RECORDS OF COUNTY DELEGATION

Concord, N. H., Jan. 15, 1935.

The Belknap County Delegation met in room 100 of the State House at the close of the morning session.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Neal.

Mayor Charles E. Carroll of Laconia spoke to the delegation in regard to relief projects and on the subject of the construction of a road between the Weirs and Meredith.

The delegation decided to hold a hearing on appropriation for the Extension service a week from next Thursday.

The delegation then went into executive session.

It was moved to raise a sum not to exceed \$4,000 to pay for one-half the cost of the Weirs Road Project, provided the city of Laconia would pay for the balance of the cost. The motion prevailed. The meeting then adjourned.

Concord, N. H., Jan. 24, 1935.

The Belknap County Delegation met in room 100 of the State House after the close of the morning session.

Mr. Arthur Rollins of Alton, President of the Belknap County Farm Bureau was heard in relation to the appropriation for the Agricultural Extension Service.

Mr. Royal Smith of Laconia spoke on the Extension service.

Mr. Weeks of Gilford spoke on the proposed ski jump in Gilford. He likewise presented communications from Charles B. Proctor of Hanover and the

Eastern Amateur Ski Association in relation to this subject.

The delegation then went into executive session.

In executive session it was moved by Mr. Carroll that we authorize the Commissioners to purchase 80 acres of land on Rowe Mt. in Gilford for a ski jump project.

Mr. Carroll withdrew his motion.

It was moved that a public hearing be held next Tuesday after the session and that representatives of the ski association and relief organizations be invited to attend.

It was moved by Mr. Dodge that a sum of \$5,400 be appropriated for the Agricultural Extension service in Belknap County.

(Discussion ensued)

The question being on the motion of Mr. Dodge, the motion prevailed.

The meeting then adjourned.

Concord, N. H., Jan. 28, 1935.

The meeting was held after the morning session and was called to order by Chairman Neal.

Mayor Charles E. Carroll appeared and spoke on the desirability of appropriating money for relief purposes in the construction of a new road between the Weirs and Meredith.

County Commissioner Joseph Smith spoke in favor of a new cow barn at the County Farm. He said that this would cost the county about \$10,000.

County Commissioner Fred Weeks was heard in favor of appropriation for a ski jump project in Gilford.

Edward Lydiard of Laconia spoke in favor of the ski jump. Messrs. Roberts of Laconia and Henry Turner of Laconia spoke in favor of the ski jump.

Mr. Charles A. Rollins of Alton spoke in favor of extending the ski trail over the Belknap range to Alton. He estimated that \$300 would cover all the expenses.

Mrs. Katherine York of the Belknap County Relief office was heard on the subject of relief.

The delegation then went into executive session.

Mr. Stafford of Laconia moved that a sum of \$4,000 be appropriated for purposes of work relief and that the delegation recommend that this money be expended to pay for part of the cost of the material to be used in the project on the construction of the Weirs road.

Mr. Dodge moved that we adjourn. On a vote of eight to six this motion did not prevail.

The question being on the motion of Mr. Stafford a roll call was demanded. The motion was carried by a vote of 11 to 3.

The following members voted in the affirmative:

Varney, Little, Hunt, Page, Beane, Carroll, Hoyt, Stafford, Merrill, Dow, and Plastridge.

The following members voted in the negative:

Dodge, Thomas Guay, and Smart. It was moved to have the clerk draw up resolutions on the ski jump project. This motion prevailed.

The meeting then adjourned.

Concord, N. H., Jan. 30, 1935.

After due notice having been given in the house the Belknap County Delegation was called to order by Chairman Neal at 12:15 P. M.

On motion of Mr. Stafford it was voted that the delegation attend the funeral of Representative Thomas Guay.

The Chairman appointed Reps. Stafford, Simpson, and Beane to draft resolutions in memory of Rep. Guay.

