THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Music Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the support and maintenance of the Free Public Library.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance and construction of highways.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for oiling the streets.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for state aid maintenance of highways.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for trunk line maintenance of highways.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for state aid construction of highways.

9. To see what action the town will take for the erection and maintenance of a public incinerator and to eliminate public nuisances.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for Memorial Day.
11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for Plymouth cemeteries.
12. To choose one Library Trustee for a term of three years.
13. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
14. To see if the town will vote to build a rest room and raise or appropriate money for the same.
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the repair and construction of sidewalks.
16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to appropriate for defraying the expenses of the District Nurse.
17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money to pay the debts of the town and give notes therefor, countersigned by the town treasurer.
18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the aid of the Emily Balch, Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Hospital.
19. To see if the town will vote to discontinue any portions of the highway in the town of Plymouth formerly known as the Daniel Webster highway which have become unnecessary owing to the relocation of said Daniel Webster highway, and to determine what, if any, portions of said highway shall be so discontinued.
20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The following is a complete list of Cemeteries now under the care of the Board of Trustees:

Pike Hill. There are seven or eight graves; four without inscriptions. The identified ones are: Perley Pike, died 1838, age 60; Mrs. Pike, Boy Solon, age 9.

Cemetery near the Mary Ann Gourley place contains the remains of Mrs. Armena Seavey; one other grave with markers only.

Cemetery on the Stevens Glover farm near the old Glover homestead. Two graves with markers and evidence of other graves, but nothing to indicate owner-

ship. Hear-say tells us that one Emery Rowe or Dearborn died in this vicinity of Small Pox and remains were buried in the night. A stone wall encircles this burial plot. There is to be seen another marker outside and near the stone wall.

An old soldier is buried in a lonely spot over and beyond Huckins Hill, on the north side of the highway, only a marker designates the spot, no inscription but the tale of older inhabitants tell us that one Howard, a Civil War Veteran was buried there. There is indications of another grave alongside. An iron rail fence encircles the plot.

The so-called "Stearns Cemetery" located on the Main road by and near the Everett Keniston homestead. Several graves are here located and many eligible gravestones are in evidence. This cemetery is receiving good care.

On Huckins Hill, on the west side of the highway is the Ellis cemetery, so-called, and is being kept in excellent condition. There are many graves and well inscribed data.

The Lower Intervale cemetery is the resting place of the Currier family, and there is a permanent fund to care for it. It can be seen East of the Daniel Webster highway, just before reaching "Glove Hollow."

The Fair Ground cemetery, between the railroad and the highway near the Fair Ground gate is enclosed with an iron railing; is a very old cemetery and the Hull family are among the early occupants.

Another old cemetery receiving attention is located near the residence of Mr. John Cook.

The Turnpike cemetery, opposite the Turnpike School house, surrounded by a white picket fence, contains many remains of the early settlers of the west part of the town.

There is a private Grave-yard near the Allen Moulton place, now owned by Mrs. George Merrill. The graves are on private property and are cared for by the George Merrill family. Occupants unknown.

The Bartlett cemetery is the resting place of Benj. and Solomon Bayley, the last named a Revolutionary Soldier; and great-grandfather of Timothy E. Bayley's children; it also contains the David Bart-

lett family, Mrs. Cordelia Adams, the grandmother of W. Fred Adams and many others of the very old inhabitants of Plymouth.

A very old cemetery at the rear of the Lewis Spencer homestead is enclosed with an iron railing, and many grave stones indicating early settlers.

The Riverside cemetery of more modern origin, and the Union cemetery, Plymouth and Bridgewater, near the Willis Martin homestead completes the list.

All of these cemeteries are receiving the care and attention of the Board of Trustees just so far as the money allotted for the purpose will enable them to do. There are fifteen in all.

REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

New services with brass pipe have been laid through Main Street from top of "Ashland Hill", so-called on South Main Street to Baker River Bridge: this to comply with requirements of the State Highway Department before a permanent cement road is built.

New construction: Replacement with a 10 inch Main from Highland and Main Streets to Langdon Street; new 6 inch Main from Highland and Russell Streets to Gould Terrace; new 4 inch Main from South Main Street to B. & M., Freight Depot; new resericing of High Street to Summer Street, also 3 new hydrants have replaced old ones.

On account of using power in ditching for new construction more than half time was saved in doing the work and the expense was very much lessened from that of previous replacements.

