(Explanation: Article 1 relating to the election of Town and Cooperative School District Officers, will be taken up on Tuesday, March 13 and polls will be open until 7:00 o'clock. A second session to consider all other business will be held on Wednesday, March 14 at 7:30 p.m. as per vote of the Town to accept provisions of RSA 39.2a).

MARCH 14, 1984

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by the Moderator, John R. Taylor. Due to inclement weather, there was insufficient number attending to form a quorum. Fred Rozelle made a motion to postpone. Richard Papen seconded. The meeting was postponed, to be held at the Town Garage in North Sandwich, on Saturday, March 17, 1984 at 1 o'clock. The meeting was adjourned at 7:35 p.m.

MARCH 17, 1984

The meeting was called to order at 1:00 p.m. by the Moderator, John R. Taylor. Rev. Marshall Davis gave the invocation. Mr. Walter Forbes led the salute to the flag.

John R. Taylor, Moderator, read the results of Article No. 1 and proceeded with the Town Warrant.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,838,000 for the purpose of designing and constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed \$927,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H.R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Sandwich, N.H., and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto. (This article must be voted by secret ballot with two-thirds majority vote.)

Mr. Rozelle made the following motion

Richard Papen seconded

“Moved that the sum of \$2,838,000 be and hereby is appropriated and authorized to be raised in part by borrowing as hereinafter provided for the purpose of designing and constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities in the Town of Sandwich which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds, of which sum an amount not to exceed \$927,000 shall be raised by borrowing by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H.R.S.A. 33.1 et seq., as amended); that the Selectmen are hereby authorized to issue and negotiate any such Bonds or Notes, to determine the rate of interest thereon and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such Bonds or Notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town, the taking by the Board of Selectmen of any such action being hereby declared to be conclusive evidence that the same is in the best interests of the Town; and that the Selectmen are hereby authorized to expend for the aforesaid purposes such monies as may become available to the Town from the Federal government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the said Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended.”

The Moderator then called for a vote on Article 2. Before the voting

began, the Moderator instructed the meeting that the voters would have one hour to cast their ballot. He declared the voting to begin at 2:10 p.m. The hour at 3:10 p.m. having arrived, the Moderator declared the voting closed on Article 2. Two thirds vote being required for passage, the ballots were tallied with the following results: 349 voting, 235 Yes, 114 No, 67.3% voting in the affirmative.

 - D. Tax Collector \$1,000 per year plus expenses.
 - E. Deputy Tax Collector \$100 per year plus expenses.
 - F. Town Clerk \$675 per year plus expenses and auto permit fees.
 - G. Deputy Town Clerk \$100 per year plus expenses.
 - H. Highway Road Agent \$100 per year plus regular hourly rate.
 - I. Moderator \$4.50 per hour for services rendered at Town Meeting and all other Town, State and National elections.
 - J. Deputy Moderator \$4.00 per hour for services rendered at Town Meeting and all other Town, State and National elections.
 - K. Ballot Inspectors \$4.00 per hour.
 - L. Supervisors of Checklist \$175 per year plus \$4.00 per hour for additional work incurred.
 - M. Treasurer of Trust Funds \$550 per year.
 - N. Forest Fire Warden \$150 per year.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sandwich qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next from 10:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. for the casting of ballots and at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 13, 1985, at the Sandwich Central School to act upon the following articles:

(Explanation: Articles 1 through 4 relating to the election of Town and Cooperative School District Officers and proposed Zoning Amendments, will be taken up on Tuesday, March 12 and polls will be open until 7:00 p.m. A second session to consider all other business will be held on Wednesday, March 13 at 7:30 p.m. as per vote of the Town to accept provisions of RSA 39:2a.)

ARTICLE 1. To elect by official ballot all necessary town and cooperative school district officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To see how the Town will vote by official ballot on the following question: Are you in favor of adoption of the amendment to the Zoning Ordinances as proposed by the Planning Board? This amendment establishes a Waterfront District intended to protect certain ponds and lakes from excessive density and development. The following bodies of water are involved: Squam Lake, Bearcamp Pond, Dinsmore Pond, Little Pond, Red Hill Pond, Intervale Pond and Barville Pond.