The delegation adjourned to meet at the store of A. W. Simoneau on Church St., Laconia, at 7:45 Thursday morning.

The Belknap County Delegation met in the State House and the following motion which the clerk had been instructed to draw up was presented and passed:

“Resolved: That the sum of \$1,000 be expended for purposes of unemployment relief and that it is hereby recommended that this money be used for the purchase of land for a ski jump on Rowe Mt. in the town of Gilford, and that said project employ those who are on relief.”

The meeting then adjourned.

Concord, N. H., May 9, 1935.

The Belknap County Delegation met in room 156 at the close of the morning session.

The delegation was called to order by Chairman Neal. The following members were present: Neal, Simpson, Page, Wallis, Plastridge, Varney, Hunt, Merrill, Carroll, Dow, Hoyt, Guay, Cantin, Little, Stafford, Smart, and Dodge.

Mr. Rollins of Alton was heard regarding the Gilford ski jump. He spoke in regard to the purchase of more land at the ski jump.

Mr. Coleman of the ERA office discussed this subject as did Mr. Sanborn of Gilford and Mr. O'Niel of Laconia.

The committee then went into executive session.

In executive session there was discussion on House Bill 235. An act prohibiting the discharge of sewage and other wastes into Lakes Winnisquam and Opechee and providing for the construction of sewage treatment plants.

Mr. Stafford moved that the bill be laid on the table pending the addition of suitable amendments. The motion prevailed.

Mr. Guay moved that the Chair appoint a committee to draw up such amendments. The motion prevailed. The Chair appointed Messrs. Guay, Stafford, and Smart.

The report of the budget committee was presented and discussed. The report was read by Chairman Neal of that committee.

Mr. Dodge for the committee to investigate the conditions at the county farm presented a report and the recommendation that no new work be done at the farm other than painting, and that the herd be cut down to the size necessary for use at the farm.

Mr. Carroll moved that the report be accepted and the recommendations adopted. The motion prevailed on a voice vote.

The meeting adjourned.

Concord, N. H., Wednesday, 2:00 P. M.

The Belknap County delegation met in room 156 of the State House. The meeting was called to order by Chairman Neal.

Mr. Little was elected Clerk Pro Tem.

Motion was made by Mr. Guay and seconded by Mr. Little that the section of law which authorizes the Chairman to call the convention as needs may require be passed.

Twelve members present and voting in the affirmative.

(See Chapter 35)

Members present were Little, Piper, Hunt, Page, Guay, Hoyt, Stafford, Cantin, Merrill, Simpson, Wallis.

There was discussion on the budget as was reported by the special budget committee.

Commissioners Morrison, Rollins and Smith were present.

In regard to the County Airport it was found that no lease had ever been issued by the County Commissioners.

It was moved by Mr. Simpson and seconded by Mr. Stafford that the County Commissioners be authorized to lease the County Airport for a period of five years for airport purposes. The motion was passed.

It was moved by Mr. Guay and seconded by Mr. Piper that the convention accept the budget as presented by the Budget Committee. The motion passed.

The convention adjourned.

June 12, 1935, 9 A. M.

Belknap County Delegation. Room 150 by Chairman Neal. Members present: Neal, Guay, Dodge, Stafford, Dow, Merrill, Hoyt, Simpson, Varney, Little, Cantin, Smart, Wallis.

Moved by Hoyt that the sum not exceeding \$4500, seconded by Varney, be appropriated for remodeling the barn provided the Federal Government will furnish the labor under a Federal project. Motion carried.

Moved by Simpson that \$4,800 be appropriated (seconded by Stafford) for the purchase of the Sawyer & Harris land at the Ski Jump. Motion carried.

Moved that the chairman be authorized to prepare bill for Bond issue \$2,300.00 (Simpson—seconded by Merrill). Motion carried.

Moved by Hoyt, seconded by Guay, that we reduce our appropriation for welfare from \$4,000 to \$3,000. Carried.

