

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sunapee in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at I.O.O.F. Hall in said Sunapee on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2 Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing Games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

Article 3 To hear the reports of Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors, and committees, or other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 4 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$3,000.00 to pay the balance due on Tractor Note and \$450.00 for interest on its Notes, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2,700.00 for Town Officers Salaries, \$1,200.00 for Town Officers Expenses, \$450.00 for Election and Registration, \$100.00 for Municipal Court, \$400.00 for Repair and Expenses of Town Property, \$2,000.00 for Police Department, \$30.00 for Vital Statistics, \$4,000.00 for the Fire Department, \$150.00 for the Health Department, \$1,500.00 for the District Nurse Association, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 6 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$12,000.00 for Highway Summer Maintenance, \$1,000.00 for Bridge repair at South Sunapee, \$250.00 for the Town Dump, \$10,000.00 for Highway Winter Maintenance, \$5,000.00 for Road Oil, \$3,000.00 for machinery Maintenance, \$3,300.00 for Street Lights, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$713.00 for the Library, \$4,000.00 for Town Poor and Old Age Assistance, \$1,000.00 for the care of its Cemeteries, \$7,000.00 for the Water Department (including Debt. and interest) and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 8 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 each year for Five Years to assist our Doctor, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 9 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$150.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 10 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 11 To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the years 1950 and 1951, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 12 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2,000.00 for work on Play Ground, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 to assist the Fish and Game Club to advertise Lake Sunapee, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 14 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for Band Concerts at George's Mills and Sunapee Harbor during July and August, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 15 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 for the Collection of Garbage for the entire year, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 16 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the observance of Memorial Day or take any action pertaining thereto.

Article 17 To see if the Town will vote to raise \$450.00 to maintain Information Booth and a Committee to be appointed by the Selectmen to take charge of Booth.

Aricle 18 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following highways:

- (1) From the so called Belloir Homestead via the so called Frank Muzzey road to the New State Highway.
- (2) From the so called Belloir crossing, West on former Route 103 to Cemetery, thence from Cemetery corner West on Short cut to Newport to the intersection of New State Highway.

Article 19 To see what action the Town will take in regard to extension of year round (Summer and Winter) Water Service to the John Trietschel Homestead, to raise money for the same, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 20 To see if the Town will vote for Eight additional Street Lights in South Sunapee, six on Mt. View Lake Road, two to replace on State Road, raise money for the same. Also to see what action the Town will take relative to a Dump for South Sunapee, raise money for the same, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 21 To see if the Town will take over the Road leading from Maple Street as far as Russell Colby's property, raise money for the same, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 22 To see if the Town will vote to change the Names of the streets at George's Mills, which now are named—from New London to Grantham, "Main Street." From store (Russells) to Sunapee, "Sunapee Street." From Springfield to Lake Street, "Lover's Lane." The above streets to be renamed—beginning from the New London Line to Sunapee, "Main Street." Beginning from Main Street to Springfield Line, "Springfield Road." Beginning from Main Street Square to Springfield Line, "Prospect Road." And pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 23 To see if the Town will vote to name these streets at George's Mills which at present have no names—Jobes Creek Road to Hubers, "Westwood Road." Road from now named Main Street to Melendy's, "Meadow Brook Road." Road from now named Lover's Lane to Grantham, "Stony Brook Road." And pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 24 To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to arrange for the rental or purchase of a Modern Combination Shovel-ouder to replace our old Town Shovel and other old equipment, and to execute contract for the purchase with payments not to exceed three years, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 25 To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Water Commissioners to increase the Water Rents, namely \$2.00 for the first faucet, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 26 To see what action the Town will take in regard to extension for summer water service to William A. Cronin, to raise money for the same, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 27 To see if the Town will vote to extend a four inch Water Main on West Court as far as Victor Gregory's, put in a Fire Hydrant or Hydrants and raise the money for the same, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 28 To see if the Town will vote to extend the side walk from the John Bartlett homestead to Ralph Alexander's driveway and raise money for same, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 29 To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

Special visual tests were given during the year to all school pupils by Dr. Ralph Benson, Optometrist of Newport. These tests were of great value in finding special difficulties of vision.

Sunapee was fortunate in having the N. H. Mobile Chest X-ray Unit and many took advantage of this opportunity to have free Chest X-rays,

We have had very few cases of communicable diseases in the school this last year but there has been considerable absentee-ism in the lower grades due to various forms of grippe and colds.

New scales with an attachment for the measurement of heights have been added to the health equipment at the school,

The greatest health need among school pupils is better dental care and parents are urged to cooperate by having their children make regular visits to their dentists. During the month of August the local nurse was relieved by Mrs. Dora Simpson of Georges Mills.

The association is very grateful for the gift of a hospital bed by Mrs. Neilson. This bed is available for the use of any patient in Sunapee.

