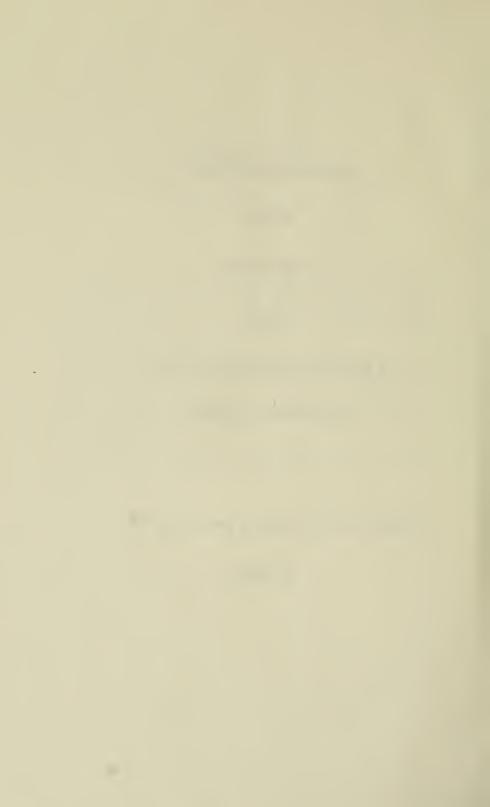

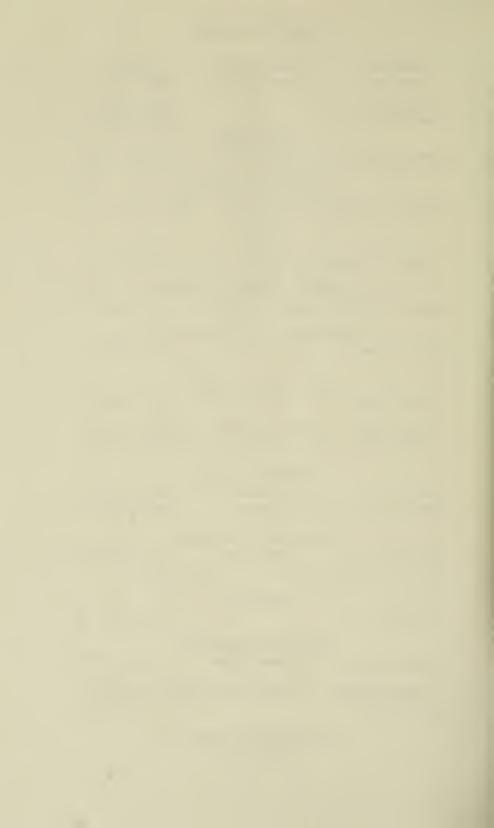

## SUMMARY OF 1986 WARRANT ARTICLES

- Article 1 All town officers duly elected.
- Article 2 Voted to hear report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.
- Article 3 Voted to raise such sums of money as necessary to defray town charges and make appropriations for same.
- Article 4 Voted to raise and appropriate \$3,600.00 to have the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council develop a master plan for the town.
- Article 5 Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,600.00 to purchase radios and defray school costs for the police department.
- Article 6 Voted to raise and appropriate \$5,000.00 to establish a Solid Waste Capital Reserve Fund.
- Article 7 Voted for a five year lease purchase agreement with John Deere Co. for a backhoe. This is a five year agreement which would cost \$8,859.00 per year plus interest for a period of five years, the monies to come from highway block grant.
- Article 8 Voted to raise and appropriate \$16,000.00 to purchase a small truck for the highway department. \$6,683.00 to come from Revenue Sharing Funds and the remaining amount from Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.
- Article 9 Voted to raise and appropriate \$21,000.00 to reconstruct the first bridge on River Road. The work to be contracted by the State of New Hampshire. Monies to come from Bridge Capital Fund.
- Article 10 Voted to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for the services of professional consultant to develop concepts and feasibility for a new town hall or renovate existing building. Monies to come from Town Offices Building Fund.
- Article 11 Defeated article to raise and appropriate \$11,250.00 to purchase E. Stuart Lang lot on Kilton Road.
- Article 12 Voted to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 for the State of NH Property Appraisal Division to do pick up work for 1986. Monies to come from Property Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund.
- Article 13 Voted to oppose burial, storage, transportation and production of radioactive waste in Grafton and NH. Also, to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into US Department of Energy's plan to dispose of radioactive waste and their competence to carry out such a plan.
- Article 14 Voted to adopt written welfare guidelines as proposed by the Board of Selectmen.
- Article 15 Voted to authorize Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 16 Voted to authorize Selectmen to convey by quit claim deed all property acquired by tax deed.
- Article 17 Defeated article to repeal the law making it unlawful to let dogs run at large.

