TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Raymond in the County of Rockingham qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at I. O. O. F. Hall in said Raymond on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what action the town will take relative to playing beano in the Town of Raymond.
- 4. To fix compensation for collecting taxes for the year ensuing.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town maintenance including snow.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Dudley-Tucker Library.
- 10. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums for State Highways as recommended by the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 toward payment of debt.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for tarring.
- 14. To hear the report of the dump committee and pass any regulations pertaining to the dump. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as is necessary for maintaining the dump.
- 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cleaning Main Street.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Parks and Playgrounds. Also pass any regulations pertaining thereto.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction any property acquired by Tax Collector deeds.
 - 18. To see if the town will vote to celebrate Old

Home Day in August and raise and appropriate money for same.

- 19. To see if the town will vote to borrow a sum not exceeding \$14,000.00 for the extension of water mains on Epping Street a distance of approximately 2,000 feet, and to issue and sell in connection with such borrowing, notes of the Town of Raymond in the principal amount not exceeding \$14,000.00, such notes to be issued pursuant to Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws of 1942 as amended, payable from funds to be raised by taxation, to bear interest at a rate not exceeding 5%, payable semi-annually, principal payable in equal annual installments of \$2,000.00 per year, the first payment being due one year from date of said notes, and all other matters in connection with said notes to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to borrow a sum not exceeding \$8,000.00 for the purchase and installation of Water Meters, and to issue and sell in connection with such borrowing, notes of the Town of Raymond in the principal amount not exceeding \$8,000.00, such notes to be issued pursuant to Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws of 1942 as amended, payable from funds to be raised by taxation, to bear interest at a rate not exceeding 5%, payable semi-annually, principal payable in equal annual installments of \$1,000.00 per year, the first payment being due one year from date of said notes, and all other matters in connection with said notes to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 toward the making of a Property Map of the Town of Raymond.
- 22. On petition of Andrew Fasekis and 15 others: "To see if the town will vote to accept Lake View Drive

(between Harriman Road and Governor's Pond) as a Town Highway."

- 23. On petition of Hardy L. Hanson and 13 others: "To see what action the town will take in regard to tarring Prescott Road, to raise and appropriate money for same."
- 24. On petition of Eldon McKinley and 13 others: "To see what action the town will take in regard to continue tarring Lond Hill, to raise and appropriate money for same."
- 25. On petition of Lyman Hammond and 14 other legal voters of Raymond: "To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing a New Power Grader, or other equipment for plowing snow, turning in present grader toward new one. To raise and appropriate money for same."
- 26. On petition of Edward W. Moulton and 11 others: "To see if the town will vote to borrow a sum not exceeding \$6,000.00 to extend the water main on Main Street in the Town of Raymond, beginning at the hydrant near the residence of Winnifred Davis on said Main Street, and ending at a point in the vicinity of George Hibbard's residence on said Main Street."

"And to issue and sell in connection with such borrowing, notes of the Town of Raymond in the principal amount not exceeding \$6,000.00, such notes to be issued pursuant to Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws of 1942 as amended, payable from funds to be raised by taxation, to bear interest at a rate not exceeding 5%, payable semi-annually, principal payable in equal annual installments of \$600.00 per year, the first payment being due one year from date of said notes, and all other matters in connection with said notes to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen."

- 27. On petition of William H. Roberts and 10 others: "To see what action the town will take in regard to tarring Mountain Road, to raise and appropriate money for same."
- 28. On petition of Robert F. Marsh and 15 others: "To see if the town will vote to install and maintain a street light at Junction of Pawtuckaway Road and Route 101 and raise and appropriate money for same."
- 29. To see if the town will vote to allow the collector of taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the state head tax and to fix the amount thereof.
- 30. To transact such other business as may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF HIGHWAY AGENT

This past year we had quite a little overdraft on maintenance, due to the fact we had to buy two tires which blew out that I did think would go until spring. also some breakdowns which were not expected. I am under on all other appropriations. We spent approximately \$900.00 on the grader this past year which is far too much. Since January 1, we have spent some. I have only fixed the grader for the present. If we keep this grader another year I estimate it will cost as much if not more than the past year. It is not a safe piece of equipment on the road at present as the steering boxes are all worn out. These boxes and gears have been inspected by mechanics from R. C. Hazelton Co. I am asking to see what action the citizens of Raymond wish to take at town meeting on purchasing a new grader. I think the people on the country roads have seen quite a difference in roads since we purchased this grader, especially in plowing snow. I would appreciate any citizen in Raymond to call and inspect this grader before town meeting. I am not asking for plow and wing for this grader as the one we have is in fine shape and can be used on a new grader if they wish. Raymond has not got the plowing equipment that they should have for the coming years, as the situation looks today with two more factories coming in it means a great deal more plowing for parking space, which takes a great deal of time and delays us on our other roads. We have over thirty miles of roads to plow.

