


Annual Message to the Board of Aldermen by Mayor William F. Sullivan

Nashua, N. H., January 1, 1932.

Gentlemen of the Board of Aldermen:

Today begins another municipal period. The old year has been an unusually trying one in many ways everywhere. In this city we felt the pinch of depression to some extent, but not to the same degree that many other cities have. Many reasons for this have been advanced and numerous have been the predictions as to when business will improve and prosperity replace the present difficult times. We have in the past and should continue in the future to pursue an even course. Caution and prudence should guide us; consequently we should refuse to commit our city to large capital expenditures until such times as our revenues are sufficient to do so without increasing taxes. Values in general have tumbled to such an extent that all property values have become affected. Last year there was a net loss in valuation in our city of \$1,879,231.00. With unstable markets and business, and with varying currents of pessimism prevailing it is fair to assume that there will be further reductions in real estate values. If this is so, with our unemployment problems, with reduced incomes, and with inactive business the question may be asked of us, "How are the taxpayers, as a whole, going to meet their tax obligations?" What can this administrative body do to lighten the load for the revenue producers and keep the city's credit in a high class? The answer should be clear. We must assist in stabilizing values. We must reduce expenditures to a working minimum in anticipation of valuation reductions in order that we may not come to the plight of other New England cities which have exceeded the debt limit and are nearing bankruptcy. In some of these cities the cure for financial ills has been drastic and painful, working great hardships upon the civil employees by reduction in numbers and wages.

Owing to the fact that our business, manufacturing, and financial institutions are well managed and sound, Nashua is in much better condition than other places.

Temporary depression is with us but will, as it always has done, pass away. It has been said that "the poor are always with us." Today people are in straitened circumstances who yesterday were well-to-do.

If there is one duty more obligatory than any other which a community must assume, it is the care of the needy people within its gates. Independent welfare organizations, churches, and individuals are doing splendid work. The Overseer of the Poor and the County Commissioners are taking care of many who never believed it would be their lot to ask for assistance. Doing this in a humane and reasonable manner has necessitated a two-fold increase over normal years in the cost of city and county departments. Hence we may ponder and consider the requirements necessary from every source and prepare to meet the emergency. It is needless to say that no person within our boundaries should suffer from the want of food, fuel, and clothing. If there must be any additional appropriation it should be for relief.

With the exception of the personnel of departments other expenses are decreasing, a reduction which, when linked with curtailment, should mean smaller appropriations.

As was said before, our city finances, our business, and other institutions of credit are sound. To prove that reasonable and moderate expenditure over a term of years has been a wise policy, let us glance at the city's account.

During the past four years, notwithstanding bond issues for the Canal Street bridge, public improvements in the fire area, the Veterans' Home, and sewer loans amount to over \$300,000, the net debt has been reduced \$298,597.82, and the borrowing capacity increased \$196,550.30.

Notwithstanding the fact that we issued \$100,000 Public Improvement bonds, which were used mostly for the rehabilitation of the conflagration area, this statement shows a decrease of \$63,669.15 in the net debt last year.

A decrease in our borrowing capacity this year of \$49,207.91 is directly caused by the loss in valuation of \$1,879,231.00.

The assessed valuation of the city for 1930 was \$44,097,117.00 and for 1931 was \$42,216,886.00. This is an indication of the trend of valuations and unless *there* is a substantial and immediate improvement in business *there* will, undoubtedly, be a further shrinkage of property values.

We must recognize that there has been retrogression in property values for over two years. Much of this is only temporary due to the inability of willing buyers to purchase because of the falling off in the value of their assets. We are confident that this apparent reduction will be only short-lived and in a brief time values will be adjusted at their true worth which will and must approximate values of 1931. It becomes the duty of the taxing powers and property owners not to get disturbed but to mark time for a short period instead of sacrificing ownership in property which is sure to again appreciate. Rather consider that real estate is in the same category as other kinds of securities, and that when the financial thaw comes, it will again float safely on the sea of prosperity. There are many delinquent tax payers. Taxes must be paid to carry on government. So that the embarrassment of taxpayers may not be increased, relief in a measure must be achieved; therefore this Board is confronted with an obligation to keep expenditures within a certain range to enable all, whether it be those who do not have to deny themselves or those householders who have no work, or part time work, to meet the inexorable demands of the tax collector.

SCHOOLS

The public school attendance for 193I showed a decrease under the previous year of 32. The enrollment in the Senior High School was 1209, an increase of 66 over the preceding year. The Junior High School has 710 students, a decrease of 43.

The grades, kindergartens, and suburban schools registered 2581, which is a decreased registration of 55 pupils from the 1930 figures. A joint committee from the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Education took up the request of the School Department for increased housing facilities for the Senior and Junior High School classes.

Dr. Jesse B. Davis was engaged to make a survey and report on the advisability of adopting the 6-3-3 plan.

The Joint Committee on February 9, voted to adopt the 6-3-3 plan, and recommended the erection of a thirty-room school building adjacent to the present Junior High School.

At a meeting on April 15, with the Mayor present, it was the concensus of opinion that owing to the depression, the committee should proceed slowly with a building program. It was felt that a valuable study had been made and that temporary arrangements to care for all registered students could be made. It was the judgment of the committee that it would be advisable not to proceed with the plan, but to wait until there should be an improvement in business.

The accomplishments of the School Department have been significant. It has halted the yearly demand for increased appropriations; it has operated the schools upon an efficient basis with a reduced budget, and this year has made a saving of approximately \$12,000.00. It has changed its form of organization, and eliminated unnecessary expense by centralizing responsibility. This is most gratifying, and in line with the trend for a more efficient and economical educational system.

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

This year Bowers Street, between Allds Street and Harbor Ave., was widened 15 feet on the north side. New sidewalks were laid with curbs and gutters, and the whole roadway was resurfaced with hot asphalt. Spruce Street, between East Hollis and Worcester Streets, was widened from 40 feet to 60 feet, and between Worcester Street and Temple Street, a new street was cut through, 60 feet wide. Proper drainage was provided, new curbs set, and the street rebuilt with a crushed stone base and a hot asphalt top. On Bowers and old Spruce Streets shade trees were set out.

On Allds Street from near Salmon Brook Bridge, easterly to McKean Street land was acquired to widen this section of the street which has for a long time been dangerous to the large volume of traffic which uses this artery.

RAILROAD BRIDGE WALK

For years our citizens have been trespassers on land of the Boston & Maine Railroad. It has been the custom of many people to use the railroad bridge in travelling between Temple and Canal Streets. It furnished a convenient cut off from the north side to the south side of the Nashua River. Arrangements were made and easements obtained to construct a safe passage across the bridge with suitable approaches. Under an agreement the city and railroad shared the expense. This walk is giving great satisfaction and fills a long felt want.

SIDEWALKS

Three sixty-six hundredths miles of cement concrete sidewalk, 5 feet in width were laid.

STREETS

A number of streets were gravelled and tarred, and many streets were treated with a hot penetrating mixture. This treatment is continually increasing and improving the mileage of our hard surfaced streets and roads.

SEWERS

Two thousand two hundred twenty-eight lineal feet of sewers from 24 to 8 inches in diameter have been laid.

SEWERAGE SYSTEM SURVEY

The comprehensive survey for a sewerage system has been carried on during the year, and further work has been done on the city survey or so-called assessors map. There is still a portion of this map work near the town lines incompleted.

STREET RAILWAY

It is evident that the Board of Public Works will be confronted with a problem when the Public Service Commission rules on the permanent abandonment of the street railway tracks.

STATE HIGHWAY (CONCORD STREET)

The State Highway Department has just constructed a two-lane cement concrete highway from Greeley Park in Nashua to Horseshoe Pond in Merrimack, a distance of 4.88 miles. In doing this work the dip and curve at Pennichuck brook have been eliminated. There is now underway, a new bridge and cut off, cast of the old bridge, which will straighten the road and reduce the grade about 300 per cent. This will make for safer driving.

LOWELL ROAD (STATE HIGHWAY)

The highway from Taylor Road to the state line has carried the bulk of travel which has come into the state in the past, and this traffic is ever increasing. One of the state's chief industrics is summer visitors, and the Daniel Webster Highway, bisecting the state and running through the valley of the Merrimack, bears the burden of travel. The southern end of the valley in New Hampshire has abundant scenic grandeur, and is the most populous and wealthy part of the state. The Lowell road initiates a vast amount of travel into the New Hampshire gateway. The demand is great for this road to be widened and improved. It has been suggested that the state build a four-lane highway from the Massachusetts state line to Taylor Road.

Before this is done it may be well to consider a proposition which has received considerable impetus in Massachusetts. At the present time, plans are under way for a Merrimack Valley Scenic Boulevard from Tyngsboro bridge to the sea. More than 500,000 people live in the valley from Concord, N. H. to Newburyport.

To serve this population and the populous Metropolitan District of Boston and western Massachusetts, and all converging routes from the west and south which pour visitors into our state through the main gateway, it is clearly evident we should provide an easy and a safe entrance. If the state should rebuild the present D. W. Highway, the cost would be great for widening, straightening, and changes of grade and damages. Further, the increased traffic on this road would depreciate home values. Might it not be well to consider the opportunity of having two highways for the cost of one?

It is thought that if the State of Massachusetts would extend the proposed Scenic Boulevard along the old river road in Tyngsboro to the state line then the State of New Hampshire could extend a wide Scenic Boulevard west of and along the railroad to the west end of Hudson

bridge. From this point a scenic highway is entirely feasible, and could be continued on to Manchester, Concord, and beyond. This route has many special features which are seldom found in locating a new highway. The land is unoccupied by buildings until Salmon Brook is reached; the whole distance is nearly level and lends itself to low cost construction. Further, a right of way could be obtained which would provide travel facilities for posterity with width sufficient to make a grand parkway. As many lanes of travel as are needed may be built from time to time for passenger cars, trucks and for high speed travel. Governor Winant and Highway Commissioner Everett have shown sufficient interest in the project to say that a viewing will be made within a short time.

UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF

The Governor and Council set aside \$2,500.00 for unemployment relief to be expended on a State Aid Road. The Board of Public Works employed men who had been out of work giving them three days work and then using the stagger method. The highway selected for improvement was the Hollis or Runnells bridge road.

EMPLOYMENT

A city alone cannot solve the unemployment problem, it can only help in a slight way by artificial means.

When basic industry and its allied activities show an actual revival of production then labor conditions will become nearly normal.

