

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilmot in the (L. S.) County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wilmot on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

You are hereby further notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Wilmot the 12th day of March, next at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to negotiate the extension or renewal of the notes securing such loans when it is necessary.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,545.00 (One thousand five hundred forty-five dollars and no cents) for the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association.

5. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,500.00 (Twelve thousand five hundred dollars and no cents) for the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company, Inc.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 (One thousand two hundred dollars and no cents) for the New London Hospital.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any material or equipment deemed to be surplus to the Town needs; the sale of highway material or equipment to be made with the approval of the Road Agent.

8. To see if the Town will vote to be a member of the regional planning commission, organized and named the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council and to appropriate the sum of \$608.00 (Six hundred and eight dollars and no cents) as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses of the regional planning commission to be used in conjunction with other state and federal funds available for planning purposes.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 (One thousand dollars and no cents) for the continuation of services to the low income residents of Wilmot through the Kearsarge Valley Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 (Two thousand dollars and no cents) to help in the operation of

the Wilmot Learning Place, a non-profit organization for the preparation and adjustment of our four and five year old children towards their advancement into their formal education. The By-Laws of the Wilmot Learning Place state "All funds provided by the Town of Wilmot shall be applied as direct subsidization for the students from Wilmot only. No out of town child shall be taken without paying full tuition." The Wilmot Learning Place is incorporated in accordance with RSA 292 and licensed by the State of NH in accordance with RSA 17:E-3.

11. To see if the Town of Wilmot will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 (One thousand dollars and no cents) for the New London Ambulance Service.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 (One thousand dollars and no cents) for the Wilmot F.A.S.T. Squad.

13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal of \$14,000.00 (Fourteen thousand dollars and no cents) from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for re-construction of the Tannery Pond Dam.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for any Federal or State grants that may be available.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept any grants that may be allocated to the town and expend same.

16. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road called Church Place in Wilmot Center with the R/W to revert to abutting owners.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the installation of Road signs in the Town.

18. To see if the Town will vote to allow other outside towns to use the Wilmot transfer station provided the Selectmen can negotiate a favorable lease.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S NOTES

This year we completed the installation of a transfer station for garbage and rubbish handling. This installation has proven to be a model for statewide use. It is very neat and clean with no groundwater contamination.

Kearsarge Valley Road was completed this past year and now is in the best condition it ever has been. The total cost of renovating this road was approximately \$45,000 whereas the State of N.H. had told us it would cost about \$300,000.

The Historical Society installed Town of Wilmot signs in three places, one at the junction of North Wilmot Road and Route 4A, one at Donald Hall's on Route 4, and one on Route 11 on Olive Chase's property.

Work was started on the installation of bathroom facilities at the Town Hall. The septic system is in and a line laid for water. The contract was let for inside work and should be done by Town Meeting day.

WILMOT TOWN MEETING

March 13, 1984

ARTICLE 1: 109 Ballots cast out of 446 registered voters.

The motion was made that the polls be closed at 6:00 P.M.

ARTICLE 2: The motion was made by Earle Chandler to raise and appropriate the sum of \$212,177.23 to cover town expenses for the ensuing year, with all town revenue to be applied against this amount. Motion was seconded.

Much discussion was held with regard to the issue of solid waste disposal. It was recommended by the selectmen that we build our own pad and install a compactor on land rented from Mrs. May Jones in Wilmot Flat. This has to be installed between now and the first of July. After many pros and cons were discussed, it was decided to go on our own. However, it was suggested that the selectmen look for a piece of land to purchase in the future for this operation.

The original motion was then voted on and carried to appropriate \$212,177.23.

ARTICLE 3: The motion was made by Richard Bacon to accept article 3 as written - "To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to negotiate the extension or renewal of the notes securing such loans when it is necessary". - Motion was seconded and carried.

ARTICLE 4: Mr. John White made the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,579.00 for the Kearsarge Visiting Nurse Association. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 5: Mr. Keith Fleury made the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 for the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company, Inc. The motion was seconded and carried.

ARTICLE 6: Mr. Robert Tawney made the motion to accept Article 6 as

written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the New London Hospital". Motion seconded and carried.

ARTICLE 7: Mr. Earle Chandler made the motion to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any material or equipment deemed to be surplus to the Town needs; the sale of highway material or equipment to be made with the approval of the Road Agent. The motion was seconded and carried.