Our other equipment is in good shape at the present time.

I appreciate the cooperation the selectmen and citizens of Raymond have given me this past year.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Raymond which was made by this Division, acting under authority of Chapter 82, Section 27, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, which provides in part as follows:

"Audit on Motion of Commission. The commission may cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precinct, as often as once in two years, or whenever conditions appear to it to warrant such."

This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 21, 1951, and the period from January 1st to August 31st, 1952. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is made up in two sections as follows:

Section I—Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1951 Section II—Period January 1st to August 31st, 1952

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the

accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library, Trustees of Trust Funds and Water Department.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets, December 31, 1950-December 31, 1951: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1950, and December 31, 1951, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Surplus increased by \$3,750.71 during the year 1951.

Analysis of Change in Financial Conditions: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C and D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue surplus of \$1,909.25, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$227.05, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,136.30.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of August 31st, 1952, is indicated in Exhibit P.

Water Department: (Exhibit N and Z)

Summarized statements of the receipts and expenditures of the Water Department for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, and the period from January 1st, 1952, are presented in Exhibits N and Z, respectively.

All outstanding water accounts were verified as of August 31, 1952, by mailing notices to the water customers.

STATEMENT OF LONG TERM INDEBTEDNESS: (Exhibit 0)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1921, showing annual maturities of principal and annual interest requirements, is contained in Exhibit O.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited.

Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

GENERAL COMMENTS

CURRENT FINANCIAL CONDITION:

It is noted that substantial improvement has been made in the current financial condition of the Town (exclusive of the Water Department) since the date of the previous audit by this Division. As shown by the following statement, there was a current deficit of \$5,496.81 on December 31, 1945, compared to the current surplus of \$12,510.37 on December 31, 1951, indicating a gain of \$18,000.00 in the six-year period:

Highway Equipment Reserve Fund:

The town meeting of 1946 voted to set up a high-

way equipment fund to be made up of money received for outside use of the town tractor. This fund as indicated by the appropriation statement (Exhibit) amounted to \$1,941.61 on December 31, 1951. A like amount is shown as a liability item in the balance sheet of December 31, 1951 (Exhibit A).

It is recommended that this fund be turned over to the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds, the same as is required in the case of Capital Reserve Funds. Annual additions to the fund should likewise be treated in the same manner.

Town Clerk (Waterhouse):

It was noted that 1951 motor vehicle permit numbered 194,390 to 194,400, inclusive, amounting to \$34.52, issued by former Town Clerk Waterhouse during the period from January 1st to March 12th, 1952, had not been recorded in the Town Clerk's cash book and that amount of these permits, \$34.52, had not been remitted to the Treasurer. A remittance should be made to balance this account (Exhibit W).

Town Clerk (Clement):

During the period from March 13th to August 31st, 1952, the present Town Clerk retained \$224.00, representing the amount of fees to which the Clerk was entitled for issuing 448 motor vehicle permits at 50c each.

However, Chapter 116, Section 22, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire provides that all funds received by the Clerk for issuing motor vehicle permits shall be turned over to the Treasurer and that the Clerk shall be paid for his fees by regular town order and check.

It was therefore recommended that a town order

and check in the amount of \$224.00 be issued to the Town Clerk, covering the amount of fees retained. This check was to be endorsed by the Clerk and remitted to the Treasurer, together with other cash on hand of \$466.00 as of August 31, 1952. The total amount of this remittance, \$690.00, represented the amount due from the Clerk on account of motor vehicle permits issued up to August 31st, 1952 (Exhibit X).

Conclusion:

The accounts of the town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting and financial procedure, with exceptions as herein indicated, conformed to prescribed methods and procedure.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Raymond for their assistance during the course of audit.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1953

To the School Board of Raymond:

It is a pleasure to present my sixth annual report of the schools of Raymond. May I take this opportunity to thank you for your understanding and honesty in conducting the affairs and problems of the district.