ZONING ORDINANCE

The Zoning Ordinauce has done much to maintain the integrity of property values. It has safeguarded the city against uncalled for and misplaced structures which, if permitted, would detract from the appearances of our streets.

ZONING BOARD ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of adjustment has served faithfully, often under trying circumstances and has treated fairly applicants who deside to non-conform with the ordinance.

PLUMBING COMMISSION

This commission has carried on the work of safe-guarding the health of occupants of buildings and also protecting the owners, in some cases, against inferior workmanship.

CITY HALL

This unsafe structure has not improved with age, but it would seem unwise at this time to erect a new City Hall. It cannot be forecasted when prudence should warrant an expenditure for this purpose. It is inevitable that in the meantime the old building must continue to house the present offices. These offices which are dingy, and have not been painted for over a decade should receive attention. Changes in the combined office of City Treasurer, City Clerk and Overseer of the Poor are needed, but these would be costly and therefore should be passed by for the present.

To give the headquarters of our city at least an air of respectability I would recommend a few hundred dollars be spent on paint and kalsomine.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

This year the Fire Department had a loss in the death of the late Chief James E. Smith. He served this community faithfully for years. His successor, Deputy Chief Albert C. Melendy, has had many years of experience as a fireman, and he is handling this important department with spirit and efficiency.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Our city has maintained its good reputation for order and its respect for the laws of the state, and the ordinances of our city. Police regulations have been enforced without undue opposition or friction.

BOARD OF HEALTH

For the first time in the history of our city vaccination was provided for pre-school children. Toxin anti-toxin inoculation for school children was continued during the year. In the parochial schools supervision over contagious and infectious diseases was performed through the Board of Health's nursing system.

There was a slight scare over rabietic dogs, and a quarantine was established and carried out at small expense with the co-operation of the Police Department and Dog Officer.

It is gratifying to know that the Health Department kept well within its budget allowance.

NASHUA PUBLIC LIBRARY

The use of the Public Library has increased during the year. Adult circulation at the main library increasing 6 per cent and juvenile circulation at the main library, 11 per cent.

The library purchased 64 mounted views of old Nashua which will make a valuable addition to its collection.

An experiment is being made during the winter months in keeping the reading rooms open on Sunday evenings from 5 to 9.

Owing to the design and location of the Public Library, remodelling or enlargements in the future would be difficult without destroying its artistic lines and practical uses. The city was able to purchase opposite and in the rear of the library on Clinton Street the so-called Soucy lot. This will enable the library, when called upon, to relieve overcrowding without marring the symmetry of the present building. The Soucy property is rented at a price to carry the charges of interest and taxes.

PARK DEPARTMENT

The Park Department has 154 acres of land under its control, 16 of which is lawn. There has been an increase in the number and size of its flower beds.

In the removal of moths from private premises the charges have not been paid in many cases. The owners should realize this is a charge against the property and should be paid.

A small park at the corner of Bowers and Marshall Streets has been laid out and developed during the year. Over 400 maple trees have been set out in the burned area. Further seeding of the filled in area at Artillery pond was done this year.

In the widening of Allds Street land from the Shea heirs was obtained. It is believed that the land not used for widening should be kept open for public use.

RECREATION COMMISSION

The four activities sponsored by the Recreation Commission, namely skating, playgrounds, swimming, and tennis have shown substantial gains in use and attendance.

As usual the final program of the playground season was an event, and enjoyed by a large number of people other than the participants.

The Chairman of the Recreation Commission is of the opinion that if it is permissible under the City Charter the Commission should for reasons of closer co-operation include the Superintendent of Schools, the Chairman of the Park Commission, and the Chairman of the Board of Public Works. This Department will end the year with a balance.

OVERSEER OF THE POOR

It was anticipated when the budget was prepared that this department would require additional funds to care for those in greatest need who came legally within the law for aid. The appropriation was \$15,000.00. Because of the large number of calls this sum will be exceeded 20 per cent.

TAXICAB ORDINANCE

This year a Taxicab Ordinance was adopted primarily to protect the public against irresponsible operators. It provides for local registration of the cabs, and a city license for the chauffeurs with liability insurance in amounts from \$5,000.00 to \$20,000.00 for each cab. This ordinance, in a measure, has regulated the use of these vehicles upon the public streets.

The taxicab is a keen competitor of the Nashna Street Railway. Railway operation has become a losing business. In an effort to solve the transportation problem and serve the public under the provisions of its charter the company has substituted busses which are now running on schedule time. The management states that with all the economies put into effect the returns are less than expenses. They further state that taxicabs are unfair competition, and if there is not further regulation of rates the city will surely lose its organized transportation system. Having been unable to meet its current obligations the Street Railway has been petitioned into a receivership. In the event of this company going out of business the community will lose a valuable asset. For nearly forty years the street railway has served the public and especially those residents living in the outskirts. Abandonment of regular service will certainly be a serious loss to many of our people and will have an unfavorable bearing on the values of moderate priced dwellings outside the built up section of our city.

OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY

The Board of Aldermen passed an Ordinance, making it legal to conduct, participate, and attend certain games on the Lord's Day, also legalizing motion picture performances. Such activities are restricted to certain hours. This Ordinance was referred to the voters and overwhelmingly adopted.

THEATRE ORDINANCE

An Ordinance was passed compelling theatres to carry liability insurance to protect patrons in case of accidents.

NASHUA'S GROWTH IN TEN YEARS

It may be of interest to note the progress of our city for the last ten-year period. It has been consistently forward and this should be a source of gratification to all who have her welfare at heart. It is the hope of all that in the next decade at least equal advance and success will be the lot of the second city of New Hampshire.

CONCLUSION

During the life of this city the high peak of material prosperity was in 1926 when the total assessed valuation was \$46,682,799.00. In 1931 the assessed valuation was \$42,216,886.00 or a loss of 9½ per cent during a four-year period. When we consider shrinkage in other cities we are indeed fortunate. Owners of property in New England cities have demolished good factories, business blocks and tenement houses to escape the payment of taxes. The effect of this reduction of valuation in Nashua, upon the annual taxable income, is about \$125,000 or about 10 per cent of our expenditures. If valuations are to be stationary, and if we are to maintain our present tax rate, then we cannot spend much for development. On the other hand, if we suffer further losses in valuation, or if new construction is undertaken, then it means either increased taxes or a reduction in the present running expenses of the city to a point where the people can pay. The duty of cities to live within their incomes is being driven home with great force. Within the past few weeks eight cities in New England have tried to float bond issues or temporary loan notes without success. This is a signal warning for municipalities to put their finances in order.

While Nashua, in common with every city and town, has felt the sting of the times, we know that we are better off than many other communities. When optimism replaces pessimism; when courage replaces gloom; and when hard times change to prosperity, I am sure we will find that our city has not been vitally hurt. If we turn our eyes inward, or if the world cares to glance our way, all will find a little city made up of sound business, manufacturing, and financial institutions; and best of all, they will find its inhabitants a happy and co-operative people who have good-will for one another, and who wish all mankind better and more peaceful times for the coming years.

Report of the Fire Commissioners

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen: Gentlemen:

We respectfully submit to you the report of the Fire Department for the year ending December 31, 1931.

The Board of Fire Commissioners, consisting of H. C. Lintott, C. H. Austin and E. W. Duncklee, met January 1st and organized by electing H. C. Lintott as Chairman and E. W. Duncklee as Clerk.

Fire Prevention Week, October 5th to 12th, was observed by the Department in a fitting manner.

INSPECTIONS BY THE DEPARTMENT

Officers and Members of the Department have made over (1200) twelve hundred inspections of buildings, cellars, yards, etc., from May 1st up to the end of the year, to guard against the accumulation of rubbish and inflammable material also to note any condition liable to fire.

These inspections are of great benefit to the Citizens and property owners in general. The inspections are also of great value to this Department, allowing the members to familiarize themselves as to the nature of contents and construction of different buildings within their districts.

We think that every effort should be made to lower our insurance rates.

FIRE ALARM TELEGRAPH SYSTEM

Beginning December 15th heavy grounds showed on circuits 2, 3, 4, 7, and tests showed that the grounds were in the cables and junction boxes in the manholes underground. At the present time we are removing these junction boxes from the manholes and installing test boxes at different parts of the City in box pedestals.

REPAIRS TO BUILDINGS AND APPARATUS

During the year the following Stations were painted on the outside, Central, Amherst, and Lake. All windows were reputtied and all broken glass was replaced. Eight pieces of apparatus have been painted and all ladders have been scraped and two coats of oil and two coats of varnish have been put on same so that every ladder is in first class shape. All these repairs were made by the members of the Department.

In conclusion we wish to extend our thanks to His Honor, the Mayor, the members of the Board of Aldermen, for their co-operation and interest in our Department, to the Chief of Police and members of the Police Department, to the Superintendent and employees of the Water Department, and to the Gas and Electric Department of the Public Service Company, also the Telephone Company, for valuable services rendered.

The Officers and Members of the Fire Department have our commendation and sincere thanks for the efficient and faithful manner in which they have performed their duties.

Report of Examination of Plumbers

Nashua, N. H., January 28, 1932.

To His Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:

The Board for the Examination of Plumbers respectfully submits its report for the year ending December 31, 1931.

The organization of the Board was as follows: Samuel J. Bingham, Chairman; P. J. McLaughlin, M. D., Chairman of the Board of Health, and Fred L. Clark, City Engineer, Secretary and Plumbing Inspector.

Regular monthly meetings have been held the first Monday of every month and written and practical examinations of applicants for Plumbing Licenses have been conducted as required.

During the year there were fifty-three (53) Master or Employing and sixty-seven (67) Journeymen plumbers licensed.

We find that the ordinance adopted May 14, 1929, and as amended March 10, 1931, has proven very satisfactory both to the property owner and the plumber; it assures the former of uniform, safe and sanitary work without unnecessary expense, and standardizes the work without undue hardship upon the latter, who has shown a willingness to co-operate with us. Violations have become fewer and in only one instance have we been obliged to invoke the law.

The number of buildings in which inspections were made were two hundred and seventy-two (272) and the total number of inspections made for the year was four hundred and fifty-nine (459).

Report of the City Solicitor for the Year 1931

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua.

Gentlemen:

Some of the important matters involving the Legal Department of the City during 1931 are as follows:

The \$70,000 action brought by Cunningham & Burdwood Construction Company against the City was tried before Judge Eri C. Oakes of Superior Court. This suit was for alleged breach of contract in connection with the erection of the present Main Street Bridge, in which the Cunningham & Burdwood Construction Company was discharged as contractors, and the Blakeslee Rollins Company completed the work. Evidence in the case lasted a week. Written arguments were submitted. Judge Oakes, the Presiding Justice in the matter, died before rendering his decision.

