

# CAMPTON'S VETERAN SELECTMAN IN 90TH YEAR



It seems highly fitting that the 1961 copy of the Campton Town Report be dedicated to a man who has given many years of time and effort for the good of this community.

We speak of veteran Selectman William B. Avery, who in his 90th year has served as selectman for thirty years. In addition to his services as "Town Father" for so many years, "Uncle Will," as he is known to most of his friends, has operated the country store at West Campton for over fifty years. As most people know, just about anything anyone could want can be found at this store.

Mr. Avery was a native of Plymouth and came with his parents to Campton about 85 years ago.

He attended the little Branch School in West Campton and later attended the New Hampton School in the year 1892, where he received his business education.

When railroading was at its height he also served for 12 years as express agent and station agent.

He was postmaster at West Campton from 1909 to 1926. The post office was located in his general store. He was later succeeded by his son Ralph Avery.

The first time Mr. Avery's name appeared in town office was in 1909 as Town Constable.

Since then he has served as Trustee of the Trust Funds for 23 years, a Representative from his town in 1928-29 at the State Legislature, a Plymouth State Fair Director for many years and has been a Grange Fire Insurance agent.

Fraternally, he is a 50-year Mason, member of Olive Branch Lodge of Plymouth and a charter member of the Osceola Grange, of Campton, which disbanded several years ago and became part of the Campton Grange. He is a 50-year Golden Sheaf member. He also held membership in the Campton Lodge of Odd Fellows.

He keeps abreast of the times locally, nationally and internationally and takes a keen interest in everything about him.

He is an ardent fisherman and until recently spent much of his time at his camp at Ellsworth Pond.

He has always greatly enjoyed the outdoors and has gathered a fund of information and folklore.

Mr. and Mrs. Avery reside in West Campton in sight of his store. His son, Ralph, resides in the neighborhood and his daughter, Mrs. Minnie Colpitts, R.N., of Lowell, Mass., has her family home here.

He has seven grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren.

During the past year he has had several serious illnesses, but still looks young though not as active as he wishes.

He enjoys having friends and his family come to visit him.

It is always a pleasure to chat with him about current affairs or events of years past, as his keen memory makes him a great source of information.

"Uncle Will" well deserves the tribute being paid to him in this dedication and earns the appreciation of his fellow citizens for the many years of faithful service given to his community.

On September 23rd Mr. Avery will observe his 90th birth-day.

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the ensuing year for the maintenance of its highways and bridges and make appropriations of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for Memorial Day.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the White Mt. Region Association.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the maintenance of Blair Cemetery and other cemeteries in Town.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,025.00 to reimburse the Campton Village Precinct for hydrant rental.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the support of Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the support of the Campton Volunteer Fire Department.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the use of the Town Historical Committee.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to hold Town Meeting the second Tuesday of March commencing at 7:30 P. M. of said day and adjourn at such time as voted by Town. (by petition)
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to quitclaim to Alexander Mulholland any interest of the Town in the property conveyed by Tax Collector's Deed to Alexander Mulholland Nov. 23, 1951 recorded in Grafton County Registry of Deeds, Bk. 812, page 298, in order to perfect title to said property.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the John Hussey Road, so-called, subject to gates and bars, from the driveway leading to the Max Haley property.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize a penalty of 50 cents on unpaid poll taxes as of Dec. 1, 1962, and each year thereafter.

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook — yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness — our carelessness. This, we — you — and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for outof-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations — hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you —

- 1. Follow the warden's directions.
- 2. Secure the required burning permit.
- 3. Keep your fires under control.
- 4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
- 5. See that your children are properly cautioned. Everyone will benefit by it.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Campton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said district on the eighth day of March, 1962, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see if the School District will authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of three persons, including one member of the Board of Selectmen, to investigate participation by the Campton School District in a cooperative secondary school and to report their findings at a special meeting to be called for the purpose. This committee is to work with the School Board.
- 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to sell and convey the right, title and interest of the District in and to unoccupied District School land and buildings and to execute deeds and/or bills of sale in the name of the District.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to expend such sum or sums of money as may be obtained from the sale of unoccupied District school land and buildings for the purpose of improving the new central school.
- 12. To transact any further business that may legally come before this meeting.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

As this report is being written, it is difficult to visualize that before it is time for another one, we will be occupying our fine new building and I am eagerly looking forward to it. I am confident that we will have a program in this school of which you will be proud. We are very fortunate also in getting as much school as we have for the money. I doubt very much if there is a school in New Hampshire that has been built during the last ten years that has the quality per dollar that your school has.

Our various schools around town are operating in about the same manner as in past years. Due to transportation problems, Blair School and Center School now include grades One through Five. This was a move I did not like to make but it was for only one year and the savings in transportation seemed to justify it.

You will all be interested I am sure to know what the teacher and grade alignment will be for the new building. I have given the matter considerable thought but I am not yet prepared to make a final decision until some other aspects of the problem have been studied. I am sure, however, that we can make a distribution which will satisfy all.

Our programs throughout the district remain essentially unchanged. We are administering Achievement tests to all grades in the Fall and in the Spring as a basis for pupil and self evaluation and Mental Ability tests are being administered to grades One, Three, Five and Seven in the middle of the year.

Reading Readiness tests are now being given the First grade at the beginning of the school year. In so far as textbooks and supplies are concerned, we have no major problems. The oldest textbook adoption we have is in Language Arts and I expect to recommend we change these after one more year. When we have moved into the school, we may find we will want a few more supplementary texts in a few areas but this is something we can take care of very well in the regular budget.

Most of you are probably aware of the fact that your School Board and a number of others have met several times in Plymouth to discuss a Cooperative or Regional High School for this area. The following is included for your information and guidance. It was expected that it would be several years before this idea really gained momentum but developments have occurred recently which made it seem practical to start the study immediately. Your School Board has conscientiously attended these meetings to gather information and in all probability at the next school district meeting will ask for a committee of citizens to work with them to make a wise recommendation to the district as to what course to follow. The advantages to the district of becoming part of such a program I think would be tremendous. Plymouth High School, at the present time, can make over no more classrooms to accommodate an increased enrollment and to remain in the present quarters will mean that in a period of a few years, some tuition pupils will have to be turned away. On the other hand, if a Cooperative or Regional School is formed, the surrounding towns who do not become a part of it cannot expect those towns who do to build facilities for them. This problem requires some serious thinking on the local level to decide which action is best to take.

The experience in other communities has been that it cost the district more initially to be part of such a project but not to too great a degree and as time went on, costs became more stable. Also, the district would have part ownership in the school and a voice in its organization and administration. Whereever these schools have operated, the trend has generally been that over a period of years, costs have tended to be no more than what they would have been under a straight tuition program. I am sure that there will be more talk about this as the year goes

on and I would be very happy to furnish any information or advice I may have concerning this or other school problems.

## EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1960-61 received a salary of \$8,050 which was made up as follows: \$3,750 paid from the per capita tax and \$4,300 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,200 for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above.

The table shows the portion of salary and travel charged to each school district.

These are only a few of the musical activities throughout the town.

Four classrooms in the lower grades are enjoying new music books which include melodies and counter-melodies for song flutes and bells and chords for autoharp.

Music is joy and satisfaction; a sense of accomplishment and of belonging. It is also frustration and disappointment when pianos cannot be tuned and materials and equipment are not available. We are looking forward to the time when all available equipment will be under one roof and necessary improvements made without duplication.
