REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

February 2, 1996

The Finance Committee is a volunteer committee appointed by the Selectmen for the purpose of evaluating certain projects as well as the Town Warrant.

This year the Selectmen asked the Finance Committee to research the following:

- Renovation/expansion of office space for the Town Offices.
- Heavy equipment (ie truck/plow/sander and backhoe/ loader).
- Waste oil furnace for the Town Garage.
- Meet with all partitioners to review their monetary requests for the Town Warrant.

We began our research on the renovation of the Town Office in June 1995, which was a 3 to 4 month endeavor gathering the necessary information to be able to make any type of a comparison as well as a recommendation.

We looked at the cost involved in renovating the Town Office verses the Town House. In either case we felt that there was insufficient parking space as well as expansion for the future. Therefore, we looked into the purchase of an alternate building to house both the Town Offices and the Town Garage (which will need to be replaced in the near future). The Finance Committee's results and recommendations on the Town Office situation were forwarded to the Selectmen.

The Finance Committee has researched the option of a purchase price for heavy equipment verses the rental of equipment currently. The results and recommendations have been forwarded to the Selectmen.

The Finance Committee recommends that a committee be appointed to research community assistant organizations with regards to any overlapping of services, being as the total sum of monies appropriated is over \$10,000. This money may be appropriated more effectively, if the town had a general fund to control as needed.

The Finance Committee found it frustrating in our search to meet the needs of our expanding Town and still being objective to the people in Town. We would like to thank everyone who came in to discuss their request.

TREASURER'S REPORT

During 1995, there were few changes concerning Town of Tamworth funds. Our main banking relationship has remained with North Conway Bank, which is now the First National Bank of Portsmouth and is expected to change its name again in 1996. We also maintain a small deposit in Fleet Bank NH to facilitate moving funds in and out of the Municipal Deposit Investment Pool.

Most of our invested funds have been deposited in the investment Pool, a service which originated through state law a few years ago during times of banking difficulties. This pool allows municipalities to invest funds safely while maximizing yield. In the case of the Town of Tamworth, this means that, while we borrowed \$1.5 million and had the use of this money from March to December, and the interest we paid for this money was \$52,220.54, we earned \$57,832.21 in interest, for a net gain of \$5611.67. Our \$1.5 million TAN was obtained from North Conway Bank, the low bidder.

At this time, I would like to express my sincere thanks to Administrator Dorothy Hidden, Clerk/Tax Collector Theresa Boewe, Selectmen Bruce Robinson, John Roberts, and Samuel Hidden, and the staff at our local banks for the courtesies shown me.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In calendar year 1995, our three (3) leading causes of fires were Children, Non-Permit fires not properly extinguished and Smoking Materials.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire, are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

MEDSTAR EMERGENCY SERVICES

Since beginning our service to Tamworth, we have diligently worked to improve our level of care. Our staff continues its education and training in advanced life support skills. In June we added a new ambulance, and as of this writing we operate two of the newest units in the area. We have added new communications equipment and several high tech patient care items. Recently we moved to our new quarters on Route 113 between the villages of Tamworth and Chocorua. This facility provides us heated garages, offices, a large training room, and crew living space. The location has proven very beneficial in our rapid response to all areas of town, and for the first time ever, the ambulances you pay for are housed within town. Along with our emergency care we assist numerous residents with in home needs, such as ambulation, dressing changes, blood pressure monitoring, and many other services. We fill these needs without charge, and all our services are always rendered without regard to the persons ability to pay. In addition to our medical services, we are very proud of our community involvement. We regularly sponsor Red Cross blood drives, offer free CPR and first aid training, and donate standby services to any community event where needed.

MEDSTAR is your ambulance service and to that end we are proud to provide you with this report of our activities for the first eight months of our contract.

The subdivisions are smaller than in years past but every month we had our share of subdivisions, boundary line adjustments and septic system waiver requests.

