

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Fremont in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Fremont Town Hall in said Fremont on Tuesday, the 4th day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and take such action as the Town deems necessary.
- 4. Upon petition of 10 or more legal voters: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars for the support of the Ray-Fre Senior Citizens Center.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from John Duston for the rights of way in the Riverside Drive area and to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight hundred, Fifty dollars to survey and locate the rights of way after the deed is received.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 as a set-off against the Budget appropriation in the amount indicated, and further to authorize the selectmen to make a pro-rated reduction in this amount if estimated entitlements are reduced, or take any other action hereon:

Fremont School District: 1972 Bond Issue (partial Principal Payment) – \$12,000.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell at private sale or public auction property acquired by Tax Collector's deed.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 9. Upon petition of 10 or more legal voters: To see if the Town will vote to enact the following dog ordinance.

All dogs except those in a leash or working or hunting or showdogs under the full control of a handler will be restrained to the owners property at all times. This leash law to be strictly enforced.

10. On petition of 10 legal voters: To see if the Town of Fremont will vote to accept the following:

That for the first violation of the ordinance under Article 9 above the owner of the dog will receive a warning. All subsequent offenses under this Leash Law, the owner will pay a fine of \$20.00. Said fine will be distributed as follows: \$10.00 to the dog officer or to the police, whichever is in charge, and \$10.00 to the Town of Fremont.

11. On petition of 10 legal voters: To see if the town will vote to designate North Road from Beede Road to the Brentwood Town Line

as scenic under the provisions of RSA 253:17. 18 for purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of Fremont and further, that the selectmen shall, regarding such road or roads designated as scenic, file the appropriate request for suspension of Public Works and Highways specifications for Town Road Aid funds under RSA 241:7.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road leading from South Road to Sandown Road, this being the same road closed by gates and bars by act of Town Meeting, March 13, 1928, and described as follows: "The old road leading from residence of Eugene D. Sanborn to near the South Side School House."
- 13. To see what action the Town will take by ballot on the following questions: Are you in favor of the following ammendments to the existing sections of the Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board:

ARTICLE IV

Section 7 (New)

At least ¾ acre of continuous land of every lot, laid out for residential use after the adoption of this amendment, shall be buildable land with soils dry enough to permit installation and use of facilities for disposal of sanitary wastes and shall not have slopes exceeding twenty (20) percent. To facilitate determination of the existance of sufficient buildable land reference should be made to USDA soils maps where indications are given of soil types, ledge conditions, slopes, height or water table, and permeability of soils or by individual testing of area in questions.

14. To see what action the town will take by ballot on the following question: Are you in favor of the following ammendments to the existing sections of the Town Zoning ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board:

ARTICLE IV – A Controlled Growth (New)

To control the growth of the Town in a manner not to create an excessive economic impact on its capacity for providing the expanded services required to support such growth, the following restrictions are established:

Section 1 - The number of building permits to be issued for new dwellings shall be limited annually to 3% of the number of dwellings in the town at the start of each calendar year.

Section 2 - These permits shall be issued based on date of application except that not more than three (3) permits may be issued per developer or within a sub-division in a calendar year.

Section 3 - Building permits for non-dwelling construction, expansion, alterations or replacement of existing dwellings are not affected by this article.

15. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution concerning participation in the National Flood Insurance Program:

WHEREAS, certain areas of the Town of Fremont are subject to periodic flooding from streams, rivers, lakes causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood and/or mudslide hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the flood plain areas having special flood and/or mudslide hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to NH RSA Chapter 31, 36, 156, 156A.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT THIS TOWN MEETING hereby:

- 1. Assures the Federal Insurance Administration that it intends to enact and maintain in force for those areas having defined flood hazards, adequate land use and control measures with effective endorcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations; and
- 2. Vests the Planning Board with the responsibility, authority, and means to:
- (a) Delineate or assist the Administrator, at his request, in delineating the limits of the areas having special flood hazards on available local maps of sufficient scale to identify the location of building sites.
- (b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the flood plain.
- (c) Cooperate with Federal, State and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map, and identify flood plain or mudslide areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining flood plain in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
- (d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the community in the development and implementation of flood plain management measures.
- 3. Appoints the Building Inspector to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request a record of evaluations (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures located in the special flood hazard areas. If the lowest floor is below grade on one or more sides, the elevation of the floor immediately above must also be recorded.
- 4. Intends to take such other official action within its powers as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.

17. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Resolution concerning participation in the National Flood Insurance Program:

WHEREAS, the Town of Fremont has adopted and is enforcing its BUILDING CODE, ZONING ORDINANCE AND SUBDIVISION

REGULATIONS, and

WHEREAS, the appropriate sections of said CODE, ORDINANCE and REGULATIONS prohibits any person, firm or corporation from erecting, constructing, enlarging, altering, repairing, improving, moving or demolishing any building or structure without first obtaining a separate building permit for each building or structure from the Building Inspector, and

WHEREAS, the Building Inspector must examine all plans and specifications for the proposed construction when application is made

to him for a building permit.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED by the Town Meeting of the Town of Fremont as follows:

- 1. The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board amend their regulations pertaining to the flood hazard area to assure that (a) all proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage, (2) all public utilities and facilities, such as sewer, gas, electrical and water systems are located, elevated and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage, and (3) adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards; and
- 2. The Town Meeting recommends that the Planning Board amend their regulations pertaining to the flood hazard area to require new or replacement water supply systems and/or sanitary sewage systems to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters, and require on-site waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding, pursuant to N.H. RSA 36:21.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

NOTE: In accordance with RSA 39:2-A adopted at the March Town Meeting, 1972, the first session of Town Meeting for consideration of ballot articles will open on March 4, 1975 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and will remain open until 7:00 o'clock in the evening. The second session for consideration of the remainder of the Warrant Articles will be held at the Fremont Town Hall on Wednesday, March 5, 1975 at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

REPORT OF THE FREMONT PRIVATE ROADS COMMITTEE

After many hours of meetings, paperwork and time spent interviewing property owners in the Riverside Drive and Tibbs Grove areas, this committee has arrived at a number of alternatives the Town of Fremont has in reference to these roads.

Much of the information in this report is supplied by the State of New Hampshire, Department of Public Works and Highways. Members of this committee traveled to the State Capital a number of times to obtain help and information from the State of New Hampshire. Finally, the State came to Fremont and measured all the roads in the Riverside Drive area, at no cost.

The Department of Public Works and Highways suggests that with a one foot gravel base, 20 feet wide, with drainage on Riverside Drive and abutting roads the cost would be about \$20,000.00

This committee, however, recommends that a 6 inch gravel base on an 18 foot wide road bed, would be sufficient yet cut the cost in half.

The cost, after the roads have been accepted by the Town, could be done over a four year period, with the money coming from Revenue Sharing. In this way, the roads could be repaired on a permanent basis with very little variance in the Town tax rate. The Road Agent in the Town of Fremont concurrs with the committee's judgment in this matter.

Eighty percent of the property owners along these roads mentioned have agreed to sign a three foot easement. This in itself, shows their commitment to get the roads improved in that area. These property owners have given to the Town of Fremont, their land for maintenance, drainage and snow removal.

This committee feels that the people and officers of the Town should understand, that if these roads are accepted at this width, it will in no way affect the present zoning ordinance pertaining to roads for developers of future developers.

There are about 20 children that walk to the corner of Riverside drive and Route 107 each morning. Some of those children walk as much as a ½ mile and stand waiting for the school bus on some very cold and dark morning.s

We on the committee, strongly recommend that the officers of the Town and the Town of Fremont accept these roads before the costs become prohibitive.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

FREMONT FIRE ALARM SIGNALS AS FOLLOWS:

These are the signals that will be given on the siren.

