

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

Annually, municipalities within this state prepare reports to their citizens which summarize the challenges and activities of various boards, committees and departments over the past year. The annual report also advises citizens of plans for the future. We urge Swanzey's citizens to read the reports submitted by boards, committees and departments of the Town which provide services and support for Swanzey's 6,530 residents.

As in past year's, work has continued in 1995 and will proceed in 1996 on the Town's Covered Bridges.

*Cresson Bridge. Rehabilitation of the Cresson Bridge, closed in December of 1993, began in September of 1995. Wright Construction, Inc., of Mt. Holly, VT, was selected by the NH Department of Transportation (NHDOT) to perform the necessary rehabilitation work. It is hoped that this bridge will re-open in early summer. The State is funding 80% of the cost of this project currently estimated at \$785,000. The Town's share, which has been funded through capital reserve, is anticipated to be approximately \$160,000 or 20% of the final project cost.

*Carlton Bridge. The Town has received approval from NHDOT for 80%/20% funding for the rehabilitation of this bridge closed in January of 1996 due to structural deterioration. State funds for this project will be available after July 1 and it is hoped that the rehabilitation, with an estimated total project cost of \$445,000, can be completed expeditiously. The Town's share of this project, approximately \$90,000, has also been funded through capital reserve.

*Slate Bridge. Efforts have continued over the past year to promote the re-construction of this covered bridge which was lost to arson in March of 1993. A committee dedicated to raising the estimated \$300,000 necessary for this project has been formed and begun work. To raise interest and awareness of the project, Slate Bridge T-Shirts have been designed and are available for purchase at locations around Town and at the Town Hall. Raising the funds necessary to re-build this bridge will be hard work requiring the help of many hands, but this goal can be achieved with everyone working together. If you have ideas or are interested working on this project, contact our office.

Much time and town resources have been directed toward resolution of proposed obstruction clearing on private properties surrounding the Dillant-Hopkins Airport operated by the City of Keene in Swanzey. The Cheshire County Commissioners supported the abutters and Town's position in that they found no public necessity for the obstruction clearing currently proposed by the City. The Commissioner's decision has been appealed by the City of Keene to the

Supreme Court and it is anticipated further efforts will be required to uphold the position of the Commissioners and prevent destruction of thousands of trees in and around the airport.

Much activity has occurred over this past year in the area of Public Safety Services.

*Police Department. We are pleased to report completion in early 1996 of the recruitment process for a new police chief with the hiring of Eric S. Sargent, a former Swanzey police officer who most recently served as Chesterfield Police Chief. We also wish to take this opportunity to express our sincere appreciation for the assistance during this past year provided by the New Hampshire State Police and their officers, Sergeant Michael A. Leclair and Corporal Peter F. Riesenbergh, who provided interim administrative services and more for the department since May of 1995. Several new full time police officers have also been hired since last Town Meeting including an officer whose position will be partially funded through a COPS FAST Grant for three years. Also during the past year some interim improvements were made to the police facility when the Town unexpectedly acquired a manufactured housing unit by tax deed. The addition of the space provided by this unit doubled the department's working area from approximately 600 square feet to 1,500 square feet for the departments 8 full time and 10 part time personnel. The board extends to the Police Benevolent Association thanks for their efforts and financial support related to the necessary building renovations.

*Fire Department. The Fire Department has also experienced several challenges in 1995 including resignation of its chief in October. At the writing of this report, Lee D. Dunham is interim fire chief and we hope to soon make a regular appointment of a new fire chief in the near future.

*Public Safety Facilities. In the fall of 1995, the process of evaluating facility needs for the Town's Public Safety operations began with the appointment of the Public Safety Facility Committee (PSFC). This committee's work is not complete and will continue throughout the upcoming year. Initially, the committee has been considering the feasibility of a shared public safety facility. Presently the focus is a facility on Route 32 south of Wilson Pond. The site under consideration seems to be a major concern when looking at a joint facility for both police, fire and emergency management operations. As the PSFC's work continues, we urge citizens to participate whenever possible as improvements to the Town's Public Safety facilities will need to be addressed in the next three to five years.

Finally, we are working with Southwestern Community Services, Inc. on two grants which will provide for housing rehabilitation in the Village of West Swanzey. One grant is


directed toward existing multi-family housing units will result in the enhancement of 12 existing units for housing low and moderate income families. The other grant currently proposed through Southwestern Community Services, Inc., will provide assistance for rehabilitation of single family homes in that same area.

At Town Meeting 1996 much time will be devoted toward consideration of the proposed operating and capital outlay budget for the Town. The budget recommended by Selectmen is approximately 3.5% less than that approved by voters for 1995 and is anticipated to produce little change in the Town portion of the tax rate. Selectmen and department heads continue to strive to develop operations and budgets pursuing the most cost effective methods of delivering services to our citizens while continuing to address necessary capital project needs faced by the Town. The support and cooperation of town residents assist us in our efforts to reach this goal. As our Town's population continues to grow, it requires expansion of some basic services in order to maintain operations.

In closing, we wish to thank all the boards, committees, commissions, town employees and volunteers who participate in our government's operations and services. The dedication, skills and expertise of these individuals provide the foundation on which the Town can build and better prepare to meet the challenges which will be facing Swanzey in the future.

SELECTMEN OF SWANZEY

TOWN HALL

Citizens of Swanzey access a multitude of services and a wide variety of information regarding Swanzey's Town Government and other governments by calling or visiting the Town Hall. Some of the services provided at Town Hall include motor vehicle registrations, vital statistics, dog licensing, voter registration, tax and sewer bill collections, assessment information, street addressing for E911, land use planning functions, zoning and permitting inquiries, financial operations, program registration and general assistance.

Residents benefited in 1995 from almost a full year of computerized motor vehicle registrations. System implementation went fairly smoothly in early 1995. Because the systems data base is continually updated by the State, paper pre-prints will no longer be sent to the Town. To ensure that the appropriate vehicles are re-registered and fees calculated correctly, residents are required to present their old registrations at re-registration.

Town Hall staff and police staff have continued work in 1995 to improve the data base used by the E911 system addressing unique street numbering and emergency services response situations. We urge residents to clearly mark their property with its assigned street number to assist emergency responders when circumstances make it necessary for a quick response. If you are unsure of your official street address, please contact Town Hall and we will provide you with that information.

General assistance, as required by statute "whenever a person in any town is poor and unable to support himself", is administered by staff at Town Hall with guidelines provided by the Selectmen. In 1995 the number of new cases declined, with 60 new applicants processed. More than 60 families were served with some cases from previous years remaining active. Although, financially the programs requirements declined in 1995, a conservative approach has been utilized for development of the 1996 proposed budget as the proposed welfare reform and the potential elimination of fuel assistance may increase the responsibilities of local government.

