



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Annual Message to the Board of Aldermen
by Mayor William F. Sullivan

Nashua, N. H., January 1, 1931.

Gentlemen of the Board of Aldermen:

Another year has rolled by, an eventful one for Nashua. The unfavorable industrial and economic conditions of the world have been reflected in the progress of the city. New England, like the rest of the country, has been enmeshed in business depression and the consequent lack of work for many who are anxious but unable to find employment. In addition to its share in the nation-wide depression Nashua had its own particular problem in the very serious conflagration, one of the worst in the history of New Hampshire, which visited this city on May 4, 1930, destroying \$3,000,000.00 worth of property and affecting 400 families. However, our people have proven that their spirit cannot be daunted by fire or hard times.

With economic conditions as they are it would have been unwise on the part of the City Government to increase the burden on the present and future taxpayers for large capital expenditures. Your Honorable Board is to be commended that for the second consecutive year you have refrained from authorizing any bond issues except the one which has been provided to meet the exigencies of the conflagration. Common sense demanded timely reconstruction in the burned territory which justifies the authorization of a \$100,000 bond issue as of January 2nd, 1931. This fund will be used for permanent public improvements in the devastated area.

The result of your prudence is shown in a reduction of the net debt of \$1,919,464.58 on January 1, 1929 to \$1,584,393.85 on January 1, 1931, a decrease of \$335,070.73 in two years.

Two incidents in the city's history helped to create the large indebtedness of January 1, 1929, to wit:—the burning of the Main Street Bridge in December 1925, and the damage by flood of the Canal Street Bridge in November, 1927.

Notwithstanding our policy of avoiding bond issues, it has been necessary to meet the obligations and needs brought forward by the conflagration of May 4th, 1930, as rehabilitation of the destroyed area would in-

deed have been incomplete if the municipality had not done its part. It was clearly the duty of the City Government to grasp the opportunity and envision the future requirements of this neighborhood, so that those rebuilding would know that the section would be a better, safer, and more desirable place in which to live.

The City Government and Board of Public Works were in accord that Bowers Street between Harbor Avenue and Allds Street should be widened; that Spruce Street between East Hollis and Worcester Streets should be widened; that Spruce Street should be extended from Worcester Street to Temple Street; that the city should enter into an agreement with the Boston & Maine Railroad for the erection of a foot bridge across the Nashua River connecting Temple Street with Canal Street; and that proper approaches to the bridge should be built and fenced.

It was deemed advisable that the City acquire a strip of land at the corner of Bowers and Marshall Streets for municipal purposes, the same to be devoted, at this time, for park and playground uses; that the city round corners wherever feasible, construct or reconstruct a number of streets and lay the necessary sewers therein.

The unusual occurrence of a conflagration turned the trend of municipal activities and created many new problems for a short time. Happily this episode in our municipal life is behind us and although the disaster for the moment appeared overwhelming, the kindness of the public and the courage of the victims turned a calamity into an opportunity, so that eight months after the fire we find many happy people domiciled in new homes with modern and up-to-date facilities.

Previously little thought had been given to the basic cause of such a catastrophe. A long wooden bridge, or rather two bridges nestling in a ravine, were sunbaked, oilsoaked, and sheathed against the elements so that when a fire was once started, the whole structure became a fiery mass. Prior to May 4th for many weeks the weather was dry to the point of drouth. The dryness was unusual and humidity the lowest ever recorded in this region.

When the fire started, it was noticed by the observer of the New Hampshire Forestry Department on Jeremy Hill, about six miles away, who noted that the wind was blowing about forty-five miles per hour. Another reading, thirty minutes later, showed a velocity of fifty-four miles per hour. This velocity was even greater in the fire area and is chiefly responsible for the spread of the fire. Other factors were the wood shingle roofs on which dropped the flaming embers throughout the fan-shaped pathway of ruin in which were lumber yards, and stave yards with vast quantities of highly inflammable raw and manufactured materials. The rapidity with which the fire scattered, and the many fires burning at the same time in separated localities were far beyond the power of any one or more fire departments to cope with, and it became

clearly evident that before sundown, Nashua was to witness its greatest spectacle, and get its harshest experience with fire.

In quick response to the alarm the firemen upon arrival could see that they had, on account of the location, a fierce and ungovernable fire to fight. In a few minutes it was a roaring mass with flaming embers soaring into the sky to be dropped into a most highly combustible district of our city. The flames lapped at and surged against nearby structures, while red hot cinders were hurtled onto wood shingle roofs, into air-dried lumber yards, and stave yards, far ahead of where the fire originated.

In a short space of time instead of one or two fires, there were many fires burning. With a fire department sufficient for a city of our size and stretched out to its very limit, it would have been unreasonable to expect it to hold in check and extinguish a fire of such tremendous proportions. At and near its source they did hold and extinguish the fire, but the fire area was three miles long and a third of a mile wide. To cope with it, help was summoned and our neighbors of Hudson, Hollis, Lowell and Manchester responded without hesitation, and working with might and main, held the fire within bounds and prevented greater losses than seemed inevitable.

The Sunday afternoon radio announced the disaster at Nashua and there came a great wave of co-operation and help on the part of fire departments in New Hampshire and Massachusetts which was made possible by present-day motor apparatus and good roads. Over the auto-filled highways machines, manned by efficient crews, raced to our city. The fire was under control in a few hours and we must admit that the toll might have been much greater. We should be thankful. A change of wind,—a fire elsewhere,—a few bad breaks, and the city would have been subjected to still greater losses.

We are grateful to Gov. Charles W. Tobey, Gen. Charles Howard, and the militiamen of Nashua and Manchester, and many others who gave their services at a time when their presence and their control afforded a sense of security to the community.

Words cannot express our appreciation to the people of Nashua and beyond, for, while the fire burned and before the ruins cooled, they opened their homes and their hearts to the fire sufferers. Representatives of the welfare organizations and public spirited citizens responded to a call for assembly at city hall. Your Honorable Board met and held a special meeting, instructed your mayor to do everything necessary to help in this dire emergency, and pledged the resources of the city. The combined and co-ordinated efforts of all the agencies took care of all the fire victims so that no one suffered from hunger or lack of shelter.

The heart of New England was touched, and people near and far expressed their feelings by generous contributions. Nashua citizens, cor-

porations, business men and a generous public responded to an appeal to help four hundred families, who were the unfortunate victims of a calamity. Our disaster committee, with the assistance of the American Red Cross, raised over \$300,000 and in addition, there was poured into emergency headquarters, vast quantities of household goods, clothing and food, with an estimated worth of \$75,000. These great donations of necessities were distributed to those in greatest need. The allotment of funds and supplies was under an efficient committee of citizens, with many sub-committees ably assisting, working unceasingly day and night during the emergency period. Following this period came the greater and more complex problem of permanent rehabilitation. The disaster committee with Mr. Harry A. Gregg, Chairman, and Mr. Maurice Reddy representing the American Red Cross, worked out a system of awards on the basis of the well-established and experienced fourteen points of the Red Cross. This plan has been tried out for many years in a large number of disasters, proven efficient and effective, and now that time has passed, and the plan has had a working chance here, we are confident that the methods employed were the best which could be used, and the results have given general satisfaction to the disaster committee, the recipients and the contributors. The very nature of the endeavor, at best, was fraught with difficulty, so that much praise is due the untiring efforts of the disaster committee and to the American Red Cross for the able and conscientious manner in which emergency and reconstruction problems have been met and solved.

One has only to observe that, out of the welter and embarrassments of the fire, the burned district is emerging and will quickly develop into a better section of the city than it was before May 4th. The industries which were destroyed have risen phoenix-like from the ashes. The White Mountain Freezer Company is again operating in a new and model plant. Proctor Brothers Company are erecting, after a second visitation of fire, a substantial modern, brick factory.

The fire directly produced much unemployment and this condition has been ably handled by the disaster relief committee. This type of relief has been further complicated by the general unemployment situation and must be continued for months to come.

Unstinted praise should be given the sufferers for their fortitude and courage, and their splendid morale.

A detailed description of the fire, its basic causes and its extinguishment, the parts played by the fire departments of Nashua and elsewhere, the water supply facilities, the militia and other agencies assisting, are on file in the office of the Pennichuck Water Works. There are charts, graphs, recording gage cards, clippings, together with other data including reports on the conflagration by the National Protective Association, compiled by Mr. R. S. Moulton and another by the Factory Mutual Fire Insurance

companies showing where our fire department aid came from and the time of leaving their home stations and arrival at Nashua. These records were compiled for reference and are available for inspection by interested citizens.

What are some of the advantages derived from the fire?

A shingle roof ordinance has been passed which will prevent a recurrence of a similar disaster to this section. A zoning ordinance has been enacted which will regulate the location of business and industry and protect homes and property from encroachment. This ordinance will provide light, air and safety to dwelling houses and unquestionably help the city to develop in an orderly and progressive way, and stabilize the values of homes and businesses.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters has just completed a periodic survey of the city, dealing with the subject from the viewpoint of fire hazards. Its report, when issued, will cover fire department facilities, fire alarm, water supply and building regulations. At the present time Nashua has no building code. The time is ripe for such an ordinance devised to take care of a growing city of our type, unless it is the desire of our people to go along building in a haphazard way.

Let us look at the financial account of the Municipality.

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This statement shows a decrease of \$166,201.90 in the net debt. The reason is clear. We did not issue new bonds.

The assessed valuation of the city for 1929 was \$43,843,267 and for 1930 it was \$44,098,177 an increase of \$254,910. This increase is gratifying considering business conditions, particularly as valuations have shown a loss during the past few years. The present valuation was computed one month before the fire and although the change in the total valuation, due to the fire, is difficult to estimate, it is hoped that the difference, if any, will be small as many of the burned buildings have been replaced and all the industries affected will be operating before April 1, 1931.

Department heads have been urged to keep down expenditures and the request is just as earnest today as it was a year ago.

CITY HALL

Action on a new city hall to replace the present obsolete and unsafe structure has been postponed on account of the general depression.

The City Hall Committee has considered various plans of buildings,

to properly and efficiently house the various city offices which are now scattered and whose functions are to carry on the business of this municipal corporation. Ours is a forty-four million dollar corporation affecting the welfare of over 30,000 people. Through the various departments the public is served at a cost of one million and a quarter dollars annually. To perform this volume of public business requires many motions and many contacts. If you are to impress your city officials with the responsibility of their positions, and the public with their obligations, you must have adequate offices. These offices should not be sumptuous but practical and respectable. Again, a City Hall should symbolize the kind of city it represents. Good citizens build good homes, erect business structures to express their progress and contribute to the city's appearance. It should be so. Is it not fitting and necessary that the municipality should do its part, not only to increase efficiency in the conduct of the city's business, but to demonstrate its willingness to do its part and to announce to all, within and without its gates, that Nashua is not at a standstill, but is prosperous and progressive?

The City Hall Committee at a recent meeting wisely deferred action until some time in 1931, when it is hoped the forecast of the future will be brighter and will warrant further consideration of this proposition, but it would seem that a new City Hall is necessary and inevitable.

ZONING

A long deferred Zoning Ordinance was passed by your Honorable Board. This is one of the most progressive measures adopted for the city's welfare in a long time as it means a better-ordered, better planned Nashua in the years to come. To carry out the provisions of the ordinance the Mayor appointed and your Board confirmed a Board of Adjustment of five public-spirited citizens who have given unstinted time and thought to many problems of adjustments. By the very scope of the Ordinance it will take many months to get its workings fairly established and when well done it will demonstrate the wisdom of this up-to-date piece of legislation.

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

The Senior High School enrollment is now 1143 showing an increase of 105 over last year. The Junior High School has 753 pupils registered, an increase of 39 over last year. The elementary grades show 2636 pupils, or a decrease of 123. The total attendance this year is 4532, an increase over the previous year of 21.

The Board of Education has requested larger school facilities for the Senior and Junior High Schools. A joint committee from the Board of Education and the Board of Aldermen has met on several occasions

and discussed the problem from various viewpoints. Estimates have been obtained on various plans to relieve the overcrowded condition of the High Schools. Before coming to a definite decision, it has been deemed wise to engage the services of a nationally known specialist on education, Dr. Jesse B. Davis of Harvard and Boston Universities, who will prepare a report on the immediate and future needs of the public schools. Particular emphasis will be given in the report to the much discussed 6-3-3 method of elementary and high school education. When this important question is disposed of, then the matter of additional housing can be acted upon more intelligently.

I am informed that the expedient, if it can be called such, of two sessions in the Senior High School is giving satisfaction from an educational standpoint.

The Board of Education, which spends more money annually than any other department, has cooperated with the appropriating powers to such an extent that it will have a balance at the end of the fiscal year. This saving was accomplished by the centralization of buying through the superintendent's office. I am informed that the Board of Education has other plans of reorganization which if put into operation will affect material economies and increase efficiency.

The "Boys' Band" has become a genuine musical organization and has proven a real addition to student activities.

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

This year the street railway track was removed on Concord Street from the Soldier's Monument to Greeley Park. Where the track was, crushed stone was placed and rolled and then surfaced with asphalt. To take care of surface drainage, seventeen new catch basins were built and ten new manholes added for ventilation and cleaning purposes. The total asphalt yardage was 12,994 sq. yards.

The car track on Main Street from Lake Street to the Country Club entrance was also removed and filled and asphalted in the same manner as Concord Street. From Stevens Street to the Country Club is a Trunkline and the State will contribute one-half the expense of this portion of the work. This work required the laying of 1996 ft. of 12 in drain pipe with thirty new catch basins and ten new manholes. The total yardage of asphalt was 14,191 sq. yards. This marks the first real step in the abandonment of rails used for transportation through our public streets.

The substitution of busses on a regular schedule is far from being a financial success for the Nashua Street Railway. It is highly problematical what is to be the outcome of the present system of carrying passengers. If the street railroad should abandon more rails, or cease

operating, the public would be confronted with a serious question and the Board of Public Works would face a large expenditure in replacing street surfaces.

Concord Street and South Main Street now afford a better highway for automobile and bus service, but there is a menace in the fact that careless and irresponsible drivers are using the improved streets for speedways.

Permanent improvements have been made on Ayer, Shattuck, Dow Streets, and Thayer's Court. Sixth and Seventh Streets and Dunstable Road have been graded and are ready for a surface application next spring. Many other streets have had major and minor improvements.

Following the fire of May 4th, the department assisted in many ways in cleaning up the debris, repairing and replacing damaged public ways and structures.

SEWERS

During the year there were laid 3925 lineal feet of sewer and drain pipe ranging in diameter from 8 to 24 inches.

SIDEWALKS

There were 3.05 miles of sidewalks, five feet wide constructed this year.

FINANCIAL

The financial statement shows that with the bills receivable for sidewalks, the Department will come through the year without an overdraft.

UNEMPLOYMENT

The unemployment situation is forcibly presented to this department. To provide work for men, a start has been made on the widening and extending of streets in the fire area. This work will be continued whenever reasonable during the winter.

