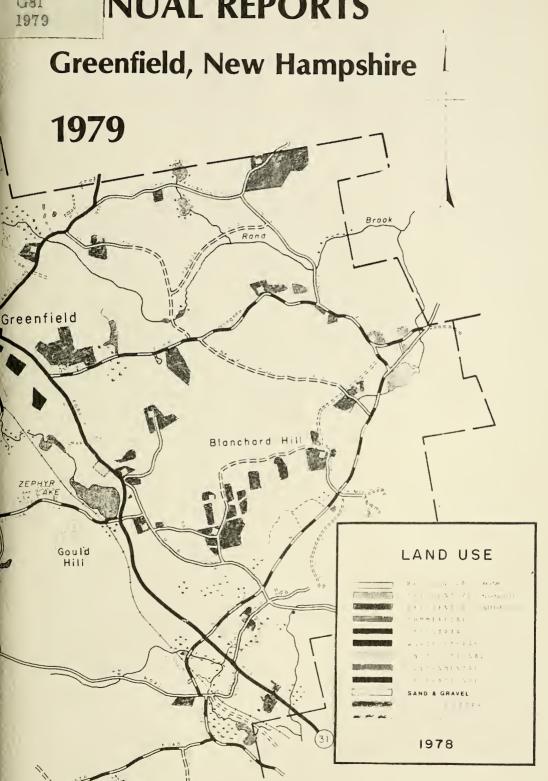

TOWN JOURNAL

1979 began with some concern about our town and ended with most people feeling much better about it.

It was a year of accomplishments. The town common was relandscaped and looks beautiful; solid progress was made toward a good master plan; the Fire Department, under Chief Conway, added a new 3400-gallon tanker and a well-equipped rescue van to its equipment. Town finances underwent a severe scrutiny, resulting in improved purchasing procedures and a general tightening up. Highway and other departments kept within budget. Property re-assessment at 100% of market value was completed. Tax bills at year's end actually reflected a slight drop in the adjusted rate.

Population growth slowed a little. Fourteen new homes were started, down from 17 last year. Estimated population was 1038.

The year opened snowy and cold. By February we'd had days of 20 below. A check for \$1800 toward equipment for the new rescue van was presented by the woman's Club. Youth Fellowship members made mounds of cookies at the meeting-house, distributing them to shut-ins in pretty Valentine baskets. A Valentine Dance on the 21st drew 35 young people, sponsored by the Recreation Committee.

Town meeting, always an emotional event, was this year something extra: Errors in the Town Report resulted in a two week adjournment to give the selectmen time to correct them. A second try fared little better, with errors still unclarified.

At last, on April 10 the budget and 34 articles were voted up or down, and life returned to normal. Paul Brooks replaced Aime Metivier as sele ctman, Aime having retired for health reasons.

The Historical Society announced success in having our meeting-house declared an historical landmark - a deserved honor as the one remaining such in the state still used for both church and secular affairs. Our Youth choir participated in a Youth Choir Festival at the United Church of Christ in Keene. The town was saddened by the death of Frank Hopkins, recently moved to Peterborough after many years of service to the town. Early in May, whip-poor-wills were heard on South Francestown Road.

Charles and Kit Hopkins hosted a grand open house to meet our new minister, Alexander S. Dreese. He was to assume the pulpit a month later bringing with him his new bride, Becky.

Memorial Day parade filled Forest Road with sound and glory, replete with color guard, band, fire engines and antique cars.

Library trustees fostered a bike-safety program at the fire station. Twenty-seven kids took part. The Brownie troop held an annual Parents' Buffet and presented a play.

Lines at the gas pumps began to reappear. Word was that heating oil would be scarce next winter, and the song of the chain-saw was heard in the land. A hot, muggy summer by now. The Little League, coached by David Bingham, had so far won 3 and lost 2, while the PeeWees, under Bob Johnson, had a 5 and 2 record.

The Fourth saw the first annual Greenfield Country Fair and Parade with the theme: "Happy Days are Here Again".

Prizes for costumes, floats, antique cars, bicycles, bucketbrigade demonstrations. A cloudy but good day after heavy rains the night before.

Six hundred flowers were planted in the town common flowerbed by George Rainier, Joseph Tucker and several of Wally and Velma Stone's grandchildren. This was funded by the Grange, a community project.