-FOR FIRE-

Siren wavering Ten times in two minutes - will be repeated for more help.

- LOCAL EMERGENCY-

One steady blast for approximately 1½ minutes - All firemen report to Fire Station. This will be for lost person or drowning, etc.

- TWO SHORT BLASTS-

Fire is out or emergency is over

-SATURDAY NOON TEST-

Siren will waver up and down ten times in two minutes only.

Minor fires will be handled without the use of the alarm.

PLEASE DO NOT CALL ON RED PHONE TO FIND OUT WHERE THE FIRE IS

After waiting about 10 months for the new siren to get here, it has been all installed and the red phones have been changed over and all in working order. This work was finished in November. The siren can be set off at each of the red phones. To report a fire call 895-2512 and tell them where the fire is, who is calling, what the fire is, and how bad it is.

This last year about 12 men took a course, with state training, on everything in general about fires, etc. The course was about 12 weeks long.

In 1974, we had 4 chimney fires; 3 more than we had in 1973. PLEASE, if you are going to burn wood for heat, why don't the people who are going to use wood have your chimneys checked over for safety. If you don't, it is bad because your wooden frame house can burn as well as the wood you put into your furnace or stove. PLEASE BE CAREFUL.

Our Fire Station is nearly all done. It has got to be painted inside and a few more little things to do. We built a chimney for our furnace and I would like to thank everyone who has helped on building and repairing that has been done on and in our Fire Station. Jack Downing and his wife painted all the outside of the Station.

In 1974, the Fire Department was called out about 32 times. We went out of town 6 times and had 9 brush fires and they were all small ones. We had on Bomb Scare at the Ellis School.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER

In the past year and a half, the Health Officer has inspected numerous complaints and health hazards, and taken action where it was necessary.

Investigation of requests for three foster homes - two have been approved and one is pending.

Twenty-one applications for new septic systems have been received, and approved for construction. Eleven new systems have been built and inspected as required by state and local laws. There were three new leach fields rebuilt and inspected by the health officer, and one fire hole on Route 107 was filled because of a health and safety hazard.

I wish to advise the citizens of Fremont that septic work or replacements and any health hazard should be brought to the attention of the health officer for inspection and disposition as perscribed by law.

FREMONT LIBRARY REPORT

In 1974 the Selectmen encouraged the Trustees, by an allocation of Revenue Sharing Funds, to bring the book collection up to date, to make it more suitable to varied ages and tastes, to fill gaps in our reference materials and to make the Library more comfortable, convenient and attractive for its users. The citizens of Fremont will profit from this for a long time.

Looking toward these aims we spent \$681.43 of Revenue Sharing Funds on books. The floor was partially insulated and carpeted chiefly through Revenue Sharing. Mrs. Seavey kept the Library open 8 hours a week for most of the year, costing the Town \$622.05. She taught Donna Denny basic library skills when Donna was assigned to help the Library under the Manpower Act. Oil and electricity cost of Town \$176.72. We also made sundry small repairs and improvements.

The Trustees extend the gratitude of the Town to Mrs. Helen Seavey for her strenuous efforts on behalf of the Library. We are also very grateful for the many gifts of books and resource materials from people interested in the Library

Use of the Library has already begun to increase and we hope the Townspeople will find it pleasanter and more convenient when seeking information on a wider variety of subjects.

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REPORT OF FIRE WARDEN

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land now owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid-August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the exceent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

FREMONT CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Fremont Conservation Commission was busy this year. Besides setting up a Land Trust Fund for the community, which was accepted by the voters at the March 1974 Town Meeting, the Commission also held a number of educational programs on several different topics, which were open to all of the Citizens of Fremont. At the Wildlife Tree and Shrub program, many shrubs were distributed through out the community. A gardening program was followed by a Dumping and Recycling program made available through the cooperation of several surrounding towns and their Conservation Commissions.

