#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

This has been our first year with the new Zoning Regulations and on the whole the Selectmen have found that they have worked very well. In order to protect the interests of those property owners who were in a non-conforming situation prior to the passage of the new Regulations, and to clarify certain areas of the regulations, the Selectmen requested the Planning Board to make some changes in the Zoning Regulations. The Planning Board accepted the suggestions and have placed several amendments in the Warrant for approval by the voters. These amendments are to be found in succeeding pages of this book.

Although most of the July 4, 1973 flood repair work was done in 1973, a considerable amount had still to be finished before the July 11, 1974 completion deadline for eligibility for federal funds. The work was completed in time. A detailed report can be found among the Highway reports in this book. A considerable part of the Selectmen's time during the summer went into making a detailed and accurate accounting of flood expenditures for the State Disaster Agency and the Federal Government. Acceptance of this accounting governed the town's eligibility for Federal Disaster Funds.

Cornish's accounts were audited by the State in late 1974, and by the Federal auditors in January 1975. The accounts were found to be completely satisfactory and were approved. A check for the balance of the Federal Funds for which the Town is eligible should be received in about a month.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed 23,000.00 including interest for a new truck and plow frames to replace the Diamond T. The purchase price to be financed over a period of 5 years; bids to be let out after advertising for 10 days; bids to be opened publicly at Selectmen's Office; the Selectmen to reserve the right to accept or reject any or all bids.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 to assure ambulance service for the Town of Cornish; and to see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of the above amount from the

Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund, under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, of \$4,000.00 to make payment on the note due on December 15, 1975 on the New Fire Truck loan, as a set-off against this debt service incurred for "priority expenditures" since January 1, 1972.

8. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.

9. To see if the Town will vote to assign the \$500.00, raised in Article 9 of the 1973 Warrant, to the Tax Map Fund, and instruct the Selectmen to make application to the Department of Revenue Administration for a revaluation of the whole Town before the year 1980.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$410.00 to cover one half of the group Blue Cross-Blue Shield single memberships of the permanent help in the Highway Department.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to pay for the preservation of the collection of personal and public papers of Revolutionary War General Jonathan Chase.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the refinishing of the Library floors.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to help make "Wheels Around Windsor" available to service citizens of Cornish.

14. To see if the Town will vote to approve the construction and operation of a Bleached Kraft Pulp Mill as proposed by Parsons and Whittemore, Inc., conditioned upon compliance with all State and Federal environmental standards.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,400.00 for the projects of the Cornish Bicentennial Commission.

16. By request. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 towards the expense of removing snow at the Mt. Ascutney Hospital and Health Center.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$887.00 for membership in the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council.

18. To see what instruction the people of Cornish wish to give the Selectmen as to the use and preservation of the Cornish Town Hall.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

20. By request. To see if the Town of Cornish will consider taking over the maintenance of Beechwood Drive in Beechwood Acres.

21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept aid from any and all agencies, both State and Federal, relative to disasters which may occur during the ensuing year and until the Annual Town Meeting in 1976, and to expend funds so received to repair and restore damaged municipal properties and to alleviate disorders resulting from such disasters.

22. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell or otherwise administer property acquired through tax sales.

23. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

24. To hear the reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### Amendment #1

Article IV, Paragraph O, Driveway and Woodroad Construction, is changed to read as follows:

#### O. Driveway and Woodroad Construction

The juncture of any new driveway or woodroad with a Town right-of-way must be constructed in a manner consistent with safe vehicular travel and the prevention of damage by soil erosion. Prior to connecting any driveway or woodroad to a Town right-of-way, the landowner shall apply for a permit from the Selectmen. Before issuing a permit the Selectmen shall determine that the proposed juncture does not create a traffic hazard or an unacceptable risk of damage through erosion.

#### Amendment #2

Article VI, Nonconforming Structures or Uses, is changed to read as follows:

#### Article VI - Nonconforming Structures, Uses or Lots

Any nonconforming structure or use or lot existing on the effective date of this Ordinance may be continued, except that:

- 1. A nonconforming structure or use may not be changed to a different nonconforming structure or use.
- 2. A nonconforming structure or use may be altered provided the structure is not substantially enlarged or the use substantially extended.
- 3. A nonconforming structure may be replaced by a nonconforming structure provided the replacement is of the same general size and character as the original structure.
- 4. A nonconforming structure or use which has been abandoned or discontinued for one year may not be re-established unless such structure or use is made to conform to the requirements of this Ordinance.
- 5. A lot of land in existence as of the effective date of this Ordinance which does not meet the frontage and area requirements of this Ordinance need not comply with such frontage and area requirements.

The last sentence of Paragraph D, 3 of Article V is deleted in order to remove an inconsistency with No. 5 paragraph above.

#### Amendment #3

Article IV, A, the following definitions are added:

Flood - Inundation from rising waters or from the overflow of streams, rivers, or other bodies of water, or other severe storms or deluge.

- Flood Plain The area of land lower in elevation than the land-water boundary along a watercourse or other body of water flowing at its 100 year frequency and/or those soils classified by the National Cooperative Soil Survey as "soils subject to flooding".
- Flood Proofing A combination of structural changes and adjustments to properties subject to flooding primarily for the reduction or elimination of flood damages.
  - In Article V, the first paragraph is changed to read as follows:
    - **Note:** The information in Section A pertaining to Flood Plain pertains to all zones.

