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THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plymouth in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Music Hall in said Plymouth on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing and delegates to the National Conventions.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to appoint one or more highway agents.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the support and maintenance of the Free Public Library.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance and construction of highways.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for oiling the streets.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote

to raise or appropriate for state aid maintenance.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for trunk line maintenance.

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- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for state aid construction.
- 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for Plymouth cemeteries.
- 12. To choose one Library Trustee for a term of three years.
- 13. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term. of three years.
- 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for defraying the expenses of a District Nurse.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money to pay the debts of the town and give notes therefor, countersigned by the town treasurer.
- 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate for the aid of the Emily Balch and Soldiers Memorial Hospital.
- 17. To see if the town will fund its indebtedness by issuing bonds.
- 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate to reimburse the Union Grange Fair Association in being obliged to drive a well and lay pipes to procure water to be used at its Fair Grounds, the water previously used being condemned by the State Board of Health on account of the same being contaminated by the town using the locality upon which its former supply has been obtained for a town dump.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to give a discount on the early payment of taxes for the year 1932.

20. To see if the Town of Plymouth will vote to ratify the action taken at a Special Town Meeting held on the 8th day of September 1931. The action taken at said special meeting being as follows:

ARTICLE 1

Resolved: That the following committee consisting of Fred C. Tobey, George R. Foster, John Gadd and Fred C. Rowe—to act in conjunction with the Board of Selectmen—be appointed and they are hereby authorized and instructed to make such surveys and measurements as in their judgment may be necessary and advisable for the purpose of procuring sufficient knowledge and information as in their judgment they may need for the purpose of contracting the building of cement sidewalks on Main Street wherever sidewalks are now in existence and at any other places, which in their judgment may be deemed wise and necessary from the top of the hill at South Main Street near the Daniel Webster Garage so-called, extending Northerly on either or both sides of the Daniel Webster Highway as the sidewalks are now in existence to the new bridge beyond the upper Five Points Crossing, so-called. And, that the building of such sidewalks shall be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder who can satisfy the committee that they are competent and capable of doing a first class job and that said committee may in their judgment require any bidder to whom this contract is awarded to furnish such a Bond as in their judgment may be for the best interest of the town.

It shall be the duty of said committee to reject any or all bids which in their opinion is for the best interest of the Town that they should be rejected because of their bids being too high or otherwise.

The Resolution adopted.

ARTICLE II

RESOLVED—That it is the sense of the Voters of the Town of Plymouth that a cement road twenty feet wide, similar to that now being laid on the Daniel Webster Highway, should be laid in that part of Main Street West of the Common, connecting with said Daniel Webster Highway at the north and south ends of said Common: and also that the shoulders of the road on said Main Street both sides of the Common from a point opposite the South end of the Plymouth Inn, so-called, to a point opposite the North End of the Draper-Maynard Brick Factory Building, should be constructed of Cement, so that, within said limits, the entire road, from sidewalk curb to sidewalk curb on each side shall be of cement; and the Selectmen are hereby instructed to see that the provisions of this resolution are carried out in connection with the present cement construction being carried on on said Daniel Webster Highway.

An amendment to Article 2 was made by R. J. McLean, but was not carried.

The Resolution adopted.

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- 21. To see what action the town will take regarding the discontinuance of a portion of Webster street, as a public highway.
- 22. To see if the town will approve by-laws adopted by the Selectmen relative to the observance of the Lord's Day as provided by Chapter 155, as amended by the Legislative Session of 1931.
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Given under our hands and seal, this 20th day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and thirty-two.



MEDICAL EXAMINER'S REPORT

February 15, 1932.

To the School Board of the Town of Plymouth:

Here is my tenth report as the Medical Examiner of Plymouth. I have examined and reported this year 689 scholars, 53 more than last year.

In the rural schools I have examined 120, finding 20 defects. Of the defects reported last year, 17 have been corrected, found 6 unvaccinated.

I have examined 284 in the Training School finding 74 defects. Twenty-four defects from last year have been corrected, 14 unvaccinated of which 10 have been excused by the Board of Health.