With the completion of the master plan during 1995 it was our duty to try to implement its proposals. We reviewed it and concluded that the best way to keep Tamworth the way the majority of the people want it to become is to adopt a small simple zoning ordinance. So we spent a great deal of time this year writing one. We could not have done it without much of the work being done by a very capable subcommittee.

It was a little disappointing for us not to be able to produce an ordinance for the town to vote on this year. At the last review by legal counsel the ordinance was checked for compatibility with other ordinances within the town. Town counsel believes that there was some potential for confusion. Since there was not time for the changes to fix the problem we are going to postpone a vote on it until 1997.

We will use our time this year to further refine the ordinance. The planning board hopes that everyone will use the time to study the proposed ordinance for themselves.

AGENCY INFORMATION

Tamworth Community Nurse Association, Inc. received renewal of licensure for another year of service as a Community Health Agency after annual inspection on August 1995 by Rod Gagne of the New Hampshire Bureau of Health Facilities. Board policy, operating procedures, patient records, office statistics and documentation were examined to ensure all state regulations and protocol are being met and actively practiced. TCNA continues to maintain, as well, its licensure under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendment (CLIA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Public Health Practices Program for testing of blood sugar and urinalysis specimens. This year we have been able to offer the service of drawing blood samples for homebound patients. Thanks to the office of Tamworth Family Medicine for allowing us to drop our samples there to be picked up by the Huggins Hospital Lab Courier.

John Patten, M.D. continues to serve as the Medical Advisor to TCNA. His willingness to donate his time, knowledge, and efforts has been greatly appreciated.

Supplemental services of physical, speech, occupational and IV therapies, social workers, home health aides, homemakers and "back up" registered nurses, as well as hospice care have all been provided to Tamworth residents by other area agencies. We remain particularly grateful for the cooperative efforts extended to us by Heritage Home Health. VNA Hospice of Northern and Southern Carroll County have also provided valuable assistance for Tamworth residents. Many area adults have come to rely upon the homemakers and health aides of Carroll County Home and Health Care Services for assistance with daily activities which enables them to remain in

their homes.

Promoting optimal health, safety and quality of life is the objective of TCNA. Through continuous assessment of the patient and collaboration with assisting agencies, physicians and involved family members this objective can be attained.

AGENCY FUNCTIONS/PROGRAMS

The Board of Directors of TCNA continues to meet on a monthly basis to direct agency functions and operations and to handle financial matters. The Board Members and the Friends of TCNA (formally the summer board) volunteer their time with board activities such as clinics and screenings, special programs and fund raising events. With their guidance and assistance and support from the towns people we have continued to function as a non-profit, non-charging community health agency.

Karen Pelsor, RN was hired in July 1995 as the associate nurse. Karen has over 20 years experience as a registered nurse and is very competent and caring. She works on a part time basis 3 days a week.

Monthly Blood Pressure Clinics continue in the TCNA office on the last Wednesday of every month from 12 to 1 PM and on a monthly basis at the Congregate Meal Site on the 3rd. Monday of each month. Office hours are also available 4 to 5 mornings a week for blood pressure screenings or other health questions, concerns and problems.

Our "skilled" nursing care services, offered in the office and at home, as needed, continue to be directed by the patients physician. Referrals are received from physicians, hospitals, family members and patients themselves. After an initial assessment is obtained, TCNA can continue visits and collaborate care with their physicians consent. Skilled care procedures include injections, blood drawing, dressing changes, suture removal and assessment of vital signs, safety, adherence to medication regime and general health status. Patient teaching and education are also vital aspects in maintaining the health of the community.

The Spring Adult Health Screening cosponsored with the Ossipee Valley Lioness was held in April 1995. Over 159 people participated. Screenings included: basic vision, glaucoma, dental, podiatry, hearing, blood pressure, blood glucose, cholesterol, hemoglobin, pulmonary function, nutrition, and information on Living Wills and Advanced Directives.