The position of Code Enforcement Officer was filled with the hiring of Jim Sager by Selectmen at the end of 1995. This position will insure that the commercial and multi-family housing projects approved by the Planning Board meet code requirements. The Code Enforcement Officer will also be reviewing properties, as required, to ensure compliance with zoning and other regulations.

Again in 1995, we thank the Old Homestead Garden Club for their efforts beautifying the Town Hall and other common areas of the Town. Without the efforts of volunteer organizations like this club, town staff and visitors to our community would not find as much pleasure in the changing seasons.

As they do every four years, activities on the federal, state and local political landscape will keep townspeople and town staff busy with four scheduled elections. We remind voters that polling places have been consolidated into two voting precincts; Precinct 1 which votes at the Town Hall and Precinct 2 which currently votes at the VFW Post on Railroad Street. Consolidation allowed hours at the polling locations for state and federal elections to be expanded. Included in this year's warrant is a proposal for automation of voting which should speed ballot processing and reduce the number of hours required to accurately tally election results. Voters will be given an opportunity to test the proposed "Accuvote" system at Town Meeting this year. If approved, this system will be utilized for the fall primary and federal elections.

The Swanzey Town Hall is regularly open Monday through Friday, excluding holidays, from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. If you have questions regarding your Town, it's government, zoning or other matters, please call 352-7411 or NH RELAY TDD 1-800-735-2964. 

PLANNING BOARD

The Swanzey Planning Board seats 6 members elected by the town, one "ex-officio" member from the Board of Selectmen, and three alternate members appointed by the board itself.

Our responsibilities are to review, update, and amend Swanzey's Master Plan, which guides the Planning Board in regards to decisions that effect the development of the town.

We also have the responsibility of promoting interest in and understanding the town's Master Plan. Copies are available at the Town Hall, and I encourage all to read and comment on it. The board is always open to your comments or suggestions whether they be in person or in writing. We meet the first and third Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall and welcome participation (not to mention the company) from all the citizens of Swanzey.

Reviewing suggestions and amendments to your Zoning Ordinance is another responsibility of the Planning Board. Last year four new zoning proposals were presented for your consideration. A Shorelands Protection District, an Industrial Park District, changes to the Sign Ordinance, and provisions for temporary Manufactured Housing Permits, were all approved by you at Town Meeting.

Because of their potential impact on the development of the town, our Site Plan Review responsibilities apply to all non-residential or Multi-Family uses. Last year we approved 10 site plans and 5 Home Occupations.

We also review all subdivisions and lot line adjustments. We approved 5 subdivisions and 4 boundary line adjustments through the course of last year.

Through the course of this year we will be working on amendments to the Airport Zoning, updating the Master Plan, and, along with members of the Swanzey Conservation Commission, an Aquifer Protection Plan. We encourage anyone with an interest in these topics, (or others), to join us in our discussions.

SWANZEY CONSERVATION COMMISSION
Annual Report 1995

The purpose of the Commission is "for the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources" of the town. The Commission reviews environmental aspects of the application to the Swanzev Planning Board, and Board of Adjustment, and all local applications to the NH Wetlands Board. The Commission has consistently advocated at board meeting for policies protecting the aquifers in Swanzev and continues to work with the Planning Board to develop an aquifer protection ordinance.

We continue to maintain our membership in the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commission. The Commission manages the following properties; the Muster Field in West Swanzev, the Town Forest at Mt. Cresson, and the former Tracy property on Causeway Road. Timber harvesting has recently been completed on a portion of the Town Forest property. Members of the Commission participated in a field day to build and develop a trail system through that property. The conservation easement at Honey Hill is monitored by the Commission and a map and trail guide of this property is available at the Town Hall.

Commission members volunteer their time to present environmental education activities to children at Swanzev Summer Recreation Program. The Commission also holds an annual Ashuelot River canoe trip in the spring which is open to the public.

This year the Commission recommends the appropriation of \$3000. to the Capital Reserve Fund for the acquisition of conservation easements or land. The development of this fund will enable the Town to preserve open space and natural habitat for future populations.

SWANZEY POLICE DEPARTMENT

It has been an emotionally difficult year for officers and residents alike. However, adversity has a way of bringing people together to achieve their common goals and to that end we wish to thank all residents for their support during a difficult time.

The department continues to sustain its level of commitment; while experiencing increased requests for service. Since 1990 total calls for service have dramatically increased more than 200% while our department staffing has only risen by half. The increased calls for service have increased our administrative responsibilities proportionately. Traffic enforcement and officer visibility have conversely decreased due to the amount of time needed to complete the necessary administrative reports.

Some of the changes which have positively affected the operation of this department have been the addition of an officer to fulfill the COPS FAST grant. This has allowed the department to assign one officer on a full time basis to conduct criminal investigations and prosecutions, for which there was a serious need; while maintaining our uniform strength for responding to calls and continuing our patrol functions, albeit, reactive than proactive.

Another positive move, literally for this department, is expansion of the current physical plant which has increased our operating space by 100% over the former building and has aided in improving morale. We continue to use the former station for functions such as evidence storage, records archives and cruiser maintenance supplies.

The Swanzev Police Department continues to pledge its upmost to serve the community and seeks the continued support from the community it serves.

A total of 64 permits were issued in 1995, 43 less than in 1994. The total value of new construction decreased by 41%. The average cost of a site constructed residence increased from \$81,750 to \$82,900.

The Swanzey Zoning Ordinance now in effect requires that a building permit be obtained from the Building Inspector prior to the start of construction or alteration of any building or start of construction of any permanently installed swimming pool.

Plans for any construction involving a non-residential use or multi-family dwelling units must be submitted to the Planning Board for review and approval prior to application for a building permit in accordance with the requirements of Section III.I of the Zoning Ordinance.

Development of any land in the Floor Plain District is prohibited except by special exception from the Swanzey Board of Adjustment and approval by the Building Inspector in accordance with the requirements of Section IX of the Zoning Ordinance.

A copy of the Zoning Ordinance may be obtained at the Town Hall.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

Winter of '95 was low on snow, as we hooked the plows only three or four times. However, the spreaders put out a lot of sand and salt. We performed a lot of maintenance and preventative maintenance on our equipment. By mid March we started graveling and grading the dirt roads. Winds of March also kept us busy with downed trees in the roadways and cemeteries.

In April we started our part of the Matthews Road reclamation project, which involved cleaning and constructing ditches, sloping the banks, and replacing some culverts. We hired Key Blasting to blast some ledge and large rocks. We shimmed some areas with broken asphalt which we salvaged from all over town. Allstate Asphalt then reclaimed the existing pavement and finish graded it. F.W. Whitcomb applied the 2 1/2" base course of asphalt, at a width of 24'. The 1" wearing course will go on in '96.