Edward H. Wason was awarded a verdict of \$6000 in his \$40,000 suit against the City for land damages in connection with the widening of Main Street in 1926. Trial of this case lasted a week. This is the second time Congressman Wason was awarded damages in connection with his suit to recover for land taken; the first time at a Superior Court session two years ago he was awarded damages of \$7,500 and the City filed for a review of the case by the Supreme Court.

The J. R. Worcester Company, engineers for the Main Street Bridge, sued the City for \$7,000 additional services rendered in the construction of the Bridge. Judge Morris of the N. H. Federal Court directed a verdict for the City in the case and his decision was upheld by the Circuit Court of Appeals.

Suit for \$184,000 was brought by the City against the Maryland Casualty Company, the bonding company for Cunningham & Burdwood, original contractors of the Main Street Bridge, for additional expense incurred by the City when the bridge work was delayed. The writ was returnable at the 1931 September Term of Superior Court, the very last session of Hillsborough County Court in which it could be filed under the six year Statute of Limitations in this State.

A decision in the action brought in 1930 by the City against Emile E. Marquis to enjoin him from using his premises for purposes allegedly contrary to the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance was handed down. He was not allowed the use of his premises as a garage and for the purpose of auto wrecking, two of the complaints brought by the City.

Several times a Court of Inquiry was called by the Fire Department and much time spent investigating the causes of several fires in the City, all occurring within a few days of each other. At first it was believed that the fires were the work of a lone incendiary or pyromaniac. However, official investigators could not trace the origin of these fires as being connected, as the various fires had individual characteristics that eliminated any possibility of their having been set by one person. Some of the fires investigated were the City Station, Slawsby Block, Central Block and Nashua Theatre. The hearings were private and several witnesses were questioned. Most of the fires were satisfactorily explained.

Much time was devoted to the "Itinerant Vendors" situation which developed noticeably within the past few months. Steps were taken to protect local merchants from future encroachments of that type and to rid the city of itinerant vendors who are operating illegally.

Numerous ordinances and resolutions were drawn, one most outstanding being an amendment to the Ordinance Relating to Fire Proof Roof Covering of Roofs in the City. After much discussion, the opposition being that it was too drastic, a committee was appointed to study the amendment and to redraft it. After the special committee studied this amendment for over a month, and after it was redrafted several times, it was finally passed.

Another ordinance of widespread favor drawn up and passed this year was the Ordinance Relating to the observance of the Lord's Day.

A resolution was passed authorizing the Mayor to execute an agreement between the City and The Boston & Maine Railroad in reference to land on Main and Canal streets for the purpose of public parking of automobiles, the premises being the site of the old City Station, which was partially destroyed by fire.

Other suits of minor importance were disposed of without recourse to the Court; the usual letters for the City Departments were written; many bankruptcy proof of claims were filed for the Tax Department; contracts and other legal documents were drawn when needed; cases were investigated; and advice and opinions, both written and oral, were rendered the City Departments and City Officials on innumerable problems.

To the Board of Education, Nashua, New Hampshire.

This is the sixty-fifth in the series of annual reports by superintendents,

The number for this school year is 22 more than it was a year before in the corresponding month. There are fewer pupils in the elementary schools, but the high school shows an increase of 91. It was found possible to close Suburban No. 7, discontinue Ash St. School, and to consolidate two grades at Palm St. and Mulberry St. It is safe to assume that the school population of our elementary schools will remain substantially the same unless a revival of prosperity in our industries should cause an influx of new residents. The reverse is true in our high school. It is to be expected that there will be a continuation of gradual growth, in all probability not as marked as in the past ten years. Present business conditions have a tendency to send more boys and girls back into high school, who find the competition for work too keen, and who realize more than ever before the need of education.

The high school has operated upon the two session basis. From the standpoint of administration and scholastic results little adverse argument can be raised. However, the plan causes curtailment in study periods and is decidedly inconvenient to the home.

The dual kindergarten plan, which has been on trial for several years, is operating satisfactorily, efficiently, and economically. The enrollment at Amherst St. Kindergarten has been small. It would seem

advisable in September to close this school as such a small number hardly justifies the rental of this building and the additional maintenance costs.

At times the criticism comes that the School Department might make a materially large reduction in its appropriation. Such a statement does not take cognizance of how the money is expended. Eighty-five per cent of our budget last year was spent for salaries of all employees. \$55,561.97 was left for all other expenses. Certainly it is false economy to allow the school buildings to deteriorate or deny pupils the necessary books and supplies. Most of the remaining expenses are fixed charges. To eliminate Manual Training and Domestic Arts would seriously deny educational opportunities to a certain group of pupils with little saving in that an equal number of teachers would have to be engaged for instruction in some other subjects.

It is evident that the only means of a large saving is a reduction of salaries. This is hardly advisable for a number of reasons. For years during periods of prosperity the teacher worked for a meagre wage while other occupations reaped according to the times. Again, the present salary schedule can be maintained without requesting an increased appropriation. When we look about at neighboring communities and observe the financial difficulties of their school departments we must admit that our affairs were basically sound in order to have made such accomplishments in these times. A recent U. S. Survey cites Nashua as one of the outstanding communities to maintain salary levels without appropriation increases or financial difficulties.

New Rules:

During the year 1931 the Board of Education completed the revision of their Rules and Regulations. This was the first revision since 1921. These rules embody the most modern theory concerning school organization and administration. The rules became effective July 1, 1931, with the exception of the organization. The organization of January 1, 1932, has now put these rules into full force.

Instruction:

There has been a constant improvement in instruction accomplished by revision of curricula, introduction of basal texts, principals' meetings, grade meetings, and demonstration classes. Arithmetic, reading, geography, spelling, and writing have received particular attention. More detailed information can be secured from the various quoted sections which follow.

HIGH SCHOOL

During the year three tests were given by the State Department of Education—an intelligence test, a geography test, and an English test. The results compared with the other state schools showed that, while this school was below the state median in general native intelligence, it equalled the state median in place geography and was above the state in the English test.

The Tressler English tests have been given three times, twice during 1930-1931 and at the beginning of the present school year, with this result: in each class the standing in May was about what it should have been in October, but the gain during the year was 9.5 points against an expected gain of 7.3.

The Terman Mental Ability test has been given to the entering class for the last three years showing each class about six points below the normal median.

The employment situation worked something of a hardship on many members of last year's graduating class. Twenty-six returned to school this fall for special work, probably because they were unable to secure positions. Others of the graduates are scattered among the following institutions: Keene 9, Plymouth 1, University of New Hampshire 15, Dartmouth 2, Boston University 4, Amherst 1. The class numbered 343 new pupils at entrance and 203 or 59 per cent were graduated. Nineteen per cent dropped after the first year, 18 per cent after the second year, and 7 per cent after the third year.

To date our enrollment for 1931-32 is 1244 divided as follows: 804 morning, and 440 afternoon pupils, 596 boys, and 648 girls. This is an increase of 91 more than a year ago. The increase is 34 in the com-

mercial curriculum, 29 in the general, 10 in the college, 20 post graduates, and a loss of two in the practical arts.

This increase has been absorbed by increasing the size of the classes and in some cases adding an extra class to the teachers' program.

2. Program of Studies. The only change that has been made in the program deals with the time allotment given to the work in Practical Arts. Each pupil now receives instruction four periods each week, double periods twice a week, in Home Economics and Manual Arts, instead of the three periods given to the work heretofore. Results: teachers in Practical Arts work report that pupils are able to accomplish much more

classroom work along with the practical application of the work given in the laboratory periods. It has also been casier to hold pupils to a definite standard of accomplishment where the teachers have the opportunity of meeting the class twice a week instead of once a week. Finally, the double period, instead of the three consecutive periods devoted to the work in the past years, seems to be more efficient and eliminates some waste of time that formerly occurred.

- 3. Curriculum. With the introduction of the second book of the Strayer-Upton Junior Mathematics series, the school is now equipped to follow efficiently the program in general mathematics usually outlined for grades seven and eight of a Junior High School.
- 4. The teachers of Mathematics, History, and English have been at work by committees since the opening of school in September in developing outlines of work for the above named subjects. Excellent progress has been made in this work due to the splendid way in which the teachers have co-operated and given their support to this undertaking. The results that are already apparent are as follows:
 - 1. More definite standards of achievement in the several subjects mentioned have been established.
 - 2. The minimum essentials in the various subjects are standardized and there is unity of purpose and accomplishment in the various class divisions.
 - 3. More efficient and effective teaching.
- 5. Miscellaneous. The following median scores taken from the individual tests of the Stanford Achievement Test given to the pupils of grade 6 in 1931 indicate that the members of the present 7th grade, who entered from the public schools, entered well prepared to take up the advance work of this grade.

Due to the fact that we have many pupils who enter the school from private or parochial schools, many of whom have a decided language handicap, we need the services of a capable teacher who can handle the work usually carried on in the so-called opportunity classes. At the present time, these pupils do not meet with success in the work of the Junior High School, and they are not the type of pupils who should be turned over to our present type of special grade; neither should they be demoted to the sixth grade, because they are, in most cases, already above the age level of that grade. These pupils are increasingly becoming a problem in the school.

EVENING SCHOOL

The Evening School is organized, as in the past years, in two units:

L. Americanization and Citizenship Classes, 2. Commercial subjects.

All classes are held on the third floor of the Senior High School building.

The registration in the commercial department showed a considerable increase over former years. It was necessary to hire one additional teacher for part-time work in order to care for this increased enrollment. The enrollment in the Americanization department remains practically the same as last year, and it seems reasonable to assume that there will be no appreciable change in the registration of this department in the immediate future; in other words, two teachers will probably be able to handle this work from now on.

HOME ECONOMICS

After careful study of the Home Economics' Curriculum, it was decided in June that the work could be covered more effectively by dropping the sixth grade course and giving intensive study four periods a week in the Junior High School. A tentative course of study was made during the summer which has so far proven to be very satisfactory to both instructors and pupils.

In the two years' work, we hope that each girl will show a growth and an improvement in her ability:

- To select food in relation to her individual needs and those of the family.
- To plan, prepare and serve wholesome meals within the family income.

- 3. To develop acceptable standards of skill in all work of the home.
- 4. To dress suitably and becomingly, taking into consideration the family budget.
- 5. To plan and make the clothing which can be economically constructed in the home.
- 6. To select ready made garments best suited to her individual needs.
- 7. To have a well groomed appearance.