The Flu Clinic was held in October with over 250 recipients trivalent vaccine. Many have already been spared the severity of the flu afforded thru this preventative measure.

The dental program afforded to students at the Kenneth Brett School allows dental care free of charge to eligible children. Due to scheduling problems the program began later than usual. Dr. Eric Hirschfeld will again be offering his skill and expertise. We are very appreciative of the Tamworth Foundation for their support.

TCNA has worked with the Community Food Pantry, local clergy and the Brett School to assist families and individuals in need of services,

recourses and programs available to them.

The “loaner closet” continues to be of great use by many residents. Wheelchairs, commodes, walkers, canes, crutches, beds and assorted supplies are available free of charge. We are grateful to those who have donated items this year.

The Tamworth Community Christmas Project (TCCP), of which I am a member, was a great success this year. Donations were plentiful, provided gifts of clothes, gift certificates and turkey dinners for households. Many thanks to those who contributed time and/or money.

Attending conferences, seminars, networking programs and other meetings is yet another area of necessity for the agency. This includes keeping updated on medical treatments, procedures and health issues as well as maintaining required Continuing Education Units for R.N. licensure. Also meeting with area home health agencies providing supplemental services to our patients is of paramount importance.

June Donovan continues to function as our office manager/secretary. She is a tremendous asset to TCNA and we thank her for the years of hard work and dedication. She also coordinates the Tamworth Meals on Wheels program prepared by the Ossipee Concerned Citizens. Much effort goes into scheduling drivers to deliver the meals to more than 25 households five days a week. We thank our many faithful drivers.

This has been a year of transition for TCNA. I assumed the role of TCNA in May of last year. Many thanks to Donna Miller, RN for a thorough orientation. We were saddened by Barbara Anderson’s retirement in June. Barbara has been in touch and reports she is thoroughly enjoying her retirement.

Our new assistant nurse, Karen has been a pleasure to work with. The past year has been a rewarding and positive learning experience for me. The current and expected changes in the health care system are creating many challenges in the home health care field. In the coming year I hope to concentrate on assessing the needs of all ages in the community and organizing some informational meetings, programs or support groups. If you have any ideas, suggestions or concerns please stop by the office or call us. We continue to seek your support in caring for the community.

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS AND CEMETERY COMMISSIONERS 1995 REPORT

Your Trustees are currently responsible for the safe keeping and investment of \$295,000 in trust and reserve funds. The details of these funds are shown on the accompanying schedules. They can be broken down into two main types of funds. Permanent funds consist of funds set aside in perpetuity for such purposes as cemetery maintenance, library funds, and the like. We administer \$138,500 in these categories.

Non permanent capital reserve funds amount to \$156,500. They consist of reserves for such things as fire department equipment, police cruisers, and special education costs at the school. In recent years we have removed significant sums from this category to help pay for the new fire truck, property revaluation, and the police cruiser.

For many years we have traditionally invested the Trust Funds in Certificates of Deposit with local banks. This was done when interest rates were high but recently with the rates under the 3% range, we sought conservative, but higher rate opportunities. The State of New Hampshire has recently established the N.H. Public Deposit Investment Pool with yields in the 5.5% range. As CDs have matured we have switched the funds to the municipal pool. Slightly higher returns should be expected in the future.

CEMETERY MAINTENANCE:

During 1995 cemetery maintenance costs were on the high side. This was primarily due to tree trimming and removal problems. Trees that surround cemeteries are exposed to the elements and vulnerable to wind damage. We had more than our share of such weather this past summer and fall. Our cemeteries continue to be nicely tended by Phil Stone and Ralph Ames. Their efforts are much appreciated.

COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The Cook Memorial Library is a public library open 16 hours per week with programs and services available to residents and nonresidents. We are pleased to report increases in usage and circulation for 1995.