In the High School I examined 285, finding a large number of defects, 182 which was a bad showing. Bad teeth were the cause of defects of 53, errors in vision 39, and skin diseases 29. This report shows the scholars that have reached the High School age are more careless or indifferent about their physical condition than younger ones. I presume it is because of their mother. She used to watch them. Twenty-six reported last year have been attended to.

On the whole, I think considerable progress has been made. We have been assisted by the Representatives of the State Board of Health, who looked over our reports from last year and did considerable followup work.

There were at the time of my examination 16 attending school who were unvaccinated without any excuse.

Again I want to thank the Superintendent and teachers, especially Mrs. Brown of the Training School, for their pains taking assistance in my work.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Members of the School Board of Plymouth Town School District:

I submit my eleventh annual report of superintendent as schools.

Statistics

For purposes of comparison figures for the two school years ending respectively June 30, 1930 and June 30, 1931 are presented in the following table.

Clearly there was little significant change during the two years. Our school population as judged by numbers is remaining fairly stationary.

The next table compares the total enrollments for February 15, 1931 with those of February 15, 1932:

The increase in the Rural Schools is due to the doubled enrollment at the Turnpike caused by the moving of three families into this neighborhood.

High School registration has jumped to the surprising total of 299 with an actual membership of 288 on February 15, 1932. Note the growth over the past years. Membership 1930-239; 1931-263; three 1932-288. Have we yet reached the reak? Last June there were forty graduates from the eighth grades of Plymouth. Next June we expect about sixty. Our high school enrollment is likely to be even larger next September. Two conclusions emerge from the facts. We may feel pride in the distinction of having a high school far larger than one would infer from the size of our town. Our high school is attracting and holding the youth of our own and our neighboring communities. The report of Headmaster Moors will set before you the details of the life and administration of this excellent institution.

Teaching Staff

No changes of teaching personnel are to be noted in the rural schools. In the Model Schools, Miss Marion Seavey was granted leave of absence from her position as principal of the Model School and first grade teacher. Miss Seavey is finishing her college work at Boston University this year. We confidently expect her to return to our staff next September. Her place as principal is being taken by Mrs. Anna Brown, Junior High critic teacher. Miss Evelyn Werme was transferred to the first grade, and Miss Dorothy Davis took over the second grade as critic teacher. Miss Helen Kelleher, the fifth grade critic teacher, resigned her position to take a place as elementary supervisor in Ludlow, Mass. Miss Nelliemae Connor of Nashua was chosen to fill this vacancy. Miss Connor graduated from Plymouth Normal School last June with the degree B.Ed. In Normal School she had an outstanding record in both scholarship and leadership. She has proved very satisfactory. One of our own girls, Miss Dorothy Tobey of Plymouth High School and the Bouve School, supervised physical education until her resignation at the end of the first semester to take a position in Arizona. Miss Velma Keenan of Berlin, N. H., succeeded her. Miss Keenan is a graduate of Posse Nissen. New Normal School instructors acting as subject teachers or supervisors in the Model School are: Miss Ruth McGregor, music; Miss Mildred Doherty, Domestic Arts and Waldo Perkins, Manual Training.

At the beginning of the year there was no change in the high school staff. The increased enrollment with the consequent addition to the administrative and teaching load convinced the superintendent of the necessity of an additional teacher in Plymouth High School. Miss Ruth Frye of Plymouth was fortunately available. Miss Frye is a graduate of Plymouth High School and Wellesley College. She has a record of two years of successful teaching in North Carolina, and has substituted a considerable aggregate length of time in our high school. She was, therefore, chosen by the School Board for this assignment.

Work of the Schools

This has proceeded with fairly satisfactory progress. Thirty graduated from the Junior High School last June of whom twenty-eight are now in high school.

Eight of the ten rural school graduates are attending high. The May Festival, under the direction of Miss Evelyn Werme was held the afternoon of May 22, 1931. A beautiful and impressive program was presented at the D. & M. Park by representatives of the high, rural, and model schools. We look forward to an occasion of similar import this year.