SEWERAGE SYSTEM

This year a beginning has been made in getting a comprehensive survey of Nashua's sewerage system. Large areas have no drainage facilities, others have a drainage system of inadequate capacities. Such a condition exists in a drainage area which is bounded on the north by Laton Street, on the east by the Nashua and Merrimack Rivers, on the south by the Nashua River and on the west by Norton and Lemon Streets. A study for the relief of this section, by Mr. Fred L. Clark, the City Engineer and George P. Winn, consulting Engineer of Jamaica, N. Y. and formerly City Engineer at Nashua, is embodied in a report on

file in the office of the Board of Public Works, entitled, "The construction of a Storm Water Sewer on Lock Street." It is improbable that the whole of this work will be attempted this year, but it is hoped our finances will enable a start to be made.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

A year ago in speaking of the Fire Department, I said: "Conflagration hazards are ever present and there must be no letting down in the maintenance of the necessary equipment or in preserving the morale of the membership of the Department." Since then, Nashua's Department has received its severest test. Unexpectedly and with the suddenness of a gust of wind, it was confronted with a fire of conflagration proportions, which it met efficiently, and everything humanly possible was done to prevent the spread of the fire, but great loss was unavoidable. We are grateful that the fire was mastered within the limits of the burned over area.

POLICE

The Police Department has maintained law and order and no untoward criminal occurrences have stirred our people or caused unenviable publicity.

NASHUA PUBLIC LIBRARY

The report of the Nashua Public Library would indicate that its usefulness has increased during the year.

The American Library Association has set a standard of one dollar per capita support for libraries and minimum circulation of 5 books per capita which a city should record if its library is supported adequately. The Library Trustees of Nashua must be doing a fairly good job when they operate on a cost of about fifty cents per capita, with a circulation of approximately 4.6 books per capita.

The circulation of foreign books has shown a substantial gain and the magazine circulation has increased amazingly.

BOARD OF HEALTH

The Board of Health appointed a meat inspector to meet the requirements of the ordinance. This removes the work from the province of the Health and Milk inspector.

There has been a demand for more intensive farm inspections, and rules installing a scoring system for dairies and farms have been put into effect.

This Department has cooperated with the School Department, immunizing 1522 children, that number having had three treatments of

Toxin-Antitoxin as a preventative for diphtheria and 300 more pupils have received one or two injections of the serum. This work has been done at less cost than estimated.

A new truck was purchased for garbage collection and the department will keep within its appropriation.

PLUMBING INSPECTION

The Board for the Examination of Plumbers, consisting of Samuel J. Bingham, Chairman, Dr. P. J. McLaughlin, Chairman of the Board of Health, and Fred L. Clark, City Engineer, Secretary and Inspector, have held regular monthly meetings this year. Written and practical examinations have been held periodically to test the qualifications of applicants. The requisite ranks were attained by 52 Master or Employing Plumbers and 68 Journeymen Plumbers and licenses were granted this number.

A total of 421 inspections were made since April 1, 1930.

The plumbing and drainage regulations adopted May 4, 1929 have given satisfaction, although the Plumbing Board have minor changes and additions to recommend and will ask the Board to amend the Ordinance. The Plumbing Ordinance has been a distinct step in promoting the health of our people and safeguarding property owners from insufficient materials and poor workmanship.

CEMETERIES

All City Cemeteries have had the careful attention of reliable and interested trustees, who have zealously guarded and improved these final resting places.

PARK COMMISSION

The work of the Park Department is being enlarged due to the upkeep of increased areas of improved park sections. The Greeley Park road has been resurfaced and a new cinder road built.

The North Common athletic field is now under the sole management of this department. A new stand of portable bleachers has been added to the equipment.

The work of filling the north section of Artillery Pond was continued during the year and twenty five hundred yards of loam removed from the pit and spread over a specially prepared space.

Several irregular shaped areas at street intersections have been placed under the control of the department and a start has been made toward improving them.

The gypsy and brown tail moth nests on city trees are removed annually.

There are sufficient funds left in this department to seed down and smooth the North Common section this coming spring.

RECREATION COMMISSION

The work of the Recreation Commission has been commendable. The use of the playgrounds and swimming pool has shown a decided increase with a keener interest displayed by those in attendance. The annual Lantern Parade was a fitting climax to the summer program. Skating is most popular and enjoyed by many, and furnishes a safe winter sport.

The tennis courts were in constant demand during the late spring, summer and early fall. This year the Commission completed courts in Crown Hill on the Arlington Street schoolgrounds.

The skating area at the South Common has been enlarged and levelled. In doing this the skating surface has been increased twenty-five per cent, and the Commission is enabled to more quickly flood and freeze the rink.

OVERSEER OF THE POOR

The unemployment conditions have thrown a heavy burden on this department as applications for aid have been many and varied. Each case is investigated and if found worthy, assistance is rendered. This year the appropriations will be exceeded by a substantial amount.

TAXICAB ORDINANCE

The increasing use of the city streets by taxicabs and others carrying passengers for hire presents a problem which must be met and effectively solved. For many years passenger carriage was provided by a duly chartered and organized company under Public Service Commission regulations. The automobile has become a competitor with the result that the Nashua Street Railway is unable to meet its operating charges. How long the company can continue depends on its willingness to continue operating at a loss. Whether electric street railway carriage combined with bus transportation running on established routes and on schedule time will be the acceptable method of caring for the daily need of our industrial workers and non-users of automobiles, or private taxi service will be determined within a short time. If the street railway ceases to operate then many kinds and types of service will venture into this field. Nashua has no control or regulations of the use of the city streets by taxi or motor vehicle carriers, other than the state regulation of buses. With present traffic conditions and the uncertainty of future methods of transportation, a taxicab-jitney ordinance should be enacted at an early date to insure the safety of the riding public. Such an or-

dinance will not only safeguard patrons and citizens but will protect owners and operators of transportation systems.

CENSUS

The last Census Bureau report was most gratifying for it showed that Nashua, for the past decade, increased in population about 11 per cent, so that now we are a city of over 32,000. This increase was made in a period when many other New England cities showed a decrease.

CONCLUSION

The past year has been a strenuous one for the people of Nashua. The slacking of business with the resultant unemployment, and the fire combined with the world-wide depression were sufficient to test the courage of our people. The citizens of Nashua have not faltered, but have continued to advance. Industry has made a splendid effort to operate as fully as possible and our citizens out of work have faced a trying situation with patience. The city debt has been decreased. The fire sufferers had confidence in generous and public spirited citizens and this faith was rewarded by the unselfish and excellent work of the Disaster Committees.

In spite of the hard times our people rallied and contributed large sums of money for the fire sufferers and to welfare organizations and instituted and supported for the first time a "Community Chest" which will prove to be an efficient method of handling welfare work.

We ring out the old with a feeling that while the year has been an eventful one there are many things for which we should be thankful. Nashua is young, strong, and optimistic, financially sound, and will continue to grow and be, as it always has been, a good city in which to live and do business.

THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

Walter E. Grant

is Chairman *ex-officio* of all Standing Committees of the Board.

Section 50 of the City Charter provides that the Mayor and Aldermen-at-large constitute the Finance Committee and Committee on Claims. The Standing Committees are named by the President of the Board of Aldermen subject to confirmation by the Board.

A study has been made for the past two years of accidents in the city reported to this department where motor vehicles were involved which resulted in personal injury, no note being made of accidents where there was property damage only. For this purpose a map of the city was used and each accident was charted showing the exact location of each accident. In this manner it can be ascertained where the most accidents occur and then a survey can be made to find the cause, if possible.

During the year 1929 there were 131 automobile accidents where personal injury was involved, three of these resulting in death.

During the year 1930 there were 151 automobile accidents where personal injury was involved, three of these resulted in death.

Contrary to general opinion accidents do not occur in large numbers where the roads are wide and in good condition even if the autoist indulges in excess speed, but in congested areas where the public disregard certain rules laid down for public safety because of the congestion.

The balance of the accidents were scattered over other parts of the city.

A noticeable increase in accidents is noted in the section of Main Street between the City Hall and the Main Street Bridge as during the year 1929 there were four accidents while during the year 1930 there were twelve accidents. The number of accidents on Main Street from Hollis Street to Main Street Bridge was 27, an increase of 350% in 1930 over the year 1929.

I believe that the increase of accidents is due to improper parking ordinances and to the lack of proper parking ordinances. Main Street is used as an open air garage and in order for persons attempting to transact business on Main Street it becomes necessary for them to double park to the detriment of safety or drive to the outlying districts to park.

Through streets were established in the city during the year and "stop" signs were erected on streets entering the through streets where auto drivers are required to stop before entering. This department has been very lenient with violators during the period of getting used to the "stop" signs, but it is evident that more drastic measures should be adopted to insure the obedience of this important ordinance.

Report of the Examination of Plumbers

Nashua, N. H., January 29, 1931.

To His Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:—

The Board for the Examination of Plumbers respectfully submits its report for the year 1930.

The Board was organized with Samuel J. Bingham as Chairman, P. J. McLaughlin, M. D., Chairman of the Board of Health and Fred L. Clark, City Engineer, Secretary and Plumbing Inspector.

Following the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 153 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire, creating a Board for the Examination of Plumbers, said Board prepared Plumbing and Drainage Regulations and rules pertaining to the licensing of plumbers, which were approved by your Honorable Board, and these regulations were put into effect April 1, 1930.

Regular monthly meetings have been held the first Monday of every month and examinations of applicants for Plumbing Licenses, consisting of a written and practical test, have been conducted each month.

Since April 1, 1930, fifty-two (52) Master or Employing Plumbers and sixty-eight (68) Journeymen Plumbers have been licensed.

A total of four hundred and twenty-five, (425) plumbing inspections have been made and the plumbers, as a whole, have shown a willingness and desire to co-operate with us, which we greatly appreciate.

Our Plumbing and Drainage Regulations as adopted May 14, 1929, have worked out very well, but after nine months of operation we find that certain changes should be made, and these we will submit to you for your consideration, in the form of an ordinance amending the present ordinance, with our recommendation that same be adopted.

We have cared for more patients than in any previous year, and from what I have been able to learn as the result of questioning patients, those of others as well as my own, from members of the staff, and from observation, there exists a feeling that those who come here for care and treatment during illness receive the best that can be rendered by an institution of this character. Many voluntary words of commendation have been paid to the hospital and those who directly look after the welfare of the patients. This is a condition of affairs that should and does please us all, and it is the duty of those having the executive responsibility, as well as those who work under them to see that this conduct of affairs is continued.

Every year finds new problems to be met and this past one has been no exception. It has been found necessary to do a great deal of work pertaining to the upkeep of our plant, some of which I will detail. We have painted all the rooms in the original building, corridors of the same, basement, morgue, laundry and many side rooms used for storage and various purposes. It was necessary to install a new metabolism machine. Many other minor articles have been bought which are necessary for the operative upkeep of the hospital.

Shower baths in the nurses' home had to be partially rebuilt, due to faulty plans in installing the same. Necessarily, there has been considerable work in the way of repairs, requiring the services of carpenter and plumber.

The cost of the refrigerating plant was financed with borrowed money, but its cost has been spread over a period of 10 years, and have charged up to this year's expenses its proportionate sum. The same has been done with the portable X-ray, extending over a period of five years, and the painting over a period of three years.

All the rest of these additions and purchases have been paid from this year's hospital earnings. In addition to that, a note of \$2,000., the last of the campaign expenses, has been paid from the earnings of the hospital plus the amount given us each year by the city. There have been some other expenses contracted one or two years ago, which have also been paid out of our earnings.

A new driveway for the use of ambulance and other vehicles, delivering goods, has been built, entering the rear of the hospital from the west. This work was done by the City at a nominal cost. There have been but few changes in the personnel of those operating the institution, the principal one being the election of Mrs. Agnes Whidden, as instructor of nurses and assistant Superintendent of the hospital.

On behalf of the Executive Committee, I wish to thank the Superintendent, assistant Superintendent, supervisors, nurses, technician, dietitian, bookkeeper, office clerk, record clerk and all employees of the hospital for their willingness at all times to render service. I also think that the Treasurer, Mr. Charles Johnson, the Clerk, Mr. Clarence Whitney, and the auditors, Mr. Herbert Kendall and Mr. Clarence Wright merit a vote of thanks for the work they have done. The treasurer's work is continuous throughout the year, and I assure you it entails many hours of labor, which are always cheerfully given.

Report of City Solicitor

To the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of Nashua, New Hampshire.
Gentlemen:

I submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1930.

The year 1930 was a very busy one for the City Solicitor.

Of the numerous ordinances and resolutions that were drawn, one most outstanding, necessitating innumerable conferences and public meetings, there having been six public evening meetings, was the Zoning Ordinance. After eighteen months in the making, and after many amendments, the Zoning Ordinance was finally adopted. This gave birth to many new difficulties involving the City. An Adjustment Board had to be appointed and instructed as to its duties and powers. After the passage of this ordinance and establishment of the board, many difficulties arose in the public mind and several disputes had to be settled; the most serious of these was the Emile E. Marquis suit brought by the city. Also, the miniature golf course problem made its appearance upon passage of this law. Much time was spent in interviewing premises in violation of the Zoning Ordinance. Most of these questions have been dealt with and settled amicably.

Another important matter was the trial in Federal Court of the J. R. Worcester & Company suit against the City for alleged unpaid services accruing from the construction of the Main Street Bridge. Action was based on engineering services given by J. R. Worcester & Company of Boston in the construction of the new Main Street Bridge of 1926. The claims of \$4,700 were not allowed. A direct verdict for the City was given. The plaintiff has taken the action to the U. S. Court of Appeals and the case is now pending there.

The Traffic Laws had to undergo a complete revision, and after making many changes, the recodification of the Traffic Laws was passed.

The much discussed removal of the tracks on Main Street from Lake Street to the Nashua Country Club and on Concord Street, substituting therefor bus service, was definitely acted upon and settled; and the trolley cars in that section have been replaced by the bus.

The election of Mr. Gravelle to the Board of Public Works, a vacancy in that department having been caused by the resignation of James D. DeRocher, came after a lengthy discussion as to the legality of the move, at the same meeting in which the resignation was accepted. The City Charter, it was shown, contained nothing which prevented the holding of a joint convention at that same meeting. The vote to defer election which was taken at the early part of the meeting was finally rescinded and the joint convention called to order.

The petition for the widening of Bowers Street, the conflagration of May 4 having made it very opportune at this time, was granted after much discussion at a hearing held for abutters, and many deeds and abstracts have been drawn and executed toward that purpose.

The petition for the widening and extending of Spruce Street was also granted and assistance has been given in the preparing and executing of deeds and abstracts in order to accomplish this.

Much work was done in preparation for the trials of Cunningham & Burdwood Construction Company vs. The City and Wason vs. The City. These cases will be tried within the next few months.