The clothing problem is rapidly changing from that of making garments in the home to one of selecting an increasing number of garments of the ready made type. To be able to judge materials and workmanship, and to know the line, design, and the color most becoming to the individual is of increasing importance in being well dressed, therefore the High School course of study in clothing has been changed to give emphasis to the selection of ready made garments.

We do not wish to minimize or omit skill, but perhaps the greatest values to be acquired from making a garment are an appreciation of good workmanship and some knowledge of line and design in relation to the human figure. Our new course of study is being tested by the clothing instructors, and will be revised by them in June.

MANUAL ARTS

Last June the sixth grade work was discontinued. With the added time in the Junior High School, I believe that it will offset any educational advantages lost through discontinuing this course. It is an economical move, and reduces the cost of maintaining this department.

This year a course in house framing was added to the curriculum. This course is offered the first half of Junior year. From present indications, I think it was a wise move, supplementing our architectural drawing. It will make our drawing course a much stronger one, and give the boys an opportunity to acquaint themselves with one phase of carpentry. Another year it would be better to give this course the last half of the year; any outside work would then be done in the warm weather.

DRAWING

An Art III course was offered to pupils in High School this year.

The Art classes have co-operated with various departments in the High School in designing and painting posters used for advertising purposes and in making cuts for the *Tattler*.

The work in the grades has been carried on very much the same as last year with changes in projects to make the work interesting to the teachers and pupils,

MUSIC

Junior High School

Classes in singing with attendant theory of music have been carried on in classroom groups in both seventh and eighth years.

Pupils are pursuing a definite course of study in singing and elements of the theory of music, with practice in three part singing, special attention being given to the adolescent voice and good voice production.

Solo voices and small groups of singers are given opportunity to express themselves before the school at the weekly assemblies. Also there is singing by the entire school.

The orchestra is a great factor in the life of the school. The programmed rehearsal of the orchestra is taken by Miss Kelley.

High School

The vocal work at the High School as in the Junior High is confined to one period a week. In this period a large group (elective) studies four-part singing. Worthy choral literature is sung, the pupils benefiting from mass chorus practice in mixed voice parts, and from the cultural beauty of the music.

The music studied is chosen from a repertoire of music used by other leading High Schools in the country compiled after pedagogical discussion at Supervisors' meetings and conferences.

The classes give opportunity for tone-lending, proper vocal production in consideration of group training, and interpretation of music in regard to the character of the music to be performed.

Careful watch is made to discover outstanding natural voices, and when such are found we bring the fact to the pupils' attention for private study outside. The average voice is very acceptable when joined in large chorus groups and blanded by intelligent instruction, but solo voices are a physical matter, an anatomical condition of the organs which constitute the vocal apparatus. They that possess superior voices are endowed by nature, the gift of God.

A few of the outstanding voices from the High School in the last few years are: Lorraine Morin, Esther Stone, Ned Spaulding, Herman Weymouth, Alice Weymouth. These voices were discovered in school and the opportunity given them while there to take solo and leading parts in cantatas and operettas.

At this writing, plans are being made to present a concert of vocal music by the High school chorus early in the spring.

The choral division of any school must not be judged by the number of solo voices produced, but more by the general benefit derived by the participation of the individual in mass chorus practice and its ensemble technique. Because of the demand for the assistance of instrumental music at many and various occasions, the band and orchestra have been the vehicle of expression from the music department, and have been brought within the focus of the public eye. This might lead one to believe that we are underemphasizing vocal music.

We specialize vocal music annually in the "A A" operetta. Solo voices and chorus work are a prominent feature. The experience in the weekly chorus training is directly responsible for their ability to prepare this type of presentation.

Choral groups go annually to the Hunt Homes and sing carols and other songs in part for the entertainment of the folk there. The senior class specializes with a mixed voice selection at the graduation exercises.

One fact remains—the freshman chorus has not had a music class for over a season. The administration is fully conversant with this situation and undoubtedly will solve the problem as soon as conditions will allow them.

Because of the fact that the music department was alive and up-todate and that the administration was wholly in sympathy with the project, we were honored by having the New Hampshire State School Music Festival held here last May. The vocal and instrumental demonstration given by the various school boys and girls from all over the state was of great and lasting influence.

Grades

The music in the grades has progressed along the lines outlined in previous reports. The books in use are the Music Education Series published by Ginn and Company. The Lindler pitch pipe, a new chromatic instrument, was introduced this year and has proved most satisfactory.

The orchestra this year is unusually small, being composed of only seven members, but it promises to equal the work of other orchestras numbering more members.

A harmonica band of twenty-five members has just started weekly relicarsals, and the result is most gratifying.

HEALTH

There were one hundred fifty-six (156) pupils vaccinated by the physician in schools at the first of the school year.

The pupils were weighed and measured. Free milk which was donated, was given to the poor and undernourished children.

Diphtheria toxin-antitoxin was given to six hundred forty-eight (648) pupils. Of these, six hundred forty-four (644) took the Schick test. Of this number, six hundred two (602) were found to have a negative reaction.

The School Dental Clinic is held in the Senior High School building. Dr. E. T. White and Dr. D. J. Hagerty do the work, assisted by the nurse. It has been the aim of the Clinic to care for all deserving pupils whose teeth need attention in all the grades up to the Junior High School. This year we fell far short of our aim. About one hundred more pupils needed attention. Two mornings each week are given to dental work. On an average five pupils are cared for at each clinic.

There have been 21 eye clinics, the work being done by two optometrists, Dr. Martin and Dr. Hagerty. 854 pupils were examined and 340 found to have defective vision.

As in previous years, Dr. Robert E. Kerr, executive secretary of the New Hampshire Tuherculosis Association, has given us some time to examine underweight children. This year it seemed best to spend this time in High School. Four clinics were held and 92 pupils were examined. 25 of these were found to have symptoms of tuberculosis. Of these 25, two of them had active tuberculosis and were removed from school and placed in a sanatorium. Two were quiescent cases, four glandular cases. The remaining 17 will remain under Dr. Kerr's observation until all symptoms have disappeared.

Classroom inspections for parasitic and contagious diseases have been made once each month.

One cannot adequately appreciate the organization and processes of a modern school system unless he understands the fact that education is adjustment to life as a whole and not simply a regiment of mental training. Physical and emotional adjustments are as important as mental adjustments. The recognition of this fact explains the scope and comprehensiveness of the modern school curriculum. It is useless to scoff at the modern school curriculum as too general, too complicated, or too extensive. If education is adjustment to life, it must be an adjustment to life as we find it today, not as it prevailed a century ago. The economics of a hundred years ago, while serving well the purpose of that age, would be wholly inadequate to solve the financial and business problems of today. The philosophy of a hundred years ago, although much of it is still useful, is not suited to meet the social needs of the present generation. Likewise the education of a hundred years ago, although it embraced elements that are still usable, is by no means sufficient to adjust the children of this generation to the complex and many-sided life in which they find themselves. We cannot help the youth of today successfully to meet the problems of their generation by looking longingly into a past, glorified by distance, and hallowed by a few precious memories, but thrown out of perspective by the accumulation of years of unremembered experiences. We must face the future,

strive to understand the youth of this generation, endeavor to comprehend modern life as a whole, and arrange our educational processes, as effectively as we can, to adjust the youth of today to the life of today. This is what the more intelligent educators are striving to do. But mistakes are being made, and will continue to be made, because it is much easier to look backwards, than to understand the present and to anticipate the future. Our responsibility is clear, and the success of our educational efforts will depend upon the intelligence and sincerity with which we accept that responsibility.

Report of the Board of Health

April 1, 1932

To His Honor the Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN:

The Board of Health transmits the report of the Health Department for the year 1931.

On May 1, 1931, Miss Clara L. Morin, R. N., was appointed to work in the Parochial Schools for the prevention of communicable and contagious diseases.

During the year further immunization against diphtheria was conducted in the Public and Parochial Schools and among children of a preschool age.

Physical examinations of all employees of the Milk Plants of our city was carried out and it is hoped that this procedure will soon initiate a movement for physical examinations of every employee engaged in manufacture, distribution and handling the food.

Rabies made its appearance, in our city, during July and August a provisonal quarantine of dogs was instituted. Several dogs' heads were sent for examination, some being positive. Anti-rabitic Clinic was instituted and treatment given to 4 children, 1 man, who were bitten by rabid dogs. As a result no cases of human rabies was reported.

Vaccination Clinics were established in children of pre-school age. 138 children being vaccinated. In August clinics were held in parochial schools, 650 children were vaccinated before opening of school year.

The Tuberculosis and Venereal Disease Clinics are both doing a good work in conjunction with the local Board of Health.

Under separate head we present the report of the different departments for the year.

We wish to thank the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen, the heads of our different Departments and the Medical Inspectors of the Public Schools for their co-operation.

During the year I attended to the various duties of Health Inspector, and in the summer months spent considerable time investigating children that had been bitten by dogs said to have been affected with rabies and recommended that five children be given treatment which was done by your Board. Seven dogs' heads were sent to the Laboratory at Hanover and 3 of the dogs were found to have been affected with Rabies. Under your direction a suitable place on the Dunstable Road was maintained for a few weeks quaranting stray dogs.

Special attention was given to the inspecting of food stores, and found that with the use of Cellophane much better care had been given by the merchants in protecting food, such as cookies, cakes and doughnuts. The stores are in a very good condition at the present time.

In 1931 the Board of Health adopted a set of requirements, which must be fulfilled by a farmer producing milk before he can ship to this market. This was necessary to obtain uniformity of conditions under which milk can be produced for sale in this market.

The most important requirement was milk rooms for all producers.

The milk room to contain cooling tank and can rack and used for straining and storage of milk. About half of our producers had milk rooms and this year 45 new ones have been built and most of them with insulated cooling tanks, many with electric refrigeration. This has made a decided improvement in quality.

Consderable time was spent in taking temperatures of milk as received by the milk plants and 1188 quarts of milk rejected on temperature alone while probably as much more was rejected by the milk dealers who insisted on having their milk properly cooled by the farmer. Five farmers were shut out of the market.

This year many of the dealers took bacteria tests on their farmers' milk in cooperation with the Board of Health. This saved time for the milk inspector who supervised the tests and had access to the records. Thus it was easy to find who the producers of poor quality milk were and more time could be spent correcting the trouble.

