Federal Revenue Sharing Funds: (Exhibit B-2)

The Town received \$26,980 of Federal Revenue Sharing and Interest during the current year. The Town transferred \$10,000 to the General Fund for expenditures, leaving an unexpended balance of \$40,491 for future uses which must be appropriated within 24 months of receipt.

Long-Term Debt Group of Accounts:

Statement of General Long-Term Debt - December 31, 1977: (Exhibit C)

The outstanding long-term debt of the Town has decreased by \$3,000 during the year ended December 31, 1977.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Duties of the Treasurer:

The provisions of R.S.A. 41:29 include the following:

"The town treasurer shall have custody of all moneys belonging to the town, and shall pay out the same only upon orders of the selectmen...Whenever the town treasurer has in his custody an excess of funds which are not immediately needed for the purpose of expenditure, he shall, with the approval of the selectmen, invest the same..."

This Division interprets these references to mean that the treasurer shall pay out town funds only upon his receipt of vouchers signed by a majority of the Board of Selectmen. Therefore, the Treasurer's practice of paying tax anticipation notes, long-term debt and interest, and investing idle funds by bank memo does not comply with provisions of R.S.A. 41:29, since the Selectmen have not issued signed vouchers for these transactions. We recommend that in the future such transactions be performed with approval of a majority of the Selectmen by their issuance of signed vouchers directing the Treasurer to make these payments in a manner similar to any other payment of Town funds.

Duties of Town Clerk:

The Town Clerk has, on occasion, accepted payments of Resident Taxes without authorization.

The provisions of R.S.A. 41:38 state, "Any collector, being authorized by vote of the town, may appoint deputies, with the approval of the selectmen, who shall be sworn, have the powers of collectors, may be removed at the pleasure of the collector, and before entering upon the duties of his office, give bond as provided in section 6 of this chapter."

The Town Clerk must be authorized by vote of the Town to function as Deputy Tax Collector and must also be bonded as same.

Also, the Town Clerk has refunded, on occasion, overpayments of motor vehicle registration permit fees. This practice should be discontinued, since the Town Treasurer is the only one authorized to pay out Town Funds and then, only upon orders of the Selectmen.

Performance Bonds:

The Atkinson Subdivision Regulations provide that a subdivider, constructing roadways which will eventually be accepted by the Town of Atkinson, must bond the performance of road construction per Town of Atkinson specifications. Upon completion of the road, it is inspected by the Town Engineer to determine that it meets the required specifications, and if so, the entire road bond funds are returned to the subdivider. In the event the work has not been completed properly, funds in the bond account may be used for purposes of completing the road to Town specifications.

Monies in this account are held in a fiduciary capacity and the Town has no right to use these funds unless the bond has been breached by failure to perform.

Our examination of performance bonds on hand August 25, 1978 as well as a listing of those bonds on hand December 31, 1977, provided during the course of our audit, indicate that these bonds consist primarily of savings accounts in the name of individual contractors. No other evidence has been presented to enable us to determine if the Town may readily utilize these funds for completion of roads should the contractor default. Nor have any written agreements between the Town, contractor and banks been provided.

We recommend that legal agreements between the Town, contractors and banks be created in such a manner as to enable the Town to use them upon default, while at the same time restricting their use until satisfactory performance.

Custody of Trust Funds and Investments:

The provisions of R.S.A. 31:25 include the following:

"The trustees shall have custody of all trust funds held by their town."

Also the provisions of R.S.A. 31:31, which provide that:

"...whenever a gift, legacy or devise shall be made in trust to a...subdivision of a town and accepted by it, the same shall be held in custody and administered by the trustees of trust funds of such town..."

And the provisions of R.S.A. 35:10 include the following:

"The trustees of trust funds of a town shall have custody of any capital reserve of a town..."

Furthermore, also applicable are the provisions of R.S.A. 35:11 which states in part,

"Whenever any town shall have voted to transfer any accumulated surplus to the capital reserve fund, the town clerk shall forward to the board of selectmen and to the town treasurer within ten days of the adoption of such vote, a certified copy of the same; and, thereupon, the selectmen shall draw an order on the town treasurer for the amount of surplus set forth in said vote; and the town treasurer shall on receipt of said order immediately transfer to the trustees of trust funds of said town the amount specified in said order."

We recommend, therefore, that the Whitaker Fund, The Todd Fund, and the Capital Reserve Fund for recreation purposes, now in the hands of the Treasurer, be transferred to the Trustees of Trust Funds and that the Board of Selectmen draw orders for that purpose on the Town Treasurer.

Summary Inventory of Valuation:

The figures appearing on the 1977 Summary Inventory of Valuation, Form DRA #1, which determine the net valuation on which the property tax rate is computed, do not agree with the Computer Center inventory figures used to prepare the tax warrant and tax bills for 1977. This discrepancy resulted in a tax deficiency of approximately \$16,000. Therefore, we recommend that the Computer Center's inventory figures be verified and that they correspond to those figures filed with the Department of Revenue Administration on future DRA #1 forms.