Suits of minor importance were disposed of without recourse to the Court; the usual letters were written in connection with delinquent tax payers, etc.; bankruptcy proofs of claim were made out; contracts and other legal documents were drawn; cases were investigated; and advice and opinions, both written and oral, were rendered to the City Departments and City Officials on innumerable problems.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Board of Education,
Nashua, New Hampshire.

This is the sixty-fourth in the series of annual reports by superintendents.

For the fall term the school census returns show enrollment in the day schools as follows:

The number for this school year is 35 less than it was a year before in the corresponding month. For the first time in recent years one school room is vacant in the Palm Street building and one is not needed for public school pupils in the Arlington Street School. The business depression and the Crown Hill fire might have diminished the enrollment much more seriously. The public schools were fortunate not to lose any buildings in the fire of May fourth that burned the houses of 400 families.

The pupils of the Holy Infant Jesus Parochial School have been using one room at the Arlington Street School, one at the Belvidere, and also the Community Hall on Crown Hill, together with the Crown Hill Kindergarten rooms forenoons. New school quarters for them are nearing completion.

The kindergarten maintained for fourteen years on High Street has been closed because of reduced attendance. The ten other kindergartens of the city, beginning in September, 1930, were arranged in pairs, alternating morning and afternoon sessions each semester. The salaries of the kindergarten principals were made equal to those of the primary teacher.

Up to the present time the attendance in the afternoon has been as large as that in the forenoon. The kindergarten enrollment for September, 1930, varied by only two children from what it was the year before in the same month and in exactly the same kindergartens.

James Hiram Fassett who served the City of Nashua a few months more than twenty-six years as Superintendent of the public schools was fatally injured November ninth, 1930, in an automobile accident at Orlando, Florida. He died a few hours later. His mother lost her life in the same accident. Mr. Fassett was a man of varied talents including athletic power, inventive genius, musical gifts, and scholastic and literary ability. He was widely known, not only in this country, but in foreign lands, through his Beacon series of phonetic reading books for children which obtained a very extensive use. He also wrote a Child's History of Nashua and Colonial Life in New Hampshire. During the last ten years of his life he was developing an orange grove in Florida.

FINANCES

The Board of Education, in January, 1930, was granted an appropriation of \$375,000.00 plus income. The income for 1930 was estimated at \$14,000. This granted appropriation represented somewhat of a decrease in comparison to the original, requested appropriation of \$397,000.00. However, the Board of Education realized that there was a sincere effort on the part of the Aldermen to reduce current expenses.

As a result of this realization it took immediate steps to plan carefully its year's expenditures in order to keep within the granted appropriation. It is pleasing to note that even in the face of additional, unforeseen, expenditures the books have been closed with all bills paid and a balance to our credit. This saving has been effected in a number of ways, but particularly in the centralization of the purchasing power in the Office of the Superintendent.

Anticipating our needs for the year ensuing it is also especially gratifying to note that the maintenance of our schools will not require as much money as in the year 1930. This is due to the reorganization of the Kindergartens, the consolidation of certain rooms, the passing of the peak in our automatic salary increases, as well as to conservative buying. Statistics, released by the State Department of Education, show that the median cost per pupil in all the high schools of the State was \$134.65. The cost in Nashua was \$122.23. The median cost per pupil in all the elementary schools of the State was \$84.00. The cost in Nashua was \$81.14. These indices show conclusively that school money is being used in an economical way.

During the year a number of studies have been conducted in comparison of school costs with other cities. The studies have proved profitable and in most instances have been in our favor. Considering that teachers' salaries constitute approximately 85% of our budget there is not an opportunity for any great reduction. The remaining items are to a great extent fixed and standardized. However, I do think that a material reduction can be made in our fuel costs. In comparison with other neighboring cities this item is too high. This is particularly true of the high school. The difference cannot be attributable to the price as we are buying as cheaply as elsewhere. I am quite firmly convinced that the additional cost is due to the inefficiency of the heating plants and the firing methods. At present all bins are being measured and a trained engineer is expected to inspect the high school plant. It is interesting to observe that in the neighboring city of Manchester unbelievable savings have been made in this respect.

HIGH SCHOOL

I quote from Mr. Nesmith's report:—

"The present year finds the senior high school operating under an all-day system. Students arrive at school at 8:00, 8:53, 10:42, 11:26 and 12:27. They leave at 12:15, 1:00, 3:40, and 4:27. Probably one of the greatest evils of this system is the fact that most of the students are in school only five periods instead of the usual six. This extra outside period in many cases is not used for study purposes. Many students are reciting all day with no period for study.

The group which attends the morning session comfortably fills the building and illustrates a school functioning in a building adapted to the number of pupils occupying it. More than 400 freshmen attend school in the afternoon and remain only long enough for their classes, therefore a freshman music period and an assembly period are necessarily omitted.

Forty-five of the one hundred sixty-four who were graduated last June continued their education,—thirty going to college and fifteen to normal schools.

The students sent to Dartmouth College did as well as students from any of the large schools in the state; those who went to the normal school at Keene received ranks which placed this school as low as any city school; those who went to the University of New Hampshire ranked in the third quarter compared with the other city schools.

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

Enrollment

The total enrollment of the school to date is 770, 365 in grade eight, 405 in grade seven. The school is organized with twenty divisions for classroom work. The average enrollment of the divisions is 38, although there are eight divisions having 40 pupils. The classrooms which have a seating capacity of 35 take care of the overflow by using arm chairs which have been loaned to us by the Senior High School. Every available room is used for classes as far as the schedule will permit. Further increase in our enrollment another year can probably be met by (1) doing away with the library and using that room as a small classroom; (2) using the assembly hall for classes more than we do at present; (3) using the lecture room as a regular classroom. Thirty-five pupils per division is considered a fair maximum load for a teacher. The fact that more pupils in a division can be successfully taught in a single group is granted. However, if classes are to be larger than 35, the classrooms should be equipped to handle that number. It is useless to expect a teacher to do much individual or group work in a room that is so crowded that it is impossible for her to move about the room with any great degree of freedom.

Recommendations

1. Departmental organization of the work in Art and Music with teachers hired who are trained to teach these subjects. At present we have five teachers teaching music (including the director of music) and two teachers (working under the supervisor of drawing) taking care of the art work. There is enough work in a school of this size to warrant a trained teacher devoting her entire time to music, and one to devote her entire time to the teaching of art and related subjects.

2. No teacher to be elected to the junior high staff without specific training for this field of work and with specific training for the subject to be taught.

3. More men teachers for the staff. A junior high school with an enrollment of over 750 pupils without a single man teacher on the permanent staff (exclusive of manual training) certainly lacks balance and is working under a serious handicap.

4. Definite provision for a so-called Opportunity room and teacher to do special re-enforcement work with pupils who need extra help in order to avert failure. Many pupils enter the school with a severe language handicap. We need a classroom and a teacher who will work particularly in language and mathematics with a small group of pupils who once grounded in these fundamentals will make satisfactory progress through the remaining grades of the public school system.

EVENING SCHOOL

The Evening School is organized in two units (1) Americanization and Citizenship classes, (2) Commercial subjects. All classes are held in the building of the Senior High School, third floor only being used.

MANUAL ARTS

A special committee has been conducting a survey of the manual arts work in our city. The opinion of former students and the heads of industrial firms has been sought, comparisons in maintenance costs with other cities have been made. While the committee is not yet ready to draw any definite conclusions, still it is inclined to believe that on the basis of this study a certain reorganization of this department will be recommended.

HOME ECONOMICS

I quote the following taken from the report of the Director of Home Economics:

"When the Nashua fire rendered hundreds of people in need of clothing, the Home Economics Department realized at once that here was an opportunity to turn its ability to practical purpose. The Foods classes demonstrated their skill by making bread, rolls, cookies, cakes, and salad dressing which they sold at a food sale on the tenth of May, clearing one hundred dollars. This money was used to pay for materials which were converted into dresses and underwear by the Clothing classes. The Home Economics classrooms resembled a busy workshop running overtime and the girls showed a wonderful spirit of co-operation. Their willingness and ability to put their knowledge to immediate use was quite remarkable, as in three weeks they had constructed, fitted, mended or renovated over five hundred garments. This work was all done in conjunction with the Red Cross."

MUSIC

Music in the grades has progressed along the usual lines. The books used are the New Education Series supplemented by the One Hundred and One Song book and the Golden Book of Favorite Songs.

The Junior High Orchestra showed growth in musical ability and numbers. Beside a large string section, woodwind and brass instrument players have been developed and added to the orchestra. This shows the great interest of the pupils in instrumental music. At the second annual New Hampshire School Music Festival at Concord, the Junior High was represented by vocal and instrumental groups.

From January to June, the first year and upper classes in Senior High School studied such four part vocal music as was compatible with their experience and ability.

Nashua will be the scene of a great musical festival next April. The third annual school festival and contest will be held here. Bands and orchestras from all over the state will gather here, as will choruses of boys' and girls' glee clubs.

On the evening of April 24 the All High School State Orchestra will give a symphonic concert. The orchestra will number over one hundred and fifty players. On Saturday, April 25, the contests will be held after which the bands will parade and play a concert of massed bands.

HEALTH

The work has continued as in previous years with medical inspection of all pupils, physical examination of the first, fourth and eighth grades, also any pupil in any other grade that may appear to need it. All pupils have been weighed and measured from the first to the seventh grade.

Records have been kept of all defects found and notices sent to the parents when advised. Home visits have been made to explain the need of having these defects corrected and to help the parents (when they wished or needed help) to get them corrected.

An inspection of all class rooms has been made at least once each month for parasitic and contagious diseases. The decrease in the number of parasitic diseases has been very noticeable in the last few years.

At the beginning of the school year 147 children were vaccinated in the school building. Three toxin-anti-toxin clinics were held, three hundred children completing the three treatments.

There have been twenty-one eye clinics held this year, 913 pupils were examined; 328 were found to have defective vision, 273 notices were sent to parents and 55 either could not be helped or were having treatment.

From February 4th to April 4th, each morning was given to the Senior High School with the Red Cross classes in Home Hygiene and care of the sick. There were 76 girls enrolled in these classes, 69 of them received certificates from the National Headquarters of the American Red Cross, Washington, D. C.

The clinics for under-nourished children have continued with Dr. Robert E. Kerr, Executive Secretary of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association, examining. The work this year was conducted on a different plan from that used in previous years. The tuberculin skin test was given to the entire group. Of the 525 children receiving the skin test 153 were found to have a positive reaction. All of these with positive reaction will remain under the supervision of Dr. Kerr.

The Dental Clinic was in operation twice weekly during the school year. Three hundred and twenty-eight children received dental care. One thousand and nine cavities were filled. Doctor E. T. White and Dr. Daniel Hagerty have been very kind in caring for emergency cases in their private offices on other than clinic days. Mount Pleasant School was not covered owing to the lack of time. The suburban and other lower grades schools were completed.

DRAWING

I quote from the report of the Director of Drawing as follows:

"On account of the crowded conditions in the junior and senior high schools there will undoubtedly be changes in their organization within the next few years, therefore this seems a suitable time to suggest ways of improving and expanding the drawing department.

"At present, art courses are offered as an elective in the Senior High School, to pupils in the sophomore and junior classes. It is an injustice to talented pupils not to be able to take this work throughout the four

years course. I recommend that the opportunity to do so be given as soon as possible.

"The junior high school with over six hundred pupils should have a trained drawing teacher who devotes her whole time to the work in that building.

"Drawing should be an elective for pupils over twelve years of age, and those who are interested in the work should have an opportunity to study it each year. At present they can study drawing only half of each year. The junior high school teacher should, in addition to her regular classes, have charge of the drawing in the extra curricula activities, such as making the cover design and illustrations for the school paper, posters for advertising purposes and scenery for the school plays. She should be able to give talks to groups of pupils on famous pictures and other works of art."



Report of Board of Health

To his Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:

The Board of Health herewith transmits the report of the Health Department for the year 1930.

Activities of the department have been conducted much as in past years but with changes and improvements necessary to keep the work on a high plane and in accordance with present day procedure.

Early in February, Mr. Alden Wright was appointed Meat Inspector, to carry out the provisions of the Meat Ordinance thereby putting this department under a separate head, receiving more constant supervision and giving more satisfactory results. His compensation being entirely from fees.

More satisfactory results could be obtained in this department by having a Municipal Slaughter House with a full time Meat Inspector on salary.

During the year a very intensive drive was made to immunize the children of the City against diphtheria; 1637 children being completely immunized and about three hundred partially immunized. These children are to be Schick Tested the coming year.

In the early part of the year diphtheria appeared with a total of 25 cases being reported. The chief source of infection being a carrier in one of the local schools. This carrier was isolated and the infection abated.

In some of the parochial schools of the City our nurse, Miss Wilcox, conducted inspections for communicable diseases and gave assistance and advice in eliminating skin infections.

The Board in conjunction with the Milk Inspector made a survey of the Milk situation of the city and have formulated a working basis for more intensive work in this department.

During the year a new truck was purchased for the collection of garbage and a Ford coupe for the use of the Milk Inspector. These being paid for out of our regular appropriation.

The tuberculosis program in the city is becoming increasingly understood and appreciated by the public at large. In the program the City Board of Health and the N. H. Tuberculosis Association participate. By-monthly clinics being held.

There has been decided laxity on the part of the individual collectors of garbage and the Health Inspector has been instructed by us to clean up this condition.

Under separate head we present the reports for the year of the Nurse, Health, Meat and Milk Inspectors.

We wish to thank the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen, the heads of our different Departments and the Medical Inspectors of the Public Schools for their co-operation.

During the year I gave special attention to the sterilization of dishes in restaurants and sterilizing of cups at soda fountains and tonic establishments.

I also inspected markets with Mr. Wright the Meat Inspector to see that meat is properly stamped. Went on several complaints with Mr. Fred Clark the Plumbing Inspector. The usual Spring Clean-Up

took place the first week in April and found conditions much improved. Spent much of my time in the fire district in May with Mr. Albert E. Smith, Milk Inspector, to see that the dead animals were properly disposed of.

I spent a good part of my time inspecting ice chests in food stores and markets. There are a few bad places in the City I constantly inspect to keep them clean and sanitary.

I have been aided in many ways by the faithful co-operation of our State Food Inspector, Mr. Joseph X. Duval, and the Milk Inspector, Mr. Albert E. Smith, in my investigations, together with your co-operation at all times.

There has been an increase in the butter fat content of the milk sold in the city. The State Standard for butter fat is 3.35% while all the dealers today have not less than 3.70% for their standard and several dealers insist that their milk tests better than 4%.

The farmers milk as delivered to the milk plants was checked more this year and it was necessary to reject some as it had not been handled properly. This caused a loss to the farmers but most of them seemed willing to co-operate to get a good milk supply. Some however, seemed unable to meet the requirements and were shut out of the market.

