

### TOWN WARRANT

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (five hundred dollars) \$500 for the Town History Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred dollars) \$100 for the Fire Hose Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund for the purpose of a Water Reserve, and to raise and appropriate a sum not in excess of one half of one percent of the last assessed valuation for the purpose thereof.

- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one thousand dollars) \$1,000 for the Water Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion, plats showing new streets or the widening thereof, or parks, and upon adoption of this article it shall be the duty of the Town Clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the County of Hillsborough a certificate or note showing that the said Planning Board has been so authorized, giving the date of authorization, as provided in Sections 19-29 inclusive, Chapter 36 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the changes, in the Zoning Ordinance adopted March 12, 1962, recommended by the Hancock Planning Board, as follows: Article 4, paragraph 9 to read as follows "Minimum Land Area. No lot shall be less than 40,000 Sq. Ft."; Article 7, paragraph 2 to read as follows, "Minimum Land Area. No lot shall be less than 60,000 Sq. Ft."
- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of (two hundred dollars) \$200, for the use of the Trustees of the Hancock Town Library in helping to meet the costs of maintaining the building in good condition, and particularly in improving the front lawn and shrubbery and in replacing the tree which had to be removed, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the Town will establish a town Conservation Commission as set forth in R.S.A. 36—A.
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred fifty dollars) \$150 to repair the lightning rod on the steeple of the Town Hall, or take any other action relating thereto.

- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (five hundred dollars) \$500 for repairing and painting the clock faces of the clock in the steeple of the Town Hall, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old road that goes from the old Gullefer place northerly to the Old Antrim Road, the two interconnecting roads from this road to the Old Antrim Road, and the old road from this road toward Greystone Lodge to the Antrim line, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (eight hundred ninety seven dollars and ninety two cents) \$897.92 as our share of the T.R.A. program, and to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow up to (seven thousand dollars) \$7,000 for a two year program and to raise and appropriate the necessary interest money, or take any action relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town wishes to buy a new one way snow plow for the Highway Dept., raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$950.00 for the same or take any other action relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in the anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 1% on property taxes if paid within 30 days after date of bill, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

- 19. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### REPORT OF DISTRICT FIRE CHIEF

Fire records are made by people — those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- 1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- 2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres . . . a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

- 1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
  - 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
  - 3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important Instruct your children that matches are not play things.

#### REPORT OF HANCOCK PLANNING BOARD

We have investigated land subdivision control regulations as recommended by the State of N.H. Division of Economic Development and those adopted by other towns. It is apparent from these studies and the Contoocook River Valley Preliminary Study that Hancock is one of the fastest growing towns, in population, in this area. Because of our conclusions drawn from these investigations we urge the establishment of regulations permitting the subdivision of land. They will preserve the beauty and charm of our village without becoming another crowded community.

#### PROPOSED SUBDIVISION CODE

If the town grants the Hancock Planning Board the authority to regulate the subdivision of land the following regulations are those the Planning Board plans to adopt.

## Land Subdivision Control Regulations

## Section I. Authority

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Hancock Planning Board by the voters of the Town of Hancock, and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 36, Sections 19-29, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and as amended, the Hancock Planning Board adopts the following amended regulations governing the subdivision of land in the Town of Hancock, New Hampshire.

#### Section II. Title

These amended regulations shall be known and may be cited as the "Town of Hancock Land Subdivision Control Regulations" of 1967 hereinafter referred to as the "Subdivision Control Regulations."

#### Section III. Definitions

A. BOARD means the Planning Board of the Town of Hancock.

B. SUBDIVISION means the division of a tract or parcel of land into two or more lots for the purpose,

whether immediate or future, of sale, rent, lease, or building development, located on an existing, new, widened or extended street, and requiring the extension of municipal utilities, or construction of private on-lot systems, for all types of land uses — residential, trailer, mobile home, business, industrial, public or semi-public: provided, however, that development for agricultural purposes is expressly excluded. When appropriate to the context of these subdivision regulations, the term subdivision shall relate either to the process of subdividing or to the land or area subdivided. It shall not include a division of land where each resulting parcel fronts on a public street previously accepted or taken by the Town.

