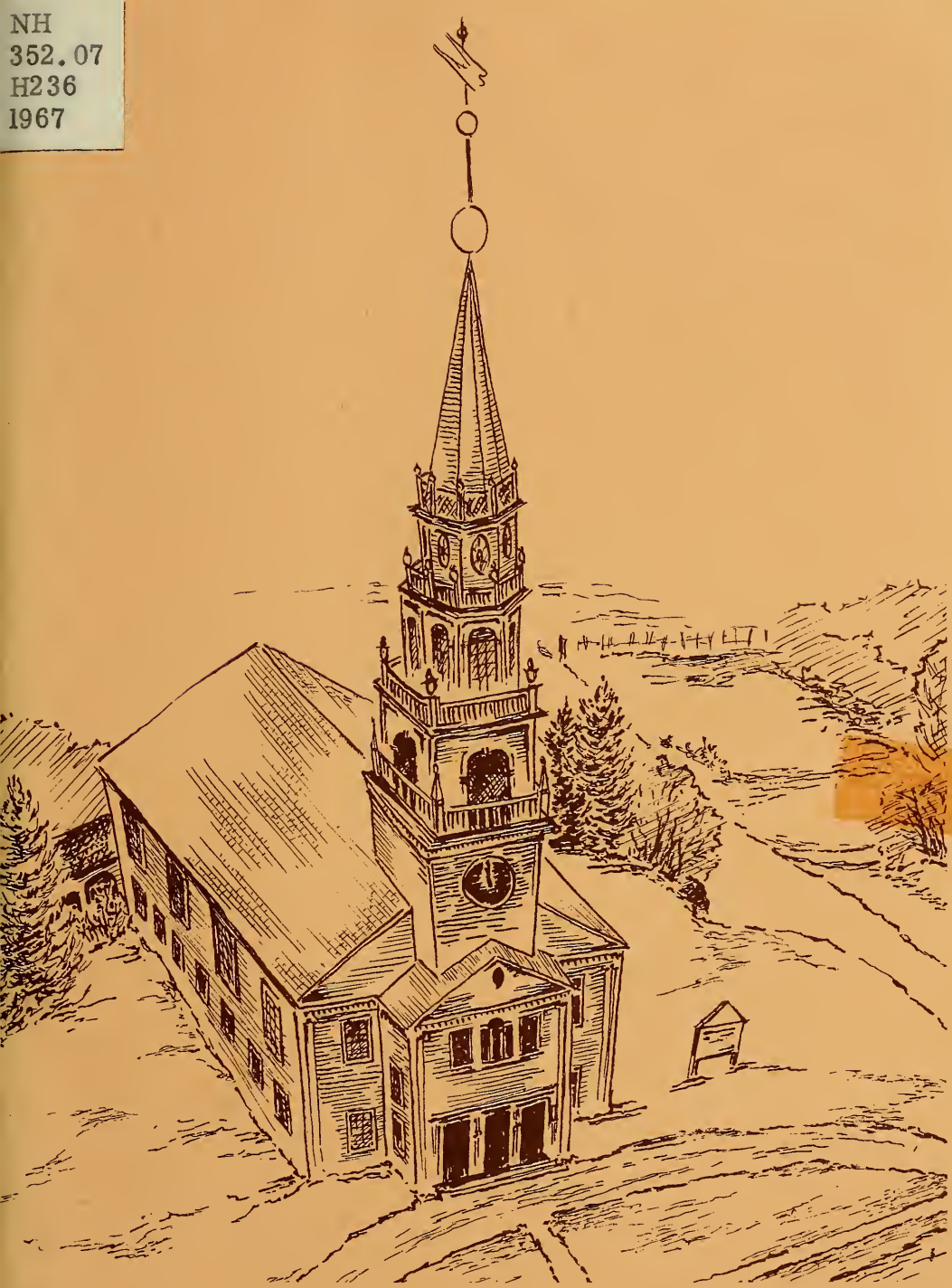

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing and for election of Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, and Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Convention.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (five hundred dollars) \$500 for the Town History Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.
4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred dollars) \$100 for the Fire Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate (one thousand dollars) \$1,000 for the Water Reserve Fund, or take any other action relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town wishes to buy a new pick-up truck for the Highway Dept. raise and appropriate money for the same or take any other action relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town wishes to buy a new self feeding sand spreader for the Highway Dept. raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$550.00 for the same or take any other action relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (three hundred sixty dollars) \$360 to buy six suits of protective clothing for the Fire Dept. or take any other action relating thereto.