#### A. Conservation District (Zone C)

The following regulations apply to the C Districts. They are mainly districts of steeply sloped forest, wet lands, flood plains and other lands whose soil types and geography render them generally unsuitable for human habitation. The precise boundaries of this district shall be determined in each particular case by the Planning Board in consultation with the Conservation Commission on the basis of large scale and detailed maps of the particular area involved in the case. Such maps to be furnished by the applicant.

These amendments will become effective immediately following their passage at the March, 1975, Town Meeting.

#### **CORNISH TOWN MEETING OF MARCH 5, 1974**

Town meeting opened at 10:00 a.m. promptly, with reading of first three articles of the Town Warrant by Moderator Peter H. Burling. Polls were then opened.

At 1:00 p.m. the afternoon business session was opened with the flag salute led by Hollis J. Boardman, Sr., and prayer offered by Rev. James Link. Articles 4 through 28 were read by the moderator. Article 4

(a) Motion made and seconded by Daniel Poor and Mrs. Beverly Widger that the eighth graders may attend town meeting and speak if they so desire. This was agreed upon by the townspeople and so voted. Jim McSwain moved, Ruth Rollins seconded, that we handle each item under Art. 4 separately. This was voted on, in the affirmative. Ed Lawrence moved that the town raise and appropriate \$7,000.00 for town officers' salaries, seconded by Myron Quimby, and this was so voted.

(b) Hollis Boardman, Sr., seconded by Whit Littell, moved that we raise and appropriate \$3,250.00 for town officers' expenses. This was voted on. in the affirmative.

(c) (Election and Registration Expense) Myron Quimby, seconded by Paul Rollins, moved that we raise and appropriate \$1,400.00 under this article. So voted by town.

(d) A motion was made by Fred Sullivan, supported by Pete Decatur, that we raise and appropriate \$4,500.00 for Town Hall and other town buildings. So voted.

(e) Herbert Reed moved, Andrew Kuhre seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for Employees' Retirement and Social Security. As there was no discussion, a vote was taken and motion was passed.

(f) Whit Littell moved, seconded by Robert Widger, to raise and appropriate a sum of 1,500.00 for the Police Dept., which was voted on in the affirmative.

(g) Helen Link moved, Pete Decatur seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate \$3,900.00 for the Fire Dept. This was put to a vote and unanimously voted on in favor.

(h) Whit Littell moved, Myron Quimby supported, a motion to raise and appropriate \$1,700.00 for Insurance. This was so voted.

(i) Hollis Boardman moved, Herbert Reed seconded, a motion to raise and appropriate \$350.00 for Planning and Zoning. This was voted in the affirmative.

(j) Jill Edson made a motion to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for Damages and Legal Expenses, supported by Whit Littell, and this was so voted.

(k) Ed Lawrence moved, James Lukash supported, to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for dog tags, licenses, and other items that make up the cost of dogs. This was voted on in the affirmative.

(1) Danny Hilliard moved, supported by Helen Link, to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for use of the Health Dept. This was so voted.

(m) Hollis Boardman moved that we raise and appropriate \$150.00 for Vital Statistics. Dorothy Colburn seconded his motion. Question was asked why \$150.00 instead of \$50.00 and Mr. Boardman explained it was because the Town Clerk had failed to submit her bill, for Vital Statistics the last two years. Motion was then passed by vote.

(n) It was moved and supported by Mary Brown and Polly Rand that the Town raise and appropriate \$100.00 for the Visiting Nurse Association of Windsor. This was so voted.

(o) Donald Monroe moved that the Town raise and appropriate a sum of \$2,000.00 for the Town Dump. This motion was seconded by Pete Decatur. There was some discussion on what was being done toward the time when we are forced to have the land-fill system. Motion was brought to a vote, and was a vote in the affirmative.

(p) Ed Lawrence moved we raise and appropriate the sum of \$52,200.00 for town maintenance of highways and bridges. Andrew Kuhre supported this motion. Discussion. Robert Bayliss moved an amendment that the town vote to raise and appropriate \$52,000.00, which is to include a grant

from the state in subsidy money of \$16,125.63. This amendment was seconded by Hollis Boardman, and so voted. Then the main motion, with amendment, was voted on, in the affirmative.

(q) Pete Decatur and Kenneth Lord moved that \$250.00 be raised and appropriated for street lighting, which was approved by vote.

(r) Bob LaClair moved, and Myron Kuhre supported, the motion to raise and appropriate \$1,148.28 for Town Road Aid. It was explained that \$8,803.75 was available of TRA and Duncan Fund money, but had not been spent because of the July flood. The motion was then voted on, in the affirmative.

(s) \$1,500.00 was a sum to be raised and appropriated per motion of Hollis Boardman seconded by Whit Littell, for the George H. Stowell Library. When an inquiry was expressed on how the library could spend more than was appropriated, Irene LaClair answered that some money came from a Library Trust Fund. The motion as above stated was then passed by a voice vote.

(t) Mary Brown, seconded by Helen Littell, moved that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for Public Welfare. This was so passed by vote.

(u) \$50.00 is to be raised and appropriated for Memorial Day, per motions of Henry Eberhardt and Ruth Rollins, which was approved by vote of the town.

(v) Mary Brown moved, seconded by Barbara Rawson, to raise and appropriate \$1,600.00 for Cemeteries. A question on the small overdraft of last year was inquired, with the explanation that a new tractor for mowing cemeteries was purchased, but this, hopefully, would not be necessary this year. The motion was voted on and passed.

(w,x,y) Ed Lawrence moved, Barbara Rawson supported, that the town vote on w, x, and y together, and in so doing, that we raise and appropriate the total sum of 9,000.00 (6,000.00 on Principal and Long Term Notes, and 2,000.00 for Interest on Temporary Loans). This was voted on in the affirmative.