- C. LOT means a parcel of land capable of being occupied by one principal structure or use and its accessory structures or uses and as shown and identified as such on a plat.
- D. PLAT means the final map, drawing or chart on which the subdivider's plan of subdivision is presented to the Hancock Planning Board for approval, and which, if approved, will be submitted to the Register of Deeds of Hillsborough County for recording.
- E. STREET means and includes street, avenue, boulevard, road, alley, highway, and other ways exclusive of driveways serving not more than two adjacent lots.
- F. SUBDIVIDER means the registered owner or the authorized agent of the registered owner of a subdivision.
- G. ENGINEER or SURVEYOR means the duly designated and legally recognized engineer or competent surveyor of the subdivider as may be pertinent to the actual services to be performed in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 319, Sections 1-30, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and as amended.

#### Section IV. Procedure

## A. Pre-Application

Previous to the formal submission of a subdivision preliminary layout, a subdivider in order to save himself the cost of needless changes at a later date, may appear at a regular meeting of the Board and submit a sketch plan for discussion with the Board.

## B. Application

Whenever any subdivision is proposed to be made and before any contract for the sale of, or offer to sell, rent or lease, such subdivision or any part thereof shall have been negotiated, the subdivider shall apply in writing to the Board for approval of such subdivision. The application shall conform to the specifications contained in the Subdivision Regulations. Applications for approval together with a nominal fee for covering the cost of advertising and mailing shall be filed with the Secretary of the Board not less than five days before any regular meeting of the Board. The Secretary shall furnish the applicant with a receipt for same.

#### C. Preliminary Layout

The preliminary layout as described in Section VI shall be filed with the Board. The Board will then study the preliminary street and lot layout and proposed improvements in connection with the Comprehensive Town Plan, the Official Map, (if and when one is adopted) the needs of the surrounding area and neighborhood, the topography and soil conditions of the area, and any other pertinent State or local regulations.

#### D. Revision of Preliminary Layout

The Board before taking formal action shall hold a discussion with the subdivider and may hear and confer with other parties whose interest may be affected by the proposed layout. After such discussion the Board shall communicate in writing to the developer the specific changes, if any, which it will require in the preliminary plan, and the types and amount of construction or improvements it shall require as a condition precedent to the approval of the subdivision plan. The Board may disapprove of the preliminary layout in its entirety, but shall state its reasons for such disapproval. Any approval shall be considered only as tentative and shall not be entered on the plan.

#### E. Final Plat

The subdivider, after official notification by the Board with respect to the preliminary plan and the changes, if any, to be made, therein, shall within twelve months thereafter file with the Board the final plat and the accompanying material as described in Section VII. The subdivider shall tender offers of cession in a form certified as satisfactory by the Town legal counsel of all land included in streets, highways, or parts not specifically reserved by him, but approval of the plat by the Board shall not constitute an acceptance by the Town of the dedication of any street, highway, park or other public open space.

The subdivider shall either file a bond, in an amount and with surety and conditions satisfactory to the

Board providing for and securing to the Town the actual construction and installation of such improvements and utilities within a period specified by the Board and expressed in the bond; or other evidence supporting an assessment or other method whereby the Town is put in an assured position to do said work and make said alterations at the cost of the subdivider. Such bond or other method shall be approved as to form and sureties by the legal counsel of the Town and conditioned on the completion of such improvement within five years of the date of the bond or acceptance by him of any other approved method.

Before the final plat shall have been approved or disapproved, the Board shall hold a public hearing on the plan. Notice thereof shall be sent to the subdivider by registered mail, with return receipt requested, stating the time and place of such hearing, not less than five days before the date fixed thereof.

#### F. Approval

The Board shall consider any plat submitted to it within 30 days and shall act to approve or disapprove thereof within 90 days in accordance with Section 23, Chapter 36, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and as amended. If the Board approves the plat, the Secretary of the Board shall transmit a copy of such approval in writing to the Register of Deeds of Hillsborough County.

#### G. Certificate of Failure to Take Action

The Town Clerk is hereby specified as the municipal officer who shall issue on behalf of the Board a certificate of failure on the part of the Board to take action on approval or disapproval of a plat submitted to it, as provided by Chapter 36, Section 23, N.H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

Section V. General Requirements for the Subdivision of Land.