There was considerable change in the personnel of the teaching staff beginning in September. The last of July 1952, Mr. Mirey resigned to accept a position in Massachusetts. He was replaced as principal of the school by Mr. John J. Callaghan. Miss Mary C. Hathaway, a young lady and teacher of but one year's standing in Raymond, was released by the return of Mr. Raymond J. Antell who has spent two years with the armed services abroad. Mrs. Ann deLaBruere discontinued her teaching career in Raymond in Commercial Subjects and has been replaced by Mrs. Grace M. Pendergast of Lewiston, Maine. She has had extensive experience in the business field and comes to Raymond well-recommended. Since Mr. Callaghan was elected to the principalship, it was necessary to replace him as a teacher in such courses as social science and coaching. This position has been filled by Mr. Socrates Sotiriou of Manchester. Mrs. Martha R. Graham resigned during the summer, August, which required the election of a new Home Economics instructor. This position was filled by Mrs. Marie B. Cherms from Rhode Island. Mr. Louis deLaBruere and Mr. Raymond H. Presby along with Mr. Callaghan make up the balance of the staff in the high school. The elementary school remained unmolested during the upheaval and is the same. The personnel in the grades are Mrs. Kate G. Shaw, Mrs. Miriam E. Vining, Mrs. A. Willis Goddard, Mrs. Ruth T. Houghton, Mrs. Helen T. Forgan, and Mrs. Ethel M. Scott.

An event of importance to the physical structure of the building was the passing of the original basement facilities in the older part of the plant. This section was replaced by modern plumbing and has made a vast difference in the atmosphere and health conditions of the entire surroundings. The School Board is to be highly commended for this much needed improvement.

Included in the other repairs and replacements during the summer were the building of shelves in the supply room, the replacement of old and worn out typewriters, the replacement of the ancient and honorable and useless desks and chairs in the fifth grade room where a new lease on life has been developed by the use of modern furniture, the redecoration of the lunch

room and kitchen where the elimination of dark and dreary paint made the rooms more inviting and homelike and more condusive to working and eating, repairing of the plumbing in the kitchen, the painting, cleaning, and resurfacing of floors and corridors in various parts of the building, the installation of new light fixtures, and various other minor repairs so necessary every summer.

Another project that should have the attention and wholehearted support of the entire town is the making and installation of the bleachers. This project is just another milestone in many that have been made in the schools of the town. They were first conceived last year when a few community-minded young men suggested that trees be cut and the lumber fitted to give the school gymnasium a modern touch so that more men, women, and children could share the activities of the school. Through the kindness and good will of a few more men, this lumber was prepared and made ready for the job. Following a period of allowing the lumber to become partially dry, the task of putting the boards together was accepted by the boys, teachers, and Mr. Littlefield. This was done in excellent style and if you desire you may look the job over and feel proud that from the practical view-point, this project will be a monument to cooperation and individual helpfulness as can only happen in this America of ours. A fine job; a job well-done. You are to be commended for it.

Again this year may I urge that you keep your equipment up to date by replacing it here and there as it becomes worn out and useless. I refer, of course, to typewriters and sewing machines, boiler parts where necessary, and playground equipment.

If you will consult the statistical report you will find that there were 357 pupils enrolled in the Raymond Schools last year. Enrollment trends are again on the upward swing. Our first and second grades are running close to 40 pupils, too many for any one teacher. Our entering grades in the high school are pushing 30 pupils or better. This means that with the present staff your boys and girls will receive only a part of what they should in the way of individual attention because of the time element needed for each child. The answer, as you have already guessed, is the addition of another teacher. This teacher for the high school will first, be used to relieve the load in the English and Social Science classes; second, release a teacher to relieve every classroom of study pupils; third, improve and extend the health program including physical education; and fourth, to have time for individual help and guidance so that every child may receive his fair share of attention and be allowed to take courses to be introduced that more satisfactorily meet individual needs for the growth and development of the democracy.

The increase of tuition pupils speaks well of the standing of your school, Class A, but the time is not too far distant when we shall have to either reject these pupils or increase classroom space. There is no doubt that for the size of the school, Raymond accepts more than its share of children from other towns. This is an important factor with which we must reckon very soon. Your School Board has discussed this phase of Raymond education many times and up to the present time nothing definite has been forthcoming.

It is barely possible that the citizens of the town do not realize that for the state as a whole, Raymond teachers are not over-paid. According to the release received recently from the State Department and the New Hampshire State Teachers' Association, the average salary for elementary teachers is \$2,673 for this year. The average for Raymond teachers, believe it or not, is \$2,450. The average for Pembroke teachers is \$2,600, for Hooksett \$2,620, for Allenstown \$2,700, for Deerfield \$2,520, and for Candia \$2,475. In the Senior High School in the State, the average salary for women is \$3,277 while the men reach \$3,617 as an average. The average for the State for all high schools is \$3,465 and the average for the State for all teachers is \$3,070. This is the first time that figures of this kind have ever been presented to the district. The School Board, at the time this report is being written, is working with the teachers of the schools to find a solution to the salary question in the form of some systematic schedule. It is a sign of the times and this means there must be cooperation between Board, Teachers, and Citizens.

