# REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

February 8, 1995

The Finance Committee met several times before the Feb. 7th due date for all petitions and request to be in. The Board was made up of seven people, appointed by the Selectman.

The Finance Committee found that in most cases each agencies, departments, committees, etc., requesting money stayed the same, or very few of them had even decreased their request from the previous year, a few had increased or doubled their request from last year. The Finance Committee would like to suggest that in the future if all the people requesting money would submit their request earlier than the due date, and also have someone come in and discuss their request with the Finance Committee, it would benefit each and everyone.

The Finance Committee believe that each request were very important but that in some of the cases, their request doubled over the previous year or that some request didn't have enough information attached to their request. We as the Finance Committee agree that serving on this board was an interesting learning experience. We would like to thank the Selectman, and all those people who came into discuss their request.

## FINANCE COMMITTEE COMMENTS

- **ART. 30: Fire CRF:** Some members felt that \$40,000.00 per year was high, and believe that a lessor amount would allow for a reasonable upgrade of equipment.
- **ART. 51: Bearcamp Valley School:** Some members believe that there is overlap between the school and the day care.
- **ART. 50: Red Cross:** This organization has asked for a flat amount of \$1,000.00 per year. This year they have gone a per capitol cost to all towns that they service.
- ART. 52: Center of Hope: The request for 1993 was \$400.00, 1995 was \$588.00 and 1995 is \$1236.00, which has more than doubled the cost.
- ART. 54: Great Hill Tower: Last year bids were not requested until late in the year, with no response. The request has been raised from \$2,500.00 to \$4,000.00, as the tower needs new guy wires. The suggestion was made to have contractor (\$) bid the project for reasonable costs involved prior to set a price, which may be too low or too high.
- **ART Planning Board:** The overall view of the committee was that the cost was excessive for the project. We felt that bids should be obtained to achieve a competitive cost.

The Tamworth Fire Department had 66 emergency runs in 1994.

Members put in over 585 hours of training this year. Training included drills and courses on air packs, propane gas, communicable diseases, relay pumping, ladders, chimney fires, pre-planning, CPR, Leadership, Firefighter Level I, Hazard Materials Operations and Dartmouth-Hitchcock Air Response Team Ground Safety Course.

Thanks again this year to the Tamworth Foundation and The Tamworth Firemens Club for buying us four new Cairns air packs.

On December 28 the Tamworth Fire Department took delivery of a pumper/engine with a 1000 gallon water tank and 1250 GPM pump. The body was built by Luverne Fire Apparatus Co., Inc. of Brandon, S.D. It was built on a Freightliner chassis with a 300 HP Cummins engine and an Allison MD 3060P 5-speed automatic transmission.

The contract price for the truck with Luverne was \$163,287.00 which included approximately \$20,000.00 for required equipment, purchased from Luverne's local dealer C&S Specialty, Inc. of North Smithfield, R.I.

The Fire Department Truck Committee spent 250 hours over a one year period preparing bid specifications for the new truck. We were pleased to receive six competitive bids.

In calendar year 1994, our three (3) leading causes of fires were No Permit, Children and Rekindles of fires where the fires was not properly

extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a

controlled burn.

### TAMWORTH PLANNING BOARD 1994 ANNUAL REPORT

This past year we have had seven subdivision applications. After deliberation, and with the cooperation of the applicants we granted six of the applications. One of them is still in the process. There were also four boundary line adjustments and two septic system waivers brought before us. After investigation and with some changes we granted these.

The members and alternates of the planning board attended many educational events including but not limited to the Law lecture series. The state regulations and requirements keep changing so our learning process is

continual.

With most of the work being done by a subcommittee, we are finally bringing the master plan revision to its conclusion. The Lakes Region Planning Commission's participation has been a little less than we expected so we have had to pick up the slack. The Master Plan committee deserves our

appreciation.

Our subdivision regulations were originally written and adopted in 1976 and have seen many small amendments since then. The result is that now they are a little fragmented and hard to understand. The states regulations keep changing and we are required to change with them. The land in Tamworth is as varied as the people so it takes a comprehensive set of regulations in order to be able to apply them consistently. We are often have trouble trying to apply them fairly. Over the last two years we have been analyzing and trying to revise them but after much work we are not too close to a finished product that would work. Therefore we are proposing to the voters that we hire the work of rewriting our subdivision regulations. We are not anticipating any major changes to the basic lot requirements in fact some details may be removed that are no longer applicable or allowed by the state. Whether we do the work or we hire some of it we would have public hearings and plenty of opportunity for voter input before it was adopted by the town.