The subdivider shall observe the following general requirements and principals of land subdivision:

A. The plan shall conform with the Comprehensive Town Plan, the Official Map, if and when one is adopted, and any other pertinent State or local laws or regulations.

B. Land of such character that it cannot be safely used for building purposes because of exceptional danger to health or peril from fire, flood or other menace shall not be platted for residential occupancy, nor for such other uses as may increase danger to health, life or property or aggravate the flood hazard, until appropriate

measures have been taken by the subdivider to eliminate such hazards. No floodway shall be obstructed.

- C. Streets shall be logically related to the topography so as to produce usable lots and reasonable grades and shall be in appropriate relation to the proposed uses of the land to be served by such streets. Where practical, lots shall be graded towards the streets.
- D. The arrangement of streets in the subdivision shall provide for the continuation of the principal streets in adjoining subdivisions or for their proper projection when adjoining property is not subdivided, and shall be of a width at least as great as that of such existing connecting streets.
- E. No street or highway right-of-way shall be less than 50 feet in width and may be required to be more if a greater street width is required by Item A above or is warranted in the opinion of the Board.
- F. Except where near-future connections may be possible, dead-end streets shall not in general exceed 600 feet in length, and shall be equipped with a turn-around roadway at the closed end with a minimum radius of 60 feet from the center to the outside edge of the right-of-way.
- G. No horizontal curves shall have a centerline radius of less than 150 feet, except turn-arounds on a dead-end way. For changes in grade exceeding one per cent, a vertical curve shall be provided ensuring a minimum site distance of 150 feet.
- H. Grades of all streets shall conform in general to the terrain and shall, so far as practical, not exceed 5% for major streets and 8% for minor streets. No street shall have a grade of less than 1%.
- I. The widths of blocks shall not be less than 200 feet, nor shall the length exceed 1200 feet.
- J. Intersecting property lines at street intersections shall be joined by a curve of at least 25 foot radius.
- K. Streets shall be laid out to intersect as nearly as possible at right angles. No street shall intersect another at an angle of less than 60 degrees. Streets entering opposite sides of another street shall be laid out either directly opposite one another or with a minimum offset of 125 feet between their center lines.
- L. Reserve strips of land which, in the opinion of the Board show an intent on the part of the subdivider to control access to land dedicated or to be dedicated to public use shall not be permitted.

- M. Where the topography is such as to make difficult the inclusion of any utilities or other facilities within the public area so laid out, the preliminary layout shall show the boundaries of proposed permanent easements over or under private property. Such easements shall be not less than 15 feet in width and shall have satisfactory access to existing or proposed public ways. Watercourses proposed for public control shall have a permanent easement of not less than 20 feet.
- N. Areas set aside for parks and playgrounds to be dedicated or to be reserved for the common use of all property owners by covenant in the deed, whether or not required by the Board, shall be of reasonable size and character for neighborhood playgrounds or other recreational uses. For subdivisions involving more than 10 acres whether done at one time or in a series, at least 5% of the area shall be reserved for recreational purposes.
- O. Streets which join or are in alignment with streets of abutting or neighboring properties shall bear the same name. Names of new streets shall not duplicate, nor bear phonetic resemblance to the names of existing streets within the Town. Where practical, names shall have historical connection.
- P. Lots shall be laid out and graded to eliminate flood or stagnant water pools. No water shall be permitted to run across a street on the surface but shall be directed into catch basins and piped underground in a pipe of not less than 12 inches in diameter.
- Q. It shall be the responsibility of the subdivider to provide adequate information to prove that the area of each lot is adequate to permit the installation and operation of an individual sewage disposal system (septic tank and drain field not a cesspool). Such information shall consist of a report showing the results of a series of percolation tests taken one to an acre in the subdivision in accordance with the New Hampshire Department of Health Regulations titled "The Septic Tank System of Sewerage Disposal" three copies of which are on file with the Secretary of the Board. Based on these tests the Engineer shall locate the best position for each private sewerage system and shall submit a typical design for each system also done in accordance with the above State regulations. If a sewerage system is to be installed to service more than a single house, adequate information must be provided to assure that the necessary requirements for drainage as well as all other requirements of that system are met and complete details of the system must be pro-

vided. Any system of this type must be approved by the Water Pollution Board, State of New Hampshire.

