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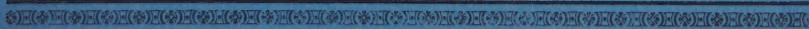

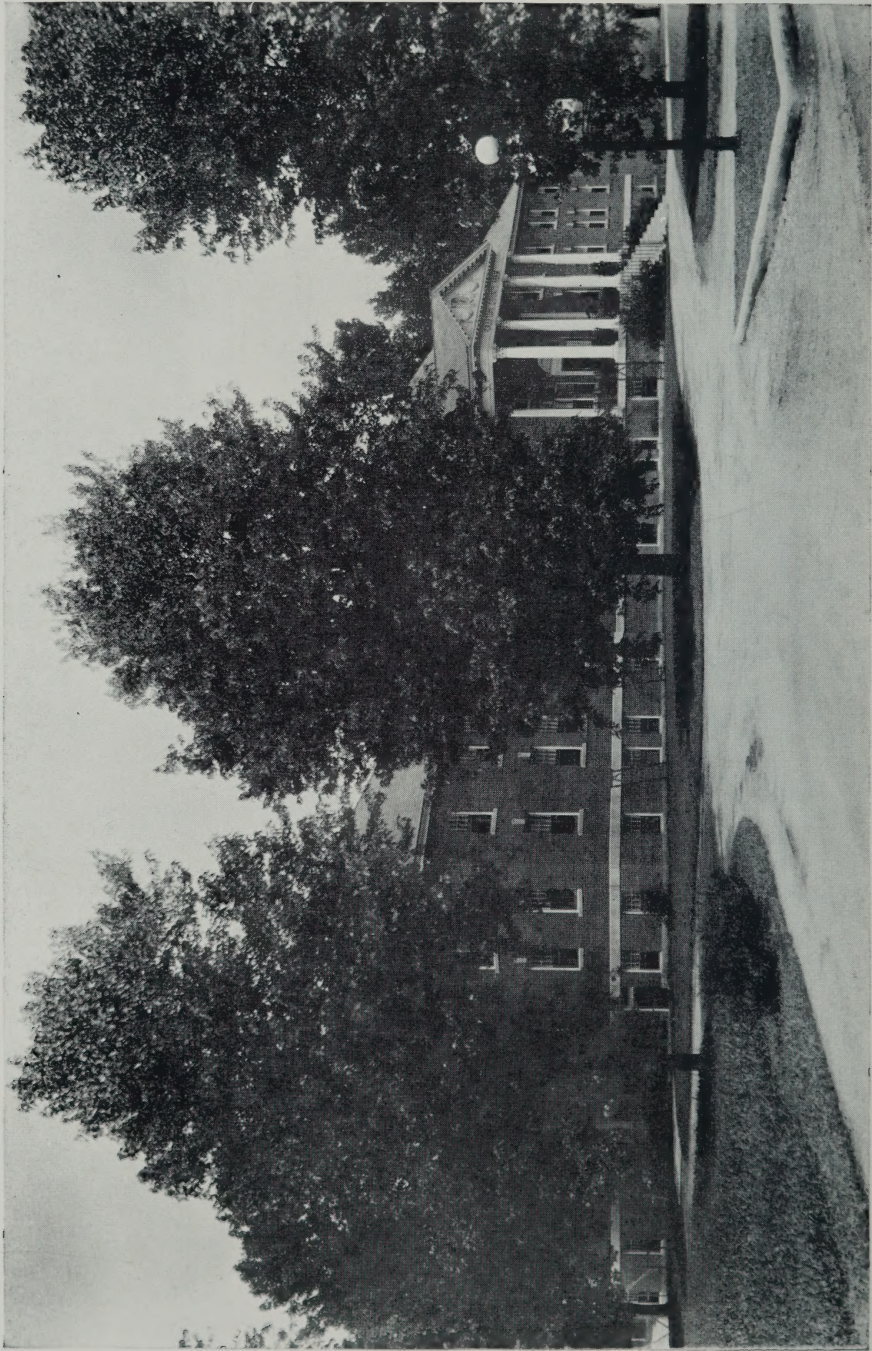

## GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION PROCEEDINGS

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**January 13, 1965**

Meeting of Grafton County Delegation called to order by Chairman Edwin P. Chamberlin of Bath at 2:00 p. m., in Room 119, State House, Concord, on Wednesday, January 13, 1965.

It was moved, seconded and unanimously voted in the affirmative that Senator Eda Martin of Littleton be permitted to remain as guest of the delegation during the meeting.