Lazy, hazy days as work started on reviving the town common. A DPW team assisted by Roscoe Putnam's back-hoe installed new granite curbing to define driveways and parking, removed seven defunct maples, spread loam and grass-seed. A great improvement, and done within budget.

Becky Dreese, who must have just caught her breath, was introduced as our new librarian at a coffee given by the trustees. She replaced Pat Rainier, who had taken a job with the N.H. Conference of the United Church of Christ. Thirteen year old Jun Takayabu from Japan came to stay for a month with the Joseph Naylor family.

The weather played tricks - down to 35 degrees on August 6, but muggy and hot for Labor Day. Swimming lessons at Camp Union resulted in 3 "fish" and 6 "minnow" awards.

Traces of hurricane "David" struck us September 5,
knocking down some branches, followed a week or so later by
"Frederick" with similar results. A threat of frost brought
concern for un-ripened tomatoes. Foliage was turning early. A
farewell for the Arthur Blanchards, moving to Maine - friends
filled the meeting-house. The town misses them.

Chill winds and peak foliage marked the Woman's Club
Harvest Fair. People came from miles around and sold-out signs
went up early. A week later we had 3 inches of snow(about the
last to be seen for the rest of the year). A chilled group
turned out to dedicate the new historical marker for our
meeting-house, with a speech by Governor's Councilman, Judd Gregg,
songs by the choir, and a benediction by Reverend Alexander
Dreese. Edythe Atherton, President of the Historical Society
conducted the dedication. The text of the marker by Frank
Dierauf was admired by all.

Sixty-odd met early in November to form a Citizens' Advisory Board to aid the Planning Board in developing the master plan for the "eighties". Great excitement at Greenfield Industries when presidential candidate George Bush appeared on the steps to film a real "down-home Yankee" campaign commercial. Among those pictured with him were Anna Chute, Kathy and daughter Molly Gregg, Scott Carbee and John Jenkins. Disturbing news from Iran - our diplomats in hostage - brought volunteers to ring the meeting-house bell for 15 minutes each noon until our hostages were released. It was still wounding forth at the end of the year.

Christmas was green but merry, enlivened by carols and parties, and a "Symbols of Christmas" pageant by Sunday-Schoolers at the Church. On December 29 recycling became mandatory. A nuisance, but perhaps not as bad as we'd thought. With much done and a revived spirit, Greenfield enters another decade in its vigorous life.

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenfield in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town House in said Greenfield on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1A: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 1B: To vote by ballot on (6) amendments to the Zoning ordinance proposed by the Planning Board.

Town Meeting will recess until 7:30 P.M. Friday, March 14, 1980 when Article 2 and the remaining articles of the warrant will be acted upon.

Article 2: To raise and appropriate such sums of money for the operation and maintenance of Town Property, Old Age Assistance, Social Security, Town Officers Salaries, Town Officers Expenses, Legal Expenses, Debt Service, Insurance, Planning Board Expenses, Community Services, and any other charges arising within the Town as proposed under "Appropriations which Comprise Town Charges" printed elsewhere in this report.

Article 3: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums as are necessary to defray Town charges in anticipation of taxes, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 4: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, standing committees, or other officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relative thereto.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer and convey property acquired by the town by tax collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts given the Town in trust or otherwise by any individual or group of individuals. or take any action relative thereto.

Article 7: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$64,000. for the support of the Public Works Department allocated as follows:

Article 8: To see if the Town will vote to accept and appropriate \$10,873.36 of Highway Subsidy Funds for the maintenance, construction, or reconstruction of Class V Town Roads, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to accept and appropriate the additional subsidy of \$9,171.19 as provided in Chap. 241 Sec. 15 of R.S.A. 1977 to be used in construction and reconstruction of Class V roads which shall be used to increase the highway appropriation for 1977, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 10: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$819.56 providing the State will contribute \$5,463.74 for the construction and reconstruction and betterment of Class V roads, or take action relative thereto. (TRA)

Article 11: To see if the Town will vote to accept and appropriate the sum of \$1,447.41 as per Chap. 241 Sec. 11 R.S.A. for maintenance of Class V highways, or take any action relative thereto. (Duncan Fund)

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700. for the use of the Conservation Commission, said funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. for the support of the Recreation Program, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,500. for repair to The Meeting House steeple, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to permit the Union Congregational Church to install a chairlift at the rear of the Meeting House, in the area of the fire escape, provided that neither the basic structure is compromised nor the appearance seriously altered.

