TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newbury, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Newbury on Tuesday, the ninth of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects: The Articles of the Warrant to be taken at Ten o'clock in the forenoon, with the exception of balloting.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for painting the Office Building inside and out.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred fifty dollars (\$450.00) for painting the Memorial Hall.
6. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising and appropriating the sum of for the purpose of Class V Roads.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One hundred twenty-five dollars (\$125.00) for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with the other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the New London Hospital.

9. To see what action the town wishes to take in regards to disposing of property acquired by tax deed, the vote to hold until rescinded.

10. To see if the town will vote to reroof the Town Hall raise and appropriate money for same.

11. To see what action the town will take in prohibiting the use of the Town Wharf, Newbury and Esplanade for commercial purposes, to hold until rescinded.

12. To see what action the town will take in closing the Cross Road from Route 103 to the South Road subject to gates and bars.

13 (a) To lay a permanent surface on Lake Avenue, Washington Street, Pine and Orchard Streets, Sunlight Lane, Post Office Street and the Beach Road running from Lake Avenue to the entrance of the home of Mr. Jacques Coleman.

13 (b) To widen said roads where the same are not of uniform width with the remaining portions, especially in front of the property of Joseph Gowan known as the "Ten Eyck" on the easterly side of Washington Street.

13 (c) To widen the road which leads from Route 103A to the lake at the bend about where the "15 mile" traffic sign stands on the northerly side almost opposite the entrance to

the caretaker's home of the Bowles Estate, and on the hill in front of the home of Donald Preble.

That these improvements be made over a period of years.

14. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to purchasing two additional new portable pumps and equipment for same and raise and appropriate money for same.

15. To see what action the town wishes to take to reorganize the Newbury Fire Department in accordance with existing state law Chapter 175 of Revised Laws of New Hampshire, year 1942.

16. To see what action the town wishes to take in regards to installing a dry hydrant at the Esplanade in Newbury.

17. To see what action the town wishes to take in regards to purchasing a 2000 gallon or 1500 gallon tank truck, and raise and appropriate money for same.

18. To see what action the town wishes to take in regards to accepting the One Hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the perpetual care of the George Gillingham and Elma Lovering cemetery lots.

19. To see what action the town wishes to take in regards to accepting One hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the perpetual care of the Loren Ayer cemetery lot.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four hundred dollars (\$400.00) for the control of Pine Blister Rust.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

June 25, 1947. Checked boat-house at Edgemont shore and found no toilets or disposal facilities. Also that none could be installed because of location over water and against railroad bank. Recommended that boat-house not be rented to summer people and owner agreed. Reported this to state board and they agreed it was the best solution. Found on a later visit that water was running into the lake from a kitchen drain at this boat-house. Recommended that this be stopped and the people agreed to stop it.

July 5, 1947. Made a survey of conditions at Blodgett's Landing with representative of the state board of health and the local selectmen. We found conditions very good with one exception. The state board made recommendations to the owner in this case but he made no changes. Later he had his cesspool pumped and this seemed to relieve the situation at least temporarily. No further action was taken.

July 15-20, 1947. Investigated several complaints from people in the vicinity of the Edgemont dump. I found garbage dumped around in various places and of course it smelled but otherwise the dump did not need attention. I reported this to the selectmen and they had it cleaned up. People dumping garbage at this location should bear in mind that houses and summer cottages are close by and should cover all garbage that they dump there. The only other solution is to close this dump but the residents in the area do not seem willing to take this action.

July 28, 1947. Received complaint of an overflowing cesspool at Blodgett's Landing and investigated. Found the trouble was caused by a clogged grease trap on a sink drain, contacted owner and recommended that it be cleaned, checked later and found the situation corrected.

August 16, 1947. Received a complaint from a cottage owner at Edgemont that a neighboring cesspool was overflowing and running on the surface. Investigated and found report to be true. As I was unable to contact the owner of the offending cottage I reported the conditions to the state board of health. I recommended that the owner be forced to install a septic tank with proper drainage facilities. I never received any response to my letter and I don't know if any action was taken or not. I will check this cottage again next summer.

The Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region has been putting in a lot of hard work on a lot of projects and would do more if their funds would permit, among them at the improvement of the Wadleigh State Park in Sutton, the Kearsarge State Reservation, improving the mountain road from Warner, the Winslow State Park in Wilmot, the Pillsbury State Area in Washington and Goshen which could be developed so it could equal if not surpass the Bear Brook Reservation with trails connecting the Pillsbury reservation with the Sunapee Mountain project, this has been signed by the Governor and Council and should be started this year, also the Public Bathing beach at Lake Sunapee.

They are working on a membership drive to obtain more funds. Any one interested in being a sustaining member may send \$1.00 or more, corporations and organizations by sending \$5.00 or more a year to Mr. Albert S. Carlson, Executive Secretary, Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, Box 181, Lebanon, New Hampshire.

The Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association and the Tramway Committee worked very hard to make a success of the Tramway project to be presented to the Governor and Council making it a success.

This is the school report for the year 1946-1947 but any remarks that I have to make will have to be for the period from July 1, 1947 to the time which this report was written.

Hot lunches were started in the schools after the Christmas vacation. Even in this short period of time it is possible to say that excellent meals are being served and the children are doing full justice to them. Special credit is due the Hot Lunch Committee for their work in getting the program organized; Mrs. "Jim" and Mrs. LaPorte for being willing to prepare the meals and an extra gold star for doing such a grand job of preparing the meals.

There are two other problems which the people of Newbury should consider very seriously. One is providing transportation for high school pupils and the other is the co-operative school district. Many states pay for the cost of high school transportation and already in this state many towns accept this as their responsibility and more are taking over the cost of this service every year. It seems reasonable to assume that if a community is liable for the high school education of a child it should also be liable for getting the child to that school.

Many groups of towns are considering the possibility of setting up a Co-operative High School District whereby they will have a consolidated high school instead of several small schools. A consolidated school means a better staffed, more economic unit. The value to Newbury would be that the people of Newbury would have something to say about what kind of an education their high school children are going to have. That is determined by the school board of the town in which the present high school happens to be. In a cooperative school Newbury would have a representative or representatives on the Co-operative Board.

It has been a pleasure working with the parents, teachers and school board of Newbury. I have also enjoyed working with the young people although the games at the Center School are less strenuous for an elderly gentleman than those at the South School.