## WARRANT FOR THE TOWN OF GRAFTON THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

## THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Grafton, New Hampshire, in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grafton Town Hall in said Grafton on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at 10:00 in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to act on the remaining articles at 7:30 P.M. at the town hall.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$240,000 for the construction of a new town hall and to authorize the selectmen to withdraw from the capital reserve fund created for this purpose, the amount of \$56,000 and to issue bonds or notes in the amount of \$184,000 under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA:33) for this purpose. Vote must be by paper ballot and poles must be open for one hour. 2/3 majority
- 3. To see if the town will vote to hear a report of the budget committee and to act thereon.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$120,000 for the purpose of adding space to present town hall for town offices as proposed by renovations study committee and to authorize the selectmen to borrow the sum of \$64,000 for said purpose through the issuance of bonds or notes under the provisions of Municipal Finance Act (RSA:33) and to withdraw the sum of \$56,000 from existing capital reserve funds created for this purpose. Vote must be by paper ballot. 2/3 majority.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80,000 for construction of a new town hall/community center and to authorize selectmen to withdraw \$56,000 from the dapital reserve fund created for this purpose and to issue bonds or notes in the amount of \$24,000 under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA:33) for this purpose. Vote must be by paper ballot. 2/3 majority.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$56,000 and withdraw said amount from the Town Offices Capital Reserve Fund and to authorize the selectmen to do so for the purpose of adding space to the present town hall for town offices.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of maintenance work to be done on the town hall. (Repairment of sill, additional structural support to floor, improving site drainage.) by petition.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 to purchase two acres of land adjacent to the recreation field from James and Josephine Thoresen.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$46,500 to purchase a new truck and to authorize the selectmen to withdraw from the Highway Equipment capital Reserve Fund, the sum of \$20,000 and to issue notes or bonds in the amount of \$26,500 under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA:33) for this purpose. Vote must be by paper ballot. 2/3 majority.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the Solid Waste Capital Reserve Fund.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the bridge Replacement Capital Reserve Fund.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 or updating property reappraisals and to authorize the selectmen to withdraw said amount from the Tax Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for continued work on the history book
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$839,631 which includes all monies raised for general operating costs and all monies raised in special warrant articles as approved by budget committee and town meeting convened.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-C which authorizes any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to apply, receive and expend any federal or state assistance not anticipated as of town meeting for the purposes set forth in the budget and that the selectmen shall account for all additional revenues and expenses.
- 17. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell the present town hall and land if or when a new town hall is built on an alternative site.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to instruct the town's representatives to General court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radio active waste from Scabrook nuclear plant shall be stored or disposed of within the Town of Grafton unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the town at the annual town meeting by written ballot. by petition.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow in anticipat ion of taxes.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of or sell by sealed bid or public auction, all property acquired by tax deed. RSA: 80:42-II.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to call upon the selectmen to establish a policy that off-highway vehicles, including snowmobiles, not be operated on class 4, 5 and 6 town roads. by petition.

#### ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

In 1986 the Highway Department built a new section of road at Grafton Pond. We graveled most of the roads on the height of land. We also did Williams Hill Road.

Winter sand and gravel for summer roads cost over \$20,000. The highway department replaced three bridges, all are wood, one on River Road, one on Wild Meadow Road and the last on Hardy Hill Road.

The highway department is still removing large rocks from roadways with the new backhoe.

We have had our usual amount of problems with our older truck and some with the newer ones.

The department mowed roadsides with a brush mower this fall.

We wish to say thank you to all who helped make this year go a little smoother.