Article 21: To see what action the Town will take, if any, towards the disposition of the 1937 Chevrolet Fire Truck.

Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to increase the annual salary of the Treasurer to \$600. and that of the Town Clerk to \$600., or take any action relative thereto.

Article 23: To see if the Town will vote to authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act for use as a setoff against the following debt service.

1979 Loader Note & Interest \$7,485.

Article 24: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate six thousand dollars (\$6,000.) for a Police Cruiser and authorize withdrawal of this Amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 25: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.) for enclosing the recycling shed and authorize the withdrawal of this amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to return to the Recreation Committee the \$2,500., plus interest, now in saving account #55445 (The Recreation Project for which it was designated is no longer active), or take any action relative thereto.

Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,200. for the purchase and installation of street signs to be placed at those road intersections where none now exist, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 28: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$750. for the "winterizing" of the Town Hall which shall include storm windows, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 29: To see if the Town under the provisions of RSA 36:19-a, will vote to empower the Planning Board to review site plans for the development of tracts for non-residential uses, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 30: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$8,000. for the repair of the Fire House roof, or take any action relative thereto.

Article 31: To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift of land, containing 1 acre more or less, (frontage on Sunset Lake abutting the present town beach) from Fred Coville and express the town's gratitude to the Coville Family.

Article 32: To see if the Town will vote to elect a six member Budget Advisory Commission. The six members to be elected in 1981. Terms to be; 2 members for 1 year, 2 members for 2 years, and 2 members for 3 years. Each year thereafter elect 2 members for a 3 year term. The duties of the Commission will be to assist the Selectmen and Town Departments in the preparation of annual budgets.

Article 33: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting, or take any action relative thereto.

TOWN MEETING

March 13, 1979

Meeting openned at 10 a.m. with Gardner Glover leading the Pledge of Alegeance to the flag, and Peter Hopkin's Moderator lead the Lords Prayer==The Moderator read the warrant through the first article. The Checklist was read and presented to the Clerk.

Folls openned= Balloting only on this day for Town Officials and Zonning changings.

Polls closed at 6:10 p.m. when ballots were counted. 306 votes cast= with 564 names on the checklist.

Selectman for three years:

Scott S. Carbee 150 votes = Stephen R. Payne 151 votes, Edward Conley had 1 write in. Therefore Stephen R. Payne elected for the ensuing three years.

Town Clerk for Three Years:

Anna M. Chute had 283 votes therefore elected for the ensuing three years.

Tax Collector for one Year:

Anna M. Chute had 278 votes, therefore elected for the ensuing year.

Town Treasurer for one Year:

Patricia E. Spiller had 259 votes =Write-ins Anna Chute l=Remus Macalaster 2=Jackie Whiton 2=Margaret Macalaster l=Anne Geisel l and Diane Naylor l vote. Therefore Fatricia E. Spiller having 259 votes elected for the ensuing year.

Fire Chief for one Year:

James Conway had 287 votes, therefore elected for the ensuing year.

Chief of Police one year Term:

Charles S. Burrage had 288 votes, write ins, David Nichols 1= Wyatt Fox 2nd 1 and Bruce Russell 1 vote. Therefore Charles S. Burrage elected for the ensuing year.

Supervisor of Checklist for two years:
Robert L. Johnson 279 votes, elected for the ensuing year (2)

Supt. of Public Works for one Year:

Bruce N. Cagnon had 282 votes =write ins Allan Young 1=Wyatt Fox 2nd 2= Diane Naylor 1 and Wilfred Crouse 1. Bruce N. Cagnon having 282 voted elected for the ensuing year.

Trustee of Trust Funds three Years:

Muriel L. Paro 270 votes= elected for the ensuing three years.

Library Trustee Three Years:

Barbara Fraser 238 votes=write ins=Fat Johnson l=Adele Gagnon l=Diane Naylor l=Anne Geisel l=Puth Merrill l=Velma Stone l and Doroth Howard l vote. Barbara Fraser having 238 votes elected for ensuing three years.

Overseer of Public Welfare for one Year: Write ins=Diane Naylor 66 votes =Several write ins besides of 1 vote each. Diane Naylor having 66 votes elected for the ensuing year.