It has been my good fortune to be associated with the schools of Raymond and this Supervisory Union for nearly six years. It is a pleasant feeling to know that perhaps I have been instrumental in helping to improve and help the growth of its educational system in its modern development. However, we are not done and the task will continue long after we have moved to other pastures and other times. It might be well for just a moment to look to the future to see what might happen in this area and the educational growth of this community.

With the building of the new Air Base, this area will again see an increase in the population. Men will bring their families to the town which, among other things, has good schools. If the schools are slow in responding to the modern trends in education, these families will move on to other towns until the right one is found. This is the American way of life and expansion which has been passed down to us for over 100 years. Progress cannot be stopped and the children of future generations will carry on and make every town in this area and other areas meet the needs of their children. They HAVE to because if they don't the new menace of communism will blot out freedom and America will degenerate and pass into oblivion.

May I plead with every citizen of the town to think the educational situation over very carefully in order that some solution may be forthcoming. These are your children, these are the future men and women of the town.

Again may I thank those men, women, and children who have made this year a very profitable and progressive one and may this spirit continue to grow and develope in the years ahead.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent and the School Board:

In making my first report, I wish to offer my humble thanks to you, gentlemen, for the cooperation and understanding you have extended me in my new position.

School opened September third. Mr. Raymond Antell resumed his duties, as Language teacher, after two years in the service of his country. Mrs. Grace Pendergast replaced Mrs. Ann deLa Brueré as teacher of Commercial subjects. Mrs. Marie Cherms replaced Mrs. Martha Graham as Home Economics teacher. Mr. Socrates Sotiriou joined the staff as teacher of Social Studies and Athletic Coach.

During the Fall we conducted the first half of our semi-annual Testing Program, which includes Intelligence and Achievement Tests. We have also availed ourselves of the testing service provided by the New Hampshire State Employment Office in Portsmouth. We feel that with the tests, plus the information made available to this office, we are in a better position to contribute toward helping the individual make a happier adjustment to life in this locality.

We are making wider use of materials offered by the New Hampshire State Library, through the bimonthly visits of the bookmobile. In our own library, through the generous subscriptions of the various classes, we have added current copies of the most widely read educational magazines.

In September a school band was organized under the capable direction of Mr. Raymond Davis, our music teacher. This is an expansion of the instrumental music program introduced last year. We sincerely hope that this very worthwhile, and at this time self-sustaining, program will find its rightful place in the school budget.

I am very happy to report that this year we resumed participation in the Deerfield Fair Program, which we have always considered a wonderful educational experience. Through the splendid effort of both teachers and pupils we were able to send the Drum and Bugle Corps to lead the parade, the float that won first prize, the baseball and track teams, and a school exhibit that won twenty-flve prizes.

In November during National Education Week we held a "Go to School Night" and were very happy with the turnout. We hope that this will become an annual fixture, and that more parents will attend, to see their school in action.

Also, in November, bleachers were erected under the direction of Mr. Presby. These bleachers were made possible through the cooperation of the School Board, Mr. Presby's classes, and the Lion's Club, which sponsored the scrap drive for the needed funds. A new drive has been started by the Alumni to raise funds for an electric scoreboard, for basketball.

The boys basketball team won the Southeastern C League Championship. We also expect the boys to repeat as a strong contender for the Class C title at the State Tournament this year. The girls team, which lost heavily through graduation, is in the process of rebuilding. I wish to thank the sports-minded people of Raymond for their loyal support of our athletic teams, win, lose, or draw.

Our activities program was as follows: In November, we held our annual Halloween Party, in cooper-

ation with the merchants of Raymond. The Sophomores conducted a fine "Hop" under the supervision of Mrs. Cherms. In November, the Seniors presented their annual play, "A Couple of Country Kids", under the direction of Mr. Antell. The Activities Association sponsored a Christmas Party for all grades, with the entertainment being provided by the elementary school children under the direction of Mrs. Goddard. In January, the Winter Carnival Ball was a grand social and financial success.

In conclusion, I wish to express my sincere thanks to all who have helped to make this report possible.