### **AGENCY INFORMATION:**

The annual state inspection of Tamworth Community Nurse Association took place on October 20, 1994 by Theresa Jarvis, R.N., BSN of the New Hampshire Division of Public Health Services, Bureau of Health Facilities Administration as per state mandate. Our office records for patient care and services, TCNA protocol, policies and procedures, patient records, documentation and implementation of services were examined, reviewed and following some TCNA Constitution and ByLaw revisions, received our annual renewal of license as a Community Health Agency. TCNA, as well, continues to maintain its licensure under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendment (C.L.I.A.), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Public Health Practice Program for testing of blood sugar and urinalysis specimens.

Dr. John C. Patten has continued with our agency as medical advisor. Dr. Patten annually reviews agency medical procedures and protocols and participates in agency Health Screenings and Clinics. We acknowledge and appreciate Dr. Patten's efforts and contributions for another year of service to

the Tamworth Community Nurse Association, Inc.

Many residents of Tamworth have benefited throughout 1994 by supplemental service offered by Heritage Home Health of Meredith for physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech therapy, as well as home health aides and skilled nursing care to "back up" TCNA. Carroll County Health and Home Care is another agency which has provided valuable assistance to many elders and physically challenged Tamworth residents through certified aides, homemakers and respite care in the home. Visiting

Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County have merged this past year with Hospice of Northern Carroll County to become "Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care Services of Northern Carroll County", also supplementing TCNA services as has the Therapy Department and Laboratory Department of Memorial Hospital in North Conway. Promoting home health care which results in the optimum possible safety and quality of living is the foremost objective of the Tamworth Community Nurse Association Inc. and can best be obtained when there is continual interaction and communication between between TCNA. the patient, the physician and the involved family members as well as all integrated multidisciplinary team services.

### AGENCY FUNCTIONS/PROGRAMS/COMMUNITY PROJECTS

The Tamworth Community Nurse Association Board of Directors consists of ten volunteer members representing Tamworth, Chocorua, South Tamworth, Whittier and Wonalancet, plus eleven others on the Committee of Friends of Tamworth Community Nurse Association(formally The Summer Board). The board meets monthly to discuss agency services, clinics, programs and budget matters. Board members have also been very generous with their volunteer time doing extra activities such as transporting children back and forth who are enrolled in the Dental Program, doing driving in general, assisting with clinics and screenings, wrap gifts at Christmas, support agency functions and programs and coordinate the ever growing problem of fundraising to remain a nonprofit, noncharging community health agency. It has been through their dedicated and loyal efforts that has kept the agency viable and functional in meeting the needs of the Tamworth residents since 1921.

Tamworth Community Nurse Association offers "office hours" five mornings a week in addition to home visits for those unable to go out. Individuals may come to our office, with or without appointments, for monitoring of vital signs, health maintenance monitoring, medical assessments, suture removal, dressing changes, consultations and educational services as needed, or other services as arranged with our office and the patient's physician. Skilled nursing care services are through physician's instructions. On a daily basis, this office consults with hospitals, physicians, nurses, social workers, home care agencies, pharmacists and other service-related professionals in our combined efforts to ensure adequate and necessary services in the patient's home environment.

TCNA provides Blood Pressure Screenings twice a month, open to the public and without charge. On the last Wednesday of each month the TCNA holds a Blood Pressure Clinic in our office from 12 to 1 PM and on the third Monday of every month a Blood Pressure Clinic at the Town House Congregate Meal Site in Tamworth from 11:45 AM to 12:15 PM. All are encouraged to attend and take advantage of this free service whenever possible.

TCNA is very fortunate to have the skills and capabilities of Barbara Anderson, RN our associate nurse. I thoroughly enjoy working with her. Her reliability and professionalism is always well received throughout Tamworth. Barbara currently works three days per week; generally, Mondays, Wednesdays

and Thursdays.