I have received, as a rule, very fine co-operation from the dealers in quality work among their farmers. Each dealer seems to realize as never before the need of receiving milk of high quality from the farms to enable him to have quality when he delivers it on the street.

The farmers on the other hand have showed as much interest as the dealers and requested your Board for uniform inspection and have had a set of minimum requirements drawn up which each farmer must fulfill if he wants to ship milk to this city. I am sure this was a step which will give us a better supply and now each farmer will know what we require for equipment and methods.

SOUTH MAIN AND CONCORD STREETS TRACK REPAIRS

This year the Street Railway tracks were removed on Concord Street, from Soldiers Monument, to Greeley Park. Crushed stone was placed on the track bed, rolled, and surfaced with asphalt.

Seventeen new catch basins were built, also ten new manholes. Total yardage of asphalt was 12,994 sq. yds.

The tracks on South Main Street, from Lake Street to the Country Club entrance, were also removed, filled, and asphalted in the same manner as Concord Street.

From Stevens Street to the Country Club entrance, is a State Trunk line, and the State of New Hampshire will pay one-half of the expense of this work. This work required the laying of 1996 feet of 12 inch drain pipe, 30 new catch basins, and ten new manholes. Total yardage of asphalt was 14,191 sq. yds.

Total cost for this work was \$24,143.58, the State of New Hampshire paying us \$8,204.18 as their share.

Superintendent of Parks' Report

To the Board of Park Commissioners,

Gentlemen:—

I herewith submit this brief summary of the work performed during the year 1930. In the winter months the browntail and gipsy moths were removed from all city trees on the streets and in the parks and commons. Notices were distributed to owners of premises having trees and shrubs, requesting the removal of moth nests thereon. Later these premises were inspected, and in case the moth nests had not been removed the work was done by this department, and the cost charged to the owners. Most property owners co-operate and either have this work done or request that we do it, but a few object to this and some refuse to pay. This work is compulsory, being required by the State Department of Insect Suppression. Obviously this work does not pay for itself and I feel that a special appropriation should be made for this work, as it now diverts funds from our regular appropriation which are needed for the maintenance and improvement of our parks.

Also during the winter months the pine grove on the Manchester St. end of Greeley park was cleaned up. Poor and undesirable trees were removed and the others pruned of dead wood and shaped up to permit the better development of the remaining trees. All of the young pines through the oak grove on Greeley park were pruned so that they will shape up and develop to better advantage. Several thousand trees were thus treated.

The north drive in Greeley park was surfaced with ashes which were donated by various manufacturing concerns. About 500 loads were drawn and spread, putting into good condition a stretch 20 feet wide and about 2000 feet long.

On stormy days unsuitable for outdoor work the men were employed inside. The canvas used for fencing the North Common ball grounds was badly torn during the previous summer. This was patched and reconditioned, so that only a small amount of new canvas had to be purchased. With the use of a sewing machine purchased the previous year, this work was all done by park help. Also all the settees, swings and equipment were overhauled, repaired and painted.

On the crest of rising ground north of the lawn near the Cotton rest house a planting of shrubs and perennials was made which gave a very pleasing effect and received much favorable comment. About 2000 plants were used, most of these being taken from our own nursery and the others donated, so that the only cost was for labor. Other flower beds on Greeley park were filled as usual and kept in good condition, as were the walks and drives. Plants for several of these beds were donated by Mrs. R. D. Fletcher, the Buxton Greenhouses and Otis F. Searles.

A larger set of swings and a slide were installed in the grove south of the main drive, thus releasing the existing swings and slide for the use of smaller children.

About 200 feet of stone retaining wall was constructed beside one of the walks, replacing a broken down banking which could never be kept in neat condition.

Five hundred feet of cinder walk was constructed, extending an uncompleted walk from a point near the rest house to the north drive near the edge of the grove.

Several hundred young trees in the nursery were transplanted, some of the larger ones being set in permanent locations about the park.

Some of the large old trees on the park were given surgical treatment, cavities in them being cleaned, disinfected and filled with cement, thus prolonging the life of the trees.

On the east side of Concord Street stakes were set for drives which will extend the existing drives on the west side, in accordance with the plan of the park which is gradually being developed. The loam will be removed and piled for future use in top dressing and enlarging the lawns. The excavation will then be filled with ashes to make a passable drive.

At the west end of the park near the reservoir, the remnants of an old stone wall was demolished and the boulders used to make a series of miniature cascades in a small brooklet which flows down a steep hillside at this point. This gives a scenic effect which will be very attractive when completed. A small pond at the bottom of this hill was cleaned out and will be planted to water lilies and aquatic plants.

The various small squares about the city received their usual care. The maple trees on Deschenes park and monument square were pruned, dead wood and interfering branches being removed, some bad crotches bolted and chained and the trees fertilized. On several of these squares flower beds were filled by donation. The one on Stark square by F. H. Bailey & Son, the Esplanade by the Buxton Greenhouses and Meeting House park by C. R. Blake.

At the junction of South Main Street and Dunstable Road a small island was installed by request of the Mayor. This was constructed of rough boulders instead of the conventional cement or granite curbing, and will be filled with flowering plants.

At South Common in addition to the usual care of the lawn and trees, a new backstop and bleachers were built for the ball diamond near Elm and Lake Streets. The other backstops and bleachers were repaired and the diamond near Lake and Chestnut Streets was resurveyed and anchors set for the bases, the old ones having been destroyed when the land was graded for a skating rink by the Recreation Commission.

On the North Common the ball grounds were cared for. All the trees there and near the school were pruned and the bleachers and grandstand repaired.

The Artillery Pond basin has been used as a dump in order to obtain filling for grading. On the north and east sides sufficient material has been received, so that this section was graded to a proper surface by use of tractors and scrapers. Black muck was removed from the south side with a steam shovel and spread on this surface for top soil. Clay was mixed with this to give a proper consistency and the whole given a proper finished grade so that it may eventually be used for an athletic field. As this work required the use of tractors, trucks and steam shovel, the equipment with operators was furnished by the Public Works Department. Employment was also given to several unemployed fire victims. About two acres was put in shape and will be harrowed and seeded in the Spring.

All the poplar trees on the streets and parks were sprayed for the control of the satin moth, also several on private grounds at the request of the owners. The large elms and oaks at Greeley park were sprayed and all of the blue spruces for the gall louse, about 250 trees were sprayed.

Report of Supervisor of Play Grounds

To the Recreation Commission:—

SKATING

Skating facilities were again offered the public at South Common and Artillery Pond under the direct supervision of Dr. Babbitt. Many people availed themselves of this opportunity during the winter months. An estimate of the person-period attendance would run into the thousands as the rink was so crowded at times as to almost preclude skating.

The levelling of the ground at South Common has made it possible to produce a skating surface much easier and cheaper than ever before, as well as a much larger space than formerly.

A snowshoe and ski hike was held in February and thoroughly enjoyed by those taking part.

PLAYGROUNDS

The playground season opened the last Monday in June and enjoyed an eight week season. As usual the same six grounds offered a varied program to the children.

It was necessary to engage several new workers but placing these with the experienced ones, the program was successfully carried out.

Leagues and tournaments were held for both senior and junior boys and girls. These included baseball, horseshoes, volley ball and bean bags. Beside these, badge tests, dramatics, musical shows, pushmobile contests, pet show and picnics were conducted.

Handcraft activities were conducted as usual by Mrs. Foley and proved as usual to be the most popular activity on the program. The exhibit was held in store windows on Main Street and well merited the attention and praise offered by the public.

The closing day celebration took the form of a lantern parade, through Main Street. Over 800 boys and girls participated. The Veterans of Foreign Wars donated their Fife and Drum Corp to furnish music and to lead the parade.

All playground events were judged on a point scoring basis and the winner presented with a playground championship banner. This was won by Nashua Mills playground.

The attendance on the different grounds was very good. Based on a person-period basis the attendance at each ground was as follows:

The cost of operation was \$3,350.04. This brings the cost of 6.5c per person-period.

TENNIS

The Crown Hill courts were completed in the spring and opened for play. These courts are built of concrete and will insure the people of an opportunity to play from early spring to late fall.

The new clay court at North Common also was completed this spring. This is a clay court along side of the other clay court. The direction of play was changed from east and west to north and south.

The courts were in great demand, especially the South Common courts and North Common courts. The use of those at Crown Hill was less on account of the big fire. More courts at South Common could be used to good advantage.

A studied estimate of person-period players on all the courts for the season is placed at over 6000, over half of which could be accounted for at the South Common courts.

To the Recreation Commission:—

The Bath House opened June 6 due to extreme hot weather and the many requests for a place to dress. It was officially opened June 22 and remained open until September 2nd.

Two life guards and an instructor of Red Cross methods of life saving and swimming were in attendance every day.

The pool to be suitable for a city the size of Nashua should be made larger and deeper to accommodate the many who desire to use it.

Chlorine is mixed with the water at the head of the pool by means of the new Chlorinator installed last year.

The attendance taken at three different times of the day was 15,341, 70% of whom were children or minors.

This year was our best year at the pool when you consider that only on one occasion have I had to enlist the help of the Police Department to investigate a complaint.

Report of Recreation Committee

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:—

As heretofore, your Commission has promoted four activities, skating, playgrounds, tennis and swimming.

During the last two or three years besides promoting the regular activities a program of permanent construction has been carried on. Five tennis courts have been built giving the city six in all—two at North Common, two at South Common and two at Crown Hill. The South Common and Crown Hill courts are built of tarvia so that they are usable from the time snow is off in the spring to the coming of snow in the fall.

Skating has been a very popular sport during the winter and an increasingly larger space has been needed at South Common. Nearly the South third of the common has been levelled so that a fair skating surface may be obtained in a single cold night.

The swimming pool lot has been cleaned up and benches and tables put in. Also an up to date chlorinating outfit installed and the road leading to it rebuilt.

This report would not be complete without a resume of future needs which are named in the order of their importance. Probably our greatest need is to furnish some sort of lavatory conveniences at the different playgrounds, the lack of which is little short of criminal. Second, to find some small area in the High Street-Clay Street section and install another small playground. Third, to enlarge and deepen the swimming pool to partially accommodate the larger boys and girls who find it too shallow and too small much of the time as it exists at present. Fourth, two more tennis courts at the South Common.

A financial report and detailed reports by the supervisor of Playgrounds and supervisor of the Swimming Pool are appended hereto.

Report of Librarian

To the Trustees of the Nashua Public Library,
Nashua, H. H.

The annual report of the Public Library for the year ending December 31, 1930, is herewith submitted.

The year has been one of steady growth and usefulness in all departments exceeding the circulation of 1929 by 4,869 volumes. The total home circulation was 179,820 and in addition 5,556 books and magazines were given out at the desk for reading and study in the Reading Room, making a grand total of 185,376. Last year it seemed impossible to do any more business under present conditions but with more money for the purchase of books and with assistants who have worked hard to give service, the increase has come about.

2,291 books were added, 2,049 purchased, 192 by gift, 50 by binding periodicals, etc. 1,224 books and pamphlets were discarded, making a total gain of 1,067 to the library, or, approximately 45,410 volumes on the shelves, December 31, 1930. The number of discards were unusually large, due to the fact that many Government Documents which have been stored in the Tower Room, unused for years and taking up valuable space, were returned to Washington. With additional shelving in this room some relief will be obtained from overcrowded shelves on the main floor. From year to year the evil day of new stacks is postponed, but eventually it must come. Space for the valuable volumes of the Nashua Telegraph has become an exceedingly trying problem which the librarian cannot solve.

The library was open 303 days. There has been some demand for Sunday opening but not enough to warrant the extra expense.

The largest month in the adult department was January, with a circulation of 11,133, which is the largest ever recorded. The largest day was 676 and the smallest 56. The average daily circulation was 372 and in all departments 593. In the Children's Room, November was the largest month with 6,032 recorded. The largest day was 572, smallest 10, with an average daily circulation of 171. At Crown Hill, January was the largest month with a circulation of 1,727. The largest day was 101 and the smallest 11, with an average daily circulation of 51.

The fire in the Crown Hill section retarded library activities to a considerable extent. Considering the difficult situation under which the library functioned, the loss of 55 in circulation over the previous year is not at all serious. With the kindergarten in session in the adjoining rooms, the large parochial school in Community Hall just above, the noise and confusion has been very trying. Mrs. Woodbury is to be congratulated in keeping her patience and poise. About 200 books were burned in the May fire, but with an additional appropriation of one hundred dollars by the city, many of the most important titles were replaced without making an inroad into the general fund.

The foreign circulation has shown a very satisfactory increase, particularly in French, by 550 volumes over 1929. Miss Rockwood has been given charge of this department and results show that she is making progress. More additions are needed in the other languages.

Last year at the main library literature surpassed all other classifications in number of volumes circulated. This year periodicals take first place, with 4,829 numbers circulated, literature next, 3,992, history and travel, 3,672, biography, 2,898, useful arts, 2,738, fine arts, 2,216, sociology, 1,366, philosophy, 1,101, religion, 777, language, 172.

Reference work has increased, accordingly, and often three attendants are required at the desk to take care of reference and circulation. 2,829 overdue notices were sent out and 2,948 book reserve cards. These two items, alone, require much detail, also a large amount of clerical work. Fines collected for the year amounted to \$1,112.49, the largest ever known.

In the Children's Room during the past year, there were 700 new registrations and 20 reregistrations, bringing the total number of borrowers up to 3,579 or over two-thirds of the 5,257 children in the city under high school age.

A special effort was made to reach the children in the parochial schools and visits were made to both the Sacred Heart and St. Francis Xavier which met with a hearty response. Library instruction was given to the sixth grade classes from the Quincy St., Mt. Pleasant and Crowley Schools. In each case the teacher accompanied the class and the interest shown by both children and teachers was very gratifying. Instruction was given in the Dewey Decimal classification, use of the card catalog and encyclopedias and each child was given some practical experience in looking up definite books or articles. In all nine classes received this instruction, making a total of about 270 children. The story hours were well attended during the year.

The Rainbow Reading Club which was carried on during July and August helped to keep up the interest in reading during the summer. Certificates were awarded to seventeen boys and girls who completed the requirements.

Book Week is an interesting time for the children, always. In November the new books were on display during the week in the staff room, which was decorated with animal skins, armor and coat-of-arms to represent a mediaeval castle and was called the Castle of Books. The attendance was 934. A novel feature was the Costume Party which was held on Saturday evening. Fifteen boys and girls of junior high school age were dressed in the costumes of various book characters. A guessing contest followed and other games were enjoyed.

Although there has been no marked increase in the number of volumes circulated, Miss Manning, the Children's Librarian, feels that the boys and girls are reading better books each year.

Four Gothic lanterns were purchased from the Johnson Electric Co. in the spring and were hung in the Reading Room. These have been very satisfactory, not only improving the lighting, but adding to the attractiveness of the room.