ARTICLE 3. To see how the Town will vote by official ballot on the following question: Are you in favor of adoption of the amendment to the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board? Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Sandwich, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 1984

NOTE 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

A. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the Town.

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund – The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds – Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action. Included in this fund type are Federal Revenue Sharing, Driveway Plowing, Blanchard and Hall Highway and Sidewalk, Wentworth Library, Conservation Commission and Forestry Committee funds.

Capital Projects Funds – Transactions related to resources obtained and used for the acquisition, construction or improvement of capital facilities are accounted for in Capital Projects Funds. Such resources are derived principally from proceeds of long-term notes or bonds from federal and state grants and gifts.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Trust Funds – Trust Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust by the Town for others.

B. Account Groups (Fixed Assets and Long-Term Liabilities)

All governmental funds and expendable trust funds are accounted for on a spending or “financial flow” measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of “available spendable resources”. Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State, the Town does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

Long-term liabilities expected to be financed from governmental funds are accounted for in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group. This account group is not a fund. It is concerned only with the measurement of financial position and not results of operations. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long-term liabilities are not recognized as governmental fund type liabilities. They are instead reported as liabilities in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group.

C. Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the General, Special Revenue, Capital Projects, and Expendable Trust Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or in the case of judgments and claims against the Town, when there is a probability that such judgments and claims will result in liabilities, the amounts of which can be reasonably estimated. Exceptions to this general rule include: (1) accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay, and (2) principal and interest on general long-term debt which is recognized when due. All Nonexpendable Trust funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting.

D. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations. However, contrary to generally accepted accounting principles, it has not been the practice of the Town to adopt an annual budget for all Special Revenue funds. The Town budget represents departmental appropriations as authorized by annual or special town meetings. The Selectmen may transfer funds between operating categories as they deem necessary. State Statutes require balanced budgets but provide for the use of beginning fund balance to achieve that end. In 1984, beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year-end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures; and are therefore reported as part of the fund balance at December 31 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year. F. Investments

Investments in all instances are stated at cost, or in the case of donated investments, at market value at the time of bequest or receipt.

G. Inventories

Inventory in the General and Special Revenue funds consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost thereof has been recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items were purchased.

H. Accumulated Unpaid Vacation and Sick Pay

Accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay is not accrued in the governmental funds using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Employees may accumulate fifteen days sick leave at a rate of five days per year. Vacation is granted in varying amounts depending on department. Vacation and sick pay accumulation does not exceed a normal year's allowance.

I. Taxes Collected For Others

The property taxes collected by the Town include taxes levied for the Interlakes Cooperative School District and Carroll County which are remitted to these governmental units as required by law. The ultimate responsibility for the collection of taxes rests with the Town.

J. Property Taxes

The National Council on Governmental Accounting, Interpretation 3, referring to property tax revenue recognition, requires disclosure if property taxes receivable, which are to be collected beyond a period of 60 days subsequent to December 31, 1984, are recognized on the balance sheet and not reserved. In accordance with the practice followed by other municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Sandwich annually recognizes, without reserve, all tax receivables at the end of the fiscal year. The Town feels this practice of accrual is justified as it more appropriately matches the liability to the school district entity at December 31, with collections which are intended to finance these payments through June 30 of the following year.

Annually, the Town establishes and raises through taxation an amount for abatements and refunds of property and resident tax revenues known as overlay. All abatements and refunds are charged to this account. The amount raised in 1984 was \$9,821 and expenditures amounted to \$5,351.

As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector sells at tax sale all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due.

The purchaser at tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 18% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the two year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the lien holder.

K. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services and fund capital outlay. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

NOTE 4 – Pension Plan

The Town participates in the State of New Hampshire Retirement System. The Town's contribution for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the entire State plan. Since the actuarial valuation is performed on the entire State plan the amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets is not available. The Town does not have an accrued liability for past service costs. Pension costs amounted to \$2,422 in 1984.

NOTE 5 – Trust Funds

The principal amount of all nonexpendable trust funds is restricted either by law or by terms of individual bequests in that only income earned may be expended. The Town's nonexpendable and expendable trust funds at December 31, 1984, are detailed as follows:

NOTE 6 – Capital Project Fund – Bond or Notes Authorized – Unissued \$927,000

Article No. II of the March 13, 1984 Town Meeting appropriated \$2,838,000 for the purpose of designing and constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities and authorized long-term borrowing not to exceed \$927,000 in accordance with the State of New Hampshire Municipal Finance Act. Interest earned on the fund balance of \$10,000 was the only activity in the project in 1984.

