To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough, in said State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To bring forward your ballots for the necessary town officers and school officers for the ensuing year and the ensuing three years. Polls are to open at 10:00 A.M. and are not to close before 6:00 P.M. At 8:00 P.M. action will be taken on the following Articles in the Town Warrant:

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, up to the sum of \$50,000.00 if needed, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for interest thereon.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,235.00 for the operation and mainteance of the Bedford Public Library.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for repairs and renovation to the second floor of the Bedford Public Library.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,319.37 for Construction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$8.795.82.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,000.00 for the tarring of Class V Highways under the direction of the Selectmen.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the Town.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for damages and legal expense including dog damage.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Grader.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a Tractor Loader.

- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 to apply to the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a new fire truck.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 for the care of Cemeteries.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,200.00 to operate and maintain the Police Department.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the Planning Board.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Board of Adjustment.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$556.00 for Civil Defense. (Budget Committee Recommends \$250.00).
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38.88 for the installation of a street light near the Arnos property on utility pole No. 48 on the South side of Donald Street. (Submitted without recommendation of Budget Comm.).
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to re-classify a parcel of land of approximately one acre, owned by Roger E. Bellmare, located West of U. S. Rte. 3, Bedford, N. H., bordering parallel to the turnpike, from Agricultural to Industrial, the land to then be acquired by the Antenna Systems, Inc. of Manchester, N. H. for the purpose of constructing a tower together with a transmitter control house and storage of related equipment, to establish a test range from its plant located at Grenier Field.

- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to re-classify a parcel of land owned by George Caron, 444 Boynton St., Bedford, N. H. of approximately three acres in area, located at the Northeast corner of Rte. 101 and Interstate Highway 93, from Residential to Commercial, for the purpose of erecting thereon, an eight to ten unit motel.
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to re-classify a parcel of land of approximately 76 acres now belonging to A. J. Lindahl and Lovell A. Wright by petition of Joseph Dorion of Londonderry, N. H., holder of an option on this land, from its present classification of Agricultural to Commercial. Mr. Dorion proposes to construct thereon twelve apartment type buildings consisting of six living units in each building. His immediate plans are to start with three such apartment buildings, and the other nine to be later constructed.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Fire Chief, or his duly authorized agent, to charge a fee of \$5.00 for issuing oil burner permits pursuant to Chapter 251 Laws of 1947 as amended.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept the West end of Horizon Drive beginning at the South side of Smith Road and continuing in a Southerly direction for a distance of 1,100' x 50' wide. (including a turn around).
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept Briar Road from a point on Wallace Road Westerly for a distance of 2,600' x 50' wide including a turn around at the Westerly end.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 in trust from Mrs. Evelyn Bennett, the interest to be expended for the care of the Arthur J. Bennett lot in the Bedford Center New Cemetery.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$250.00 in trust from the Estate of Mertie M. Darrah, the interest to be expended for the care of the Darrah-Batchelder lot in the Bedford Center New Cemetery.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 in trust from Stanley H. Jamroz, the interest to be expended for the care of the Jamroz lot in the Bedford Center New Cemetery.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### BEDFORD PLANNING BOARD

As a result of the recommendations of the Planning Board, the Town voted at the last Town Meeting to approve an article which authorized the Town to engage a Planning Consultant with funds provided by the Town, State and Federal Governments. After consideration of proposals from several firms engaged in this type of business, the Planning Board made its selection. A contract was negotiated by the State Department Resources and Economic Development with the firm of Metcalf and Eddy of Boston. Mr. James Woglom was appointed by the firm to conduct the survey and to present his recommendations to the Planning Board. The State appointed Mr. Leonard F. Hubbard to supervise the activities and maintain liaison between the Town and the State Department of Resources and Economic Development. The contract is for a term of eighteen months during which time the consultant will make written reports to the Planning Board, as he completes the various phases of the overall plan.

Up to the present, two such reports have been submitted to the Planning Board. The first was a "School Study and Plan, Interim Report" which was issued immediately prior to the vote of the School District on the proposed school consolidation with Amherst. The second report was, "Proposed Land Subdivision Regulations."