The Committee on the Grading of Nursing Schools believes that every school of nursing should have at least one regular instructor who is not expected to carry administrative responsibility for the hospital nursing service, but is able to concentrate her full attention upon the education of the students. Where the work of the teacher is well done, it often involves following the students into the wards and supervising the way they apply what they have learned to the practical problems they meet. Such teaching supervisors, however, should be teachers, not administrators. They should not be expected to carry heavy supervisory responsibility for the nursing service. Their primary concern should be the welfare of the students. Responsibility for the patients should rest on other shoulders.

With this in view, we now have two instructors. Thanks to the Executive Committee for conceding to our request. One teaches the principals and practice of nursing, and the other the sciences.

Our aim is to raise the rating of our Training School, and to make a diploma from the Nashua Memorial Hospital Training School indicate a standard of efficiency second to none.

Nashua Hospital Association Report of Executive Committee

In the way of something regarding conditions in the Hospital January first, I could very nearly repeat the report given you of 1930, charging, of course, some of the details. In my report of that year I made the statement that we had cared for more patients than in any previous year, and the year 1931 surpasses that of 1930 as regards house patients. A slight decrease in the number of out-patients. I also made the statement last year that there exists a feeling that those who come here for care and treatment during illness receive the best that can be rendered by an institution of this character. I have seen no reason during the past year to change that statement. On the contrary, judging from the increase of those admitted and from what I have been told by many who have been here, it would seem that I can lay greater emphasis upon that statement.

We have had a most prosperous year in every way. So far as I have been able to observe, the best of feeling and a sense of co-operation has prevailed among those working in the hospital, including the student body.

A great deal of necessary work has been done to keep the hospital equipment up to date. A radical construction change has been made in the front of our building, partly the result of a necessity because of leakage between the roof of the old piazza and the main building, tending to destroy the walls of the latter. It being necessary to remove this portion of the building, it was thought best to do away with the first floor of the old piazza which darkened the offices and was of doubtful utility, making use of the space for the enlargement and lightening of our administrative offices, which had never been satisfactory, and the enlargement of the waiting room. We still have our sun veranda above. This change has been most satisfactory in every way, not alone because of better facilities, but has resulted in a very much improved appearance of the front and entrance to the hospital.

The usual amount of painting has been required, both in the hospital and in the nurses's home. Our record room has been transferred from the basement to what was formerly one of the rooms which had been deprived of its window as the result of reconstruction of the front of the building. The room for special nurses has been transferred from Room 25 to the basement, part of which was renovated, and with lavatory and furniture installed makes a very much larger and satisfactory room. It also returns to us Room 25 for use of patients. Three of our utility

rooms have had sterilizers installed for various utensils. New sinks and gas plates in diet kitchens. It was found necessary to install a new Autoclave in our operating room, the old one having served its purpose for fifteen years and now out of repair. Most of our furniture has been reupholstered and painted where needed. Four or five beds have been installed, in that which was formerly the superintendent's suite, with electric bell attachments, thereby increasing the capacity of the hospital.

The foregoing is sufficient to give an idea of what has been done during the past year. A hospital somewhat resembles a home in this respect, every year brings its new problems entailing expense. What the new year will require we do not know, but without doubt other problems will present themselves.

I feel that we should be very grateful for the fact that in spite of the hard times and the fact that we have had to care for more charity patients and part charity, meaning those who pay a portion of their bills but not all, we have been self-supporting during the past year. From my knowledge of hospitals this is very rarely the case. It seems to me that some way must be devised in the near future whereby we will be able to decrease our indebtedness. The interest on this debt at 6 per cent very nearly neutralizes the money received from our endowment fund, and is a burden which should not be allowed to continue. It is my belief that well within another decade a new wing will have to be built to the west, for I believe that the demand for beds in the Nashua Memorial Hospital is bound to increase yearly, and it is only a question of time when that demand will have to be met. Before anything of that sort can be done our present indebtedness must be liquidated. Just how, I do not know, but I wish to call it to your attention that everyone may be giving it some thought and possibly a way discovered for its accomplishment.

This is the first year that we have had two practically full time teachers in the training school. I understand that there are but one or two hospitals in the state that have this service. We are also about to send one of our recent graduate nurses to the Massachusetts General Hospital to take a course in X-ray work that she may be of assistance in that department. We are still recognized by the American College of Surgeons as an A-1 hospital.

On behalf of the Executive Committee, I wish to thank the Superintendent, various supervisors, and all employees of the Hospital for their willingness at all times to render service. I also think that the Treasurer, Mr. Charles E. Johnson; the Clerk, Mr. Clarence Whitney; and the Auditors, Mr. Herbert E. Kendall and Mr. Edwin S. Gage, merit a vote of thanks for the work they have done.

There was also a bond issue of \$100,000.00 for Public Improvements. Out of this, land damages were paid to the abutters of Spruce, Bowers and Allds Streets, for land taken by the City, in the widening of these streets. The balance of the money left was used by our department, in doing this work.

Bowers Street, between Allds Street, and Harbor Avenue, widened fifteen feet on the North side, with new sidewalks, curb and gutters, and the whole of the street resurfaced with hot asphalt.

ALLDS STREET

Plans were made and land acquired for the widening of Allds Street twenty feet, from McKean to Salmon Brook. A retaining wall was built along the land owned by G. Tibbets, and a fill started on the Shea land. This was done out of the Public Improvements fund.

SIXTH and SEVENTH STREETS, and one-half mile on the EAST DUNSTABLE ROAD, were completed from last year, and treated with tar.

FOURTH and FIFTH STREETS were graded, gravelled, and also treated with tar.

EAST DUNSTABLE ROAD, off Main Street, was regraded, treated with tar, and curb and new sidewalks built.

Report of the Superintendent of Parks

To the Board of Park Commissioners:

Gentlemen:-

The most outstanding accomplishment of this department during the year 1931 was the development of a new park and the planting of shade trees in the fire area. A plot of 2.24 acres of land on the southwest corner of Bowers and Marshall Streets was purchased by the city for park purposes. This lot was fenced on the south and west sides with a substantial chain link fence six feet in height. The land was then graded to conform to sidewalk and fence grades, but the center of the plot was left in its natural rolling contour because of the large expense which would have been involved in grading the entire tract. The land was then plowed, harrowed, smoothed and seeded to grass. A winding walk across the park was laid out, trees and shrubs planted, a drinking fountain installed and two small shelters with tables beneath were erected.

Credit should be given to the Texas Company for the donation of shrubs and loam from the Gen. C. W. Stevens lot, which aided materially in the development of this park, also for a large weeping beech tree which was planted at Greeley Park in a sightly location on the west side of Concord street.

It would seem that our new park should be designated by an appropriate name.

Maple trees were planted on Bowers St., Spruce St., New St., Marshall St., Allds St., Williams St., McKean St., Newbury St., Haines St., and Burke St. About 400 trees were planted and about 100 more should be planted in the Spring to complete the planting. Some of these trees were planted in the grass plot between the sidewalk and the curb, while others were set on the land of the abutters, six or ten feet from the sidewalk line, which is the only proper place to set them, as trees set in the grass plot will eventually become starved and stunted because of lack of sufficient nourishment.

The section of Artillery Pond which was graded and covered with loam last year, was smoothed up, fertilized and seeded to grass and clover, an excellent stand being obtained.

At Greeley Park the drives on the east side of Concord Street were staked out as indicated on our park plan. The loam was then removed and placed in a storage pile to be used for repairing and topdressing our lawns. This excavation started from Concord Street opposite both our existing drives, meeting on the flat below, thence extending nearly to the B. & M. Railroad.

Through the kindness of the Carlo Bianchi Company a large amount of broken asphalt and concrete from the State Highway job was dumped into this excavation, to be used as foundation material. This will be covered with cinders to make a finished surface to the drives.

The wooded section between the railroad tracks and the Merrimack River has been cleaned up by removing underbrush and scrub trees, so that it now presents a much more attractive appearance.

In the small pond near the Manchester Street entrance, water lilies, Egyptian lotus and other aquatic plants have been planted. 'This will eventually become an attractive and interesting water garden.

During the winter months the browntail and gypsy moths were removed as usual, many of our trees were trimmed and all our equipment overhauled, repaired and painted where necessary.

In the Spring our trees were sprayed, our flower beds and lawns put into good condition and given their usual care during the Summer and Fall.

In the Fall we enlarged our nursery, resetting the trees and shrubs and arranging them in a more systematic and attractive manner. We were able to furnish a large amount of the shrubbery used at the Marshall Street park from this nursery. This would have meant considerable expense if purchased at a commercial nursery.

As our lawn areas increase we feel more acutely the need of a lawn mower sharpener and hope at some future time to be able to install such a machine.

I believe this covers the more important of our activities for the year 1931.

Report of the Recreation Commission

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen:

The usual activities of skating, playgrounds, swimming and tennis have been promoted by your Commission for the year 1931.

Skating was unusually popular, both rinks being well attended, especially the one at the South Common with considerable call for better facilities for hockey.

The Swimming Pool, under the efficient management of Superintendent William J. O'Neil, made something of a come-back from last year in both amount received and number of users. The water was kept at a reasonable level most of the season, rendering the pool more agreeable to the larger bathers.

The water sports at the pool as a final feature of the playground season was enjoyed by a large number of participants and onlookers.

The usual six playgrounds were open eight weeks under the care of Superintendent Ray Pendleton. They were well attended and much interest was shown by both parents and children.

The six tennis courts were used nearly as soon as the snow was off in the Spring, and a few users persisted until kept off by the snow in the Fall. The economy and usefulness of the tarvia courts have proved very satisfactory. They have stood the frost without heaving or any perceptible displacement and the painted lines are much more economical than any method of lining clay courts. The first cost is less, the upkeep is only a fraction of the cost of the upkeep of clay courts and days of usefulness in this locality are at least three times as many as clay courts can be used.

A financial statement is hereto appended.

Report of the Public Library

To the Trustees of the Nashua Public Library: Nashua, N. H.

The annual report of the Public Library for the year ending December 31, 1931, is herewith submitted.

All over the country increased demands on public libraries are being made. Lack of employment means more time for profitable study as well as recreational reading. In so far as our budget has allowed the Nashua Library has been able to meet these demands in a large measure during the year.

Statistics show increase in books circulated, but no record is kept of actual help given patrons and students over the desk and by telephone which constitutes a large amount of the library's usefulness.