We replaced a lot of culverts throughout town, increasing the size of most of them, and graveled, graded, and applied dust control to our dirt roads. We prepared the Recycling Center area for paving, as well as the new handicapped accessible area at Richardson Park, and the Highway Garage.

Some of the streets in North Swanzey were hot mix paved, as well as most of Corey Pond Road. We hot mix shimmed part of Marcy Hill, Carleton Road, Webber Hill Road, and Taft Road. We finished constructing Aldrich Road in the DeLuca development, and triple stone sealed a portion of Christian Hill Road. We stone chip sealed some roads with the similar results we had two years ago. When it rained, the stone picked up and the tar tracked off again. Possibly more hot mix paving will be the way in the future.

Heavy rain in late July and August as well as late October and November caused some washouts. We packed ledge stone in the deep washes to hopefully reduce the water velocity in future storms. The most serious problem involving rain was the culvert loss on Rust Way. We replaced the old pipe with a larger elliptical pipe, having to hire an excavator from Leonard Laurence Construction. We are attempting to recoup some of that expense through the FEMA organization.

We improved the Corliss Road by widening, ditching and sloping. Among other things, we built steps from the Fire Station to the back parking lot of Town Hall, helped with the new Police Station by digging utility lines and moving the decks, and installed most of a new Fire Line at the Recycling Center.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The actual cost of all services provided in 1995 with all funding sources is projected to be \$458,422.90. The total cost of services provided for a partial fee, or at no charge to residents in 1995 is projected to be \$13,869.07 for home care and \$2,424.00 for the Meals-On-Wheels wheels.

For 1996, we recommend an appropriation of \$14,000.00 to continue home care services at the current level. We also recommend an appropriation of \$4,532.00 for the Meals-On-Wheels Program.

MONADNOCK FAMILY SERVICES

Monadnock Family Services request your support for the continuation of Keene District Office services. Financing from the Monadnock Region towns is used directly to support outpatient services to Monadnock Region residents. This program provides individual, marital, family and group therapy as well as crisis intervention to people of all ages. During the past year, Monadnock Family Services served over 3,000 adults, children and elderly people, of which, 249 were citizens of Swanzey.

In order to provide mental health services to residents of your town who have no insurance and/or no resources to pay for them, we are asking for \$1.00 per capita. Based on the New Hampshire Office of State Planning estimate from 1994, our request from Swanzey is \$6,530.00. We hope that your support will continue and that you will incorporate this request into your town's budget.

SWANZEY MUSEUM 1995

Brazil was the only country we could add to our list in '95, but we still welcomed over 1,200 visitors from the United States, South America and Europe - an increase of 10% over last year.

Numerous letters and phone calls were received requesting information. Letters from Vermont and Georgia inquired about our coach, post cards were sold by mail to people in Iowa, Indiana, New Jersey and Massachusetts. We also assisted a lady in Woodsville with a special Covered Bridge project she was working on. Although our pictures were not chosen for 1996 we did submit them to Vermont Yankee for their calendar, answered inquiries about our cemeteries, corresponded with a firm in Washington State regarding advertising, allowed the Concord Group Insurance Company to photograph the Amoskeag, for their annual report, assisted students by providing information with school projects, provided both the Historical Society of Cheshire County and Yankee Traveler with information and made a commitment to the Slate Bridge Committee to assist them with historical information about the history of said bridge.

We also assisted the Richmond Public Library with one of their projects. At Christmas time - two final projects - we sent information to the State Library on John Franklin Stratton. They are planning a special exhibit next spring on local band leaders. We also worked with Pamela Russell, of Winchester, who is preparing a book on several towns in our area.

In January a slide presentation was shown at the Museum and in June shown to the Preservation Society. This presentation covers over two hundred old pictures of Swanzeay and is available to any interested group. Groups visiting in addition to the Preservation Society were the Cobble Hill Pines Tenants Assoc., two Scout troops, people from Pilgrim Pines, two groups from Cutler School and another from Woodbound Inn.

Shortly before opening, the V.F.W. Auxiliary presented the Museum with a flag, which was much appreciated. In May we had our annual meeting, the Orientation, and the Board of Directors voted unanimously to allow members of the Historians Afternoon Group to use the Museum one Sunday afternoon, per month, for meetings. As a result five members of the group joined the Museum Committee. A member of staff did a Show and Tell at Mt. Caesar school and the program was well received by 20 plus children who were shown items from "Back When".

We did participate in the InfoLine "History Note of the Week" until it was cancelled in April. We still try to

preserve as much local history as possible.

In the spring we received a computer, a gift from Frank Worcester, and later a bulletin board, from boards of the Cresson Bridge, crafted by Bill Smith. When the grist mill stone was found in Mid-April, it was decided this would be donated to the Museum. After much hard work and careful planning the stone arrived in mid-September, thanks to the Preservation Society and their friends. It is estimated at sixty inches, weighing four ton, and about 250 years old.

Exhibits this year include Music and Momentos of Swanzey Musicians, Hampshire Pottery - Courtesy of Gary and Laurie Boes, Schoolhouses, Pottery by Eoline Wood and Karen Elliott, Toys made by Kingsburys, including two pieces from the movie Jumanji, Paneling and Stained Glass Window from the Thompson homestead, and about one hundred pictures belonging to Denman Thompson or members of his family.

Eoline Woods presented a very interesting program on pottery making. Walter Harrington, WW2 Fighter Pilot explained what equipment they utilized and demonstrated its use.

We had the misfortune to lose three members, David Perry, Kenneth Lysitt and Cecil Plummer. All were good workers and will be missed. If anyone would like to give a Memorial Gift to the Museum, in memory of a loved one, that individual's name will automatically be added to our Memorial Plaque. On Memorial Gifts there is no minimum amount - it is whatever the donor feels comfortable with.

We publicly thank the people at Mt. Caesar Union Library, Stratton Free Library, for their assistance with various projects, the Swanzey Preservation Society and members of the Historians Afternoon Group, for assistance in so many ways, the West Swanzey Fire Department for putting up our flags in the spring, then taking them down in the fall, and Jeff Hurt who has done an excellent job keeping us plowed out. Your many kindnesses are appreciated.

CRESSON BRIDGE REHABILITATION
PROGRESS AND STATUS REPORT
February 14, 1996

The engineering firm of Bettigole, Andrews and Clark (BAC) was retained by the New Hampshire Department of Transportation to perform an in-depth inspection of the bridge, prepare an Inspection Report and prepare a Rating and Recommendation Report.