Roll call found the following present: Pryor of Ashland, Chamberlin of Bath, Stevenson of Bethlehem, Cavis of Bridgewater, Plumer of Bristol, Willey of Campton, Ellms of Canaan, Morse of Enfield, Gage of Grafton, Low and Manchester of Hanover, Larty and McMeekin of Haverhill, Karsten of Holderness, Adams, Putnam, Coutermarsh, Demers, Lewis and Whipple of Lebanon, McGee of Lincoln, Brummer of Lisbon, Gardner, Rich and Tilton of Littleton, Park of Lyme, Johnson of Monroe, Mack of Orford, Bell and Smith of Plymouth, Berringer of Woodstock. Absent Were: Scott-Craig of Hanover, Johnson of Franconia, Anderson of Warren, DeWolf of Alexandria, Boutin of Benton, Thayer of Dorchester, Martin of Orange;

Delegates present were: Sargent of Alexandria, Bowles of Easton, Batchelder of Ellsworth, Nettleton of Groton, Adams of Hebron, Snell of Landaff, Kinghorn of Piermont, Barney of Rumney, Aldrich of Sugar Hill, Bradley of Thornton, Bean of Waterville, Breck of Wentworth, Birch of Lyman.

First order of business—Election of Chairman—Coutermarsh of Lebanon nominated Chamberlin of Bath, seconded by several. McGee of Lincoln moved that nominations cease and secretary cast one vote for Chamberlin of Bath as Chairman; seconded by Whipple of Lebanon. Motion Carried.

Election of Vice Chairman — McGee of Lincoln nominated Whipple of Lebanon, seconded by several. Coutermarsh of Lebanon moved that nominations cease and secretary cast one ballot for Whipple of Lebanon as Vice Chairman. Duly seconded and carried.

Election of Clerk — Larty of Haverhill nominated Demers of Lebanon, seconded by several. Coutermarsh of Lebanon moved that nominations cease and clerk cast one ballot for herself as clerk. Duly seconded and carried.

Election of Executive Committee—Larty of Haverhill nominated by Whipple of Lebanon, seconded by several. Plumer of Bristol nominated; McGee of Lincoln, Berringer of Woodstock and Low of Hanover nominated. Coutermarsh of Lebanon moved that nominations cease and clerk cast one ballot for Larty, Plumer, McGee, Berringer and Low as members of Executive Committee for ensuing two years. Duly seconded and unanimously carried.

Clerk read motion of November 9, 1964 of Executive Committee held in Woodsville, as follows:

“Motion by Plumer of Bristol, seconded by Low of Hanover, that the Executive Committee Recommend to the incoming delegation that they investigate the cost of transporting prisoners from Municipal Court to Grafton County Jail and that they further recommend that this cost be borne by the municipality. Motion carried.”

Discussion ensued with comments by Pryor, Bell, Plumer, Morse, Larty, McGee, Gardner.

Motion by Coutermarsh of Lebanon, seconded by Whipple of Lebanon, that the chair appoint a committee to investigate this situation and report to our next delegation meeting—with the suggestion that delegates be appointed from each of the five deputy districts. Motion carried unanimously.

Brummer of Lisbon spoke on payment of architect's fee to clarify his position on this issue. Chairman read minutes of January 1963 meeting showing authorization to hiring of architect.

Coutermarsh of Lebanon moved that the delegation support the position of the outgoing executive committee and county delegation in payment of this fee. Seconded by several.

Discussion on above with several delegates speaking on this subject. Among them were Brummer, McMeekin, Bell, Snell, Coutermarsh, McGee; Brummer and McMeekin spoke twice on this.

Motion for previous question. Motion Carried.

Above motion put to vote and motion carried.

Move to adjourn at 3:00 p. m. Motion carried.

The public hearing on the Grafton County Budget was held in the Court Room of the County Court House, Woodsville, N. H., February 15, 1965. The

meeting was called to order at 2:00 p. m. by Chairman Edwin Chamberlin of Bath who turned the meeting over to County Commissioner Kenneth Bell who explained the budget for the county. Sheriff Herb Ash spoke on the work of his department. Frank Little of the County Home spoke on needs for the home and jail. Grafton County Attorney Bowker of Littleton spoke of need for increase for his office, work load has increased over the years, but not the salary. Bill is to come before legislature to increase salaries of County Attorneys.