Moved to adjourn.

Moved to instruct the Chairman to draw Bill authorizing the County to refund its indebtedness, and motion made by Guay, seconded by Carroll.

Moved to adjourn to call of chairman.

Concord, N. H., June 18, 1935.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Neal.

It was stated that the delegation had been ordered to report in House Bill 235 by tomorrow morning.

Mr. Stafford of the committee, which had been appointed to draw up amendments to this bill presented the following amendment:

“Amend said bill by striking out all after the enacting clause and substituting in place thereof the following:

1. Discharge of Sewage and Other Waste Matters Prohibited. No inadequately treated sewage from the sewage system of the city of Laconia, or from any private system of sewage, and no rubbish, garbage, refuse or other wastes from any industrial establishment, business public building, hotel, cottage, farmhouse, boarding-house, camp, or other abode, or from any privy, cesspool, stable or out-building, and no excreta from any boat or structure, of any kind, shall be discharged, deposited in or allowed to enter Lakes Winnisquam or Opechee or the waters connecting these lakes, or be deposited upon the banks or shores in such a manner as to be likely to wash or leak thereinto.

2. Sewage Treatment Plant to be Installed. The city of Laconia shall install, in conjunction with its sewage system, such system of sewage treatment as shall be reasonably effective for the purification of sewage. Provided that neither this requirement nor anything contained in section 1 shall be deemed to obligate the city of Laconia unless and until the said city of Laconia shall be applied for and shall have had awarded to it a grant and loan of money acceptable to it and sufficient for the purpose of constructing the said plant and the appurtenances necessary thereto.

Whereupon, the said city shall proceed to effect the installation of such a plant without undue delay.

3. Penalty for Discharge of Sewage or Deposit of Other Wastes. Any person, company, association, or corporation other than the said city, violating any of the provisions of this act shall be fined twenty dollars and shall also be subject to a fine of not more than ten dollars for each day that such violation may be allowed to continue following a conviction thereof.

4. Enforcement. It shall be the duty of the state board of health, with the cooperation and assistance of the boards of health of the municipalities concerned, to enforce the provisions of this act.

5. Takes Effect. This act shall take effect upon the date that a grant and loan of money is awarded to the city of Laconia as provided in Section 2.

It was moved by Mr. Dodge that the committee report that the bill ought to pass with this amendment.

(Discussion ensued)

The previous question was ordered and on a voice vote the motion prevailed.

The meeting then adjourned.

Mr. Beane moved that we rescind the vote which we took today to report in House Bill 235 with the recommendation that the bill pass.

Mr. Wallis moved the previous question. The motion prevailed.

Mr. Stafford moved that House Bill 235 be reported with the recommendation that it is inexpedient to legislate.

(Discussion ensued)

On a voice vote the motion prevailed.

Mr. Carroll moved to adjourn. The motion prevailed.

County Farm, Laconia, N. H.

August 29, 1935.

The special meeting of the Belknap County Delegation, called by the County Commissioners, for the purpose of considering the replacing of the barn destroyed by fire, was called to order by the Chairman, William J. Neal, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The Clerk of the delegation being absent, Harry S. Little was elected Clerk Pro Tem. The following members were present: Neal, Little, Bean, Alfred Guay, Cantin, Plastridge, Page, Hunt, Gordon, Wallis, Dow, Simpson, Merrill, Stafford, Piper, Varney and Hoyt. The County Commissioners and Mr. Norman Randlett, Architect, were also present.

The County Commissioners submitted a plan to the Delegation to sell approximately 50% of the cattle at Public Auction this fall in order to save buying hay and save providing necessary space for housing them until the barn was built.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, this proposition was approved.

Upon motion made by Mr. Guay and seconded by Mr. Little it was moved that the type of barn to be constructed be left to Mr. Norman Randlett, Architect, and the County Commissioners.

Upon motion made by Mr. Bean and seconded by Mr. Guay it was moved that we authorize the County Commissioners to enter into an agreement with such agency of the Federal Government as they may determine, for the purpose of securing Federal aid in building the new barn and that we appropriate for the county's share of the project not to exceed \$20,000.

Upon motion made by Mr. Little and seconded by Mr. Stafford the following resolution was adopted:

Be it resolved by the Belknap County Convention:

Section 1. That John Morrison be and he is authorized to execute and file an application on behalf of County of Belknap to the United States of America for a grant to aid in financing the construction of stock barns and feed storage facilities.

Section 2. That John Morrison and N. P. Randlett be and are hereby authorized and directed to furnish such information as the United States of America, through the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, may reasonably request in connection with the application which is herein authorized to be filed.

Mr. Neal presented his resignation as chairman because he would not be a member of the delegation after September first.

Upon motion duly made and seconded the resignation was accepted.

Motion made, seconded and unanimously carried that Mr. Alfred Guay serve as Chairman of the delegation.

Upon motion of Mr. Neal, seconded by Mr. Little, it was voted that the chairman be authorized to fill the

vacancy in the committee on investigation caused by the resignation of Mr. Neal and the election of Mr. Guay as Chairman.

The Chairman appointed, to the position, Mr. Gordon of Meredith.

Upon motion duly made and seconded it was voted to adjourn.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

In compliance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire, the Commissioners of Belknap County herewith present the annual report of the County Commissioners, Treasurer, Superintendent of the Farm and House of Correction, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Solicitor, Farm Physician, Chaplain and Auditors for the year ending December 31, 1935.

Unemployment in private enterprise is still our greatest problem. This is taken care of to a great extent by federal projects. The ski-jump in Gilford, a W. P. A. project, which entailed quite an expense for land, equipment, and transportation in 1935, will undoubtedly take many off the relief rolls in the coming year as all labor is paid directly by the federal government. This alone will give employment to 300 or more men for at least a year. Similar projects are the airport, the Weirs road, and the rebuilding of the County Farm barns.

There have been only minor repairs at the County Farm this year. These include painting and papering and a small amount of shingling. The House of Correction has been equipped with new beds. The big barn was destroyed by fire the evening of August 20th. Temporary equipment had to be provided such as a silo for the corn and a place to house the animals.

At the Court House new rooms have been finished in the basement for relief workers.

We are indebted to Mr. and Mrs. William J. Hartford, superintendent and matron at the County Farm for the manner in which they have conducted all matters coming under their supervision.

Rev. Frederic Fitzpatric of Belmont, chaplain at the County Farm, has contributed a great deal to the spiritual well being of our people and we wish to thank him for his generosity and devotion.

We extend our thanks to all those who have cooperated with us in our efforts to make conditions better and life more pleasant for those in our care.

Gentlemen:

I hereby submit a report of my work for the first year of my term as County Solicitor:

I have endeavored to give to all persons seeking my advice on County matters prompt and courteous attention. Besides the time required in criminal matters I have tried to promptly and satisfactorily dispose of all matters referred to me by the Commissioners.

When I took office, April 1, 1935, there were pending on the criminal docket of the Superior Court for Belknap County, twelve cases, all of which have been disposed of with the exception of two, one of which has been appealed to the Supreme Court. Two cases were tried in April, 1935, and resulted in verdicts of "Guilty."

Four criminal cases of a serious nature were entered at the October, 1935, Term of Superior Court, namely:

State vs. Robert H. Wilkinson—Sentence not less than 1 year and 1 day. State Prison.

State vs. Samuel Bernier—Sentence not less than 1 year and 1 day, State Prison.

State vs. Robert Avery—Sentence not less than two years, State Prison.

State vs. Joseph Cartier—Sentence not less than 8 years, State Prison.

Since April 1, 1935, I have investigated and prosecuted in the Superior Court and various Municipal

Courts throughout the County a total of thirty-nine criminal cases.