Sawyer Land Purchase:

Warrant Article 13 of 1977 authorizes the purchase of land from Ralph and Ruth Sawyer, a portion of which is to be paid by Bureau of Outdoor Recreation Funds. This tract of property was acquired subsequent to December 31, 1977, and a review of the transactions reveals that a tract of the Sawyer property acquired is in Massachusetts. We do not find statutory authority for a New Hampshire Town to hold title to property in Massachusetts and therefore, we recommend that the Town dispose of this particular tract of land.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 19-III, require that the Auditor's summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

Federal Revenue Sharing Funds: (Exhibit B-2)

The Town received \$29,159 of Federal Revenue Sharing and Interest during the current year. The Town did not appropriate any money during the year leaving a balance of \$69,650 for future use which is required to be appropriated within 24 months of receipt. At present there is approximately \$15,000 that is being held longer than the 24 months.

We recommend that these monies be appropriated or obligated as soon as possible so as to avoid any problems of current or future funding. We also recommend that Anti-Recession Funds that have been held longer than six months be appropriated at the next annual meeting.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Duties of the Treasurer:

The provisions of R.S.A. 41:29 include the following:

"The town treasurer shall have custody of all moneys belonging to the town, and shall pay out the same only upon orders of the selectmen...Whenever the town treasurer has in his custody an excess of funds which are not immediately needed for the purpose of expenditure, he shall, with the approval of the selectmen, invest the same..."

This Division interprets these references to mean that the treasurer shall pay out town funds only upon his receipt of vouchers signed by a majority of the Board of Selectmen. Therefore, the Treasurer's practice of paying tax anticipation notes, long-term debt and interest, and investing idle funds by bank memo does not comply with provisions of R.S.A. 41:29, since the Selectmen have not issued signed vouchers for these transactions. We again recommend that such transactions be performed with approval of a majority of the Selectmen by their issuance of signed vouchers directing the Treasurer to make these payments in a manner similar to any other payment of Town funds.

Summary of Inventory Valuation:

The figures appearing on the 1978 and 1977 Summary of Inventory Valuations, Form DRA #1, which determine the net valuation on which the property tax rate is computed, do not agree with the Computer Center Inventory figures used to prepare tax warrants and tax bills for 1978 and 1977. These discrepancies resulted in a tax deficiency of approximately \$16,000 in 1977 and \$19,000 in 1978. Therefore, we again recommend that the Computer Center's inventory figures be verified and that they correspond to those figures filed with the Department of Revenue Administration.

Sawyer Land Purchase:

Warrant Article 13 of 1977 authorized the purchase of land from Ralph and Ruth Sawyer, a portion of which was paid by bureau of Outdoor Recreation Funds. This tract was acquired in 1978 and a review of the transactions reveals that a tract of the Sawyer property acquired is in Massachusetts. We do not find statutory authority for a New Hampshire Town to hold title to property in Massachusetts and therefore we recommend that the Town dispose of this particular tract of land.

General Accounting Procedures:

Fiscal year 1978 was the first year that the Town of Atkinson utilized electronic data processing for the Selectmen's records. Service Bureau generated records for the year were never compared with the Treasurer's records and there were many items of receipts and expenditures that were posted incorrectly or not posted to the Selectmen's records. Because of this much extra time was spent in correcting these errors.

It is recommended that the selectmen require the treasurer to submit monthly reports of his activities and then balance this report with those generated by the Computer Service Bureau.

It was also noted that only vendor checks were prepared by the Service Bureau. All payroll checks and some vendor checks are prepared manually. It is recommended that the Town consider having all checks prepared by Service Bureau.

Performance Bonds:

The Atkinson Subdivision Regulations provide that a subdivider, constructing roadways which will eventually be accepted by the Town of Atkinson, must bond the performance of road construction per Town of Atkinson specifications. Upon completion of the road, it is inspected by the Town Engineer to determine that it meets the required specifications, and if so, the entire road bond funds are returned to the subdivider. TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Atkinson in the county of Rockingham in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Kimball Public Library Function Room on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the articles required to be voted on by official ballot (Articles 1 and 2). By vote of the Selectmen, the polls for the meeting will remain open from ten o'clock in the forenoon until seven o'clock in the afternoon (and as much longer thereafter as the Town, at the opening of the meeting, may vote).