I wish to thank the people of Sunapee, the board of the Lake Sunapee Nursing Association, the doctors, parents, teachers, local organizations and the town officials for the cooperation given to our nursing program. I especially wish to express my appreciation to Dr. John H. Munro who was always very helpful to our health program during his years of practice in Sunapee.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Sunapee School Board:

I herewith submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools,

Enrollment

The enrollment for the school year 1949-50 is 199. In September the first grade enrollment was 30 whereas the previous September it had been 20. As of January 1, 1950 there were 28 pupils in the first grade. The size of the first grade has made it necessary to split the pupils in grade 2 between the two primary rooms. If the entering classes continue to be as large as the present one, we will be seriously cramped for space in the elementary grades in a few years.

This year there are but two tuition pupils enrolled—one in the high school and one in the grades.

Teachers

The supply of teachers at the high school level is much greater and with the exception of one or two fields—such as home economics and commerce—does not constitute a real problem.

The supply of elementary teachers is quite a different matter. We are faced with a serious shortage of lower grade teachers. With increased enrollments in these grades and still an insufficient number of people in the colleges taking elementary work, this situation is likely to continue for many years.

If we expect to get good elementary teachers in our schools, each of us should urge young people desiring to teach, to train at this level. Employment opportunities will be much better for grade positions than for high school.

We are more fortunate than most communities in the small number of vacancies on the teaching staff. This year there is only one change in the faculty.

In-Service Training

Dr. Anna Philbrook, Director of the N. H. Child Guidance Clinic, conducted a course in Mental Hygiene through the University of New Hampshire Extension Service. The course was held in Newport during the first semester. It attracted social workers, nurses, clergymen and housewives as well as teachers. One of the elementary teacher took the course.

Courses of Study

A new course entitled Contemporary Problems has been added to the high school curriculum. The course is intended to give upper classmen a more thorough understanding of current social, economic and political problems inasmuch as they will soon become citizens in our complicated society.

We are now offering Junior and Senior English as separate courses where previously the two have been combined. This should make for more effective instruction in those courses.

Handwriting

We have endeavored to concentrate this year on improving the handwriting of the students. This is something that involves all grade levels but is praticularly important in the elementary grades where the proper writing habits must be formed.

It is hoped that next year we may offer a specialized handwriting service. Many New Hampshire communities have adopted this writing system and the actual progress shown in a year is remarkable.

Transportation

It was necessary to provide additional bus facilities beyond the anticipated needs of the present budget. Mr. Arthur Nutting purchased a new Chevrolet 48-passenger bus, expecting to combine both his routes with the one bus. However, the number of bus pupils on the route totaled 55—too great a number to be carried in one bus and still comply with the law. Therefore, Mr. Nutting is operating a bus to the Wendell section in addition to the regular Newbury-Mt. Sunapee run. The increase in bus pupils has been largely in the Mt. Sunapee section.

Repairs

During the summer the entire building was given a thorough cleaning by the janitor. The auditorium was redecorated—much improving the appearance of this area.

The ends of the hallways were repaired and repainted.

The cement steps leading into the building were rebuilt.

The cement floors in Room X, boys' and girls' basements and lower corridor were painted—improving both cleanliness and appearance.

The floors in the upper corridor and the Freshman-Sophomore room were sanded and refinshed.

New Equipment

The major items of new equipment included:

35 movable desk and chair units for the Freshman-Sophomore room.

1 typewriter was exchanged.

Bleachers for the stage were constructed by the shop classes, 1 set of Health Scales.

1 electric refrigerator (additional electrical refrigerator has been loaned by a commercial company).

(Both electric stoves have been replaced.)

School Survey Committee

In accordance with the vote of the District, the School Board appointed a committee, composed of Leo L. Osborne, Mrs. Hope Leone and Louis Gregory, to serve with them to investigate present and future school needs. It is the aim of this group to carry on any studies pertaining to school needs in conjunction with community needs so that when and if building plans are presented, it will be on the basis of town planning rather than for the school to operate separately in the matter.

The State Borad of Elucation is in the process of conducting a survey of the Sunapee schools. This will include an appraisal of the present plant and facilities and project what the future needs are likely to be in terms of the birth rate and other factors. Upon completion of this survey by the State Department, it is expected that the School Board and Committee will proceed with their studies.

Conclusion

The work of the school touches many phases of community activity. It is my hope that our accomplishments will be such as to merit the continued interest and generous support of the citizens of Sunapee.

SUNAPEE SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the School District of Sunapee qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the I. O. O. F. Hall in said District on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March 1950, at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon to act upon he following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- Article 5. To choose one or more Auditors and such other Officers and Agents as the voters may judge necessary.
- Article 6. To hear and act upon the reports of the School Board, Treasurers, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen.
- Article 7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate \$48,880.49, as recommended by the School Board in in its annual report, for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officers, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district; and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 8. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,00 to be used for preliminary study and sketches—if the School Board and School Study Committee deem it advisable.

Article 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