These proposals have been suggested as a guide for future regulations to provide for the control of underdeveloped land in the Town through review by the Planning Board. Subdivision plats would be submitted to the Planning Board to insure conformance with the long range comprehensive Town Plan. Once land has been cut into streets and lots, the "die is cast", and the pattern is difficult to change. Therefor, it is vital that definite standards and local review procedure be established, to make sure that a particular subdivision is designed and improvements installed in the best interests of the whole community. In order that the Town may become thoroughly familiar with the benefits and consequences of subdivision control, as many public hearings will be held as seems necessary before the Town is asked to approve an ordinance which

will grant to the Planning Board the power to approve or disapprove in its discretion, plats showing new streets or parks. It is expected that a Special Town Meeting will be called later this year for this purpose.

As Chairman, I wish to thank those former members for the time and effort they devoted to the affairs of the Planning Board, and the assistance and cooperation they gave me while serving on the Board.

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE CIVIL DEFENSE AGENCY BEDFORD, N. H.


The Bedford Civil Defense Executive Committee met on the last Sunday of each month at 8:00 P.M. in the offices of Paul Johonnett who kindly loaned his facilities for this purpose.

Richard Durette, Chief of Radiological Monitoring Unit, and George Cleaver, newly appointed Chief of Communications, report the past year's activities as follows:

- 1. Continued weekly manning of the Hillsborough County Radio net, their radio operators rotating this duty, while the RACES Net is in session.
- 2. Completed Radio coverage of Bedford Area using the Six Meter Radio Band. We now know we have complete communication capability, using the Town Hall as our operating base.
- 3. Established a Local Radio Net for the town of Bedford, which can be used to tie together all CD Units, during any emergency. Three units are Mobile, and we hope to add more this coming year.
- 4. Set up three Radiological Monitoring Stations under State of New Hampshire auspices, background radiation readings taken at regular intervals, reports sent in to headquarters in Concord. One station is located in the Boynton Street area, one in Ministerial Branch area, and one in the Wayfarer area.
- 5. Purchased six Radiation Detective Kits to be used by various Town Units, such as Fire, Police, Engineering, Medical, etc. during any nuclear disaster.

Paul Johonnett, Chief of Transportation has conferred with School authorities with intent to develop a rapid evacuation of





children to homes from schools in Bedford. Also, he is establishing a system of rationing for heating and transport fuels.

Dr. Walter Rahmanop, Chief of Medical Services, is developing an Emergency Ambulance Corps, plans for several First Aid stations, and an Emergency Nurses Corps for Bedford.

Leo Bongers, Jr., First Aid and Light Rescue Service Chief, will assist Fire Chief Ernest Jenkins, in giving First Aid and Light Rescue classes to the fireman as well as to the Engineering Unit.

Rolland McMurphy, newly appointed Chief of Engineering Unit, assisted by Richard Ramig, is building an inventory of all types of construction equipment located in the town, for use in possible emergency.

Police Chief Bruno Vincent expects to build a corps of auxiliary C.D. police trained especially in traffic control.

Welfare Director Ray Starita reports:

Mass feeding Chief Joseph Tambini has completed a survey of all restaurants in the town as mass feeding stations, located adequate equipment and utensils for any emergency.

Bernice Wiggin, Chief of Registration and Information, has had one training course, will hold others, and a refresher for new and old members of her staff.

Grace Wiggin, Chief of Housing and Billeting, will use C.D. formula for housing large numbers of displaced persons and refugees in houses in Bedford. Records of Selectmen will be used as basic information.

Zepherine Chesbro and Evelyn Goad, Chiefs of Clothing, will use basement of Parish House as headquarters for collection and disbursement of clothing.

Freeman Shaw, Treasurer for Bedford, will be in charge of all financial assistance and records of such for Bedford.

John Loxton, newly appointed member of the Executive Committee, working with Ralph Wiggin, Jr. responsible for blowing

CD horn in CD emergency, is devising a method by which areas of Bedford who do not hear the CD horn may be alerted to a CD emergency.

# PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

- 1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
- 2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
- 3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
- 4. Have something to keep the fire under control—pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
- 5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
- If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to instill in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire. In 1962 we had 25 fires. We burned 100 acres. Permits issued, 386.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY

During the year 1962, certain improvements have been made to the physical plant of the library. The main library sign was repainted early in the year. The library building has been insulated according to plans set up in 1961. The building was also fumigated. This was necessary because silverfish were doing real damage to many books. A book slot has been installed in the front door of the library which will enable people who have borrowed books to return them at any time. A filing cabinet for new pamphlet material has been purchased. These changes with the new charging tray for the librarian's desk, the gift of Mrs. Edith Farrar, have added greatly to the efficiency of the routine work of the library. Aside from the purchase of new books all through the year, it is a pleasure to report the purchase of "The World Book Encyclopedia". This will be of great help to our young people.

An additional three hours has been added to the hours the library is open weekly. The library is now open on Tuesday 2-5 and 7-9 p.m., on Thursday 2-5 p.m., and on Friday 2-5 and 7-9 p.m.—making a total of thirteen hours.

Aside from the regular routine of the library during the past vear, special activities are of interest. National Library Week during April was observed with an Art Exhibit at the Library, which included exhibits in photography, sculpture and oil paintings by Bedford people, together with an exhibit of books dealing with art. The result was a delightful showing in which twenty-one people exhibited their work. By request, the exhibit was held over a second week, and there have been many requests that it be repeated in 1963. In connection with the observance of National Library Week the Annual Authors 'Luncheon was held in Concord with James Michener as speaker. Our two librarians with a group of friends attended this very outstanding event. At this meeting an announcement was made of the award of a scholarship to Frances M. Wiggin, our librarian, allowing her to attend the course on "Public Library Techniques" given at the University of New Hampshire during the summer.

A summer Reading Contest for Young People was conducted this last year much as it has been done during the last few years. The results with seventy-one children participating and approximately five hundred books read was most gratifying. The winners of the contest were entertained by the librarians at a Hallowe'en party at the library with fourteen children present in costume. Also during the summer the following Girl Scouts received badges for assisting with library work under the supervision of Mrs. Wiggin and Mrs. Peck: Sally Rice. Jane Johonnett, and Meredith Stanley. "National Book Week" was observed in November. Among other activities our two librarians visited Stevens-Buswell School and told stories to some of the children there.

The trustees with the librarians have met monthly, with the exceptions of July and August, and state and area meetings have been attended by both librarians and trustees. In May Mrs. Wiggin and Mrs. Peck attended the New Hampshire Library Association at the Carpenter Hotel, at which time Mrs. Wiggin began her second year as First Vice-President of the Association. In September Mrs. Wiggin and Mr. Bailey attended a Publicity Workshop at Durham. In October Mrs. Smiley attended the Annual Meeting of the New Hampshire Library Trustees Association at Concord. At this meeting Mrs. Edith Farrer was given a special award for outstanding service to the Bedford Library. Early in November Mrs. Wiggin, Mr. Bailey and Mr. Hyde attended the Neighborhood Meeting held at the Chandler Library in Nashua. These meetings are an important part of the year's work, as they keep us in touch with both state and local activities.

Many New Hampshire libraries have organized "Friends of the Library". The Bedford library has not felt the need of such an organization because we have so many active and valuable friends helping all through the year. Mrs. Florence Nickolls who retired as a member of the Board of Trustees in March, 1962, after six years of untiring and efficient service, remains always a devoted friend of this library. The hours that Mrs. Edith Farrar has given the library during the past year in cataloguing, mending books, revising the pamphlet file and in countless other ways, have been tremendously helpful. Her daughter, Mrs. Helen Fletcher, graciously gave many hours of service to the library during the fall to relieve Mrs. Peck during the illness of Mr. Peck. Both librarians are most enthusiastic as to the quality of the work Jane Johannett, a High School student, has given to the library week after week

during 1962. Mr. John Reilly, Jr. served ad interim for Robert Bailey, Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, during ten months of 1961 and 1962 while Mr. Bailey was recalled for duties at Fort Bragg. His services were most cheerfully and efficiently rendered, and were greatly appreciated by all of us. Mr. Bailey was welcomed back at our monthly board meeting in September, 1962. Our thanks for gifts of books go to the Bedford Garden Club, the Mother's Club of the Bedford Presbyterian Church, the Bedford Women's Club and the Stevens-Buswell Post of the American Legion Auxiliary and to the many other friends from whom we have received gifts of books and magazines. We also wish to acknowledge gratefully the gift of a beautiful statuette of Michael Angelo's David from the Rev. and Mrs. Albert Watson.