June Donovan has continued to successfully coordinate the Tamworth Meals on Wheels program prepared by the Ossipee Concerned Citizens. Meals have been delivered five days a week, fifty two weeks per year to an average of eighteen to twenty households. More recently, the numbers have been twenty to twenty four households per day. Much gratitude for the efforts of June and the many volunteer drivers who faithfully sign up and drive the MOW route, June Donovan, as she has been for many years, is also TCNA's Office Manager/Secretary. She is truly an asset to TCNA. The office is open from 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM Monday through Thursday.

We are grateful to the Ossipee Concerned Citizens as well for their continuing efforts in keeping the Congregate Meal Program going in Tamworth at the Town House every Monday at 12 noon. A few years back Tamworth petitioned and regained the Tamworth site for the meal program. This is a valuable and important program for the Tamworth residents and all are strongly

encouraged to attend for the nutritious, hot meals and socialization.

In April, TCNA co-sponsored the Annual Spring Adult Health Screening with the Ossipee Valley Lioness. The event was very successful screening 172 people. Again, over \$200.00 of health screenings done by area volunteer professionals were offered without charge except for a minimal fee for blood testing. Screenings included: basic vision, glaucoma, dental, podiatry, hearing, bloodpressure, blood glucose, cholesterol, hemoglobin, dentistry, pulmonary function, nutrition, with documents being available for Living Wills and Advanced Directives. This has become the largest health screening of Northern New Hampshire.

TCNA's Annual Flu Shot Clinic was held on October 27, administering over 234 flu shots. Advertising for the awareness of this vaccine being available in Tamworth to the general public was coordinated through the Public Relations Department at Memorial Hospital in the hope that Flu Shot Clinic information this year was less fragmented, clear and readily available to the public. Some time was also spent at the Kenneth A. Brett School

administering flu shots to the staff.

The Dental Program is another TCNA service project which allows children from the Kenneth A. Brett School to receive dental care without charge. This fall began with 28 children enrolled, Dr. Eric Hirschfeld of Conway provided screenings, cleanings, fluoride treatments, x-rays, fillings, sealants, and other needed dental work to the students. The contribution and expertise of Dr. Hirschfeld has been greatly appreciated. We are also appreciative of the Tamworth Foundation's support for this project, without which many of these children would be without dental care.

The Boy Scouts of Tamworth and their leaders deserve great praise for their collection of food this fall. Thanks as well to all who donated food for this effort. The thousands of items collected were divided between the Community Food Pantry held at St. Andrew's in the Valley and TCNA. By Christmas all of the food in our office had been distributed to area families and individuals.

TCNA distributed USDA surplus foods throughout the year to qualifying

Tamworth households, as well as holiday food baskets prepared by the Community Food Pantry.

TCNA has worked closely throughout the year with local clergy, the Community Food Pantry and Brett School to assist families and individuals in need of services, resources and programs available to them. TCNA has met during the year with area clergy to address problems and needs of families and/or individuals of mutual concern.

We are grateful to those who have donated items for our medical supply "Loaner Closet". Wheelchairs, walkers, commodes, raised seats, canes, beds and bath stools, medical supplies and equipment have been "loaned out", without charge, to many grateful Tamworth residents.

Due to the extent and size it has grown to, the Christmas project this year was headed and orchestrated by a special task force "The Tamworth Community Christmas Project". Members met on a regular basis to organize the program. 79 Tamworth households received the "Spirit of Christmas" and 127 children benefited from this year's program. Contributions from the community provided clothes and gift certificates for children and turkey dinners, prepared by the Community Food Pantry for families, as well as remembrances, baked goods and fruits for other Tamworth residents. Many heartfelt thanks to all who contributed in anyway this year!

The Tamworth Community Nurse Association is also this area's Salvation Army Unit Station. Some emergency funds are available depending on eligibility, a Tamworth resident experiencing a financial crisis and all other financial avenues have been exhausted.

Barbara and I have attended regular network meeting with Carroll County professionals from health and human service fields. This is essential and has assisted greatly with exchange of ideas, effective communication and insight into existing issues. Network meeting topics and speakers held through the Carroll County Health and Home Care include Division of Human Services programs, RSVP, Hospice, "Caregivers", N.H. Cooperative Extension Services and Community Action Program, Ossipee Concerned Citizens and the newly formed "Carroll County Transportation Alliance", of which TCNA is a member. The CCTA was formed and is actively pursuing the organization of transportation resource throughout the county. In the hope that the transportational resources within the county can be better and fully utilized and less fragmented and isolated. Transportational needs to be facilitated include to and from doctor appointments, grocery shopping, general shopping, social gatherings and events and other needs as they arise. Their efforts also hope to produce some funding from the State of New Hampshire.

