## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING MARCH 13, 1928

One Hundred Ninety-Seventh Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Durham on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, A. D. 1928, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk (Charles Wentworth), one Selectman for a term of three years (John C. McNutt), a Town Treasurer (George D. Stevens), a Collector of Taxes (Esther Y. Burnham), two Auditors (Clement Moran, Samuel Runlett, Jr.), and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years (Stephen P. Chesley).
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:
- (1) Trunk Line Maintenance. (See budget.)
- (2) State Aid Maintenance. (See budget.) Carried.
- (3) Trunk Line Construction. (See budget.)

- 4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget.) *Carried*.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County Taxes as required. (See budget.) *Carried*.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law. *Yes*.
- 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. *Carried*.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for fencing and gates at the new Durham Cemetery. \$300.00 voted.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2% if paid on or before July 1.

1% if paid on or before September 1. Carried.

- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to make the entrance to Joshua Smith house, so called, accessible to the highway. (By request of S. H. Craig and nine others.) \$150.00 voted.
- 11. To hear the reports of committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to increase the salaries of Town Officers. *Increase for Auditors and Treasurer*.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust control. *Carried*.
  - 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate

the sum of \$600.00 for the construction of a granolithic sidewalk on Madbury Road from Main Street to Garrison Avenue. *\$1,000 voted*.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an arrangement whereby the upper room of the Town Hall may be used for supervised recreation for the children of the Community. (Mrs. O. V. Henderson and eleven others.) *Carried*.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease or let the old store for a term of years. *Carried*.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING MARCH 12, 1929

One Hundred Ninety-Eighth Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Durham on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1929, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:
  - (1) Trunk Line Maintenance. (See budget.)
  - (2) State Aid Maintenance. (See budget.)
  - (3) Trunk Line Construction. (See budget.)
- 4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget.)
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County Taxes as required. (See budget.)

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for permanent improvement of village streets.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for town officers as required by law.
- 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvements in the Durham Cemetery.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2% if paid on or before July 1.

1% if paid on or before September 1.

- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for grading and beautifying the triangle at the intersection of Mill Road and Main Street.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the bequest of \$500.00 from the late Forest S. Smith for the care and maintenance of the cemetery on the Smith farm.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote for the installation of three additional street lights on Madbury Road between the residences of L. W. Hitchcock and H. M. Bisbee.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust control.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for Town Officers as required by law.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the University of New Hampshire or an individual, relative to the distribution of water through the Town water main and arrange the terms for the same.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

DURHAM, NEW HAMPSHIRE

January 31, 1929.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham:

Books and the information, inspiration and recreation contained in books are as essential to the adult in home and business life as to the child in school and the college student. The measure of a library's usefulness is through its book service, answering questions, providing helpful information, supplying interesting reading, etc. Each year we have tried to do this in an increasing amount for both community and college. Results are sometimes hard to measure for it is difficult to keep track of the time spent in hunting information, compiling lists of references, and recording and keeping track of the thousands of miscellaneous pieces of printed material which are received by the library in the course of the year.

In this tenth annual report we give statistics of the work of the library for ten years ago, one year ago, and last year:

We have to report two important staff changes. On June 30, 1928, Miss Mary Washburn for four years Reference Librarian resigned to go to the Manchester Public Library. She was succeeded by Miss Eleanor Bell at the reference desk. Miss Helen G. Cushing for nine years Catalog Librarian resigns February 28, 1929, to become Cataloger on the Staff of the American Library in Paris. She will be succeeded by Miss J. Doris Dart from the cataloging staff of the Yale University Library.

During National Book Week, last November 12th to 18th, the Library conducted an exhibit of children's books in the window of Mr. Rand's store. For the second year in succession Library Open House was held, this year on the evening of November 14. Over twelve hundred townspeople and students were present—twice the number of the year before. Exhibits of rare book-bindings, pottery, sculpture, paintings, tap-

estries as well as many rare and beautiful books were displayed. Photographs of old homes in Durham were shown and a contrasting exhibit of costumes in Godey's Lady's Book of the eighteen fifties and sixties, and current magazines of fashion such as Vogue and Fashionable Dress. Many departments of the University had exhibits of books and other materials relating to their work. On Friday afternoon, November 16, a story hour for the children was held with an attendance of ninety.

During the past year additional shelving and more powerful lights have been added to the Reserved Book Reading Room and we have been given the use of Room 205 for additional reading-room space from twelve o'clock noon until ten o'clock each evening. In the near future we hope to have this room for the rest of the day and Room 201 also, thus insuring the entire building for library purposes and eliminating the noise and confusion resulting from the passing between classes.