This fall, over 100 people attended the Wildlife Adventure program held at the Ellis School with Larry White exhibiting many animals from the Needham Science Center

Two Dredge and Fill applications were filed with the Conservation Commission. The Commission attended the public hearings in Concord as a result of these filings, along with other town officials.

If you have any suggestions for programs or projects which you think the Conservation Commission should be involved in, we welcome your ideas and your suggestions. Just contact any Conservation Commission member.

According to the enabling act (36-A:2) establishing conservation commissions, it is the duty of a commission to conduct research into the town land and water areas and to keep an index of all open space and wetlands. Also it may recommend to the selectmen a program for the best utilization of all such areas.

In furtherance of the above orders the conservation commission has conferred with the Department of Agriculture Soil Service and has received from them an enlarged map of the town. This map shows the various soil types in different colors and an explanatory key indicates the soil suitability for sewage disposal. Other uses such as farming or forestry may be inferred from the information showsn.

More work needs to be done to better define the boundaries of the different areas shown on the map before the commission can reasonably recommend the best uses for the land.

This must be considered a preliminary report since work is in progress to collect more data and analyse the best methods of presentation.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING Fremont, New Hampshire March, 4, 1974

The School District Meeting for the Town of Fremont opened at 8:07 p.m. at the Laurence Pettengill Hall - Ellis School in said district with the reading of the Warrant by the Moderator Timothy T. Louis.

ARTICLE I: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Mr. Robert Louis moved that the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and officers chosen be accepted as printed in the School District report. Mrs. Ruth Anderson 2nd. The motion and the motion carried.

ARTICLE II: To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any officers or agents of the district.

Mrs. Ruth Anderson made a motion that since the salaries of the School Board, Truant Officer and agents are covered in Article 5, she moved that this Article be bypassed at that time. Mr. Robert Louis 2nd. the motion and the motion carried.

ARTICLE III: To see if the School District will vote from this date forward to indemnify and save harmless from loss or damage any person employed by it, including the Superintendent of Schools and any member of the School Board, administrative staff or agencies, from personal financial loss and expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to or destruction of property if the indemnified person at the time of the accident resulting in the injury, damage or destruction was acting in the scope of his employment or office.

Mr. Robert Louis moved that the District vote from this date forward to indemnify and save harmless from loss or damageany person employed by it, including the Superintendent of Schools and any member of the School Board, administrative staff or agencies, from personal financial loss and expense including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage or destruction of property if the indemnified person at the time of the accident resulting in the injury, damage or destruction was acting in the scope of his employment or office. Mrs. Ruth Anderson 2nd. the motion. Mr. Joseph C. Bonis ammended the article to read that the words negligence or other be replaced with the word "an" and that the following words be added to his article. "The provisions of this article shall not apply to any case of established negligence by the above named." The ammendment to this

article was defeated. The Article was passed as originally moved by Mr. Robert P. Louis and seconded by Mrs. Ruth Anderson. The motion carried to accept Article III as printed in the School Warrant.

ARTICLE IV: To see if the School District will vote to authorize the School Board to purchase a comprehensive general liability insurance policy in order to protect the School District employees, officers, administrative staff and itself against personal liability suits.

Mrs. Ruth Anderson moved that the district vote to authorize the School Board to purchase a comprehensive general liability insurance policy in order to protect the School District employees officers, administrative staff and itself against personal liability suits. Mr. Bertram Thomas 2nd. the motion, and the motion carried.

ARTICLE V: To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

Mrs. Ruth Anderson moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$324,268.00 for the support of schools for the payment of salaries for school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district. Mr. Robert Louis 2nd. the motion and the motion carried.