STATEMENT OF BONDED DEBT

The final payment on the Fire Truck Note in the amount of \$10,462.50 principal and interest was made in April of 1984. The Town of Sandwich now has no bonded debt.

SANDWICH SELECTMEN 1984 Annual Report

This report contains many of the completed, continuing and new projects undertaken by the Board of Selectmen during 1984 and brief notes on some of the 1985 warrant articles.

Work on the five bridges on the Sandwich Notch Road was completed as scheduled during the summer of 1984. Durgin Bridge abutment work was started during last summer. During construction several additional repairs were found to be necessary. The additional cost was paid for by contributions from the Quimby Trustees, Historical Society and Sandwich Fair. The entire renovation cost has been paid for through state money and contributions from the above mentioned organizations. The one remaining Town bridge scheduled to be replaced by a culvert was completed this fall also, bringing an end to a project started in the 1960s.

The sewer project for the center is progressing. At the suggestion of voters at the Town Meeting, a study of possible alternate sites for the leach field was made. Two sites were investigated in depth. However, neither one proved to be as suitable or as cost effective as the initially recommended site adjacent to Creamery Brook on Bean Road. The construction grant request has been submitted with state approval to the federal government. When approved, final engineering plans will be completed and submitted for construction bids. A construction schedule will be announced when a contractor is selected. This year's warrant asks the Town to accept Chapter 149-I of the New Hampshire statutes. Approval enables the Town to construct and set up a bookkeeping system for the sewer according to state statutes.

The renovation of the Selectmen's office in the Town Hall will be completed before Town Meeting along with an inside fire stairway from the second floor auditorium. The old vault has been emptied of its' contents and removed to facilitate the completion of the stairway. The collection of old records found in the vault yielded many valuable documents. The Selectmen wish to thank the Sandwich Historical Society for the many hours spent by Betty Peaslee and Connie Hoag in sorting and listing the documents.

The installation of six dumpsters at the Sandwich dump has enabled the Town to eliminate the need to bury trash in the land fill area. An additional dumpster is to be purchased for building materials not suitable for burning. The dumpsters have enabled residents to use the dump for all types of trash each time the dump is open. Continued compliance with the mandatory separation of recyclable materials is necessary to hold costs in line.

Warrant article 21 at the 1984 Town Meeting authorized the selectmen to investigate a system designed for computerizing town records.

The recommended system is to be voted on in this year's warrant.

The Recreation Committee has been in operation for one year. An increase in funds to support additional types of recreational activities for young and old is proposed for 1985.

Residents of Sandwich Slopes have expressed interest in having the Sandwich Slopes Road, a development roadway, taken over by the Town. The initial grade is too steep to be maintained by the Highway Department. An alternate road to replace the present entry section has been planned. The warrant addresses the method of building and funding the project.

In the past 20 years, the town Highway Department has had many changes. In the mid-sixties, the Road Agent would own or hire most of the equipment, hire and fire his own men, maintain his own equipment and use whatever rolling stock the Town owned to build and/or maintain the town roads. The Road Agent had an opportunity to earn an hourly wage plus generate income from equipment rented to the town. His crew now works for the town and are paid wages plus fringe benefits directly from the town.

The Town of Sandwich now owns one road grader, two loaders, a backhoe, three heavy trucks, two pickup trucks, a rock rake and other equipment. A five stall garage to house and maintain this equipment and the equipment itself is valued at over \$500,000.00.

Additional responsibilities have been given to the Road Agent through the years; most recently the maintenance at the town beaches, recycling/stump area at the dump and other town property, as needed, have been added. Changes in the system of funding used by the state have resulted in additional planning responsibilities for the Road Agent.

Future changes in the Highway Department requiring the attention of the Board of Selectmen and Road Agent concern the development of a master plan to upgrade and maintain all town roads on an annual and long-range basis, and the need for supervision of a town employee whose responsibility will be the operation and maintenance of the pending sewer system.