The in-depth inspection of the bridge was completed by BAC in March 1994. The inspection team found that the bottom chord members and diagonal truss members that support the bridge deck system were in very poor condition. The bridge deck planking was severely worn, and the metal roofing was corroded and leaking in several locations. BAC Engineers recommended that the lower chord members, floor beams, bridge deck planking, siding, metal roofing, and diagonal members in the support areas be replaced.

Wright Construction of Mt. Holly Vt, was awarded the contract for \$488,361.04 in January 1995. It was anticipated that work could progress through the winter and the bridge could be reopened to traffic in June 1996.

Construction crews began removing the siding on April 22, 1995 to permit a detailed inspection of all structural members. An inspection team consisting of representatives of the New Hampshire Department of Transportation and the consultant design firm of BAC met with Wright Construction Company personnel to inspect areas of the bridge that had not been accessible for inspection prior to the removal of the siding. The inspection team discovered 24 upper chord members and 33 additional lattice members that needed replacement. The Contractor agreed to replace the 57 additional members for a lump sum price of \$84,500. Work was suspended until August 28, 1995 to allow time for delivery of the select structural lumber needed to begin repairs.

The first delivery of lumber arrived on September 11, 1995. On September 15th the precast concrete footings for the temporary support system were placed in the river and work began on the first phase of the temporary support system. Replacement of structural members began on October 10th but had to be suspended on October 23rd to stabilize the temporary support system. Heavy rains and high water had undermined the temporary footings near the pier and caused them to settle. Repairs were made to the support system when the water levels returned to normal levels and work resumed on the structural repairs to the north truss. All upper chord members and most of the lattice members had been replaced by late November. The temporary support system was modified to allow removal of the lower chord members to begin on January 4, 1996. The new bottom chords and floor beams were in place by the end of the second week of February.

SLATE COVERED BRIDGE FUNDRAISING COMMITTEE

The Slate Covered Bridge Committee was formed in November of 1995 with the sole objective to raise the 20% necessary to meet the state's requirements to rebuild the bridge.

To date we have designed and put on sale, Slate Bridge T-Shirts, which have been very well received.

With a strong and dedicated committee, work is continuing in other areas of fund raising. We have many ideas in the making, all of which will be publicized as we go.

So keep your eyes and ears open; this bridge was a part of Swanzey's history, and we are looking to all available avenues for resources!

ASHUELOT RIVER LOCAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE
Annual Report to Town Meeting

Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (LAC) was convened in October 1994 by the Commissioner of the NH Dept. of Environmental Services. During this first year, the LAC made progress toward understanding the issues that make the Ashuelot such a valuable asset for the region and towns through which it flows. The Ashuelot is protected for 64 miles from its origin at Butterfield Pond in Washington to its confluence with the Connecticut River in Hinsdale.

The Ashuelot was designated to the NH Rivers Management and Protection Program by the legislature in 1993 (RSA 483), following nomination by local communities. The program establishes management and protection for rivers with special qualities in the eyes of the towns that share them. The program has statewide and local components. Statewide, the Department is responsible for ensuring that water use does not leave protected rivers with less than the essential minimum flow. Locally the statute authorizes Local Advisory Committees to prepare River Corridor Management Plans for the protection of stream and riparian (river banks and near by uplands) assets, such as canoe access, wildlife habitat, and water quality.

The LAC has heard expert presentation on water quality, wildlife, endangered species, river bank buffer zones, and instream flow. Issues thus far identified as priorities for the LAC plan include education, local shoreland protection, canoe access, water quality monitoring with plan to act on pollution when found, historic preservation, and protection of the river corridor as a unified greenway through the region (does not mean public land).

The Committee is moving to complete the corridor plan by October 1996. Before that time, Committee members will make presentations of draft plans to Planning Boards and Boards of Selectmen. The Final Plan will be available for public review with public hearings held throughout the corridor before the corridor towns are asked to adopt the plan's recommendations as an element of their local Master plans.

An additional task of the LAC is review of environmental permit applications for activities proposed within the river corridor (1/4 mile from each river bank). The LAC is afforded the opportunity to comment on applications and encouraged to address known environmental violations but has no authority in the permitting or enforcement processes.

The Committee membership affords knowledge in biology, hydrology, local land use and town government, economic development, education, and history and archeology. All towns on the corridor are represented: Washington, Lempster,

Marlow, Sullivan, Gilsum, Surry, Keene, Swanzey, Winchester, and Hinsdale. The LAC receives professional assistance from the NH Department of Environmental Services Rivers Program and Southwest Region Planning Commission.

The Ashuelot LAC hopes to become a regional advocate for the River and the many public interests in this irreplaceable asset. The LAC invites citizens and town officials to contact their local LAC members, LAC Chairman, or the Planning Commission with any questions or comments about the Ashuelot River.

Article 2: To vote by ballot on the following amendment to the SwanzeY Zoning Ordinance - Airport Zoning - as submitted by the Selectmen to comply with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated:

Amendment No. 1. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as submitted by the Board of Selectmen to the SwanzeY Zoning Ordinance - Airport Zoning as follows:

AMEND Section XB DEFINITIONS to read:

B. DEFINITIONS

1. Airport - means any area of land or water, whether constructed or not, which has been approved by the Commissioner of the New Hampshire Department of Transportation as a site for the landing and taking off of aircraft or to be utilized by the public as a point of arrival or departure by air.

2. Imaginary Surfaces - means those surfaces being shown on the Dillant-Hopkins Airport Approach Plan dated August 1, 1995, which Approach Plan is attached hereto as Exhibit A and made a part hereof, said areas being shown as the horizontal surface, conical surface, the approach surface and the transitional surface.

3. Airport Hazard - means any structure, tree, smoke, steam, dust or other substance which obstructs the aerial approaches of a publicly owned airport or impairs the reasonable visibility in the vicinity thereof, electrical impulses and disturbances which interfere with

radio aids or communications and lights which might result in glare in the vision of pilots or aircraft or be confused with airport lights.

AMEND SECTION XC ORDINANCE RESTRICTIONS to read:

C. ORDINANCE RESTRICTIONS

In order to carry out the purposes of this Ordinance, all of the land below the Dillant-Hopkins imaginary surfaces, is hereby declared subject to the restrictions of this Ordinance.

AMEND SECTION XD(1) HEIGHT to read:

1. Height Limits: No structure or tree which shall be an "Airport Hazard" as described in Section XB(3) shall be erected, altered or allowed to penetrate or grow above the Dillant-Hopkins imaginary surfaces.

