#### **TOWN WARRANT**

### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bow, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Building in said Bow on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, 1969, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot, and the polls shall open for balloting at ten o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before eight o'clock in the evening. The remaining articles of this warrant shall be acted upon at eight o'clock in the evening or at the closing of the polls if the meeting shall vote to keep the polls open to a later hour.

1. To choose by Non-Partisan Ballot the following town officers: \*\*

One Selectman for three years

A Town Treasurer for one year

A Town Clerk for one year

Two members of the Budget Committee for three years

One member of the Budget Committee for two years

One member of the Budget Committee for one year

One Library Trustee for five years

One Library Trustee for three years

One Trustee of Trust Funds for three years

A Sexton for one year

A Police Chief for one year

One Water Commissioner for three years

One Sewer Commissioner for three years

- 2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the Town Accounts.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand ninety-seven dollars and eighteen cents (\$1,097.18) for T. R. A. construction, the State to furnish the amount of seven thousand three hundred fourteen dollars and fifty-six cents (\$7,314.56) to be spent on Robinson Road.\*
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to improve the construction of the public highway known as Bow Center Road and raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand (\$15,000.00) dollars for this purpose, the State to furnish matching funds.\*
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to improve the construction of the public highway known as River Road and raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand (\$15,000.00) dollars for this purpose.\*

8. To see if the Town will vote to improve the construction of the public highway known as Knox Road and raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars for this purpose.\*

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to improve the construction of the public highway known as South Bow Road and raise and appropriate the sum of eighteen thousand five hundred (\$18,500.00) dollars for this purpose.\*
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established for alteration, addition, improvement and acquisition of lands for the Baker Free Library.\*
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Planning Board to instruct the Consultant to complete the Comprehensive Town Plan and raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand five hundred (\$7,500.00) dollars for this purpose.\*
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer surplus funds not to exceed ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purchase of Highway Equipment.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to trade an International tractor for a Loader-Backhoe and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purchase of Highway Equipment, a sum of money not to exceed eight thousand (\$8,000.00) dollars to purchase the same.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund established for the purchase of Highway Equipment, a sum of money not to exceed three thousand three hundred (\$3,300.00) dollars for the purchase of a Body Sander and authorize the Board of Selectmen and Town Engineer to purchase the same.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund for Highway Equipment, a sum of money not to exceed three thousand five hundred (\$3,500.00) dollars for trading a highway truck.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand five hundred (\$8,500.00) dollars for the purchase of a new truck and authorize the Board of Selectmen and Town Engineer to purchase the same.\*
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars to improve the construction of the public highway known as Wood Hill-Hooksett Road.\*
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer surplus funds not to exceed ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund established for Fire Department Equipment.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Fund established for the Fire Department Equipment, the sum of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars for the purchase of a

fire truck, the remaining ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund as voted at Town Meeting on March 12, 1968.

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars to be used by the Conservation Committee for the purchase of lands and other necessary expenses. Funds to the sum of one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars will be given by the Spaulding Foundation if this article is accepted.\*
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to change the organization of the Bow Volunteer Fire Department to a Paid Call Department.
- 22. To hear the reports of standing committees and take any action relating thereto.
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

February 5, 1969

Board of Selectmen Bow, New Hampshire

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Bow for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1968, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

One of the enclosed audits must be given the Town Clerk as part of the permanent records.

#### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Baker Free Library (Regular Account), Baker Free Library (Building Fund Account) and Volunteer Fire Department.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets – December 31, 1967 and December 31, 1968: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1967 and December 31, 1968, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$57,777.44 during 1968 from \$103,898.73 as of December 31, 1967 to \$46,121.29 as of December 31, 1968.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures – Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1968, are presented in

Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$11,123.70, plus a revenue surplus of \$6,653.74, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$17,777.44.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1968, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1968, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1968, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

#### **AUDIT PROCEDURE**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipts and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements submitted by depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

#### GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$17,777.44 during the year from \$11,101.27 to \$28,878.71, as shown herewith:

Disposition of Unexpended Proceeds of Long Term Note Issues Prescribed by R. S. A. 33:3-a:

"If after notes or bonds have been issued and no expenditure of the proceeds has been made for thepurpose or purposes for which the debt was incurred, or if a balance remains after completion of the project or projects for which the debt was authorized — a town — by a vote of two-thirds of the voters present and voting at an annual meeting, may authorize the expenditure of the sum or sums on hand, including any premiums received for any purpose or purposes for which bonds or serial notes may be issued for an equal or longer period of time at any time which said sum or any portion thereof remains available; provided however that if the sum obtained by the issuance of bonds or notes, as aforesaid, or any balance thereof, including any premium, is not appropriated as aforesaid, then the same shall be used to pay the principal of the loan as it matures."

#### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Bow for their assistance during the course of the audit.

#### REPORT OF HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

1968 construction got off to a good start and continued at a good pace all season. The first rebuilding job was a section of the Dunbarton Center Road. This started at Mr. Knauf's house and went seven-tenths of a mile to the Dunbarton line.

The second project was a short section of the Brown Hill Road from Mr. Kirchoff's house to the Dunbarton Center Road.

Then we completed a section of East View Drive, and started on the Robinson Road. The Robinson Road job started at the Knox Road intersection and went two thousand feet toward Route 3A. This was our T.R.A. project for 1968.

The River Road was next. This project eased a very bad curve and was a good one to get done. This job was eight tenths of a mile and went from the intersection of the Old Ferry Road to within a few hundred feet of the railroad Bridge.

Then we moved operations to the Knox Road, and started from the Robinson Road and got as far as the Rapoza house with our excavation, gravel and crushed gravel. This is where snow caught us, and we stopped construction on November 20.

In between the new construction, the highway crew was busy graveling shoulders, sealing and sanding 5 miles of Road. They graveled and surfaced the Putney Road, replaced eleven culverts, sealed and sanded 25 driveways, rebuilt the roads in the Alexander Cemetery, constructed underdrain pipe in ditches on Whiterock Hill Road and Ridgewood Drive, built a new salt shed, and put up a few new road signs which we hope to add to this year. This, in addition to the regular road maintenance, and snow and ice removal, has kept us busy.

The Manchester Paving Company applied the first course of pavement on a section of Whiterock Hill Road. More to be done this year.

It might be of interest to know that all the town roads were measured and the breakdown is as follows:

Total Mileage excluding Rt. 3A - 52.26 miles

Paved Roads – 41.16 miles

Gravel Roads - 11.10 miles

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF BAKER FREE LIBRARY

The trustees and library staff are happy to report the completion of the first year in our new addition and remodeled library. The building was started in June, 1967 and completed in December, 1967. We held open house on December 27, assisted by the Mothers' Club. Many residents of Bow and other friends visited us at this time. The library board decided to increase our hours and these have worked out successfully. They are:

Monday - 2:00 - 8:00 P.M. Wednesday - 2:00 - 6:00 P.M. Friday - 2:00 - 6:00 P.M. Saturday - 2:00 - 5:00 P.M.

This is the winter schedule. The summer is the same with the exception that on Friday we are open 2:00 - 9:00 P.M. and closed Saturdays.

Our circulation has increased by 10,000 over last year. Thirty-six and one-half thousand books piled one on top of each other would make a pile almost 7/10 of a mile high. Quite a pile and that is the amount of books circulated by the library staff this year. On the South Street side we have a book deposit box (looks like a mail box). Into this, there have been returned 3,058 books.

RCA and Columbia gave us about 100 records to start a collection. These are all catalogued and have been in circulation since the last week in September. We hope to increase these. The library also subscribes to 35 magazines, which may be taken out, and are found in the adult reading room.

Early in April we had a reference work-shop for this central district under the leadership of the State Extension Service. A large group came and much useful information was acquired. A conducted tour and explanation of how to use the library was given in October to a nursery school.

Your librarian and Mrs. Fosher of the staff have attended several State Cooperative book buying and Central District Meetings. A few gifts of books have been received, especially from the Bow Garden Club.

As usual, the library staff will have an exhibit at the Community Building on town meeting day. We will have new books on display and will answer any questions about our work. We hope to meet our new residents and greet old friends.

Thanks go to the people of Bow for our fine and modern building. We strive to give you the best of service for this is your library.