R. It shall be the responsibility of the subdivider to provide adequate information to prove that the area of each lot is adequate to permit the installation and operation of both individual on-lot water and sewerage systems where required. Each water system shall be at least 75 feet from any portion of a septic tank or drainage field and shall be constructed in accordance with the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare publication titled "Manual of Individual Water Supply Systems" Public Health Service Pub. No. 24, three copies of which are on file with the Secretary of the Board.

## Section VI. Preliminary Layout

Each Subdivider shall file with the Board three black and white copies of a preliminary layout at a horizontal scale of not more than 100 feet to the inch and a vertical scale of not more than 40 feet to the inch. The over-all sheet size shall be 32 inches by 36 inches with separate sheets numbered and showing their relationship to each other. A margin of at least one inch shall be provided outside ruled border lines on three sides and of at least two inches along the left side for binding. The plan shall show or be accompanied by the following information:

- A. Proposed subdivision name; name and address of owner of record; subdivider and Engineer or Surveyor; date; north point and scale.
- B. Names of owners of record of abutting properties, abutting subdivision names, streets, easements, setbacks, alleys, parks, and public open spaces and similar facts regarding abutting property.
- C. Location of property lines and their approximate dimensions; existing easements, buildings, water courses, ponds or standing water, rock ledges and other essential features.
- D. Existing water mains, sewers, culverts, drains and proposed connections or alternative means of providing water supply and disposal of sewerage and surface drainage. Location of each percolation test hole and the results, each proposed septic tank and drainage field, each proposed well, and typical designs of the proposed on-lot water and sewerage system.
- E. Location, name and width of existing and proposed streets and highways with their grades and profiles and the elevations of sufficient points on the property. For land that slopes less than approximately 2 per cent

spot elevations at all breaks in grade, along all drainage channels or swales and at selected points not more than 200 feet apart in all directions; for land that slopes more than approximately 2 percent either contours with an interval of not more than 10 feet if ground slope is regular, or not more than 5 feet if ground slope is irregular.

- F. Proposed lots, approximate square foot size of each lot and setback lines.
- G. Location of all parcels of land proposed to be dedicated to public use and the conditions of such dedication, and a copy of such private deed restrictions as are intended to cover part or all of the tract.
- H. Preliminary location and size of any bridges or culverts which may be required.
- I. Where the preliminary layout submitted covers only a part of the subdivider's entire holding, a sketch of the prospective future street system of the unsubmitted part shall be furnished and the street system of the submitted part will be considered in the light of adjustments and connections with the street system of the part not submitted.

#### Section VII. Final Plat

## The final plat shall show:

- 1. Proposed subdivision name or identifying title, the name and address of owner of record and subdivider, and the name, license number and seal of the Engineer and/or name and address of Surveyor, date, scale, and north point.
- 2. Street lines, setback lines, pedestrian ways, lot lines lot sizes in square feet, reservations, easements and areas to be dedicated to public use and areas the title to which is reserved by the developer.
- 3. Typical street cross sections, approximate grades, profiles and locations and sizes of any bridges or culverts.
- 4. Location and typical design of the proposed on-lot sewerage and water system and location and size of the proposed storm pipes and catch basins.

- 5. Sufficient data to determine readily the location, bearing and length of every street line, lot line, boundary line and to reproduce such lines upon the ground. All dimensions shall be shown to the nearest tenths of a foot and bearings to the nearest minute. The error of closure for blocks enclosed by streets shall not exceed one in 5,000. The final plat shall show the boundaries of the property.
- 6. Location and description of each permanent monument and bench mark including primary control points and reference to a USGS bench mark.

# Section VIII. Improvement Construction Requirements

The following improvements shall be installed and constructed by the subdivider to the satisfaction of the Selectmen and under their supervision either before submission of the final plat or the subdivider together with the final plat shall file a bond or make other suitable arrangements as contained in Section IV-E.

