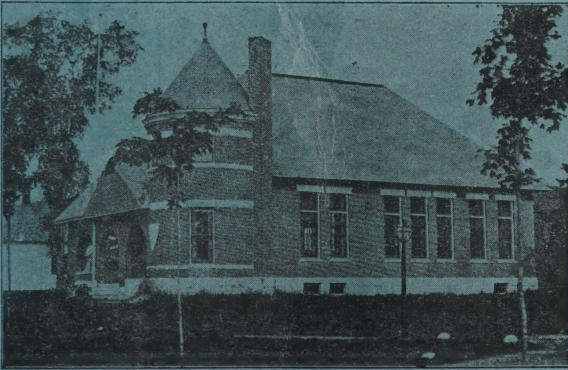

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sutton in the
County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to
vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Pillsbury Memorial Hall in said Sutton, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

2A. To see if the town will vote to sponsor WPA projects and raise and appropriate money for the same.

3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of aid to persons on public welfare.

4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges.

5. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for highway construction or accept Town Road Aid for graveling Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for the same.

5A. To see if the town will vote to install 5 or 6 additional street lights at Blaisdell Lake. Two on the highway leading to Bradford and four on Watkins Avenue, so-called, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting.

6A. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to the purchase of additional fire fighting equipment and raise and appropriate money for the same.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day celebration.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day celebration.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the Sutton Free Library, beyond that required by law.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a free bed in the New London Hospital.

12. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount for the early payment of taxes.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

13A. To see if the town will vote to raised and appropriate a sum of money for the Darthmouth-Sunapee Lake Region Association.

14. To see if the town will vote to make any alterations in regard to the quarters for the Sutton Free Library and raise and appropriate money for the same.

15. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading past the Wadleigh place.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE OVERSEER OF THE POOR

I wish to take this time to thank the voters for the confidence placed in me at the 1938 Town Meeting in electing me to the office of Overseer.

At the beginning of the year there were some able-bodied persons without work and in some cases sickness in the family. These people were obliged to call for aid. After starting the WPA project nearly every able-bodied person, eligible for WPA work, was given employment thus dropping these cases from our relief rolls.

At the close of the year we report only two direct relief town cases and nine Old Age Assistance cases.

For the year 1939, with a small appropriation for WPA work, our relief costs should drop one thousand dollars.

From the statistical table it will be noted that the percent of attendance is even better than last year which was excellent, both above the average for the state. A very commendable drop in the number of cases of tardiness also deserves special mention. A decrease from 2.44 per pupil to .69 per pupil is shown. Eight less pupils were registered than during the previous year. However, there was a decrease of only about four in the average attendance. A total of 79 pupils were registered in the schools of the district, twenty other elementary pupils attended in Warner, and seventeen high school pupils went to other districts. There were in all 116 pupils residing in the town and attending public schools, one less than last year.

One of the chemical toilets at the Mills School needs to be replaced, as it has required repairs and is badly rusted. We would suggest that a new septic toilet be installed in place of this. This new type of toilet requires no chemicals, and will run satisfactorily on about 2-3 pails of water daily. It is odorless and does not freeze readily. Toilets of this type have been in use two years in two of the districts of this supervisory union, and have proven very satisfactory. They have not frozen and the districts have saved annually at least \$8-10 per toilet in cost of chemicals. The initial cost of the equipment is about the same as that for a chemical toilet.

All the chemical toilets in the schools of the district have been in use a long time and will soon need

to be replaced. This ought to be done gradually beginning this year, so that the expense may be spread over several years, if possible.

During the year 1937-'38 the pupils of the local schools have in general made good progress as a result of the efforts of teachers and parents, in cooperation with the school board and superintendent of schools.

schools. Carlton Bradford Jr., Hope Hayes and George Williams each won prizes of 50c for the best health book in their school. Miss Elizabeth Murphy, State Supervisor of School Nurses, awarded the prizes and dental certificates in June.

In May the schools under the supervision of Mrs. Chase gave an operetta for the benefit of the health fund.