9. To see what action the Town will take in appropriating a three-year term of office for the Town Clerk instead of the current one-year term.

10. To see what action the Town will take in approving a three-year term of office for the Tax Collector instead of the current one year term.

11. To see what action the Town will take in approving a three-year term of office for the Treasurer instead of the current one year term.

12. To see what action the Town will take in approving the change in the method of payment of the Selectmen from an hourly basis to an annual salary; the Chairman receiving \$400 per year and each of the other two members receiving \$300 per year or take any other action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (two thousand dollars) \$2,000 for grading Wilder Road and laying a bituminous surface thereon from its beginning at Norway Hill Road to its terminus at or adjacent to the northern boundary of property now or formerly of William J. and Helen D. Eklund, or take any other action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the parcel of land on Longview Road on which was formerly located the Town shed or take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (two thousand dollars) \$2,000 to replace the present docks at the Town Beach with aluminum docks, or take any other action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (six hundred sixty seven dollars and fifty three cents) \$667.53 which with the \$332.58 included in long term notes will amount to \$1,000.11 as our share of the T. R. A. program, or take any other action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate (one hundred dollars) \$100 to purchase a new lawn mower for the cemeteries, or take any other action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (five hundred dollars) \$500.00; this sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended for the purposes of the Conservation Commission or added to by gifts of money.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 1% on property taxes if paid 30 days after date of bill, or take any other action relating thereto

21. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

22. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen, or take any other action relating thereto.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

HANCOCK CONSERVATION COMMISSION

First Annual Report

Your Conservation Commission has held several meetings which were well attended. Members have also been present at a number of meetings in Concord, including several hearings at the State House in connection with conservation bills – especially House Bill III, the well known “omnibus bill” which will make it much easier for the towns to enforce proper sewage disposal methods.

The Commission has followed through an offer of about two hundred acres of land, but, as a result of legal advice, the donor made other plans. Even though the land is now in the hands of a different owner it is still safe from exploitation. A piece of desirable wet-land was discovered to be without an owner. Our Commission was able to find the owner and he is now paying taxes on the land. Hopefully, the Town may be able to acquire the property as it protects the watershed of one of our major brooks. Still another piece of land has been set aside which presumably will be given to the Town.

A complaint was made some time ago about raw sewage being emptied into another of our major brooks and, with the cooperation of our Public Health officer and a neighbor, this situation has been corrected.

A few films on wildlife and conservation have been presented through the activity of this Commission.

Thanks to a special grant, money has been provided for the purchase of textbooks on Conservation and allied subjects and a course in Conservation has been instituted in our local school for the fifth and sixth grade children including the establishment of a Nature Trail.

Through our efforts the Town now has a map of the Town-owned land covering the watershed of the Town Reservoir – Juggernaut Pond. Also members of the Commission are at present working on a special copy of the Town Map to mark out the various ecological and conservation areas in the Town. Following this will be an index of the water resources such as ponds, streams and marshes. There are many abandoned roads and railroad ways which a number of people of Hancock are interested in opening up to a limited degree for hiking and even for fire protection.

We recommend the establishment of a Conservation Fund built up jointly of Town Funds and funds given by

public spirited citizens and also, hopefully, by some charitable foundations. The purpose of such a Fund would be to have money on hand in the event land became available which would best serve Hancock citizens by Town ownership.

We believe that the consistently friendly and helpful attitude of the librarians has contributed greatly to the increasing use of the library. We are sure that all who use the library share our gratitude to them. The librarian, Miss Elsie Frank, has set the standard, the assistant librarians, Mrs. Laura Olson until we regretfully accepted her resignation, her successor Mrs. Doris Rogers, and the children's librarian Mrs. Eleanor Scott have maintained the happy atmosphere. We are very glad of this opportunity to thank them publicly.

During the year we have been able to make two improvements which are very helpful to both staff and patrons; an outdoor drop-box for the return of books at any time, and a telephone (525 - 4411). The latter may be used to request renewals.