Children continue to have a large presence in the library. The library offers a weekly Tuesday morning storytime for pre-schoolers as well as a popular Summer Reading Program. Volunteers continue to coordinate the summer story hour, a welcome addition to the library's schedule of programs. All programs are open to the public at no charge.

The library is being used by many community groups for meetings. In addition to circulating over 11,000 volumes, the library hosted over 40 community meetings, sponsored over 20 childrens programs, and logged nearly 7,000 visits.

We were fortunate to receive a grant through the Carroll County Library Cooperative which enabled us to install a FAX machine. We can now better utilize the Article Express service making available hundreds of periodical articles from the State Library, with a guaranteed one day response time. Enhancements in the New Hampshire State Library Automated Information System has simplified our usage of interlibrary loan requests and reference services. We borrowed hundreds of items from other libraries. The Cook Memorial Library continues to move toward its goal of automating the cataloging and circulation system. With assistance from the Tamworth Foundation, hardware and software for the project has been purchased.

The library loans books, magazines, videos, book cassettes and music on compact disc. The New Hampshire Collection is a circulating collection and is heavily used, as is the Ulitz Room, which houses our noncirculating local history and genealogy collection. The library has a VCR available for meetings and programs, as well as a typewriter for public use. Art exhibits are on display featuring works of local artists.

We wish to thank everyone for their assistance in making the year a success. We wish to especially thank our many loyal volunteers who contribute their time, from barcoding to bake sales. The library continues to grow to better meet the needs of the community in providing educational, cultural, recreational and informational services. I welcome each of you to visit the Cook Memorial Library.

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CHOCORUA PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Chocorua Public Library was founded in 1888, and is one of the oldest chartered public libraries in the State of New Hampshire. Together with the Cook Memorial Library, it forms an Associative Library under the New Hampshire State Library System, serving the Town of Tamworth and all of its residents.

The financial situation for the Chocorua Public Library has changed dramatically in the last 5-7 years. In the mid to late 1980s, we received between \$16,000-\$18,000 annually from the Whittemore fund invested through the Foundation. At one point it peaked at nearly \$20,000. Since then, the income has continued to drop, and this past year we received only \$11,000. To make up the deficit, we put a warrant article in at Town Meeting, increased our fund raising efforts, and modified any expenses where possible. Unfortunately, 90% of our budget is in fixed expenses related to the building and operations over which we have little control. Each year, we have dipped into our cash reserves to balance the budget. This year we are in the process of having our investment portfolio analyzed and will propose a new investment strategy to our Board so that we can increase the income realized from our holdings.

During the past year, we logged 2200 visits, circulated nearly 2,500 pieces of printed material and added 177 new books to our collection. In addition to this, one hundred new cards were issued. We had many adult and children programs which included the "Artist of the Month". This program put a wide variety of local artists' work on display for all to enjoy. We also had a large turnout at our Annual Tree Trimming Party, through which the Tamworth Community Christmas Project received many new mittens and hats for holiday delivery to the needy.

Through grants, The Chocorua Public Library has some new services this year. We were able to purchase a computer and FAX machine. The computer system allows the library to link electronically with all other libraries in the state as well as provide many other opportunities to patrons. We are presently upgrading and enhancing the children's section of the library. We want to offer a listening section for books on tape and other audio aides. With the addition of our new computer, we will focus more attention on the growth of computer offerings for children, especially in relation to what they are studying in school.

TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT 1995

DREDGE AND FILL - Tamworth Conservation Commission (TCC) has been involved in four applications for dredge and fill in wetlands replacement of a bridge on Scott Road, protection of bridge abutments on Wonalancet Brook, a farm pond for fire protection near the foot of Great Hill Road, and has continued monitoring work begun several years ago on a project near house 41, where there has been non-cooperation with conditions set by the state wetlands Board, leading to worsening of erosion. Sites have been inspected and recommendations made to the Wetlands Board for improvements in the way work should be done. In the case of the farm pond negotiations are underway to modify the plan to meet the concerns of an abutter as to the effect on a well and septic system. In all cases TCC has recommended approval by the Board, but with conditions to avoid environmental damage.