As well as regular network meetings, Barbara and I have met periodically with other area visiting nurse associations and organizations to update one another on respective programs and services and collaborate on mutual patient case loads when appropriate. As well for the exchange of information, problem solving and discussion of ethical issues facing all of us. Workshops, seminars and conferences have also played a vital role in this networking

process and for being current on the number of Continuing Educational Units required to maintain R.N. licensure in New Hampshire.

It has been a wonderful year for me, both as a professional being given the opportunity to serve this town in the capacity of Director of Nursing for the Tamworth Community Nurse Association and personally, having moved a year ago to live full time in Wonalancet. I feel very fortunate to be a part of such a caring and responsive community. I can honestly say I have never in my experience as a nurse lived and worked in such a unique and special community as Tamworth.

Home Health Care is one of the most important, exciting and growing areas of health care today. Early discharge after hospitalization for surgeries, illnesses and deliveries of babies necessitates more skilled care nursing visits to patients in their homes. Advances in medical technology offer opportunities for longer lifespans which also create the need for more home health service. We hope to continue to promote health awareness, address the pertinent issues and continue to grow internally to meet community demand for quality, high-tech services while still providing services with compassion and respect for patient dignity. Due to the increasing costs of running a non-profit business and in order to provide quality free care to all Tamworth residents, fundraising will be a major issue for us. We appreciate your generous help at holiday times, but remember, we need your help all year long. Any donation is greatly appreciated! And, feel free to call or come in and see us.

### RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Since being appointed Recreation Director last April it has been my pleasure to work with and for the Town of Tamworth Both the Board of Selectmen and the Recreation Committee have been very supportive of all our programs.

One of the top priorities of the Department is the upgrade of the Recreation facility. Among the improvements so far:

- 1. A permanent 450' water line to a hydrant at the baseball field.
- 2. A water line and hydrant for the soccer field.
- 3. A 5' well tile buried by the well with all valves and shut offs inside and easily accessible.
- 4. Fertilize and lime baseball and soccer fields.
- 5. Cutting back bushes surrounding fields.
- 6. Permanent benches in dugouts.
- 7. 8' safety screens in front of dugouts.
- 8. 135' of chain link fence down left field line.
- 9. New scoreboard for baseball field donated by Varsity Beverage/Pepsi Cola.
- 10. Hockey boards stained, straightened and corners rounded.

All of the improvements are essential, but the most important was getting the water line to the baseball field. Being able to water the grass on a regular basis has made a tremendous difference in the quality of the turf.

This year we would like to replace the present warming hut with a larger building. The existing building is too small and very rundown. The proposed 24' by 24' building would be built on a concrete slab and be used as a warming hut, storage facility and office with a phone for emergencies.

### Programs offered:

Girls softball, adult coed softball, mens softball, soccer, flag football, tennis lessons, hockey, basketball, contract bridge, Christmas concert trip, flower show trip, adult basketball, high school basketball, adult volleyball, adult hockey.

The 4th of July Family Day and parade went very well this year. Many thanks to the local organizations and individuals who attended and supported the events. A special thanks to Chairman Brian Cutter.

Last summer we offered a six week Youth Summer Program, for the first time. The program was for children from age 7 to 10 and 11 to 14. 65 children took part in the program. The activities offered were, chess instruction, basketball, softball, floor hockey, frisbee golf, swimming, soccer, tennis, arts & crafts, hiking, biking, a theater workshop, line dancing and field

trips. Field trips were to Storyland, Weirs Beach Waterslide, Mt. Washington Boat and a Portland Sea Dogs game, and hikes up Green Mountain and Mount Chocorua.

For a list of upcoming events, please check our bulletin boards at Market-in-the-Pines, South Tamworth Country Store, Chocorua Village Store, Tamworth Post Office and the Town Office. Please contact me if you have questions or suggestions.

To the nearly 100 people who have donated time and/or materials in the past 10 months, I say thank-you. Volunteers are what make a Recreation

Department successful.