ARTICLE 8: Richard Bacon made the motion to see if the Town will vote to be a member of the regional planning commission, organized and named the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council and to appropriate the sum of \$608.00 as the Town's share of the annual operating expenses of the regional planning commission to be used in conjunction with other state and federal funds available for planning purposes. The motion was seconded, and after little discussion, the motion was carried with 1 opposed. Mr. Chandler mentioned the fact that Mr. Madden, after 10 years of service on this Council, was retiring, and our appreciation was shown by a round of applause.

ARTICLE 9: Robert Tawney made the motion that Article 9 be accepted as written "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,537.00 for the continuation of services to the low income residents of Wilmot through the Kearsarge Valley Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc.". Motion seconded.

Mr. Tawney then made an amendment to the original article to reduce the amount to raise and appropriate to \$1,000.00. The reason being that the selectmen felt that this was the appropriate share for the town of Wilmot. The motion was seconded, and after some discussion, the motion was accepted by a show of hands 51 to 19.

The motion was then made to accept the original article with the amendment made to reduce the amount to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00, and this motion was seconded and carried.

ARTICLE 10: The motion was made by Robert Tawney to accept article 10 as read - "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to help in the operation of the Wilmot Learning Place, a non-profit organization for the preparation and adjustment of our four and five year old children towards their advancement into the formal education. The By-Laws of the Wilmot Learning Place state 'All funds provided by the Town of Wilmot shall be applied as direct subsidization for the students from Wilmot only. No out of town child shall be taken without paying full tuition.' The Wilmot Learning Place is incorporated in accordance with RSA 292 and licensed by the State of N.H. in accordance with RSA 17:E-3". The motion was seconded.

Much discussion followed after which the motion was voted on, and carried overwhelmingly.

ARTICLE 11: Mr. Chandler made the motion to see if the Town of Wilmot

will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the New London Ambulance Service. Motion seconded.

Mrs. Marianne Fairall made an amendment to the original article to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,540.00; motion seconded. After much discussion, this amendment was defeated.

The original motion was then voted on to see if the Town of Wilmot will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the New London Ambulance Service, and this was carried with 1 opposed.

ARTICLE 12: Mrs. Helen White made the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the erection of road signs in the town, in accordance with a petition signed by Helen White and others - the motion was seconded. After discussion, and it being stated that the State would place signs on main roads going off Routes 11, 4, 4A, etc., the motion was defeated by a show of hands with 40 to 29.

ARTICLE 13: Mrs. Julie Morse made the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 for the establishment and equipping of a F.A.S.T. Squad for the town. Motion seconded. Mrs. Morse then explained how the F.A.S.T. Squad would work, and after some discussion, the motion was voted on and carried with 1 opposed.

ARTICLE 14: Mr. Chandler made a motion to accept article 14 as written - "To see if the Town will vote to accept title and ownership to the so-called Tannery Pond dam. Such acquisition to be at no cost to the town". Motion seconded and carried after some discussion.

ARTICLE 15: Kevin Drake made the motion to see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal of \$9,000.00 from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for reconstruction of the Tannery Pond dam. Motion was seconded, and after some discussion carried, unanimously approved.

ARTICLE 16: Robert Tawney made the motion to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for any Federal or State grants that may be available as matching funds for the reconstruction of the Tannery Pond dam. Motion seconded and carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 17: Robert Tawney made the motion to accept article 17 as written - "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept any grants that may be allocated to the town under Article 15, and expend same". Motion seconded and carried.

ARTICLE 18: Richard Bacon made the motion to see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal of \$12,000.00 from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for construction of toilet facilities, and related repairs to the Town Hall. Motion seconded. After much discussion, especially regarding the use of the well water for the Library which cannot be used for drinking vs. the use of the artesian well owned by the church, it was voted to accept the motion, and to connect to the artesian well on the church property with the approval of the church members so that the water can be used for

drinking, etc. (Dana Aldrich had looked into this matter, said the church members were in agreement, and had figures on how much it would cost the town to do this). The vote was carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 19: John Morse made the motion to see if the Town will vote to amend the Wilmot Planning Ordinance on Flood Plain Insurance to include the following:

1. "The responsible person shall require that all subdivision proposals and other proposed new development greater than 50 lots or 5 acres, whichever is lesser, include within such proposals base flood elevation data;"
2. "The responsible person shall obtain and reasonably utilize any base flood elevation data available from a Federal, State, or other source, until such other data has been provided by the Administrator, as criteria for requiring that (i) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the base flood level and (ii) all new construction and substantial improvements of non-residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or flood-proofed to or above the base flood level;"
3. "The responsible person shall notify, in riverine situations, adjacent communities and the State Coordinating Office prior to any alteration or relocation of a water course, and submit copies of such notifications to the Federal Insurance Administration;"
4. "The responsible person shall assure that the flood carrying capacity within the altered or relocated portion of any watercourse is maintained;"
5. "The responsible person shall require that all mobile homes to be placed within Zone A on the community's Flood Hazard Boundary Map shall be anchored to resist flotation, collapse, or lateral movement by providing over-the-top and frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that (i) over-the-top ties be provided at each of the four corners of the mobile home, with additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile home less than 50 feet long requiring one additional tie per side; (ii) frame ties be provided at each corner of the home with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long requiring four additional ties per side; (iii) all components of the anchoring system be capable of carrying a force of 4,800 pounds; and (iv) any additions to the mobile home be similarly anchored;"
6. "DEFINITIONS: Unless specifically defined below, words and phrases used in this document shall be interpreted so as to give them the same meaning as they have in common usage and so as to give this document its most reasonable application.
"Base Flood" means the flood having a one percent chance of being equalled or exceeded in any given year.

“Development” means any man-made change to improved real estate including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation, or drilling operations. “Flood” means a general and temporary condition of partial or complete inundation of normally dry land areas from:

(1) The overflow of inland or tidal waters.

(2) The unusual and rapid accumulation or runoff of surface waters from any source.

“Flood Plain” or “Flood prone area” means any land area susceptible to being inundated by water from any source (see definition of “flood”).

“Floodproofing” means any combination of structural and non-structural additions, changes, or adjustments to structures which reduce or eliminate flood damage to real estate or improved real property, water and sanitary facilities, structures, and their contents.

“Habitable floor” means any floor usable for living purposes, which includes working, sleeping, eating, cooking or recreation, or a combination thereof. A floor used only for storage purposes is not a “Habitable floor”.

“Mobile home” means a structure, transportable in one or more sections, which is built on a permanent chassis and designed to be used with or without a permanent foundation when connected to the required utilities. It does not include recreational vehicles or travel trailers. The term includes, but it is not limited to, the definition of “Mobile home” as set forth in regulations governing the Mobile Home Safety and Construction Standards Program (24 CFR 3282.7 (a)).

“Person” includes any individual or group of individuals, corporation, partnership, association, or any other entity, including State and local governments and agencies.

“Riverine” means relating to, formed by, or resembling a river (including tributaries), stream, brook, etc.

“Structure” means, for flood plain management purposes, a walled or roofed building, including a gas or liquid storage tank, that is principally above ground, as well as a mobile home.

“Substantial improvement” means any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure either, (a) before the improvement or repair is started, or (b) if the structure has been damaged, and is being restored, before the damage occurred. For the purposes of this definition “substantial improvement” is considered to occur when the first alteration of any wall, ceiling, floor, or other structural part of the building commences, whether or not that alteration affects the external dimensions of the structure. The term does not, however, include either (1) any project for improvement of a structure to comply with existing state or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications

which are solely necessary to assure safe living conditions or (2) any alteration of a structure listed on the National Register of Historic Places or a State inventory of Historic Places.

“Variance” means a grant of relief by a community from the terms of a flood plain management regulation.”

Motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 20: The motion was made by Mr. Chandler to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,000.00 for the purchase of a new diesel truck for town road maintenance. With \$23,500.00 being taken from Capital Reserve Fund, Equipment Fund and \$5,500.00 to be taken from highway department appropriation. Motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

ARTICLE 21: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting:

Mr. Chandler spoke on the \$17,000.00 saving on the budget from last year, and also about the \$34,000.00 surplus which could be applied to this year's taxes.

Mr. Tawney - Asked for the feeling of the Town's people on holding the town meeting on the Saturday afternoon following the second Tuesday, the day of the actual election for town officers, rather than on the Tuesday night as we are accustomed to doing. The town's people were in favor of continuing on with the way we have been doing.

Mrs. Wilcox mentioned the fact that she had copies of the report from our representative for anyone who wished to have one.

Motion made to adjourn, seconded and carried unanimously.