The exhibitions of paintings have been continuous through the year with the exception of one month. The glass case has been filled with interesting miscellaneous collections, the most popular being the pictures of old time residents and the soap sculpture. The exhibition by local talent, including work of the public schools, brought many people to the library and was very much enjoyed.

Mr. Leonard Burbank and the librarian are trying to create an interest in a permanent collection of pictures of old Nashua and former residents which will be priceless in the future. Several gifts have been received and a filing cabinet has been purchased for their preservation.

The resignation of Mrs. Anne Congdon from the Board of Trustees was accepted with much regret in March. Her interest in every phase of library activities not only made her a valued member of the Board but her helpfulness and friendly counsel was a constant source of inspiration to the librarian. A hearty welcome is extended to Mrs. Margaret Gregg, her successor.

The Telegraph Publishing Co., has co-operated generously in giving library publicity during the year, the Police Department has responded, promptly, to appeals for help and many kind citizens and friends have contributed books, magazines and newspapers. To them all grateful acknowledgment and thanks are given. The librarian desires to express her appreciation to the Staff who have given loyal and efficient service and to the Trustees, one and all, who have supported and guided so splendidly.

Sargent, Michael H. O'Grady, J. Pierre Lampron, John P. Cyr, William G. Finn and Eliot A. Carter, to be known as the Advisory Committee on City Hall, by and hereby are constituted as the City Hall Committee. All members thereof shall serve without compensation and any vacancy in the Advisory Committee on City Hall shall be filled by the Mayor, subject to confirmation by the Board of Aldermen.

2. Said City Hall Committee is hereby authorized to select a proper location for the erection of a new City Hall, pursuant to the recommendation of the Advisory Committee on City Hall, filed with the Board of Aldermen on June 12, 1928, and for the proper performance of said duty shall secure prices on available locations, a description and abstract of title of each, and if reasonably necessary, may recommend the taking by eminent domain of any suitable location and the price to be offered therefor. If a location other than the site of the present City Hall and Municipal Buildings, so-called, shall be selected, the said Committee shall obtain bids for the sale of said City Hall and Municipal Building and the land upon which said buildings are located, in such parcels as may be deemed advisable by it.

3. The said Committee is hereby authorized to employ a competent architect and such other expert assistance as shall be reasonably necessary for the proper performance of its duties. It shall obtain plans and specifications for the proposed new building.

4. Said Committee is hereby authorized to expend such sums as shall be reasonably necessary, said sums to be chargeable to the account of the new City Hall. Said Committee or its architect shall consult with the heads of departments which are to be located in the new building and the heads of such departments shall give all necessary information and advice for the location, arrangement and space necessary for their respective departments.

5. The said Committee shall report its findings in detail, with its recommendations thereon, with all papers, plans, specifications, prices, bids and all other information, to the Board of Aldermen for its final approval.

WHEREAS the States of Indiana, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, South Carolina, Pennsylvania, New York, Minnesota, Maryland, New Jersey, Illinois, Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Nebraska, Massachusetts, Georgia, Missouri, and other States of the Union, and United States Congress have by legislative enactment designated October 11, 1929 to be "General Pulaski's Memorial Day" and

WHEREAS it is fitting that the recurring anniversary of this day be commemorated with suitable patriotic and public exercises in observing and commemorating the death of this great American Hero of the Revolutionary War;

THEREFORE BE IT

Canal Street, it being understood that the Main Street Bridge shall be
exempt from the Provisions of this section.

On East Pearl Street to a point one hundred eighty feet from
Main Street.

On West Pearl Street to South School Street.

On High Street to Washington Street.

On Factory Street to Harrison Street.

(b) No Parking whatsoever shall be permitted on the following
Streets.

North side of Pearson Avenue.

East side of Mechanic Street.

East side of Front Street.

And also amend Sections 4 and 5, of Chapter 31 by adding after
the words "paralled streets" in Section 5, the following:

"Commercial vehicles, while actually taking on or discharging mer-
chandise, or any vehicle while taking on or leaving passengers, may stand
for a reasonable period, not exceeding five minutes, at a reasonable dis-

PARKING

2. PARKING LIMITATIONS.

(a) No motor vehicle or horse drawn vehicle shall be stationed and
remain for a period exceeding two hours on the following days and
hours:

Wednesdays and Saturdays from 12:00 to 10:00 P. M.

IN THE FOLLOWING PLACES

On the South side of Temple Street from Main Street to a point
one hundred fifty (150) feet East of Main Street.

On the West side of Main Street between West Hollis and Amherst
Street, and on the East side of Main Street between East Hollis and
Canal Street, it being understood that the Main Street Bridge shall be
exempt from the Provisions of this section.

On East Pearl Street to a point one hundred eighty feet from Main
Street.

On West Pearl Street to South School Street.

On High Street to Washington Street.

On Factory Street to Harrison Street.

(b) No Parking whatsoever shall be permitted on the following
Streets.

North side of Pearson Avenue.

East side of Mechanic Street.

East side of Front Street.

(c) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed
and remain on the North side of Franklin St., between Main Street
and the intersection of Front Street and between Locust Street and
Charles Street.

No Motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the North side of Franklin Street between the intersection of Front Street and Locust for a period exceeding one hour.

The foregoing regulations in this section shall be in effect week days only from 6:00 A. M. to 7:00 P. M.

(d) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the North side of Temple Street between South Street and Scripture Street.

No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the South side of Temple Street between South and Scripture Streets for a period exceeding one hour.

The foregoing regulations in this section shall be in effect week days only from 6:00 A. M. to 7:00 P. M.

(e) CHARLES STREET. No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on the East side of Charles Street.

(f) GREEN STREET. No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on either side of Green Street.

(g) LOCUST STREET. No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on Locust Street.

(h) WINTER STREET. No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on the North side of Winter Street. Parking on the South side of Winter Street is prohibited.

DEFINITIONS

1. VEHICLES. The word "vehicle" used herein shall include horses hitched to vehicles, horses ridden or led, motor vehicles of all kinds, bicycles, tricycles propelled by hand or foot, and everything on wheels or runners except street cars and light carriages for the conveyance of children.

MOTOR VEHICLES. The word "motor vehicles" shall include motorcycles, automobiles and all other vehicles used upon highways, propelled by power other than muscular power, except railroad and railway cars and motor vehicles running only upon rails or tracks.

MOTOR TRUCKS. The word "motor truck" used herein shall include any motor vehicle of greater than one ton capacity intended, designed, or constructed for the transportation of freight or merchandise, or any motor vehicle equipped with other than pneumatic tires.

HORSE. The word "horse" shall include all domestic animals.

OPERATOR. The word "Operator" shall include any person who operates a motor vehicle.

SAFETY ZONE. The word "safety zone" shall include any part of the highway established and marked by the Police Department as such, from travel of which vehicles may be restricted or excluded.

PARKING

2. PARKING LIMITATIONS.

(a) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding two hours on the following days and hours:
Wednesday and Saturdays from 12:00 M. to 10:00 P. M.

IN THE FOLLOWING PLACES:

On the South side of Temple Street from Main Street to a point one hundred fifty (150) feet East of Main Street.

On the West side of Main Street between West Hollis and Amherst Street, and on the East side of Main Street between East Hollis and Canal Streets, it being understood that the Main Street Bridge shall be exempt from the provisions of this section.

On East Pearl Street to a point one hundred eighty feet from Main Street.

On West Pearl Street to South School Street.

On High Street to Washington Street.

On Factory Street to Harrison Street.

(b) No parking whatsoever shall be permitted on the following streets:

North side of Pearson Avenue.

East side of Mechanic Street.

East side of Front Street.

(c) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the North side of Franklin Street, between Main Street and the intersection of Front Street and between Locust Street and Charles Street.

No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the North side of Franklin Street between the intersection of Front Street and Locust Street for a period exceeding one hour.

No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the North side of Lake Street between Pine and Vine Streets for a period exceeding one hour.

The foregoing regulations in this section shall be in effect week days only from 6:00 A. M. to 7:00 P. M.

(d) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the North side of Temple Street between South Street and Scripture Street.

No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the South side of Temple Street between South Street and Scripture Street for a period exceeding one hour.

The foregoing regulations in this section shall be in effect week days only from 6:00 A. M. to 7:00 P. M.

(c) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on the East side of Charles Street.

(f) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on either side of Green Street.

(g) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on Locust Street.

(h) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on the North side of Winter Street. Parking on the South side of Winter Street is prohibited.

3. LEFT SIDE OF VEHICLES TO CURB, PROHIBITED. No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall without necessity stop with its left side to the curb in the following streets, viz:

Main Street north of Lake Street;

Temple Street between Main and Court Streets;

West Pearl Street;

Factory Street.

4. VEHICLES PARKED AT 45 DEGREE ANGLE. In the following streets, or parts thereof, every motor or horse-drawn vehicle remaining in any one place therein shall be parked at an angle of about forty-five (45) degrees, with the right front wheel to the curb, viz:

West side of Main Street between the Speare Block and Hollis Street;

Main Street between Abbott Square and the Main Street Bridge;

On the north side of Deschenes Park;

On the north side of Nashua and Lowell Station.

5. DISTANCE OF VEHICLE FROM CURB. In all streets or parts of streets hereinbefore named, excepting those mentioned in Section 4, any motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle remaining in any one place therein shall be stationed within twelve (12) inches of the curb and parallel thereto.

(a) COMMERCIAL VEHICLES. Commercial vehicles, while actually taking on or discharging merchandise, or any vehicle while taking on or leaving passengers, may stand for a reasonable period, not exceeding five minutes at a reasonable distance from the curb and parallel thereto, when such vehicle cannot find a nearby parking position, on any street in Nashua, except that portion of Main Street between the present City Hall side and the Southerly entrance of the Main Street Bridge.

6. PRIVATE DRIVEWAY. At no time shall any motor vehicle be stationed in front of any private driveway.

7. SAFETY ZONES. No vehicle shall enter or remain in any part of the highway that shall be established and designated as a "safety zone" by the Police Department.

8. **HYDRANTS.** No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed, without its driver, within a distance of less than five (5) feet from any hydrant upon any street in the City of Nashua.

OPERATION

9. **TRAFFIC LIGHTS.** On intersection of streets where traffic lights have been installed, vehicular traffic shall proceed on the green. Pedestrian traffic shall proceed on the yellow and continue on the green. All traffic shall cease on the red.

10. **CROSSING STREET.** Motor vehicles and horse-drawn vehicles crossing from one side of a street to the other in any street or part thereof hereinbefore named shall, except in case of necessity, do so by turning to the left so as to head in the same direction as the traffic on that side of the street.

11. **INTERFERENCE WITH TRAFFIC: STREET CORNERS.** No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall in any streets or parts thereof hereinbefore named, without necessity, so occupy the same or unreasonably to interfere with or interrupt the passage of other vehicles thereon and shall not stop within ten feet (10 ft.) of any street corner.

12. **SIREN WHISTLE.** No person shall use upon any vehicle within the city limits any signalling device known as a "siren whistle or siren horn" but this prohibition shall not apply to fire and police department vehicles.

ONE-WAY STREETS

13. **PARK STREET.** Park Street is made a one-way street from Main to Court Street. All vehicles operating along said one-way street shall travel in an easterly direction.

14. **RAILROAD SQUARE.** Railroad Square between the railroad station building and land premises on the South side of said square and the public oval, so-called, shall be a one-way street, and no person shall drive or operate a vehicle within the area herein designated as a one-way street, except when going in an easterly direction.

15. **ELDRIDGE STREET.** Eldridge Street is designated a one-way street and all parking therein is prohibited. All vehicles operating along Eldridge Street shall enter from Spring Street and travel in a westerly direction.

16. **SOUTH STREET.** South Street is designated as a one-way street and all parking therein shall be on the East side of the street, and for a period of not exceeding one hour. All vehicles operating along South Street shall enter from Worcester Street and travel in a Northerly direction.

17. **SCRIPTURE STREET.** Scripture Street is designated as a one-way street and all parking therein shall be on the West side of the street, and for a period not exceeding one hour. All vehicles operating along Scripture Street shall enter from Temple Street and travel in a Southerly direction.

18. **BEECH STREET.** Beech Street is designated as a one-way street and all parking therein is prohibited. All vehicles operating along Beech Street shall enter from West Hollis Street and travel in a Southerly direction.

19. **GARDEN STREET.** Garden Street is designated as a one-way street and all parking therein shall be on the West side of the street.

All vehicles operating on Garden Street shall enter from West Pearl Street and travel in a Southerly direction.

PENALTY

20.Any person convicted of a violation of any of the foregoing provisions shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00) for each offense.

MOTOR TRUCKS

21., WHERE EXCLUDED. All motor trucks shall be excluded from Dearborn Street from its intersection of Prospect Street to its intersection of Tyler Street. Any person convicted of a violation of this section shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00) or imprisonment not exceeding thirty (30) days.

22. **THROUGH WAYS.** The following streets are hereby designated as Through Ways, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 119 of the Session Laws of 1929:

Concord Street from the northerly intersection of Beasom Street South to the intersection of Main Street.

Main Street at the intersection of Concord Street South to the Southerly intersection of Russell Avenue.

Hollis Street from its intersection at Badger Street East to its intersection of Bridge Street.

Pearl Street at its intersection at Pine Street East to its intersection with Temple Street.

Kinsley Street from Main Street to its Westerly intersection of Sawyer Street.

Manchester Street from Concord Street to its Northerly intersection of Abbott Street.

Amsherst Street from Main Street to its intersection with Broad Street.

23. OPERATION OF VEHICLES. Every vehicle immediately before entering or crossing Through Ways, at its point of intersection with another way, shall first come to a full stop, except where otherwise directed by a police or traffic officer, or by a lawful traffic regulation sign, device, signal or light, and no motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall park within a distance of twenty-five (25) feet of a lawful traffic regulation Stop Sign.

24. PENALTY. Any person who shall fail to stop before entering a Through Way, where a stop signal, sign, device, or light has been installed, in pursuance of Chapter 119 of the Session Laws of 1929, shall be fined not exceeding one hundred (\$100) dollars for each offense.

25. ORDINANCES REPEALED. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

RESOLVED, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua:

Pursuant to the Provisions of Chapter 59 of the New Hampshire Public Laws 1925 and to the provisions of a Special Act which was approved May 4, 1923, entitled, "An Act empowering the City of Nashua to incur debt to the amount of six per cent of its valuation," the Mayor and Treasurer are hereby authorized to issue and sell, under the direction of the Finance Committee, bonds of the City of Nashua in the aggregate principal sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00).

Said bonds are to be issued for the purpose of paying for public improvements of a permanent nature in widening and reconstructing Spruce Street, Bowers Street, and Allds Street; for the purchase of land acquired in widening said Streets; for the purchase of land on Marshall Street to be used for a Park for Public purposes; for constructing a foot bridge over the Nashua River at Temple and Canal Streets and for constructing new sewers and pavements of a permanent nature in divers public streets in the City of Nashua and the proceeds of the sale of said Bonds are hereby appropriated for that purpose.

