To the Inhabitants of the Town of Canterbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Canterbury on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon (Polls open from 10:00 A. M. to 7:00 P. M.) to act upon the following subjects:

- To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
 Meet at seven of the clock in the evening to act on
 - Meet at seven of the clock in the evening to act on the rest of the articles in the Warrant.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell, lease or otherwise transfer, at public sale, real property acquired by the town by Tax Collector's deed.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract for disposal of the Canterbury portion of the Hannah Dustin Bridge.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to discontinue three portions of Class 5 highway being a part of those highways recently reclassified from Class 2 to Class 5 upon completion of the Hoyt Road Inter-

change and connecting Spur to Route 3 in Boscawen.

Portion 1. Hannah Dustin Drive, so called, from the Canterbury-Boscawen town line in the middle of the Merrimack River Bridge southeasterly a distance of three hundred twenty five feet to a point about one hundred feet southeasterly of the southeasterly abutment of said bridge.

Portion 2. Boyce Road or Penacook Road or sometimes called Canterbury Center Road from the westerly right of way line of the Boston and Maine Railroad easterly about two hundred feet to the westerly right of way line of the Interstate Highway Route 93 about opposite southbound center line station 401 plus 00.

Portion 3. The same Boyce Road however otherwise called from the easterly right of way line of the Interstate Highway Route 93 easterly about fifty feet to the westerly right of way line of the frontage road carrying Boyce Road traffic to the Hoyt Road Interchange.

- 7. To see if the town will vote
 - a. to establish a Capital Reserve Fund of \$7,000 to be taken from cash surplus as authorized by Article 35:1 of the N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated.
 - b. this Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the reconstruction or replacement of the Boscawen-Canterbury Bridge adjacent to the Jordan Farm at such time as the town may authorize the reconstruction or replacement of this bridge.
- 8. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

CLERK'S REPORT OF THE MARCH 10, 1959 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

After certification of the check lists, the ballots were counted and found correct. The meeting was then called to order by the Moderator, Carl A. Thunberg. Then followed the reading of the warrant, budget and certification of posting of the budget, warrant and checklists. At this time it was voted to work under Article 1 of the warrant, namely the election of officers for the ensuing year. It was voted to work under Article 1 until six-thirty o'clock but the polls were not closed until six forty-five o'clock to allow all who wished to vote to do so. Polls were then declared closed, and the votes were counted with the following results.

Selectman for three years Town Clerk for one year Town Treasurer for one year Tax Collector for one year Road Agent for one year Auditors for one year

The items of the Budget were the next order of business and it was voted to consider each item and then accept the whole as amended. The Budget as proposed was for the sum of \$31,973.01. Following are the changes as voted.

It was voted to pay two Auditors \$20.00 each per year for their services, making the Town Officers' Salaries appropriation \$1,440.00.

It was voted to raise the library appropriation \$50.00, making the total library appropriation \$700.00.

The Budget accepted at this time was for the sum of \$32,063.01.

Then followed the articles of the Warrant to be acted upon and as the business of Article 1 was completed, the first article to be considered was Article 2. The results of the voting and action taken on all articles follows:

- Article 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same. Accepted as read, with above changes.
- Article 3 To see if the town will give the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Accepted as read.
- Article 4 To see if the town would authorize the Selectmen to sell, lease or otherwise transfer, at public sale, real property acquired by the town by tax collector's deed. Accepted as read.
- Article 5 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Road Agent instead of having one elected, to take effect at the time of the 1960 March Town Meeting. Rejected.
- Article 6 To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to sell the observation post to the highest bidder. Voted to give the observation post to the Civil Defense Organization.

- Article 7 To see if the town would vote to abolish the Zoning and Building Organization and and General Regulations now in effect. (By Petition). After much discussion this article was defeated.
- Article 8 To see if the town would adopt the amendments to the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board and appended with this report. Amendments B, C, F, and G accepted as read. Amendment A to be included with Amendment E for further changes which are as follows. Section II, Amendment E. The Administrative Authority (shall waive) in place of (may waive). In Amendment D, strike out the word, mortared. The above is found in Section 3 of the Amendments.
- Article 9 To see if the Town will vote to accept, at no cost to the town for the Canterbury Unit of Civil Defense, a truck to be used as a Rescue Unit in the Canterbury Civil Defense Organization under the jurisdiction of the Canterbury Volunteer Fire Department, and upon granting this request to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred twenty-five dollars (\$125.00) to insure said truck and cover any other liabilities which may occur. This money to be raised in the name of the Canterbury Civil Defense appropriation (By Petition). Article accepted after it was voted to strike out the words "under the jurisdiction of the Canterbury Volunteer Fire Department".