The old pump has been rebuilt and put in condition so that Pumping Service will not be stopped in case of trouble with Pump No. 1.

So that the necessary quota of water required for all purposes be furnished and also that the reservoir be kept filled it has been necessary to keep the pump running most of the time.

MEDICAL EXAMINER'S REPORT

February 11, 1931.

To the School Board of the Town of Plymouth:

Once more I am passing in my report as Medical Examiner of the schools of Plymouth. This has been an average year as far as the health of the pupils is concerned.

There are always defects to be found and corrected. I examined this year 632 scholars with a less number of ailments than any year since I took on the work of examination.

In all the schools I found only nineteen unvaccinated and nine of them were excused by the Board of Health. Defective teeth are not attended to as soon as they should be. Wrongs in vision have been attended to, in some cases which are very much improved. Only ten cases of pediculosis were found.

The general health of the pupils in the Model School has been very good as Miss Seavey has been very careful to note anything wrong and have it attended to at once.

The Senior class in the High School might be called a husky bunch, one boy being six feet, one and one-half inches tall, the largest girl one hundred sixty-six and one half pounds, average height of the boys five foot, eight inches, weight one hundred thirty-nine pounds. Girls five feet four and one-half inches tall and weight one hundred twenty-five pounds.

The sanitary conditions in all the schools are good, although screens are needed very much in the Lower Intervale District.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Members of the School Board of Plymouth:

Herewith is submitted the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

The Schools in General

On February 15, 1931, our total enrollment was 690 of whom 553 were Plymouth residents. The actual membership was 643; 325 boys and 318 girls.

For the school year ending June 30, 1930, the total registration reached 703; 565 residents, 138 tuition pupils. Average membership was 637. The per cent of attendance was 95. 596 pupils were regularly promoted. There were only twelve failures.

The superintendent was credited with 754 visits during the school year. He has made especial effort to direct supervision to challenge each pupil to achieve to the level of his ability. The teachers have shown initiative and devotion to the individual welfare of each pupil.

That the schools are managed economically is shown by the fact that our per pupil cost is well below the state average. Also our expenditure per thousand dollars of equalized valuation is not excessive.

The School Board has been liberal and far-sighted in the allowance of text books and necessary supplies. The Kardex system authorized by the Board for the keeping of the elementary scholarship records will bring our system up to date.

Dr. Chase performed his health examination with his usual intelligent and sympathetic thoroughness assisted by Mrs. Chase, the District Nurse. Local relief agencies have made possible much remedial treatment.

The Rural Schools

Total enrollment February 15, 1931, was 128; eight less than last year. The actual membership was 121; 62 boys, 59 girls.

Last June a class of twenty-eight pupils graduated from the eighth grades of the rural schools. An excellent evening program was held in the High School auditorium. Sixteen of these young people are now found in Plymouth High School. Regrettably eleven seem to have finished their schooling. This year there are twelve in the eighth grades of the rural schools.

The schoolhouses were repaired again last summer. The chemical toilets, installed at the Turnpike School, have demonstrated the value of this modern convenience. Similar installations are strongly recommended for one or more of the other schools next summer.

Two changes in the teaching force are noted. Miss Blanche Smith refused reelection at the Turnpike. One of our own girls was appointed in her place. Miss Zanita Spencer is a graduate of Baker River Rural School, Plymouth High School, and Plymouth Normal School. After teaching one year successfully in Bridgewater she is now pleasing both parents and pupils in the Turnpike District.

Mrs. Kate Eastman Smith, although struggling with ill health, heroically completed the year at Ward Hill. Soon after the close of school she succumbed to a critical illness ending a career closely identified with the welfare of Plymouth children. She had served as critic teacher in the Normal School under the well-known Principal Rounds. Marriage terminated her teaching for a time. After her husband's death she resumed her work as teacher. The last eight years she spent in unstinted and loving devotion to the children of the Ward Hill School. To her memory is due tribute for her truly notable achievement. She gave her life for the children.

We were fortunate in securing for her successor, Mrs. Grace M. Pratt, who has made her home in Plymouth the last few years. She is a teacher of maturity and experience, a graduate of Randolph, Vt., Normal School with professional summer school courses to her credit at Teachers College, New York City, and Plymouth Normal School. Her appointment has assured the welfare of the pupils of the Ward Hill School.