We do, however, have a real problem to face as we realize the over-crowded condition prevailing in our present library building. Mrs. Wiggin is constantly faced with the necessity of discarding books, finding room for the students of Bedford who must be helped as well as readers who would occasionally like to linger to look at a magazine or a reference book. Other problems arise continually because of this condition. It is our aim this coming year to utilize every possible inch of space in the library. We hope to put the three small rooms on the second floor in better working order. looking forward always to the time when our library can be more adequately housed. In closing this report we can only point once more to the continuing rise in population in Bedford, to the increase of readers in our library which accompanies this rise and to the increase of books which we will have to purchase to satisfy these readers. What are you going to do about it? Please do not forget our library in your plans for the future Bedford.

# THE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION OF MANCHESTER, NEW HAMPSHIRE

Since 1956 the services of the Visiting Nurse Association of Manchester, New Hampshire have been available to the residents of Bedford, New Hampshire. This includes general nursing care to people of all ages including convalescents returning from the hospital, sick children and follow up care to crippled children, changing dressings, help with special exercises and home treatments as well as hypodermic injections under the direction of the patient's physician.

Instructions to Expectant Parents in infant care before and after the baby is born and guidance in family health problems are also included in services provided by the Visiting Nurse. Classes for Expectant Parents are held twice a year in the Spring and Fall at the Visiting Nurse Association headquarters, 194 Concord Street, Manchester, N. H. For information telephone 622-3781.

1962 was a busy year for the Bedford Health Officer. This was due primarily to the very complex nature of some of the problems referred to us. The following data gives an idea of the types of work done.

Home building specifications were examined and approved for several Federal Loans.

Sabin Oral Polio Vaccine Clinics were held at the Town Hall on June 26, July 31 and Sept. 9 in the evening. The Manchester Health Dept. was most helpful in obtaining and storing Vaccine for us and advising us about supplies and procedures. Mrs. Roy Jenkins recruited a large number of volunteers to run the Clinics. Especial thanks go to those of our Police Officers and other townspeople who helped out with the unexpectedly large crowds at the June Clinic. The Selectmen received the sum of \$422.52 after clinic expenses were paid. Thanks to everyone's fine coopration a large percentage of Bedford families were immunized as well as many people in the Manchester area who attended these Clinics.

#### REPORT OF BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD

For the past year it has been my pleasure to be the chairman of your School Board. It has been an extremely busy year and some very important decisions have been reached regarding the future development of our school system. Other equally important decisions face us this year.

For some time now superintendents, school boards, various committees and professional educational consultants have pointed out to us the problems which faced us and have offered their several opinions as to how we should solve them. Bedford has grown so much in a few short years and this growth has brought with it many town and school problems. While progress may not have seemed fast enough to some, real progress has been made—progress which has looked to the solution of our problems within the ability of the taxpayer to pay.

The first step in this direction was the building of the Memorial School in 1955. The next step was the 4-room addition to that school in 1959. This year you are being asked to take step 3—an ambitious step but one which should go a long way toward solving our school problems. It has the enthusiastic backing of the State Department of Education, the town planning consultant, the superintendent and the School Board and we earnestly hope it will also have your enthusiastic support.

The program is made up of two parts and takes into consideration both the elementary and secondary school needs. One article in the warrant calls for the signing of a five-year contract with Manchester. This should take care of our immediate needs on this level and give us the necessary time to see how our town is developing and if in the future we will want to continue this arrangement. The other half of the package calls for a two-room addition to the Memorial School and a new Upper Elementary School of 12 classrooms and core facilities for an eventual 24 classroom building. This will be a very flexible plan which will allow adaptation to elementary or secondary needs. It will also allow us to close the Donald Street, Stevens-Buswell and Peter Woodbury Schools, thus operating more efficiently and economically.