Article 10 To see if the town will vote to change the terms of office of the Town Auditors from concurrent one year terms to staggered two year terms, with one Auditor elected in March 1960 to serve a one year term, the other Auditor elected in March 1960 and all subsequently elected Auditors to serve a two year term. Accepted as read.

Article 11 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Total amount of Budget items and Warrant Articles, \$32,188.01.

Selectmen report no progress on bridge leading from Canterbury to upper Boscawen.

SELECTMEN'S LETTER

There are many items of business we would like to discuss in this report. However, the problem of the Canterbury-Boscawen Bridge is so demanding of action it deserves our undivided attention.

Your selectmen have been actively investigating the problems surrounding the bridge for the past one and one-half years. The following statements sum up our conclusions and recommendations at this time.

* We believe that the bridge is necessary to the livelihood and convenience of Canterbury residents.

* After consulting with Bridge Division engineers in the State Highway Department it does not appear practical (probably impossible) to repair the present bridge.

* It appears that a practical solution within Canterbury's means may be worked out although at present we have nothing on paper.

** It is our recommendation that the Town of Canterbury set aside the 1959 cash surplus (see Article 7 in warrant) in a special reserve fund to be used for the replacement of this bridge if a realistic solution to this problem, acceptable to the town, can be worked out.

The cash surplus mentioned was an unexpected "windfall" from taxes assessed on highway construction equipment on the expressway. This source of revenue will probably not be available in 1960. It seems logical to set these monies aside, for a major capital expenditure such as a bridge.

Your consideration of this problem will be appreciated.

REPORT OF THE CANTERBURY PLANNING BOARD

Your Planning Board has been working on several projects during the past year, at least a few of which we are pleased to report have been completed.

Aided immeasurably by the generous contributions of time, effort and artistic skill from fellow-townsman James Lilly we were able to publish a Canterbury pamphlet of quality which we hope is appropriate to its subject matter. The primary purpose of the pamphlet is to promote interest in Canterbury as a place to live. Accordingly it has been distributed to real estate agents; state, regional and local development associations and also motels. An abundant supply of the pamphlets has been printed. Anyone desiring copies may obtain them through any member of the Planning Board.

Another project closely related to the pamplet in purpose and scope is that of inventorying available real estate. It is not the intention of the Board to compete with real estate agents but rather to help them in finding out what property might be on the market. In the past real estate agents who might otherwise be interested in promoting Canterbury property have been discouraged by the difficulty of searching out willing sellers. If you have real estate for sale and you think this function of the Planning Board is worthwhile, please do not hesitate to inform any member of the Board of your situation.

Other projects on which the Board is currently working include the following:

1. Formulating a long range plan for public lands and buildings at the Center. Needless to say the Board

has no power to commit the town to any plan. Rather, the intention is to explore in advance various possibilities, their relative advantages and disadvantages so that when the time comes for decisions to be made, the necessary information will be ready.

- 2. Formulation of a long range plan for road building and improvement.
- 3. Exploration of the possibilities for potential public facilities for swimming, skating and other forms of recreation.

The Board considers it desirable that as many board meetings as possible be open to the public so that it may benefit from the views of interested townspeople on the subjects mentioned above and any others which may warrant consideration. Several such open meetings are planned for the coming year. Please come.

REPORT OF THE CANTERBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT, INC.

The number of fires in Canterbury during 1959 was 18, four more than in 1958. These fires consisted of three house fires, six brush fires, three chimney fires, one call out of town to a house fire, one controlled fire, one car fire, one tractor fire, one fire at the Town Dump and one fire set by pranksters.

Up until this year Canterbury has been very fortunate in having few fires with small losses. However, 1959 seems to indicate that the trend is in the other direction.

The three house fires were each a total loss. The home of Owen Burtt on Route 106 was destroyed on March 1. On March 28 the Orvis Fife residence in the center of town burned. The third house fire on August 8 was at the home of Paul Scripture. These three fires represented considerable loss to the owners and considerable loss of taxable property.

The six brush fires were for the most part, easily handled except for two of them. A railroad fire along Canterbury curve proved quite stubborn and one at Hill's Corners at the Barney residence nearly took the buildings. The end of the barn started to burn but Engine No. 1 from the Department arrived in time.