**GRAFTON COUNTY DELEGATION  
EXECUTIVE SESSION  
February 15, 1965**

Meeting of Executive Committee was held at the County Court House in the office of the County Commissioners on February 15, 1965. Meeting was called to order at 10:30 a. m. by Chairman Edwin Chamberlin of Bath. Present, in addition to the Chairman, were vice chairman Gladys Whipple of Lebanon, Fletcher Low of Hanover, George McGee of Lincoln, St. Clair A. Berringer of Woodstock, Wilfred J. Larty of Haverhill, Clerk Mary Demers of Lebanon; also present were County Commissioners Kenneth Bell of Plymouth, Bert Shores of Lebanon and George Clement of Landaff.

Commissioner Bell went over the County Budget explaining the various items. Mr. Little of the County Home discussed financial needs at the home, also for the jail. Charles Wood, Register of Deeds, spoke in favor of the bill now before legislature to have all Registers of Deeds throughout state go on a salary basis. Mr. Little spoke also on water pollution.

Meeting adjourned at 11:35 a. m.

**April 5, 1965**

The County Delegation meeting to act upon the annual budget was held at the County Home in Haverhill on Monday, April 5, 1965. The meeting was preceded by a wonderful dinner attended by many of the representatives and delegates. An inspection tour of the County Buildings was conducted by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Little for the new delegates.

The delegation meeting was called to order at 1:30 p. m. by Chairman Edwin P. Chamberlin who announced that the meeting was for the purpose of adopting the budget. Many questions were asked. Mr. Morse of Enfield inquired about the indexing of deeds. Charles Wood, Register of Deeds, stated that every five years these have to be indexed according to the statutes. Mr. Gage of Grafton questioned the item of jury payroll. County Attorney Bowker reported that the requested increase was due to the estimate of the cost of the arson case of the City of Lebanon.

Motion by McGee of Lincoln, seconded by Coutermarsh of Lebanon, that the delegation go on record as supporting all three bills to come before House relative to salary of County Attorneys, County Sheriffs and Register of Deeds. County Attorney Bowker explained that the Salary of the County Attorney should be increased and gave reasons why, such as increased work load. Sheriff Ash explained the bill coming up relative to stated salary for Sheriff. Register of Deeds, Charles Wood, explained that the bill relative to the register of deeds would put each County on a stated salary, depending upon the amount of work involved. Smith of Plymouth, sponsor of sheriff's bill explained purpose of bill, which gives a flat salary of \$9,500.00 per year plus a car which goes with that salary. This is similar to the other bills being submitted on sheriffs salary. There are nine (9) bills being introduced. At present Rockingham is on a salary basis. Any fees for civil claims court cases, if he received them, would be turned over to the County. The deputies would still be on the same basis.

Charles Wood, Register of Deeds, spoke on responsibilities of person holding his office. If an error is made, he is responsible. This might mean a great financial loss. Very difficult to get insurance to cover



such loss. Lloyds of London insures for this. Grafton County Register of Deeds, Charles Wood, carries insurance with Lloyds of London.

Mr. Morse of Enfield inquired about appropriation for Court Houses. Commissioner Bell explained need for upkeep and repairs. Mr. Frank Little spoke on need for repairs at County Jail.

Thomas Pryor of Ashland suggested amendment to include bill for Register of Probate. Discussion followed regarding wisdom of going on record as supporting any bill prior to its printing, distribution and public hearing. Coutermarsh withdrew his seconding of motion; McGee withdrew motion. Object of offering motion was to permit discussion.

Motion by Coutermarsh of Lebanon, seconded by several, that the sum of \$466,094.64 be raised by taxation to cover the Grafton County Budget. Motion carried.

Coutermarsh of Lebanon spoke on locating a vocational-technical school in Lebanon. It was moved by Coutermarsh, seconded by Smith of Plymouth, that the Grafton County delegation go on record as petitioning the State Board of Education, at an early date, to conduct a public hearing on the selection of site for one of the two remaining vocational-technical schools, and further that the delegation go on record as endorsing Grafton County as a site for one of these schools. Motion Carried.

Invitation extended by Clerk of Delegation to all to attend meeting on April 12, 1965 at Lebanon High School, at 7:30 p. m. to discuss presentation at public hearing in Concord to have vocational-technical school located in Lebanon area.

McMeekin of Haverhill questioned nursing hospital. Messrs. Bell and Little spoke on need for additional

beds. McGee of Lincoln moved that the chairman appoint a committee to investigate need for expansion of County Home to take care of geriatrics and other patients and report to the delegation at the earliest possible date; seconded by Demers of Lebanon, duly carried.

Motion by Coutermarsh of Lebanon, seconded by several that meeting adjourn. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 4:00 p. m.

The matter of the House of Correction was taken up, and it was suggested by Commissioner Clement that we amend our security at the House of Correction. Mr. Frank Little spoke on the House of Correction and the jail. The prisoners had pried out wall and did damage to amount of \$667.00; he spoke of need for more guards. Father Gaulin, Chaplain of county jail, spoke on situation. John Roden, Chief of Police of Haverhill, also spoke on need for more security.

Meeting recessed for lunch. Continued at 1:00 p. m. in Chapel at the County Home. Mrs. Frank Little spoke on need for two extra nurses' aides. Low of Hanover recommended that commissioners take action on this.

The commissioners were advised to get bids on work needed (including catwalk recommended by Mr. Little), to call public hearing and to look up statutes covering this. Meeting adjourned at 3:10 p. m.

HB 681 — An act relative to the salary of and amount of fees to be collected by the register of deeds for Grafton County.

Rep. Brummer inquired about fees and spoke in favor of salary only. Mr. Wood explained procedure in making copies — extra work involved, etc.

Rep. McMeekin inquired about copy work done by register of deeds. Discussion held regarding work with Pryor, Bowker, Wood, Coutermarsh and McMeekin discussing merits.

Hearing closed on HB 681.

HB 615 — An act relative to salary of the sheriff of Grafton County.

Rep. Smith of Plymouth, sponsor, spoke in favor.

Rep. Coutermarsh, co-sponsor, spoke in favor.

Rep. Manchester of Hanover, Rep McMeekin, Rep. Morse discussed merits of bill, and Rep. Morse inquired if sheriff is going to let the deputy do his work.

To the Citizens of Grafton County:

As required by Statute, the Commissioners of Grafton County submit herewith the report of the various County Officials for the year ending December 31, 1965.

At the end of the year 1965 the County had a cash balance of \$50,957.27. This was due to going under our appropriation by \$27,525.77 and a substantial increase in revenue from the County Farm. A Convalescent area was set up there during the year whereby more patients could be cared for.

Our direct relief and Veterans Aid were down slightly from the previous year but due to the increase in the number of boarding children, their expenses exceeded their appropriation. Several of these children were transfers from other towns.

The Court House in Plymouth was repainted on the outside and more painting done on the inside, also, other repairs which included a new oil burner. Five air conditioners were installed in the Woodsville Court House, also ten Combination Windows.

Miss Beatrice Warren, one of our esteemed and faithful social workers in the Plymouth and Littleton area, passed away in February. She was replaced by Mrs. Leota Welch in Plymouth and Mrs. Esther Whitney in Littleton.

Unwar Samaha, Clerk of Superior Court for Grafton County for the past nineteen years, terminated his services here on March 1 and moved to Exeter, N. H., where he is Clerk of Superior Court for Rocking-

ham County. He was replaced by William E. Lovejoy of Lebanon, N. H.

We wish to express our appreciation to our staff of employees, the County Delegation, the various town officials and State Welfare Department for their continued cooperation.

The year 1965 has been a very active and rewarding one at Grafton County Farm.

New equipment purchased for the Farm this year was a Hay Buncher, Flail Chopper and Board Planer. Equipment purchased for the Institution was a washing machine in the laundry, a bath lift for the Women's Convalescent area, and a Hot Food Conveyor used in the Employees' dining room.

During the year two changes were made, one was establishing a central kitchen where all foods for the entire Institution are prepared. Previously we had two kitchens. This has eliminated much duplication

and has proven very satisfactory. The second one was setting up a Convalescent Area where our elderly women who needed more constant care would have twenty-four hour supervision. By doing this more beds were made available in our hospital for strictly hospital patients.

All three houses where employees live were painted on the outside and several rooms in the main house were done. Much of the woodwork was varnished.

Farm crops and garden produce were, in most cases, above normal for the year. Our shelves were well filled with canned goods and our freezer filled to capacity.

A two year old heifer was entered at Springfield Exposition. She came in fourth in her class, second in udders and was Reserve All New England. This is where competition is keen so we feel we did very well in the showing. From this entry it made it possible for us to enter a three year old milker in the N. H. State Sale which brought top price of \$1,400. Charles Page, Darrell Woodward and Douglas Bigelow are to be congratulated on this fine showing.

Church groups, organizations, clubs, schools and individuals have continued their interest during the year by providing church services and programs, giving gifts, clothing, money, magazines and books. All for which we are most grateful.