As for reports on the condition of our present buildings and curriculum, etc., I shall leave these matters to others better qualified than I. I would, however, like to say "thank you" to the many people whose cooperation and hard work make our schools the good schools they are—Superintendent Ramsay, Teacher Consultant Edwards, the principals, teachers, custodians, cooks, Nurse Gladys Smend and new Hot Lunch Director Ruth Gott. I would also like to thank the members of the Steering Committee who gave so much of their time and effort in the consolidation study. And lastly, thank you to the Selectmen, the Planning Board and the Budget Committee who have all been ready to supply information and to help in every way to make our job an easier one.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bedford, I submit with pleasure my eighth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Within the last few months, Bedford has had the opportunity to express itself on one solution to the problem of adequately housing the pupils of Bedford Schools, with a prevailing opinion that the elementary needs have first consideration. With this in mind, your School Board is proposing in the current school budget that the solution to the above needs be carried out in the following manner:

The addition of two classrooms to the Bedford Memorial School, to be ready for the Fall of 1963. This would allow for the closing of the Donald Street School and would bring the Bedford Memorial School to its maximum size and at the same time have that building ready to play its part in the overall program.

In addition to the above, your School Board is proposing the building of a new 12 room upper elementary school to house Grades 5-8, with core facilities for an eventual twenty-four room building. Facilities would include a cafetorium and kitchen, a central library, a gymnasium that could be used for town affairs, and a science laboratory. This building would be constructed in such a manner that should Bedford ever want to move into its own high school program, it could do so with a minimum of effort and expense. Plans for this forward looking program are included in this current budget and deserve your careful consideration. As voters of the Bedford School District, the final decision is yours to make.

#### **NEW TEACHERS**

Mr. Anthony Buteau, B.A. St. Anselms of 1962, to replace Louis Nardello as a Science teacher and Coach in Grades 7, 8. Mr. Nardello resigned to accept a teaching position in Manchester West High School.

Miss Elizabeth Frye, B.Ed. P.T.C. 1955; M.S. Wheelock College 1962, to replace Mrs. Virginia Taylor in Grade 1. Mrs. Taylor

resigned to accept a position in the Mastricola School, Merrimack. Miss Frye comes to us with five years teaching experience in the schools of New Hampshire and New York.

Mrs. Margery Muskat, B.S. in Elem. Ed., B.U. 1962, to replace Mrs Sylvia Edmunds who was assigned the position of Special Class teacher. Mrs. Muskat teaches Grade 6.

Mrs. Constance Patchen, B.S. Univ of Conn 1946, with extension courses at U.N.H., as additional teacher in Grade 4.

Mrs. Thelma Taggart, Manchester Institute of Arts and Sciences, with summer courses at Newark, New Jersey, to replace Mrs. Hazel Hennessey as Art teacher. Mrs. Hennessey resigned to become a full time Art teacher at Alvirne High School, Hudson. We are fortunate in having a teacher with Mrs. Taggart's background and experience to carry on our Art program in the Bedford Schools.

#### INSTRUCTION

The instructional program under the guidance of Teacher Consultant, Raymond G. Edwards and Principals Evelyn Barton, Dorothy Marcy and Donald Fournier is progressing very satisfactorily. As Mr. Edwards' report follows in more detail, I shall only say here that I have been very pleased with the way principals and teachers have cooperated with Mr. Edwards in furthering a sound up-to-date instructional program. My confidence in your Teacher Consultant has been well placed.

#### SCHOOL LUNCH

Mrs. Ruth Gott, School Lunch Director, has done an excellent job in maintaining a quality school lunch program. Mrs. Gott has spent many hours in mastering the many details that go along with such a position. It is to the credit of Mrs. Gott, the cooks, and their aides that this has been done with such apparent ease. Congratulations to all concerned.

I would like to add that because she no longer needs to divide her efforts, Gladys Smend can now devote all her efforts to Health services, which has already proven to the advantage of all the school children.

