TOWN WARRANT

CLARKSVILLE, NEW HAMPSHIRE

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 11:30 AM to 5:30 PM.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Clarksville, in the County of Coos, in the State of New Hampshire, **qualified** to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Clarksville on Tuesday, the 13th day of March 2007, at 11:30 AM to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

The <u>business meeting</u> shall begin at <u>7:30 PM</u> in the evening to act upon the following articles in the warrant.

- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of <u>\$140,800.00</u> for General Government.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of <u>\$150,000.00</u> for General Road Maintenance (Summer, Winter and General Expenses).
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\underline{\$10,000.00}$ for **Winter Sand and Salt**, with the purchase of said winter sand and salt to be determined by the Selectmen.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of <u>\$10,000.00</u> for Resurfacing of Town Roads.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of <u>\$50,000.00</u> for the purpose of supporting the layout, by the Board of Selectmen, of that portion of Moose Mountain Road running from West Road, through land of Roland and Gisele Plante, as far as the Town-owned acre of land deeded to the Town of Clarksville by Almon J. Young and Arlene H. Young (the deed dated June 6, 2005, recorded at Book 1130, page 835 in the Coos County Registry of Deeds) as a town-maintained public highway; and to construct the said highway to acceptable public highway standards. (VOTE of Article 6 SHALL BE BY PAPER BALLOT.)
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept for the purposes of a public highway turnaround area, the circular area shown at the end of the existing public highway known as Ardes Lane, as shown on a plan entitled "Plan Prepared for the Town of Clarksville, Showing location and area of the Cul-De-Sac to be taken by the Town Easterly of Crawford Road dated April 18, 2005" and

recorded as Plan # 2569 at the Coos County Registry of Deeds on December 22, 2005, including a 0.12-acre area to be accepted from Steven and Dianc Adams, and a 0.08-acre area to be accepted from Mark and Heather Amey a/k/a Mark Amey and Heather Mitchell, as show on the plan, and further to authorize the Selectmen to take all action necessary to implement this vote, including the acceptance of easement deeds for the above-mentioned parties, in a form acceptable to the Selectmen.

- To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Mapping Capital Reserve Fund created in 2004. Said fund, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, to be transferred to the Town of Clarksville's general fund. (Majority vote required). Selectmen recommend this article.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of the Perry and Young Cemeteries Improvement Capital Reserve Fund and to raise and appropriate the sum of <u>\$20,000.00</u> to be placed in this fund. This sum to come from fund balance and no amount to be raised from taxation. Furthermore to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend said Cemeteries Improvement Capital Reserve Fund. (Majority vote required.) Selectmen recommend this article.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Mapping Capital Reserve Fund and to raise and appropriate the sum of <u>S10,000.00</u> to be placed in this fund. This sum to come from fund balance and no amount to be raised from taxation. Furthermore to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend said Mapping Capital Reserve Fund. (Majority vote required). Selectmen recommend this article.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

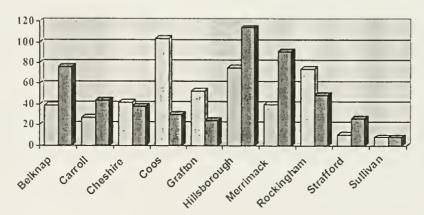
Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or <u>www.des.state.nh.us</u> for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

Fire activity was very high during the first several weeks of the 2006 fire season, with red-flag conditions issued by the National Weather Service and extreme fire danger in many sections of the state. The largest forest fire during this period occurred in late April and burned 98 acres. The extremely dry conditions in spring resulted in over twice the amount of acreage burned than in all of 2005. Our statewide system of fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Fires in the wildland urban interface damaged 6 structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

The Beecher Falls volunteer fire department answered a total of 249 emergency calls in the fiscal year December 1, 2005 to November 30, 2006.

These calls were answered in the following towns and Gores Canaan VT, Norton VT, Averill VT, Hall Stream Rd. in Pittsburg NH, Clarksville NH, West Stewartstown NH, East Hereford Quebec, Saint Venant de-Paquette Quebec, Saint Malo Quebec, Saint Hermenegilde Quebec, and East Clifton Quebec. These areas cover approximately 465 square miles and 4500 permanent residents.

The fire department expended the fire act grant for this year. The grant was for \$39,845.00 with a 10% match. This grant was used to purchase new hose, nozzles, and appliances for water supply. There was some left over money that will be used for the fire prevention programs at the schools in our jurisdiction. Some of the money will also be used for a program involving smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors.

The combination engine and rescue that was supposed to be delivered to us in April of 2006 turned into a very frustrating year for the fire department. The fire department had received a fire act grant of \$225,000.00 to help pay for the truck. The original price on the truck was \$275,000.00. The project turned into a financial burden for the fire department. In March of 2006 we were informed that Emergency Vehicles of Maine the contractor for the truck was in financial trouble and the business was being put into receivership. We soon found out that a bank in Maine was now the owner of our truck. A large amount of money had already been invested in the truck over \$220,000.00 at this time, with \$125,000.00 being federal money. The federal government told the fire department that we had to produce the truck or we would have to pay back the \$125,000.00 that we had received from the government. A long legal battle ensued from this point, as we could not afford to loose the truck and have to pay back the government. The bank showed no leniency toward the fire department and we had to purchase the truck back from them. We received the truck in August and immediately started the search for another contractor to finish the project. The fire department soon found out that the contractor used a good share of the money that had already been allocated for the project for other purposes. We also learned that the truck had been substantially under bid. Valley Fire Equipment was chosen to complete the truck. The truck was delivered two days before Christmas. We expect the truck to be in-service buy the 1st of February. In the beginning we were very pleased with the grant and the fact that we were only going to have to pay somewhere in the vicinity of \$50,000.00. This fit very well into our long-term plans for equipment purchases. However after everything was settled and we received the truck the \$50,000.00 we expected to pay had increased to over \$300,000.00. This affects our long-term plans immensely.

The fire department has recently entered into a contract with Zoll medical company to purchase an Auto Pulse machine. This machine is used to assist in administering CPR. The Auto Pulse enhances the CPR with far greater perfusion than normal CPR. The CPR never changes once it is started. Although this is a fairly new device to the medical field it is already proving to be very beneficial. The cost of the Auto Pulse is \$15,000.00. The department voted not to use any current money for the purchase. We have 1 year to pay for the Auto Pulse and intend to raise the money through fundraisers supported by the communities that we serve.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT CLARKSVILLE

It seems that each year I start this message by writing about the uncertainty of state funding. Unfortunately, this year is no different. The New Hampshire Supreme Court ruled that House Bill 616, which became the current education funding law, is unconstitutional because it is not linked to a definition of a constitutionally adequate education. The Court gave the legislature until June 30, 2007 to develop a definition of a constitutionally adequate education. Essentially, the legislature needs to develop the definition before it can determine the costs of the components of that adequate education. The plaintiffs in the case argued that the state has a responsibility to provide a constitutionally adequate education for each child in the state, regardless of each school district's ability to pay for that education. This means that the state would provide the cost of an adequate education uniformly throughout the state on a per pupil basis. There are members of the legislature and the Governor who favor a targeted aid formula, which would give more money per pupil to school districts with less ability to pay.

The legislature has formed an eight-person task force to work on the definition of a constitutionally adequate education. What this will mean in terms of funding is unknown at this time. We need a resolution to the funding issue that is equitable and sustainable so that state funding will be a known amount when school districts develop budgets, and when voters are asked to vote on those budgets.

This has been a very challenging year economically for the North Country. Coös County differs from "downstate" economics for a number of reasons. Coös County has 20.1% of the state's total area, but only 3% of the population. For a hundred years the North Country has been largely dependent on the market for a single product; paper manufacturing has been the mainstay of the economy. When the Groveton Paper Board closed in March 2006, and the Burgess Pulp mill in Berlin closed in May 2006 that resulted in the loss of 358 jobs in those mills, but it is projected that those closings would lead to a loss of 786 jobs in Coös County. The North Country economy is changing and progressing at a different rate from the rest of the state. The reduced hours at Ethan Allen and the lack of snow this winter have also adversely affected the region's economy. Unfortunately, these economic conditions do not lessen the state and federal requirements that we must meet.

This year we have several staff changes, with Mark Ekberg assuming the duties of Principal, and five new teachers joining the staff: Breanna Adams – Foreign Languages, Matt Brooks – Science, Tammy Jeralds – Family & Consumer Science, Norma Underhill – Grade 5, and Dee Young – Grade 2. We were very fortunate to find well-qualified individuals to fill those vacancies. From: Mr. Shallow Subject: Principal's Report (1 July 2005 – 30 June 2006)

This year, like most others, the staff and students of Pittsburg School had very busy year. There were many positive experiences as well as some difficulties. We had a few faculty changes with Mrs. Merrill moving from kindergarten to grade one and Ms. Jessica Jondro being hired as the new kindergarten teacher. We also employed a new foreign language teacher, Mr. Gerard Trinqué.

I am very proud of the many positive things that happened this year.

First, we prepared a nomination submitting Pittsburg School as the best high school in the state. Several staff members and students created a presentation for the state selection board. Mrs. Judd, Mrs. Guilmette, "BJ Jeralds", Melissa Colcord, Rebecca Marquis, and I traveled to Concord in November to make this presentation. There were ten schools selected for presentations with three selected as finalists. Unfortunately we were not one of those selected as a finalist but this process gave us an opportunity to identify all the positive things we do. It also gave us an opportunity to identify areas where we needed to improve.

We followed a similar process for our elementary school except that we submitted a written nomination instead of conducting a personal presentation. Mrs. Merrill and Mrs. Pariseau helped me write the elementary nomination and Mr. Sullivan helped edit.

We also continued our drive to excellence in faculty recognition. You may remember that Ann Gray was selected as the state media specialist of the year two years ago. This year I nominated Sheli Judd as the New Hampshire Teacher of the Year and she has made the finals. She is one of the five New Hampshire teachers being considered for "best in the state". In May a state team visited the school as part of the final evaluation process. They were not only very impressed with Mrs. Judd but were impressed with the whole school.

Unlike many schools in the state, Pittsburg School continues to make "adequate yearly progress" under the No Child Left Behind Act. Our state test scores have been solid. The October 2005 New England Common Area Assessment Tests indicated we were generally somewhat below average in grades 3 – 6 but at or above state average in grades 7 – 8. We continue to review our curriculum to ensure we are moving towards helping our students learn more and better.

I am also very pleased that we are becoming involved in extra curricular academic activities. This year we sent a team to compete in Granite State Challenge and had several students compete in the North Country Academic League. Many of our students have been very active and interested in practices and matches.

We can also be proud of our sports teams, particularly our varsity softball and baseball teams; they both made the playoffs. The girls won their preliminary game and lost to Colebrook, eventual state champion, by one run in the quarterfinal games. The baseball team played the second seed and only lost by one run.

Our key theme for this year has been the Respectful School. The Respectful School is a concept designed to make schools safer and more enjoyable for both the students and the staff. We have spent much of the year gathering data on how various groups feel about being a student at Pittsburg School. This data should be the foundation for a long-term plan addressing the needs of our school. Our goal this year was to simply make students and staff more aware of and sensitive to issues like name-calling, harassment, and bullying.

There are also some issues, which need to be addressed. We also continue to face some challenges.

Although we made a major effort at seeking parental involvement in the school's operation we were not very successful. Parental involvement is a major portion of the Best School's nomination and our nomination was not very strong in that area. Many parents volunteer to help with class trips and activities but parents also need to be involved in providing input for all school operations. We started the year with a parent meeting that only about 17 parents attended. Throughout most of the year we had regular meetings of a parent/community group and tried to create three sub-committees: planning, discipline, and communication. None of those ever really got off the ground. We do not have a Parent Teachers Organization like many schools and I think parental involvement should be stressed more. We have placed announcements on the school door, sent announcements home with students, put advertisements in the papers, and have personally called all parents about meetings. The results have been pretty consistent; a low turnout.

While certainly a minority, there are still too many students that place little value on homework and school. Unfortunately our size prevents us from implementing programs that would keep these students interested in school. Our dropout rate, as calculated by the state, is 24%. That is tied for the most drop-outs of any school in the state.

The school system continues to absorb responsibilities that years ago belonged more appropriately with parents. The major emphasis this year has been "health and fitness". Federal legislation has dictated that students spend 30 minutes of physical activity each day at school. The government also stresses healthy eating. While the goal of preventing heart disease and other physical ailments is laudable, the question seems to be what academic subjects are we willing to sacrifice to provide for fitness? Fortunately we have three years to fully implement the program.

In conclusion, every resident of Pittsburg should be proud of Pittsburg School. Everyone should take an active interest in school activities and the programs offered. I am proud to have been your principal for the past three years. I wish all of you the best!

Title I Report Fiscal Year 2006

I, Joanne O'Brien, hold the Reading Specialist position at both Pittsburg and Stewartstown Community Schools. I presently work two days a month for Stewartstown Community School. I am employed for the remainder of the month at Pittsburg School as the Title I director/teacher for the remedial reading and math programs in grades one through six. As the Title I director/teacher of the elementary remedial reading and math programs, my position is partially funded through federal funds through an annual grant.

As the Reading Specialist, I assume the roles of instructor and diagnostician, at both Pittsburg and Stewartstown Community Schools. The unique dual jobs of Title I director/teacher and Reading Specialist at Pittsburg School occupies the majority of my day. As an **instructor** I work in the primary grades with students most in need. The day is divided between one-on-one instruction and small group remedial lessons. I provide direct instruction for individuals who qualify for Title I assistance in the areas of reading and math. As a **diagnostician** I test and evaluate students as needed to determine reading placement. I screen all incoming first graders to offer Title I service to individuals most in need. I provide individual and/or group testing based on recommendations of the resource team. I am a member of the Instructional Support Team (IST) and meet with teachers on Wednesday mornings.

I attend Title I project/managers' meetings. I help organize and design the brochure for the North Country annual Conference. I am a member of the North Country Reading Council. My major goal is to promote a lifetime habit of reading for Pittsburg's students.

TECHNOLOGY REPORT SY 2005-2006

Once again Pittsburg School has been making strides in the area of technology. There is much advancement made in the field of technology throughout the world every year. It is always a challenge for any school to keep up with these advancements, but I do feel that we do a good job in trying to stay current here at Pittsburg School.

There are computers in every classroom at Pittsburg School and the teachers and/or the students use them every day. For instance, the third graders make use of the computers to do research on the Internet to find information on various winter holidays. The fourth graders made use of the computer lab last year to type letters to staff members when they were learning proper letter format. This resulted in several weeks of letter exchanges between several staff members and the students. The fifth graders made extensive use of the computer lab to do research on various Native American tribes before typing their reports. They also created PowerPoint presentations on the Big6 (an information problem solving system used in research projects in schools around the world) in library class. Part of the requirements for this project involved using a digital camera and inserting a relevant picture into the presentation. Several students enjoyed this process of designing a PowerPoint presentation so much that they were even asking to stay after school so that they could polish up their products!

The high school classes use the computers and a variety of software in different ways every day. Whether it is doing research on the Internet, typing up major projects, doing science lab reports in Excel, translating English terms into a foreign language, studying for tests using the interactive SmartBoard in science, or creating culminating projects using MovieMaker, these students are adept at using technology. It is truly amazing to see these powerful productions. Mr. Brown used MovieMaker to create an exciting presentation in May when the school did their Respectful Schools workshop. Ms. Judd also used MovieMaker when she created her presentation that helped to qualify her as one of the top five candidates for the Teacher of the Year. Mr. Brown's sophomore history class worked for weeks to produce a very professional culminating project that focused on some of the highlights of U.S. history. Among other tools, they used MovieMaker and a video camera to design this impressive project.

In order to keep up with all of the new things available in the technology field, it is necessary for staff members to take workshops to learn all of the ins and outs of various new products. In the fall of 2005, several staff members took advantage of a workshop on the Mimio devices that the school owns presented by Paula Churchill of NCES in Gorham. These devices work with a classroom computer to turn a regular classroom whiteboard into an interactive device. This workshop was made available by the Title II-D grant.

David Covill, Jeremy Brown, and Ann Gray spent several days in Nashua in the fall at the Christa McAuliffe Technology Conference. Each of them took advantage of the time to chat with vendors to learn about new products and attended many inspiring workshops. At one of the workshops that were attended, the school was given a free software package called RMEasyteach which in now loaded on the computer in the first grade classroom. This software, in combination with the computer and a Mimio device, allows for interactive use with science and math programs.

David Covill and Ann Gray have also attended several workshops on the new ICT (Information and Communication Technologies) literacy standards that are now in effect in the state of NH. These standards require that all students leaving grade eight and grade twelve will have a digital portfolio showing that they can use various computer programs. In conclusion, our teachers and students are taking advantage of all of the tools that the school makes available to them. They might be using overhead projectors, digital cameras, video recorders, tape recorders, or computers. SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM 2005 - 2006

How quickly time passes when we are having so much fun. Once again the School Nurse Program has offered some great information and opportunity to staff and students.

At the start of the school year we began doing lice checks. Dental screenings were also done. Eighty students were screened. "WOW" that number has grown!! CPR and AED trainings were offered to faculty – three people signed up for this opportunity.

We began October with a visit from our local Fire Department. Through the Risk Watch Program, our children were transported to the Fire Station and learned Fire Safety. We ended October with a 2-hour school delay and an early dismissal due to bad weather, certainly not a way to start out the school year; I wonder what is in store for the winter??

November was busy; Risk Watch invited our local Fish and Game Officer, Chris Egan, and his assistant, along with Warren Chase, Hunter Safety Instructor, to talk to students about Firearm Safety. This month was also when our Puberty Education took place with the 5th grade students through the Teen Task Program. Ski and Snowboard Safety Tips and Helmet information was provided to parents and students. Parents could also order good quality helmets through this program for a much cheaper price.

December was quiet, everyone was busy shopping and getting ready for a little break. Hepatitis B vaccines were begun. This is a series of three shots given at specific intervals during the school year. A few flu vaccines were also provided upon special request. It is my hope to be able to offer the Flu Vaccine to anyone interested next year.

January came and vacation was over, so back to the grind! Flu information was sent home to grades K-6 parents. Jen Santamaria came to school at the end of the moth to discuss poison prevention with the students. The second series of the Hepatitis B vaccines were given. Vision and Hearing Screenings began this month for students K-12. Scoliosis Screenings were also done for students in 5th through 8th grade. Fifty two students were screened this year, with two referrals sent.

The 8th grade students, along with two senior students, were taught CPR and First Aid in February. Each individual student received a certificate of completion of the program. Miles of Smiles Program visited the classrooms providing dental education. Vision and Hearing Screenings continued.

Vision and Hearing Screenings were wrapped up in the month of March. Referrals were sent home with the students and followed up via telephone by the School Nurse.

<u>SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM</u> 2005 - 2006

In April we held our local annual Seat Belt Challenge. Six teams completed this year with the winner going to Concord in May for the State Challenge. Our willing team took 10th place. For those students whose vaccinations needed an update, Tetanus and Measles, Mumps, Rubella vaccines were provided. The third and final round of Hepatitis B Vaccine was also given.

We topped May off with a speaker that graduated from our school and is currently employed with the Tilton Fire and Rescue. Peter Latucky did an intense but extremely informative PowerPoint presentation with students in grades 8 -12 regarding motor vehicle/seatbelt safety. We also had EMT's visit our school to discuss the dangers of "The Choking Game". This is a very dangerous game that our children are experimenting with and the end result of this game could be "Death". For more information please refer to <u>www.chokinggame.com</u>. This discussion was done with students in grades 5 -12. The EMT's also did a basic discussion with our younger students on how to use "911" in case of any emergency. The Teen Task Force also had another successful year with its 8th grade Pregnancy Prevention Program at The Balsams.

June was wind down time. At this time that we wrap up all of our loose ends, complete reports and make sure all tasks were done completely and to the best of our ability. I have completed my 8th year as the school nurse in Pittsburg, and I must say that I enjoy my job thoroughly. I have learned a lot from students and staff in this building and hope that I, in turn, have provided them with some educational moments. I am looking forward to coming back next year with more knowledge to share with everyone. Have a great summer and see you in the fall.