Said bonds shall be payable to bearer, shall be dated January 2, 1931, shall bear the City Seal, shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Treasurer and the said Bonds shall be for the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) each and shall be due and payable serially each year as follows: Five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in one year, five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in two years, five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in three years, five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in four years, five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in five years, five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in six years, five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in seven years, five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in eight years, five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in nine years, five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in ten years, and five bonds of \$1,000.00 each in eleven years, twelve years, thirteen years, fourteen years, fifteen years, sixteen years, seventeen years, eighteen years, nineteen years and twenty years respectively from the date thereof; shall bear interest at a rate to be established by the Treasurer, not exceeding four and one quarter per cent per annum, said interest shall be payable semi-annually on the second day of January and second day of July each year.

Both principal and interest shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America of the present standard of weight and fineness at the office of the Treasurer in Nashua, New Hampshire, or, at holder's option at the First National Bank of Boston, Boston, Massachusetts.

The coupons shall bear the fac-simile signature of the Treasurer. None of said bonds shall be obligatory without the authenticating certificate of said the First National Bank of Boston endorsed thereon.

Zoning Ordinance

An ordinance regulating and restricting the height, number of stories and size of buildings and other structures, the percentage of lot that may be occupied, the size of yards, courts and other open spaces, the density of population, and the location and use of buildings, structures and land for trade, industry, residence or other purposes; creating districts for said purposes and establishing the boundaries thereof; defining certain terms used therein; providing for the method of administration and amendment, for a Board of Adjustment and for the imposition of penalties.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua, that in the interest of promoting the public health, safety, morals, or the general welfare of the community, the following articles and sections be, and the same hereby are, enacted into law:

ARTICLE I—GENERAL

SECTION 1—*Short Title*

This ordinance shall be known as the "Zoning Ordinance."

The map herein referred to, which consists of two sheets identified by the title "City of Nashua, N. H., Zone Map, June 1930", shall be known as the "Zone Map."

The Zone Map is hereby declared to be a part of this ordinance.

SECTION 2—*Districts*

The City of Nashua is hereby divided into seven (7) types of districts, which shall be known as:

- "A" Residence Districts
- "B" Residence Districts
- "C" Residence Districts
- Local Business Districts
- Main Business Districts
- Light Industrial Districts
- Heavy Industrial Districts

SECTION 3—*Boundaries of Districts*

The location and boundaries of Districts are and shall be as shown on the Zone Map; provided, that where the designation on the Zone Map indicates a District boundary approximately on a street or alley line or on a lot line, the center line of such street or alley, or such lot line, shall be construed to be the boundary.

SECTION 4—*Application of Regulations*

(a) Hereafter no land shall be used or occupied, and no building or structure shall be erected, altered, used or occupied, except in conformity with the regulations herein established for the district in which such land, building or structure is located.

(b) In cases of Mixed Occupancy, the regulations for each use shall apply to the portion of the building or land so used.

SECTION 5—*Definitions*

For the purpose of this ordinance, certain terms and words are herein defined. Words used in the present tense include the future; the singular number includes the plural and the plural the singular; the term "used" includes the words "arranged, designed or intended to be used," the term "occupied" includes the words "arranged, designed or intended to be occupied;" the word "structure" includes the word "building."

Alley.—Any roadway or public way dedicated to public use and twenty (20) feet or less in width.

Certificate of Occupancy.—A statement, signed by the Administrative Officer, setting forth either that a building or structure complies with the Zoning Ordinance or that a building, structure or parcel of land may lawfully be employed for specified uses, or both.

Court.—An open unoccupied space, other than a yard, on the same lot with a building, unobstructed from the lowest level to the sky.

Outer Court.—A court extending to a street or alley or to a front or rear yard.

Inner Court.—A court not extending to a street or alley or to a front or rear yard.

Width of Court.—The least horizontal dimension of a court at its lowest level.

Curb Level.—The elevation of the top of the curb or the established curb grade opposite the center of the building or portion thereof under consideration. Where no curb level has been established, the elevation of the ground at the center of the traveled portion of the street in front thereof shall be considered the equivalent of the curb level, and where the building does not adjoin the street the average elevation of the proposed grade line of the ground immediately adjacent to the building as shown on the building plans shall be considered as the curb level.

Dwellings—

One-Family Dwelling.—A separate, detached building designed for and occupied, exclusively as a residence, by one family.

Two-Family Dwelling.—A separate, detached building designed for or occupied, exclusively as a residence, by two families.

Multiple Dwelling.—A dwelling designed or occupied otherwise than as a One-Family Dwelling or a Two-Family Dwelling. The term "Multiple Dwelling" shall be understood to include apartment houses, row houses, tenement houses and all other family dwellings of similar character, where apartments or suites are occupied and used as separate complete housekeeping units, but not to include hotels.

Row Dwelling.—A Multiple dwelling in which the space allotted to each family extends from the front of the lot to the rear of the lot, and from the ground to the sky.

Family.—An individual; or two or more persons related by blood or marriage living together; or a group of individuals, of not more than six (6) persons, not related by blood or marriage, but living together as a single housekeeping unit. In each instance the family shall be understood to include the necessary servants; and in the first two instances may be understood to include, in addition, not more than four (4) lodgers or roomers taken for hire.

Garage.—A building, structure or any portion thereof used for housing or repairing motor vehicles. This does not include rooms for storing, exhibiting or showing new cars for sale.

Private Garage.—A garage for housing only, with a capacity for not more than two (2) motor vehicles. A garage exceeding a two (2) vehicle capacity, intended primarily for housing of cars belonging to occupants of the premises, shall be considered a private garage if the lot whereon such garage is located contains not less than sixteen hundred (1600) square feet for each vehicle capacity.

Community Garage.—A group of private garages, either detached or under one roof, arranged in a row or around a common means of access, and erected for the use of residents in the immediate vicinity.

Public Garage.—Any garage not included within the definition of a Private Garage or a Community Garage.

Height of Building.—The vertical distance measured from the curb level to the highest point of the roof adjacent to the street wall for flat roofs; to the deck line of mansard roofs; and to the mean height between eaves and ridge for gabled, hipped and gambrel roofs.

Lot.—A parcel of land which is or may be occupied by a building and accessory buildings, including the open spaces required under this ordinance.

Depth of Lot.—The mean horizontal distance between the front lot line and the rear lot line.

Corner Lot.—A lot abutting upon two or more streets at their intersection.

Inter'or Lot.—A lot the side lines of which do not abut on a street.

Through Lot.—An Interior lot having frontage on two streets.

Mixed Occupancy.—Occupancy of a building or of land for more than one use.

Non-Conforming Use.—A use of a building or land that does not agree with the regulations of the District in which it is situated.

Porch.—A roofed, open structure projecting from the front, side or rear wall of a building, and having no enclosed features of glass, wood, or other material more than thirty (30) inches above the floor thereof, except awning or screening or the necessary columns to support the roof.

Stables.—Any building, structure or portion thereof which is used for the shelter or care of horses, cattle or other similar animals, either permanently or transiently.

Privat. Stable.—A stable with a total capacity for not more than four (4) animals.

Public Stable.—A stable with a capacity for more than four (4) animals.

Signboard.—Any structure or part thereof on which lettered or pictorial matter is displayed for advertising or notice purposes.

Story.—That portion of a building included between the surface of any floor and the surface of the next floor above it, or if there is no floor above it, then the space between such floor and the ceiling next above it.

Half Story.—A story under a gabled, hipped or gambrel roof the wall plates of which on at least two (2) opposite exterior walls are not more than two (2) feet above the finished floor of such story.

Structure.—Anything constructed or erected, the use of which demands its permanent location on the land, or anything attached to something having a permanent location on the land.

Structural Alterations.—Any change in the supporting members of a building or structure, such as bearing walls, columns, beams or girders.

Street.—Any roadway or public way dedicated to public use, except an alley.

Telephone Exchange Building.—A building with its equipment, used or to be used for the purpose of facilitating transmission and exchange of telephone messages between subscribers, and other business of the telephone company; but in a Residence District, as established by this ordinance, not to include public business facilities, repair facilities, storage of plant materials or spare parts (other than those carried for the particular building), or storage of equipment, automobiles or trucks, or housing or quarters for installation, repair or trouble crews.

Terrace.—A natural or artificial embankment between a building and its lot lines.

Height of Terrace.—The difference in elevation between the curb level and the top of the terrace at the center of the building wall.

Yard.—An open, unoccupied space, other than a court, on the same lot with a building, unobstructed from the ground to the sky, except as otherwise provided herein.

Front Yard.—A yard across the full width of the lot, extending from the front line of the building to the front line of the lot. (The front line of the building is not the front line of the porch—See Section 28-d.)

Rear Yard.—A yard across the full width of the lot, extending from the rear line of the building to the rear line of the lot.

Side Yard.—A yard between the side line of the building and the adjacent side line of the lot, extending from the front yard to the rear yard. If there be no front yard, the side yard shall be considered as extending to the front line of the lot, and if there be no rear yard, the side yard shall be considered as extending to the rear line of the lot.

ARTICLE II—USE REGULATIONS

SECTION 6—"A" Residence Districts

In an "A" Residence District, land may be used and buildings or structures may be erected, altered or used, only for the following:

PERMITTED USES:

1. One-family dwelling.
2. Church or other place of worship.
3. School or college; including fraternity house, sorority house or dormitory, for faculty or students, if located on the same unit of property upon which the school or college buildings are situated.
4. Library or museum.
5. Park (Not including an amusement park operated primarily for profit.)
6. Playground or athletic field.
7. Country Club.
8. Truck garden, greenhouse or nursery.
9. Farm.
10. Accessory uses, incident to any of the principal uses above listed and not involving the conduct of a business.

(See Section 9.)

SECTION 7—"B" Residence Districts

In a "B" Residence District, land may be used and buildings or structures may be erected, altered or used, only for the following:

PERMITTED USES:

1. Any use permitted in an "A" Residence District.
2. Two-family dwellings.
3. Hospital, other than a hospital for persons suffering from insanity or from diseases such as are commonly isolated in a separate building.
4. Public or semi-public institution, educational or charitable; (not including a jail, reformatory or other correctional institution).
5. Telephone Exchange building.
6. Accessory uses incident to any of the principal uses above listed and not involving the conduct of a business. (See Section 9).

SECTION 8—"*C*" Residence Districts

In a "C" Residence District land may be used and buildings or structures may be erected, altered or used, only for the following:

PERMITTED USES:

1. Any use permitted in a "B" Residence District.
2. Multiple dwelling.
3. Lodging house or boarding house.
4. Fraternity house, sorority house or dormitory.
5. Clubhouse (not including a club the chief activity of which is a service customarily carried on as a business.)
6. Hotel.
7. Electric substation without rotary machinery; or gas regulating station.
8. Accessory uses, incident to any of the principal uses above listed and not involving the conduct of a business.
(See Section 9.)

SECTION 9—*Accessory Uses. Residence Districts*

In any Residence District, accessory uses shall be uses customarily incident to the principal uses listed as permitted. They shall be understood to include, among other things:

1. An office, such as that of a physician, dentist, musician, artist or other professional person when located within or directly attached to his or her dwelling, which is used primarily as a dwelling; and home occupations engaged in by persons of the immediate family within their own dwellings, such as dressmaking or the maintenance of a beauty parlor; including also in the case of a farm, the necessary barns and outbuildings, and the sale of farm produce on the premises.

2. The renting of rooms or lodgings, or the serving of meals for compensation, to not more than four (4) persons.

3. A private garage, located not less than sixty (60) feet from the front lot line, if a separate building; or in a suitable room within or attached to the dwelling. (See Section 34).

4. A private stable, located not less than eighty (80) feet from the front lot line. (See Section 34).

5. A sign or signboard not exceeding six (6) square feet in area, appertaining to the lease or sale of the premises.

6. A name plate not exceeding two (2) square feet in area.

7. A sign or bulletin board, not exceeding twelve (12) square feet in area, so placed as not to interfere with front yard requirements nor obstruct the view across the corner of intersecting streets; and erected upon the premises of a church or similar institution for the purpose of displaying the name and activities thereof, or the services therein provided.

8. A fence, hedge or enclosure wall provided.

(a) A solid fence or enclosure wall shall not exceed a height of six (6) feet;

(b) An ornamental fence exceeding six (6) feet in height shall have a ratio of solid portion to open portion not in excess of one to four.

(c) Any fence, hedge or enclosure wall on a corner lot, and situated within fifteen (15) feet of the intersection of the two street lines, shall not exceed a height of three (3) feet.

SECTION 10—*Main and Local Business Districts*

In a Main or Local Business District, land may be used and buildings or structures may be erected, altered or used, for any purpose except the following:

PROHIBITED USES:

1. Automobile storage yard or wrecking yard (not including a lot used for temporary parking of automobiles).
2. Blacksmith shop.
3. Bottling works.
4. Carpet or bag cleaning establishment.
5. Contractors plant and storage thereof, except during the course of building construction.
6. Garage, public (Permitted under conditions prescribed in Section 16).
7. Gasoline service station (Permitted under conditions prescribed in Section 17).
8. Laundry, steam.
9. Milk bottling establishment, or wholesale milk distributing station.
10. Stable, public.
11. Sawmill or woodworking mill.
12. Stone or monument works.
13. Storage, sorting or lading of junk, scrap metal, paper or rags.
14. Storage yard.

15. Veterinary infirmary.
16. Warehouse, except as an accessory to a retail store and located on the same premises.
17. Manufacturing of any kind, other than the manufacture of products the major portion of which is to be sold at retail on the premises to the ultimate consumer. (See Section 18).
18. Any use prohibited in a Light Industrial District as listed hereinafter in Section 11.

SECTION 11—*Light Industrial Districts*

In a Light Industrial District, land may be used and buildings or structures may be erected, altered or used for any purpose except the following:

PROHIBITED USES:

1. Acetylene gas (Manufacture of compound acetylene in excess of 15 pounds pressure per square inch).
2. Acid manufacture.
3. Asphalt manufacture or refining.
4. Brick, tile or terra cotta manufacture.
5. Celluloid manufacture or storage.
6. Cement, lime, gypsum or plaster of paris manufacture.
7. Chlorine or bleaching powder manufacture or refining.
8. Coke ovens.
9. Coal-tar products manufacture.
10. Creosote manufacture or treatment plant.
11. Distillation of bones, coal or wood.
12. Dye-stuff manufacture.
13. Emery cloth or sandpaper manufacture.
14. Fat rendering; soap, tallow, grease or lard manufacture or refining.
15. Gas manufacture, or storage in excess of 10,000 cubic feet.
16. Gasoline service station (Permitted under conditions prescribed in Section 17).
17. Gasoline storage in excess of an amount necessary for use, or sale at retail, on the premises.
18. Glue, size or gelatine manufacture.
19. Rolling mill, forge shop or fabricating plant.
20. Iron or steel works, if of the character cited in Item 37 of this Section.
21. Match manufacture.
22. Oilcloth or linoleum manufacture.
23. Ore reduction and general smelting operations.
24. Paint, oil, shellac, turpentine or varnish manufacture.
25. Paper and pulp manufacture.
26. Petroleum refining.