Health Supervision

In his modest report of his valuable activities Dr. Chase mentions the special work accomplished last year. We are especially indebted to Miss Elizabeth Murphy, State Health Supervisor, for her efforts and her interest. In several cases physicians and specialists gave their services, and the Plymouth Community Chest made much remedial work possible. Mrs. Ralph Lovett was employed as special nurse. She cooperated finely wth Dr. Chase, made some eighty-seven visits to the homes where she found a noticeable spirit of cooperation, and succeeded in accomplishing a great deal for the permanent improvement of the health of our children. In view of what she was able to do in the short time of eleven school days, it seems evident that the employment of a nurse to regularly take charge of the follow-up of the cases of the school physician's inspection would be most desirable. We recommend that provision be made for such regular nursing service.

Rural Repairs

The repairs made and the chemical toilets installed at Livermore and Ward Hill have been a source of great satisfaction this school year. Similar improvements should be made in the other rural buildings as soon as circumstances permit.

In Conclusion

Doubtless every effort should be made to keep expenses at the lowest possible level this coming year. Nevertheless sufficient means should be provided to keep good teachers and maintain our schools efficiently. Again we urge the necessity of studying the housing situation with a view to enlarging the quarters for the Model Schools in the not too distant future.

I wish again to express my grateful appreciation to School Board, Teachers, and school patrons for their wonderfully fine and friendly cooperation.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit, herewith, my third annual report as the Headmaster of the Plymouth High School.

Class of 1931

Out of a graduating class of 30, 13 continued their education in higher institutions and 3 are doing postgraduate work in secondary schools. Of these the distribution is as follows:

The three now in secondary schools plan to enter colleges next September.

Attendance

The attendance record last year was 96.25%, which appears very good, considering the distances and bad roads over which many of our pupils are obliged to travel. The record for tardiness, however, was not as good. This year, the attendance record will fall below last year's, due to epidemics which have been more prevalent.

May I urge the parents to cooperate with the school in the matter of keeping unnecessary absences as few as possible that the efficiency of the pupils may not suffer. Continual making up of back work is a hindrance and a discouragement to pupil and teacher alike. Tardiness due to late arrival of trains must naturally be excused, but there seems little reason for pupils living in town being late in reaching school. Parents are asked to cooperate with school authorities in seeing that pupils start for school on time.

Athletics

Football, basketball, and baseball for the boys, and basketball for the girls under skillful supervision have been a part of the school program during the past year. It has been the policy of the coach to give as many pupils as possible a chance to participate in these activities, and larger squads than usual have availed themselves of this opportunity. Mr. Dawson has been greatly aided by the kindness of many friends of the school who have given their time and the use of their cars for transportation.

The boys and girls are made to feel that there are other things besides physical development and victory to be gained in these contests, namely: good sportsmanship in success as well as in failure; cooperation; the giving of one's best efforts at all times; and the development of a good mental attitude and "teamwork" with colleagues as well as fair play and courtesy toward opponents.

Other Extra-Curricular Activities

The Girls' Club, under the supervision of Mrs. Keniston, has done much the past year for the welfare of the school. The members have assumed many responsibilities for making our building attractive and have acted as hostesses to visitors. The awarding of School Cups each year, is made possible through the efforts of the members of this club.

The Ho-Eco Club has sponsored many instructive meetings during the year. The members prepared and distributed clothing at Christmas time.

The English Club has presented several short plays at assemblies. These plays were written and coached by members of the club. Miss Suitor has had supervision of this work.

The Annual Prize Speaking Contest was resumed last spring, and an unusual number of boys and girls participated in the trials from which five girls and three boys were chosen. The contestants were coached by Miss Effie Muchmore and Miss Dorothy Suitor. The prizes were awarded as follows: First Girl's Prize, Anne Moors; Second Girl's Prize, Elizabeth Tobey; First Boy's Prize, Charles Rittenburg; Second Boy's Prize, Walter Chase.

Addresses by local citizens and others, accounts of trips taken by some of the pupils, have been made in assemblies. Special programs have been held to commemorate special days and anniversaries throughout the year.

Aim of P. H. S.

To formulate courses of study, to adapt the methods of instruction, and to cooperate with the parents in guiding the pupils that all who enter may become, not only good pupils in the present, but good citizens of the future. A work shop, where boys could be taught manual arts, would be of great assistance in accomplishing this objective.

Conclusion

I wish to thank you as Superintendent, members of our School Board, The Citizens of Plymouth and surrounding towns, and my entire staff of teachers for the wonderful support and cooperation, interest and assistance, all have been willing to give in maintaining our High School.