All voters are further notified to meet at three o'clock in the afternoon on the fifteenth day of March, 1980, at the Academy School Auditorium to act on all other articles in this Warrant.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the coming year.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following changes and additions, as follows:

A. "Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment # 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinances as follows:

Article V, Secion H to read:

1. Residences may be used to house such uses by the owner or tenants as professional offices, other recognized business offices, or such home occupations as hairdressing, dressmaking, manufacture or sale of gifts, craft products, or food products produced on the premises. No more than three (3) people, including the owners or tenants, shall be employed at any one location. Such home industry shall not give the appearance of a commercial enterprise, except that a maximum of two (2) informative advertising signs will be permitted for professional or business services rendered or produce sold on any one location. Such signs may not, in aggregate, total more than ten square feet of display area.
2. All home industry shall be subject to approval by the Planning Board. Persons desiring to operate such a business must make application to the Planning Board for a home business permit.
 - a. Each permit will be valid for one year from date of issue.
 - b. There will be a permit fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00) for the initial application and a renewal fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00).
 - c. Prior to the issuance of an initial permit, the Planning Board will hold a public meeting. Abutters within a three hundred foot radius will be notified of the time and date of this hearing by regular mail, such letter to include a copy of the permit application.
 - d. A formal site review may be required by the Planning Board if deemed necessary.
 - e. Renewals may be approved by the Planning Board with no requirements for a public meeting or notification of abutters unless, in the opinion of the Board, the business practices originally set forth and defined in the initial approval have changed.
 - f. No more than one business permit can be in effect for any one location. Multiple businesses may be covered by one permit.

3. Home businesses with a valid permit issued by the Planning Board prior to the effective date of this regulation will receive a renewal permit effective as of that date with no fee due.

Article V, Section J to read:

One or more signs of an informative or historical nature, or which pertain to the lease, sale or use of the lot or building on which they are placed will be permitted, except that they may total, in aggregate, no more than five square feet of surface area."

Recommended by the Planning Board

- B. "Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinances as follows:

To amend Article VII, by adding Section B which will read:

The change in status of a dwelling from a seasonal, recreational or second home to a home which is intended to be used as a primary or year-round dwelling shall be considered an alteration for the purposes of the building code of the Town of Atkinson. The granting of any permit shall be conditioned upon a showing that the waste-water disposal system appurtenant to the dwelling complies with the Town of Atkinson and New Hampshire Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission requirements in effect at the time of change of status. A permit by the building inspector and health officer of the Town of Atkinson obtained before any construction begin."

Recommended by the Planning Board

- C. "Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment #3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinances as follows:

Article IV, Section D, Paragraph 7 to read:

Determination of Minimum Lot Size

- a. Areas designated as poorly drained may be utilized to fulfill up to twenty-five percent of the minimum lot size required by the zoning ordinance for the district wherein the wetland is located.
- b. Areas designated as very poorly drained or fresh water marsh may not be utilized to fulfill any of the minimum lot size required by the zoning ordinance for the district wherein the wetland is located.
- c. Lots must also meet the requirements of the Land Subdivision Soils Regulations."

Recommended by the Planning Board

- D. "Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment #4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinances as follows:

To amend Article IV, General Provisions, by adding Section E which will read:

Flood Plain Conservation District Ordinance

1. Purpose and Intent. In the interest of public health, safety and welfare, the provisions of the Flood Plain Conservation District are intended to control and guide the uses of land areas subject to flooding. It is intended that the provisions of this District shall:
 - a. Promote the general health, safety and welfare of the community through certain restrictions of the use of land located within the flood plain.
 - b. Prevent the erection of structures in areas unfit for human usage by reason of danger from flooding, unsanitary conditions or other hazards.
 - c. Reduce the financial burdens imposed on the community, its governmental units and its individuals by frequent and periodic floods and overflow of lands.
 - d. Permit appropriate uses to be located in the flood plain as herein defined which will not impede the flow of flood waters or otherwise cause danger to life and property at or above or below their locations along the floodway.
 - e. Permit only those uses in the flood plain compatible to the preservation of natural conditions which are conducive to the maintenance of constant rates of water flow throughout the year; which withhold rapid water runoff contributing to down-stream flooding; and which provide area for groundwater absorption for maintenance of the subsurface water supply.
2. District Boundaries.

Definition. Flood plain is defined as those areas subject to periodic flooding and ponding as delineated by the Soil Conservation service, United States Department of Agriculture, in the Soil Survey of Rockingham County, dated March 1978. Although infrequent floods will exceed the limits delineated, those areas designated by soils bearing the numbers 6, 197, 295, 395, 495,

and 595 represent the areas most often inundated by flood waters and represent the most realistic flood plain for the purpose of this district.

Establishment of District. The limits of the Flood Plain Conservation District are hereby determined to be areas subject to frequent, periodic flooding and include all such areas delineated by the Soil Conservation Service, United States Department of Agriculture, in data and maps comprising the Soils Survey of Rockingham County, dated March 1978.

Adjustment of District Boundaries. Insofar as various natural conditions, including the plain as herein defined, may change, such change can be validated by detailed on-site survey techniques of a qualified Soils scientist. The Planning Board shall act upon the validation of the Soil Conservation Service and/or other appropriate agencies to adjust a change in boundaries immediately upon receipt of such information.