The present policy of electing the Road Agent for one year fails to set standards for the position other than that of being a registered voter. The position does not require a drivers license, knowledge of training or managing personnel, operation of equipment, knowledge of short or long range planning, knowledge of road building or management of budget. The only evaluation is the election process.

Provisions to replace an unqualified elected Road Agent while in office are complicated, time consuming, and expensive. The Selectmen recommend the Road Agent be appointed as noted in the warrant.

Once again the Town of Sandwich has become the recipient of a new trust fund. It will be known as the Doris L. Benz Trust Fund and the earned income will be spent by the Selectmen for the betterment of the town.

The Board of Selectmen expresses its thanks for the many hours given by volunteers serving on town committees during 1984. Our town government functions well because of such efforts.

**SANDWICH HOME NURSING ASSOCIATION
1984 Annual Report**

The Sandwich Home Nursing Association, incorporated on July 22, 1980, has had increased activity in 1984. In 1983, 29 people in the Town of Sandwich received skilled nursing care and/or physiotherapy in their homes, whereas in 1984 such care was received by 42 of our residents. Also, in 1983, only 710 home visits were made in Sandwich by the VNA nurses, while 761 such visits were made here in 1984. Thus, in 1984, there was a 44% increase in the number of patients treated here, and a 7% increase in the number of home visits made.

The level of skilled nursing care our townspeople are receiving in their homes has been raised substantially because patients are being discharged from the hospitals earlier than formerly and at a stage of their recovery when they still need skilled nursing care. In other words they represent continuing hospital care which is being transferred to their homes, where their recovery will continue for some more days or weeks. In this way, much of the cost of treating the illnesses of our people is being shifted from what has to be paid to the hospital onto what the patients and their towns have to pay for the continuation of their nursing care at home. Our hospitals are facing even more cutbacks in what Medicare and Medicaid will pay them for each "Diagnosis Related Group" of cases, and so patients in 1984 were discharged even a little earlier than they were in 1983.

The Wolfeboro VNA has continued to bill insurance carriers, and Medicare and Medicaid for every possible service they render our people whenever the insurance they hold makes it possible. Those Sandwich residents who are not covered by any insurance are billed for the services they receive and are requested to pay as much as possible.

Ninety-five percent of the Sandwich residents who received on-going home care in 1984 were age 65 or older, and generally were living on fixed incomes. All home health services are provided under direct or orders from the physician who requested them, and the VNA continues to provide the ordered services without full payment being received from those residents who cannot afford to pay for their care.

As we see in Table 1, the stipulated annual fee being charged the Sandwich Home Nursing Association for 1985 is \$8,350, which is a 28% increase over the \$6,500 fee charged us in 1984. This is due to a projected increase in number of patients who will be treated and in home visits that will be made in 1985, and to an expected 6% increase in the VNA's costs, involving salaries, supplies and office maintenance. In Table 1 we also see an increase in the amount paid by the Town every year, except in 1983, but the increase for 1985 will be only 45%, which is much less than that of 1984, when the early discharge of patients to their homes really began to be felt. The Association will pay \$1,800 of the stipulated fee of \$8,350 for 1985, and (see Table 1) we are requesting that the Town pay the other \$6,550.

In Table 2 we see how much the home care given in Sandwich has cost the VNA in each of the last 4 years, and in 1984 it cost nearly 3 times what it was in 1981. The cost nearly doubled in 1983 over 1982, but in 1984 it was only 38% more. The income from the townspeople's insurance coverage, plus what they paid the VNA nurse in cash, has taken care of from 65% to 87% of the cost of care in the past 4 years, which is a tremendous savings for the Town. In fact, the total cost of the home care for the years 1981 through 1984 was \$53,278.77, and the total amount collected from our townspeople's insurance was \$35,389.74. If we were not able to collect on our people's insurance, which collection is made possible and done for us by the VNA, the Town and the people would have had to pay the difference, which is \$17,889.03. As it is, the Town has paid (see Table 1) \$8,500 in this 4 year period, and it is clear we've gotten our home nursing care at a truly bargain rate.

There are now 140 responding individual and family memberships in the Association, and we are actively seeking new members, and more and larger donations. We especially need memorial gifts and legacies for our Sandwich Home Nursing Trust Fund. Contributions may be sent to the Association, P.O. Box 83, Center Sandwich, N.H. 03227.