#### MAINTENANCE

Your School Board, in keeping with its past policy, is meeting the demands of repair and replacements as they arise. This is wise in that it keeps problems at a minimum. The general maintenance as carried out by the custodians is very good. Mr. Ellison's ability to accomplish many small repair jobs along with his regular work, has saved numerous calls for outside labor. Mr. Cupples' pride in the Peter Woodbury School is sincerely appreciated by all concerned. I would like also to express appreciation to Mr. Harrington in his efforts to provide a good maintenance program at Stevens-Buswell.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

Bedford has some interesting years in its immediate future. With the increased demands for town services that are a natural outgrowth of increased population, it is sometimes difficult not to lose sight of the fact that our Young People and their education deserve prime consideration. It will be the job of your School Board and this Office to insure that the educational needs of the Youth of Bedford are more than adequately met. My main concern in this report has been to apprize you of our thinking in this matter. This is by no means a new frontier, but, it is a challenge.

In closing I want to once again express my sincere appreciation to the School Board, citizens, and all school personnel for their friendliness and cooperation. It is a pleasure to be associated with Bedford School System.

#### TEACHER CONSULTANT'S REPORT

Mr. Louis Ramsay Superintendent of Schools Bedford, N. H.

Dear Mr. Ramsay:

The following paragraphs constitute my first report to you as Teacher Consultant in the Town of Bedford, New Hampshire. As I stated last year in my report as Principal of Pelham's E. G. Sherburne School, maintaining high standards of instruction is a task continued successfully only by means of a high degree of cooperation by all members of the team associated with the school. During the past year I have found the team associated with the Bedford Elementary Schools to be closely knit, cooperative, and working toward a common goal of providing better education for the youth of Bedford. It is indeed a privilege to be a member of this team.

Any educational team can best be evaluated by the degree of progress attained in intensifying and diversifying the instructional program. I believe the record of the past year speaks well for the Town of Bedford.

Modern mathematics is now a reality in our school system. Last September the program was instituted in grades 1 and 2, and will be followed by grades 3 and 4 next September. I am indeed proud of the dedicated efforts of our teachers to make this program a success. The entire staff is making every effort to acquire additional training in this field at considerable cost.

A modern mathematics program was also begun last fall in the 7th grade and will be followed by the 8th grade next September. Every effort is being made to better prepare our children for advanced mathematics courses at the High School of their choice.

A few words of explanation concerning the modern mathematics program is here called for. What are we trying to accomplish? Very briefly, the new approach gives emphasis to the development of mathematical ideas, number meanings and principles of operation. Very important to this approach is the encouragement of children to discover these principles for themselves by relating a situation

to the concrete. Skill in computation has always been and always will be of the utmost importance. But the days when emphasis is placed wholly on the learning of isolated facts and the memorization of specific rules to be followed in computation are passing rapidly. Real learning is meaningful learning. It must be developmental—it must be structurally oriented.

On a planned basis, the basal reading series will presently be brought up to date. The new edition of the Scott Foresman reading series already in use in the supervisory union has been extremely helpful in improving instruction in this very important area. It behooves us to remember that increased excellence in reading instruction remains the primary key to the future learning success of our children. Our constant attention should be directed toward that end.

Bedford has reason to be very proud of the calibre of textbooks available to the children. We have made a great deal of progress in modernizing all textbook series currently in use. To keep up with the modern textbook needs in a constantly growing community is indeed a difficult challenge. The people of Bedford are very effectively meeting that challenge.

The results of last year's standardized testing program indicates clearly the excellence of instruction in the Bedford schools. No schools that I know of in the State of New Hampshire can boast of a higher achievement record.

To maintain these high standards we need to constantly watch the size of our classes. All the gimmicks in the world will never replace good teaching and small classes as the primary prerequisites to high academic achievement.

Paul L. O'Neil closed his last report to the town of Litchfield with a quote from Benjamin Willis, one of our nation's top educators. I believe that quote to be worth repeating. "Generally, to speak of the school is to conjure up in the public mind an image of a building. It would be closer to the truth if the word School were to bring to mind a picture of the Teacher. The Teacher Makes The School."