MINIMUM IMPACT - Wetlands Board regulations have been changed in order to expedite dredge and fill applications that have only minimum impact on a wetland. The Board has empowered staff members to approve applications instead of waiting for action by the Board. In all cases TCC is notified and, for those other than forestry projects, a TCC member must sign the application before it goes to the Wetlands Board staff. TCC has been involved in sixteen such applications. In those where the application was incomplete a TCC member has worked with the applicant to fill in information necessary for approval.

COMPLAINTS AND ALLEGED VIOLATIONS - Six complaints or alleged violations have been made to TCC which were investigated and, where indicated, reported to the proper authority. The Wetlands Board doesn't notify TCC of renewed or refiled applications, only of the original one. TCC has requested notification in such cases so it can act promptly on applications. From discussion on how to handle complaints, it was agreed with the Selectmen, that these should be in writing. And a procedure was worked out for acting on them.

SEPTIC SYSTEM WAIVERS - TCC has worked with the Planning Board to set up guidelines for acting on waiver applications and means have been established to expedite them, most importantly in cases of a failed system which poses a health hazard.

SOLID WASTE - TCC asked the Selectmen for a re-formation of the Solid Waste Committee. A committee of five was appointed, including a representative from TCC, Planning Board and Selectmen. Charlie Townsend was chosen to represent the Conservation Commission. First task for the

committee was fact finding. Subsequently bins were set up for glass, to be filled by the dump attendant, not directly by the public, a vast improvement on the process that had been used. The committee continues its work on long range plans for the dump, with due consideration for costs. The household Hazardous Waste Collection, which is now an annual event, took place in July. T.C helped with publicity and with volunteers on collection day.

EDUCATION - As the Conservation Commission had a small donated fund for education, it publicly requested applications for grants. One has been made to the Cook Library for an Audubon Society of N. H. program, "Moose to Mice, N. H. Mammals." Another grant is pending.

MEETINGS - A member of the Commission attended a legislative hearing on Wetlands Board rule making. Four members went to workshops and annual meeting of the N. H. Association of Conservation Commissions. Two TCC members made a presentation on Commission work at a meeting of the Tamworth Civic Association and have also sent material for the associations newsletter. TCC chairman went to a meeting on a Route 16 Corridor Study, a brainstorming session attended by representatives from towns along the corridor. Members attended a Dept. of Environmental services hearing on a permit request by Browning Ferris Industries for a solid waste transfer station on the east side of town, a permit which was eventually denied because of expressed concerns as to effect on the quality of the aquifer and on property values.

GREAT HILL TOWER, managed by TCC at the request of the Selectmen. TCC has worked with the Selectmen to procure bids on work needed to repair and paint the metal structure, as no bids were received after the Selectmen's public announcement in 1994. In March, 1995, the Town appropriated \$4000 for this work. A firm, Nelson Communications, was located, which would supply turnbuckles and cables and do wire-brushing and painting for \$3450. This proposal was accepted by TCC with approval of the Selectmen. Work was completed in the summer.

MEMBERS - With the death of Peg King last November Tamworth Conservation Commission lost a valuable member. Another loss came when the Selectmen did not re-appoint one member of the Commission. Three new members whom the Selectmen asked to serve, unfortunately, were unable to do so, one because he moved out of town and two others for personal reasons. Now there remain three vacancies on the seven member Commission. The Commission would be glad to talk with any resident interested in environmental work. A reading of this annual report will show some of the types of work involved in serving on the Conservation Commission.

DOG WARDEN REPORT 1995

In the year of 1995 I responded to 104 calls, traveling 1030 miles, for a total of 67 man hours, in the Town of Tamworth. Over all, 14 dogs were impounded, 3 bite cases with 3 quarantined dogs, 4 summons issued for nuisances, ie: dogs running at large and barking dogs. There were no confirmed rabid dogs in the Tamworth area during the year.