(z) Michael Yatsevitch, seconded by Herbert Reed, moved that the town raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for Capital Reserve Fund for Highway. This was voted on, in favor.

(z1) Myron Kuhre moved, Pete Decatur seconded, to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Dept. This motion was voted on, in the affirmative.

(Z2) J. T. McSwain made a motion that the town raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for Capital Reserve Fund for Conservation Commission, which was seconded by Jerry Smith and voted on, in favor.

(Z3) J. T. McSwain moved, Lewis Gage supported, that the town raise and appropriate a sum of \$1,000.00 for the Capital Reserve Fund for Tax Map. This was so voted by the town. (Z4) Ed Lawrence moved that we raise and appropriate the necessary amount for County Taxes, supported by Myron Kuhre and so voted.

#### Article 5

Donald Monroe moved, Mary Brown supported, a motion that the Town vote to purchase a Payloader, Model #60B, Serial No. 02404, with 2-vd. bucket, for the sum of \$28,995.00; \$3,995.00 of the purchase price to come from the Capital Reserve Fund, and the balance of \$25,000.00 to be raised and appropriated and financed by notes over a period of five years. Following general discussion, Robert LaClair made a motion for an amendment as follows: To see if the town will vote to purchase a loader with cab and equipment, the town needs, for a sum of \$28,995.00 or less. The sum of \$25,000.00 to be raised and appropriated and financed by notes over a period of five years; the balance to be taken out of the Capital Reserve Fund. Bids to be let after advertising for 10 days; bids to be opened publicly at the Selectmen's Office. The Selectmen to have the right to accept or reject any bid that is in the interest of the Town. Herbert Reed supported this amendment. It was discussed, then brought to a vote, and passed. Then the main motion, with amendment, was voted on, and the town voted unanimously in favor.

#### Article 6

Arnold Wilkie moved, Ed Lawrence seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 to assure ambulance service for the Town of Cornish, and to authorize the withdrawal of such amount from Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. Hollis Boardman amended the motion to read: . . . to assure the provision of ambulance service for the Town of Cornish by the Windsor Vt. Ambulance Service. The amendment was passed by vote of the town. Then Article 6 as amended was voted on, in the affirmative.

#### Article 7

Clara Weld and Dale Rook moved and seconded that the town withdraw from the Revenue Sharing Fund, under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, of \$4,000.00 to make payment on the note due on December 15, 1974 on the new Fire Truck loan, as a set-off against this debt service incurred for "priority expenditures" since January 1, 1972. After very little discussion this motion was voted on, in the affirmative.

#### Article 8

James T. McSwain seconded motion of Hollis J. Boardman that the town authorize the withdrawal of the balance of the town's Revenue Sharing Fund from the Revenue Sharing Fund Account established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, in the amount of \$2,764.76. Also that such funds shall be expended for the general upkeep, repair, and painting of the town's bridges, as the Selectmen shall direct. A question: "Would the Mill Village bridge be fixed", was answered to: "If the Selectmen wish to use it for that". Motion voted on, as no more discussion, and motion was passed.

#### Article 9

Fred Sullivan moved, John Rand seconded, that the town raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$500.00 to bring the town's valuation up to 100%. Discussion held, bringing out the fact that if this is done, the state will not have to come in and reassess our property. The motion was voted on, in favor.

### Article 10

Whit and Helen Littell moved that we accept the article - to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for the printing of the 4th edition of the town history. Discussion. The committee, headed by Hugh Wade, reported they are bringing all important facts from 1763 up to 1974, including those from Childs' Vol. I and II, plus Vol. III, summarizing them. A letter will be sent out soon to bring geneologies of present Cornish people up to date. Clara Weld said the Historical Committee, especially Hugh Wade, should have our deep appreciation for all the hours of work put into this important project. The motion was voted on, and was passed.

#### Article 11

James Lukash made a motion, supported by Dale Rook, that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing 12 fire coats, 6 pair fire boots, and 6 fire helmets for use of the Cornish Fire Dept. for the safety of the Cornish firemen. As there was no discussion, the motion was put to a vote and passed, unanimously.

#### Article 12

James T. McSwain moved that the town authorize the Selectmen to appoint a highway agent in accordance with the provisions of RSA 245:6 in lieu of electing such highway agent. This was seconded by Betty Macy. Paul Tewksbury, supported by Robert Bayliss, moved to vote on above motion by paper ballot, after discussion. Motion passed. Original motion voted: yes - 46; no - 116. It was voted against.

#### Article 13

Polly Monette moved to pass over the article, seconded by Whit Littell. The article stated that the "Planning Board to cease accepting commercial sub-division applications of more than two lots, and granting commercial sub-division permits of more than two lots until a town plan is approved by the voters". This was put to a vote by showing of hands. Voted approval to pass over, by two-thirds.

#### Article 14

Jerry Smith moved, Chris Tilghman supported, the motion that the town prohibit the use of herbicides by the town, its officers or designated agencies or employees, in town maintenance programs on Town Roads and Town Properties. This was put to a vote: yes - 67; no - 81. Motion was turned down.

#### Article 15

Clara Weld made a motion, Whit Littell supported, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$137.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association. Jerry

Smith spoke against this motion. Clara Weld spoke in favor, and told some of the advantages of supporting this with this small amount. It was then voted on: yes - 76; no - 44. Motion passed.