### TAMWORTH POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT 1994

In 1994 the department saw an increase in motor vehicle activity, and calls for service. These increases were attributed to the increased day time patrols. The department in its attempt to strive towards safety of the community, has when ever possible tried to make its presences at the K.A. Brett School zone on Route 113. The safety of our children coming to and from school is of great importance t all of us. The increase in calls for service has been attributed once again to the increased patrol times, and accessibility.

The department this year has also had some changes in personnel. Long time Part Time Officer Carl Huddleston, was hired by the Ossipee Police Department in June 1994, and resigned from his duties in Tamworth. In his absence, Former Police Chief Emery Roberts was pulled from retirement to assist the department with is summer activities. Officer Roberts who is a great asset due to his long time knowledge of the town, and its people. Officer Roberts agreed to assist the department on a limited basis, and until another Officer could be hired to replace Officer Huddleston. In August 1994, Officer Matthew Weegar was hired to replace Officer Huddleston. Officer Weegar who is a Law Student, and comes to the department with 11 years of full time Officer experience, a great asset to me department, and the community. With the appointment of Officer Weegar, Officer Roberts accepted the position of Traffic Control Officer.

The departments make up is: Officer Scott Kinmond, a 10 year veteran of Carroll County Law Enforcement, and is employed full time with the Moultonboro Police Department, Officer Matthew Weegar, an 11 year veteran of Maine & New Hampshire Law Enforcement, and is a full time Law Student. Traffic Control Officer Emery Roberts, a 40 year veteran of Law Enforcement, and the Towns Road Agent.

In closing I have attached a copy of the departments activity for 1994, I would like to take this opportunity on behalf of the Tamworth Police Department, to Thank Officer Carl Huddleston for his years of service to the Town of Tamworth, The New Hampshire State Police, and the Carroll County Sheriff's Department, for their countless hours of covering the complaints when the police department is not on-duty. I would also like to thank the citizens, elected officials and area Law Enforcement agencies for their support.

### **COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY**

The Cook Memorial Library is pleased to report another busy year, loaning over 11,000 volumes, reflecting a steady increase of 4% each year. Our popular Tuesday morning storytime for pre-schoolers and the summer reading program have increased our usage by the children in the community. The volunteers who have contributed to the success of our children's room are, Arlene Littlefield who created the storybook dolls, Kathy Brown for her creative puppets, and Shirley Nystedt who assists at our storytime program. The traditional summer story hour run by volunteers continues to be a welcome addition to the library's schedule of programs open to the public.

Library hours have been consolidated, making it more accessible during the afternoon and evening, for a total of 16 open-hours per week. The library is being used by many community groups for meetings and now has a VCR available for meetings and programs. Available for loan are books, videos, audio tapes, magazines, and pamphlets. Our meeting room is available for use by community organizations. The Ulitz Room, our local history and genealogy room, was organized by Jean Ulitz and Marilyn Christie this year, another important historical resource for our community.

This is a time of change for libraries and computers are the primary reason. The library searches for information in other databases, places and confirms book orders electronically, and also has access to the Internet. With assistance from a Project Access (federal) technology grant, and the Tamworth Foundation, a computer for administrative use was purchased. The library also has a donated computer available for public use. Another service available is Article Express, offering hundreds of periodical articles from the CD ROM resources at the New Hampshire State Library, with a guaranteed one day response time.

We wish to thank everyone for their assistance in making the year a success. Our loyal volunteers contributed immensely and are very much welcomed as the library continues to grow. The library continues to meet the needs of an ever changing community, and is available to everyone in providing educational, cultural, recreational and informational services. I welcome each of you to visit the Cook Memorial Library to take advantage of your valuable resource.

#### **CHOCORUA PUBLIC LIBRARY**

The Chocorua Public Library was founded in 1888, and is one of the oldest chartered public libraries in the State of New Hampshire. Together with the Cook Memorial Library, it forms an Associate Library under the New Hampshire State Library System, serving the Town of Tamworth and all of its residents.

During the past year, the Chocorua Public Library was a successful recipient of a matching funds grant from the NH State Library Advisory Council as part of the NHAIS Project Access through the U.S. Department of Education. The grant monies, combined with fund raising dollars from our Book & Bake Sale and a Tamworth Foundation grant, has allowed the library to purchase its first computer and link electronically with all other libraries in the state as well as provide many other opportunities for library patrons.