Last year the pupils of the rural schools joined the village pupils in the May Festival. This year they will take a prominent part.

The far-sighted School Board has kept the rural schools well supplied with equipment and textbooks. The pupils are enjoying educational opportunities comparable with those of the village schools.

The Model Schools

Total enrollment in the Model School grades on February 15, 1931, was 299; eleven less than a year ago. The actual membership was 274; 143 boys, 131 girls.

We are continuing to use the room in Livermore Hall for grade 3. The Junior High is again occupying as a classroom the basement room in the high school building.

Miss Marion Seavey has continued her efficient work as principal. Student teaching has been safeguarded by holding the critic teachers increasingly responsible for discipline and organization. They have not only kept a strong grasp of the supervision of the work of the children but have themselves done at least two-fifths of the teaching. Individual differences have been recognized so that the slowly developing children have not been seriously retarded while the welfare of the more able has been fostered. Constant standard testing shows that the model schools are doing their work well.

Last year the Superintendent's Report noted the May Festival. In May 1930 the occasion proved an even greater success with all the schools of the town participating. The ideals of healthy living demonstrated in this festival seem to make it worthy of annual observance. To Miss Werme, Supervisor of Physical Education, and to Miss Newton, Music Supervisor, much credit is due. All teachers worked faithfully to make the program succeed.

Thirty-three pupils graduated from Junior High last June. An innovation was holding the graduating

exercises in the High School auditorium. All entered Plymouth High school. The eighth grade class this year at present numbers thirty.

During the first semester of the present school year Mr. Charles Abbott of the Normal School Faculty taught eighth grade science while Mrs. Brown taught a penmanship class of Normal School students. Miss Sarah Richardson, who succeeded Mrs. Carpenter of the Normal School Faculty, teaches household arts to the Junior High girls. Miss Dorothy Davis of Derry, N. H., Plymouth Normal School, B. Ed., 1930, has been added as a part time teacher to the Model School Staff. She has taken charge of grade 2 when Miss Werme has been engaged in supervision of physical education, and given necessary assistance in other grades.

Mrs. Marion Jenness, Grade 3, critic Teacher, and Miss Marion Kinyon, Grade 2, Critic Teacher, resigned to continue their education in Teachers College, New York City. Miss Evelyn Werme, who has specialized in primary education, transferred from Grade 4 to Grade 2. To Grade 4, Miss Hazel Corson was appointed. She graduated from the elementary curriculum of Plymouth Normal School in 1925, has taught three years in Plymouth and the Livermore Falls Model School in Campton. She will soon complete her work for a degree in the Summer School of the University of New Hampshire. For Grade 3 was chosen Miss Esther Bozarth, an experienced teacher, graduate of Illinois State Normal School and the University of Chicago.

The High School

February 15, 1930, the total enrollment had reached 239. February 15, 1931, it was 263. A year ago the actual membership was 225. This year it is 248; 120 boys, 128 girls.

February 15, 1930, the number of Plymouth residents in the high school was 131. At present it is 155. A slight proportion of the increase is due to the large entering class. One conclusion, however, is evident. Our high school is not only attracting tuition pupils in increasing numbers, it is also drawing and holding our town pupils.

One cause of this happy result is the increasing attention to individual differences in learning ability. The slower learners are especially cared for, a practice quite in keeping with enlightened policy everywhere. There has been no diminution of the high standards of Plymouth High. The school has the privilege of certification for college entrance and efficiency prepares for college as the records of our graduates in higher institutions certainly show.

A year ago the superintendent recommended that Miss Riley, the commercial teacher be relieved of her overload. This has been accomplished by reallocation of teaching assignments without the employment of an additional teacher. The office work is again being done by the commercial seniors under Miss Riley's direction.

The marriage of Miss Irene White removed one of our ablest teachers. Mr. Hasseltine yielded to the lure of a larger salary and a wider field of service terminating three years of excellent service and wholesome influence as athletic director. Miss Lovering, teacher of junior and senior English, resigned her position at the end of the school year.

A fortunate selection was made in the appointment of Miss Anna McLean of Portsmouth, N. H., Plymouth Normal School, B. Ed. 1930, who has taken over Miss White's freshman history and the classes in physiography. Mr. George Dawson, graduate of Plymouth High School and the University of New Hampshire was elected in place of Mr. Hasseltine. He has succeeded admirably both as teacher and coach. Miss Muchmore was persuaded to teach the junior and senior English classes, and Miss Dorothy Suitor of Barre, Vt., was chosen to teach the English classes of the first two years. Miss Suitor graduated from the elementary curriculum of Plymouth Normal in 1925 and has taught in the elementary and high school grades of Whitefield, N. H., for five years. Her appointment assured a sympathetic handling of beginning pupils. The staff has proved loyal, cooperative, professional, and efficient.

The superintendent feels a real pleasure in commending the work of Headmaster Moors. He has demonstrated his ability as administrator and teacher. His relations with the pupils are firm but kindly and his leadership of the staff of teachers progressive. The school is characterized by a high morale.

The headmaster's report contains the essential details of his stewardship.

Conclusion

The superintendent feels that he should repeat certain recommendations that he made a year ago.

1. A forward looking study of the housing situation should be made. The problem of increased building space must be faced soon.

2. At least one more rural school should be made sanitary through installation of chemical toilets like those installed at the Turnpike School.

3. A study of the possibility of introducing mechanics arts into our high school curriculum should be made.

4. Sufficient appropriations should be provided to maintain our teaching force at its high level of efficiency.

This is the tenth report of the present superintendent of the Plymouth Schools. It is difficult for him to believe that so much time has elapsed since he assumed office. He has greatly appreciated the kindly cooperative attitude of the parents and friends of the schools. To the teachers who have loyally worked for the welfare of the children he expresses his gratitude. He feels that no words will adequately tell the kindness and consideration of the school boards with whom it has been his privilege to serve.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit, herewith, my second annual report as Headmaster of the Plymouth High School.

Building

The repairs made within the High School building during the summer months have not only made it far more attractive but also created a much more pleasant atmosphere for work. In the very near future something should be done to improve the dressing-room facilities for outside wraps and footwear.

Class 1930

Forty-one received their diplomas last June; of this number 15 went to post-secondary schools. Six others will enter similar institutions this September. The distribution is as follows:

The Colleges of the present time have many more applicants than can be accommodated, with the result that colleges are becoming constantly more exacting and careful in the selection of these candidates for college training. The scholastic records during the high school course, together with the report of the headmaster on the moral character, mental and physical abilities, efficiency and ambition of each candidate are studied very thoroughly before a choice is made. Boys and girls who wish to enter college and remain there, must show during their entire high school course that they are willing and even anxious to work steadily and faithfully for those things which will enable them to efficiently carry on college work. The Plymouth High School furnishes the opportunity for those wishing to prepare for college. The courses which do not prepare

for college have been just as carefully planned and efficiently taught.

The task of guiding our young people during their high school years and of preparing them for whatever they wish to later undertake, is not confined to the school alone but must also be shared by the church, the home, and in fact the entire community. Parents must co-operate with the school and the school must do all in its power to aid the parents.

Athletics and sports automatically became a part of the school **program** when they were placed under the control of the school and received skilled supervision. The work, so well started by Mr. Hasseltine, has been continued by Mr. Dawson in an excellent manner. Both the school and community deeply regretted the loss of Mr. Hasseltine but they were fortunate in procuring a man who could so ably carry on the work.

It has been the endeavor of the school to furnish variety in athletics so that as large a number as possible of the student body might participate in games and sports. Your headmaster would advocate that winter sports under supervision might be added to the athletic activities of the High School. Many thanks are given at this time to all the friends of the school who by their presence have helped support the games, and all who have given their time and donated use of their cars for transportation of teams to and from places of games.

Other activities outside the class room have included those of the Girls' Club, English Club, Home Economics Club, Dramatics, Boys' and Girls' Glee Club, Orchestra, Class parties and a Class studying instrumental music. The Prize Speaking Contest which it seemed wise to omit last year, is again on our school program this year.

The boys and girls of the school should be complimented for their splendid spirit in responding to dictations or requests of the administration. Unpleasant circumstances have sometimes arisen and unfortunate things have occurred but they have been adjusted in

a manner thought to be for the good of all concerned. An honest effort has been made to manage the school as a large family where all members might work for the good of all.

In conclusion I wish to thank you as Superintendent, members of our School Board, the citizens of Plymouth, any my entire staff of teachers for the wonderful support and co-operation, interest and assistance all have been willing to give in maintaining **our** High School.