27. Potash manufacture.
28. Printing ink manufacture.
29. Rock or slag crushing.
30. Rubber, caoutchouc or gutta percha manufacture or treatment.
31. Soda ash, caustic soda or washing compound manufacture.
32. Stone quarry.
33. Slag dump.
34. Tanning, curing or storage of raw hides or skins.
35. Tar distillation or manufacture.
36. Tar roofing or tar waterproofing manufacture.
37. And, in general, those uses which may be noxious or offensive by reason of the emission of odor, dust, smoke, gas, vibration or noise, including all uses prohibited in a Heavy Industrial District as listed hereinafter in Section 12.

SECTION 12—*Heavy Industrial Districts*

In a Heavy Industrial District, land may be used and buildings or structures may be erected, altered or used for any purpose except the following:

PROHIBITED USES:

- *1. Abbatoir.
 2. Animal fertilizer manufacture.
 - *3. Garbage, offal, dead animals or refuse; incineration, reduction or storage.
 4. Gasoline service station (Permitted under conditions prescribed in Section 17).
 5. Gunpowder, fireworks or other explosive, manufacture or storage.
 - *6. Stockyards.
- * (See Section 43-c-14).

ARTICLE III—EXCEPTIONS TO USE REGULATIONS

SECTION 13—*Two-Family or Multiple Dwelling—*

"A" and "B" Residence Districts

In an "A" or "B" Residence District, a Two-Family or a Multiple Dwelling may be erected on a lot the side of which adjoins a Business or Industrial District, provided the height of the dwelling, the lot area per family housed thereon, and the open spaces on the lot are in accordance with the regulations herein prescribed for the District in which such dwelling is located.

SECTION 14—*Community Garages—Residence Districts*

In any Residence District a Community Garage may be erected in the interior of a block, provided:

(a) No portion of such structure shall be nearer than sixty (60) feet to the frontage of the block, or nearer than forty (40) feet to a street line along the side of the block.

(b) No portion of such structure shall be less than fifteen (15) feet from the center of an alley.

(c) No portion of such structure shall be nearer than two hundred (200) feet to an existing dwelling (See Section 43-e-12).

SECTION 15—*Garages Accessory to Multiple Dwellings*

In a "C" Residence District, a garage with storage space to the extent of not more than one car for each family may be erected upon the same lot with a multiple dwelling, for the housing of automobiles for those who have a residence in such dwelling, provided:

(a) No portion of such garage shall be nearer than sixty (60) feet to the frontage of the block, or nearer than forty (40) feet to a street line along the side of the block, unless located in a suitable room within such dwelling.

(b) No repair facilities are maintained and no repairs excepting those of a minor nature are made.

SECTION 16—*Public Garages—Business Districts*

In a Business District, a Public Garage may be established, erected or enlarged, provided:

(a) No entrance or exit of such garage, for vehicles, shall be within two hundred (200) feet of any school, playground, church, hospital or public library, or within one hundred (100) feet of any Residence District, as established by this ordinance, unless separated from such Residence District by a street forty (40) feet or more in width.

(b) No repair facilities shall be maintained on the front portion of the lot, or in the front portion of the first story of the building within thirty (30) feet of the street.

(c) Any door for vehicles, opening upon a street, shall be at least fifteen (15) feet from the street line and an open, unoccupied space shall be maintained between said door and the street line. The heights of such open, unoccupied space shall be not less than twelve (12) feet and the other dimensions shall be such that no part of the structure encroaches on the triangular area circumscribed by lines joining the center of the doorway and two points on the street line, one on either side of the center line of the doorway and each twelve (12) feet therefrom.

Except in a Local Business District, the aforesaid requirement of fifteen (15) feet may be waived and the entrance door placed on the street line, provided the latter is of the vertical rolling type and a glass window is constructed along the front of the building for a distance of at least

six (6) feet each side of the doorway in such manner as always to make visible from the sidewalk any car approaching the doorway from within the building. No view obstructing object shall thereafter be placed within the triangular area in the building having as its base that portion of the street line lying between points six (6) feet upon either side of the doorway and its apex upon the center line of the doorway fifteen (15) feet from such street line.

SECTION 17—*Service Stations—Business and Industrial Districts*

In a Business or Industrial District, a station for the storage and sale of fuel, lubricating oil and accessories for motor vehicles may be established, erected or enlarged, provided:

(a) No equipment for the service of gasoline or oil is placed closer to any street line than fifteen (15) feet; except that in a Main Business or Industrial District one line of such apparatus may be placed at the side of the entrance driveway, adjacent to the street line, but at least five (5) feet therefrom, but any one unit of such apparatus shall be at least fifteen (15) feet from the street line of an intersecting street or from the side of the entrance driveway where it intersects the same street line.

(b) In a Business District, no portion of such structure or its equipment shall be located less than forty (40) feet from Residence District, as established by this ordinance, unless separated from such District by a street forty (40) feet or more in width.

SECTION 18—*Manufacturing in Business Districts*

In a Business District, manufacturing not prohibited in a Light Industrial District and not otherwise excepted by this ordinance, may be established and maintained subject to the following limitations:

(a) Such manufacturing processes shall not occupy the front portion of the first story of a building, within thirty (30) feet of any street line.

(b) Such manufacturing processes shall not occupy an area exceeding fifty (50) per cent of the floor area of the building.

(c) Such manufacturing processes shall not be located within one hundred (100) feet of any Residence District as established by this ordinance.

ARTICLE IV—NON-CONFORMING USES

SECTION 19—*General*

(a) The lawful use of land existing at the time of the adoption of this ordinance, or of an amendment thereto, although such use does not conform to the provisions hereof, may be continued; but if such non-conforming use is discontinued, any future use of said land shall be in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance.

(b) The lawful use of a building or structure, existing at the time of the adoption of this ordinance, or of an amendment thereto, although such use does not conform to the provisions hereof, may be continued and such use may be extended throughout the building; provided no structural alterations are made, other than those ordered by an authorized public officer to assure the safety of the building or structure; and provided further that such extension does not displace any residence use in a Residence District established by this ordinance.

(c) A non-conforming use of a building may be changed to another non-conforming use of the same or of a more restrictive classification, provided no structural alterations are made, other than those ordered by an authorized public officer to assure the safety of the building or structure; and provided further that such extension does not displace any residence use in a Residence District established by this ordinance.

(d) Whenever a non-conforming use of a building has been changed to a more restricted use or to a conforming use, such use shall not thereafter be changed to a less restricted use.

(e) Whenever a non-conforming use of a building, or portion thereof, has been discontinued for a period of at least one (1) year, such non-conforming use shall not thereafter be re-established, and the future use shall be in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance. (See Section 43-e-8).

ARTICLE V—HEIGHT AND AREA REGULATIONS

SECTION 20—*Schedule of Regulations*

In any District, the maximum height of buildings or structures, the minimum dimensions of yards, courts and other open spaces, and the area of lot required per family housed thereon, shall be as shown on the "Schedule of Height and Area Regulations" accompanying this ordinance and hereby declared to be a part hereof.

ARTICLE VI—APPLICATION OF HEIGHT LIMITATIONS

SECTION 21—*General*

The height limitations of this ordinance shall be applied as follows:

(a) A cellar or basement, when designed for occupancy as a dwelling, shall be counted as a story; when otherwise designed and used, it shall not be counted as a story.

(b) On a Corner Lot having two (2) or more frontages, the height shall be taken from a level midway in elevation between the highest curb level and the lowest curb level; and this height limitation shall apply upon such lot not farther than to the center line of the block, beyond which any portion of the same lot shall have a height limitation similar to that applying upon the property next adjacent thereto.

(c) On a Through lot the height limit, including all exceptions thereto, beginning at either frontage, shall apply to a depth not exceeding one-half the depth of the lot.

(d) On an Interior Lot the height limit, including all exceptions thereto, shall apply to a depth equal to one-half the depth of the block as measured from frontage to frontage on a line projected through the center of the lot in question. Any rear portion of such lot beyond the center line of the block, shall have a height limit similar to that applying upon the lot immediately abutting in the rear thereof.

ARTICLE VII—EXCEPTIONS TO HEIGHT LIMITATIONS

SECTION 22—*Height of Dwellings—"A" and "B" Residence Districts*

In an "A" or "B" Residence District, the height of a dwelling may be increased to forty-five (45) feet, but not to exceed three stories, provided that the width of each side yard required by the Schedule of Height and Area Regulations for the District in which the building is located be increased a distance equal to at least the added height of the building above the 35-foot limitation of the District.

SECTION 23—*Height of Public or Semi-Public Buildings*

In any Residence District, or in a Local Business District, the height limitation for churches, cathedrals, temples, hospitals, sanitarium, schools or educational institutions may be increased to eighty (80) feet, but not to exceed six (6) stories, provided that the width of each side yard required by the Schedule of Height and Area Regulations for the District in which the building is located, be increased so as to provide that no point in any wall of the building above the height limitation of the District shall be nearer to the vertical plane through a side lot line than a distance equal to one-third the height of such point above the curb level.

SECTION 24—*Height of Monuments, Spires, Etc.*

In any District, the height limitation of the District may be exceeded by a monument, shaft, spire, dome or tower, if erected for ornamental purposes only.

SECTION 25—Height of Special Structures

In a Main Business District, or in an Industrial District, the height limitation of the District may be exceeded by structures requiring special design on account of their particular use in industry or commerce, (such as chimneys, stacks, grain elevators, detached water or wireless towers, etc.), provided they otherwise comply with the regulations herein prescribed.

SECTION 26—Appurtenances to Buildings

In any District, chimneys, stacks, elevator bulkheads, penthouses, gas or water towers, cooling towers, stage towers or scenery lofts, electric signs, wireless towers, and other necessary mechanical appurtenances, where permitted by the Use Regulations and erected upon and as an integral part of the building, may be erected or extended above the height limit of the district; provided that any such structure shall set back from the vertical plane of the permitted building line one (1) foot horizontally for each two (2) feet of extra height.

SECTION 27—Allowance for Terraces

On a lot where terraces exist, the height of a building located thereon may be increased above the height limitation of the District a distance equal to the height of the terrace, provided that the depth of front yard is not less than the height of the terrace.

ARTICLE VIII—APPLICATION OF AREA REGULATIONS*SECTION 28—General*

(a) No yard, court or other open space, provided about any building or structure for the purpose of complying with this ordinance, shall be considered as a yard, court or other open space for another building or structure.

(b) In any District, yards or courts, even though not specifically set forth in the "Schedule of Height and Area Regulations" shall be provided for a lot upon which a building intended to include living or sleeping accommodations is to be located, unless at least one window in each room wherein people are intended to live or sleep shall open directly upon a street or alley. Where required, such yards or courts shall be so arranged that at least one window in each room wherein people are intended to live or sleep shall open directly upon a front yard; or upon a rear yard not less than fifteen (15) feet or less than three (3) feet for each story of building height, in depth; or upon a court having a width not less than fifteen (15) feet or less than three (3) inches for each foot of the height of such court measured from the bottom thereof to the

top of the highest wall abutting it; or upon a side yard not less than four (4) feet, or less than two (2) feet for each story of building height, in width.

(c) In measuring the width and depth of the yards prescribed herein, a cornice projecting not more than twelve (12) inches, or a fence, shall not be held to reduce such required dimensions.

(d) A porch may be erected in a front or rear yard, provided it be not closer to an adjoining property line than the required width of the side yard.

SECTION 29—*Front Yards*

(a) In any Residence District, where forty (40) per cent or more of the property fronting upon one side of a street between two intersecting streets, and located in such District, has been improved with buildings at the time of the passage of this ordinance, and a front yard of greater depth than the minimum or of less depth than the minimum required by the "Schedule of Height and Area Regulations" has been provided for the majority of such buildings, such minimum may be disregarded, but no building or structure hereafter erected or altered in such Residence District shall be placed nearer to the street line than the average depth of front yard established by such majority; except that the minimum depth of front yard for a dwelling on a lot between two adjoining lots, on each of which a building exists at the time of the passage of this ordinance, shall be the average of the depths of front yards observed by such buildings.

Where less than forty (40) per cent of such property has been improved with buildings, or where dwellings do not front upon a street, the minimum depth of front yard shall be as required by the "Schedule of Height and Area Regulations."

(b) For a corner lot in a Residence or Local Business District where there are lots fronting upon the side street, the minimum depth of yard along either frontage shall be the depth of yard which is required along the same street for the adjoining lot; provided that nothing in this provision shall be so interpreted as to reduce the buildable width of a corner lot of record at the time of passage of this ordinance to less than twenty-eight (28) feet or in a Residence District to require more than one yard, adjacent to the street lines, in excess of twenty-five (25) feet in depth (or width); or in a Local Business District to require any yard, adjacent to the street lines, in excess of fifteen (15) feet in depth (or width).

(c) When a dwelling in a Main Business or an Industrial District fronts on an alley, or on a street less than thirty (30) feet in width, the front line of such dwelling shall be at least fifteen (15) feet from the center of such street or alley.

SECTION 30—*Side Yards*

(a) The width of a side yard shall be taken as the least distance from any part of or point on the building to the adjacent side line of the lot.

(b) In any District other than a Residence District, a building other than a dwelling shall not require a side yard except when bordering on a Residence District, in which case a side yard shall be provided adjacent to such District and equal in width to that required therein.

(c) The width of any side yard provided, whether or not one is required by the "Schedule of Height and Area Regulations", shall not be less than three (3) feet.

SECTION 31—*Rear Yards*

(a) The depth required by the "Schedule of Height and Area Regulations" for rear yards shall be the depth exclusive of any portion used for accessory structures.

(b) In computing the depth of a rear yard for any building where such yard opens into an alley, one-half the width of such alley may be considered as a portion of the yard.

(c) In measuring the depth of rear yards, in cases where the rear lot line is not parallel with the street line, average dimensions may be used.

(d) In any Business District, a building not used in whole or in part as a dwelling shall not require a rear yard except when bordering on a Residence District, in which case a rear yard at least fifteen (15) feet in depth shall be required adjacent to such District.

SECTION 32—*Courts*

(a) Except as herein prescribed, an outer court is not required in any District, but if provided, its width shall be not less than ten (10) feet nor less than one-fourth ($\frac{1}{4}$) of its length nor less than two (2) inches for each foot of height of such court measured from the bottom thereof to the top of the highest wall abutting it.

(b) Except as herein prescribed, an inner court is not required, but if provided its width shall be not less than ten (10) feet nor less than three (3) inches for each foot of the height of such court measured from the bottom thereof to the top of the highest wall abutting it.

