WARRANT

TOWN OF STRATFORD

To the inhabitants of the Town of Stratford, in the County of Coös in said State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Stratford on Tuesday the Tenth Day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the subjects here and after mentioned.

You are hereby warned that on said date and place the polls will be open at 10:00 in the forenoon and will remain open until 6:00 in the afternoon for the receipt of your ballots under the non-partisan ballot system.

1. To see if the Town will vote to choose by Non-Partisan Ballot the following Town Officers:
 - One Selectmen for Three Years
 - One Town Clerk for One Year
 - One Town Treasurer for One Year
 - One Trustee of Trust Funds for Three Years
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,584.99 and to authorize the withdrawal of such sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 and expend same as Follows:

Partial Payment on Long Term Flood Note \$13,584.99.
3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and raise and appropriate money for same. If not, to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
4. To elect two auditors for the ensuing year or see if the Town will vote to petition the State Office of Revenue Administration to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting or to authorize the Selectmen to hire a private auditing firm of accountants to audit the Town books and make an appropriation to cover the costs of the same.
5. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in order to defray the expenses of the Town in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Board of Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required by law, not elected by Non-Partisan Ballot.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$6,000.00 to help defray the expenses of the Town Nurse.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$375.00 for operating expenses of Ambulance District A-1.
9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as a contribution for the support of the services of the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Services and Vershire Center.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the Beatrice D. Weeks Memorial Hospital.
11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,050.00 for the support of the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital.
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for operating expenses and matching funds for the Northern Coos Community Health Association.
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 for the support of the services from North Country Council, Inc.
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$763.79 in support of the White Mountains Region Association.
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$19,000.00 for the removal of rubbish in the Town of Stratford by Ray O. Parker & Sons, Inc.
16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend without further action of the Town Meeting money from the State, Federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year. (RSA 31:95b).
17. To see what action the Town wishes to take upon the application of Mr. Roland LaPerle to open and maintain the road presently known as the Mason Road

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain the road in the A. Douglas Wood Development, leading off from U.S. Route #3 to the turn off for the Earth House and from said road to the residence of Ellis Potter.
19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to open and maintain the Percy Road from U.S. Route #3 for a distance of thirteen hundred (1300) feet Easterly of said Route #3, and to bring the road up to Town Road Aid Specification.
20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money and to open and maintain the easterly portion (.3 mile) of Percy Road up to Francis White's proposed house.
21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed at private sale, as the Selectmen, in their discretion deem equitable and just. (RSA 80:42 (I and III)).
22. To see what action the Town wishes to take on the Quonset Hut located on Route #3 acquired from the Tri-County Homes, Inc.
23. To see what action the Town wishes to take with respect to the construction of a building by the North Stratford Volunteer Firemen's Association on land adjacent to the Quonset Hut, so-called.
24. To see if the Town will authorize the withdrawal and to vote to raise and appropriate all accrued interest from the Fire/Truck, Fire Station and or Land and the Fire Department Building Fund Capital Reserve Funds to be used to complete the Stratford Hollow Fire Department Station.
25. To see what action the Town wishes to take with respect to the disposition of the North Stratford Memorial Fund and the Stratford Hollow Memorial Fund.
26. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money and to open and maintain the section of road from U.S. Route #3 to the home of Mrs. Anita Marshall.
27. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regards to the vacancy of a full time police chief.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$15,000.00, for the purpose of designing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities which are requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et. seq.). This action will qualify the Town for federal funds. Of the total design costs, the Town shall raise a sum of not to exceed \$15,000.00 by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. R.S.A. 33.1 et. seq., as amended) and authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon, and take such actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds and notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Stratford and allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251 et. seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.
29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following by law. By law on the dumping, processing, removal and disposal of Hazardous Wastes 1. For the purposes of promoting the health, safety and the general welfare of the Town of Stratford, under the provisions of R.S.A. 31:39, hazardous wastes shall not be dumped, buried, stored, collected, received, processed, reprocessed, treated, recovered, separated, or disposed of in any way on any land in, or in any building in the Town of Stratford except by prior permission of the voters of the Town obtained at an annual or special Town Meeting. 2. For the purpose of this by-law, hazardous wastes means any material which may a. cause or contribute to an increase in mortality or illness; or b. pose a potential threat to human health or the environment when improperly handled or mismanaged; or c. has been identified as a hazardous waste by the New Hampshire Bureau of Solid Waste Management using the criteria established under R.S.A. 147:50. 3. This by-law shall take effect immediately on its passage.
30. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the State or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent.