Planning Board Member Three Years: Two members Jarvis M. Adams 3rd. 221 votes=Sheldon Carbee 96 votes and Julie W.Hopkins 206 votes and four write ins of one each. Jarvis M. Adams 3rd and Julie Hopkins having the most votes elected for the ensuing three years.

Auditors for one year - vote for two:
H. David Grophear 244 votes=write ins Maurice Lagace 17 votes and twenty other votes for twenty other people. H. Grophear and M. Lagace elected for the ensing year.

Conval School Board Member 3 year term:
Donald F. Winslow 114 votes and Louise Force 171 votes=Several 1 vote each
write ins= Louise Force having 171 votes elected for the ensuing three years.

Zonning Votes: #1 Amendment to eliminate the industrial zone which lies within Residence B District in the vicinity of Old Bennington Road, Cashion Road and Flynn Roads in the N. W. Portion of the Town. Voted in the Affirmative 145 votes yes and 132 votes no

#2 Amendment to change the setback requirement in Residence A and Residence B Districts from 25 feet to 50 feet=Voted in the affirmative.

177 votes Yes and 101 votes No

#3 Amendment to allow the conduct of professional business or other customary home occupations in any Residence in Residence A and Residence B Districts=Voted in the affirmative.

222 votes yes and 55 votes no

#4 Amendment to the limit the number of building permits to any record holder during the next two years or until completion of the Town's Master Plan, whichever comes sooner. Voted in the affirmative 195 votes Yes and 89 votes No

Art. 2 Moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$90,305.84 to defray town charges. Mr. M. Lagace moved to postpone article two until article twenty and twenty two were taken up first. Motion moved and seconded and voted in the affirmative. After article twenty and twenty two were taken up the Moderator continued on through article 24, when he returned to article two. \$800.00 difference in the town officer salaries were raised from \$6,000. to \$6,800. Moved and \$econded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$90,305.84 for Town Charges and voted in the affirmative. (This article was taken up during the third meeting of the Town Meeting.)

Art. 3 Moved and seconded to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money that is necessary to defray town charges. Voted in the affirmative.

Art 4. Moved and seconded that the reports be accepted as printed. Voted not to accept the reports. After much discussion and pointing out the fact that the detailed statement of payments was off some \$5,000. and also many reports didn't balance nor add up to the totals in the book. The Auditor Mr. Lagace stated that the Selectmen's Ledger book and the treasurer's books did balance. This did not satisfy the voters and the meeting was recessed until the Selectmen went to their office and got the books, but they were unable to satisfy the people. A motion was moved and seconded to postpone the meeting for two weeks, Friday March 30th 1979 at 7:30 p.m. In the meantime the Selectmen are to come up with the corrected statements. The Moderator stated the Town Meeting closed, but did open the rest of the articles for discussion only. The meeting closed at 9:30 p.m.

March 30th recessed meeting called to order by Moderator Peter Hopkins. (A moment of Silence was had in Memory of JOHN T ROBERTSON a long time resident of Greenfield, who had recently passed away.)

The Selectmen gave a report of their findings. They stated they were unable to balance the report and was still off \$1,387.00. Several voters from the floor gave a report to the Selectmen stating where several of the mistakes were listed. Motion made to accept the article. More discussion and the voted not to accept the article. Motion moved and seconded to leave this article and take up article 32. Voted in the affirmative. (report of article 32 listed after article 31 in this report.)

Art. 5 Moved and seconded to accept the article as printed. Selectmen were questioned as to the sale of Town Property. Reported none being sold. Voted to accept article as printed. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 6 Moved and seconded legacies and gifts given to the town in trust or otherwise by individuals or groups be accepted. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 7 Moved and seconded to postpone this article until article 12 is discussed. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 12 is listed in its proper place in this report.

Art. 7 as voted. Moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$52,807. for the Public Works Department. This amendment was a reduction from the originial amount \$73,550. asked for. Voted on amendment and voted in the affirmative.

Art. 8 Moved and seconded to appropriate the sum of \$10,866.63 subsidy money for the highways. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 9 Moved and seconded to appropriate the sum of \$7,045.45 of extra state subsidy monies. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 10 Moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$817.86 for TRA roads, provided the state give \$5,452.42. Voted in the Affirmative.