(c) In determining the width of a court which adjoins a yard located on the same lot, or which adjoins a street or alley, such open space may be counted as a part of the court.

SECTION 33—*Lot Area per Family*

(a) Nothing in the area requirements of this ordinance, relating to lot area per family, shall be held to prohibit the erection of a one-family dwelling upon a lot, the area of which is less than that prescribed as the lot area per family, provided such lot, at the time of the passage of this

ordinance, was held under a separate ownership from the adjoining lots; or provided that, at the time of the passage of this ordinance, the majority of the lots fronting on the same street and between the two adjacent intersecting streets are each held under separate ownerships and are each of the same or less area than the lot in question.

(b) In any District, the minimum lot area per family required under the "Schedule of Height and Area Regulations" may be reduced ten (10) per cent for a corner lot.

SECTION 34—*Accessory Buildings*

(a) In any Residence District, any accessory building shall be at least ten (10) feet from the center of an adjoining alley.

(b) In any Residence District, any accessory buildings shall be at least ten (10) feet from any street line.

(c) In any Residence District, accessory buildings on a corner lot the rear line of which is the side line of another lot, shall not be closer to the side street than the depth of front yard required in the District in which such adjoining lot is situated. Such accessory building shall also be at least five (5) feet from said common lot line, unless the distance from the side street to the accessory building be at least twenty (20) feet greater than the required depth of front yard in said District.

ARTICLE IX—ADMINISTRATION

SECTION 35—*Administrative Officer*

The duty of administering and enforcing the provisions of this ordinance is hereby conferred upon the City Engineer, herein referred to as the Administrative Officer.

SECTION 36—*Plats*

All applications for building permits shall be accompanied by a plat in duplicate, drawn to scale, showing the actual dimensions of each lot to be built upon, the size and location of each building to be erected upon each lot, and such other information as may be necessary to enable the Administrative Officer to determine that the proposed structure and use of land will conform to the provisions of this ordinance. A record of such applications and plats shall be kept in the office of the Administrative Officer.

SECTION 37—*Building Permit—Certificate of Occupancy*

(a) No excavation for foundation, nor the erection, construction or structural alteration of any structure or part of a structure, or occupancy of streets or alleys with building materials or temporary structures for construction purposes, shall be undertaken until a permit therefor shall have been issued by the Administrative Officer. No such permit shall be issued before application has been made for a Certificate of Occupancy.

(b) No vacant land shall be occupied or used and no structure hereafter erected, structurally altered or changed in use shall be used or changed in use until a Certificate of Occupancy shall have been issued by the Administrative Officer.

(c) A Certificate of Occupancy, either for the whole or a part of a new building or for alteration of an existing building, shall be applied for coincident with the application for a building permit and shall be issued within ten (10) days after the erection or alteration of such building or part shall have been completed in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance.

(d) A Certificate of Occupancy for the use or occupancy of vacant land, or for a change in the use of land, or for a change in the use of an existing building, shall be applied for and issued before any such land shall be occupied or used, or such land or building changed in use, and such certificate shall be issued within ten (10) days after application has been made, provided such proposed use is in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance.

(e) A like Certificate shall be issued for the purpose of maintaining, renewing, changing or extending a non-conforming use, existing at the time of the passage of this ordinance; and such Certificate shall state that the use does not conform with the provisions of this ordinance. For the purpose of complying with this requirement, the Administrative Officer shall mail such Certificate to the occupants or owners of all such property within ninety (90) days after the passage of this ordinance.

(f) A record of all Certificates of Occupancy shall be kept on file in the office of the Administrative Officer and a copy shall be furnished on request to any person having a proprietary or tenancy interest in the building or land affected.

(g) No fee shall be charged for a Building Permit or for an original Certificate of Occupancy as required herein; but for each copy of an original certificate there shall be a charge of one (1) dollar, which shall be remitted to the City Treasurer by the issuing officer.

SECTION 38—*Interpretation—Purpose*

(a) In interpreting and applying the provisions of this ordinance, they shall be held to be the minimum requirements for the promotion of public health, safety or general welfare. Where this ordinance imposes greater restrictions upon the use of buildings or land or upon the height, bulk or size of a building or structure or requires larger open spaces than are imposed or required by other ordinances, rules, regulations or permits, or by easements, covenants or agreements, the provisions of this ordinance shall govern. Where any other ordinances, rules, regulations or permits, or any easements, covenants or agreements, impose greater restrictions upon the use of a building or land, or upon the height, bulk

or size of a building or structure, or require larger open spaces than are required under the regulations of this ordinance, such provisions shall govern.

(b) All buildings the construction or alteration of which has been begun, and a substantial portion completed, prior to the passage of this ordinance, or for which a contract or contracts have been let, may be completed and used according to the plans adopted by the owner at the time the work was undertaken.

(c) If after the issuance of a permit, the operations authorized thereunder are not commenced within sixty (60) days after date of permit, or if after the commencement of operations the work is discontinued for a period of three (3) months, such permit shall be void, work may not again be commenced until a new permit shall have been issued as for the original work, and building materials and equipment on the ground shall be removed or stored according to the requirements of the Administrative Officer.

ARTICLE X—CHANGES AND AMENDMENTS

SECTION 39—*Procedure*

(a) The Board of Aldermen may, from time to time, on its own initiative, or on petition signed by a majority of the property owners according to frontage in any District, or portion thereof as large as one city block between two intersecting streets, amend, supplement or change the regulations, restrictions or district boundaries herein established or subsequently established. This shall be done only after reference to and report by the Board of Adjustment; and after public hearing, official notice of which shall be given in an official newspaper of the city at least fifteen (15) days prior to such hearing.

(b) In case the proposed amendment, supplement or change be disapproved by the Board of Adjustment, or a protest against such change, signed by the owners of twenty (20) per cent or more either of the area of the lots included in such proposed change, or of those immediately adjacent in the rear thereof, extending one hundred (100) feet therefrom or of those directly opposite thereto extending one hundred (100) feet from the street frontage of such opposite lots, such amendment shall not become effective except by the favorable vote of three-fourths of all the members of the Board of Aldermen.

(c) The Board of Aldermen shall take final action upon such proposed amendment, supplement or change within forty-five (45) days after the filing of petition for same with the City Clerk, and if the Board of Aldermen shall fail to take action upon such petition within said time the petition shall be deemed to have been rejected.

ARTICLE XI—BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

SECTION 40—*Creation—Membership*

(a) A Board of Adjustment is hereby established. The word "Board" when used in this ordinance shall be construed to mean the Board of Adjustment.

(b) The Board shall consist of five members to be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the Board of Aldermen. One member shall be designated to serve until January 1, 1931; two until January 1, 1932; and two until January 1, 1933. Their successors shall be appointed on the expiration of their respective terms, each to serve three years. Appointments to fill a casual vacancy shall be only for the unexpired portion of the term.

SECTION 41—*Meetings*

Meetings of the Board shall be held at least once a month and at such other times as the Board may determine, or upon call of the Chairman. All meetings shall be open to the public. The Board shall adopt its own rules of procedure and shall keep a record of its proceedings showing the vote of each member upon each question, or if absent or failing to vote indicating such fact; and shall keep records of its examinations and other official actions. Every rule or regulation, every amendment or repeal thereof and every order, requirement, decision or determination of the Board shall immediately be filed in the office of the Board and become a public record.

SECTION 42—*Appeals*

Appeals from the decision of the Administrative Officer may be made to the Board of Adjustment by any person aggrieved or by any Officer, Department, Board or Bureau of the city affected by any decision of the Administrative Officer. The appellant shall file with the Administrative Officer and with the Board of Adjustment a notice of appeal specifying the grounds thereof. Such appeal shall be taken within a reasonable time as provided by the rules of the Board by filing with the Administrative Officer and with the Board of Adjustment a notice of appeal specifying the grounds thereof. The Administrative Officer shall forthwith transmit to the Board all the papers constituting the record upon which the action appealed from was taken.

SECTION 43—*Powers and Duties*

(a) The Board shall hear and decide appeals de novo and review on appeal any order, requirement, decision or determination made by the Administrative Officer in the enforcement or application of this ordinance, and upon such appeal may, in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance, reverse or affirm, wholly or partly, or may modify, any such order, requirement, decision or determination. The concurring vote of four

members of the Board shall be necessary to reverse or modify any order, requirement, decision or determination of the Administrative officer or to decide in favor of the appellant or any matter upon which it is required to pass, or to effect any variation from the strict application of the provisions of this ordinance.

(b) If after a permit has been authorized by the Board, such permit is not lifted from the office of the Administrative Officer within a period of six (6) months from the date of the authorization then such authorization shall be null and void and no permit shall be issued thereunder.

(c) The Board shall fix a reasonable time for the hearing of an appeal, taken within the time specified by its rules, shall give public notice thereof as well as due notice to the parties in interest, and shall decide the same within a reasonable time. Upon the hearing of such appeal, any party may appear in person or by agent or by attorney.

(d) Where the street layout actually on the ground, or as recorded, differs from the street layout as shown on the Zone Map, the Board shall interpret the map in such a way as to carry out the intent and purpose of this ordinance and the Map for the particular section or district in question.

(e) Where by reason of topographical conditions, district border line situations, immediately adjoining existing developments or because of other unusual circumstances, the strict application of any provision of this ordinance would result in exceptional practical difficulty or undue hardship upon the owner of any specific property, the Board may after public notice and hearing, make special exceptions to the terms of this ordinance, and may vary or modify such strict application or interpret the meaning of this ordinance so as to relieve such difficulty or hardship, provided that such variance, modification or interpretation shall remain in harmony with the general purpose and intent of this ordinance, so that the health, safety and general welfare of the community shall be conserved and substantial justice done.

In granting variations the Board, if it deem proper to the carrying out of the intent and purpose of this ordinance, may impose such reasonable and additional stipulations and conditions as will, in its judgment, better fulfill the purpose of the ordinance.

In the exercise of its power the Board may, among other variances, modifications and interpretations, authorize a permit to be issued:

1. For the use of land or the erection or use of a building or structure, such as a real estate office or a contractor's stable or storage yard, for commercial or industrial purposes in a Residence District, in cases where such use is incidental and reasonably necessary to the development of the District for residential purposes; or for a signboard in undeveloped territory. Any such variation shall be granted only in cases where the proposed use is clearly of a temporary nature, to be abandoned as the

adjacent areas become occupied for residence purposes. Any permit so authorized shall be only for such limited period of time as the Board shall determine is reasonable, considering the character of the district in question, and in no case for a period of more than one (1) year.

2. For a sand, gravel or clay pit, stone quarry, or mine, together with the necessary accessory building or structures, in a District restricted against such use by this ordinance, for such period and under such conditions as are reasonable, considering the character of the District in question.

3. For a reasonable extension of the regulations of either District over a lot divided by a District boundary line, when all parts of such lot are held under the same ownership at the time of the passage of this ordinance.

4. For the establishment and maintenance of a non-conforming use on a lot adjacent to a lot the use of which, at the time of the passage of this ordinance, does not conform to the regulations herein contained, when the existing non-conforming use renders reasonably impracticable the improvement of such lot without such modification; provided that any non-conforming use so permitted shall not be of a less restrictive use classification than that to which said existing non-conforming use is assigned by the terms of this ordinance.

5. For a reasonable enlargement of a structure existing at the time of the passage of this ordinance and used for trade, business or industry, but located in a District restricted against such use; or for reasonably necessary additional structures for any such use, upon the same lot or plot of ground as that upon which such existing structure and use obtain.

6. For such variation of the area requirements of this ordinance as the board may deem necessary secure an appropriate improvement of a lot of such restricted area, size or shape that it cannot be reasonably improved without modification of the strict application of the provisions of this ordinance; provided such lot, at the time of the passage of this ordinance, was held under a separate ownership from the adjoining lots.

7. For the reconstruction of a building in a District restricted against its use, when such building has been partially destroyed by fire or other calamity, provided the application for permit for such reconstruction is made within six (6) months from the date of such fire or other calamity.

8. For resumption of a non-conforming use of a building in a Residence District when such non-conforming use has been discontinued for a period exceeding one (1) year, provided such use has not been followed by a more restricted use, and that it is not reasonably practicable to utilize the lot upon which such building is located for a conforming use.

9. For the erection or use of a structure in any District by a public service corporation when such erection or use is reasonably necessary for the service of the public and not unreasonably detrimental to the character of the development.

10. For a hospital in an "A" Residence District, where on account of ample area of site and adequate open spaces on all sides of the proposed structure, the residential character of the neighborhood will not be affected.

11. For an aviation field, a cemetery, or a municipal utility or building in any District.

12. For a community garage, in a Residence District located within two hundred (200) feet of an existing dwelling. In passing upon such appeal, the Board shall give weight to the consents to such variation from the provisions of this ordinance, as shown by the signatures of the owners in interest and number of sixty (60) per cent of all the property within two hundred (200) feet of the proposed structure.

13. For a detached private garage built in a terrace on the front of a lot in a Residence District where the topographical conditions are such as to make it impracticable to construct such garage as required under Section 9 (3) of this ordinance.

14. For the use of land and the erection and alteration of structures in a Heavy Industrial District for the prohibited uses listed as Items, 1, 3 and 6 of section 12 of this ordinance, provided that each use thus authorized is reasonably necessary and essential for the public convenience and welfare and not seriously detrimental to the neighboring territory.

15. For a front yard of less depth than that required by this ordinance, where topography or existing building development makes strict compliance unreasonable or substantially impossible.

16. For an arrangement and size of yards varying from that specified in the Schedule of Height and Area Regulations in cases of a group of buildings on a parcel of land forming in effect a multiple dwelling made up of separate units, provided that the depth of yard adjacent to a street line and the required lot area per family as specified in this ordinance shall be complied with in the location of said buildings.

17. For such reasonable variation of the Height and Area Regulations herein set forth as the Board may deem necessary for the suitable use of a telephone exchange building located in a Residence District; where the Board determines such variation is reasonably necessary for the public convenience or welfare, harmonious to the purposes of the District, and not unreasonably injurious to the property of the District in which the structure is or is to be located.

ARTICLE XII—VIOLATION; REMEDIES AND PENALTY

SECTION 44—*Violation; Remedies and Penalty*

Upon information that the provisions of this ordinance are being violated, the Administrative Officer shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance as provided in Chapter 42, Section 67, of the General Laws of New Hampshire.

Any person, firm or corporation, violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, for each violation upon conviction thereof, pay a fine of not less than ten dollars and not more than two hundred dollars. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

ARTICLE XIII—VALIDITY

SECTION 45—*Validity*

If any section, clause, provision or portion of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not affect or impair any other section, clause, provision or portion of the ordinance.

ARTICLE XIV—CONFLICT

SECTION 46—*Conflict*

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

ARTICLE XV—EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 47—*Effective Date*

This ordinance shall take effect on the date of its passage.




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