During the past year, we logged nearly 2,000 visits, circulated nearly 3,000 pieces of printed materials, 200 video cassettes, and added 184 new books to our collection. The exterior of the building received a new paint job, enhancing both the library and one of our town gathering facilities, Runnells Hall. Several adult programs were held, as well as a summer story hour for pre-schoolers. A new "Artist of the Month" program was instituted, putting a wide variety of local artists' work on display for all to see and enjoy. Through the generosity of a large turnout at our Annual Tree Trimming Party, the Tamworth Community Christmas Project received dozens of new mittens and caps for holiday delivery to the needy. The library was again honored to receive a First Place in the Family Day Parade in July for its float, "Saddle Up to a Good Book!"

The Chocorua Public Library is supported in part by a bequest from Elizabeth Lane Whittemore which is ably administered by the Tamworth Foundation. In addition, the library hosts fundraising events, accepts donations, and gratefully receives support from town taxpayers. In the coming year, the Board, Librarian and volunteers look forward to expanding the scope of services we can provide to you, our community.

# TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT 1994

WETLANDS - There has been only one standard application for dredge and fill this year - to construct a farm pond. Tamworth Conservation Commission (TCC) members have checked the site and recommended that the Wetlands Board approve it, which has been done. There have been 8 applications for minimum impact dredge and fill, an expedited process whereby Wetlands Board staff approves the application without having to wait for board action, Minimum impact applications, except those for timber cutting, go directly from the Town Clerk to TCC, a member then checks the site within ten days and, if application is accurate and complete, signs it and sends it along with any comments to the Wetland Board which then approves it and notifies the applicant. In one case where the form was incomplete, TCC consulted the logger to get the form completed. It was sent to the Wetlands Board and has now been approved.

SEPTICS -TCC has been called on to advise the Planning Board in one case of a proposed septic system near a wetland. Delineation of the wetland was difficult; a soil scientist, who was then consulted, found the proposed septic to be in compliance with town ordinances. The Planning Board then approved the application.

VIOLATIONS - Seven complaints of violations have been received and checked into by the Commission. Among these were dredge and fill in wetlands without a permit, breaching of a beaver dam, and violation of the Scenic Roads ordinance as to removal of stone walls. A check of the Scenic Roads Act, on which the Tamworth Ordinance is based showed that, including recent amendments, trees may not be cut nor stone walls torn down on a scenic road without written permission from the Planning Board after a public hearing; there are some exceptions to this, but none in the case of a stone wall marking a boundary; it must not be removed or altered.

EASEMENTS -Signs have been placed on conservation easements held by the Town, after wording had been worked out with the landowner. At the foot of Bunker Hill Road at its junction with route 113: "THE OLD PERKINS FARM This property is protected in its natural state for future generations by a conservation easement purchased by the Town of Tamworth in 1991." A similar sign is on the Aspinall property on the south side of Cleveland Hill Road, except this was "given by the Charles E. Aspinall Trust." Scott Aspinall has added a wood plaque to this sign which names the area Gregory James Aspinall Wildlife Sanctuary. The Perkins Trail has been built on the Perkins easement property, now owned by the Community School; it runs from the Bunker Hill Road, just opposite the Jackman South

trail to join a trail along the Bearcamp River which continues to Bartlett Mill Bridge in South Tamworth.

Documentations of Town owned easements continues. For each one that is complete with maps, photos and legal documents - one copy goes to the landowner, one to the Town vaults, and one to the easement documentation chairman (Chris Conrod).

HEMENWAY - The State plans to lumber 38 acres near TCC's Big Pines Spur Trail. Discussions have been held with the state forester to ensure minimum disturbance to the trail, as there will be a skid trail which will run from the Blake Orchard woodroad and cross the Spur Trail to reach the area to be lumbered. The bridge across Swift River on the Big Pines Trail was repainted with preservative, work done by TCC members and families with some help from Eric Anderson, as part of his Eagle Scout project.

GREAT HILL TOWER, which is managed by TCC at the request of the Selectmen - In March the Town voted \$3,100 to repaint the steel structure and replace cables. The Selectmen put this out to bid, but received no response. It may be necessary to ask the 1995 Town Meeting to increase the appropriation.

COOPERATION WITH PLANNING BOARD - Two members of the Commission continue to work with the Master Plan Committee. Results of the Planning Board survey have been summarized. TCC held a special meeting to discuss these and make recommendations to the Planning Board for the upcoming Plan. Most of these recommendations were adopted by the Master Plan Committee.

SOLID WASTE - The annual household hazardous waste collection was held in July. TCC helped in publicizing this and arranged for volunteers to help on collection day.

EDUCATION - TCC, in coordination with the Bearcamp Valley Garden Club, gave a scholarship to a student at Community Conservation Camp. A donation was made to Tin Mountain for scholarship support. TCC held its annual bird walks for five Wednesday mornings in spring. These are led by TCC member Ned Beecher.

PLANTINGS - Cooperative Extension of U. N, H, offered lilacs free of charge. TCC received 6 for Tamworth, transported them to town and arranged with Brett School for planting them,

MEETINGS - Two TCC members attended workshops at the Annual Meeting of N. H. Conservation Commissions, One member attended a series of Municipal Law workshops on easements.

MAPPING - A Commission members has made his own map, in color, of protected land In Tamworth, A copy will be made for TCC.

MEMBERS - The Commission lost a long time member with the death of Peg King in November, She had served as chairman for 20 years and had only recently resigned this position to become an alternate, In August Charles Townsend was approved by the Selectmen as a Commission member. Even in this short time he has proved to be a valuable member of TCC as he is highly motivated and active.

#### **DOG WARDEN REPORT 1994**

I have found the citizens of Tamworth, for the most part, understanding and willing to work with. However, there seems to be a lax attitude towards the licensing and rabies shots that are required. These requirements are set forth by the State of New Hampshire to be carried out by the towns where the canines reside. Many people I have spoken with seem to think that the town is out to make a few bucks from dog owners. Pet owners don't realize the cost involved if their pets should bite or scratch someone. For a pet that is not currently vaccinated, and licensed, the cost starts at around \$2,500.00, plus impoundment fees, and any cost to the town. If a pet has bitten or scratched someone or is suspected of having rabies and has no identification, ie: License or Rabies tags, my only option is to destroy the animal immediately and send the head to Concord, NH for testing. This has to be done immediately as Rabies is a Life threatening infection.

I urge any one with a pet to get the necessary shots and licensing required. To use an old adage, 1 ounce of prevention is worth 1 pound of cure. Rabies is spreading rapidly, the last confirmed report, as of this

writing, was in Alton, NH.

Another issue I ran across is the Leash Law. The leash law says that an owner shall have control over their dog at all times. It does not say that their dog must be leashed at all times. If a dog is with its owner and the owner calls it and it returns to them they have control over it. I think the key issue here is that the dog is with the owner, if the owner knowingly allows the dog to run free or leaves the area where the dog is known to be, then the owner is not in control of the dog. A dog off its premises, with no apparent owner present, is in violation.

I would like to thank the citizens of Tamworth for their input and the employees of the Town of Tamworth for their support. I look forward to

serving you to the best of my ability in the coming year.

### TAMWORTH RED CROSS WATER SAFETY PROGRAM

In 1994, 160 individuals from preschool age through high-school were involved in swimming classes. They were enrolled from the preschool level through the Emergency Water Safety level. The fees charged for enrollment in the Swim Program were raised this year for the first time in several years. Tamworth residents pay \$5.00 for an individual, \$10.00 for two children and \$12.00 for a family. Non-residents pay \$20.00 for one child and \$30.00 for a family. \$3.00 of each registration fee goes to Mount Washington Valley Red Cross to cover administrative costs.

We were sorry to lose the services of our part-time instructor, Tammy Johnson, who was in Arizona continuing her college education. We missed her and wish her well. We were fortunate to have Bev Hammond join on us a volunteer basis to help with the instruction of the Bearcamp Valley School children on a part-time basis.

The staff of the Tamworth Swim Program realizes how fortunate we are to have the continued support of the Town of Tamworth, the Tamworth Foundation, the parents and the children. Thank you, also, to the Staff of White Lake State Park for their continued support in the Tamworth Swim Program. Our sincere thanks for that support and we hope to be able to continue to provide the quality program that has become our trademark.

All of the staff associated with the Tamworth Swim Program are certified in the new instructional Programs authorized by Red Cross. We continue to renew as new programs come along. We look forward to serving the Town of Tamworth and their children. From Martha Chandler, Ellen Hamilton and myself, our thanks for your continued support.

Our request for funding from the Town continues to be in the amount of \$2,800.00. This is the same amount that has been requested for the past several years.