#### **BOW PLANNING BOARD**

The past year has again seen your Planning Board put in one of its busiest years. The board conducted over 30 meetings, including public hearings and a special town meeting, covering all aspects of the town's growth. New and larger subdivisions of land for private homes, expansion of existing subdivisions, an influx of industrial development and rezoning of land are the major areas of action that your Planning Board has been confronted with.

As a result of action at last years annual town meeting the Selectmen and Planning Board retained the professional services of Edwards and Kelcey, Inc., a Boston engineering and planning firm, to prepare a Comprehensive Plan and Report for the immediate and distant needs of the town. The first phase of this work, which covers the assembling of various statistical data on many aspects of the town, is nearing completion.

During the coming year, as work progresses on the final phases of this plan and report, the Planning Board will be bringing the proposals and recommendations before the Town through the use of citizens working committees, public informational meetings, and public hearings. Subjects of the report and plan which will require public participation through the above meetings cover a capitol improvement program and projected capital budget, proposed land use, and the implementation of the report by action on updated zoning regulations and zoning map.

Your Planning Board intends to continue coordination of appropriate aspects of the Comprehensive Plan with other Town Officials, agents, commissions and committees, to best work with our professional planner to produce a workable product for the town.

In order to implement the final phases of the plan discussed above, we recommend adoption of our request in the Town Warrant for the appropriation of funds to complete this work.

We wish to thank the residents of the Town for their continued interest and opinions pro and con on these varied issues throughout the past year.

#### CITIZENS COMMITTEE REPORT

Pursuant to Article 22 of the 1968 Town Warrant for the Town of Bow, the Citizens' Committee as appointed by the Moderator, herewith makes its report to the Budget Committee in regards to police needs and police protection.

This report consists of recommendations of the committee, and a proposed budget for 1969, submitted by Police Chief Kenneth Morgan and recommended for approval by this committee.

It is recommended by the committee that:

- 1. The Town adopt the commission form of administration and control for its police department. A separate set of particulars is attached.
- 2. The Town employ on a full time basis, one salaried policeman for evening duty.
- 3. The Town purchase one police cruiser and equip it fully.
- 4. The Town purchase 2 full police uniforms of distinctive identify and design for use by the full time policeman. Additionally, all shields currently being used should be numbered for control purposes if they are to be continued in official use.
- 5. The Town increase the hourly rate for part time policemen to \$2.50 per hour.
- 6. The Town use to the fullest advantage, the results of the Traffic and Highway segment of the survey now being conducted by the Planning Consultant engaged by the Town of Bow. Proper road planning, illumination, and traffic control signs and devices are extremely necessary.
- 7. The Town provide an office space within a Town owned building for use by the Police Chief and his department. This office should be adequately supplied with necssary law books, forms, and cabinets for storage and safekeeping of records and supplies.
- 8. The Chief of Police adopt a formal screening process for appointment of policemen. State and federal agencies will aid in this processing and they should be fully utilized.
- 9. The Chief of Police arrange for complete training of all new appointees to the Police Department and also arrange training schedules for all members of the department. Training should include police procedures, knowledge of laws, firearms use and safety, first aid and other pertinent subjects. Aid from other law enforcement agencies is available and should be used.
- 10. The Chief of Police solicit full cooperation from school authorities to conduct Student Education Programs relative to pedestrian and traffic safety. It is recommended in this behalf that new laws regarding bicycles be formulated to aid in minimizing the possibilities of accidents involving cyclists.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOW VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1968 your Fire Department made 77 runs as follows: Chimney fires 6, Miscellaneous fires 16, Car fires 13, Out of town assists 16, Industiral 2, Resuscitator 3, Dump fires 7, Grass and brush fires 13, and one House fire. Our fire log has increased by 14 runs over last year.

During 1968 the Fire Department sent Glenn Houle to Spruce Pond Camp at Bear Brook for one week. He enjoyed his stay and came back and talked to the firemen about the different things he did there.

Mutual Aid has again played an important part in saving many dollars worth of property both here in Bow and the other towns in the compact.

The new Tanker voted at Town Meeting last year has been ordered and it will be delivered after Town Meeting of this year. The new Tanker will be a 1500 gallon Truck with a 750 gallon per minute front mounted pump. This truck will give us approximately 3,000 Gallons of water which should be sufficient for most fires along with our Mutual Aid Equipment.