Article 3: To vote by ballot on the following question submitted by petition:

3. Primary Surface

A surface longitudinally centered on the runway. The elevation of any point on the primary surface is the same as the elevation of the nearest point on the runway centerline. The dimensions of each primary surface are:

Runway 14/32	4,401 ft	250 ft

4. Horizontal Surface

A horizontal plane 150 feet above the airport elevation, the perimeter of which is constructed by swinging arcs of specified radii from the center of the primary surface of each runway of each and connecting the adjacent arcs by lines tangent to those arcs. The radius of each arc is:

Runway 2/20	10,000 ft
Runway 14/32	5,000 ft

When a 5,000 ft arc is encompassed by tangents connecting two 10,000 ft arcs, the 5,000 ft arc shall be disregarded.

5. Conical Surface

A surface extending outward and upward from the perimeter of the horizontal surface at a slope of 20:1 for a horizontal distance of 4,000 ft.

6. Approach Surface

A surface longitudinally centered on the extended runway centerline and extending outward and upward from each end of the primary surface. The inner edge of the approach surface is the same width as the primary surface. It expands uniformly to a width of:

7. Transitional Surfaces

These surfaces extend outward and upward at right angles to the runway centerline at a slope of 7 to 1 from the sides of the primary surface and from the sides of the approach surface. Transitional surfaces for those portions of the approach surfaces which project beyond the limits of the conical surface, extend a distance of 5,000 ft measured horizontally from the edge of the approach surface and at right angles to the runway centerline.

8. Airport Hazards



However, no provisions of this airport approach plan, except for the Primary Surface (Section 3), shall limit the height of a structure, natural growth, or terrain to less than 30 feet above the ground upon which it is located.

AIRPORT APPROACH PLAN



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



Article 3: To vote by ballot on the following amendments proposed to the Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board:

Amendment No. 1. It was voted in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Swanzey Zoning Ordinance as follows:

AMEND Section II, A, by deleting the present Section II, A, 6 replacing it with a revised Section II, A, 6 to read as follows:

6. **SHORELAND PROTECTION DISTRICT.** The Shorelands Protection District is established as an overlay district which is superimposed over the conventional existing zoning. The uses permitted in the underlying districts shall be allowed only if they meet the additional requirements set forth in Section VIII of this ordinance. The Town of Swanzey Shorelands Protection District includes:

a. Swanzey Lake - All land within 1,000 feet from the reference line of the lake

b. Wilson Pond - All land within 250 feet from the reference line of the pond.

c. Ashuelot River and South Branch - All land within 250 feet from the reference line on both sides of these waters.

AMEND Section VIII by deleting said section in its entirety and inserting the following revised Section VIII entitled **SHORELANDS PROTECTION DISTRICT** in its place.

**SECTION VIII
SHORELANDS PROTECTION DISTRICT**

A. SHORELANDS PROTECTION DISTRICT

The Shorelands Protection District is hereby established as an overlay district which is superimposed over the conventional existing zoning. The uses permitted in the underlying districts shall be allowed only if they meet the minimum standards promulgated by the State of New Hampshire Shorelands Protection Act, RSA 483-B. Pursuant to authority granted by RSA 674:16, this Shorelands Protection District is adopted by the Town of Swanzey to further protect the public waters of the Town.

B. TOWN OF SWANZEY SHORELAND PROTECTION DISTRICT

includes the following public waters:

1. Swanzey Lake - All land within 1,000 feet from the reference line of the lake.
2. Wilson Pond - All land within 250 feet from the reference line of the pond; and
3. Ashuelot River and the South Branch - All land within 250 feet from reference line on both sides of these waters.

C. MINIMUM LOT REQUIREMENTS

1. The minimum lot size for new lots in areas dependent on on-site septic systems shall be as follows:

- a. Swanzey Lake - three acres
- b. Wilson Pond - dependent on the underlying district in which particular property is located
- c. Ashuelot River and South Branch - dependent on underlying district in which particular property is located

2. New lots requiring on-site water and sewage systems within this District shall have a minimum of shoreland frontage of 150'.

3. Setbacks.

a. No primary structure as defined by RSA 483-B, shall be built, placed or erected within 125 feet of the reference line of Swanzey Lake and Wilson Pond. No primary structure shall be built, placed or erected within 50 feet of the reference line of the Ashuelot River or the South Branch.

D. Subsurface Waste Disposal Systems

1. All newly subdivided lots, including those in excess of five acres, created within the Shorelands Protection District are required to obtain subdivision approval by Department of Environmental Services.

2. All subsurface waste disposal systems must be designed and installed in accordance with the Department of Environmental Services, Division of Water Supply and Pollution Control publication Subdivision and Individual Sewage Disposal System Design Rules.

3. The septic tanks and leach fields, new or existing, adjacent to ponds, lakes and streams feeding ponds, lakes and wetlands shall be designed and installed in accordance with Env. WS1000. The leaching portions of all new septic systems shall be set back from the reference line at least 125 feet.

4. Adjacent to rivers, septic system leach fields shall be no less than 125 feet from the reference line.

E. NON-CONFORMING LOTS OF RECORD

1. Existing, individual, undeveloped, non-conforming lots of record within the Shoreland Protection District may be used for the purpose of constructing a single family residential dwelling unit and related facilities, including, but not limited to, decks, piers, boat houses, boat loading ramps, walkways and other water dependent structures in accordance with RSA 483-B and this ordinance.

F. NON-CONFORMING STRUCTURES

1. Existing structures within the Shoreland Protection District which do not comply with the requirements of this ordinance (non-conforming structures) may remain in use.

2. No existing non-conforming use or structure in the Shorelands Protection District shall be reconstructed, extended or enlarged unless the extension or addition does not extend any closer to the reference line than the existing structure and the Board of Adjustment grants a special exception. No special exception for an alteration or expansion of any existing non-conforming structure shall be granted until the applicant obtains approval of the increased load on the sewage disposal system from DES Water Supply and Pollution Control Division.

G. NON-CONFORMING USES

Existing uses which are non-conforming under this section of the Shoreland Protection Ordinance may continue until the use ceases to be active or is discontinued for a period of one year. An existing non-conforming use may not be changed to another non-conforming use, and existing non-conforming uses shall be required to meet the shoreland natural buffer, drainage and related water quality protection requirements of this ordinance to the maximum extent feasible.

H. RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN STATE AND LOCAL REQUIREMENTS.

Where both the State and the Town of Swanzey have requirements the more stringent shall govern. (RSA 676:14)

Amendment No. 2. It was voted in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Swanzev Zoning Ordinance as follows:

AMEND Section II, A by adding a new paragraph numbered 10 entitled INDUSTRIAL PARK DISTRICT to read as follows:

10. INDUSTRIAL PARK DISTRICT. The intent of this District is to allow industrial activity in a park like setting, where municipal water, sewer, fire protection and electrical power may be accessible. It is the intent of this District, by requiring minimum building size, to preclude small business and office operations (allowed in other zones) unless they are grouped together in the same building. This district also excludes service operations and retail sales activities except those that are clearly accessory to the permitted use.