Art. 11 Moved and seconded to appropriate the sum of \$1,581.11 Duncan Fund monies for roads from the state. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 12 Moved and seconded to appropriate the sum of \$5,000. Revenue sharing monies to go toward the purchase of a new loader for the Town Public Works Department. Amendment to this araicle is moved and seconded to appropriate the sum of \$7,650. of Rev. sharing monies. Voted in the affirmative. Don Ross made a motion to take up article 12 and article 12a together, also article 7 was discussed at this time. Bob Geisel presented a chart of highway spending and showed that a saving of \$10,000. would be saved in rental of equipment on the highway budget. Moderator called for a ten minute recess.

After the recess the Moderator asked for a vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,650. rev. sharing monies for payment on the loader a two thirds vote necessary on this vote. Show of hands 91 votes yes no vote against.

12a Moved and seconded to authorize the selectmen to borrow the sum of \$30,000.00 to pay the balance on the loader, to be paid over a five year payment plan. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 13 Moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,766.67 to cover overdrafts - amendment to this article = To raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,822.61 to cover the overdrafts, voted in the affirmative. It was stated that it was believed that the overdrafts could be more. The Selectmen stated they would find out if this artice was legal when they went to Concord to get the tax rate.

Moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,822.61 to cover overdrafts. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 14 Moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,825.00 for the Fire Department's general use. Maurice Lagace moved to discuss article 14 and article 15 together, this was seconded and voted in the affirmative. Moved and seconded to amend article 14 to increase the amount to \$9,575. Appropriate the sum of \$4,750. from the Fire department's escrow monies in the trust fund. voted in the affirmative. Also raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,825. for general use. voted in the affirmative.

Art. 15 (this article voted on before article 14 was.) Moved and seconded to appropriate the sum of \$8,930. of revenue sharing monies for the purchase of 2000 feet of 4" hose. Amendment to this article moved and seconded to appropriate the sum of \$9,433. Appropriate the sum of \$5,186. from revenue sharing funds=Show of hands for two thirds voted needed. 91 votes Yes and no votes against. Voted in the affirmative. (Only the Revenue sharing appropriation voted under article 15=the difference you will note was taken care of in article 14.)

Memo: I have listened to the tape of the Town Meeting and I believe these article to be correct. It would be much better in the future if the Budget

Art. 18 Moved and seconded to accept article as printed. (a vote of thanks was extended to the Women's Club for their donation of \$1,800. toward; the Greenfield Fire Department Rescue Equipment Fund.) Voted in the Affirmative.

Art 19 Motion moved and seconded to increase the Fire Chief's salary to \$200. per year . voted in the affirmative.

Art 20 Moytion moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,550. for the Police Department. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 21 Motion to recess at eleven o'clock and reconvene next friday night at 7 p.m. Voted in the affirmative. Now finished with article 21. Moved and seconded to change the police Chief's term to a three year term, beginning in 1980=voted in the affirmative.

Art. 22 Moved and seconded to accept and appropriate the sum of \$1,900. for the Police chief's wages from the N. H. Crime Commission. Voted in the affirmative.

THE SELECTMEN ARE TO CONTINUE TO FIND THEIR ERRORS IN ACCOUNTING AND BRING IN A BALANCED REPORT FOR THE NEXT recessed meeting.

Meeting closed at 11'10 p. m. Recess until April 6th.

April 6th meeting came to order at 7 130 p.m. with Moderator Peter Hopkins leading the meeting. Took up article 24 before article 23 was voted on. Article 23 is posted in it's proper place.

Art 23 Moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. for

the support of the Recreation Program. Voted in the affirmative.

Art 24. Moved and seconded to appropriate the sum of \$4,000. from Rev. sharing monies to go with monies already on hand for the Recreation department= to enlarge the Recreation field and purchase the Russell property that is needed. Mr. Rizzio gave a summary of the funds already on hand with the assistance of the Selectmen. Privous funds appropriated in 1975 and 1976 =\$6,000. of this \$2,500. in Peterboro Savings bank earning interest and \$3,500. of Otter Lake Fund also and with the Revenue sharing monies. This year will take \$5,200. from Otter Lake Fund also and rev. sharing money of \$4,000. would have \$15,200. That is short \$300. but the Committee would be able to raise difference giving food sales etc. The Total would be \$15,500. and this would be matched by B.O. H. monies that is already applied for and waiting for this vote. This would make a total of \$31,000. available for this work.