The total home circulation of 191,800 in all departments is an increase of 11,980 over 1930 or 6 per cent. Adding the 5,706 books and magazines given out for use in the Reading Room makes a grand total of 198,506 which shows that the library is being used as never before. The adu't department in the main library circulated 120,722 volumes—fiction 92,841, and non-fiction 27,881, a gain of 8,705. The children's department, 53,289—fiction 34,221, and non-fiction 19,068, a gain of 1,690. Crown Hill, 17,789—fiction 13,680, and non-fiction 4,109, a gain of 2,285. Nearly 27 per cent of the entire circulation was non-fiction, a gain of 2,637 over 1930 with 6 books circulated per capita.

The foreign circulation of 5,592 is a gain of 1,120 which is a good showing considering the small number of additions during the year.

The average daily circulation in all departments was 633, a gain of 40. The largest month in the main library, adult circulation, was 11,811, a gain of 678, and the largest day 858, a gain of 182. In the children's room the largest day was 473 and at Crown Hill, 150.

This year as last, periodicals stand first in number circulated in the main library, adult department with a total of 5,650—history and travel second, 4,265—literature 3,846—biography 3,268—useful arts 2,396—fine arts 2,676—sociology 1,514—philosophy 1,263—religion 579—language 298—pictures 233.

2,221 books were added, 2,085 purchased, 101 by gift and 35 by binding periodicals. 541 were discarded making a total gain to the library of

1,680, or approximately 47,090 volumes on the shelves December 31, 1931. Fines of \$1,145.92 exceeds the amount of 1930 by many dollars.

The total number of registrations during the year was 1,811. Of these 1,487 were new borrowers. Total number of active borrowers, 9,707. 3,470 overdue cards were sent out and 2,626 reserves taken in the adult department, alone.

Miss Manning, children's librarian, has instructed 210 junior high school pupils in the use of the library, and has held regular story hours. Eleven visits were made to the graded schools where the pupils were told about the library and interesting books and how they could become borrowers.

The Summer Travel Club which was organized in the Children's room and at Crown Hill to encourage the reading of books on travel was a great success. Each child was obliged to read at least ten books about seven different countries which entitled him to a certificate. Thirty-five children earned certificates, many of them reading more than the number required. Thirty was the largest number read by any one child. Parties were given the winners and refreshments served on two succeeding Saturday evenings at the library.

The World Friendship theme was carried out all over the country during Book Week, and an interesting exhibit of children's travel books was held in the Staff Room. Flags of many countries, colored posters and handmade Egyptian panels helped make the display attractive. A collection of beautifully illustrated travel books and new adult titles were shown in the Trustees' Room during the entire week.

The Crown Hill library with a circulation of 17,789 has more than made up for the loss sustained from the fire in 1930. The crowded condition of the room required additional shelving which was added in December. At the present time every inch of available space is being used.

Twenty-four exhibitions of various kinds have been held at the main library. A great deal of time is required to handle the many details, but it is work that pays well in education values, particularly when the library is the only place in the city where one can see interesting exhibits in the fields of art and history. In the bright and prosperous days of the future it is hoped that the Soucy property on Clinton Street, purchased by the city for library extension may be outfitted with a historical room where exhibits can be held and valuable treasures stored.

The local exhibit in June of old and rare views of Nashua was enjoyed by hundreds of people. The latter part of the year 64 mounted 5x7 prints of oldtime Nashua were purchased from Mr. Frank M. Ingalls of New York, a former resident and photographer, which have been added to our valuable collection of historical pictures.

The mutilation of books, magazines and newspapers has not abated and missing books are on the increase.

An interesting program was carried out at the State Library Meeting held at Hanover, September 9-11 with your librarian as president, and Miss Manning, secretary of the Association. One of the interesting and, I hope, valuable things accomplished at this meeting was the adoption of a resolution regarding the mutilation of books, magazines and newspapers, a copy of which was sent to the Commissioner of Education, who promised to co-operate. It read as follows:

Whereas the librarians of New Hampshire are seriously concerned about the mutilation of books, magazines and newspapers by students in their zeal to produce illustrated notebooks, current events clippings and posters which will please their teachers; therefore be it

Resolved, That the New Hampshire Library Association respectfully urges the Commissioner of Education to help abolish these practices by bringing this matter to the attention of the teachers of the state, by requesting them to impress their pupils with a regard for public property and by ruling that they accept no illustrations which originate in books magazines or newspapers.

Rachel Sanborn, an assistant since 1929, took a summer library course at Columbia University in July and August. Christine Rockwood, assistant librarian and cataloger, spent her vacation in England and Scoland. Elizabeth Spring, a former assistant, returned to the library the first of November, otherwise the personnel of the staff remains the same.

Beginning the 20th of December the Trustees voted to open the library Sunday evenings from 5 to 9 as a relief measure, adding a few hours of warmth and cheer for those who might welcome this opportunity.

The Telegraph Publishing Co. has been generous in giving publicity during the year, the Police Department has helped in recovering books and keeping order and kind citizens have contributed many books, magazines and newspapers. Grateful acknowledgment and thanks are extended to them all, and to each and every person who has helped in any way to make the library more efficient, attractive and useful.

Too much praise cannot be given the members of the staff for their co-operation and faithfulness which has contributed largely toward a successful year. Sincere thanks and appreciation are extended to the Board of Trustees for their helpful guidance and support.

ADOPTING RULES AND FIXING THE TIME FOR HOLDING REGULAR MEETINGS

AUTHORIZING THE FINANCE COMMITTEE TO BORROW MONEY IN ANTICIPATION OF TAXES

CITY OF NASHUA

In the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-One

RESOLVED, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua:

That the Finance Committee be and they hereby are authorized and directed to borrow, from time to time during the current municipal year, beginning January 1, 1931, a sum or sums not exceeding One Million (\$1,000,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of meeting the current expenses of the City, and the Mayor and Treasurer are hereby authorized to execute and issue a negotiable note or notes of the City of Nashua therefor.

Every such note shall become due and payable within one (1) year from the date of the loan for which it is issued is incurred, but no such note shall be payable on demand, or shall be valid unless authenticated by the certificate of the First National Bank of Boston.

All debts incurred under authority of this vote shall be paid from the taxes of said current municipal year.

AN ORDINANCE

REGULATING THE USE OF VEHICLES IN STREETS

BE 1T ORDAINED, by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua:

DEFINITIONS

1. Vehicles. The word "vehicle" used herein shall include horses bitched to vehicles, horses ridden or led, motor vehicles of all kinds, bicycles, tricycles propelled by hand or foot, and everything on wheels or runners except street cars and light carriages for the conveyance of children.

Motor Vehicles. The word "motor vehicles" shall include motorcycles, automobiles and all other vehicles used upon highways, propelled by power other than muscular power, except railroad and railway cars and motor vehicles running only upon rails or tracks.

MOTOR TRUCKS. The word "motor truck" used herein shall include any motor vehicle of greater than one ton capacity intended, designed, or constructed for the transportation of freight or merchandise, or any motor vehicle equipped with other than pneumatic tires.

Horse. The word "horse" shall include all domestic animals.

OPERATOR. The word "operator" shall include any person who operates a motor vehicle.

SAFETY ZONE. The word "safety zone" shall include any part of the highway established and marked by the Police Department as such, from travel of which vehicles may be restricted or excluded.

PARKING

2. PARKING LIMITATIONS.

(a) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding two hours on the following days and hours:

Wednesdays and Saturdays from 12:00 M. to 10:00 P. M.

IN THE FOLLOWING PLACES: On the South side of Temple Street from Main Street to a point one hundred fifty (150) feet East of Main Street.

On the West side of Main Street between West Hollis and Amherst Street, and on the East side of Main Street between East Hollis and Canal Streets, it being understood that the Main Street Bridge shall be exempt from the provisions of this section.

On East Pearl Street to a point one hundred eighty feet from Main Street.

On West Pearl Street to South School Street.

On High Street to Washington Street.

On Factory Street to Harrison Street.

(b) No parking whatsoever shall be permitted on the following streets:

North side of Pearson Avenue.

East side of Mechanic Street.

East side of Front Street.

(c)) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the North side of Franklin Street, between Main Street and the intersection of Front Street and between Locust Street and Charles Street.

No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the North side of Franklin Street between the intersection of Front Street and Locust Street for a period exceeding one hour.

No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the North side of Lake Street between Pine and Vine Streets for a period exceeding one hour.

The foregoing regulations in this section shall be in effect week days only from 6:00 A. M. to 7:00 P. M.

(d) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the North side of Temple Street between South Street and Scripture Street.

No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain on the South side of Temple Street between South Street and Scripture Street for a period exceeding one hour.

The foregoing regulations in this section shall be in effect week days only from 6:00 A. M. to 7:00 P. M.

- (e) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on the East side of Charles Street.
- (f) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on either side of Green Street.
- (g) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on Locust Street.
- (h) No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed and remain for a period exceeding one hour on the North side of Winter Street. Parking on the South side of Winter Street is prohibited.
- 3. Left Side of Vehicles to Curb, Prohibited. No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall without necessity stop with its left side to the curb in the following streets, viz.:

Main Street north of Lake Street;

Temple Street between Main and Court Streets;

West Pearl Street;

Factory Street.

4. Vehicle Parked at 45 Angle. In the following streets, or parts thereof, every motor or horse-drawn vehicle remaining in any one place therein shall be parked at an angle of about forty-five (45) degrees, with the right front wheel to the curb, viz.:

West side of Main Street between the Speare Block and Hollis Street;

The West side of Main Street between a point at the Southerly end of the Main Street Bridge and continuing Northerly to a driveway between the Whiting Block and the H. C. Lintott property at the Northerly line of said Whiting Block;

On the north side of Deschenes Park;

On the north side of Nashua and Lowell Station.

5. DISTANCE OF VEHICLE FROM CURB. In all streets or parts of streets hereinbefore named, excepting those mentioned in Section 4, any motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle remaining in any one place therein shall be stationed within twelve (12) inches of the curb and parallel thereto.

(a) COMMERCIAL VEHICLES.

Commercial vehicles, while actually taking on or discharging merchandise, or any vehicle while taking on or leaving passengers, may stand for a reasonable period, not exceeding five minutes, at a reasonable distance from the curb and parallel thereto, when such vehicle cannot find a nearby parking position, on any street in Nashua, except that portion of Main Street between the present City Hall site and the Southerly entrance of the Main Street Bridge.

- 6. Private Driveway. At no time shall any motor vehicle be stationed in front of any private driveway.
- 7. SAFETY ZONES. No vehicle shall enter or remain in any part of the highway that shall be established and designated as a "safety zone" by the Police Department.
- 8. HYDRANTS. No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall be stationed, without its driver, within a distance of less than five (5) feet of any hydrant upon any street in the City of Nashua.