The Occupational Therapy Class continues to make and sell many useful articles.

The cooperation of the entire staff is very good, making it possible for all departments to endeavor to move forward.

In closing we wish to thank the Commissioners.

Mrs. Madeline Kirk, Mrs. Doris Hobbs, Dr. C. D. Eastman, the chaplains and staff for their fine co-operation and help during the past year.

FOR THE YEAR 1965**

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To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

I hereby submit the following report of my activities for the year 1965:

Processed through this office were fifty-five (55) appeal cases, forty-three (43) felonies, thirty-one (31) petitions under the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Act, together with a number of miscellaneous matters, making a total of approximately one hundred forty-one (141) cases. In addition to the foregoing there was considerable advisory work with the welfare department, on both the state and county level.

I should like to bring to your attention that the above statistics include some eight (8) cases of reckless driving, death resulting, two (2) murder cases and one (1) homicide-suicide.

There is at this time one (1) case involving murder which has not yet been disposed of; otherwise, the court docket is current.

It is hoped that the coming year, with more vigorous prosecution of motor vehicle violations, the number of cases involving highway fatalities can be reduced.

The County at this time is neither party plaintiff nor party defendant in any civil action.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank all law enforcement officers and agencies for their cooperation and assistance, with particular appreciation

given to the Grafton County Law Enforcement Officers Association. Every effort is being directed toward a better liason among the various agencies and a clearer understanding of the problems of law enforcement.

Dear Sirs:

Dating from the time of my transfer to Woodsville in June 1965, I can report to you on my own personal experience as Catholic chaplain to the Grafton County complex. From hearing him describe it I can report to you, second hand (by way of accounting for first six months of 1965) on the experiences of Rev. Leon Gaulin, who in June culminated an illustrious twenty months of hard work, that bore much fruit and resulted in the betterment of conditions of privacy, in consultations with people occupying the House of Correction and Jail at the County Home.

Both Rev. Gaulin and I have administered the Sacrament of the Eucharist each first Friday of the month during 1965. Fr. Gaulin has administered, as required, the Sacrament of the anointing of the sick five times during the six months and I have administered the same on eight occasions. On the eve of Christmas of 1965 I celebrated the Sacrifice of the Cross in the meeting room of the County Home. If there were more ambulatory patients and residents it would be desirable to celebrate Mass more frequently, however the present number (five) does not warrant this.

The final aspect of this ministry is the weekly visitation I make to provide encouragement or merely to be company for those who live in the home. My concern with the residents of the home, especially those who are required to call a hospital their home, is to have them see that they must create happiness among themselves and stay close to God in order to make this possible.

On several occasions during the six months the men of the House of Correction and Jail have requested to see a priest (as often they did call for Fr. Gaulin during the first six months.) When called I tried to show them the innate dignity of the human person as well as the work to which the Lord has called all men. The average age of these men is appallingly young, so it is not too late to introduce such ideals to their lives.

I wish to thank the Superintendent, Mr. Little and Mrs. Little, the Turnkeys, Dr. Eastman, the nurses and the entire staff of this institution for their great cooperation in notifying Fr. Gaulin and me whenever we were needed in any way.

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**REPORT OF COUNTY PHYSICIAN**

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To the Commissioners of Grafton County:

I hereby submit my report for 1965:

The maximum care unit was again very busy this year as can be seen from the accompanying report. Our maximum capacity at present is 33 patients and our daily census average was 31.3. One of our 33 beds is a locked room and is empty much of the time, because it might be needed for a prisoner or psychotic patient. We had fewer admissions, fewer discharges and more deaths. The total of patient days was approximately the same and the number of outpatients was greatly increased.

During the year, with the Supt. and Mrs. Little we worked on a Convalescent Unit and in this placed many of our older women patients who need 24 hour supervision. At the present time we have 10 patients who fall under this category.

Cubicle curtains have been purchased and hung in all our multiple bed units which affords individual patients greater privacy.

Because of the nature of our institution we have more wheel chairs, more lifting equipment, etc., than any general hospital of its size and we have no storage room. We now keep them in unused corridors and in the old operating room which is not satisfactory.

No one at present knows what impact Medicare will make on our Institution. Inspectors have measured rooms, corridors, etc., and we do not conform to the standards they require. To meet these requirements would cause major alterations. The biggest deficiency

is the narrowness of our corridors. A bed cannot be moved from one room to another with a patient in it. There are other major deficiencies, also.

We are still sending obstetrical and major surgical cases to general hospitals which is the policy laid down by the State Board of Health.