John F. Bassett Road Agent We are seeking to purchase another new truck for the highway department. This one will be comparable in size to the one purchased last year. With the acquisition of this truck the town should have a reliable fleet of trucks. While on the topic of highways, a Bailey bridge was installed in place of the first bridge on River Road. A new bridge is scheduled to be built in its place within three years. In the meantime we will continue to seek money to place in the bridge replacement fund for the eventual replacement of other bridges in town. In the same pattern of anticipation of capital projects we are continuing to request money to be placed in the Solid Waste capital reserve fund for the day when it will have to be closed out. This year we have entered into an agreement with McDow Salvage to have the metal scrap periodically removed from the dump site. We still have to grapple with the problem of the safe disposal of demolition material. To ensure that only Grafton taxpayers use the transfer station, we have reinstituted the policy of dispersing dump stickers.

Finally, a word about a change in the way that we have been collecting taxes. Due to a change in the Federal Tax Code, annual tax collection is no longer practical because the maximum amount of time that we can borrow is six months. Any interest earned from investment of tax anticipation loans must be turned over to the Federal government. Thus semi annual tax collection becomes more practical for a better cash flow for the town.

There have been many changes in the town last year. The voters have the opportunity to instill just as many profound changes in the town this year as we'll have in years to come. We would appreciate it if all of the voters would attend town meeting.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This year will be one of choices for the Town's voters, some of which will not be easy to make. Foremost of these choices is the Town Hall issue. This past year a committee was impaneled by the selectmen to study the Town Hall space needs. This committee later split into two sub-committees; one to study the practicality of renovating the present building, and the other to study the feasibility of constructiong an entirely new building at a different location. Their studies have been completed. Their recommendations have been submitted for public comment at a meeting held this past fall. These recommendations are now being presented for action by the voters on this year's Town Warrant.

The Town Hall renovations committee is presenting the voters with three choices. One is to use just the money contained within the Town Hall Fund to raise the present building and place a basement under it. The second proposal would finish the renovation project for an added cost of \$64,000. The last choice requests money to repair certain defects in the building.

The other sub-committee is presenting the voters with only one choice; that of constructing a new building for a cost of \$240,000.

Adding to the voters' consternation, however, is yet another choice; that of a partial Town Hall, one without space for a general assembly. It is a modular concept that could be added to at a future date. It's initial cost would be \$80,000.

For some voters the choice will be easy. The price tag will dictate their choice. Although cost is one criteria used in arriving at a decision, it should not be the sole factor. The money deposited in the Town Hall capital reserve fund was acquired through Federal Revenue Sharing funds which are no longer available. Most likely, the Town will never come by such a "gift" of this magnitude again. It should be spent judiciously.

In casting their vote, the voters would not only consider the cost, but how that proposal they are voting for will benefit the Town's future population as well as its present. Some of the Town's future population may very well be the children of today's population. In summary, none of these proposals are equal in what they will offer the Town. In renovating the present building, additional office space will be gained. A new Town Hall community building offers not only additional office space, but room for recreation programs, storage for the attendant paraphenalia, and much needed restroom facilities, also the potential for added parking as well as a more central location. The "short form" modular Town Hall offers only office space, some storage space for recreation equipment and a "toe hold" at the recreation field with the promise that sometime in the future an addition would have to be built to accommodate a meeting hall.

The rest of the Town's business that has transpired is a potpourri. We have joined the New Hampshire municipal insurance pool, under this arrangement we have increased our coverage of fleet, liability, and property insurance. While this coverage is somewhat more expensive than that obtained under the individual carriers that we were contracted with, the town stands to receive dividends from this coverage based on how well the pool does.

#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS FOR 1986

The Town received \$3,799.77 of trust funds' interest income for cemetery care and \$451.57 for the purchase of new books for the Town Library.

As voted at Town Meeting, a capital reserve fund for \$5,000 was set up for the Solid Waste Fund and an addition of \$10,000 was made to the Highway Equipment capital reserve fund.