As soon as this new piece of Equipment arrives in Town, the people in Town are invited to come in and see it at any time.

Our Training Program progressed very well in 1968 under the supervision of Deputy Chief Roger Ordway. We have plans for more State Instruction as well as our own during 1969.

1st. Deputy Chief Neil Ordway was appointed a Special Deputy Warden for the State Forestry. His job in this capacity will be to assist the State District Chief and also to take over brush fires in his absence if necessary.

Please remember when there isn't any snow on the ground, permits are definitely required and there cannot be any outside burning between the hours of 9 A. M. and 5 P. M.

Remember fire prevention as well as fire suppression is our business. Keep attics and cellars clean. Have a clean chimney and always be on the lookout for fire.

It is your enemy as well as ours.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN & DISTRICT CHIEF

James Goodwin, Warden – Gerald H. Hight, District Chief

People cause fires. Our records show that the number of fires increase in an area as the population increases and our state is growing tremendously. This means that we all must be aware of fire causes and do our best to prevent their occurrence.

When we are very young the lighted matches is an adventure, burnt fingers and a dropped match is another fire. A little older we like to have a woodland cookout, or go out by ourselves for a smoke but fire and forests get together for another statistic. We adults like to clean up in the spring, burn the old debris and the dead grass, result — escaped fires and much personal expense.

With new homes and summer cottages located in woodlands and with abandoned fields and forests crowding the back yard of our villages' streets, it is necessary that everyone be aware all through the fire season, which comes with the disappearance of the snow, of the need to be careful with outdoor fires and fire sources.

The following action will help:

notification of the warden.

- 1. To teach our children the danger of lighted matches.
- 2. To *never* discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn a. You need a written permit from the town fire warden for *all* debris burning except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooking fires in outdoor fireplaces or in charcoal brasiers in your own back yard is permitted on
  - b. The warden is forbidden by regulation to allow burning of household rubbish on grass by householders between 9.00 A. M. and 5.00 P. M.
  - c. Have equipment on hand to control the fire before you light the match.
- 4. Promptly report any fire out of control to your fire warden or fire department.

Help to keep our town out of the fire occurrence column and save your tax dollars for useful purposes.

The Committee was fortunate in securing the services of David Bundy during the summer of 1968 for research work. He prepared a helpful bibliography of old newspapers and their location. He also prepared a cross-indexed card file on references to Bow in the Provincial and State Papers, and in the Concord Daily Monitor from 1864 to 1889.

Richard Hanson has compiled much information on Mills and other businesses in Bow.

Muriel Howard has nearly completed a comprehensive review of Schools and Education in Bow History. We welcome Muriel as a new member of the History Committee.

Members of the Committee conferred several times during the summer, and at a meeting in October, with Mrs. Jewel Smaus, on the clearing, proposed landscaping and marker to be erected on the site of the Meeting House on White Rock Hill by the Christian Science Church.

We are especially grateful to the Baker Free Library for allowing us to meet in the Baker Room, and for providing storage space for our reference material. We also thank all others who have helped in any way.

## The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School District in the town of Bow qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Bow Memorial School in said district on the 14th day of March, 1969, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 2. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 4. To see if the district will authorize the school board to contract with the Concord Union School District and any other school districts for the tuition of Bow pupils in the high school of said district at any amount necessary to provide therefor.
- 5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States, provided such grants do not jeopardize local control of our system.
- 6. To see if the district will elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employees (other than those eligible under the Teachers Retirement System) in the New Hampshire Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 100-A, as inserted by 1967, 134 and as amended and any subsequent amendments thereto.
- 7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-thousand dollars (\$30,000) for the purchase of a tract of land abutting the northerly side of the Bow Memorial school site now owned by the Concord Lumber Company and known as block No. 3, Parcel No. 109 and authorize the school board to complete the purchase of said property.
- 8. To see if the district will appropriate a sum of money for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Memorial School, and to determine whether such appropriation shall be raised by borrowing or otherwise.
- 9. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Bow:

I herewith submit my seventh annual report relative to the Bow Mills School and the Bow Memorial School.

## Building for the Present and the Future

The Bow School Board, Building Committee, administrators and teachers have been engaged in a study to determine the updated curriculum, modern teaching methods, and the related materials and equipment that the schools should provide to insure a meaningful and enriched school experience for the boys and girls of Bow.