After much discussion=The Selectmen said the Russell land had been appraised by the State man Mr. Greene. The question came up that if B.O.H. monies were used anyone from another town could use the facilities. The Recreation director Mr. Rizzio stated it would be scheduled and didn't believe the town would be bothered with out siders.

Art. 24 continued

Mr. Paro asked if this was enough money to finish this project. The Selectmen said this would more than finish stage one of the project. Also the Selectmen stated that if this was voted down we would loose the B. O. H. monies and would have to start all over again applying. This has already been worked on for two years now==getting the paper work done. A two thirds vote needed. show of hands counted yes vote 30 count no vote 19 votes necessary for two thirds vote 32==lost by two votes.

Art. 25 Moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,550. for the support of the Library. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 26 Moved and seconded to have the town reassessed this year. To be put out for bids==State or Private assessors. Voted in the affirmative. Approved \$15,000. for this job.

Art. 26a Motion moved and seconded to appropriate the sum of \$5,000. from revenue sharing funds. Amendment change to appropriate the sum of \$12,0000. from revenue sharing to reduce the cost to the town for this reassessing. Voted in the affirmative. Count Yes vote 51 count no one voted against it.

Art. 26b Motion moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000. for the balance of the reassessing job. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 27 Moved and seconded to appropriate the sum of \$50. from revenue sharing fund for advertising hearings. Voted no show of hands Yes vote none = 51 count no. article defeated.

Art. 28 Moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for the support of the Conservation Commission and Elm Tree preservation graps. Voted in the affirmative.

Art 29 Moved and seconded to accept the article as printed. Amendment Ann Geisel moved to use contigency fund money necessary for this committee. Voted in the affirmative. The same members are asked to remain on the board for another year.

Art 30 Moved and seconded that the operating cost of each department will show their own expenses of lights, heat and telephone=be listed this ; coming year so people will know what the cost is==beginning in 1980 town report, these will be included in the budget of each department. Also Insurances if possible to list separately. Voted in the affirmative.

art. 31 Motion moved and seconded to accept article as printed, Discussion Mrs Dierasuf wants road back of Town Hall closed, Mrs. L. Russell Wants it left open=Mr. Paro stated put stop signs at each end if necessary for a safety factor. Frank Dierauf wants gates and bars=He withdrew his idea. Peter Hopkins the Moderator stated leave this to the Town Common Committee as the road had not been officially closed. Voted in the Affirmative.

Art. 32 moved and seconded to have State auditors do the town books beginning with 1979 books. Discussion=Amendment to have the auditors also do 1978 books over. Amendment was voted no. Also the books could be done quarterly= Mr MacAlaster former town treasurer said he thought this would be a waste of town money. Mr. Stephen Payne the new Elected Selectman reported to the people that he felt very sure the town must be a least \$100,000. in the red from privous overdrafts over the years. The Present Selectmen said he was very much wrong in his statement. Amendment by Mr. Payne moved and seconded to have privous years auditored that is necessary to find the deficit. Amendment was voted in the affirmative.

Art. 32a Motion moved and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000. for payment to Outside auditors to audit the town books. Voted in the affirmative.

Art. 33 Motion moved and seconded not to change the name of Swamp Road to Sleepy Hollow Road. Voted in the Affirmative.

Art. 4

At this point in the meeting article 4 was once again taken up. The Selectmen gave a report. Mr. Metivier said that the report was balanced within \$22.00 and that anyone that would like to look for it they were welcome to do so. Marjorie Aiken made a motion to accept his article now. Seconded and voted in the affirmative. Mr Dierauf asked the Selectmen to send corrected reports to the State Department and State Library.

 $\mbox{Mr.}$ Jerry Adams thanked the Budget Committee for their outstanding work on the budget.

Marjorie Aiken hoped that the department's would get their reports to the Budget Committee this coming year much earlier than in the past. Gardner Glover suggested that the polls be open until ? p.m. in the future for the people that work out of town so they may have time to vote. The opinion of the group present thought it was a good idea. Meeting closed at 10 p.m.

Report of Public Works Department

1979 was an active year for the D.P.W. With an early spring, brush cutting was done on the So. Francestown Ad. and Fletcher's Cross Rd. which was also widened and ditched to enable water runoff and easier snow plowing.

I would like to see all dirt roads widened and ditched

where necessary in years to come. This will be possible now

the town owns its own loader.