SANDWICH PLANNING BOARD

Among other things, 1984 witnessed the revision and reprinting of the town's Subdivision Regulations. The principal changes involved expansion of the definitions section and the inclusion of a more detailed description of road construction specifications. Copies of these Regulations are available at the Selectmen's Office and should be consulted by anyone contemplating subdivision, sale of part of a parcel of land or construction of any sort.

Much effort has been spent in studying ways by which we can better protect our lakes and ponds from pollution and other forms of deterioration. With this in mind, your Planning Board has been pleased to lend its support to the Conservation Commission in their task of identifying Prime Wetlands in Sandwich. Such identification is a vital step in arriving at future decisions affecting the protection of our water supplies through protection of our wetlands. A part of this effort has involved the study of ways by which we can protect our lakes and ponds by guiding growth in these vital areas. It is anticipated that your Planning Board will recommend amendments to the Zoning Ordinance related to the foregoing efforts.

As many of you may know, a neighboring town has been the locale of a struggle between concerned citizens and developers over so-called "funnel developments" on Lake Winnepesaukee. These developments provide access to owners of multiple unit dwellings built on the backland. Presumably these multiple unit dwellings could be time-sharing or would be rented, thus ensuring steady use of the units and the lake or ponds. Your Planning Board has serious misgivings about the ecological impact of this type of development. These misgivings are shared by the State which is currently conducting studies at State level. Until these studies are completed and a report issued, and until we know much more about how to guide this type of growth, your Planning Board feels that a careful approach would be wise. Accordingly, we are recommending an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance that would make it less attractive for developers to engage in this type of development in Sandwich.

On the personnel front, members of the Planning Board have devoted many of their evenings to attending lectures sponsored by the New Hampshire Municipal Association. These are lectures on land use law and are given by attorneys experienced in land use matters. They are designed to keep town officials informed on the latest developments in an increasingly complex field. Another important source of information is the input we receive from our fellow townspeople without whose friendly support we could not operate effectively.

SANDWICH BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT 1984 Annual Report

In 1984, the Board of Adjustment met five times and held four hearings on appeals. No motions for rehearing were filed.

Three of the hearings involved requests for variances from the terms of the Town Zoning Ordinance. One request for approval of a permitted use under the Special Exception provisions relating to the Historic District was considered and decided by the Board.

All of the applications for appeal received in 1984 were heard. Three were decided during the year, and one was continued over into 1985.

Meetings of the Board and Hearings before it were conducted in the Town Hall. When helpful in understanding the appeals, members of the Board went into the field to view the sites involved.

At the annual organization meeting of the Board in the Spring, Stuart W. Heard requested that the Chairmanship be passed on to another member of the Board and that he be allowed to serve out his term as a regular member of the Board. Members of the Board noted his long stint of service to the Board as its Chairman and expressed their gratitude to Stuart. Phil W. Dodge was elected by the Board to serve as its Chairman for the ensuing year and has done so since the organization meeting.

The Board wishes to take this opportunity to remind anyone contemplating a new building, making changes or additions to existing structures, or changing uses of their property to review carefully the Zoning Ordinance of the Town. If required, application for the appropriate permit should then be made to the Selectmen. This could eliminate unnecessary appeals and delays.

When an appeal is necessary, the Board will conscientiously and thoroughly consider the request. Applicants for a hearing can help the Board in its consideration of the request by making an orderly and complete, but brief presentation of all the facts pertaining to the appeal.

SANDWICH CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1984 Annual Report

Prime wetlands were the chief topic of interest for the Sandwich Conservation Commission in 1984. Over 40 town citizens participated in the Wetlands Evaluation Team, exploring, studying and mapping eight wetlands in Sandwich. Voters will be asked at the March 1985 Town Meeting to accept as "prime wetlands" three small marshes on Squam Lake, three small bogs north of Rt. 113, the Bearcamp Pond marsh, Bearcamp River below the pond, Meadow Brook, Atwood Brook, Red Hill River's marshes, and the Red Hill Pond wetlands.

