working to assess present resources and future town requirements. The Transportation committee has distributed a transportation questionnaire and has conducted traffic counts around town. The Capital Improvement Committee has finished the Capital Improvement Plan for projected major town expenses. Other committees have been busy in their respective areas doing a good job. Master Plan events for 1989 include assistance from the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission and public hearings on the various sections of the Master Plan.

The Planning Board meets the second Wednesday of each month at 7:30 P.M. at the Town Hall, attendance by concerned citizens is always welcome. In addition if you are interested in working on the Master Plan please inform the Selectmen's Office.