Relation of districts. Where the Flood Plain Conservation District is superimposed over another zoning district, the provisions requiring the strictest conservation of the greatest area of land shall apply.

3. **Permitted Uses.** The following uses are permitted in the Flood Plain Conservation District, provided they are in compliance with other municipal and State regulations.
 - a. Cultivation and harvesting of crops according to recognized soil conservation practices.
 - b. Pasture, grazing lands.
 - c. Outdoor plant nursery, orchards.
 - d. Recreation use such as: park, day camp, picnic area, golf course, hunting and fishing, excluding structures.
 - e. Forestry-Tree Farming, excluding storage and mill structures.
 - f. Harvesting of any wild crops, such as ferns, moss or berries.
 - g. Wildlife refuge, woodland preserve, arboretum.
 - h. Utility transmission lines.
 - i. Flood retention dams, culverts, bridges and roads.
4. **Prohibited Uses in Flood Plain Conservation District.**
 - a. The filling of flood plain lands except to build roads and dams in compliance with municipal and state regulations.
 - b. The removal of topsoil of damming or relocation of any watercourse except with the appropriate municipal and state approval.
5. **Prohibited Uses in areas contiguous to Flood Plain Conservation District.** The following uses are prohibited in areas bordering the Flood Plain Conservation District:
 - a. All permanent structures within a 100-foot horizontal distance from the boundaries of the Flood Plain Conservation District.
 - b. All structures between a 100-foot and 300-foot horizontal distance from the Flood Plain Conservation District boundaries with the exception of those whose lowest floor (including the basement) and openings are at least two feet above the elevation of the flood plain boundary.
 - c. All buildings with a height of more than two stories plus basement."

Recommended by the Planning Board

F. "Are you in favor of the adoption of amendment #5 as proposed BY PETITION of the voters for this Town?"

To amend the Atkinson Wetlands Zoning Ordinance, Article IV, to read:

Paragraph D-7

Title to read, "Minimum Lot Size"

In the text, after the word "requirements" add "according to Atkinson's zoning ordinance."

Paragraph D-8

Change "75-foot horizontal distance from a designated wetland boundary." to "100-foot horizontal distance from a designated wetland boundary."

Add Paragraph D-9, to read:

"Buffer Zones

Buffer zones shall be defined as those areas surrounding poorly or very poorly drained soils, freshwater marshes and perennial streams. In buffer zones, waste disposal and permanent structures shall be prohibited. Buffer zones shall terminate at 100 horizontal feet from the designated wetland boundary provided an elevation of 5 feet above the wetland boundary elevation has been reached. In the event that the 5 foot elevation has not been met at 100 horizontal feet, the buffer zone shall continue until an elevation of 5 feet above the wetland boundary elevation has been reached. In no case shall a buffer zone extend beyond 300 horizontal feet from a wetland boundary."

Not recommended by the Planning Board

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept Belknap Drive as a Town Road.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept Rockingchair Lane as a Town Road.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept Pebblebrook Road as a Town Road.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept Bittersweet Lane as a Town Road.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept Old Coach Road from Lot #93 to the end as a Town Road.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept Oak Hill Circle as a Town Road.

Annual Report of ATKINSON POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Atkinson Police Department had a very busy year in 1979. Most of our time was spent trying to stop the vandalism that took place in the west side of Town. The egg throwing at houses and the running over of lawns consumed a large portion of our operating budget. We finally had to use a road check at Sawmill and Meditation Lane and check every car entering and leaving the heights. I hope we did not inconvenience too many people. During 1979 the Atkinson Police Department held its first coloring contest for the Rockwell and Academy Schools which we plan to hold again in 1980.

The biggest problem the town and the Police Department has facing it in 1980 is a place for the kids to hang out. Most people do not want to see them around the store, or the Common, but the \$64,000 question is still unanswered, "where do they go"? 1980 is the year we should really get into finding a place for them, be it a boys club or some other building they can call their own in Town.

In 1979 we had 291 cases in Plaistow District Court, consisting of 265 motor vehicle complaints, 9 misdemeanor and felony cases, and 17 DWI cases with a conviction rate of 97%. The Police Officers were paid for 2,645 hours of road time and gave an additional 1,000 hours at no charge to the Town. If we had to pay for every hour the fellows and gals were out on the road patrolling the Town, the budget would be up 30-40%. The dispatch center received 6,812 calls of which 1,284 needed an Officer or two to respond at once. A Breakdown of calls are B & E 38, vandalism 184, outside theft 64, domestics 22. Total calls into dispatch are up 902 or 15%, outside thefts and B & E's were down by 5, but Malicious damage was up by 62 or 51%.

I feel you have a Police Department that you can be proud of and is dedicated to giving you, the Towns People the best protection possible. Drive defensively and have a good year.