#### Article 16

Jerry Smith and Bill Gallagher moved and seconded to pass over this article-to become a member of the regional planning commission, now organized and named the Upper Valley Planning and Development Council, and to appropriate the sum of \$764.00 as the town's share of the annual operating expenses of the regional planning commission, to be used in conjunction with other State and Federal funds available for planning purposes. This was voted on: yes - 44; no - 86. Article was not passed over. Polly Monette then moved, and Frederic Kingsley seconded, to adopt the above article, and raise and appropriate \$764.00 as Cornish's share. This was voted on: yes - 103; no - 24. Article 16 was passed.

#### Article 17

Jim Lukash and Ed Lawrence moved and seconded that Cornish vote to instruct the selectmen to join the Ambulance District B-1. It was then explained that this would not be contradictory to our association with the Windsor Ambulance Co. This was voted on, in the affirmative.

#### Article 18

Ruth Rollins moved, Dale Rook seconded, that the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 55:9a and 55:9b which would give the Town Clerk all the powers and duties of city clerks as provided in RSA 55:9a and RSA 55:9b. Bernice Johnson explained this would give her the power to register residents for voting, under the Supervisors of the Check List, and would give local residents more opportunity to get their names on the Check List as the Town Clerk has hours each week while Supervisors meet generally only three times before each election for this purpose. This motion was put to a vote, and passed.

#### Article 19

Mrs. Dorothy Colburn moved, Jerry Smith seconded, a motion to adopt this article authorizing the Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept aid from any and all agencies, both State and Federal, relative to disasters which may occur during the ensuing year and until the Annual Town Meeting in 1975, and to expend funds so received to repair and restore damaged municipal properties and to alleviate disorders resulting from such disasters. This was voted on, in favor.

#### Article 20

Hollis Boardman moved that the town raise and appropriate \$500.00 to fence the Edminister Cemetery addition, seconded by Barbara Rawson. This was, it was explained, to keep cows out of the cemetery. Motion was voted on, in the affirmative.

#### Article 21

George Edson moved, Selma Lovejoy seconded, a motion to discontinue the road leading from the George Edson residence to the Center Road. Bill Gallagher moved an amendment, seconded by Jerry Smith, that this road be closed subject to gates and bars. After further discussion the amendment was withdrawn by both parties. George Edson explained the condition of the road. Motion was voted on. against, thus not passing.

#### Article 22

Ed Bourne II and Merilynn Bourne moved and seconded to pass over the article to open the Deming Road leading to the residence of Edward A. Bourne II from the sugar house to approximately 900 feet. A letter from the town counsel explaining the situation was read by the moderator. By vote the article was passed over.

#### Article 23

Jim Lukash moved. Kenneth Lord seconded, that the town set aside Class VI roads (publicly owned and non-maintained) for bridle paths and hiking. A lengthy discussion was held, with ideas expressed for and against the article. It was finally brought to a vote but was not adopted.

#### Article 24

Jim Lukash moved, seconded by Henry Eberhardt, that the town declare Lang and Whitten Roads as Scenic Roads. for the purposes set out in the New Hampshire revised statutes. Discussion followed, which resulted in Lang and Whitten Roads being voted as scenic.

#### Article 25

Mrs. Dorothy Colburn moved, John Rand supported, motion that the town instruct the selectmen to sell or otherwise administer property acquired through tax sales. This was so voted.

#### Article 26

Donald Monroe moved, seconded by Selma Lovejoy, that the town vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money if necessary, in anticipation of taxes. The motion was carried by favorable vote.

#### Article 27

Clara Weld moved that we accept all reports as printed, seconded by Paul Tewksbury. This was so voted.

John Rand and Jim Lukash recommended that the Recreation Committee have a report of its year's activities in the Annual Report, after Ed Lawrence announced there was no report from this committee, and that there had been poor attendance at meetings throughout the year.

John Dryfhout reported for the Conservation Commission and recommended that the selectmen put figures into the Town Report, even if the Commission fails to do so.

Clara Weld spoke on land use, as her property is, in relation to the Planning Board's ordinance.

Fred Sullivan spoke for the Dump Committee on Land Fill, which also includes Micolaas Leyds and James McSwain.

Ed Lawrence moved, Barabara Rawson seconded, that the Moderator appoint six interested persons to the Recreation Committee. This was so voted.

#### Article 28

Nominations were opened for Fence Viewers, which was pointed out. could be an important committee. The same committee of: Fred Sullivan.

Ed Lawrence and Katherine Kibbie were nominated by Jim Lukash and were elected by vote.

Nominations were called for, for Surveyors of Wood, Bark and Lumber: Barbara Rawson nominated Lionel Tracy, Jesse Stone, Jerry Smith and Fred Weld to all serve again. This was so voted and the four were elected to office.

1974 Hog Reeves: Donald Powers, Max Jewell, Dale Braley, Jim McSwain, Jr., Merilynn Bourne, Jim Lukash, Polly Rand, Samuel Kaymen, Robert Widger and Peter Burling were nominated and all elected by vote of the town.

Herbert Reed moved that the business part of the meeting be recessed, which was supported and passed. Polls were closed at 7:00 p.m. Ballots were counted by two groups, supervised by the moderator.

Of the 699 on the Check List, 454 voted. Elected were: For Selectman -Fred C. Sullivan with 300 votes; for Town Clerk - Bernice F. Johnson with 443 votes; for Town Treasurer - David A. Bevan, 263 votes; Tax Collector - Carol F. Fitch, 445 votes; Auditor - Eben A. Farnsworth with 427 votes; Library Trustee, Virginia A. Gage with 397 votes; Trustee of Trust funds - Fred Sullivan, 251 votes; Constables, Paul H. LaClair, 370 votes and Dale R. Braley with 266; Overseer of Public Welfare - William B. Tracy - 283 votes; Highway Agent -Robert C. LaClair with 200 votes; for Sexton - Ellsworth H. Atwood, 277 votes; and for Constitutional Convention - G. Alvan Barrus with 281 votes. The vote on Zoning was yes - 230, no - 219, blank - 4. The Zoning Ordinance was accepted.