Expenditures from capital reserve funds were as follows:

Highway Equipment \$8,758.00 (new truck)

Town Offices Fund \$3,964.17 (Town Hall Bldg.Comm.)
Tax Reappraisal \$1,987.30 (property reappraisal)

Interest from the Kilton Doctor Fund was expended as follows:

\$2,559.25 - Medical expense reimbursement of \$15.00 each to 172 Grafton residents

\$2,000.00 - Ambulance operating expenses

\$1,935.00 - Reimbursement of Grafton's per capita payment to the Mascoma Home Health Services

Town residents should note that the Trustees of Trust Funds will meet at the Town Hall from 7 to 8 p.m. on the <u>fourth Tuesday</u> of each month. Due to declining interest rates, reimbursement will only be \$10 per person that can be collected at the time presentation of receipted bills for medical, dental, or eye treatment is made. No bills can be received between the December and January meetings because the Trust Fund books must be closed for auditing. Bills dated after the last December meeting will be accepted at the January meeting and paid for the ensuing year.

#### REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1985 and June 1986, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The two leading causes of forest fires were again children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

#### REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

We appreciate the opportunity to submit the following report in our continuing effort to directly communicate with our constituents, realizing your concerns and our accountability for a fiscally conservative budget.

We have heard that budget message and continually strive to meet mandated and essential services in the most efficient and effective, yet economical manner possible. This has been reflected in tight county budgets the last two years, resulting in decreased county tax requirements. Some towns may have seen increased county taxes due to evaluation and apportionment formula used by the N.H. Dept. of Revenue Administration. However, public services at the county level still usually reflect more equitable distribution of tax dollars. County tax averages 6.2% of base property taxes.

The county is facing the same problems in the insurance market as the towns. However, we have joined in the N.H. Municipal Association's insurance programs for most coverage needs at reasonable cost. We shall also have to deal with the loss of Revenue Sharing funds in the next budget.

It is too early to make a comprehensive report on the new welfare system under Senate Bill-1. We do know that with the change in program liabilities, county costs will substantially increase, and towns should realize a decrease in welfare assistance payments. County focus under SB-1 is to serve the needs of the

children, the elderly and disabled. Because the north country is growing with changing needs, growth in the elderly population, and expanded service requirements, we must look to the future to meet those needs.

The House of Correction occupancy figures have grown dramatically due to weekend sentencing, new DWI laws, and continuous one year sentencing to avoid incarceration at state prison, causing overcrowding at the Correctional facility. One option now under consideration is the construction of a two story dormitory type addition for 30 beds. The result would be a net increase of 18 beds meeting space standards under a plan in line with previous jail study recommendations, and at far less cost than a new facility.

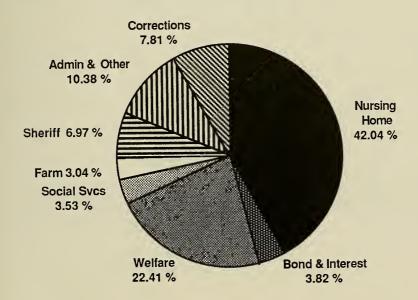
The farm continues to be self-supporting, provides work for inmates, and offers access for experimental projects. The Register of Deeds net profit margin is 3.6% of county revenues. The Sheriff's Dept. provides essential services in transport, superior court, dispatch, and other law enforcement activities, with increased revenue in fees. The Nursing Home is one of the finest in the state.

We are proud of our county; of the dedicated staff, exemplary services and high standard facilities.

Commissioners meet weekly, and encourage public attendance. We welcome facility tours.

#### MASCOMA HOME HEALTH SERVICES

The staff and board of Mascoma Home Health Services has been very active this year responding to the many changes that are occurring locally and nationally in the health care field. Cost of health care has become an issue at all levels. The need to operate efficiently and effectively has never been more important than now, with the marked reductions in State and Federal funding for health care and the increase in the numbers of people of all ages in need of community health and support services.

The primary goal of the home care program is and has been to keep individuals out of costly institutions by maintaining them safely and independently in their own homes. This program is staffed by nurses, therapists, home health aides, homemakers and a social worker.

Child health services are primarily for prevention and intervention of problems that may arise in early childhood. This program now includes parent aides to assist families with parenting skills, and also a "Mother for Mothers" volunteer network to provide reassurance to new mothers in need of support. The traditional well child clinics held monthly have an enrollment of 180 children. All of these services have reduced the need for acting on crisis situations, which are costly and disruptive to family life.