Many hours are involved in keeping an up dated list of currently licensed dogs, so if found they can be returned to their owners. It is required by law that any dog when outside, wear a collar with current license tag attached. I have heard from many owners that the tags keep coming off: The "S" type hooks that come with the tags apparently are at fault. A tip from the grape vine says that using a round type key ring, sold at the hardware store, keeps tags securely in place.

Yearly licensing will soon be here again, be sure to check your pets rabies expiration date, dog license's expire April 30, 1996. Licenses may be obtain at the Town Hall prior to April 30, 1996. A pet not currently vaccinated, and licensed, in a bite situation could cost \$2,500.00 plus impoundment fees, plus any cost to the town.

Leash Law. The leash law says that an owner shall have control over their dog/dogs at all times. It does not say that their dog/dogs must be leashed at all times. If a dog/dogs is with its owner and the owner calls it and it returns to them they have control over it. The key issue here is that the dog is with the owner, if the owner knowingly allows the dog to run free or leaves the area where the dog is known to be, then the owner is not in control of the dog. A dog off its premises, with no apparent owner present, is in violation.

I would like to thank the citizens of Tamworth for their input and the employees of the Town of Ossipee for their support. I look forward to serving you to the best of my ability in the coming year.

We were fortunate to have Bev Hammond once again volunteer to help us when her work allowed. We are hopeful that we have found another instructor to join us parttime in the summer of 1996.

The help that is offered by both the children, parents and the staff of White Lake State Park continues to make our jobs both a joy and a pleasure. Thank you to all those people and organizations. The support we continue to receive enables us to continue the quality program that has become our trademark.

All of the staff associated with the Tamworth Swim Program are certified in the new programs offered by the Red Cross. We look forward to continuing to serve the children of Tamworth and surrounding communities. From Martha Chandler, Ellen Hamilton and myself, our thanks for your continued support.

Our request for funding this year for the Town of Tamworth is in the amount of \$2900.00. This is an increase of \$100.00 over last year. This amount is increased in anticipation of an additional part time instructor.

REPORT OF THE RECYCLING COMMITTEE

This Committee was appointed by the Selectmen pursuant to the recommendation of the 1995 Master Plan, "to explore all possibilities of recycling and solid waste management solutions." Specific actions may include assuring continuance of the present landfill regulations, reducing the solid waste stream through additional recycling and education, exploring the possibility of a compost facility, improving the recycling facility, and possible regional cooperation. (Master Plan, p.1-3)

Committee members are: Selectmen John Roberts, Chairman; Landfill operator Glenn Johnson; Stephanie Dahl, Jack Leader, Charles Townsend representing the Conservation Commission, and volunteers Walter Upson and Louis Wiesner.

The first tasks were to explore markets for recycled materials, find out how neighboring Towns deal with the problem, visit area schools to see how children are educated about recycling and find out how business firms handle their solid waste. The Committee set up task forces for these purposes.

Markets are available for aluminum cans (the most valuable item), iron and steel ranging from heavy metal through refrigerators and kitchen stoves to steel cans; tires, newspaper, miscellaneous other paper; cardboard; No. 1 and 2 plastic; and glass bottles. Tamworth recycles some of these materials. Except for aluminum the recovery proceeds barely cover the storage and shipping costs of recyclables. }However, recycled waste materials are turned into usable products for less energy cost and less consumption of natural resources than producing those commodities from scratch. In the case of Tamworth recycling also diverts waste from the landfill, thus prolonging its life. For these reasons it is advantageous to our residents and taxpayers to maximize recycling.

The Northeast Resource Recovery Association (NRRRA), a cooperative of various municipalities of which Tamworth is one, arranges some of the marketing and supplies collection and shipping bins, for a fee.