Extension service in the town schools and at the home of Mrs. Edward Griffiths continues as in previous years with a total Extension Circulation of 994 volumes.

### REPORT OF THE CEMETERY COMMITTEE

During the past year the Cemetery Committee constructed a new five-strand wire fence with steel posts around the new cemetery. Two rubble stone gate posts  $3\frac{1}{2}$  feet square and 8 feet high were erected and double drive woven wire gates hung. About 20 rods of old stone wall had to be removed, a good many bushes and small trees cut, and some stumps blasted out. Along the roadside it was necessary to grade down the bank and fill up the gutter so as to secure a uniform water course. A central roadway entrance was constructed with a 24-foot 10-inch gutter pipe underneath protected by concrete headers.

Two lots were sold during the year. One to the University of New Hampshire for the reinterment of the bodies of Benjamin Thompson and certain of his kin, and the other to Mrs. Charles James, whose husband was buried December 13. Two monuments were erected, one by Charles H. Pettee, and the other, the Thompson monument formerly located on the University campus.

The cemetery lots are laid out twenty feet square. The price of these lots is \$150, with certain reservations relative to walkways, markers, stones, grading, planting of trees, resale of lots, etc., as were published in the Town Report for 1927. All lots are sold with the guarantee of perpetual care, which means their maintenance in sod and mowing during the summer season.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

### To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

Real progress is being made in your schools, and with the equipment we now have, I believe your schools are doing as good work as can be reasonably expected. Several changes in the teaching force were made. The following is a list of the teachers, and the number of pupils registered in each school.

### REPAIRS

A new boiler has been installed and is heating the building very satisfactorily. I visited the Central School early, one of the coldest days. The rooms were not warm enough; but after a session with the furnace, plenty of steam was generated and the house was soon comfortable. I again urge that a full time janitor be provided for the colder months, as a janitor who

has his time divided, and can give only a part of his time to the janitor work, cannot render satisfactory service.

The windows have been fitted with metal weather strips, and the old trouble of windows that rattle, and let in too much cold air, is done away with.

The roof has been patched and it is apparently water tight for the time being. A porch was built over the rollway, and the front steps were repaired. If this schoolhouse is to be used for a term of years, the roof should be newly shingled and the house painted. New slate blackboards have been placed in the Packers Falls schoolhouse.

### NEEDS

The Central School house is now very comfortable, so far as light and heat is concerned. But it lacks the room for some of the things that seem necessary to do the entire work that should be done in the Junior High School. It may be possible to partition off a part of the upper hall for typewriting. The pupils going to Dover for the last two years of their Commercial Course, should take typewriting in our school, and some way should be devised for such work. Some new equipment in the way of school furniture must be provided. Every desk is now being used. I had to take up two desks from the Primary Room and take them to the Packers Falls School, as some new pupils entered that school and there were no desks for them. office, or teacher's room is very much needed, and I can see no space where such a room can be made.

### HEALTH

There has been very little sickness in the schools this year, although many cases have been reported in town. Our school nurse, Miss Ina Marden, has been very active and efficient and her constant inspection and advice has had much to do in preventing sickness. The schools seem to be the safest places, for the children, to be found in town. The nurse reports that she has "Some very cooperative people in Durham to whom I can turn for help in getting defects corrected. One child sadly in need of surgical attention, has had a throat operation through the financial aid of the Red Cross. Sixty-one of the school children have received the Toxin-Antitoxin treatment."

I wish to thank the people of Durham for the unselfish interest in the children in our schools, and I am sure that the knowledge that the children are being helped to a better physical and mental life should be a reward.

### A NEW BUILDING

The attention that has been given to the matter of a new building for Durham has been in the hands of the Committee appointed at the District Meeting. I have been asked by this Committee to obtain plans and estimates for remodelling the present building, also to get other plans for a new building. I employed Architect Richardson of Dover, and we went over the needs of the school and he drew a plan to remodel the present building. His estimate of the cost was rather a surprise, as it exceeded \$30,000.00. I have consulted several architects and have had plans submitted for buildings that would cost anywhere from \$30,000 to \$100,000. Some of these plans will be available for study by those who are interested in the matter of a new building.

The matter of to build or not to build is a question for the voters of Durham to decide. Of course, a new building in keeping with the town would be very nice to have, and no doubt would add much to the attractiveness of the town. But if you decide not to build for a time, we shall make the present building do as a part of the equipment in fitting your boys and girls for their life work.