31. To hear reports of Agents, Officers, and Committees, heretofore chosen and take any action on same.
32. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the
Board of Selectmen
Town of Stratford
Stratford, New Hampshire

We have examined the combined financial statements of the Town of Stratford and the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements of the Town as of and for the year ended December 31, 1980, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1F, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that the omission of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the preceding paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Stratford, New Hampshire at December 31, 1980, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined statements of the Town of Stratford, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining, individual fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE
FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest Fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC.
TOWN REPORT

In the Town of Stratford, the North Country Council has provided assistance in assembling four different federal applications to assist the Town in its overall flood recovery effort. The overall federal investment in the Town as part of the flood recovery program effort is approximately three million dollars. NCC is assisting the Town with the planning and implementation of the project.

North Country Council is the regional planning commission and economic development district serving the North Country. In 1980, North Country Council targeted its resources and expertise to fit the needs and problems of the towns and region we serve. In the community planning field, the Council has programmed a systematic way of handling requests from communities for assistance with a local community plan. By the end of 1981, the Council will have assisted six communities complete master plans. For its membership fee in the Council, a town can receive any of twenty-two types of assistance identified by NCC. Communities can contract with NCC to undertake special project programs which require a significant amount of time over and above the normal types of services. Sponsorship of the Municipal Law Lecture series and membership on the Environmental Law Clinic affords the Council with the opportunity to secure necessary legal information on behalf of the Town. The Council has been active in a number of regional issues such as transportation, economic development, land use, and housing. In transportation, the Council supported the restoration of rail service to the Mt. Washington Valley area and initiation of commuter air service in Berlin, assistance to the Whitefield Regional Airport, and improved highway and public transportation systems. In land use, the Council has published reports on the Role of Agriculture in the North Country, Managing Wetland, and several brief fact sheets.

The Council has accelerated its economic development program with the addition of a Business Development Director who is making direct contact with the businesses to encourage them to locate in North Country communities who have identified new industry as a need. NCC has prepared a regional industrial brochure coupled with local area fact sheets as a tool to encourage planned economic growth. As a result of these efforts several companies have expressed an interest in locating in the region. Efforts are underway to establish a Revolving Loan Fund as an incentive for prospective industry.

In rural development, assistance has been provided to a number of communities in areas such as wastewater treatment, solid waste, water supply improvement, and other necessary community projects. A special report on Rural Development is available.

Because of the Council's activity in energy, the Governor's Council on Energy granted NCC some funds which will enable the Council to assist three targeted communities to prepare a local energy plan.

State and federal agencies and statewide groups continue to contact North Country Council for a North Country perspective on such varied issues as growth, forestry, environmental concerns, land use, and manpower training. For example, in June, the Council presented testimony to a special legislature committee on proposed changes needed in the state's planning and zoning legislation. Association with these groups provides NCC with the opportunity to share some of the regional and local concerns expressed by the towns with those state and federal agencies whose decisions will impact on the region. The Council continues to work with other regional councils in New England through the efforts of its President who serves as a Board member of the National Association of Regional Councils.

The efforts and accomplishments of the Council are a collection of the many contributions of local towns, other agencies, our fine staff, the Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee. We express our appreciation to the Town for its support and assistance during the year. North Country Council is an arm of local government in the North Country. 5. To see if the district will vote to transfer the Stratford Hollow School site and all rights pertinent thereto over to the Town of Stratford.
6. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund established for the purpose of replacing or improving its heating equipment and/or systems, or to make major capital improvements, and that the school board be authorized as agents to determine when such funds may be expended.
7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,300.00 for the payment of salaries under the terms of a Collective Bargaining Agreement for the year 1981-82. (Included in the proposed budget for 1981-82.)

8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.
9. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE
OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The programs begun in the past year have been progressing satisfactorily throughout 1980. The installation of a data processing system which serves all school districts in SAU 58 marks the most significant administrative change. The NCR 8150 computer, with the capacity to handle the new State accounting requirements, has been providing general ledger, purchase orders, accounts payable and budget summary reports for several months. Payroll will be "on line" in the early months of 1981. The significant advantages of handling business accounts with the data processing equipment is rapid recovery of information and the ability to manage efficiently the ever increasing paper burden which school districts are required to deal with. Far from being a replacement for personnel, the computer will aid in preventing the need for additional administrative staff to handle the schools' business affairs. Personnel in the central office are continuing training to update their knowledge and proficiency with the computer and its programs. The ability to perform pupil accounting tasks - attendance, grade reports, class lists, etc. - will be examined in the future, once the business functions are all in place and operating smoothly.

Full implementation of the new State accounting system is in effect this year. Although significantly different compared to the old accounting system, the new format will allow much more detail in the reporting of financial information. The longer account numbers work like postal "zip" codes, identifying the source of funds, the function for which the money was appropriated, and the specific "objects" purchased, such as textbooks, salaries, utilities, insurance, etc. It is anticipated that although some initial confusion may result due to unfamiliarity with the new system, once the procedures are understood, a far greater degree of financial information will be made available to the communities than in the past.

The addition of a part time school psychologist to serve the special education programs became effective in the fall. The psychologist is available in each school in SAU 58 once every two weeks. The position is supported largely by State and Federal funds with local funds, which formerly were spent on contracting private psychological services to meet Federal requirements for the handicapped, making up the balance of costs. Overall, a significant savings in psychological testing costs will be realized since those private agencies' fees were not federally supported to the same degree as is the current staff psychologist.

Through participation in a Federal Energy Grant Program, a number of major improvements in energy efficiency of the heating plants and building envelopes have taken place in the schools. Insulation, storm windows, boiler and fuel tank maintenance and constant monitoring fuel consumption and thermostat settings should bring about noticeable cost savings

in fuel use. The Federal Project paid for fifty percent of approved energy conservation measures in the schools.

At the Stratford School this year, because of a small enrollment, only one kindergarten session was scheduled. The kindergarten teacher assisted with the large first grade group to help those children working below level in reading. By using Title I funds, a para-professional was hired at the high school level to assist students having difficulty with Math and English. The aide helps students in the classroom working directly with the Title I teacher. The "Me/Me" program, which has been implemented successfully in elementary schools nationally, was examined by the staff. An adaptation of this program will begin in the elementary grades in the fall. The program, which deals with values necessary to resist pressures to use alcohol and drugs, addresses the rapidly developing danger which alcohol and drug abuse has for young people.

For the first time all junior high students are experiencing classes in both Home Economics and Industrial Arts, putting the school in compliance with Title IX of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. Beginning in the fall, all sixth graders will participate in weekly units in Home Economics. The Science curriculum, developed under a federally funded project, is in its second year of implementation. It is expected that the program will provide a substantial basis for improving academic progress in Science at the secondary level. The Spalding Writing Road to Reading is used in conjunction with the regular reading program in grades 1 and 2. This phonetic approach to learning has resulted in markedly improved spelling and word attack skills. The initial success of this basic approach to reading is significantly high and warrants consideration for full adoption in all primary grades in the future.

The Stratford-Groveton Building Trades Program is an important part of the curriculum and high school students continue to take advantage of programs at the area vocational center in Berlin. This year students participated in diversified occupations; welding auto mechanics and nurse's aide programs.

Stratford strives to give its students the best possible education. The Iowa Test of Basic Skills, a nationally standardized evaluation tool, shows improving school achievement overall and the rate of success of students in post-secondary education is excellent. The majority of Stratford High School graduates in in post-high school vocational and collegiate programs find continued success as they complete their education.