Committee members visited the transfer stations at Madison, Sandwich, and Freedom, which have populations comparable to Tamworth's. All of those Towns have closed and capped their landfills; so they must send all solid waste to other locations. Accordingly, they try to recycle as much as possible, thereby receiving some money, or at least breaking even, and reducing transport charges and tipping fees for nonrecycled trash. Sandwich has the most complete and careful recycling system. Even so, the total costs for solid waste disposal in all three neighboring Towns are considerably greater than Tamworth's.

A Committee member visited the Brett, Bearcamp, and Community Schools. He found that the children were learning about conservation and recycling, including composting, and had a number of projects underway.

Many Tamworth business firms use private contractors to dispose of their waste, and do not use the dump. Some are proud of their recycling programs,

such as Pinetree Power which makes its wood ash available to farmers to spread on their fields. Others, particularly retail stores and some restaurants, do bring waste to the dump; their record of segregating recyclable materials is mixed, as is that of some multi-family dwellings, according to Glenn Johnson. Most citizens are quite conscientious, however.

This Town presently sends to markets for recycling heavy metals and "white goods" (refrigerators, stoves, etc.), tires, aluminum and steel cans, glass bottles, and newspapers. It collects fees from members of the public for the tires and white goods, earning about \$1,350 in 1995. At midyear, with the help of Northeast Resource Recovery, Glenn Johnson introduced a new system for glass bottles, which residents now deposit by color in small bins, after which Glenn does the final sorting and puts the bottles into a compartmented roll-off. That eliminates non-recyclable glass and other contaminants, and produces a product which brings a small revenue. By far the largest source of revenue, however, is aluminum cans, for which over \$2,800 were received in 1995. Glenn has earned praise from NRRRA and the market companies for the cleanliness and freedom from contaminants of the aluminum and glass which he provides.

The gross total cost of solid waste management in Tamworth were approximately \$28,500 in 1995, including the salary of the operator. That was almost \$2,000 above expenditures in 1994. In both years earnings were over \$4,000.

Our system of sorting and selling newspapers is less than ideal. Also, it would be desirable to recycle cardboard, miscellaneous paper, and plastic, all of which add much volume to the landfill now, and all of which are marketable—though prices have been depressed during much of the year. To accomplish this, sorting and storage space which is covered from the elements would be needed. Accordingly, the Committee, after studying the facilities of other communities, prepared plans for a permanent recycling building (drawn by Walter Upson based on the NRRRA model and the structure in Sandwich), and obtained cost estimates from a number of area contractors. The average total was about \$50,000.

It appears, however, that we had put the cart before the horse. Our planning had been based upon two assumptions: (1) that some land in the present dump property, particularly the road, had not been filled with waste and therefore could stand the weight of our structure; and (2) that the State would permit us to put the transfer station on dump property, as Freedom has done. Both of these assumptions are open to question. During the approximately 60 years of the landfill's life no accurate records have been kept of where trash has been dumped and buried. The Selectmen have now contracted with the same company that did a hydrogeological survey in 1987 to do another survey, including drilling at various locations; this can not be done until frost is out of the ground in the spring. Secondly, the State has not ruled on when the landfill must be closed and capped (We think it has several more years of useful life), and on whether a transfer station could be built anywhere on that property.

Accordingly, we have obtained estimates on the cost of buying or renting reconditioned 40-foot shipping containers or trailers, which could be placed near the existing storage boxes and moved later or returned to the vendors as necessary. The costs are reasonable, but would raise the budget, which will already have to be increased by year-round costs of the roll-off for building materials and furniture. Also, Glenn Johnson would probably have to work full-time at the landfill, with a corresponding increase in his salary.

It has been suggested that a composting area for leaves and yard waste be opened, as other Towns have done. This also would extend the life of the landfill, and would make compost available for the Townspeople to pick up.

All these questions and options will be discussed at Town meeting.