In an effort to reduce the overhead costs of operation, Mascoma Home Health Services has made an arrangement with the Mascoma Pediatric Group in Canaan to share office space and associated expenses, including clerical staff. This effort complements the efforts of both groups and strengthens health care services in the community.

We feel that we have been most fortunate to have your support for all of the programs that we provide. The financial assistance that we have received from you has helped to stretch other funding, which is passed on in care to patients and individuals in need of help, who otherwise might go without.

We look forward to working with you again this year.

#### UPPER VALLEY LAKE SUNAPEE COUNCIL

The Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council is a public, non-profit voluntary association of towns and cities in the Upper Valley and Lake Sunapee areas. Our thirty-one (31) communities are in two states and five counties.

The Council consists of a Board of Directors and a professional staff. Each town or city annually appropriates funds for the Council's operation and sends two representatives to participate on the Board of Directors. The Board elects officers, adopts the annual work program and budget, and develops policies and positions on issues that are important to our communities.

The Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council is the official organization that brings towns and cities within our region together. By bonding together and pooling their resources, local governments have a highly trained, professional staff available to them for a wide variety of services. Areas of expertise include land use planning, master planning, economic and community development, water quality management, transportation, landscape architecture, housing, capital budgeting, historic preservation, downtown revitalization, solid waste planning, recreation and fiscal and environmental impact analysis. The Council also serves as a collective voice for these towns and cities in dealings with state and federal governments, thereby protecting and furthering the needs and interests of our comunities.

Half of your local dues to the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council supports regional planning and regional programs. Over the past year, the Council:

- prepared the Upper Valley Solid Waste District Management Plan and provided administrative services to the Solid Waste District;
- sponsored and helped organize the Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program and provided assistance to the New London League of Women Voters to help create a similar collection program in the New London area:
- worked with several communities in the Lake Sunapee area to develop a solution to their septage disposal problem;
- maintained our regional data base, including our role as a Regional Data Center for the U.S. Bureau of the Census and updated and published the Economic Profile of the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Region which is the primary source of economic and demographic data for our region;
- provided an Economic Development Agent for Sullivan County to help retain and expand employment opportunities in the area;
- testified on several bills before the legislature, including the Connecticut River Resource Authority Bill, and distributed summaries of new and amended legislation to our communities;
- testified on Vermont's 5-year highway plan and New Hampshire's 10-year highway plan;
- · sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture Series;
- sponsored two meetings on groundwater protection and distributed model ordinances to each community in the region;

- provided administrative services to the Upper Valley Community Land Trust and worked with the Connecticut River Watershed Council, Hanover Conservation Council and Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests to negotiate voluntary conservation easements and deed restrictions to protect open space and conservation lands;
- continued the regional historic preservation program, including historic surveys, national register nominations and historic preservation plans;
- coordinated efforts to secure state funding for the Upper Valley Transportation Study and the Cheshire Bridge and completed numerous traffic studies for our communities;
- · provided technical assistance to Advance Transit and County Coach;
- helped over a dozen communities seek state and federal grant funds by providing technical assistance, data and in most cases, preparing the grant applications;
- conducted a survey of application fees for local land use regulations and distributed the survey results to several communities;
- met on numerous occasions with state department heads and legislators to discuss the needs and interests of our communities; and
- · updated and amended the Regional Land Use Plan.

As requested by communities, the Council conducted a large number of impact studies concerning proposed developments, prepared amendments to local subdivision, zoning, site plan review, and earth excavation regulations and provided mapping, drafting and other technical assistance.

The Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council has also provided a number of specific services to the Town of Grafton over the past year including working with the Planning Board on completion of the Town Master Plan and preparation of a townwide Existing Land Use Map. We also prepared a Community Development Block Grant application, which the Town may wish to consider submitting in the future, to conduct a study of housing needs and conditions in Grafton. The Council also helped the Planning Board review major subdivision proposals and provided technical assistance as needed.

The Council's staff of professionals stands ready to assist your community in addressing the planning and growth management issues which you will face during the coming year. We also encourage you to become more familiar and involved with the Council, since we are essentially an arm of local government addressing your needs.