OPERATION

- 9. Traffic Lights. On intersection of streets where traffic lights have been installed, vehicular traffic shall proceed on the green. Pedestrian traffic shall proceed on the yellow and continue on the green. All traffic shall cease on the red.
- 10. Crossing Street. Motor vehicles and horse-drawn vehicles crossing from one side of the street to the other in any street or part thereof hereinbefore named shall, except in case of necessity, do so by turning to the left so as to head in the same direction as the traffic on that side of the street.
- 11. Interference with Traffic: Street Corners. No motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall in any streets or parts thereof hereinbefore named, without necessity, so occupy the same or unreasonably to interfere with or interrupt the passage of other vehicles thereon and shall not stop within ten (10) feet of any street corner.

12. SIREN WHISTLE. No person shall use upon any vehicle within the city limits any signalling device known as a "siren whistle or siren horn," but this prohibition shall not apply to fire and police department vehicles.

ONE-WAY STREETS

- 13. PARK STREET. Park Street is made a one-way street from Main to Court Street. All vehicles operating along said one-way street shall travel in an easterly direction.
- 14. RAILROAD SQUARE. Railroad Square between the railroad station building and land premises on the South side of said square and the public oval, so-called, shall be a one-way street, and no person shall drive or operate a vehicle within the area herein designated as a one-way street, except when going in an easterly direction.
- 15. Eldridge Street. Eldridge Street is designated a one-way street and all parking therein is prohibited. All vehicles operating along Eldridge Street shall enter from Spring Street and travel in a westerly direction.
- 16. South Street. South Street is designated as a one-way street and all parking therein shall be on the East side of the street, and for a period of not exceeding one hour. All vehicles operating along South Street shall enter from Worcester Street and travel in a Northerly direction.
- 17. Scripture Street. Scripture Street is designated as a one-way street and all parking therein shall be on the West side of the street, and for a period not exceeding one hour. All vehicles operating along Scripture Street shall enter from Temple Street and travel in a Southerly direction.
- 18. Beech Street. Beech Street is designated as a one-way street and all parking therein is prohibited. All vehicles operating along Beech Street shall enter from West Hollis Street and travel in a Southerly direction.
- 19. Garden Street. Garden Street is designated as a one-way street and all parking therein shall be on the West side of the street. All vehicles operating on Garden Street shall enter from West Pearl Street and travel in a Southerly direction.

PENALTY

20. ——. Any person convicted of a violation of any of the foregoing provisions shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00) for each offense.

MOTOR TRUCKS

- 21. —, Where Excluded. All motor trucks shall be excluded from Dearborn Street from its intersection of Prospect Street to its intersection of Tyler Street. Any person convicted of a violation of this section shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00) or imprisonment not exceeding thirty (30) days.
- 22. Through Ways. The following streets are hereby designated as Through Ways, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 119 of the Session Laws of 1929:

Concord Street from the northerly intersection of Beasom Street South to the intersection of Main Street.

Main Street at the intersection of Concord Street South to the Southerly intersection of Russell Avenue.

Hollis Street from its intersection at Badger Street East to its intersection with Bridge Street.

Pearl Street at its intersection at Pine Street East to its intersection with Temple Street.

Kinsley Street from Main Street to its Westerly intersection of Sawyer Street.

Manchester Street from Concord Street to its Northerly intersection of Abbott Street.

Amherst Street from Main Street to its intersection with Broad Street.

- 23. Operation of Vehicles. Every vehicle immediately before entering or crossing Through Ways, at its point of intersection with another way, shall first come to a full stop, except where otherwise directed by a police or traffic officer, or by a lawful traffic regulation sign, device, signal or light, and no motor vehicle or horse-drawn vehicle shall park within a distance of twenty-five (25) feet of a lawful traffic regulation Stop Sign.
- 24. Penalty. Any person who shall fail to stop before entering a Through Way, where a stop signal, sign, device, or light has been installed, in pursuance of Chapter 119 of the Session Laws of 1929, shall be fined not exceeding one hundred (100) dollars for each offense.
- 25. Ordinances Repealed. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO PURCHASE A CERTAIN PARCEL OF LAND WITH BUILDINGS THEREON FROM SOUCY'S GARAGE INCORPORATED

RESOLVED, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua;

That His Honor Mayor Sullivan be, and he hereby is authorized and instructed to purchase from Soucy's Garage Incorporated for and in behalf of the City of Nashua, a certain parcel of land with buildings thereon situated at the intersection of Clinton and Lowell Streets in said Nashua and Bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a stone bound at the Northwest corner of the premises, at the junction of Clinton and Lowell Streets, thence running Southerly by the East side of Clinton Street about 90.00 feet to a stone bound at a point about12.00 feet Northerly of the Northwest corner of land deeded to B. Burke by the Nashua Manufacturing Co. by deed dated 4th January, 1931, said being the Northwest corner of land now owned by the Tavern Hotel, so called; thence Easterly on a line parallel with the Northerly line of said Burke land 86.00 feet, more or less, at land formerly of P. Clark and others, more recently of S. Whittemore, and formerly owned by McKean, and now owned by said Tavern Hotel; thence Northerly by land owned formerly by the Laton heirs, now owned by Hill Hardware and Paint Company, along a line in the center of a twelve inch brick division wall (erected by said Laton heirs; said division wall) 62.00 feet more or less to said Lowell Street: thence Westerly by said Lowell Street about 86.00 feet to the place of beginning.

Being the same premises conveyed to me by deed dated 2nd January, 1924, and recorded in Hillsborough Registry V. 825, P. 483.

Subject to a mortgage of \$15,000.00 in favor of the Nashua Trust Company, of said Nashua, which said grantor assumes and agrees to pay.

The purchase price of said described property to be \$12,000.00, which amount to be included in the annual budget for 1931.

AN ORDINANCE

AMENDING AN ORDINANCE PASSED MAY 14, 1929 AND APPROVED MAY 15, 1929, ENTITLED, "RELATING TO PLUMBING AND DRAINAGE REGULATIONS"

BE IT ORDAINED, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua:

That the Ordinance passed May 14, 1929, and approved May 15, 1929, entitled, "Relating to Plumbing and Drainage Regulations," be amended as follows:

Amend Section 1 of said Ordinance by adding at the end thereof the following paragraph. Every plumber, twenty-four hours before doing any work in a building, except the repairing of leaks and the opening of obstructed or frozen pipes, shall file at the office of the City Engineer upon blanks for that purpose, a description of the work to be performed, and no such work shall be commenced in any building without the approval of the Plumbing Inspector. This requirement shall apply alike to new work and to all modifications, replacement and extension of work.

So that Section 1, when amended, shall read as follows:

Section 1. Every person who shall carry on the business or do any work of plumbing in the City of Nashua shall register his name and place of business in the office of the Board for the Examination of Plumbers and a notice of any change in the place of business of a registered plumber shall be immediately given to the said Board. This section shall not apply to employees while working for a registered plumber.

Every plumber, twenty-four hours before doing any work in a building, except the repairing of leaks and the opening of obstructed or frozen pipes, shall file at the office of the City Engineer upon blanks for that purpose, a description of the work to be performed, and no such work shall be commenced in any building without the approval of the Plumbing Inspector. This requirement shall apply alike to new work, and to all modifications, replacement and extension of work.

Amend Section 2 of said Ordinance by adding at the end thereof the following paragraph. The contractor or plumber having charge of the construction or reconstruction of any portion of the drainage system of any building shall, when the work is completed or sufficiently advanced for inspection, notify the Inspector of Plumbing who shall proceed at once to pass upon the work, and all inspections shall be made promptly and not later than twenty-four hours after such notification.

So that Section 2, when amended, shall read as follows:

Section 2. The plumbing of every building shall be separately and independently connected with the public sewer where such sewer is within one hundred feet of said building, unless permission is given by the Board to connect in some other way. When there is no such public sewer the plumbing shall be connected with a septic tank or dry well of a construction and capacity approved by said Board. The contractor or plumber having charge of the construction or reconstruction of any portion of the drainage system of any building shall, when the work is completed or sufficiently advanced for inspection, notify the Inspector of Plumbing who shall proceed at once to pass upon the work, and all inspections shall be made promptly and not later than twenty-four hours after such notification.

Amend Section 3 by striking out the words, five feet, as appearing in line seven, and substitute the words, two feet, instead thereof, also striking out the words, fifteen feet, as appearing in line eight, and substitute the words, ten feet, instead thereof, so that Section 3 when amended shall read as follows:

Section 3. The main drain of any building from a point ten feet outside the interior face of the foundation wall to a point inside the cellar shall be of cast iron of a sufficient size, not less than four inches in diameter, and of a weight not less than hereinafter specified. Said main drain shall be carried open up through the roof to a sufficient height, not less than two feet above said roof, and not less than two feet above the top of any window within ten feet. Should a water closet be connected with said main drain, the latter shall not be less than four inches throughout its entire length. If no water closet be connected, the main drain may be reduced inside the cellar wall to not less than two inches in diameter, provided however, that said main drain is again increased to four inches in diameter before passing through the roof.

Amend Section 7 of said Ordinance by adding at the end thereof the following sentence: All rain water leaders or gutter drains shall be trapped.

So that Section 7, when amended, shall read as follows:

Section 7. Rain water leaders shall never be used as soil, waste, or vent pipes, but shall be carried to a point ten feet outside the inside surface of the fundation wall before being connected with the main drain, and the main drain shall be enlarged at the point where the rain water leader enters it. All rain water leaders or gutter drains shall be trapped.

Amend Section 10 of said Ordinance by inserting after line four, the following sentence. Within specified limits, agreeable to the Board, a single round trap may serve for both tub and lavatory. So that Section 10, when amended, shall read as follows:

Section 10. The waste pipe of each and every sink, basin, watercloset, and of each set of trays or other fixtures except bathtubs, shall be furnished with a separate trap which shall be placed above the floor of the room in which the fixture stands. Within specified limits, agreeable to the Board, a single round trap may serve for both tub and lavatory. The waste pipe of each and all bath tubs shall be furnished with a round trap or some other trap equally acceptable to the said Board which shall be placed as near the fixture it serves as is practicable.

Amend Section 11 of said Ordinance by striking out the entire section and add a new Section 11, when amended, shall read as follows:

Section 11. Traps must be protected from syponage by the use of deep seal and non-sypon traps. Except as specified in Section 10, each fixture shall be provided with a separate entrance into the stack. When the delivery pipe from a trap is over ten feet from the main drain or stack, then a separate stack, not less than two inches in diameter, must be provided, and same may be connected into the main drain or stack, not less than three feet above the highest fixture, or it may be carried direct through the roof, provided it is increased to four inches before passing through the roof. Stacks shall be run as direct as possible and changes in direction shall be made with forty-five degree ells or eighth bends.