The year-long study has been in cooperation with the New England Center for the Study of Instruction Team under the personal direction of Dr. Robert Anderson, Professor of Education, Harvard University, a renowned author and eminent authority in education.

The Bow Building Committee comprised of Carl Smith, Chairman; Mrs. Arthur Gwynne, Secretary; Morris Foote, Richard Hanson, Roy Person, Leonard Wood and the Bow School Board, Mrs. Muriel Howard, Chairman; Richard Nichols and Roy Peaslee employed the services of Warren H. Ashley, A. I. A., Architect; whose work has won him many national awards in the design of schools.

The voters of Bow at the School District Meeting will have an opportunity to approve an addition to the Bow Memorial School. The proposed addition is capable of housing the educational program which has evolved from the year long study and is a building that has the flexibility to accommodate changes in the educational patterns of the forseeable future.

There will be a series of teacher in-service training programs and visitations to schools which have implemented innovative practices and new approaches to education. The New England Center for the Study of Instruction will continue its relationship with the Bow School System during the period prior to entering the new school. It will continue to serve during several years of implementation and continual evaluation of a program designed to permit individualization of instruction for each boy and girl in a school atmosphere that is conducive to learning.

The building program has the approval of the School Board, Building Committee, and administrators as well as the recommendation of the Bow Budget Committee.

With voter approval, construction will be undertaken in the fall of 1969 and completed by September 1970.

#### Music and Art

A combination music and art teacher serves the Bow schools on a full-time

basis in the current school year. Previously part-time teachers were employed. By combining music and art, greater flexibility in the availability of teacher services has been introduced into the program. In addition, the children are participating in art and music to a greater degree than in the past, especially in art classes where they are being exposed to various media and techniques. The school band is showing signs of enthusiastic progress under the direction of Mrs. Bernice M. Morgan, music-art teacher.

## Physical Education

This year the Bow School District employed a full-time physical education instructor, Miss Kathryn Johnson. The response to the physical education program has been gratifying. Children of all grade levels have developed an interest in a variety of athletic endeavors that contribute to the development of their bodies.

Included in available athletic equipment are a trampoline, a vaulting box, punchball, balance beam, mini-tramp, grab-rope, mats and primary physical education apparatus.

The after school intramural program includes basketball for both boys and girls, field hockey for girls, soccer for boys, intramural co-ed volleyball, softball and cheerleading.

The activities in grades 5 through 8 have been instrumental in developing an excellent school spirit.

#### Health Services

The role of the school nurse was expanded this year to make the services of a school nurse available daily. This additional time that the nurse is on duty allows for the implementation of a systematic program of health services by Mrs. Barbara Ward, R. N.

#### Staff

The Bow schools continue to be fortunate in being staffed by qualified and dedicated teachers under the direct supervision of an able principal, John Lyford. Under his leadership, various innovations, techniques and classroom procedures have been introduced.

The addition of a full-time librarian will allow detailed planning for the Resource Center, the nerve center of a modern school. Proper selection of books, reference materials and equipment including teaching machines and the training and orientation of the school staff and the students in the ideal utilization of the Resource Center are among the duties of the librarian in the planning stages of establishing a Resource Center (expanded traditional school library).

### Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Bow School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, which was made by this Division. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1967 and June 30, 1968, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$63,198,39 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures – Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, are presented in Exhibits C & D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$503.93, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$297.28, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$801.21.

Summary Statements of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1968, is indicated in Exhibit F.

### Statement of School Lunch Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the School Lunch Account for the fiscal year is contained in Exhibit G.

### Statement of School Building Fund Account: (Exhibit H)

A statement showing the activity in the Building Fund Account during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, is included in Exhibit H. As shown, the Building Fund Account was closed out during the year.

### Statement of School District Tax Account: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the School District Tax Account with the Town of Bow for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, is presented in Exhibit I. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1968, the School District had received from the Town the total of the 1967-68 School Tax in the amount of \$404,177.16.

### Statement of Bonded Indebtedness: (Exhibit J)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District, as of June 30, 1968, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit J.

### GENERAL COMMENTS

### Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$12,602.82 to \$801.21, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1968, as shown herewith:
