WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING MARCH 8, 1927

One Hundred Ninety-Sixth Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Durham on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, A. D. 1927, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk (*Charles Wentworth*), one Selectman for a term of three years (*A. D. Littlehale*), a Town Treasurer (*George D. Stevens*), a Collector of Taxes (*Esther Y. Burnham*), two Auditors (*Clement Moran, Samuel Runlett*), and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years (*Charles H. Pettee*).

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:

- (1) Trunk Line Maintenance. (See budget.)
- (2) State Aid Maintenance. (See budget.)

(3) Trunk Line Construction. (See budget.) Carried.

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget.) *Carried.* 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Current Maintenance expenses, including State and County Taxes as required. (See budget.) *Carried*.

6. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for town officers as required by law. *Carried*.

7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. *Carried*.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay the note incurred on Mill Road Bridge. *Carried*.

9. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

3% if paid on or before July 1.

2% if paid on or before September 1. Carried.

10. To hear the reports of committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. *Reports accepted.*

11. To see if the Town will vote to increase the Library appropriation from \$100.00 to \$200.00 as requested by W. P. Lewis and ten others. *Carried*.

12. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of a cement bridge in the place of the wooden one known as the Fowler Bridge on the Piscataqua Bridge Road, so called, and raise the sum of \$800.00 for same. *Carried*.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust Control. *Carried*.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to defray the expenses of surveying the new cemetery site. *Carried*.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the old International Tractor and three heavy wagons now owned by the Town. *Carried*.

16. To see if the Town will vote to install electric lights on Mast Road as many as may seem necessary. (By request of Michael Teece and eleven others.) *Carried.*

17. To see whether the Town will vote to petition and authorize its Trustees of Trust Funds to petition the proper authorities for permission to remove the bodies from the Lucien Thompson burying ground, so called, to the Town Cemetery. To see whether the Town will vote to authorize the removal of the bodies from the Lucien Thompson burying ground, so called, to the Town Cemetery in case proper permission for such removal is obtained. To see whether the Town will vote to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to take such steps as they deem necessary for securing legal authority to expend, for the purchase and care of a lot in the Town Cemetery, the money given by the will of Lucien Thompson, late of Durham, deceased, for care of the lot on the Thompson Farm. *Carried*.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Durham on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, A. D. 1928, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:

- (1) Trunk Line Maintenance. (See budget.)
- (2) State Aid Maintenance. (See budget.)
- (3) Trunk Line Construction. (See budget.)

4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget.)

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County Taxes as required. (See budget.) 6. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law.

7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for fencing and gates at the new Durham Cemetery.

9. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2% if paid on or before July 1.

1% if paid on or before September 1.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to make the entrance to Joshua Smith house, so called, accessible to the highway. (By request of S. H. Craig and nine others.)

11. To hear the reports of committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salaries of Town Officers.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust control.

14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the construction of a granolithic sidewalk on Madbury Road from Main Street to Garrison Avenue.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an arrangement whereby the upper room of the Town Hall may be used for supervised recreation for the children of the Community. (Mrs. O. V. Henderson and eleven others.) 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease or let the old store for a term of years.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham:

In submitting his ninth annual report, the librarian would call attention to noteworthy changes in the library service and equipment during the past year. Figures given at the close of the report call attention to the statistics of library service. But there are other items which call for special attention here.

The library service equipment was materially increased and improved during the summer and fall of 1927 by the addition of a room for New Hampshire and local material and a reserved book reading room on the second floor in rooms formerly occupied by the Liberal Arts College, by the construction of a new steel stack with space 10,000 volumes in the basement, by the repainting of the entire interior of the building, by the installation of lights throughout the entire basement and by the installation of bulletin boards in the hall.

The transfer of the reserved books upstairs makes the main floor reading rooms much more serviceable for general and periodical reading and reference work. The lighting in the basement means that the contents of the basement stacks are available for evening use which has never been satisfactory before.

During National Book Week, on Friday evening,

November 18th, the library held an Open House, in recognition of the twentieth anniversary of the building, to call attention to the new and enlarged quarters to exhibit many of its collections and to furnish a pleasant, social evening for all within its walls. Over six hundred people from town and university came to partake of library hospitality, to see the noteworthy exhibits including one of university and Durham boys in the World War, groups of recent, rare and beautiful books, and tables of books of travel, history, forestry, the social sciences, home economics and many other subjects. Seventy-five children attended a special story hour during the afternoon.

As evidence of the work the library extension service is doing in the schools and homes note the following letter received from Mrs. Edward Griffiths:

"In the name and interest of the Packers Falls District. I wish to thank all who have made it possible for the library extension to reach this section. They are mostly working people with only evenings and Sundays at their disposal and there is hardly a case where books could be taken from the library were it not for this privilege. The section is sparsely populated, yet our last circulation was one hundred and nine for three months. Some families number seven and each member reads the book-meaning that about thirty people read each book. The people's interest is unabated, they are as enthusiastic as ever and I believe it has kept people home for a quiet evening many times. I am more than pleased to care for the books in my home when I realize the comfort they are proving to my neighbors.

Statistics of accession, circulation and use follow:

During the year ninety-six volumes purchased at a cost of \$154.90 have been received from the Simpson Fund of the Durham Library Association. No funds were received for the purchase of books from the general endowments of the Durham Library Association. One hundred and thirty-two volumes of fiction and juveniles have been purchased with the \$200.00 appropriated by the Town.

REPORT OF THE CEMETERY COMMITTEE

In accordance with a vote of the Town empowering the Cemetery Committee to secure a suitable site for a town cemetery, six acres of land bordering on the Concord turnpike were purchased from Karl W. Woodward in 1926 for the sum of \$1,200.00. By a further vote of the Town in March, 1927, \$150.00 was raised and appropriated to defray the expenses of surveying and marking the cemetery lots.

Before proceeding to lay out the cemetery roads and lots, the committee found it necessary to do some preliminary work such as removing bushes and rocks, leveling and grading and establishing a new and uniform turf. Accordingly, the land was plowed, harrowed, limed, fertilized and seeded to red top, bluegrass, and white clover with oats as a nurse crop. The season was a favorable one and a splendid stand of grass was secured. A fair crop of oats, which was sold standing, was also obtained.

A map of the cemetery showing its division into sections, together with the location of the lots, paths and roadways, was prepared on the scale of 20 feet to the inch. About three-quarters of the cemetery containing 280 lots has been plotted and marked. The remaining quarter with about 70 lots will not need to be laid out for some years. The standard size of lots is 20x20 feet. Some half-size lots are also available. The lots are all marked with vitrified terra cotta markers properly numbered at each corner of the lot. These markers, three inches in diameter and twelve inches long, are placed even with the surface of the ground. The committee submits the following financial statement:

During the coming season the following improvements on the cemetery are contemplated:

1. Construction of about 125 rods of wire fence with cedar posts around the entire grounds.

2. Construction of two rubble stone gate posts.

3. Installation of iron gates at the entrance.

4. Construction of an entrance roadway.

Blank deed forms have been prepared and printed setting forth the terms, conditions, and reservations upon the sale of lots. These are as follows:

First: That said lot of land shall not be used for any other purpose than as a place of burial of the human dead. The use and occupancy of said lot to be subject to all regulations which the Cemetery Committee may have made or shall hereafter make in relation to said cemetery.

Second: Owners can not sell or transfer their lot or any part thereof, to any person or persons whomsoever, without the consent of the Cemetery Committee first had and obtained in writing. And it is hereby understood and agreed by and between the Cemetery Committee and the Grantee above named, that in case the said Grantee shall at any time wish to sell or convey the lot or lots herein described, the Cemetery Committee shall have the first right to purchase the same, at a price to be determined upon by the Committee, which price shall in no case be less than that for which said lot or lots were originally conveyed by said Committee.

Third: No walkway or depression will be permitted as a boundary between adjacent lots in any section, and any person or persons owning a part or parts of any lot will be required to maintain a uniform grade throughout the same. All grades subject to the approval of the Cemetery Committee. *Fourth:* No granite, or other curbing, fence, or enclosure of any kind, will be permitted in or around any lot, and no post indicating either an intermediate or extreme bound in any lot, will be allowed to protrude above the level of the walkway adjacent thereto.

Fifth: The Cemetery Committee reserves the right to put in foundations of all kinds; to supervise the erection of all monuments, headstones and markers; to inter and to disinter bodies; to plant and prune all trees, shrubs and flowering plants, and to do and perform all work pertaining to the maintenance and improvement of said property, subject to such charges and fees as may be in force at the time such work is performed.

Sixth: No mausoleum, tomb or other structure shall be constructed, either above or below the level of the ground without the consent of the Cemetery Committee being first had and obtained in writing, and then only in accordance with the plans and specifications duly approved by said Cemetery Committee. All monuments, headstones and markers must be provided with suitable foundations.

At the risk of grave consequences the Cemetery Committee herewith announces that it is now ready to talk business with any and all parties who may wish to tarry peacefully and modestly in the fine old town of Durham till the day when Gabriel blows his trumpet. "Eventually, why not now?"

REPORT OF THE DURHAM SCHOOL BOARD

Two members of the school board were elected at the school meeting; Mrs. Edward Getchell, to fill the unexpired term of Professor J. C. McNutt, Professor A. W. Richardson for three years. The board was organized with Mr. Thomas Massingham as chairman and Mrs. Edward Getchell as clerk.

At an early meeting of the school board it was decided to put new steel ceilings in one room of the schoolhouse each year and one room was done according to this plan, and before this was actually completed, one-third of the ceiling in an adjoining room came down and we decided to put a steel ceiling into that one because we felt that it was more economical to do it then while the carpenters had their equipment there. Storm windows have been purchased to put onto the windows on the more exposed sides of the schoolhouse. A new hot water coil has been put into the manual training room in the basement. Some other minor repairs have been made.