THE WILMOT LEARNING PLACE

This year has been an exciting one at the Wilmot Learning Place. We closed out the 1983-84 school year in May with an enrollment of 11 children. We reopened in the fall for the 1984-85 year with our enrollment up to 17 children, which has made it a very busy place.

Of these 17 children, 15 are from town and 2 are from out-of-town. These 2 children pay a higher tuition rate as mandated by the town. There are 9 children in the Kindergarten program and 8 in the Nursery program. To the best of our knowledge there are two 5-year-old children from the town who are not going to the school for various reasons. The enrollment for next year's program (1985-86) is projected to be about 15 children.

The Wilmot Learning Place employs a Teacher and a teacher's aide who give the children the special caring and learning experience they need to prepare for a first grade education.

We have great support from the volunteer Moms, who give one hour per morning, to work with a small group on a special activity. Nancy Schlosser has been a big hit this year with her "Creative Movement" class each Wednesday. The children really get a "kick" out of this special treat.

We are also fortunate to be able to use the Wilmot Library on Tuesday mornings under our own supervision. This helps the school in working around other community activities in the Wilmot Community Association building. We are appreciative of the Wilmot Community Association's cooperation in working with the school and its growing numbers.

As a very generous gesture, Mrs. Kilcourse has allowed us the use of the land behind the WCA building for a four-seat swing set, a slide, a jungle gym, and a sand box, all of which were donated to the school. We also invite community use.

We have also had money donated which has been used towards the purchase of a tape recorder, tapes, and a record player. Other donations include a wonderful collection of children's books, bookshelves needed for storage space, and a miscellaneous collection of outgrown toys from homes in the community.

The school had a bake sale in the fall which was very successful and helped to update our teaching materials. We are grateful to all who have donated in any way to our school.

We have had a successful year, and again wish to thank the many townspeople who have demonstrated support and assistance. It is this spirit of community cooperation and continued support that enables the Wilmot Learning Program to provide an enriching pre-school experience.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

For the past two years, the New Hampshire State Library System has been in the process of reorganization. The Wilmot Public Library, as a prospective associate member of this system, has been given guidelines which must be met by January 1, 1988, in order to take advantage of the services offered such as inter-library loan, consultant and film service, and a percentage of State financial aid which will be allotted to libraries.

The librarian, trustees and volunteers have been working slowly but steadily to meet these requirements. Efforts have been concentrated on cataloging all books. This is a tedious, time-consuming job but with the diligent effort of Betty Nicoll who types cards every Wednesday morning and MaryJane Schoeler who devotes extra hours to the job, this work should be completed within the next few months. The main concern of the trustees now is the librarian's salary which is required to be at least at minimum wage. We do not feel that we can correct this situation in one jump but we would like to raise her pay scale in increments over the next several years. At present, Mrs. Schoeler receives less than half minimum wage for eight hours per week.

The impromptu art exhibit that we had on Primary Day brought over 50 people into the library, in spite of nasty weather. We plan to have another such exhibit of local artwork on Town Meeting Day. A program on Elderhostel, in June, attracted a small but very enthusiastic audience. In December, the trustees gave a Christmas party as a thank you to the volunteers. As the saying goes, a good time was had by all. During this coming March and April, we have scheduled a four-session program, New England Men and Women, sponsored by the N.H. Library Association. We hope many of you will attend these Sunday afternoon discussions.

We continue to add books, old, new, hardcover, paperback, to our collection. Perhaps our best purchase this past year was a set of cassette/book combinations for pre-school-kindergarten age. These have circulated like the proverbial 'hotcakes' among the children from the Learning Place who come to the library each week. We also purchased a book repair kit and plan to have some regularly scheduled workshops where people can bring in their own books as well as help to repair the library's books.

We welcome Joyce Tawney who has taken over as treasurer. As always, our thanks to our faithful volunteers, and we extend an invitation to anyone who is interested in books and/or library work to join us. You don't know what you are missing!

REPORT OF THE WILMOT PLANNING BOARD

While the Planning Board met monthly during the past year, few requests were asked by property owners in regards to subdivision of their existing parcels. Two minor subdivisions were approved and a third awaits final approval based on conditions requested by the Planning Board for proper and safe access onto an existing Town Road.

Elizabeth "Betsy" Forsham, secretary of the Planning Board, was appointed by the Selectmen to fill the position of representative from Wilmot to the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council previously held by John Madden.

The Town of Wilmot now qualifies as a member of the National Flood Insurance Program, on an "emergency basis" thanks to Paul Bidwell, Planning Board Member, and the Town Selectmen. Paul accomplished much work to complete this action.