That was our major concern this year. Culvert work that needed immediate attention included Devonshire Road, Westside Drive, Farview Hill Road, Upland Road, Pine Street, Juniper Lane and Meadow Lane.

Other Major projects included the hot topping of sections of Island Pond Road, Sawyer Avenue and Juniper Lane.

There has been much concern in town about the use of salt on our roads. I, too, am just as concerned but am also concerned with the condition of our roads in winter versus the peoples safety. But I would like to experiment reducing our salt usage and using more sand. Heavily travelled roads will still require salt but secondary roads will get less salt and more sand.

Inflation has hit this department as hard as, if not more than, all the other departments. I only hope that we can continue with the amount of work to be accomplished each year so that our roads may be kept up to the standards we all are accustomed to.

Annual Report of ATKINSON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In 1979 the Conservation Commission kept plodding along to acquire three parcels of land for the Town. After three years and a few set-backs we now have deeds to two of them and the third looks promising.

The largest of the two acquired is 35 acres of woodland adjoining Island Pond. The other is nearly 12 wooded acres in the Pope Road and Main Street area. Both were purchased primarily by federal funding (Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service) with incidental costs coming from the Conservation Commission budget.

A timber sale planned for some of the Town forest acreage (former Sawyer land) has been postponed until later in 1980 and '81.

Our Conservation Commission sponsored an Arbor Day program last May and gave away about 1300 pine and spruce seedlings to interested Atkinson residents. Also all of the third grade students learned a little about tree planting and helped set out about 200 tree seedlings on Town land.

On the conservation education scene, some of our members continued work with the school system. In addition all the Conservation Commissions of the Timberlane District worked together furnishing prize incentives for the Junior High Science Fair and plans are to continue the same this coming year. Town Clean-Up Day was again a success, thanks to the help of the school children and many other citizens.

We are interested in showing off our Town-owned lands to interested town people and plan to have a guided tour in the Spring. Ideas for better use of our natural resources are always welcome.

Annual Report of MASTER PLAN COORDINATING TEAM

Since last year, the Master Plan Coordinating Team has continued its four-phase study of the four assets in town that Atkinsonians strongly indicated they wanted to preserve in the town-wide Attitude Survey taken late in 1977: (1) low-density housing in a natural setting; (2) a non-polluted environment; (3) a pride in well-constructed and well-maintained buildings and land, both public and private; and (4) a responsible and reasonable tax program.

In a series of four open forums in early Spring of 1979, Team members and townspeople had an opportunity to learn about and discuss those factors which help a town to stay free of pollution. State and regional experts in their field offered background in five areas: water quality, energy, solid waste disposal, sewage waste disposal, noise control, and clean air.

By the end of April the Team had gathered a number of facts from its first two phases of study and had published the first of two fact-finding booklets designed to familiarize residents with background information on their town.

Later in the Spring, in a second series of open forums, the Team began the last two phases of its study by exploring the extent to which a town is able to regulate and control the design, development, use, and care of privately-owned and publicly-owned lands and buildings. In four or five sessions devoted to the subject, local officials and businessmen explained the role that designers, contractors, builders, planning boards, engineers, environmentalists, road agents, inspectors, groundskeepers, and selectmen play in creating a town whose lands and buildings are safe, sound, and well-kept. The fifth and final session was presented by a professional group of historians who were in the process of surveying the town of Atkinson and had already recognized a number of lands and buildings in town that had been cared for long enough and kept up well enough to have attained historical value.

In the Fall of 1979 the Team concluded its four-phase study of the town with a series of forums dealing with taxation and town financing. State, county, and local officials presented a detailed account of how Atkinson determines the amount of money it needs; how it gets a certain amount of money to pay the bills from sources other than property taxes; how it determines the amount of taxes each property owner should pay; how it apportions the money it collects according to town needs, county needs, and school needs; and how it can save money, increase its income, and plan ahead for large, necessary purchases in the future.

In December of 1979 the historical survey group returned and was able to give not only the Team, but several members of the Historical Society and other interested residents as well, a final report that detailed 115 buildings and sites of historic significance in town. At the same time, the Team distributed its first edition of a Historical Trails Map showing 19 specific, non-residential locations that are a part of town history.

1980 finds the Team, as well as other residents who attended some or all of the 18 open-forum study sessions held, familiar with the diverse and complex elements that go into constructing a Master Plan for the town. The Team is spending the months of January, February, and March on two tasks. First, it is gathering the facts that came from the last two phases of its study and is readying them for a March publication of the second fact-finders' booklet. Secondly, it is preparing to ask the townspeople to make specific choices regarding a number of options that are open to them for achieving their wish to have four community assets presently in the community (see first paragraph) secured for the future. All residential units in town will be receiving an Options Survey in the Spring which will be designed to give the Team detailed direction as to how Atkinsonians want to make use of the land within the boundaries of their town in the future.