Each year someone thinks it cute to set off the Town Dump. I only hope that a fire similar to the Canterbury Depot fire of a number of years ago is not caused by such a stunt. The fire started by pranksters to intimidate a family is not only inexcusable but is not our way of living here in Canterbury. Public indignation is the only way such things can be overcome.

It is my sincere hope that 1960 will show a better score, though the start is not very good. Only all of us together, by exercising proper fire habits and proper care around our homes can keep fire losses at a minimum. The Department will come any time, day or night, if you call them. We will do our level best to give you good fire protection. Please do your best too.

CIVIL DEFENSE

The progress of this group was hindered by the loss of its two leaders. However, the present members feel that they would like to further this project in the coming year.

PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note -58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners. 10%, or one out of every 9 fires were caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually causes these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fire would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles—use your ash tray.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, Parents and Voters:

Education

The people of Canterbury have always insisted on the best education the community could afford since the first school appropriation in 1762. Canterbury pupils have excelled in high schools and colleges during all the years from the graduation of William Rolfe from Dartmouth College in 1797.

The people of Canterbury were delighted when news came that Rebecca Hildreth, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lucien Hildreth, and a product of the Canterbury educational system, was first in the graduating class at Concord High School in 1959. Canterbury grade school graduates have been very successful in the high schools of Concord, Penacook, Belmont, and Tilton-Northfield, and all the headmasters have stated that the Canterbury pupils were well-prepared for the high school curricular activities.

Some Standard Test Results

It is apparent that the pupils of Grades 7 and 8 last year were being well-prepared to maintain the record of no failures in high school of their predecessors by their results on the 1959 tests.

Grade 8 had a class average of 10.1 in reading against a national average of 8.6 on the Stanford Achievement. This means, briefly, that the pupils were able to read on a tenth grade level, on the average, when they finished the eighth grade.

Grade 7 last year on the same test produced a class average of 9.1 in contrast to a national average of 7.6. Like the eighth grade, they were reading on the aver-

age of a ninth grade level, or two years ahead of what should be expected.

Education Now and Then

Education today is completely changed from the requirements of early days of this country, since it must advance with civilization. The greatest progress lies in the fields of mathematics and science, with foreign languages and social science close behind. Vocational education must be developed for the many families living near industrial centers, since many will work in mills and farm on a part-time basis. This means that elementary schools must lay the basis for the education that high schools will furnish for training for industry, business, the professions, agriculture full-time or part-time, and for the home preparation.

The graduates of elementary schools and high schools a generation ago were limited to a very basic education. The pupils today must have the basic plus all the information and understanding available on atomic fission, automation, guided missiles, sound barriers, jet airliners, color television, space travel, new home and farm appliances, solar energy, the problem of population growth, the rise of nationalism in Asia and Africa, and atomic submarines.

The struggle between Democracy and Communism has been very acute since 1945, and every American school from the first grade through college must see that all the graduates or school drop-outs must be dedicated to preserving American freedom and its democratic principles.

National Defense Education Act of 1958

The federal government passed this act to improve science, mathematics, and foreign language education in the elementary schools, the high schools and the colleges. It is part of the general system to upgrade all American education to compete with foreign competition. Every community should use these funds to im-

prove their elementary schools so that graduates will be prepared to meet the new progress that will be made in all high schools.

The funds that have been assigned to Canterbury for the purchase of equipment, materials and minor remodelling include federal funds of \$198.56 for the 1958-1959 year and \$210.97 for the 1959-1960 year. This totals federal funds of \$409.53 which must be used before July 1, 1960. Canterbury would have to expend approximately \$800 to receive the government fifty per-cent aid of \$400.

It is hoped that Canterbury can use these funds to gain a real impetus in science education, with added aid for mathematics and eventually, foreign languages.

Some Objectives Ahead

These may be some of the objectives which will concern Canterbury in the years ahead:

- (1) Continued increases in teacher salaries so that the best teachers can be obtained for any vacancies.
- (2) Most of the old seating has been replaced with modern pupil seating equipment, and this can be completed very soon.
- (3) One man-teacher eventually would help to meet the problem of playground recreation, guidance, pupil supervision of rest rooms and the playground, and advanced science teaching.
- (4) A school lunch program with adequate equipment to complete the present school milk program.
- (5) Real facilities for science, and the introduction of industrial arts and home economics.
- (6) Art instruction in all the grades.
- (7) A new television set for the educational programs available in science, history, mathematics, and social studies from Channel 11.
- (8) A real visual education program with modern motion picture equipment and projectors, to use the excellent educational films being used at low cost from the University of New Hampshire by a heavy percentage of schools.
