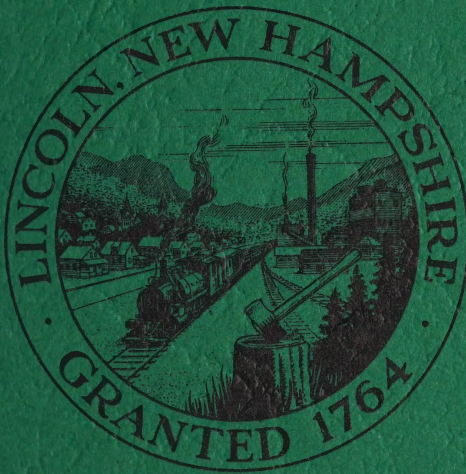

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING
MARCH 14, 1978

The moderator called the meeting to order at 9:00 am. Motion by Kalene Roberts to recess meeting to take up balloting until 6:00 pm with the business part of the meeting to begin at 7:30 pm. Seconded by Diane Mayhew. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

At 6:00 pm Kalene Roberts moved that balloting cease with regular business to be taken up at 7:30 pm. Seconded by Armand Beaulieu. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

Business meeting opened at 7:30 pm by Moderator. George McGee moved that the reading of the warrant be dispensed with. Seconded by Larry Gilman. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #2: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Chairman of the Budget Committee, Leslie Sargent, recommended that \$938,921.04 be appropriated for Town charges. Motion by Daniel Bourassa. Seconded by Wallace Peltier. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #3: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for District Court Expenses.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$8,705 be appropriated for District Court Expenses. Clifton Dauphine seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #4: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation and maintenance of the Town Building.

Motion by Daniel Bourassa to appropriate \$7,010 for operation and maintenance of Town Building. Seconded by Clifton Dauphine. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #5: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Employee' Retirement and Social Security Taxes.

Clifton Dauphine moved that \$10,500 be appropriated for Employees' Retirement and Social Security Taxes. Wallace Peltier seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #6: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Contingency Fund.

Roland Bourassa moved that \$500 be appropriated for a Contingency Fund. Richard Chase seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #7: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$70,996 be appropriated for the Police Department. Edmond Gionet seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #8: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

Wallace Peltier moved that \$6,659 be appropriated for the Fire Department. Roland Bourassa seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #9: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of all forms of insurance.

Clifton Dauphine moved that \$28,726 be appropriated for all forms of insurance. Daniel Bourassa seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #10: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.

Clifton Dauphine moved that \$300 be appropriated for Civil Defense. Earl Rannacher seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #11: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Health Department.

Clifton Dauphine moved that \$13,274 be appropriated for the Health Department. Roland Bourassa seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #12: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation and maintenance of the Sewer System.

Edmond Gionet moved that \$17,130 be appropriated for the operation and maintenance of the Sewer System. Roger Thompson seconded. Unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #13: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to operate and maintain the Town Dump.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$12,000 be appropriated for operate and maintenance of the Town Dump. Jay Bartlett seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #14: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting.

Richard Chase moved that \$16,500 be appropriated for Street Lighting. David Thompson seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #15: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Maintenance.

David Thompson moved that \$43,400 be appropriated for Town Maintenance. Daniel Bourassa seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$156.76 to the State to contribute \$1,045.04 for Town Road Aid.

David Thompson moved that the Town appropriate \$156.76 to contribute to Town Road Aid. Clifton Dauphine seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #17: To see how much the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Public Library.

Roger Stewart moved that \$8,396 be appropriated for the Town Public Library. Irene Sargent seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #18: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Town Poor.

David Thompson moved that \$2,500 be appropriated for the support of Town Poor. Clifton Dauphine seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #19: To see how much money the Town will vote to

raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$1,500 be appropriated for Old Age Assistance. Richard Chase seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #20: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Recreation.

David Thompson moved that \$6,500 be appropriated for Recreation. Roland Bourassa seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #21: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to operate and maintain the Water Systems.

David Thompson moved that \$11,100 be appropriated to operate and maintain the Water Systems. Dennis Rosolen seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #22: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries.

David Thompson moved that \$1,900 be appropriated for Cemeteries. Daniel Bourassa seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #23: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Advertising and Regional Associations.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$1,250 be appropriated for Advertising and Regional Associations.

ARTICLE #24: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Wallace Peltier moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE #25: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to expend on the Projects, and/or Debt Retirement Schedules voted in this warrant that may develop from monies paid in the Town by the State or Federal Government.

Edmond Gionet moved to authorize the Selectmen to expend on the Projects, and/or Debt Retirement Schedules voted in this

warrant that may develop from monies paid in the Town by the State or Federal Government. David Thompson seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #26: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate obtained by Tax Collector's Deed and to execute any deed or deeds thereof in the name of the same.

Jay Bartlett moved that the Selectmen be authorized to do so. Clifton Dauphine seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #27: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of all Debt Retirement Schedules due during the ensuing year.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$126,000 be appropriated for payment of all Debt Retirement Schedules due during the ensuing year. Clifton Dauphine seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #28: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Legal Expenses.

Clifton Dauphine moved that \$2,500 be appropriated for Legal Expenses. Earl Rannacher seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #29: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Patriotic Purposes.

Jay Bartlett moved that \$1,000 be appropriated for Patriotic Purposes. Daniel Bourassa seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #30: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 for the research and/or development of a solid waste disposal system.

George McGee moved that this article be passed over as it was inadvertently put in the warrant. David Mayhew seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #31: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Communications Center.

Roland Bourassa moved that \$28,726 be appropriated for the

Communications Center. Wallace Peltier seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #32: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Revenue Sharing Trust Fund and transfer to the General Administration Account, \$25,000 to be applied to the Maintenance and Administration of the Police Department.

Edmond Gionet so moved. David Thompson seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #33: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvement and construction of the Town Water Systems.

David Mayhew moved that this article be passed over. Larry Gilman seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #34: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town meeting, to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the report for, design of, and construction of a Sewage Disposal System, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in NH RSA 33:7-B ET SEQ. as amended and to pass any vote relating thereto.

So moved by Roger Stewart. Seconded by David Thompson. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #35: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the improvement and enlargement of the Municipal Water Systems, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in NH RSA 33:7-B ET SEQ., as amended and to pass any vote relating thereto.

So moved by Daniel Bourassa. Seconded by Earl Rannacher. Vote unanimous.

ARTICLE #36: To see what sums the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of improvement and enlargement of the Municipal Water Systems including pump stations,

treatment works, and such other related facilities inclusive of land acquisition, easements, and rights of way as are required, such sums to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (Chap. 33 of the NH Statutes Annotated 1955 and any amendments thereto) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale, and delivery of such bonds, as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln, and pass any vote thereto.

George McGee moved that this article be passed over as it was inadvertently placed in the warrant. Laurence Gilman seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #37: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to select either the NH Department of Revenue Admn. Division of Municipal Services or a private accredited or professionally capable auditing firm to audit the Town of Lincoln books.

Roger Stewart moved that the Selectmen be so authorized. Edmond Gionet seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #38: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to apply to budget items the interest received on taxes and deposits.

Wallace Peltier so moved. Earl Rannacher seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #39: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for and expend any monies that may be forthcoming for the Federal Emergency Manpower or CETA programs.

Daniel Bourassa so moved. Seconded by Roger Stewart. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #40: To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the Eligibility Application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

ARTICLE #41: To see if the Town will vote to establish the following building regulation pursuant to RSA 156 as follows:

1. The Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen or Building Inspector) shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements to determine whether proposed building site will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, and proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including prefabricated and mobile homes) must be (I) designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure, (II) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage, and (III) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

ARTICLE #42: To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Town Planning Board to approve or disapprove in its discretion new subdivisions and plats thereof as provided NH RSA Chapter 36:Section 19-29 inclusive and Section 34.

ARTICLE #43: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the flooding ordinance:

No person, firm, or corporation shall erect any new building or structure, or make substantial improvements to an existing building or structure, or cause to be done, within the Town of Lincoln without first obtaining a permit from the Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen or Building Inspector).

David Mayhew moved that Article 40, 41, 42, and 43 be passed over. Edmond Gionet seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #44: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser.

David Thompson moved that \$5,000 be appropriated for the purpose of purchasing a new Police Cruiser. Edmond Gionet seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #45: To see how much the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new welder.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$3,700 be appropriated for the

purchase of a new welder. G. Michael Weaver seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #46: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the paving of Town streets.

Roger Stewart moved that \$2,000 be appropriated for the paving of Dodgeville and \$7,000 be appropriated for the paving of Church St. Dennis Rosolen seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #47: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of a new Solid Waste Disposal Facility.

Edmond Gionet moved that \$133,000 be appropriated for the Construction of a new Solid Waste Disposal Facility. David Thompson seconded. Martha Patterson requested more information. Selectmen David Mayhew responded. Discussion followed. Robert Alger questioned whether the Environmental Protection Agency had accepted the incinerator unit as environmentally sound. George McGee responded. Moderator Fred Branscombe called for a vote. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #48: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the closing and restoration of the old Town Dump site.

David Thompson moved that \$8,000 be appropriated for the closing and restoration of the old Town Dump site. Wallace Peltier seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #49: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate and do all other things necessary in entering into contract with the Paper Mill for treatment of their industrial waste water. Said contract to comply with the Town's existing discharge permit as prescribed by Federal and State regulations.

David Thompson moved that \$100,000 be appropriated for treatment of the Paper Mill's industrial waste. Roger Stewart seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #50: To see what action the Town will take in setting up a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with RSA 35:1 for the use of future Water and Sewer Development projects.

David Thompson moved that \$175,000 be used in setting up a Capital Reserve Fund. Roland Bourassa seconded. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #51: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of funds from the Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Fund established under the provisions of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976 (Public Law 94-369 Title II of the Act) for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purpose and in the amount indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

So moved by David Thompson. Seconded by Edmond Gionet. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #52: To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-B and 43-C for Expanded Exemptions on Real Estate which provides for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, a \$10,000 exemption; a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000 exemption. Provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000 and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of \$50,000.

So moved by Roger Stewart, Seconded by Dennis Rosolen. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #53: Be it resolved that the Town of Lincoln that the NH Housing Comm. be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Lincoln, in the State of New Hampshire, that said New Hampshire Housing Commission is authorized to sponsor a project, for elderly persons under Section 8 of the US Housing Act of 1937 as amended, for any of the following accommodations or a combination thereof:

(a) existing standard housing (10) ten dwelling units; (b) substantially rehabilitated housing (50) fifty dwelling units; (c) newly constructed housing (50) fifty dwelling units; the total amount of the foregoing not to exceed (60) sixty dwelling units.

So moved by George McGee, Sr. Seconded by Edmond Gionet. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #54: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate and do all other things necessary in entering into a contract or agreement with the Town of Woodstock for the construction and operation of a Solid Waste Disposal Facility.

Motion by David Mayhew to amend the Article as follows:

The Selectmen of the Town of Lincoln be authorized to convey a portion of land not to exceed four acres to the Town of Woodstock. The ownership of this land to be reverted to the Town of Lincoln when the land ceases to be used for the purpose of Solid Waste Disposal Facility.

Motion to amend the article seconded by Laurence Gilman. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

Roger Stewart moved to accept Article #54 as amended. Seconded by Edmond Gionet. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #56: To transact any business that may legally come before this meeting.

Motion by George McGee to observe a minute for deceased Town Clerk & Tax Collector, Nathaniel Bartlett. Seconded by David Mayhew. Vote unanimous in the affirmative. So observed.

Motion to adjourn by David Mayhew. Seconded by Laurence Gilman. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

Meeting adjourned at 10:15 pm.

36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure of a sum not to exceed One Hundred and Forty Thousand dollars (\$140,000) for the purpose of conducting a sewer system evaluation survey with concurrent rehabilitation of the sewer system which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal and State Funds.

Said sum to be financed through the following actions:

1. The Town to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000) to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes and not to exceed Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000), under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NRSA 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the

Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Lincoln.

2. To authorize the Selectmen to file an amended Step I application for Financial Assistance with the U.S. EPA for a grant in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Five Thousand Dollars (\$105,000) and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and to pass any vote relating thereto.
37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure of a sum not to exceed One Hundred and Forty Thousand Dollars (\$140,000) for the purpose of preparing plans and specifications on sewerage and sewage treatment which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal and State Funds.

Said sum to be financed through the following actions:

1. The Town to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000) to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes and not to exceed Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000), under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NHRSA 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Lincoln.
2. To authorize the Selectmen to file Step II application for Financial Assistance with the U.S. EPA for a grant in an amount not to exceed One Hundred and Five Thousand Dollars (\$105,000) and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of

the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and to pass any vote relating thereto.

38. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of funds from the Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Fund established under the provisions of the Public Works Employment Act of 1976 (Public Law 94-369 Title II of the Act) for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purpose and in the amount indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

39. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
40. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to expend on the projects, and/or Debt Retirement Schedules voted in this Warrant that may develop from monies paid in the Town by the State or Federal Government.
41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate obtained by Tax Collector's Deed and to execute any deed or deeds thereof in the name of the same.
42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to select either the N.H. Department of Revenue Administration, Division of Municipal Services or a private accredited or professionally capable auditing firm to audit the Town of Lincoln's books.
43. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to apply to budget items the interest received on taxes and deposits.
44. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for and expend any monies that may be forthcoming for the Federal Emergency Manpower or CETA programs.
45. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available

for the report for, design of, and construction of Sewage Disposal System, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in N.H. R.S.A. 33:7-B et seq., as amended, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the improvement and enlargement of the Municipal Water Systems, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in N.H. R.S.A. 33:7-B et seq., as amended, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
47. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take an option or options on any and all lands which may in the opinion of the majority of the Board of Selectmen be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln and to do all things incidental thereto.
48. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to execute a deed in the name of the Town conveying to the Franconia Paper Co., Inc. the so-called Copeland Industrial Waste Treatment site, so-called, being bounded on all sides by Franconia Paper Co., Inc. land.
49. To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 33 of the annual meeting of March 8, 1977 whereas the Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to use the balance of the equipment money in the Trust Fund to purchase surplus equipment that may become available from the Federal Government amended to include "set-up and installation costs" of surplus equipment that may become available.
50. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new Loader/Backhoe for the Maintenance Department.
51. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to apply to budget items such sums of money from the unappropriated surplus as may be required to maintain the existing tax rate at its present level.

52. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to delete the printing of the Inventory of Assessed Property list from the Annual Report.
53. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the past action of the Board of Selectmen, whereas the Board of Selectmen acting in good faith and in the best interest of the Town, did without voter approval pass a deed for land from the ownership of the Town of Lincoln to the Linwood Medical Center Corporation.
54. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a purchase and sales agreement for a certain parcel of land declared surplus to the needs of the State of New Hampshire Department of Highways and further authorize the Selectmen to convey said land to the Knights of Columbus, Council 1730.
55. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into Eminent Domain proceedings as prescribed and authorized by the N.H. Constitution, Part One, Article 12; 4:29 should it become necessary and in the best interest of the Town.
56. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

One thankful note this year, is that for the second year in a row we have had less reported accidents. This is great because the state had a marked increase in both reported accidents and fatal accidents over the same period of time. We are also proud to report that for the past 2½ years Lincoln has been accident-fatality free.

Some of our energy this year has been directed toward gaining better relations with the community. Officers have provided lectures to the area schools on fingerprinting, criminal law and rights, the radar, etc. The department served as a registration station for a local fishing contest, and again for the fourth year in a row it provided bicycle registrations to local residents free of charge.

New to the department this year is a 1978 Dodge police cruiser. This brings to a total of 3 cruisers available for road du-

ty. Two of these only see limited action, on the Kancamagus Highway Patrol or the Loon Mountain Security detail. These two older cruisers have both seen over 150,000 road miles.

There have also been some personnel changes in the department during the year. In March, Mrs. Elizabeth O'Brien resigned from her post as department matron. Mrs. O'Brien was replaced by Eva Wright. In July Marty Bean resigned and moved to Utah to further his law enforcement career. Marty was replaced by Larry Drew, who had previously been assigned to the Loon Mountain security patrol. In August Leola Perry was added as a matron/partol officer. In September Rockland Jones, formerly of the Woodstock Police Department, and Steven Emerson were added to the departments list of auxilary officers. Steve is currently covering the patrol at Loon Mountain. So the department now has 4 full time officers and 8 auxilary officers to provide protection to the community.

During 1978 several officers attended continuing education courses. Wally Peltier took a course in First Line Management and Supervision offered by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council (NHPSTC). Jeff Mayhew attended the Part-Time Officers School sponsored by the NHPSTC. He also attended courses in Criminology, Crime Prevention and Control, and Correctional Treatment of the Offender given by the Division of Continuing Education at the University of New Hampshire.

The department would like to take this time to thank the members of the community for their constant, on-going support. Without it the job of a law enforcement officer would be next to impossible.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

1978

This year saw a new paint job on the outside of the library and a new sign added to the front of the building. Our aim was to try to maintain the upkeep of the building and library collection by regular annual improvements.

Added to the collection in the library were about 350 new books. This included a twenty-four volume art encyclopedia, a new edition of Collier's Encyclopedia, and a new science encyclopedia for children in addition to current fiction and non-fiction for adults and juveniles. These new books plus over a thousand books borrowed from the Bookmobile during the year have helped keep our patrons up-to-date in their reading.

A great asset to the interior of the library was the donation of two Mary Plummer paintings given in the memory of E.G. Mosco by his family. These along with a Sawyer painting given by Mrs. Elizabeth Canton are the beginning of a collection of local art work that enhance our library.

A summer reading program under the direction of Miss Barbara Hooker was conducted for six weeks. The program was sponsored by the Recreation Department utilizing the library and its facilities.

Due to a lack of funding, Mrs. Ethel Hopkins is no longer employed and the hours in which the library is open returned to three days a week. Mrs. Hopkins was a welcome addition to our staff and we thank her for her efforts and time spent as a librarian.

Mrs. Mary McMorran has resumed her duties as traveling librarian bringing books, magazines, and cassettes to local shut-ins. Anyone wishing to have Mrs. McMorran call on them should contact the library at 745-8159 with their request.

Among the services provided by the library to the community was the use of films for local programs. We have borrowed films from the State Library for both the Pemi-Valley Church Youth Group and the St. Joseph Youth Group. The building itself has been used as a meeting place for the Senior Citizen's Group, the Alumni Association, the kindergarten story hour, and the North Country Librarian's Association Workshop.

The Library Staff would like to express their appreciation to all our patrons for gifts of books, paperbacks, magazines, and art work. Also our thanks to the Library Trustees for their support. And a special thanks to my assistant, Mrs. Avalve Avery, for her special efforts to make our library a decorative and attractive place.

Submitted herewith is the report on examination of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the year ended December 31, 1977, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audit reports must be given to the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the permanent records.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, District Court and Trustees of Trust Funds.

Financial Statements

General Fund:

Comparative Balance Sheets — As of December 31, 1976 and 1977: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets disclosing the financial condition of the General Fund as of December 31, 1976 and 1977, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the current unappropriated fund balance of the Town decreased by \$9,951 from \$335,629, at December 31, 1976, to \$325,678 at December 31, 1977.

Analysis of Change in Unappropriated Fund Balances: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of change in unappropriated fund balance of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative statements of General Fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the year ended December 31, 1977 are presented in Exhibits A3 and A-4. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$28,309 less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,743, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$26,566.

Comparative Balance Sheets showing the outstanding long-term indebtedness of the Town, as of December 31, 1976 and 1977 are contained in Exhibit B. As indicated therein, the long-term debt decreased by \$235,000 from \$835,000, to \$600,000 during the year.

A statement, showing the activity in the revenue sharing fund account in 1977 is included in Exhibit C-2. As indicated therein, there is an unappropriated fund balance of \$49,614 as of December 31, 1977.

A statement of Debt Service Requirements showing annual maturities of principal and interest is presented in Exhibit J.

Schedule of General Fund Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A schedule of General Fund receipts and expenditures for the year ended December 31, 1977, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all Town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

Conclusion

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

Auditor's Opinion

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and group of accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the year ended December 31, 1977, listed in the foregoing table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The General Fund and Long-Term Debt Group of Accounts balance sheets of the Town of Lincoln as of December 31, 1976, which are presented for comparative purposes only, were previously examined by us and our report dated September 2, 1977, expressed an unqualified opinion on the statement. We have not performed any auditing procedures after the date of our report on the 1976 financial statement.

The Town of Lincoln had not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

As described in the accompanying footnotes, the Town's policy is to prepare its financial statements of the Special Revenue and Trust and Agency Funds on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, the statements do not give effect to accounts receivable, accounts payable, and accrued items. Accordingly, the statements do not present results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statements listed in the aforementioned table of contents, other than the financial statements of the Special Revenue Fund and Trust and Agency Fund, present fairly the financial position of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Lincoln at December 31, 1977, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended in con-

formity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

In our opinion, the accompanying statements of the Special Revenue Fund and Trust and Agency Funds listed in the aforementioned table of contents present fairly the assets and liabilities of such funds of the Town of Lincoln at December 31, 1977, arising from cash transactions, and its revenues collected and expenditures paid during the year then ended, on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The supplemental schedules included in this report, although not considered necessary for a fair presentation of the financial position and results of operations of such funds and group of accounts, are presented primarily for supplemental analysis purposes. This additional information has been subjected to the audit procedures applied in the aforementioned examination of the basic financial statements and is, in our opinion, fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

In connection with our examination of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Lincoln for the year ended December 31, 1977, we also (1) performed tests of compliance with the Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Acts and regulations as required by Sections II.C.3. and III.C.3. of the "Audit Guide and Standards for Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Fund Recipients" (Guide) issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing, U.S. Department of the Treasury, and (2) compared the data on Bureau of Census Form RS-8 with the audited records of the Town of Lincoln as required by Sections II.C.4. of the "Guide". Our findings are set forth below:

We noted no material difference between the data on Bureau of Census Form RS-8 and the records of the Town of Lincoln for the year ended December 31, 1977.

Publication in a newspaper of the required data was not made and there was no evidence of waivers issued.