The Team intends to use the information coming out of the Options Survey as the basis for the Master Plan. Presentation of the Master Plan in final form is expected to be presented to both the Planning Board and the townspeople in November of this year.

6. Approved eight building lots in two separate subdivisions;
7. Hopes to acquaint all the citizens with the zoning ordinances and regulations;
8. Is hoping to maintain the town's rural appearance while still achieving a balanced growth rate.

The Board's regular meetings are held on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month. The fourth Thursday is reserved for public business while the second Thursday is held for planning work. Planning Board meetings are open to the public. Feel free to visit and participate at any time.

Shown are proposed changes to the Atkinson Zoning Ordinance as recommended by the Atkinson Planning Board together with the ordinance as it presently reads. Both the old and the proposed ordinance are presented in accordance with a vote taken at the March 1979 Town Meeting.

Article V, Section H (current):

Residences may be used to house such uses by the owner or tenants as offices for doctor, engineer, architect, lawyer, real estate and insurance, or other recognized business offices and home occupations as hair dressing, dressmaking, manufacture or sale of gifts, antiques or craft products, the manufacture of food products, except that the number of persons employed at any one location shall not number more than two persons in addition to the owner or tenant. Home industry should not give the appearance of a commercial enterprise and all home industry shall be subject to approval by the Planning Board.

Article V, Section H (proposed) (Warrant article 2., A):

1. Residences may be used to house such uses by the owner or tenants as professional offices, other recognized business offices, or such home occupations as hairdressing, dressmaking, manufacture or sale of gifts, craft products, or food products produced on the premises. No more than three (3) people, including the owners or tenants, shall be employed at any one location. Such home industry shall not give the appearance of a commercial enterprise, except that a maximum of two (2) informative advertising signs will be permitted for professional or business services rendered or products sold on any one location. Such signs may not, in aggregate, total more than ten square feet of display area.

2. All home industry shall be subject to approval by the Planning Board. Persons desiring to operate such a business must make application to the Planning Board for a home business permit.
 - a. Each permit will be valid for one year from date of issue.
 - b. There will be a permit fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00) for the initial application and a renewal fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00).
 - c. Prior to the issuance of an initial permit, the Planning Board will hold a public meeting. Abutters within a three hundred foot radius will be notified of the time and date of this hearing by regular mail, such letter to include a copy of the permit application.
 - d. A formal site review may be required by the Planning Board if deemed necessary.
 - e. Renewals may be approved by the Planning Board with no requirements for a public meeting or notification of abutters unless, in the opinion of the Board, the business practices originally set forth and defined in the initial approval have changed.
 - f. No more than one business permit can be in effect for any one location. Multiple businesses may be covered by one permit.
3. Home businesses with a valid permit issued by the Planning Board prior to the effective date of this regulation will receive a renewal permit effective as of that date with no fee due.

Article V, Section J (current):

Property owners shall be allowed two informative advertising signs for produce sold on the premises or professional or business signs not to total over fifteen square feet in area; also one or more signs pertaining to the lease, sale or use of a lot or building on which placed, which shall not exceed a total area of five square feet; also informative or historical signs may be displayed but shall not exceed a total area of five square feet.

Article V, Section J (proposed) (Warrant article 2., A):

One or more signs of an informative or historical nature, or which pertain to the lease, sale or use of the lot or building on which they are placed will be permitted, except that they may total, in aggregate, no more than five square feet of surface area.

Article IV, Section D, Paragraph 7 (current):

Calculation of Minimum Lot Size. Areas designated as freshwater marshes, perennial or intermittent streams, or soils which are poorly or very poorly drained may not be used to satisfy minimum lot size requirements.

Article IV, Section D, Paragraph 7 (proposed) (Warrant article 2., C):

Determination of Minimum Lot Size

- a. Areas designated as poorly drained may be utilized to fulfill up to twenty-five percent of the minimum lot size required by the zoning ordinance for the district wherein the wetland is located.
- b. Areas designated as very poorly drained or fresh water march may not be utilized to fulfill any of the minimum lot size required by the zoning ordinance for the district wherein the wetland is located.
- c. Lots must also meet the requirements of the Land Subdivision Soils Regulations.

CIVIL DEFENSE**

During 1979 a new radio has been installed at the Fire Station with two-way' capability of emergency communication with surrounding Towns, and with other emergency agencies. All three of your CD officers are licensed amateur (Ham) radio operators with additional equipment at home for mobile and portable operation. Since communications is probably one of the most important factors needed in any emergency, we feel particularly well qualified in this area.

Future plans include a gradual build-up of repair equipment and emergency food and medical supplies through modest outlay with GSA and other Government agencies. We also will attend meetings with other CD officials dealing with our position relative to hazardous areas, evacuation routes, and other important considerations as outlined by State CD headquarters with whom we maintain regular contact. We will also conduct courses in Emergency first aid, CPR, and Multi-Media for interested citizens.