All who enter the library in wet weather thank the Road Agent, Everett E. Adams for changing the grade of the road at our entrance so as to diminish the young pond that frequently blocked access to our path.

Again this year the State gave us a hundred dollars worth of reference books, allowing us to select what we wished from a long list. Many give us books and magazines as soon as they have read them, and others give selected books in memory of deceased relatives and friends. As you will note in the treasurer's report, Mrs. Thelma W. Babbitt has made a major and most generous donation of over five hundred dollars to set up the George King Babbitt Memorial Fund in memory of her late husband. We and the staff are extremely grateful for these many gifts and will do our best to be worthy of your continued support.

Lovers of music will be glad to learn that the Columbia Broadcasting System has given us about thirty L.P. records. They may be borrowed as soon as they have been catalogued. You will also notice that we have been so stimulated by this gift that we have included in the budget for 1968 an item of two hundred and fifty dollars for the purchase of additional records. We shall try to suit all tastes.

HANCOCK 1967

Prosperity, growth and added creature comforts was the backdrop for 1967. It was the year the drought which has prevailed for several years was broken by snow storms of importance in April and two ground covering falls in May which included two inches on the ground May 25th.

The war in Viet Nam dragged on. Hippies with long hair and weird clothes appeared and became national news along with "mind expanding" LSD, pot and other drugs. Mini-skirts were a great success. "Cool it" was even used by Dean Rusk, Secretary of State as our language adds and drops words and expressions.

Locally we coined a new word "Con-Val" which will never appear in the dictionary. All of us in Hancock, but

particularly Bud Wilbur, our delegate, and Dick Amidon who was concerned with the budget and building committee know that Con-Val stands for the new Cooperative School to be built in Peterborough. Students from Antrim, Bennington, Greenfield, Peterborough, Frankestown, Dublin, Sharon, Temple as well as Hancock will receive their secondary education there when the new school buildings are built. The Hancock vote in favor of the project — 157 - 97.

Taking an interest was Mabel Reaveley, a former teacher and now known as an authority on weather vanes. Which logically brings to mind the church steeple and the regilding of the clock (\$425.00), one of the continuing efforts to make Hancock's main street more and more attractive. Louis/Ruth Moller set up their Real Estate office in the building which, up to 1945, was Upton's grocery store. Later, for more than a decade, it was Pat Holsaert's interior decorating shop.

A special series of bangs and shootings stars featured the Glorious Fourth as the firemen, choosing Roy Finan to light the fuses, put on a display enjoyed by a cheering throng. It was during a break in the clouds which had made cutting and drying the lush hay a continuing problem for those few in Town who still cut.

Between showers there was the usual colorful Old Home Day parade. Among the many unusual entries were three gypsies, Mary Killay and her two daughters Carol and Wendy. All three were mounted on decorated horses and accompanied by beribboned dogs. But the biggest cheers were for a side show — the climbing of the greased pole down by the old High School. On a pyramid composed of Christopher Lynch, Paul Daly, Wayne Hanson, Richard Magoon, Herbert Haskell and Kent and Lyle Wheeler, a very smooched up Suzanne Parrott (granddaughter of Betty Gunther) snatched the prize at the top.

Frank MacFarlane who, with his wife Marge, were chairmen, introduced George Weston as Old Home Day speaker. The author of "Boston Ways", an ex-teacher and humorist, was in fine form.

Throughout the summer months as people from nearby towns came to buy fresh vegetables at the Village Farm, they had a chance to see Joe Quinn's one room museum. Here articles used a hundred years or more ago were a continual delight to visitors many of whom had never found time to visit the fine display at the Historical Building. Joe took special interest in explaining how some of

the rare articles were used. Incidentally, he had delicious corn on his stand as late as October 13th.

Another enterprise in Town, Mill-All (formerly the Hancock Tool Company), continued to grow under the direction of John Hill. Early in the year it became a part of Fansteel Metallurgical Corp. of North Chicago, Ill., a firm with many domestic and foreign plants and a New York Stock Exchange listing.

In June Chuck/Nancy Marsh leased the John Hancock Inn and quickly made many friends. In that same month Ruth Higgins and Ronald Calkins were married. Speaking further of marriages, in August, in time for a trip to Expo '67 in Montreal, Albert C. Garand wed Ruth Patton. Again in August the Meeting House was the scene of another ceremony when John Petterson wed Carol Gaylor. Eleanor Briggs chose a setting in the open on the shore of Norway Pond for her September wedding to Arne Lewis.