The Commission's study does not add any new restrictions to existing wetland ordinances and law in town or the state. It does, however, provide the town and the state with the first large-scale maps of the wetlands and with detailed information concerning the resources of the wetlands. This information should help the Sandwich Planning Board and the State Wetlands Board in ruling on subdivisions, construction sites, and dredge and fill permits in or near the wetlands.

There were other unexpected results of the wetlands study. The Sandwich citizens who began the study perhaps out of curiosity ended the study with a deep appreciation of and fondness for these little known marshes, bogs and rivers. The knowledge they gained in the field proved invaluable in assessing and shaping the final report concerning the wetlands. This love for and knowledge of the wetlands is a new-found resource that should serve the town in many future discussions about wetlands in Sandwich. The Commission also learned that the team approach, combined with the technical skills of a consultant, worked well and might be used in the future on other Commission projects. The WET team would certainly be a central part of future studies of other wetlands in Sandwich.

SANDWICH RECREATION 1984

The following is a report of the recreational activities in Sandwich:

JANUARY-FEBRUARY: A ski program is held on Friday afternoons for school children, alpine skiing at Ossipee Mt. and cross country skiing on the school grounds. The Quimby Fund pays for instructor lessons at Gunstock Ski Area for the Alpine program and Gunstock's Cross Country Out-reach program instructs on the school grounds.

This year the Sandwich Recreation Committee was formed to handle the set-up and administration of the town beaches and to study new activities that can be offered to townspeople. This committee distributed a survey at town meeting which will be used as a guide for future recreational offerings.

JANUARY-MARCH: The Fair Association has again offered its large commercial building for use as an indoor skating rink.

APRIL-JUNE: Sandwich has a major and minor Little League Baseball Team which participate in the Meredith Youth League. The minor league was again champions this year and congratulations to Joanne O'Conner for another great job.

Preparations for the busy summer season begins, this includes cleaning the grounds, getting the courts ready, and scheduling the activities for the summer.

JUNE-AUGUST: A ten week program which includes activities for adults and children:

- Adult and youth tennis lessons, culminating in tournaments in August during Old Home Week.
- The town offers an expanded swimming program at the town beach, many new activities were introduced.
- Tennis matches are played against other towns for the young students to test their skills.
- A trip was taken to the Volvo Tennis Tournament, about ten people went this year.
- Activities during Old Home Week include bike races, running, tennis, woodsman field day, and many others.
- The Mug Softball Team, with many members from Sandwich, won the Meredith Men's Softball League Championship for the fourth consecutive year. Their four year record stands at 68-8.

SEPTEMBER-OCTOBER: The Sandwich youth soccer team participates in the Meredith Soccer program, this year Sandwich was league champions defeating Heath, Inc. 2-1, finishing the season at 4-1-1. Games were played against Tamworth and Moultonboro also.

Many thanks to all the people who have given time, ideas, and support for the recreation program this year.

SANDWICH RECREATION COMMISSION

The first year of existence for the Sandwich Recreation Commission was primarily one of orientation and learning for its new members. The Commission was formed with several immediate goals in mind. First, to organize and oversee the Town Beach program, which was no longer eligible for the Red Cross organizational and financial support it had received in past years. Second, and more important, the Commission was asked to evaluate the recreational needs of the community, and to structure a long range plan to meet those needs.

Our first efforts after Town Meeting 1984 were geared towards the Beach Program. Town residents were offered a well organized and diverse program with approximately fifty participants enrolled in swimming classes ranging from beginner to advanced lifesaving and aquacizes. Mention should be made of the fine job done by the two lifeguards, Kim Chappell and Cathy Hope. Availability of public rest facilities at the various local and surrounding swimming areas was less than satisfactory this past summer. We feel confident this situation has been corrected by securing a written committment from a new rental company with a strong interest in servicing our area.

During the recent November election, a recreational survey was conducted by distributing questionnaires to all voters in the Town Hall. The objective was to determine how townspeople felt about a wide range of recreational possibilities. Four hundred and nineteen questionnaires were completed, and the results of which are being prepared for publication in the near future. Our thanks to John Mayer for his help in formulating and analyzing the survey.

Through the volunteer efforts of Jere Burrows and Patsy Slothower, cross country ski activities have been explored this winter. Public ski trails have been mapped and advertised, a ski waxing clinic was held, and cross country ski instruction was offered to the townspeople through the Gunstock Outreach Program.

Defining how to work in conjunction with the Quimby Trust recreational program and the possibility of incorporating this program into a central Town Program, as well as the development of Town property in North Sandwich for recreational purposes, have been given attention and will continue to be addressed in the coming year.

The Recreation Commission meets the first Monday of each month at nine a.m. Scheduled meetings are held at the Town Hall, and all interested townspeople are encouraged to attend. Your input is vital to the proper development of your recreation program. Those wishing to volunteer their services for any recreational activities are also urged to contact commission members or attend the meetings.

**SANDWICH POLICE DEPARTMENT
Annual Report – 1984**

This year the Town purchased a four-wheel drive Chevrolet Blazer to replace the Ford "LTD" cruiser. This type of vehicle is very useful when one considers the fact that approximately half the roads in Town are not paved and there are a great number of isolated areas in Town. The Blazer has allowed us a greater level of mobility in patrolling isolated areas as well as being able to respond to calls during periods of inclement weather. Several favorable comments have been received from people in Town concerning the fact that the Blazer is the right type of vehicle for use in the Town of Sandwich and based on my experience so far with the vehicle I wholeheartedly agree.

The fingerprinting program at the Grade School and the Emergency Medical Information Program were continued this year and I would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone to update the information contained on their medical information sheets. We are also reviewing several different safety education programs for presentation at the Grade School and hopefully the presentations will begin in the spring of 1985. If anyone has interest in a particular area such as crime prevention, etc., and would like either personal information or a presentation made to a group they belong to, please contact me as I am more than willing to assist in any way possible.

I have noticed that periodically people hesitate to call the police because they don't want to bother them with something they feel might not be important. It might be a vehicle they observed in an unusual place or a problem they don't know who else to call about. If you are in this category, please feel free to call. We would rather check into ten things that turn out to be alright, than miss catching one burglar or thief, and if we cannot help you with a particular problem then we probably can put you in contact with someone who can.

In closing I would like to thank Troop "E" of the New Hampshire State Police, the Carroll County Sheriff's Department, and all the other Town Departments as well as the citizens of Sandwich for their continued assistance and support throughout the year.

The demands for service from your Department continues to grow rapidly. This year we again responded to a record number of calls. All categories except false alarms and mutual aid calls saw increases. We experienced almost a 50% increase in medical emergencies which represented 59% of our emergency calls. Chimney fires accounted for 15% of our calls but 70% of our fire calls! Again PLEASE have your chimney cleaned and checked at least once a year.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Henry H. Richards for the many years of very dedicated service to the department. Hal has had to retire due to poor health but we look forward to his continued moral support—again from all the gang, Thank You Hal.

We have had several new members join during the past year but we have a very urgent need for additional people, particularly for daytime response. We are currently six members under our minimum roster and could use ten to twelve new members. Anyone interested in serving our community is urged to contact any of the department members or the Selectmen's office.

Training of our membership to better serve the Town continues. Your Chief Officers attended a Chief seminar in December. We have members attending the various mutual aid fire schools and twice monthly department training sessions. Currently we have five members taking the nationally approved Firefighter I certification course which is meeting weekly in Moultonboro. We also have one member taking the EMT I certification course which is meeting twice a week in Conway.

During the past year the department purchased a new electric suction unit with donated funds in memory of Eva Fellows. This unit along with other medical equipment purchased during the year will help us to better serve our Town.

We have a very urgent need for a vehicle to transport our rescue and medical equipment. We currently have to load and transport this equipment in private vehicles. This slows down our response time and further presents the possibilities that a piece of needed equipment was left at the station. We currently have a committee studying our needs to try and determine the type of vehicle needed and what the probable

cost would be. Later on in 1985 we will be mounting a campaign to fund the purchase of this rescue vehicle which we hope to be able to purchase without asking for tax dollars. Your help and support will be greatly appreciated.

I wish to thank all that have given time, help and support this past year, particularly our members, The Sirens and the Selectmen.

NOTICE TO VETERANS

Any veteran entitled to tax exemption in order to obtain same, must file with the Selectmen his permanent application before April 15th or contained in an envelope addressed to such officials postmarked by that date.
