SELECTMEN'S REPORT 1998

Town finances remain in excellent shape. Long term debt is low and declining. This year we will pay off two trucks and the town hall. We also ended this year with a modest surplus. We are recommending no capital items in the 1998 warrant. In the last 10 years much has been accomplished. The municipal tax rate has been slowly declining over the last 10 years and in the last 4 years it has remained constant. We feel a pause for one year is warranted considering cost increases in schools and county taxes that are on the horizon. Another factor for level funding was the recent ice storm. The cost of clean up will exceed \$50,000. We are applying for emergency funding from FEMA. The damage to the forests and road sides is approaching the experiences of the 1938 hurricane. It will be a challenge to maintain level taxes based on the above, but we feel it is possible.

<u>Town Buildings</u> - Over the last 5 years, maintenance programs to improve the condition of town buildings has been completed. All buildings have been upgraded and have received a coat of paint. The Town House on Bridgewater Hill has a new foundation. The town clerk's offices have been renovated. We are in good shape in this department.

<u>Highway</u> - We have replaced all of our fuel storage with newly designed above ground tanks. We also paved John Smith Hill Road and improved grading throughout the town. This year we plan to resurface Bridgewater Hill Road assuming the impact of the ice storm does not severely impact our costs. If so, it may have to be delayed until next year. We should recognize the hard work by all of the members of this department especially during the recent ice storm. They worked a large number of hours to bring roads back to normal within a two week period. We will spend the rest of the year cleaning up from this event.

<u>Safety Services</u> - The new full-time police position has met with overwhelming approval. Crime is down and speeding seems to be getting lower. Recently, we dug out the fire pond on Route 3A and a new dry hydrant was put back into service near Whittemore Shores. The cooperation between fire, police and highway is great! We are fortunate to have such able and helpful personnel.

<u>H-B Refuse District</u> - We finished repaying the entry road to this facility and this year will be putting an overhang near the drop off to improve safety from snow falling from the roof and more convenient in poor weather. Recycling has been improved and costs remain constant.

<u>Bridgewater-Hebron Village District</u> - The newly formed village district is well underway. After a large turn out and an impressive 93% affirmative vote, we are underway with permitting and engineering for a school in Bridgewater. We expect construction to start sometime before mid June.

<u>Cemeteries</u> - We would like to acknowledge the donation of a tract of land in front of the Whittemore Point Cemetery from Mr. and Mrs. Robert Marchand.

The Selectmen will further address a number of these issues in greater depth in an early summer newsletter. We appreciate the volunteer efforts and cooperation of all towns people as we address the best interest of the town in this time of change. Overall, we have great reason to feel fortunate to live in a town like Bridgewater.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitant of the Town of Bridgewater in the County of Grafton in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bridgewater on Tuesday, the tenth day of March 1998 next at Twelve of the clock in the noon to act on the following subjects:

Polls to be opened from 12 Noon to 6:00 p.m.

Business meeting at 8:00 p.m.

- 1. To choose a Selectmen for three (3) years and all other necessary town officials.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey to Bridgewater-Hebron Village District for use for public school purposes, for no consideration, a certain parcel of land consisting of 13.64 acres, more or less, on Route 3A, being lot 12A on a plan entitled "Subdivision for Arthur T. King" and recorded at the Grafton County Registry of Deeds as plan No. 8359. Said parcel was donated to the town by Arthur and Ruth King and under the terms of their deed to the town the land will revert to the town if it ever ceases to be used for school purposes. (Recommended by the Selectmen)
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to assign to the Bridgewater-Hebron Village District, for no consideration, all of the town's interest in a purchase and sale agreement dated August 21, 1997 with Audrey and George Hagerman, in respect of a certain parcel of land consisting of 6.93 acres, more or less, being Lot 11A on a plan entitled "Subdivision For Arthur T. King" and recorded at the Grafton County Registry of Deeds as plan No. 8359. Said parcel is adjacent to the parcel described in Article 2 of this warrant as lot 12A. (Recommended by the Selectmen)
- 4. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.



INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Bridgewater Bridgewater, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Bridgewater as of and for the year ended December 31, 1997 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Bridgewater has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Bridgewater, as of December 31, 1997, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of Town of Bridgewater taken as a whole. The individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Bridgewater. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

As all of you are aware the Chief of Police is now a full time position and has been since the first of July This has allowed the Bridgewater Police Department to offer increased efficiency and professionalism in its performance to the town.

The Bridgewater Police Department criminal complaints are down for 1997. However, domestic violence complaints have risen, and the Bridgewater Police Department is vigorously pursing prosecution of these violations.

Reported motor vehicles accidents are also down for 1997. This is what many cities and towns strive for. The Bridgewater Police Department is working with the State of New Hampshire to reduce the speed limit on Mayhew Turnpike, which will be especially important with the construction of the new school. The increased patrols on all town roads have reduced the amount of excessive speeding, particularly on River Road, Whittimore Point Road, Mayhew Turnpike, and Dick Brown Road. The decrease in accidents seems to be indicative of this increased enforcement. It is the hope of the Bridgewater Police Department that these patrols will continue to ensure a safe driving environment for all

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Our department responded to over forty calls last year of various types. As most of you may know, often times our responses are combined with Mutual Aid response from other communities. We certainly do appreciate their willingness to assist us and we are often called into their communities when needed. We truly are part of a regional emergency service system that is controlled through Lakes Region Mutual Fire Dispatch. This mutual cooperation is vital to everyone's protection and allows all of us to keep our service delivery costs down in each town.

Within our town we still have two important needs that I have referenced in years past. First, we always will have need for additional personnel. Currently, we are operating with an adequate number, however, we will always need to have new applicants to sustain our numbers and to replace the effect of normal attrition. We believe that any individual can contribute to our efforts and ask that you contact us if you are interested in helping your town. Secondly, we are always looking for additional water sources that we can use in emergencies. As our town grows we find that there are areas that now have experienced building growth but may not have nearby water sources. We will always be looking for new sources of water to add to our existing inventory of sites. If you would like to have us look at a site on your property, please contact us.

In closing, I would like to remind all of our townspeople to think of fire safety. Please be sure that your smoke detectors are in working order at all times and have an escape plan from your home in the event of fire. Lastly, please be careful with outside fires, particularly this year since we will have so much damaged tree brush on the ground and in the forest. We always recommend that you contact a forest fire warden whenever you intend to burn outside and to obtain a permit when required by law. Attention to these details can help avoid needless fire related problems. Thank you.

1997 PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The most significant project undertaken by the Planning Board in 1997 was the initiation of an update to the Master Plan. Assisted by an advisory council, the board prepared a survey questionnaire which was mailed in November to all land owners. The response was overwhelming with almost 50% of the surveys returned. The information is being compiled into a database and after analysis by the board and advisory council amendments to the master plan will be drafted. Public hearing will be held later in 1998 on these Master Plan amendments. Thank you to everyone who helped with the project and responded to the survey.

A new sign ordinance was adopted in 1997 as part of our zoning ordinance, and amendments to subdivision regulations in the area of Guidelines for the Design and Construction of Roads were also adopted.

At its regular meetings in 1997 the board reviewed two (2) site plans for commercial lots, held four (4) preliminary consultations on projects being planned, approved one (1) subdivision application.

BRIDGEWATER CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The principal focus of the Conservation Commission this year has been on the Evaluation of the Wetlands of Bridgewater. Although soil based maps, and National Wetlands Inventory maps have been available, this on site evaluation was able to confirm the existence of 40 wetland acres ranging in size from 2 to 38 acres, with the existence of 40 wetland areas ranging in size from 2 to 38 acres, with the exception of the largest which was 132 acres. This process of determining the potential and/or actual characteristics, functions and relative values of these areas, gives Bridgewater important information for future planning. For those wishing to know more, the completed report is available at the Town Hall, and a sixty page summary is available for purchase.