Singularly honored during November was Sime Sheldon who has, for a long time, commuted from his home on Nubanusit Lake to his job as Deputy Insurance Commissioner in Concord. At the Highway Hotel dinner some 500 persons gathered to honor him and Gertrude for thirty years of service. Walt Peterson of Peterborough, Speaker of the House, was among those praising him.

And there were others singled out for special attention among them Willis A. Foort, Sr., now 82, who was the subject of an article written by Nancy West telling of his days of railroading. At the Soldiers Home in Tilton a plaque was unveiled honoring the many years of service of Wendall Crowell at which his widow, Pauline, and son John were present.

Most of us remember Maurice/Beulah Tuttle, he as selectman, she as church organist and both as continuing active Grangers despite their having lived in recent years in Jaffrey. This year their 50th wedding anniversary was fittingly observed.

To conclude it should be mentioned that in the will of the Countess de Pierrefeu, who lived in Hancock for more than half a century, was a provision providing that her extensive holdings around Willard Pond would go to the National Audubon Society of New York. The Society accepted the gift this year and will maintain a caretaker on the property which will be a wild life sanctuary.

Voting was by Check List and same was in charge of the Supervisors of the Check Lists. Ballots used were the same form as presented in R.S.A. 195:18 VI.

When all who desired to vote had done so, it being 9:30 p.m., the Polls were declared closed by the Moderator.

HANCOCK SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

March 11, 1967

On March 11, 1967 the annual School District Meeting was opened at 4:00 P.M., by Robert English, Moderator. The polls were declared open for voting on the first four Articles of the Warrant, namely to choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Member of the School Board for three years.

After the Moderator read the first four Articles of the Warrant, it was moved "that the polls be now opened and remain open until 8:00 P.M., to consider Article 1 through 4 of the Warrant and that Articles 5 through 11 be taken up at 8:00 P.M." The motion carried, the Moderator declared the meeting recessed until 8:00 P.M., and voting began.

Mrs. Edith Decker and Mrs. Louise Stearns were Ballot Clerks.

At 8:00 P.M., the Moderator reopened the Meeting and declared the polls closed. He then read Articles 5 through 11 of the Warrant and the certification. Voting was as follows:

Article 5: Motion by Mrs. Mary Garland, Member of the School Board: "I move that the salaries of the district officers for the ensuing year be as follows: Chairman of the School Board, \$75.00; each other member, \$50.00; Treasurer, \$50.00; Clerk, \$15.00; Moderator, \$10.00; Ballot Clerks, \$1.50 per hour each; Auditors, \$1.50 per hour each."

The motion carried.

Article 6: Motion by Mr. Charles Robinson, Member of the School Board: "I move that the reports as printed be accepted and placed on file with the Clerk."

The motion carried.

Article 7: It was moved and seconded that Mr. William Brown and Mr. Frank MacFarlane serve as auditors of the School District for the ensuing year. The motion carried and the Moderator administered the oath of office.

Article 8: Motion by Mr. Arthur Tremblay, Chairman of the School Board: "I move that the school district raise and appropriate \$95,446.00 less any revenues and credits as certified by the State Tax Commission for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District."

Mr. Tremblay was questioned about and explained various items in the budget. Mr. Raymond G. Edwards, Superintendent of Schools, discussed the benefits under Title III of the National Defense Education Act.

The motion carried.

Article 9: Motion by Mrs. Mary Garland, Member of the School Board: "I move that this article be amended to read \$700.00 and that the school board be authorized to include a contingency fund item in the regular school district budget and raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for this purpose."

The motion carried.

Article 10: Motion by Mr. Arthur Tremblay, Chairman of the School Board: "I move that the school district raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 in addition to the original appropriation for 1966-67, to be made available to the school district prior to July 1, 1967, in order to meet district expenses for the current year."

The motion carried.

Article 11: Motion by Mr. Charles Robinson, Member of the School Board: "I move that the school board be authorized to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire."

The motion carried.

At 10:05 P.M., a recess was declared by the Moderator on a motion that the ballots be counted. At 10:25 P.M., the results were announced as follows:
