TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

(The polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. to elect town officers, discussion and action on the articles in the warrant at 8:00 p.m.)

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate two hundred and one dollars and eighty cents (\$201.80) against the State's thirteen hundred forty-five dollars and thirty cents (\$1,345.30), for State Aid Construction.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow one percent discount on such property taxes as are paid by August 15.

5. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of ninety-three hundred dollars (\$9,300.00) for the construction of Class V roads, said sum to be raised by the sale of Town's notes or bonds, and to delegate to the Selectmen all matters of form, rates of interest, dates of payment and the sale of said notes or bonds, and to appoint any committees or pass any other votes necessary in relation thereto.

6. To see if the town will vote to install some new shelves in the Library, raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) for the same.

7. To see if the town will vote to re-value the real estate of the Town of Stratham, raise and appropriate money for the same.

8. To see if the town will vote to trade their present grader for one more up to date, raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Stratham, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The school year 1953-1954 opened with the following personnel:

Miss Edna Crane, Principal and Teacher of Grades 5-6.

Mrs. Elizabeth Merrill, Teacher of Grades 3-4.

Mrs. Hilda Barker, Teacher of Grades 1-2.

Mrs. Eleanor Henry, Teacher of Music.

Miss Mary Shea, School Nurse.

This is the same staff of teachers which taught last year. Again I would like to emphasize the importance of having experienced and competent teachers in charge of the training of the boys and girls.

With the beginning of school, there were twenty-five pupils in the fifth grade and fourteen pupils in the sixth grade making a total of thirty-nine students in that classroom. In order to solve this enrollment problem it was decided to employ an additional teacher and to give her about two-thirds of the members of the fifth grade to teach. This would bring the classroom numbers down to reasonable size and it would also provide an opportunity for a great deal of individual work which several members of the fifth grade needed badly. I believe that the school district was fortunate to have Mrs. Bertha Wiggin accept the position as teacher of this new group. Her experience and training make her a valuable addition to the staff of the Memorial School.

It may be of interest to the citizens to know that the last session of the state legislature was more favorable

to the cause of better education than the previous session had been. One example of this was the increase in the amount of State Aid from \$600,000 to \$900,000 per year. State Aid for the Stratham School District was thus raised from \$2,634.67 in 1952-1953 to \$6,395.31 in 1953-1954 as a result.

Also in order to improve administrative services the legislature made it possible to increase the number of supervisory unions in the state from forty-eight to fifty. It is hoped that this will make it possible to limit the number of school districts in any given union to not more than seven. There are some supervisory unions at present with eight or nine school districts. This same law has further provided for an additional number of Assistant Superintendents in the larger cities and it also provides for about five Helping Teachers in the larger unions. The Helping Teacher so-called has become an Elementary Supervisor on a union-wide basis in some places. In the case of both the Assistant Superintendent and the Helping Teacher the state will pay twenty-five hundred dollars of the salary.

The Stratham School District has received \$2,831.90 in Federal Aid for the last school year 1952-1953 and application has been made for federal aid for this school year. This plus the additional State Aid should help materially to defray the increased costs of the school budget.

The response of the parents to the All-Risk Student Accident Insurance program would indicate that there is an interest in this type of insurance coverage. In this Supervisory Union with a total enrollment of fourteen hundred and ten, eleven hundred and eighty-eight availed themselves of the opportunity to take the insurance for this school year. This schooltime Accident Insurance Plan is offered at the nominal rate of only one dollar per student for the entire school year.

The purchase by the Parent-Teacher Association of a film strip projector has added greatly to the Audio-Visual equipment. This machine is an excellent classroom teaching device and, as more and better film strips are becoming available, it would seem desirable to start a film strip library which could be added to each year. The Association has also paid for a yearly membership to the Film Library at the University of New Hampshire. This makes it possible to show films, many of which are connected with the school work, about every two weeks for most of the year. By these two means, the boys and girls have the advantages of a good Audio-Visual program.

The painting of two classrooms this last summer has given the interior of the building two coats of paint except for the first and second grade classroom and the auxiliary rooms. The woodwork on the exterior of the building should also be painted again.

I call to your attention the reports of the school nurse and the music teacher and the tables which follow and I hope that these will be of interest to you.

I again wish to thank the citizens, the members of the School Board, and the teachers for their continued cooperation and support.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The main objective of a music program in the schools is to present such a variety of experiences that each child may discover some phase of musical activity in which he may find enjoyment, not only as a child but as an adult.

To this end, during 1953, rhythms, music appreciation, listening, rhythm band, dramatization, singing, ear-training, dancing, reading music and part singing have all been included in the program. The third and fourth grades have purchased tonettes, and are very much interested in working with them. This instrument is excellent, not only as a means for learning to read music and for harmonizing, but also is often an incentive for the study of some other instrument later on.

In the fall a group of pupils had the privilege of attending, in Exeter, a concert by the United States Marine Band. This musical experience is one that we shall all remember for a long time.

A Christmas program was presented by the students, at the school, just before the Christmas vacation.

Plans are being made for an operetta, or some type of musical program, to be given at the Town Hall some time before school closes in June.

In closing, I wish to thank Mr. Hoyt, the members of the School Board, the teachers and the parents for their co-operation.

STRATHAM SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The first half of a school year is usually given over to services in the school health program. This year, with the help of an illuminated eye chart, we were able to find more obscure eye defects in some of the children. We are happy to report that most of these conditions have now been corrected, either through the parents or with the help of the Eye Clinic sponsored by the Lion's Club.

This year, too, several children have been attending the Speech Clinic at the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center. Many more have been screened for this Clinic and are awaiting an opening to attend speech classes.

There are two major gaps in our services to the children of Stratham. One is the need of a physician to conduct physical examinations. The State Department of Education recommends that each child receive a minimum of four comprehensive examinations during his school career, more if needed. The Stratham children do not have this service until they go to Junior High. I am sure that if an effort were made to fill this need it could be done, and inexpensively at that.

The second gap is in dental services. Numerous times during the year, the nurse has been asked by parents to help obtain for them dental appointments. The obtaining of individual appointments for children is a matter over which the nurse has no control. But she could help organize dental clinics. Many of the Stratham children need dental care badly and are not receiving it. Neither the obtaining of a school physician nor a dental clinic is insurmountable. We have a modern school in Stratham and excellent facilities, let's make fuller use of them for the health needs of the children.

Outside of stating our needs, I must report that the children on the whole have been remarkably healthy. We've had our usual quota of communicable diseases and colds. In spite of the fact that our sister school unions have had major epidemics, our illnesses have not reached this proportion.