Not all attention has been focused on land, Bridgewater is now represented on the Pemi River Local Advisory Committee. The "PRLAC" is a group of volunteers from the communities through which this river passes from Campton and Thornton to Franklin and Hill. Open meetings are held monthly. The charge to this committee is to study this section of the river and to decide whether the current laws and directives are sufficient to maintain or improve its status. It is up to the committee to determine the concerns and goals of the public and draft a River Corridor Management Plan to address these. Each town can be represented by three people. Two more official representatives from Bridgewater could be included. Anyone interested in this project is welcome at these meetings. Please contact Emily Crane at 968-4429.

The Conservation Commission is always happy to have new members or to know of ideas which may be of interest to the community. Finally residents are reminded that they must have permits from the Wetlands Bureau when adding sand to a beach or installing a dock.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The 1997 fire season was a safe period for wildland firefighters with no major injuries reported. The drought conditions experienced during the early summer months was a significant factor resulting in the total number of fires reported during the season.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION

1997 Community Contact Report to the Town of Bridgewater

Community Contact is the field services arm of Tri-County Community Action. Our purpose is to assist low-income, elderly and handicapped persons to solve problems and to meet their physical and financial needs. Community Contact staff accomplish this purpose by providing information, counseling, referrals, guidance, organizational assistance, and by effectively linking households with CAP assistance programs and utilizing community resources.

Last year the following direct financial assistance was provided by the CAP Community Contact Program in Bridgewater:

We also provided these services to the community.

- * Served as a conduit for government surplus food to pantries and soup kitchens serving the area.
- * Provided budget counseling that includes money management, debt management and financial planning to area households.
- * Assisted individuals and families who were homeless or in imminent danger of homelessness.
- * Provided information and referral services regarding matters such as legal problems, landlord-tenant disputes, emergency home repairs, health-medical resources, transportation and electric utility assistance and conservation programs.

With your help, we anticipate being able to provide at least the same level of services to Bridgewater this year.

NEWFOUND AREA NURSING ASSOCIATION

During 1997 Newfound Area Nursing Association provided the following services in the Home Care Program.

- 4,921 nursing visits
- 991 physical therapy visits
- 12,150 home health aide visits
- 2,321 homemaker units

Approximately 231 individuals and their families benefited from this program.

Many more were served by other Newfound Area Nursing Association programs as follows:

- * 72 attended our Well Child Clinic
- * 870 immunizations were administered in our Outreach Program
- * 624 were screened for Hypertension
- * 57 adults received the Flu Vaccine
- * 47 contacts were made through the Foot Care Clinic
- * 143 volunteer hours were provided by our trained Hospice Volunteers to 9 patients

Newfound Area Nursing Association's newest program NAPS (Newfound Area Parent Support) began meeting this fall twice a month and is available at no charge to all area parents.

In 1997 the federal government put in place a new law that radically changes how Medicare pays for home health services. Unfortunately, this law will have dire consequences for Newfound Area Nursing Association and our ability to serve people in the Newfound area. Under this new system New Hampshire agencies, such as Newfound Area Nursing Association which have been some of the lowest cost providers in the country, are severely penalized. The formula uses payment rates from 1993. It also treats all patients alike, with no increase in reimbursement for those with complex needs.

Despite these payment changes, Newfound Area Nursing Association wants to reassure you that our goal remains the same it has always been - to provide the support and teaching as well as clinical care that will enable patients to manage at home while gaining the ability to become independent. While we will do all we can within our mission and our means to ensure our ability to care for patients, we know this new payment system will not pay us enough to cover the care the government has promised to provide to the elders. This inadequate funding will undoubtedly force us to change the level of care we provide. The hardest hit will be the frailest elders. With Medicare no longer providing adequate reimbursement to cover those long-term cases we'll be forced to limit care unless we can attract additional funds from other sources.

We need your help to avoid putting people at risk. We encourage the public to contact our U.S. Senators and Representatives. Let them know your concerns about possible cuts in home health services to the elderly and urge them to provide adequate reimbursement for home health care to avoid a crisis.

Newfound Area Nursing Association is indeed grateful for the strong support of the towns served.