In review of the Planning Board minutes of the past year, much discussion and work has been expended toward the review of the Town "Master Plan" and means of updating same. A Planning Board Subcommittee, chaired by Gary Kiedaisch, is presently working to suggest improvements to said "Master Plan" and a survey is planned to reach a sample of townspeople for needed input. Within the State's Judicial system, the Master Plan is judged as a most important tool for Town planning, zoning, and property use, and the Board hopes to continue with the Master Plan update. Presented below is the current accepted Town Master Plan for your interest and information. The Planning Board would look forward to any input for revisions from fellow townspeople.

MASTER PLAN TOWN OF WILMOT

Wilmot is a rural community of about 650 persons. Commercial and industrial activity is minimal — one cottage type furniture plant, one auto body shop, one small jelly manufacturer, one motel and restaurant, one seasonal Christmas shop, and one small grocery store. There are five functioning farms in the town, one truck garden, and one nursery.

There is no public water or sewer system. The road net is adequate and well maintained. There is no public transportation. Recreation facilities consist of a town beach, a baseball field, a community center with a tennis court. Fire protection is provided by a volunteer fire company partially supported by town taxes. There is one part-time police person.

Between 1960 and 1978 the year-round population grew from 391 to 623, or approximately 3% a year. In addition there are about 300 weekend or seasonal residents. The dwellings are primarily single family houses, but there is one apartment building and several houses that have been remodeled to provide a separate apartment.

In the spring of 1976 the Planning Board sent out a questionnaire to approximately 400 registered voters. Replies were received from 302 people although every one did not answer every question. The following goals and policies are based on the responses to the questionnaire:

Goal I. To retain the present rural character of the town.

- Policies:
1. Encourage land use which is consistent with the natural environment.
 2. Protect historical sites and scenic areas.
 3. Encourage agriculture wherever possible.
 4. Establish adequate lot size requirements so as to insure on-site water supply and sewage disposal.
 5. Protect wetlands, steep slopes and other critical areas from development.
 6. Exercise control over quarries and gravel pits.

Goal II. To maintain the health and welfare of the residents.

- Policies:
1. Encourage the establishment of non-polluting industries and commercial enterprises.
 2. Provide open space and recreation facilities.
 3. Secure a town forest to provide revenue or to enable residents to cut firewood.
 4. Deny any land use which would result in annoyance, hazard, or reduced property values.

5. Protect the freedom to use private property subject only to community interest.
6. Develop or adopt a building code.

Goal III. To insure orderly growth in the town.

- Policies:
1. Give preference to developments along existing town roads so as to minimize expense to the town.
 2. Encourage the building of single family dwellings.
 3. Permit cluster dwellings and/or multi-family dwellings where sufficient land area is available.
 4. Encourage the growth of seasonal residences so that the ratio of seasonal to year-round residents remains about what it is now.
 5. Develop an equitable zoning plan.

Goal IV. To protect and properly manage the road system.

- Policies:
1. Preserve the scenic beauty of the roads.
 2. Enforce an access control permit system.
 3. Avoid overtaxing the present roads by reopening old roads as necessary.

WILMOT F.A.S.T. SQUAD REPORT 1984

Beginning in September 1984 when we received our pagers, the F.A.S.T. Squad responded to twelve emergency calls. Prior to that date we were dispatched by telephone to six calls for help. Your F.A.S.T. Squad, in conjunction with the Wilmot Community Association and New London Hospital, sponsored a C.P.R. course in May. The nine hour course ran for three nights and was attended by twenty-one people. The F.A.S.T. Squad members have attended continuing education courses including an EOA course, critiques and medical lectures at New London Hospital, and a series of Emergency Medical lectures given by The Danbury F.A.S.T. Squad.

We also held monthly meetings during the year to discuss any business pertaining to the F.A.S.T. Squad as well as future plans and goals. Some of the plans we have discussed include giving an Advanced First Aid course and forming a F.A.S.T. Squad Auxiliary for the purpose of raising funds for education and equipment. First on list of equipment are portable radios to facilitate communications with the responding ambulance, the hospital and dispatcher.

When reviewing our 1984 Budget and Expenditure Report, please note that our year-end figures do not reflect substantial expenditures in January, most important being two portable suction units. Also not included in our Budget Report are the two donations that we received this year totaling \$50.00.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.