ARTICLE VI: To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Mrs. Carol McFarland stated that two school buses are used each morning to transport students to Sanborn Regional High School and that there are approximately 85 students from Fremont attending Sanborn Regional High School. Mrs. McFarland said that she believed that the return trip from the school was overcrowded also because of the fact that there is only one bus used to return these students to their homes. Mrs. McFarland also asked what the capacity of the school bus is. It was stated that the capacity of the bus is 66 students. Mr. Harold Beane School Bus Driver from Fremont who drives this run stated that approximately 40 students make the trip home and that this run is not above the capacity. Mrs. Ruth Anderson School Board Member stated that if the busses become overcrowded that another bus will have to be added but at this time, busses are not above the capacity.

Mr. Theron Young Sr., made this motion to adjourn the meeting at 9:35. The motion was seconded and all were in favor.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Supervisory Union organization and/or reorganization remains a key issue in Supervisory Union No. 14.

Last March three of the five school districts within Supervisory Union No. 14 acted upon related warrant articles; the Sanborn Regional School District (the district contributing the largest percentage of Union expenses—41.5%) voted to authorize its school board to study the feasibility of reorganization; Epping voted not to authorize the school board to take whatever action was necessary to create an Epping-Newmarket Supervisory Union; and Newmarket voted to table this same proposal after Epping had already defeated it. The two smallest towns in the Supervisory Union, namely Chester and Fremont chose not to discuss reorganization at their meetings.

Thus, Epping, Newmarket, Chester and Fremont have not been actively engaged in any formal study of reorganization during this past year. However, the Sanborn Regional School Board has, on several occasions, met with representatives from the State Department of Eductcation and at this time (January 1975) it appears that Sanborn Regional could be reassigned by the State Board to a newly created Supervisory Union. The make up of this new union is not certain, but would probably involve the towns of Fremont and possibly South Hampton. The official beginning could even be as early as July 1, 1976.

Obviously, if Sanborn Regional and Fremont are reassigned, this would have a considerable financial impact upon the remaining districts within Supervisory Union No. 14. It is for this reason that thought is now being given to replacing Sanborn Regional and Fremont, if they do leave, with one or two other neighboring districts. The towns of Nottingham and Northwood have been beiefly mentioned as possibilities.

Assistant Superintendent Ira A. Stickney, who has been working very closely with the school board this past year states:

"The addition to Ellis School, after a shake down period appears to be working nicely and affords many opportunities not previously enjoyed. The people of Fremont are fortunate to have housing for the next few years.

There have been some frustrations along with the positive elements, to mention a few; some drainage problems have been encountered and remedied and paving has had an excellent impact on this problem. The original well was a major problem and expense—needing new pump, controls and extensive cleaning. Costs of all materials and services are very depressing but that is certainly not news to the people.

On the bright side the school board turned back to the taxpayers a very sizeable amount in July of 1974 and have worked very hard to keep expenses under control.

My thanks to the Fremont Board, Citizens, Staff and Pupils for making this year a year of accomplishment."

Principal reports:

"Today's school and its children are not the same as they were a few years ago. Two factors have brought about change in our elementary schools. One is the philosophy of education that dictates the way our schools will direct themselves and the other is the methods employed by our teachers to achieve better instruction. To make education seem more exciting than ever, teachers need more teaching aids. These help to make education more interesting and effective. Of course, this must be combined with the teachers' knowledge of the students of today. Todays elementary pupils have a variety of needs: social, emotional, physical and intellectual. Today's students have many more opportunities to gain better work and study habits. This has been brought about by the fact that todays teachers have been encouraged to use many more dynamic methods to reach the individual child.

The teachers in our school are primarily interested in making the teaching process an individualized program. The educational process can also work well with both small and large groups. The entire program needs to be constantly evaluated and then re-evaluated, so that we may better determine direction. The teachers at Ellis School work hard to discover a student's creative thinking and self-direction and then encourage these attriibutes.

We hope that the people of Fremont are becoming more aware of the good things that are going on in school, and we certainly want to thank the parents and friends who have been of service and assistance to our local educational program."