Highway Subsidy monies were used to cut trees and brush. widen and ditch the following roads - Slip Rd. from Metivier's the Gulf Rd. and the Gulf Rd. from Frederick's to the Peterborough Line.

A section of Zephyr Lake Rd. was cut back - trees and brush. The existing hot top, stones and stumps were removed,

regraveled with $1\frac{1}{2}$ " crushed gravel and was rehot-topped. A section of East Rd. was cut back. Two small sections of cement culvert were removed and replaced with one new 30" section and it was graveled.

New Highway Subsidy Monies were used for shimming bad

and broken sections of Slip Rd. and Zephyr Lake Rd.
This year the New Highway Subsidy should go to start reconstruction of the Old Mt. Road, Which calls for extensive brush cutting, ditching, widening, cleaning culverts or replacing if necessary. A section of the road could be done each year until it is completed.

T.R.A. was continued on the So. Bennington Rd. The Town doubled the mileage compared to last year with the town having its own loader.

Duncan Fund and part of Highway Subsidy monies were used on Dodge Rd. from So. Francestown Rd. to the bridge. The road was cut back, widened, ditched and graveled at all narrow sections to enable water runoff and easier snow plowing. year the road should be finished from the bridge to East Road. This includes widening and strengthening the bridge.

This year I have kept an hourly break down of hours the loader was worked for the different catagories of monies

spent by the Highway Dept.

Landfill 135 hrs @ \$25. \$3,375. Subs.Monies 251 hrs.@\$25 Winter & Summer 270 hrs.@\$25 \$6,750 \$6,255 Duncan Fund 24 hrs.@ \$25-\$600 T.R.A. 120 hrs.@ \$25 \$3,000

The above totals \$19,980 which was saved in vehicle rental.

At this time I would like to thank the Selectmen various committees and the citizens of Greenfield for their couperation this past year.

REPORT OF POLICE CHIEF

1979 was a very active year for the Greenfield Police Department. We physically responded to 580 calls for assistance, an increase over 438 in 1978, and more than double the 247 in 1977.

This report will deal with property crimes and offenders during 1979. When we receive a report of a theft, we must establish if the theft did occur. One alleged theft that resulted in an insurance claim of over \$1,200., was withdrawn during the course of an intensive investigation, when the stolen property was mysteriously returned by unknown persons.

Of the property crimes identified by persons arrested and convicted, the breakdown is as follows. One incident of breaking and entering into a store, one house burglary, one auto theft, shoplifting, theft of a picnic table, theft of a cord of wood, siphoning gasoline, and attempted theft by using stolen personal checks to try to procure merchandise.

Of the offenders, seven were male, and one female. Four were under the age of eighteen.

Two search warrants were obtained from the court system that allowed us to enter two different residences, seizing drugs both times.

1979 also saw the activating of our First Aid and Rescue Team. With 9 members completing the Red Cross Advanced First Aid Course, 2 Registered Nurse's and a well equiped Rescue Unit, we feel competent to handle most any emergency. 18 calls indicates a real need for this service.

REPORT

TOWN COMMON RESTORATION COMMITTEE

During 1979, the Town Common Restoration Committee presented the Master Plan to the Voters in a Public Meeting held in the Town Hall. The group present ok'ed our plan and work was started.

The Public works department assisted in this work, thus keeping the money mostley to town help. Electric wires were moved to west side of the Town Hall and buried. Hundreds of yards of loam was purchased from Pat Lussier of Peterborough. This loam was spread over the grounds and seeded by Dean Cornwell co-chairman of the Committee. The trees were cut and the wood sold to the highest bidder. Hundreds of yards of gravel purchased from Harris Construction and spread on the parking lots and roadways. Several Hundred feet of Granite was purchased and laid along the edge of the front and east drive and parking lots. Most of the Town Equipment was used which saved several hundreds of dollars in rentals. You will find a detailed statement in town report elsewhere.

You will note also a balance in this account and the Committee hopes it will be kept in escrow to finish fixing the fence and some other small jobs that needs attention.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

During 1979, work continued on the development of a comprehensive plan for Greenfield's future. The Planning Board compiled data on the Town's economic, social and natural features. This data was turned over to the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission which used some of it in the preparation of a series of preliminary reports on the Town's growth, land use, open space, recreation, and economic environment, and transferred some of it onto a set of maps depicting Greenfield's topography, soils, vegetation, historic sites, natural resources, etc.