Emergency fuel, food, and shelter are currently being planned with other Atkinson officials. Although we hope to never use our knowledge, equipment, and abilities in a true emergency, some reassurance might be gained by our fellow Atkinson residents in knowing that the guys with the traditional white helmets and armbands are working seriously to prepare to assist our friends if ever necessary.

Annual Report of THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

1979 was a year of many changes for the Forest Fire Service in the Town of Atkinson. A new Forest Fire Warden and two new Deputy Fire Wardens were appointed by the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands.

The Town Fire Warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wildfire that occurs in his Town and must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow.

As Atkinson's new Fire Warden, I use this opportunity to remind residents of the regulations for the burning of brush in the State of New Hampshire. "Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the Forest Fire Warden. No open fires can be authorized between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. unless it is raining. Commercial burning is excepted from the 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. regulation, but requires the approval of the District Chief of the Forest Fire Service. Camping and cooking fires, including backyard fireplaces also require the approval of the Fire Warden before they are kindled."

Anyone planning to kindle an open fire of any kind shall contact me or one of the Deputy Wardens listed below to obtain a permit before burning. No permit is required when the ground is covered with snow but residents are requested to notify the Fire Warden or the Atkinson Fire Chief before kindling an open fire of any kind, even when snow covered. Wildfire is a joint state and Town program and Wardens are on call to suppress forest fires anywhere in New Hampshire at anytime. Deputy Warden Donald L. Murphy, Jr. was called to serve on a team of trained Forest Fire Fighters outside the State of New Hampshire twice in 1979. This team assisted in the suppression of the Idaho/Montana forest fires and again later in the fall at the California Canyon fires. I would like to publically thank Donald for the Town of Atkinson for his service above and beyond the call of duty.

We experienced three woods fires and thirteen brush fires during 1979. Please join our Wardens and help reduce the incidents of such fires in 1980.

Annual Report of SOUTHERN ROCKINGHAM REGIONAL PLANNING DISTRICT COMMISSION

The SRRPDC serves Atkinson and six neighboring towns. It coordinates planning issues which are regional in scope, and serves as a forum for interchange of information between the representatives from these towns. This past year major emphasis was placed on wetlands legislation, groundwater resources, soils mapping, public transportation, and historic preservation. The Commission has made several public presentations relating to the above topics in Atkinson and the other member towns. The Commission staff has also given direct technical assistance to the towns for such things as on-site soils analysis, community census, historic buildings inventory, and others.

This year one of our major sources of funds, the Environmental Protection Agency, was significantly reduced, but for good reason. We successfully completed a three-year water quality study under EPA auspices. This required a personnel cutback, but we have retained a competent staff to address most of our needs.

During this next year, SRRPDC intends to be active locally by assisting the Planning Board, Coordinating Team, and Conservation Commission. Thus support to the town will continue commensurate with needs and funding.

Annual Report of TOWN FORESTER

Atkinson has over 200 acres of woodlands; all of which needs a thinning. The Conservation Commission and the Town Forester working together have plans for light cuttings over the next several years, producing saw logs and firewood on a sustained yield basis.

The energy crunch and resulting importance of firewood has created much interest by the Atkinson residents in cutting some or all of their firewood. The Town has made available cutting permits for a small fee and in 1979 about thirty permits were issued. Over four acres of Town forest land was marked in 1979 by the Town Forester and supervised cutting resulted. The cutting is done according to a strict set of rules.

The firewood thinning on the five-acre Providence Hill Town land was finished during the summer and for the past few months we have been working on the former Chadwick land along the Pope Road. No good estimate as to the amount of wood removed is available, but a guess might be three to four cords per acre.

The continued success of our free (except for permit fee) firewood program is directly related to the cooperation of those doing the cutting. Our woodlands are an important asset to our Town. It is essential that we take care of them.

Annual Report of ATKINSON HISTORICAL SOCIETY

In March of 1975, the Town of Atkinson voted to appropriate the sum of \$5,995.00 for the printing of our town's first history book, with the provision that it be paid back when the books were sold. The Historical Society finished paying back the town last November, an achievement we are pleased to report. There are still copies of this book—ATKINSON THEN AND NOW—available, and Mr. Dan Ahern is in charge of them.

During the past year the Historical Society participated in meetings with other organizations as well as those of our own. We were contacted last Spring by the Strafford Rockingham Regional Council's Historic Preservation Assistance Project for assistance in their work of identifying and cataloging the historic buildings and sites in Atkinson. We supplied them access to our early maps of the town, and referred them to our history book, as well as other pertinent records. They held two meetings, in June and December in which they reported their historic findings and recommendations for the town. Their work is of great value to our historic records, and will be given to the town in a permanent form when completed.

Last summer two of our members conducted a tour of the Museum with Mrs. Linda Jette and a group of children who had been learning something of the history of Atkinson.