"The zoning map of the Town of Swanzev dated September 1, 1947, as amended, is further amended to include the area described in Section 10 entitled Industrial Park, Paragraph 1."

AMEND Section X, by adding a new section entitled INDUSTRIAL PARK DISTRICT, which would read as follows:

SECTION X INDUSTRIAL PARK

The intent of this district is to allow industrial activity in a park like setting, where municipal water, sewer, fire protection, and electrical power may be accessible. This district excludes service operations and retail sales activities except those that are clearly accessory to the permitted use.

A. INDUSTRIAL PARK DISTRICT

Beginning at a point 400 feet easterly of the intersection of Page Court and Rte. 32 on the north side of Page Court, proceeding southerly on a line parallel to Rte. 32 to the point of intersection with the southern boundary of Lot 19.98, proceeding easterly along Lot 19.98 southern boundary to its southeast corner, then southerly to a point of intersection with the southern boundary of Lot 19-102, then easterly to the south east corner of Lot 19-102 then northerly along Lot 19-102 to a point of intersection with the southern boundary of Lot 19-97-1, in a then northerly direction along boundary of Lot 19-97-1 to a point of intersection on Rte. 12. Then northerly following boundary of Lot 19-97-1 along Rte. 12, to the lot's most northeastern corner. Then westerly following the boundary of Lot 19-97-1 to a point of intersection with the existing residence district (which runs northerly 1000' parallel from the intersection of Page Court and Wilson Pond Road). Then

southerly along the line of the residence district to the private road between Lot 19-24 and 19-97-1 then westerly along the north side of the private road to the intersection of Wilson Pond/Page Court then westerly to the point of origin. (This description of the Industrial Park District was taken from the Town of Swanzey Tax Maps dated 4/1/94.

B. PERMITTED USES

1. Manufacturing, production, fabrication, processing, packaging assembly, refurbishing and or repair of goods.
2. Research and development.
3. Bulk storage and distribution of large quantities of material, liquid, solid, or gaseous, intended for resale; excluding toxic, flammable or hazardous materials.
4. Corporate offices.
5. Publishing companies.
6. Warehousing.
7. Wholesaling.

C. PROHIBITED USES

1. Industrial uses which discharge contact type process waters on site; contact type process water is that used in an industrial process which comes into direct contact with that process. Cooling water that cools the work directly would be considered contact type.
2. On site processing of hazardous or toxic materials.
3. Storage of road salt or salted sand.
4. Any use producing offensive or noxious fumes, continuous loud noise, or large amounts of smoke which may be disruptive to any adjacent landowner.

D. FLAMMABLE LIQUIDS. On site storage of flammable liquids shall be accessory to the permitted use, and shall not exceed 10,000 gallons. Heating fuels and processing fuels shall be considered accessory to permitted use. An approved spill containment system will be required around all storage tanks.

E. HAZARDOUS MATERIALS. The storage and use of hazardous materials necessary to the permitted use will conform to all applicable regulations of the pertinent local state and federal agencies, (i.e. local fire codes, OSHA, EPA, or whatever agencies exist at the time). Since such materials may pose a present or potential hazard to human health or the environment when improperly stored, transported, disposed of or otherwise used; these materials shall include without exception materials identified as hazardous and listed in accordance with Section 3001 of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976.

F. LANDSCAPING. Outside storage areas shall be screened from adjacent properties, service roads and public roads with a form of solid screening (fencing).

G. PARKING. Two 8' x 18' spaces per 1000 square feet of

floor area are required. Fire lanes required by the Fire Department may not be included in calculating parking area.

H. BUILDINGS.

1. Height - Maximum of 45 feet.
2. Setbacks - Front 50', side 20', rear 20'.
3. Minimum square footage - 2000 sq. ft.

I. LOT SIZE

1. Minimum area - 2 acres.
2. Minimum width - at building line 200 feet.
3. Minimum frontage - 200 feet.
4. Maximum percent occupied by structures - 50% .
5. Maximum percent covered by impermeable materials including structures - 80%.
6. A minimum of 20% of the Industrial Park District is to be left vegetated and undeveloped. Setbacks, buffer zones, wetlands, and areas required for storm water detention may be included in the 20%.

J. PAVED SURFACES

1. Minimum front, side, and rear setback - 25 feet from service road; excluding access and 50 feet from residential district.

K. DRAINAGE.

1. The drainage design for construction within the District shall be such that no net increase in volume or velocity of surface water leaving the District will be allowed. This may be accomplished either by a common runoff detention system for the District or by individual systems for each lot.

2. Because the provisions of paragraph K. 1. above may create a series of man-made wetlands in the district, the setback from wetlands for septic systems will adhere to State standard within the District.

L. ACCESS. For the purpose of this district, common driveways and service roads connecting to Rte. 12 will be encouraged and may be required. Each lot shall have frontage on a town approved internal service road, connecting to Rte. 12 and or Rte. 32.

Amendment No. 3. It was voted against the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Swanzey Zoning Ordinance as follows:

AMEND Section II, A by adding a new paragraph numbered 11 entitled ADULT ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESS DISTRICT to read as follows:

11. ADULT ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESS DISTRICT. To establish an overlay district providing reasonable and uniform regulations to prevent the concentration of adult entertainment businesses within the Town of Swanzey, and to promote the health, safety and general welfare of the Citizens of the Town of Swanzey.

AMEND the Swanzey Zoning Ordinance by adding a new section entitled ADULT ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESS DISTRICT, to read as follows:

**SECTION XI
ADULT ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESS DISTRICT**

A. PURPOSE AND INTENT.

It is the intent of this section to establish an overlay district providing reasonable and uniform regulations to prevent the concentration of adult entertainment businesses within the Town of Swanzey; and it is the intent to promote the health, safety and general welfare of the citizens of the Town of Swanzey. It is the intent of this section to prevent problems of blight and deterioration which may accompany and may be brought about by the concentration of adult entertainment businesses. The provisions of this amendment have neither the purpose nor the effect of imposing limitation or restriction on the content of any communicative materials, including sexually oriented materials; and it is not the intent nor effect of this section to restrict or deny access by adults to sexually oriented materials protected by the First Amendment, or to deny access by the distributors and exhibitors of sexually oriented entertainment to their intended market; and neither is it the intent nor effect of this article to condone or legitimize the distribution of obscene material.

B. LOCATION RESTRICTIONS OF ADULT ENTERTAINMENT BUSINESSES.

Adult entertainment businesses, as defined in Section C of this adult entertainment business district shall be subject to all regulations, requirements and restrictions for the underlying districts in which the adult entertainment business is permitted and shall be subject to the following distance requirements:

1. No adult entertainment business shall be permitted within 1,000 feet of another adult business which is either existing at the time of the effective date of this ordinance or one for which a building permit has been applied for, and no adult entertainment business shall be permitted within a building, premise, structure or other facility that contains another adult entertainment business.

2. No adult entertainment business shall be permitted within 1000 feet of any church, public or private school (pre-school through high school), youth center, or Town Hall.

3. Adult entertainment business shall be allowed by special exception and only in the following areas of the Town

of Swanzey:

(a) Route 12 - Within that portion of the Business District on Route 12 which lies between the Keene-Swanzey town line and the intersection of Suburban Acres and Route 12, so called; and

(b) Route 10 - Within that portion of the Commercial Industrial District which lies between the Keene-Swanzey town line and the intersection of Rte 10 and Base Hill/Ash Hill Roads.

The distance requirements above shall be measured in a straight line, without regard to intervening structures from the property line of any site to the closest exterior wall of the adult entertainment business.

C. DEFINITIONS.

Adult Entertainment Business means: Any place of business at which any of the following activities are conducted:

1. Adult bookstore or adult video store: A business that devotes more than 15% of the total display, shelf, rack, table, stand or floor area for the display, sale and/or rental of the following:

a. Books, magazines, periodicals or other printed matter, or photographs, films, motion pictures, video cassettes, slides, tapes, records, computer disks, CD-ROM's or other forms of visual or audio representations which meet the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1; or

b. Instruments, devices which are designed for use in connection with "sexual conduct" as defined by NH RSA 571-B:1, other than birth control devices.

An adult bookstore or adult video store does not include an establishment that sells or rents books, videos or periodicals representing "harmful to minor" or "sexual conduct" materials as listed above if sales and rentals of such materials are an incidental or accessory part of its principal stock and trade and does not devote more than 15% of the total display, shelf, rack, table, stand or floor area of the establishment.

2. Adult Motion Picture Theater: An establishment with capacity for five or more persons where for any form of consideration films, motion pictures, video cassettes, slides, CD-ROM, computer displays or similar photographic reproductions are shown, and in which substantial portions of the total presentation time is devoted to the showing of material which meets the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1, for observation by patrons. For this subsection 2 and for subsections 3,4,5,6 and 7 below, a "substantial portion of the total presentation time" shall mean the presentation of films or shows described above for viewing on more than seven days within any 56 consecutive day period.

3. Adult Motion Picture Arcade. Any place to which the

public is permitted or invited wherein coin or slug-operated or electronically, electrically or mechanically controlled still or motion picture machines, computers, projectors or other image-producing devices are maintained to show images to five or fewer persons per machine at any one time, in which a substantial portion of the total presentation time of the images so displayed is devoted to the showing of material which meets the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.

4. Adult Cabaret: A nightclub, bar, restaurant, or similar establishment which during a substantial portion of the total presentation time features live performances which meet the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1, and/or features films, motion pictures, video cassettes, CD ROM's, computer displays, slides, audio tapes, or other audio or photographic reproductions, a substantial portion of the total presentation time of which is devoted to showing of material which meets the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.

5. Adult Drive-In Theater: An open lot or part thereof, with facilities devoted primarily to the presentation of motion pictures for any form of consideration to persons in motor vehicles or on outdoor seats in which a substantial portion of the total presentation time being presented for observation by patrons is devoted to the showing of materials which meets the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.

6. Adult Motel: A motel or similar establishment offering public accommodations for any form of consideration which provides patrons with closed circuit television transmissions, films, motion pictures, video cassettes, computers, CD-ROM, slides or other audio or photographic reproductions, a substantial portion of the total presentation time of which are distinguished or characterized by an emphasis upon the depiction or description of materials which meet the definition of "harmful to minors" and or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.

7. Adult Theater: A theater, concert hall, auditorium or similar establishment either indoor or outdoor in nature which for any form of consideration regularly features live performances, a substantial portion of the total presentation time of which are distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on activities which meets the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.

8. Nude Model Studio: A place where a person who appears in a state of nudity or displays male genitals in a state of sexual arousal and/or the vulva or more intimate parts of the female genitals and is observed, sketched, drawn, painted, sculptured, photographed or similarly depicted by other persons who pay money or any form of consideration of such display, or where such display is otherwise characterized by an emphasis on activities which

meets the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.

9. Sexual Encounter Center: A business or commercial enterprise that as one of its primary business purposes offers for any form of consideration: (a) physical contact in the form of wrestling or tumbling between persons of the opposite sex; or (b) activities between male and female persons and/or persons of the same sex when one or more persons is in the state of nudity; or where the activities in (a) or (b) are characterized by an emphasis on activities which meets the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.

Amendment No. 4. It was voted in favor of the Adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Swanzey Zoning Ordinance as follows:

AMEND Section II, S, Sign Ordinance by deleting paragraphs 2, 3, 4, and 5 and inserting the following paragraphs in their place.

2. Attached signs

a. In addition to a free-standing sign with attached secondary signs, one attached sign for each business on any lot shall be permitted provided it is permanently and securely attached to the primary business building. The total sign face area of signs attached to the primary business building in the aggregate shall not exceed one square foot for each linear foot of width of one side of the building.

b. At discretion of the Planning Board, the total allocation of square footage for both freestanding and attached signs may be redistributed to either type of sign as long as maximum allowable square footage is maintained.

3. Location. No freestanding sign shall be erected within 20 feet from any boundary line and all such signs shall be placed so as not to obstruct the view of traffic.

4. Content. The sign face of all business signs shall advertise only businesses conducted on the premises where the sign is located.

5. Off-Premise Signs.

a. Residential Development - a single off-premise sign will be permitted at the entrance not to exceed 32 square feet, double sided;

b. Commercial/Industrial Development - a single off-premise directory sign may be permitted at the entrances to commercial/industrial developments, not to exceed 96 square feet, double-sided.

Amendment No. 5. It was voted in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Swanzey Zoning Ordinance as follows:

AMEND Section IV, A,2,f and Section IV, B,2,c; RESIDENCE DISTRICTS USES and Section V,A, 2, c and and V, B, 2, b; BUSINESS DISTRICT USES, deleting the following language:

Upon written application to the Board of Adjustment setting forth reasonable cause for the temporary use of a trailer or manufactured housing, the board may issue a permit for a period not to exceed six (6) months. No permit shall be required for the temporary use of any travel trailer for a period not exceeding two weeks.