Once the reports and maps were prepared, the Planning Board, realizing the necessity for citizen participation in the development of any meaningful plan for the Town's future, invited all those interested to join in the formulation of an advisory committee in order to provide a forum for the discussion of the impact of a growing population on Greenfield's resources in the years ahead. The organizational meeting of the Citizens Advisory Committee, held in November, was attended by more than fifty people, most of whom elected to participate by volunteering to join one of the five subcommittees. The Board encourages any other citizens who may be interested in airing their views and playing a role in shaping our Town's future, to join the Citizens Advisory Committee which meets on the second Monday of each month, at 7:30 pm, in the Town Hall.

At the March 1979 Town Meeting, the voters approved four amendments to the Zoning Ordinance. The first, which had been petitioned by residents in the area, was the elimination of the industrial zone in that part of Residence B District lying in the northwestern section of Town; the second changed the setback from 25 to 50 feet in the residence districts; the third allowed residences to be used for professional and customary home occupations; and the fourth limited the number of building permits until completion of the Town's Master Plan.

In June, the Planning Board benefited from its participation in a meeting between the Board of Selectmen, the Board of Adjustment, the Conservation Commission, and the Building Inspector which was chaired by the Town Moderator for the purpose of discussing the role of each and how they relate to one another. The meeting went far toward promoting a spirit of understanding, cooperation, and coordination between those agencies which, collectively, are charged with the responsibility for the orderly, controlled growth of Greenfield, and the prudent use of its land.

During the year, the Planning Board approved three minor subdivisions involving two lots each.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Your Conservation Commission, as presently staffed, was not organized fully until September of 1979, and as a consequence its accomplishments are rather limited. At our organizational meeting, we established the support of the so called "Bottle Bill" and the protection of the town's wetlands as first priorities. At successive meetings, we concurred that we would aid the Planning Board with its efforts in the establishment of Flood Plain Zones and the Master Plan. As of the writing of this report, four of the Commission members are serving as members of the Citizen Advisory Board in the development of the Master Plan.

Three members of the Commission plus one Selectman and one member of the Planning Board both by invitation attended the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions. It was agreed that the workshop sessions were informative and brought back invaluable information of

present and future use to Greenfield.

The plans for the next report period require that the Commission shall have completed the soils/sewage study and submitted a report and recomendations to the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen. The effort on the Greenfield Natural Resources Inventory will continue but willnot be completed because of the Commission's emphasis on the assistance that the Planning Board will require. It has been found that much of the Inventory effort has already been completed as part of the Master Plan effort. The Dutch Elm Disease treatment will continue as required. The citizens of Greenfield are reminded that this treatment is available at the cost of the chemicals plus physical help.

With the advent of solid waste recycling in Greenfield, some residents may be tempted to employ one of two possible alternatives both of which have some negative aspects. One of these is the "disposal" which grinds kitchen waste and washes it down the drain. Because this device causes an overload on the septic system, some municipalities forbid its installation while others require that the septic system be doubled in capacity. The second alternative, since an outdoor burn-barrel is unlawful, is to burn the refuse in the wood stove or the fireplace. Although this practice does not violate the letter of the Federal Clean Air Act, it does violate the intent. The fire in these cases is not hot enough to completely incinerate, and the odor would be most objectionable to our neighbors.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Shortly after Town Meeting, Mr. Metivier resigned from the Board of Selectmen and Paul Brooks was appointed to serve until the next town meeting.

The Selectmen held a conference with the Department of Revenue Administration in late March which resulted in our being assured our finances were safe and advised as to future borrowing procedures. After developing our cash flow chart and having a conference with the Souhegan Bank officers, we borrowed \$300,000.00 in April to carry us through the year. We reinvested part of the money not needed at once and so earned interest to help defray our costs.

As a result of our reassessment program, we got an overlay of \$19,665 which was very helpful in restoring previous overdrafts.

The Town Common Committee is to be congratulated on a fine job and a balance to complete the fine details.

After a year of sincere endeavor and hard work, we felt the Town bookkeeping system now reflects fairly the accounts of the Town. We have been enable to find an accounting firm who can give us both an accounting report and management plan within the money appropriated at the last Town Meeting so this has not been undertaken yet. We hope to do so in May.