- A. Monuments constructed of concrete or stone at least 4 inches on the top and at least 36 inches long shall be set at all block corners. Two bench marks of the same description as the monuments shall be set at opposite ends of the subdivision whose tops are at an even foot in reference to the USGS datum plane.
  - B. The roadway shall have a width of at least 24 feet.
- C. The roadway shall be constructed in accordance with the following specifications:
- 1. All topsoil or loam must be removed from the limits of the road bed to a depth of at least 12 inches. Topsoil shall be removed from areas that will be filled. Where loam or improper road foundation material exceeds 12 inches in depth, such material must be excavated and replaced with bank-run gravel or broken rock.
- 2. The base course shall consist of bank-run gravel, free from loam or organic matter.
- 3. The finish course shall consist of fine gravel, not to exceed 2 inches in diameter.
- 4. The surface shall consist of one application of primer (SC 1-3 or equal road tar) applied at the rate of 3/4 gal. per square yard and one application of MC2-4 (or its road tar equivalent) applied at the rate of 1/2 gal. per square yard. The surface shall be sanded with clean sharp sand following the final coating of oil.
- D. All proposed drainage facilities and culverts shall be installed. Natural watercourses shall be cleaned and increased in size where necessary to take care of storm

run-off. Drainage swales at least 3 feet in width and 16 inches in depth at its midpoint below centerline grade shall be constructed in the street right-of-way on both sides of the paved roadway.

E. The roadway shall be graded to the final grade in accordance with the profile and cross section submitted.

F. If the subdivision is to be serviced by the public water system or by a private system servicing more than one house, all water lines must be installed. Any water system which is to be connected to the public system must conform to all requirements of the Water Regulations adopted in 1966 and meet with the approval of the Water Commissioners. Any necessary fire hydrants as determined by the Water Commissioners and Fire Department must be installed by the subdivider.

#### Section IX. Administration

The Selectmen may appoint an agent charged with the responsibility of receiving for the Board preliminary layouts and final plats, checking them to determine if they meet the requirements of the Subdivision Regulations, and inspecting improvements for compliance with the Subdivision Regulations and requirements of the Board and Selectmen.

#### Section X. Variances

Where strict conformity to the Subdivision Regulations would cause undue hardship or injustice to the owner of the land, a subdivision plan substantially in conformity with the Subdivision Regulations may be approved by the Board provided that the spirit of the Subdivision Regulations and public convenience and welfare will not be adversely affected.

#### Section XI. Amendments

The Subdivision Regulations may be amended or rescinded by the Board but only following public hearing on the proposed change. The chairman or secretary of the Board shall transmit a record of any changes so authorized to the Registry of Deeds of Hillsborough County.

## Section XII. Separability

If any section, clause, provision, portion or phrase of this regulation shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court or competent authority such holding shall not affect, impair or invalidate any other section, clause, provision, portion or phrase of this ordinance.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE HANCOCK TOWN LIBRARY

The essential repairs and modernization of the library building have now been completed. All the rooms have been painted a light color, thus greatly improving the illumination cast by the overhead fluorescent lights. Two of the round tables in the children's room have been replaced by movable display racks which attract the children because the front covers of the books are now visible. A generous appropriation from the Town, plus a smaller gift from the State Library, enabled us to make these improvements and also to buy a number of reference books without reducing our purchases of current books.

We are greatly indebted to Mrs. Adamovitch for many hours of skilled labor spent without pay in weeding the books in the stack room. This work is now finished except

for some of the biographies and histories.

We are equally indebted to the librarian and to others who assisted in carrying out the difficult task of removing the books from the stack room before the painting, piling them in order, and then restoring them to their proper places.

During the absence of Mrs. Flindell this fall and winter, Mrs. Hampson and Miss Flora Frank have served voluntarily as children's librarians, and Mrs. Pond has volunteered to arrange the art exhibits. The latter, incidentally, attracted many visitors when the library was open for inspection on Old Home Day, etc., and continue to draw much favorable comment.

We expect to install very shortly a weatherproof book-drop box outside the front door so that books may be returned on any day or hour. We hope that this will lessen the perennial problem of over-due books.