Amend Section 14 of said Ordinance by striking out the words, when practicable, as shown in the first line of the second paragraph; also by striking out the words, or overcast, as shown in the last line of the second paragraph, also by adding to the end of the second paragraph, a new paragraph as follows: In cases where the union ferrule is used, the lead shall not be flanged; cup joints on brass or plated wastes from sinks, bath tubs and lavatories may be used. So that Section 14, when amended, shall read as follows:

Section 14. Joints in cast iron pipes shall be packed with oakum, run with moulten lead, thoroughly calked and made tight.

Joints in lead pipes shall be of wiped solder. Connections of lead to iron pipes shall be made with brass ferrules calked to the iron and connected to the lead by wiped solder, or with some equivalent device satisfactory to the Board. All connections of brass to lead shall be of wiped solder.

In cases where the union ferrule is used, the lead shall not be flanged; cup joints on brass or plated wastes from sinks, bath tubs and lavatories may be used.

Joints in earthen pipe shall be made water tight by means of the best hydraulic mortar, with which the joints shall be thoroughly filled and care must be taken that all mortar which comes through into the inside of the pipe is wiped out.

Amend Section 18 of the Ordinance by striking out the entire section and add new Section 18, which, when amended, will read as follows:

Section 18. The following sizes of traps are required for the various fixtures:

Water Closets	21/2	inch
Slop Sinks	3	inch
Pedestal Urinals	3	inch
Trough Urinals	2	inch
Wall Urinals	2	inch
Laundry Trays in Basement 4:	c 8	inch
Laundry Trays elsewhere	11/2	inch
Bath Tubs 4:	c 8	inch
Combination Sink and Tray	11/2	inch
Kitchen Sink	11/4	inch
Drinking Fountain	11/4	inch
Wash Basins	11/4	inch
Shower Bath	2	inch

Amend the said Ordinance by adding new Section 19, which, when amended, will read as follows:

Section 19. The City Engineer shall serve as Plumbing Inspector, and he or one of his assistants shall inspect all installations.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING TAXICABS

BE IT ORDAINED, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua:

- 1. Every motor vehicle that uses the streets of the City for the purpose of carrying passengers for hire, except buses or trolley cars operated by the Nashua Street Railway, shall be deemed a taxicab and must be licensed under this Ordinance.
- 2. The Licensing Board as established and consisting of Mayor, Chief of Police and City Clerk may from time to time at its discretion, grant licenses upon such terms and to such persons as it may deem expedient, which license may be revoked at any time for any violation of the provisions of this Ordinance; and a record of such licenses shall be kept by the City Clerk. Applications for such licenses shall be made on forms provided by the City Clerk; all information required by such forms shall be completely furnished by the licensee; such licenses shall be numbered in order as granted. The fee for each such license shall be Two Dollars (\$2) for each vehicle licensed.
- 3. Every taxicab licensed as aforesaid shall be conspicuously marked as a public taxicab and the name of the owner, and the rates of fare duly established, shall be conspicuously posted on a printed card in every such taxicab. This section shall not apply to vehicles used at funerals, weddings or public parades.
- 4. No license shall be sold, transferred or assigned without the consent of the aforesaid Licensing Board. No license granted as aforesail shall apply to any taxicab owner or driver, except the particular one designated therein by its number or otherwise made certain.
- 5. It shall be unlawful to operate a taxicab for hire or permit the same to be operated, nor shall any license be issued hereunder, until and unless the applicant for license deposits with the City Clerk a policy or certificate of liability insurance for each taxicab for which a license is sought, said policy or certificate of liability insurance to be acceptable and approved by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen and issued by a company authorized to do business in the State of New Hampshire, indemnifying the applicant in the sum of at least five thousand dellars (\$5,000) for injury to one person or twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for injury to more than one person, and one thousand dollars (\$1,000)

property damage in any one accident, through the operation of the taxicab of the applicant; or deposits in lieu thereof the bond of a surety company authorized to do business in the State of New Hampshire, running to the City of Nashua and indemnifying persons who may be injured, or whose property may be damaged by the operation of such taxicab in the same amount and conditioned that action may be brought thereon by any person so damaged against said surety company for the amount of such damage up to the amount named therein, such bond to be approved by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen. The policy of insurance or bond so deposited shall contain a clause obligating the company issuing the same to give ten (10) days' written notice before cancellation thereof to said City Clerk, the license for the operation of such taxicab expires upon the lapse or termination of said policy or bond.

- 6. Application for license to drive taxicabs shall be made on forms provided by the City Clerk; all information required by such forms shall be furnished completely by the applicant. The fee for such license shall be Two Dollars (\$2), and a record for such applications for licenses shall be kept by the City Clerk.
- 7. No license shall be granted to any person unless he is eighteen (18) years of age or older, can read, write and speak the English language intelligently, nor unless he shall present a valid license as a chauffeur issued to him by the Registrar of Motor vehicles.
- 8. The City Clerk when issuing a license under Section Six shall deliver to the licensee a metal badge bearing the words "Licensed Chauffeur No .--, Nashua, New Hampshire," setting forth the serial number of license, which badge shall be worn conspicuously upon the front of the hat or cap or the exterior of the clothing of the licensee at all times when he is operating a taxicab; and said City Clerk shall also then deliver to the licensee an identification card setting forth the number and terms of the license, the name of the licensee, and a personal description of the licensee, including his age, height, weight, complexion, color of hair and color of eyes. No such licensee shall at any time permit or suffer any other person to wear such badge, nor shall any person at any time wear such badge issued to another. The licensee shall at all times when driving or in charge of a taxicab carry said card and the license under which said taxicab is operated or a copy of said license, and shall show the same whenever so requested by a member of said Board, by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, or by any police officer.
- 9. No taxicab shall be allowed to stand or to wait for passengers in any street, square, or public place, except on such portions thereof and during such hours as may be designated therefor by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen, who in their discretion, may from time to time designate locations, streets, squares and such public places where, and

the hours during which, such vehicles may so stand, and said Board of Mayor and Aldermen may cancel or change such locations or hours as and whenever the public interest seems to it to require such change.

- 10. No taxicab shall be stopped to take on or to discharge passengers at any place or on any street, square or public place except at the curb or as near thereto as possible; nor shall any passenger be permitted to enter or leave the vehicle except from the side nearest the curb; nor shall any person be permitted to sit or ride upon any fender, dash, step, running board, top or door of any such vehicles.
- 11. The flat rates of fare for transportation from a point to any other point, both within the City of Nashua, shall be not more than

For one passenger fifty (50) cents, and thirty (30) cents for each additional passenger.

The metered rates for transportation from a point to any other point, both within the City of Nashua, shall be not more than

For one passenger for the first quarter (¼) mile fifteen (15) cents; for each succeeding quarter (¼) mile five (5) cents; with a charge of fifteen (15) cents for each additional passenger.

- 12. The rates must be posted in printed form in large type in a conspicuous place in each taxicab within the view of the passengers.
- 13. The suspension or revocation of any chauffeur's license by the Registrar of Motor Vehicles shall automatically suspend his license to operate taxicabs issued by the City of Nashua. Such suspended or revoked license may be restored in the same manner and following the same form used in the issuance of a new license. Such restoration may not be made until the Registrar of Motor Vehicles has restored the license issued by his office.
- 14. The violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed twenty (\$20) dollars or by the revocation of license, or both.
- 15. This Ordinance shall take effect May 1, 1931. In Board of Aldermen.

That Chapter 24, Section 3, of the Revised Ordinances be am nded by adding the following:

No license shall be issued under this Section 3 unless and until the applicant therefor shall deposit with the City Clerk a policy or certificate of public liability insurance, acceptable to and approved by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, and issued by a Company authorized to do business in the State of New Hampshire, indemnifying the applicant for injuries to or damages suffered by any person or persons through operation of said theatre or place of amusement, in the sum of at least five thousand (5,000) dollars for injury to one person and two hundred thousand (200,000) dollars for injuries to more than one person in any one accident. In lieu thereof said applicant shall deposit with the City Clerk a bond acceptable to and approved by said Mayor and Board of Aldermen, issued by a surety company authorized to do business in the State of New Hampshire, running to the City of Nashua, in the sum of at least two hundred thousand (200,000) dollars, indemnifying any person or persons for injuries to or damages suffered by them through the operation of said theatre or place of amusement,, and conditioned that action may be brought thereon by any person so damaged up to the amount named therein. The policy of insurance or bond so deposited shall contain a clause obligating the company issuing the same to give ten (10) days' notice before cancellation thereof to the City Clerk, and termination thereof shall operate as a revocation of the license issued hereunder. This amendment shall apply to all licenses now or hereafter issued under this Section 3 and shall take effect upon its passage.

Said Chapter 24, Section 3, as amended shall read as follows:

3. ——, THEATRES, ETC. Theatres or places of amusement of a permanent character may be licensed for a period of twelve months from the first day of May of each year. The sum of such yearly license

shall be one hundred (100) dollars, payable in advance. This license shall designate the location of said theatre or place of amusement, be made in the name of the proprietor or proprietors thereof, and shall not be transferable. No license shall be issued under this Section 3 unless and until the applicant thereof shall deposit with the City Clerk a policy or certificate of pubic liability insurance, acceptable to and approved by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, and issued by a company authorized to do business in the State of New Hampshire, indemnifying the applicant for injuries to or damages suffered by any person or persons through operation of said theatre or place of amusement, in the sum of at least five thousand (5,000) dollars for injury to one person and two hunded thousand (200,000) dollars for injuries to more than one person in any one accident. In lieu thereof said applicant shall deposit with the City Clerk a bond acceptable to and approved by said Mayor and Board of Aldermen, issued by a surety company authorized to do business in the State of New Hampshire, running to the City of Nashua, in the sum of at least two hundred thousand (200,000) dollars, indemnifying any person or persons for injuries to or damages suffered by them through the operation of said theatre or place of amusement, and conditioned that action may be brought thereon by any person so damaged up to the amount named therein. The policy of insurance or bond so deposited shall contain a clause obligating the company issuing the same to give ten (10) days' notice before cancellation thereof to the City Clerk, and termination thereof shall operate as a revoca in of the license issued hercunder. This amendment shall apply to all licenses now or hereafter issued under this Section 3 and shall take effect upon its passage.