Hollis J. Boardman moved the Town Meeting be adjourned at 10:20 p.m., supported by Myron Quimby.

The Friends of the Library have been very active in the past year. They have sponsored many projects to raise money for renovating half of the Library basement into a useable room.

We appreciate the support of the Friends of the Library and other interested residents.

The Library is open Wednesday afternoons from 3 to 8 p.m.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT 1974

The year 1974 found the Fire Department responding to twenty fire calls and three smoke investigations. There were several training drills and a school was held on pumping with nine attending the course. A mutual aid system has been arranged with the Meriden and Plainfield Fire Departments. The three towns will assist each other on all structual fires, with no charge.

Seven women were accepted into the department this year. The lady firefighters are primarily for day time fires, when very few men are available. These ladies are attending the drills and schools.

Fire prevention week found the department again working with the school children in hopes of making them aware of the seriousness of fire.

The Ladies Auxiliary held a door to door fund drive to raise money toward the purchase of new fire hose. \$1028.85 was collected. 1500 feet of new hose was purchased at a cost of \$1660.00. \$160.00 was taken from the budget and the Auxiliary also gave the amount of \$471.15 toward the hose. The Auxiliary also purchased the department with fifteen pairs of boots costing \$420.00

The Fire Department bought two used two-way radios for the fire trucks for \$500.00. They also spend about \$500.00 on the Parsonage Road station. This is from monies earned by the firemen themselves. 12 coats, 6 helmets and 6 pairs of boots were purchased with the money allocated at last years town meeting.

May I take this opportunity to thank the people of Cornish and the Ladies Auxiliary for the new hose acquired by the Dept. It is greatly appreciated. A Fire Department can only be as efficient as the equipment it possesses.

## **REPORT TO TOWNS**

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

#### **CORNISH PLANNING BOARD**

### ANNUAL REPORT-March 1974-March 1975

The Planning Board has met every month for the regular meetings with several executive sessions held throughout the year.

The Board had 14 minor subdivisions before them in 1974. 13 were granted and the other is still pending.

Two major subdivisions were presented. One was withdrawn by the owner. The other "Cornish Heights", located on Route 12-A, is nearing final stages. The Board has met at least 6 times a month on this project, since it was presented in August.

In March of 1974 the new Zoning Ordinance was passed by the voters of the Town.

The County Engineer has been a valuable assistance to the Board. The Board was represented at the Flood Analysis Study with Plainfield Town Officials. Cornish plans to enter this study, in conjunction with Plainfield.

In November the Selectmen approached the Board for amending the Town Zoning Ordinance. The amendments will be presented to the voters at the March Town Meeting.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CORNISH CONSERVATION COMMISSION FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1974

The Zoning proposal prepared by the Planning Board assisted by The Conservation Commission was adopted by the Town at the 1974 Annual Meeting.

Environmental Engineer, Leon Geil, hired by Sullivan County this year, reported that he had met with local Cornish agencies and individuals in over twenty-three meetings, primarily with the Planning Board, as well as property owners and their surveyors, and the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

After a session with Mr. Bruce Bateman, County Forester, the Conservation Commission requested him to do a survey of the twenty acres which the Town owns in South Cornish, to determine what forestry practices might be implemented on this land, and its potential for silviculture development. It was found that due to the inaccessibility of the area, and the limited size of the area, and its relationship to the Claremont water supply, though some thinning and cutting could be done, but that the small gains which might accrue were not significant.

In May, the Chairman and Mr. Yatsevitch attended a public hearing in Lebanon concerning the program to clean up the Connecticut River watershed, including the Mascoma River area.

In October, on the recommendation of the Commission, members of the Solid Waste Management Committee, Mr. Leyds and Mr. LaClair, Road Agent attended a conference in Durham, N.H. on alternatives and solutions to the problem facing Cornish this year.

In November, Commission members attended a regional conference held in Lebanon sponsored by the State Legislature's Land Use Study Committee, in a public hearing to listen to the views of citizens on this subject, in preparation for action on some legislation by the General Court in 1975. Previously the Commission completed a rather lengthy questionnaire in June, submitted by Rep. Marjorie Colburn and the Open Space Land Study Commission. Hopefully the views of the conservation commissions and local officials throughout the state will be tabulated and reflected in the prospective legislation.

Another session, attended by the Commission, again in Lebanon, was sponsored by the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions, in November. This was an all day regional conference on Land Use, Zoning and similar programs. There were exhibits from town conservation commissions, regional centers and other organizations showing how similar programs are handled by their respective exhibitors.

Mr. McSwain and Mr. Yatsevitch participated in a public session, with members of the Planning Board, sponsored by the Upper Valley Planning and Development Council, directed by Bob Ward. The purpose of that session was to develop a blueprint of potential recreation projects for this region, which would be funded through the federal Bureau of Outdoor Recreation grants to the state and local agencies. One of the potential projects listed involves the preservation of the Blacksmith Covered Bridge, on the Kenyon Hill Road, which is rapidly falling into disrepair. It is our goal to achieve some stabilization and possibly restoration of the structure and hopefully upgrading the surrounding area into a park-like recreational area, as a wayside for the travelling public and community as well.

As a result of the legislation passed in the last Special Session of the General Court, concerned with the Dredge and Fill permit applications submitted to the Town Clerk and ultimately to the Special Board of the State Water Resources Board; Conservation Commissions are informed of such pending applications, and have seven days in which to file their comments on the proposed activity, with the Special Board in Concord. The only application received during the year was from the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department in July, to develop a boat ramp and access facility on the Connecticut River, just north of the Covered Bridge, on land which they recently purchased. The Commission took no action on the application for the permit.

The Commission has continued to work on one of its primary goals that of a complete Inventory or Survey, with an appropriate full scale map of the town, with all of its natural, historic and recreational resources. We have recently had discussion with Mr. John Cook of the Massachusetts Audubon Society, and have applied to the Society for several environmental interns for the 1975 summer season, to assist us in this survey-inventory-mapping project. The interns are graduate and undergraduate students in the various disciplines involved in the various professional programs of wildlife management, environmental study and planning. The Audubon Society placed over one hundred such interns in the United States last year, and they assist in the funding by providing twenty-per cent of the seed money with the host agency applying for other funding and possibly hiring the interns for three months, six months or as much as one year, to complete the projects.

The Commission is always open to suggestions from citizens and friends of the Town, in continuing its service to the community. Once the inventory of our town has been completed we will be in a much better position to advise local landowners and officials on the proper preservation and development of our resources. We hope that the Town will continue to support us in this, and we hope that agreements can be reached to either purchase or assign easements to the unique resources so that they will be here for future generations.

## REPORT OF THE CORNISH ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

In 1974, the Cornish Zoning Board of Adjustment heard five applications for appeal of the Cornish Zoning Ordinance.

The first hearing resulted in a variance being granted due to the unique characteristics of the land in question. Three cases concerned requests for special exceptions to allow a housing unit to be placed in a conservation zone. In all three cases, special exceptions were granted after much study and analysis of the particular issues and with some changes required. The final case of the year concerned a request for a variance and was granted with stipulations added by the Board of Adjustment.

### WINDSOR VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

Beverly Blake, LPN, of the Windsor Regional Visiting Nurse Association made 121 calls to the Cornish area in 1974. Most of these calls were to the elderly on fixed incomes and although the total number of free visits was only 21, the remaining calls were only partially paid.

A well baby clinic is held at the Mt. Ascutney Health Ctr. trice a month giving free physical exams, immunizations, developmental tests, eye and ear testing and counseling with Dr. Jeffrey Kaplan, pediatrician and State Public and Mental Health Nurses.

In Sept. the State Health Van came to Windsor: 202 area residents were tested for glaucoma, diabetes, hypertension and ambliopia free of charge. Also several influenza immunizations were given to homebound and chronically ill. The Visiting Nurse is available to homebound patients of all ages for nursing services under the Dr's recommendations and the Funds received from Cornish, West Windsor and Windsor make it possible to those unable to pay the minimal fee. Her office is at Mt. Ascutney Health Ctr. and a message may be left by calling 674-6711, ext. 270 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

### 1974 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CORNISH RESCUE SQUAD, INC.

The year 1974 saw the beginning of the Cornish Rescue Squad, Inc. Begun as a group of individuals with Emergency Medical Technition training, it has grown into a community service organization with it's purpose being to provide better emergency care and first aid coverage for the people of the area.

In order to give total care for the patient and to remain an independent organization, the Cornish Rescue Squad became incorporated on February 14, 1974. Forms were filed with the Internal Revenue Service establishing the non-profit corporation status, making all donations tax deductible. Along this line, we rely on donations and fund raising projects for our existance. It is good to report that we have received donations from individuals in town as well as local organizations and that this has insured our continued service.

Continued updating and special training sessions help to maintain a qualified membership of emergency personnel. Examples of this include the National Registration Exam; a weekend Extrication Course; and the New Hampshire Heart Association CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resucitation) course. Special meetings have been held with the N.H. Fish and Game Department and the Civil Air Patrol. There has been excellent co-operation between the Cornish Fire Department and Selectmen; the Blow-me-down Snowriders Snowmobile Club and the State and local police. It is hoped that by working together, we can improve the emergency care in our town.

Although the organization was originally set to respond to emergencies in Cornish along with the Windsor Ambulance, there have been other service projects the Rescue Squad has undertaken. In the Spring, a boy was lost on the Connecticut River in a canoeing accident. This set the Squad into action searching the river without success. Because of this incident, two signs, each 8' by 8' were erected warning river traffic of the up-coming Sumner Falls.

The first objective of the Cornish Rescue Squad, Inc. is. "To provide emergency medical care to persons in need thereof, whether by reason of illhealth or accident." Constant review and training, having the availability of equipment and supplies needed, and a smooth working system are all necessary for the objective to be reached.

### REPORT OF CORNISH BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION

Two meetings have been held to date, one December 13 and second one January 13. The Town program is divided into three broad areas: Heritage '76; Festival Cornish; and Horizons '76.

Heritage: Planned is a new publication of combined Vols. I and II of Town History, which have been in quite strong demand, and plan to sell for \$15.00, receipts from sales to be returned to town. Already have estimates from reputable printers. Costs will be around \$8,800.00, so we need half from town and hope to get other half through a matching grant from State Bicentennial Commission or Council on the Humanities.

The same plans for financing \$2,000.00 for a pamphlet on the manuscripts, relating to the Revolutionary War from the original papers of Brig. General Jonathan Chase, which Cornish owns, but are stored in the Historical Society in Concord.

It is hoped to take inventory and organize historical records of Cornish from the 1760s to the present.

Festival, Cornish: Special programs for the entire year 1976 may include for the March Town Meeting, all town officers to dress in 1700 costumes; Memorial Day to have special plans; July 4th perhaps the Cornish Players can reform and do a play based on the 1776 period; the Cornish Fair theme will be "Spirit of '76" with a large parade and special exhibits. Several appropriate programs during that week, ending with the annual Old Home Day, which originated in Cornish in August of 1877. Then the grand finale will be Muster Day on Oct. 14th.

Horizons '76: Complete cemetery markers through the town; put up signs for the first homes, town inns, etc. plus permanent "Entering Cornish" signs. Booklets giving helpful information re churches, organizations, schools, town meetings, etc. to give out to newcomers. Get all town records microfilmed. Get Cornish genealogies up to date.

### **Cornish School District**

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said District, on the 1st day of March, 1975, at 10:00 A.M. to act upon the Articles set forth in this Warrant.

Article 1 of the Warrant will be acted upon at 10:00 A.M. and voting will be by official ballot and checklist, and the polls will remain open for this purpose from 10:00 A.M. until 7:00 P.M., at which time polls will close.

At 1:00 P.M., Articles 2 through 7 will be acted upon.

Article 1: To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Auditors for the ensuing year, two members of the School Board, for three years, and one member for the ensuing year.

Article 2: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3: To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town. Article 4: To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or state agencies, and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

Article 5: To see if the District will authorize the School Board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources in addition to the original appropriation for 1975/76 for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.

Article 6: To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

Article 7: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The formation of a five member Board has brought a greater input to the Board. There is generally a feeling of closer contact with different segments of the community.

As in the past, the Board wishes to thank again the PTA and all those other members of the community who have helped and cooperated in the operation of the school.

### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As anyone who has been in the school recently will notice, the cafeteria and corridors have been painted. Mrs. Densmore organized the paint crew that included the following: Arthur Densmore; Frank, Pat and Scott Walker; Dale and Judy Rook; Bill and JoAnne Ardinger; Roy, Ruth and Willow Stewart; and Roger Napsey. Our thanks to her and to all who have assisted in this project. Our thanks, too, to all the other people and organizations who have donated time, effort, and materials to the school in the past year.

We have only three new classroom teachers, Mr. John Dempsey, Mr. Keith deLange, and Mrs. Wendy Faust, and a new music teacher, Mrs. Caren Showerman, for this school year. This represents a big improvement over the large turnover typical of the recent past. Because the seventh grade was so large (35 pupils), we hired a part-time teacher aide, Mr. Steve Faust, for this classroom. I think we have been extremely fortunate to have the skills, experience and background each of these new people brings to our staff.

In my last report, I referred to a committee studying the manner in which we report to parents. As a result of extensive study, this committee of parents and teachers recommended a new report card to the School Board. This new report card will be used and evaluated this year and perhaps revised for next year. My thanks to all members of the committee, and especially to its chairperson, Audrey Jacquier. One of the costs of a high turnover in staff is the breakdown of continuity in curriculum from one year to the next. With no plan in writing, and with so many new teachers, it was generally difficult to know what had been covered by which students in previous years. Last summer, several teachers put together curriculum guides in Language Arts and Social Studies. We hope to conduct the same sort of work in Mathematics this summer. The Teacher Consultant and I have assisted in this work and will continue to do so in the future.

The Supervisory Union has created an Advisory Committee to plan the expenditure of its share of Federal Library Funds (ESEA TitleII). Mrs. Tracy and I are representing Cornish on this committee.

Several of the recent graduates of Cornish School have enrolled in Kimball Union Academy in Meriden as day students. By all reports they have done quite well, in spite of the extra time demands made on them by the travel back and forth each day. We are proud of their accomplishments and wish them continued success.

### **REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT**

To the School Board of Cornish, N.H. and citizens of the community I herewith submit my annual report.

### FORWARD:

The "favorite child" of the American public has been schools and education, this during a prolonged period of growth. More students, more buildings, more materials and more money to support them were needed and appropriated. This is all changing. The quantity game is over. Drastically increased costs and stablizing enrollments the nation over make it imperative that we reexamine our present use of educational manpower and our allocation of dollars. The priority before us now should be quality, a rededication to excellence.

What mix of educational resources will best assure higher student achievement? This question has been debated for years. Past research suggests many factors and usually in combination: class size, teacher training and years of experience, advanced degrees, administration, use of technology, inservice education. A study conducted in New York entitled "The Educational Production Function" will soon be released. It attempts to basically answer the first question in this paragraph and does so by challenging many widely held assumptions and current practices. This topic will receive much time and study in the months ahead.

### FACULTY:

The year started with two new classroom teachers and a music teacher who works at the school one day a week.

Wendy Faust of Burlington, Vt. teaches the combined class of fifth and sixth graders, replacing Linda O'Connor. Mrs. Faust received her BS degree from the University of Vermont last June. Her sixteen week teaching internship was completed in Hinesburg, Vt. John Dempsey of Lexington, Mass., is assigned to Grade 8, replacing Steven Perry. He has three and one-half years teaching experience at the Martin Luther King Middle School in Boston, Mass., holds a BA in History from the University of Massachusetts, and spent last year traveling in the Far East and in the western states of this country.

Caren Showerman of West Lebanon, N.H. filled the vacancy of music teacher. Mrs. Showerman received her training in music education at Keene State College and student taught in Lebanon.

Cornelius de Lange of White River Jctn., Vt. replaced Peter Moran as Grade 6 teacher during the first half of the year. Mr. de Lange has diversified experiences in education totaling fifteen years. His first degree was awarded at Government College in the Netherlands and he earned an advanced degree from Kent State, Ohio.

### BOARD MEMBERSHIP:

Expansion of the Board from three to five members took place last spring. This change has been a good one. Greater representation and additional viewpoints add much to our meetings and deliberations. The end result-sound decisions made after considering more alternatives on any given topic. The school and community both benefit from this increased citizen participation in the management of its educational program.

### LOSS OF FOUNDATION AID:

The Loss of our Foundation Aid was discouraging. Nearly \$25,000 was received from the state last year and similar amounts were received in years past. This year not one penny of support was forthcoming. The formula for computation is rather complex. Factors considered are: student enrollment, a 14 mill local effort, an equalized valuation of the community, and the annual amount appropriated by the General Court. Each year these variables change somewhat for every receiving district, but only one was the major cause of this total loss. That was the change in equalized valuation in Cornish. Computation by the State Tax Commission increased our town's "paper value" 44.9% over a two year period (from \$9,051,540 to \$13,117,000). Your Board and I have made our displeasure known to proper agencies. It appears only increased funding at the state level or a statutory change in the distribution formula, will bring this money back to us in an appreciable amount.

### **REPORT OF COMMISSION ON PUBLIC EDUCATION:**

The final report has been presented to the Governor. It has already received much publicity throughout the state, but I believe it important enough to bring to your attention. This report recommends many changes in the New Hampshire School Law, some of which follow: use of sweepstakes revenues for a permissive voucher system: removal of school board members by the board itself: laws on corporal punishment: sex education courses: pupil progress in academics—testing: lowering compulsory attendance age: citizenship instruction...and many others.

Each of us has our ideas and opinions about this proposed legislation. It's important that we express them to our representatives in Concord who will be acting on them. The report itself, some twenty pages, has not been easy to obtain. Those interested in studying it should request one from the Governor's office, or perhaps your local representative could obtain a copy for you.

### BUILDING REPAIRS:

To date, three items have caused an expenditure of funds not anticipated in this current budget. The furnace burner had to be replaced at a cost of \$495.00. We were experiencing mechanical difficulties and parts were very difficult to obtain. The new unit will also save money by burning fuel efficiently. A total of \$509.00 was spent in the kitchen for plumbing and installing a new drain. A "wet vacuum" was purchased for \$750.00 to improve daily care of the building.

### STAFF AND CURRICULUM:

The Teacher Consultant visits the school regularly and reports to the Board monthly on all aspects of the staff and curriculum. He has frequent consultations with the principal and many meetings with the teachers. The purpose of these sessions are multiple: examine course content, instructional materials being used, reporting procedures, teaching techniques, staff evaluations, and in general, informational meetings to keep everyone abreast of good current practices and innovations in education.

### IN CONCLUSION:

My appreciation to each and every resident of Cornish for all you have contributed in varied ways to the support of this school district.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE 1973/74

To the Cornish School Board and the Citizens of Cornish, I herewith submit my annual report as school nurse.

During the school year the following tests were administered: Vision checks were given to two hundred and fifty-six students. Fifteen students were referred for further evaluation. Hearing tests were given to one hundred and eighty students. Five were referred and seen by their family physician. Color perception tests were given to fifty-eight students.

The height and weight of all students was taken. Periodic head and skin checks were done during the school year.

At the request of the Cornish School Board, Tuberculin tests were given to nineteen prospective teacher aides.

During the pre-school registration, short conferences were held with fourteen parents of incoming first graders. This is an opportune time for parents to make known any special need their child may have, thus making the child's adjustment from home to school easier. Several booklets were distributed on Child Safety, Health, Growing, Learning, and First Aid, courtesy of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

No serious outbreak of contagious disease occurred during the school year.

Mrs. Pricilla Gedney, Dental Hygenist at the Claremont Schools, was invited to talk to grades one and two about the care of their teeth. The children enjoyed and participated in her program.

To help enlighten children about their health needs, I have added several programs. A film entitled "The Story of Menstruation" was shown to the girls in grades five through eight. The Film "Boy to Man" was shown to the boys in grades five through eight. A question and answer period followed the films. Grades five through eight also saw a film entitled "Cleanliness and Health". Pupils in grades one through four were shown a film entitled "How Billy Keeps Clean".

At the request of the seventh grade teacher and in conjunction with her science course, a short talk was given to the seventh grade class on the importance of the hearing tests.

A question and answer period followed the talk.

Please continue to keep the school informed as to where you or the person who will be responsible for your child may be contacted so that transportation arrangements may be made in the event your child is taken ill at school.

My sincere appreciation to all personnel and School Board Members at the Cornish School for your continued cooperation and help with my program.

### **REPORT OF CORNISH SCHOOL LUNCH**

Cornish School Lunch closed the 1973-1974 year with a balance of \$929.71 and all bills paid. The expenses of the year did exceed the income however, by \$462.43 due to increased food and labor costs, and the fact that about 370 less meals were served.

Altogether during the year 27,303 student meals were provided, for which the School Lunch was paid \$7,447.40. The average count was a little under 160

per day. Food costs totaled \$8,050.29 and labor costs \$5,767.72. Cornish was almost the only school in the State serving meals to students at \$.35 each.

Further increases in costs of food and labor made it necessary to increase lunch price to \$.40 each in the present 1974-1975 year, but that has not reduced the number of lunches being served, and the average count for November and December 1974 was 162 per day.

Only the careful planning and extra work of Mrs. Ackerman and Mrs. Hilliard make Cornish School Lunch one of the best, and one of the very few that does not require a substantial district appropriation.


