TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Raymond in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at I. O. O. F. Hall in said Raymond on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. \$12,750.00

3. To see what action the town will take relative to the playing of Beano in the Town of Raymond.

4. To fix compensation for collecting taxes for the year ensuing. \$500.00

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town maintenance including snow. \$5000.00

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting. \$1500.00

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day. \$300.00

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department. *2800.00*

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Dudley-Tucker Library. *\$4500*

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. *yes*

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums for State Highways as recommended by the New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways. *\$470.65 State Roads*

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 toward payment of debt. *2000.00*

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for tarring. *\$5000.00*

14. To hear the report of the dump committee and pass any regulations pertaining to the dump. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as is necessary for maintaining the dump. *\$700.00*

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cleaning Main Street. *100.00*

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Parks and Playgrounds. Also pass any regulations pertaining thereto. *200.-*

17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public auction any property acquired by Tax Collector deeds. *\$Ad in paper with general circulation.* *3,170.65*

18. To see if the town will vote to borrow a sum

not exceeding \$14,000.00 for the extension of water mains on Epping Street, a distance of approximately 2,000 feet, and to issue and sell in connection with such borrowing, notes of the Town of Raymond in the principal amount not exceeding \$14,000.00, such notes to be issued pursuant to Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws of 1942 as amended, payable from funds to be raised by taxation, to bear interest at a rate not exceeding 5%, payable semi-annually, principal payable in equal annual installments of \$2,000.00 per year, the first payment being due one year from date of said notes, and all other matters in connection with said notes to be left to the discretion of the Selectmen. *Paraphrased*

19. To see if the town will authorize to raise the salary of the Town Treasurer to \$250.00 annually. *\$ 250.00*

20. To see if the town will authorize to raise the salary of the Selectmen to \$300.00 annually, and \$400.00 annually for the chairman of the Selectmen commencing in 1955. ~~REMAIN~~ *REMAIN the SAME*

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for tarring sidewalks in the business district on Main Street, *& AMENDMENT with*

22. On petition of Hardy L. Hanson and 10 others: "To see what action the town will take in regard to tarring Precott Road, to raise and appropriate money for the same." *\$ 2300.00* ~~\$ 1800.00~~ *2300.00* ~~10~~

23. On petition of Andrew Fasekis and 14 others: "To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary sum of money to tar Lakeview Road between Harriman Road and Governor's Pond deeded to and accepted by the town during 1953." *\$ 1000.00*

24. On petition of Paul W. Hiram and 10

others: "To see what action the town will take in regard to tarring Mountain Road, to raise and appropriate money for same," *Posponed*

25. On petition of Frederick A. and Levena B. Patterson and 13 others: "To see what action the town will take in regard to tarring Ham Road, to raise and appropriate money for same." *Posponed*

26. On petition of Frank Follis and 27 others: "To see what action the town will take in regard to tarring Old Batchelder Road, to raise and appropriate money for same." *\$1000.00*

27. On petition of Alcide Cote and 31 others: "To see if the town will vote to install and maintain two (2) street lights on the Plains, also known as Ice House Street, and raise and appropriate the necessary money for the same."

28. On petition of Robert E. Eccleston and 11 others: "To see if the town will vote to install and maintain a street light at the junction of Pawtuck-away Road, Ham Road and Heath Lane, same to be installed on the N. H. Electric Co. pole No. 31-39 and raise and appropriate money for same."

29. On petition of Grace Howard and 12 others: In the interest of Public Safety, to see if the town will vote to install and maintain a street light at triangle of Prescott Road and Route 101 and appropriate money for the same.

30. To transact such other business as may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1953

To the School Board of Raymond:

May I present my seventh annual report of the schools of Raymond and at the same time take the opportunity to thank the members of the Board for their generous help and understanding in our attempt to solve the problems of the schools.