We shall greatly miss Mrs. Eleanor Zaremba, who has moved to Florida. She was our able Curator, and was completely responsible for the money for our book sales and kept accurate records of our debt to the town.

The Historical Society welcomes donations of historical value for our Museum. Such donations do not necessarily have to be old, present day articles and records will contribute to future historic information.

We take this opportunity to welcome our new members, and invite those interested in preserving our history to join us and take an active part in our organization.

Annual Report of THE HEALTH OFFICER

The year 1979 was a year for more than the normal number of failures of septic systems. Most failures involved homes that were fifteen years or older, when there were few regulations. Since the Town has adopted the regulations requiring that a leach bed be 1,000 sq. ft. or larger, there have been no failures when the systems have been properly installed. I feel, at this time, I would like to inform the residents of Atkinson of the new state regulation.

"RSA 149-E, 3A System Installer Permit. No person shall engage in the business of installing subsurface sewage or waste disposal systems under this Chapter without first obtaining an installer permit from the Commission".

Designers fall under this regulation as well. If a home owner should have a failure with their waste water disposal system, they should be aware of this regulation prior to negotiations with a designer or installer.

Annual Report of NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

The Newmarket Regional Health Center has made great strides in 1979 towards improving services for the residents of Atkinson. The number of people utilizing the services offered by the Center continues to grow at a rapid rate. Over 20,000 rides were provided by the Senior Citizen Transportation Service in 1979, an increase of 5,000 rides over the previous year. Following our move to a new and expanded facility, our utilization of medical services has increased 38% over the 1978 utilization level. In addition to the medical services provided by the Center, there has also been a significant increase in preventive and community health services.

In November of 1978, the Center moved its base of operations from its crowded second floor location on Main Street to a newly-renovated building on 14 Elm Street. The building is ideal, being centrally located with amply parking space for patients and staff. All of the Center's services are located on the first floor, and are easily accessible to handicapped individuals through the use of a wheelchair ramp. The medical clinic has expanded to include four fully-equipped examination rooms (three adult and one pediatric), separate laboratory facilities, a counseling room, receptionist's station, and extra waiting room space.

The Center's medical services are provided by Sarah Oxnard, M.D., Mr. Michael Lewis, a Registered Physician's Assistant, and Ann Morgan, a Nurse Practitioner. The medical team also includes a nurse and a Health Aide who performs the bulk of laboratory procedures at the Center, both of whom assist the physician and physician's assistant. The Center's Community Health Workers work closely with the Medical Staff to ensure the appropriate continuity of care for its diverse patient population. In addition, they coordinate preventive screening clinics to detect potential health hazards, hold information workshops open to the public, and act as a liaison between the medical provider and the patient. To make a medical appointment, call the Center at 659-3106 or toll-free at 1-800-582-7279.

The Senior Citizen Transportation Service provides regularly scheduled bus service for the elderly of Atkinson and other area communities. Transportation to medical and dental care, social services, food and clothes shopping, and day-long excursions to social events are but a few of the many activities available to seniors. Annual Report of KIMBALL PUBLIC LIBRARY

The library has enjoyed a record year in book circulation: a total of 26,316 books were borrowed, 4,681 more books were borrowed than in 1978. On August 25, 1979, 351 books were taken home—a record daily high! More people are also taking advantage of borrowing the magazines available at the library, and several subscriptions have been donated this year.

We are grateful to our efficient staff for much of this success: Mrs. Muriel Hirsch, Head Librarian; Mrs. Linda Jette, Children's Librarian; and Mrs. Dorothy Gordon, Assistant Librarian. Heartfelt thanks are also due to our twenty volunteers who donate their time on a regular basis to help keep the library functioning so efficiently.

Thanks to The Friends of the Library, the library has a new multi-level card catalog file. The Friends also sponsored the popular Mother Goose story hour for pre-schoolers and a Christmas Craft Shop for elementary-age children. In addition, The Friends decorate the library for Christmas.

We would also like to thank residents who have donated in any way to the library during the year, as well as Girl Scout Troop #302, Garden Club, the Civic Club for sponsoring the Tree-Lighting party, and Dave Vandewater for constructing the Puppet Theatre.

During the summer, Mrs. Jette organized the very successful Reading Program, Puppet Theatre Group, and the play "Atkinson, Then, Now and in the Future". The Little Red Wagon visited again this summer. During the school year, local kindergarteners and first graders are entertained at the Puppet Theatre. Older Students also use the library as part of their regular school program, and Scrabble Tournaments are now held periodically.

The Function Room continues to be used by at least eight organizations on a regular basis. The Function Room may be reserved by calling our Function Room Coordinator and by filling out the required form.

Work on the Lyman Samuel Gray Memorial Rock Garden was started late this fall and will be completed in the spring.

In order to comply with state regulations for towns with more than 4,000 residents, the library will now be open three more hours per week on Wednesdays, 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. We welcome all residents at the library as well as any suggestions to better serve the people of Atkinson.