The schoolhouse is in bad shape. It is badly in need of a coat of paint. The windows are very loose which makes the building very difficult to heat. The two boilers are apparently not sufficient to heat the schoolhouse on a cold windy day and it has been necessary to close the school twice so far this winter on account of the cold. The school board is planning to have the entire cellar wall pointed up and to build a roof over the rollway which goes into the manual training room, because during a heavy rain water runs down this rollway onto the floor of the manual training room and makes it impossible for the scholars to do any work at that time. It is hoped that a sufficient amount of money will be appropriated to engage a janitor who can devote his entire time to the care of the school from December 1 to April 1 because of the fact that these two boilers demand so much care and attention.

A further increase in the cost of the transportation of the scholars was brought about by the added distance which Mr. Morrison was obliged to go in order to get several very small scholars who live on the road toward Lee Hill.

The school board upon examination of the situation found that it was possible, by joining with the rest of the supervisory district, to engage a part time school nurse, and Mrs. Clow from Wolfeboro was engaged and did very satisfactory work up until the first of February when she resigned. The school board feels that the money the town expended for their share of the school nurse's salary and expenses was well invested. Some complaints have come to the school board from parents who felt that their children became sick because of the cold condition of the school room, but we believe that this was no fault of the janitor nor of anyone nor anything except the inadequacy of the heating system and the very loose condition of the The school board recommends that the cellar wall. District give some thought to the erection of a new school building because the cost of upkeep on the present school building is certainly going to be expensive during the next several years.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

Your schools are having a successful year, so far as the work of teachers and pupils is concerned. Only one change in the teaching force was made at the beginning of the year. The school at Packer's Falls is still under the instruction of Miss Elsie Norman, and is very satisfactory.

Miss Helen Adams is still principal of the Junior High School, and good work is being done. Changes in the program of studies now make the work done here practically the same as the work done in the Dover High School in the 9th and 10th grades. These changes were made to enable pupils who go to Dover for the last two years of high school work to enter without any handicap.

The teachers in the lower grades are doing good work, and the spirit of the whole school is admirable.

It was decided at the beginning of the school year to introduce music in the Central School and Mrs. Elton Gildow was engaged for this important work. Under her able leadership a violin class of twelve pupils has been organized and the work in music is very encouraging. It is hoped that this may be so organized that Packer's Falls may also receive the benefit of Mrs. Gildow's good work.

The Durham School Union, No. 12, decided to engage a trained nurse for work throughout the entire Union and Mrs. Anna Clow of Wolfeboro was selected by the committee for this work. Mrs. Clow entered with whole-hearted zeal into this important field of service. Mrs. Clow reports that she has examined one hundred fifty pupils, made thirty-five visits to the Durham schools and forty visits to homes to consult with the parents of children needing attention; that she has accompanied three pupils to a doctor's office, and that she has found thirty-one pupils needing attention to their throats, twenty-three with defective vision, and forty with defective teeth.

During the Christmas vacation, Mrs. Clow's two children were drowned, and she finds herself unable to return to this work. Our sympathy goes out to Mrs. Clow and Dr. Clow, and we shall long remember Mrs. Clow's work with the children.

REPAIRS

During the summer, steel was put on the ceiling of one room, and while work was in progress the plaster dropped from the ceiling of another room, and it was found necessary to put steel on this room also. The roof of the Central School building leaks in many places during every storm, and it needs shingling. The frequent wetting of the plaster indicates that other ceilings will fall, and if so it may be necessary to put on more steel ceilings. The windows are very loose and when the wind blows from the north or west, it is very difficult to heat the rooms to a temperature high enough for it to be safe for pupils to sit and study.

New steps will have to be built at the entrance as the old ones are nearly worn through. The foundation needs to be pointed as the wind blows into the basement, which is used as the manual arts room; and a roof needs to be built over the rollway, as the water runs into the basement when it storms, thus making it unfit to use until the water dries up.

The boys' toilet has been repaired and is now in good sanitary condition.

JANITOR

During the colder months, at least, a janitor should be employed and on duty all of the time, as it is not safe to leave the boilers without a responsible person to look after them, and to see that the rooms are properly heated. It has been found necessary to close school several times this year, as it was not warm enough for the pupils to remain in the rooms with safety.

HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

You will see by the budget that the School Board has called for more money to pay high school tuition for those pupils completing their high school course in other schools. A larger number of pupils are going to other schools each succeeding year, and the prediction that the cost for pupils obtaining their high school education elsewhere is being verified, and this cost is likely to keep on increasing.

Enough has been said in previous reports regarding the desirability of erecting a new building, and keeping these pupils at home. All of the people of Durham have had time to form an intelligent opinion as to the wisdom of such a step, and I do not feel called upon to add anything to what has been said on this subject.