AMEND Section III, GENERAL PROVISIONS APPLICABLE TO ALL DISTRICTS adding as following:

V. Temporary Manufactured Housing Permits. During construction or rehabilitation of any permanent structure, the Board of Selectmen may permit the temporary occupancy of a manufactured housing unit on any lot in any district for a period not to exceed six (6) months, provided the manufactured housing unit meets all other requirements of this ordinance. Such temporary permit shall automatically expire six (6) months after issuance. No permit shall be required for the temporary use of any travel trailer for a period not exceeding two (2) weeks.

Article 4: It was voted in favor of authorizing the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80.

Article 5: It was voted in favor of authorizing the Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies or devises given to the Town in trust for any public purpose as permitted by RSA 31:19.

Article 6: It was voted in favor of authorizing the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property which may be offered to the Town for any public purpose, pursuant to RSA 31:95-e, or take any action thereon. The Selectmen must hold a public hearing before accepting such gifts, and the acceptance shall not bind the Town to raise, appropriate, or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair or replacement of any such personal property.

Article 7: It was voted in favor of authorizing the Board of

Selectmen to accept the dedication of any street shown on a subdivision plat approved by the Planning Board, provided that such street has been constructed to applicable town specifications as determined by the Board of Selectmen or their agent.

Article 31: It was voted in favor of, pursuant to RSA 79-A:25 II, placing 50% of all future payments collected for the Land Use Change Tax (RSA 79-A), up to a maximum of \$ 10,000.00 annually, into a conservation fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5 III.

Article 32: It was voted in favor of adopting an ordinance regulating conflicts of interest as follows:

**ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF SWANZEY
CONFLICTS OF INTEREST DESCRIBED AND REGULATED**

The Town of Swanzey, New Hampshire, pursuant to RSA 31:39-a, ordains as follows:

I. Declaration of Policy: Where government is based on the consent of the governed, every citizen is entitled to have complete confidence in the integrity of that government. All persons performing a public trust, engaged in the Town's business or in their duties as Town officers or employees, whether elected or appointed, including paid or unpaid member of municipal boards, commissions and committees, must earn and honor that trust by their conduct in all official actions. It is the purpose of this ordinance to ensure fair consideration of any application or matter to be voted upon, and also to ensure the appearance of fairness so as to maintain public confidence in the integrity of Town government.

II. Disclosure of possible conflicts of interest: Whenever any officer has a possible or potential conflict of interest

as described in Section V, with respect to any matter upon which that officer is to make a decision, either legislative or quasi-judicial, that officer shall disclose the facts constituting the possible conflict of interest at a public meeting of the board which he or she is a member, or in some other effective public forum; provided, however, that any officer who steps down pursuant to Section III need not disclose the reasons for doing so.

III. Disqualification in Quasi-judicial matters: Whenever any officer has a conflict of interest, as described in Section V, with respect to a matter upon which that officer is to make a decision in a quasi-judicial capacity, and that conflict of interest is definite, direct and capable of demonstration, rather than remote, uncertain, or so speculative that reasonable persons would not be influenced by it, that officer shall be disqualified and shall step down. Officers who are to make legislative decisions shall neither be required to, or prohibited from stepping down under this ordinance. An officer required to step down under this section shall not decide or vote on the matter under consideration, shall not participate in any board deliberations or discussion of the matter, except as a member of the public at a public hearing, and shall not sit with the remainder of the board during its consideration of the matter.

IV. Resolution of Uncertainty; Procedure: Whenever uncertainty arises as to the application of Section III to an officer action as a member of a board, the board shall, upon request of that member or another member of the board, vote on the question of whether that member should step down. Any such request shall be made prior to the commencement of any public hearing, or immediately following a disclosure under Section II, whichever is later. Such a vote shall be advisory and non-binding and may not be requested by persons other than members of the same board.

V. Conflict of Interests Described: The following circumstances shall constitute possible conflicts of interest under this ordinance:

a. PECUNIARY INTEREST: A personal and pecuniary interest by the officer in the outcome of the decision. Such interest includes, but is not limited to, an ownership interest in property affected, a mortgage interest, a creditor or debtor relationship with a party in the matter, or a business relationship with a party in the matter.

b. KINSHIP: A relationship by blood or marriage with a party in the matter, including the relationship of spouse, parent, child, brother, sister, uncle, aunt, niece, nephew, grandparent, grandchild.

c. EMPLOYMENT: Employment of or by a party in the matter under consideration.

d. ABUTTER: Ownership of land abutting land under

consideration in the matter.

e. **PREJUDGMENT:** A prior public statement or position indicative of bias for or against the matter under consideration. Prejudgment does not include statements or votes made during prior official action concerning the same subject matter.

f. **COMBINATION.** Any combination of the above factors.

VI. Conflict of Interest Distinguished from Ineligibility:

Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to render any person ineligible to hold any office or position.

VII. DEFINITIONS: In this ordinance:

a. "Officer" includes any elected or appointed municipal official, employee or agent, or member of a municipal board, whether compensated or not, permanent or temporary, when acting in an official capacity or engaged in the municipality's business. It does not include a voter at a town meeting or election.

b. "Decision" includes any act or determination, whether preliminary, advisory or final, which is within the official responsibility or authority of the officer, or of a board of which the officer is a member, and which involves the exercise of judgment, discretion, option of choice. It does not include a solely administrative or ministerial act, whose result is mandated or predetermined by authority of circumstances outside of the officer's control.

c. "Board" includes any municipal board, commission, authority, agency, committee, subcommittee, advisory committee or other body.

d. A "quasi-judicial" decision is one which affects the rights or obligations of specific citizens, petitioners, or concerning specific parcels of land, rather than the public at large, and which is made on the basis of investigation and evidence, or notice and hearing of the parties involved. For purposes of this ordinance the rezoning of particular parcels or tracts of land shall be deemed quasi-judicial.

e. A "legislative" decision is the enactment of an ordinance, rule of regulation, or the adoption of general public policy of a durable nature.

Article 33: It was voted by yes/no ballot, pursuant to RSA 39:3 and 40:4-a in order to reduce taxes, against reducing the administrative assistant to the Board of Selectmen position as created by Article 50 of the 1987 Town Meeting to

a part time position not to exceed 30 hours per week with an hourly rate of pay not to exceed \$14.50 per hour (\$22,600 annually). Changes in this position are effective the first full pay week after Town Meeting. These terms may only be amended at a subsequent Annual Town Meeting. Passage of this article will save Swanzey taxpayers over \$13,500 this fiscal year.


Article 34: It was voted in favor of discontinuing the positions (two) of elected town auditors (RSA 41:31) effective Town Meeting 1996.