As usual, we thank most heartily all who have given books, magazines, or other gifts to the library. We do not believe that the donors realize how much these are appreciated by our library patrons. This year one gift in particular should be mentioned. In memory of Harold Fuller Mrs. Watson gave us two wooden tubs which the Peterborough Garden Club then filled with geraniums. During the summer they adorned our lawn and they are still a mass of bloom in our two front windows.

We are very grateful to Mrs. Garland for continuing

her weekly sessions of reading aloud or story-telling to the school children. Those who have been lucky enough to hear her realize how successfully she brings our literary heritage to life.

Our next task inside the building will be to correct our files. Outside we hope to improve the appearance of the lawn and shrubbery and to replace the tree that had to be removed after being split in a gale.

We have noted with great satisfaction the increasing use of the library during the last five years.

#### HANCOCK 1966

Should you study a giant photo of our Town to see what noticeable differences there were from the preceding year you would have to look at every section, and then very carefully indeed, to note the many minor changes. A new house or two are showing, some old ones freshly painted outside — an added window or ell faintly discernible; the area of the Tool Company doubled; the William/Gladys Rockhill's house, the first in the development on Prospect Hill. Much of the significance wouldn't show.

The interior of the Meeting House, for example, underwent a major refreshening (the last one 13 years ago)

with many pooling their talents to achieve success. Red carpets, fresh painting, beautiful lighting and a new altar cross have been added. Some of those very actively involved: Chairman Bill Hill with an extra special assist from Becky, Dick/Eleanor Amidon, Alice Hill, Perley Dunbar, Harrison Kendall and Al Pierce.

Also not showing would be new faces occupying houses previously lived in by others. Because it has long been a landmark on a shoulder of Skatutakee we note that Norman/June Lynch have acquired the place built by Dr. L. Vernon Briggs and in the family since 1914. The Felch house on the property, perhaps the oldest house in Town, is held by Eleanor, daughter of Lloyd Briggs. Those who come to live here are increasingly young people who find employment opportunities in the area. They are outnumbering those retired. Both show in common an appreciation of Hancock and the people already here. Consequently they are welcomed as they adjust to their new surroundings. Fran Russ was one of those entertaining such youthful newcomers as Paul/Theresa McCarthy, Henry/Patsy Davisson, Dick/Virginia Flinchbaugh and Alan/Barbara Thulander.

The Check List which is particularly in evidence on election years shows for this year 73 additions and 58 deletions. Ten years ago the total number of voting citizens was 474, this year it was 594.

For the record the winners to major office this year were Tom McIntyre (Dem.) to the US Senate, John King (Dem.) for the third time to the Governor's chair. Jim Cleveland (Rep.) was chosen once again to Congress, Robert English (Rep.) for a seventh term as State Senator and Donald Davis (Rep.) of Greenfield to represent Hancock and Greenfield in the House of Representatives in Concord. Hancock and Greenfield are a single district since the ruling of the Supreme Court of the United States.

John Wilbur will be our new Town Moderator as after 18 years of outstanding service Karl Upton declined to continue. Otis Wilder joined Bob Strombeck and Dick Amidon as the new Selectman, Kay Moore and Les Phelps were elected as new Supervisors of the Check List. At a Republican Caucus Al Daloz was chosen Town Chairman for his Party while the Democrats selected Gale Hennessey.

We like to record doings of our younger generation so we note that Chuck Gleason, armed with a Harvard MA, is Asst. Director of Development at Clark University while David Birch with his PhD. is teaching at Harvard Business School. Andrea Moller has been chosen "good citizen" and Gay Hampson is on the honor list at Cushing Academy. There are many others to stimulate our pride. Ralph Caverly, for instance, is one who has served valiantly in Viet Nam.

We like as well to note the achievements of older citizens. This year as Interest and Dividends taxpayers they were investing wisely enough to jump their tax ante from \$27,000 to \$33,000. This windfall, not shared by many Towns, increases almost as fast as our Town and School costs and represents more than 25% of Hancock's total tax take, thus lightening the burden on all of the Town's real estate. Fitting this into the Statewide picture Hancock compares very favorably with the two largest Towns in the State, Salem and Goffstown. These Towns receive from the Interest and Dividends Tax only \$11,000 and \$15,000 respectively.

For many years there has been a tennis court near the old high school. Its condition has varied. This year, thanks to the efforts of interested citizens, a substantial fund was raised to further the good work of Tony Brown and really put it in tiptop shape. Midge Buck, one of those who settled here this year, is a former national champion tennis player. She let it be known that she would give a hand to our younger enthusiasts.

A bit before our 87th Old Home Day was another gathering of happy citizens as they feted Earl/Cora Otis on their 60th wedding anniversary. There were other important things that a wide angle lens mounted on an orbiting satellite would have missed, some of which are recorded here.

#### D. REPORT OF DISTRICT CLERK

#### HANCOCK SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING Hancock, New Hampshire, March 5, 1966

On March 5, 1966 the annual School District Meeting was opened at 4 p.m. by Robert English, Moderator. The polls were declared open for voting on the first four Articles of the Warrant, namely to choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Member of the School Board for three years.

After the Moderator read the first four Articles of the Warrant, it was moved "that the polls be now opened and remain open until 8 p.m. to consider Articles 1 through 4 of the Warrant and that Articles 5 through 12 be taken up at 8 p.m." The motion carried, the Moderator declared the meeting recessed until 8 p.m. and voting began.

Mrs. Louise Stearns and Mrs. Edith Decker were Ballot Clerks.

At 8 p.m. the Moderator reopened the Meeting and declared the polls closed. He then read Articles 5 through 12 of the Warrant and the certification. Voting was as follows:

Article 5. Motion by Mr. George Hampson, Chairman of the School Board: "I move that the salaries of the district officers for the ensuing year be as follows: Chairman of the School Board, \$75.00; each other member, \$50.00; Treasurer, \$50.00; Clerk, \$15.00; Moderator, \$10.00; Ballot Clerks, \$1.50 per hour each; Auditors, \$1.50 per hour each."

The motion carried.

Article 6. Motion by Mr. Arthur Tremblay, member of the School Board: "I move that the reports as printed be accepted and placed on file with the clerk."

The motion carried.

Article 7. It was moved and seconded that Mr. William Brown and Mr. Nelson Gay serve another year as auditors of the School District. The motion carried and the Moderator administered the oath of office.

Article 8. Motion by Mr. George Hampson, Chairman of the School Board: "I move that the School District raise and appropriate \$84,407.41 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for School District officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District."

Mr. Karl Upton questioned the wording of the motion, that is, "raise and appropriate" the sum of \$84,407.41 without the further explanation that other sources of revenue be applied against this amount.

Superintendent William Kelly explained that this wording is correct and that this amount (\$84,407.41) would cover all expenses if we don't get enough money from taxes.

Mr. Frank MacFarlane also questioned the wording of the motion and moved that it be amended using the 75 thousand figure instead of the 84 thousand dollar one.

There was further discussion and explanation by Mr. Kelly who stated that it's a risk to change the wording of the State.

Mr. MacFarlane withdrew his motion to amend. The motion carried.

Article 9. Motion by Mrs. Mary Garland, Member of the School Board: "I move that the school board be authorized to make application for and accept on behalf of the district, any or all grants forthcoming under Title III, V, or VIII, or any combination thereof, of the National Defense Education Act, Public Law 85-864 or any or all grants of other funds which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire under the provisions of the National Defense Education Act."

Mrs. Garland explained that the money was to be used for science equipment and math. Mr. Kelly discussed further the benefits under these grants.

The motion carried.

Article 10. Motion by Mr. Arthur Tremblay, Member of the School Board: "I move that the district vote to accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10, designed to improve educational opportunities with particular reference to children of low-income families, and to appropriate the sum of \$1,663.52, such funds having been made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. I further move that the district authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate."

Mr. Tremblay explained that this is a new program and it is hoped that these funds will be used for a remedial reading teacher.

Mr. Hampson stated that not only low-income families would benefit but any student who needs extra attention. He said that the only Federal requirement is that the School District must state how they are going to spend the money.

Mr. James Newcomb said that he is afraid of Federal aid and read an article from a Department of Health, Education and Welfare booklet. Mr. Newcomb further stated that "Federal control of schools is a consequence of aid" and that aid programs are part of the "blueprint for Federal control of curriculum and the manipulation of teachers."

Mrs. Garland explained that the taxes we pay to the Federal Government we are getting back by taking advantage of this fund. She said that this money can be applied only to special educational programs or equipment not supplied by the School Board. She further stated that this program is not discriminatory — that any child who needs it can benefit.

After further discussion it was requested that the Moderator read Article 10 again which he did.

It was moved and seconded that the voting on this motion be by written ballot.

The motion carried.

Results of voting: For 45 Against 29

The motion carried.

Article 11. Motion by Mr. Arthur Tremblay, member of the School Board: "I move that the school board be authorized to include a contingency fund item in the regular school district budget and raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for this purpose."

The motion carried.

Article 12. Motion by Mrs. Mary Garland, Member of the School Board: "I move that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$245.00 to meet the expenses of the area school district planning committee."

The motion carried.

At 10:20 p.m. a recess was declared by the Moderator on a motion that the ballots be counted. At 10:40 p.m. the results were announced as follows:

There were 169 ballots cast and the following were elected:

Moderator: Robert English, 89 Clerk: Dorothee English, 159 Treasurer: Mary E. Wilder, 164

School Board Member for 3 years: Charles W. Robinson, 118.

The Moderator administered the oaths of office.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:45 p.m.

#### B. SCHOOL PROGRAM

Mrs. Elizabeth Weston is a welcome addition to our staff this year, teaching the fifth and sixth grades. The remedial reading program under the direction of Mrs. Lila James has shown very satisfactory progress. Speech therapy has just begun with Mrs. Miller. New faces include Mrs. Holly Sanders, music instructor and Mrs. Ellis, teacher of brass instruments.

Mrs. Jeanne Deschenes is serving as our representative on the union-wide Science Committee and Mrs. Doris Rogers will represent our school on a similar group to investigate the language program.

We wish to thank Mrs. George Hampson for her able help at the library; Mrs. Elinor Amidon and the Woman's Club for their part in the Christmas program; Mrs. Johnson for her talk on "Early Days of Hunting in Hancock"; and Mrs. Arthur Tremblay for her efficient handling of milk and stamp money each week.

One of the highlights of this year has been the visit by two Japanese educators to our "typical village school". Again we were indebted to Mrs. Elinor Amidon for her help in arranging a suitable remembrance to give Mr. Yoshikazu Masui and Naoji Takanohashi.

Due to the generosity of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests, plans are underway for a Conservation Program involving all grades. A committee composed of Mr. Kenneth James, Mr. Donald Carle, Mr. Albert Daloz and Mrs. Clark is responsible for this new endeavor.

Equipment purchased with government and school district funds during the last year include an overhead projector, a filmstrip-slide projector, two new record players, a tilt screen, tape recorder and a copier for transparencies for the overhead.

Mrs. Doris Rogers represented us at the New England Reading Conference in Boston and she brought back new ideas and information which gave us renewed confidence in our own methods in teaching reading.

Mrs. Elizabeth Weston accompanied the sixth graders to Sargent Camp in December, a departure from our usual fall or spring trek. Mrs. Weston reports she enjoyed this experience and finds it worthwhile. Our conservation program will continue the studies encountered there.

A TV program in beginning French has been instituted in the fifth and sixth grades. Each child in the school is involved in at least one TV educational program.

The social studies program in the primary grades has undergone a complete revision through the planning of Mrs. Deschenes and Mrs. Clark. This has attracted attention and a report was given on their experiment by Mrs. Clark to the Monadnock Conference on Social Studies. Colored polaroid pictures taken by Mr. Tremblay of the first and second graders on their flight to Europe added a great deal to the display used for this report.

Mention should be made too of the Wilders who so efficiently transport our children and who donate our Christmas party ice cream each year.

The appearance of the first grade room was improved considerably when a tile floor was laid and the carpeting in the front ante way has helped.

The staff of the Hancock Elementary school is aware of its good fortune in being able to teach in a community which provides for the educational needs of the children not only with funds but with concrete help and advice.