To the nucleus of six teachers, Mrs. Houghton, Mrs. Shaw, Mrs. Vining, Mrs. Cherms, Mr. Presby, and Mr. Callaghan were added at the beginning of school in September 1953 eight new ones, Miss Dupuis, Mrs. Waterhouse, Miss Greenwood, Mr. Hixon, Mr. Patti, Mrs. Jenkins, Mrs. Cloutier, and Mrs. Leonard. This was an addition of one more than the previous years making a total of fourteen in all. In November, Mr. Alfred Engel was elected to be the teacher of music—vocal and instrumental; and with the appointment of Mrs. Fox and Mrs. Welch replacing Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Treantefael in the school lunch program, the school got under way.

Enrollments continue to increase and with Grade one numbering 42 pupils, housing space and teacher loads are again crowding us for solution as well an increase in tuition pupils from Chester, Candia, Deerfield, Fremont, and Nottingham. In Grades 9-12 there have been 103 pupils registered so far this year; 203 pupils in Grades 1-6; and 55 pupils in Grades 7-8. As compared to last year from September to June and with still one-half year to go, these figures are about the same.

Every so often a town seems to be having its share of adversity in one or more departments. Probably it has been the schools which have been singled out for such adversity in Raymond this year. Not too long ago Mr. John Callaghan, your principal as you know, was stricken with a heart attack in the pursuance of his work and was forced to retire for a short time from his duties. When a man of his stature and understanding of children is suddenly removed from the scene of activity, certain difficulties present themselves and certain steps must be taken to continue as well as possible along the same lines set up and carried out by the stricken leader. Of course, as in every walk of life every individual is different and Mr. Callaghan has his ideas of school administration which were his alone. Therefore, it became necessary to set up a temporary program with the least possible change in order to carry on until such time as he will again be able to assume command.

This was done as soon as possible and the entire staff along with Mrs. Cynthia Lord of Raymond as a substitute has done an excellent job. Mr. Presby has been given tentative charge of

the situation and with Mrs. Lord's help along with the backing of the entire staff, the program should continue without too great a handicap.

During the summer and in keeping with past procedures, the buildings were carefully checked and certain repairs and replacements were made for the protection of the property. The installation of an adequate drainage system at the back of the gymnasium leading to the woods was installed which, in my opinion, was a major operation and has proved very much worth while.

And may I finally bring to your attention three important problems that should be solved immediately.

1. An increase of insurance on the entire plant—all buildings and furnishings. The plant and furnishings are insured for about \$115,000. This is not adequate in the face of rising costs of construction and the nature of the buildings. You as a Board have discussed this problem, but have felt that an increase of insurance would increase the Budget and be turned down by the voters. However, may I point out that \$115,000 would not build one-half the structure you now have in case of fire. Regardless of precaution, it could wipe out this amount in a very short time. I would recommend that one and one-half times this amount be added over a period of three years.

2. The outside of the building needs painting. If my memory serves me correctly, it has been painted just once in six years. Surely these buildings are worth a matter of \$400 to \$500 in six years as a precautionary measure.

3. The addition of another teacher in the elementary grades. For the past five years my reports will show that 40 pupils, or even 35 pupils, especially in the primary grades, are far too many for fair, adequate instruction. The answer has always been lack of funds. This is understandable up to a certain point. However, when the time comes that your children are receiving but 1/35th to 1/45th of the teacher's time regardless of the efficiency of the teacher, then and then alone, it becomes the parents' problem to insist upon a fair class size for the instruction of their children. Much criticism at times is heaped upon the primary teacher because she cannot give each individual the time she should when the reason is not because the teacher is not willing or that she does not have the books and materials, but that there are not enough hours in the day to handle the size of the classes. Just take a glance at the number of children in the first four grades for this year so far—Grade 1, 42 pupils; Grade 2, 38 pupils; Grade 3, 33 pupils; Grade 4, 37 pupils. Believe me, ladies and gentlemen, with such teachers as Mrs. Houghton, Mrs. Shaw, Mrs. Vining and Miss Dupuis, this is putting too great a burden not only on the teaching ingenuity of these women, but the learning power of the individual child. The blame is not on the teacher, but on the people who make adequate teaching possible. Please give this vital phase of your school careful attention.

Again may I thank everyone who still has faith in those who have been intrusted with the education of their children as well as the future of the town, state, and nation.
