RUEL AND POLLY S. (BARTON) DURKEE - COMING HOME

(The following are excerpts from various newspapers in the State of New Hampshire in 1885)

Ruel Durkee was born in Croydon on July 14, 1807, the son of Rufus and Polly (Whipple) Durkee. Polly was the daughter of Moses Whipple who came to Croydon in the spring of 1766. On Ruel's mother's side, Ruel's ancestry dates back to Matthew Whipple who settled in Ipswich, MA in 1635.

Ruel Durkee received an education afforded by the common schools of his time. His early years were occupied in his father's tannery. He afterwards took to farming, owning a large amount of real estate in Croydon. As a town officer he has a record probably unsurpassed in the country (at the time) having been town treasurer 28 years and a member of the board of selectmen for 34 years, 32 its chairman. This period covered the great national struggle, and the town is greatly indebted to him for the manner in which he handled the town's money and filled the quota of soldiers.

Mr. Durkee was originally a Free Soiler and of course assisted in the formation of the Republican Party. Slavery he detested, the Union he loved, and few men did more to stay up the hand of the Governor or the President than did Ruel Durkee. He has ever been a stalwart Republican, uncompromising in principle, and not easily turned aside from any course. He had a remarkable faculty of reading other men discovering their views and drawing out their plans while withholding his own

It was this that made him such a power in a Republican convention. Early on the ground, he quickly grasped the situation, and it was a cold day for the candidate against whom his opposition was directed. No man in any state ever had, more to do with the making and unmaking of public men than did Ruel Durkee in New Hampshire for nearly half a century, though he had passed the zenith of his power before he died.

He has been aptly styled the king of the lobby, the Speaker of the Third House, on account of his potent influence on men or measures. And yet, we never heard it lisped that he lobbied for a bad cause of an unworthy candidate. Whatever pecuniary return he may have received for such services, he has oft befriended the penniless and worked for them as faithfully and persistently, without reward or expectation of it.

During all this time, though a frugal manager, without a single bad habit, with simple tastes, he has not acquired wealth. What better testimony to the purity of his purposes and his devotion to the Republican party? He never sought honors for himself and time and again refused to them thrust upon him. He represented Croydon in the legislature in 1846 and 1847, was a state railroad commissioner in 1846, was appointed messenger to carry the electoral vote of the state to Washington in 1864, and was a delegate to the National Republican Convention in 1880, then and in 1884 a hearty supporter of Blaine. He lacked refinement perhaps, but a kindly heart atoned for it.

Many a citizen of Croydon today has Ruel Durkee to thank for averting trouble or alleviating distress for him Physically he was a very giant, tall, rotund, weighing perhaps 260 pounds, and nobody who ever saw him would ever forget Ruel Durkee--always in a full dress suit of black, with silk hat, generally with his hands in his pockets, his lips frequently moving as if in conversation with his own mind. He never touched liquor and detested tobacco strongly

He leaves no descendants, but a devoted wife mourns his loss. His like never lived in this state, and probably never will. Few men of such power wield it for the public good so exclusively, so rarely for themselves. His character was certainly unique

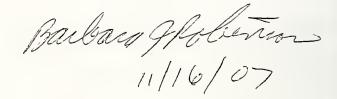

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS AND CEMETERIES 2007 Annual Trustee's Report

Several improvements and a disappointment have occurred throughout the year as concerns Trust Funds and Cemeteries as follows:

1. Improvements:

2007.

A. Trustees:

The Certificates of Deposit continue to be renewed and reinvested as they mature. Our goal is allocating 30% of the charitable trust funds of the Sawyer account (\$352.400) to stocks in order to maintain the purchasing power of the portfolio against inflation.

B. Cemeteries:

- 1. As usual, Richard "Dick" Gross has done a excellent job on maintaining Croydon's Cemeteries throughout the year.
- 2. Eleven (11) flower pots and flowers were purchased to add to the beautification of the Croydon Flat and East Village Cemeteries. Four (4) at Croydon Flat and seven (7) at East Village...many positive comments.
- 3. Several headstones and/or corner stones have been repaired and/or uncovered as well as brush cutting, mowing, trimming and repair of stones as follows:
 - a. Asa Davis: One (1) broken stone repaired.
 - b. Brighton: No change from last year.
- c. <u>Croydon Flat:</u> Corner stones uncovered in several plots and several corner stones have been re-positioned. Additionally, two (2) plots have been forfeited due to non-use in the last fifty (50) years.
- d. <u>East Village:</u> Several head and corner stones have been uncovered or re-positioned. Twelve (12) new foundations have been poured and stones re-positioned on foundations. In addition, straightened up two (2) large monuments
- e. <u>Four Corners:</u> Several headstones straightened and flush military marker repositioned. In addition, all large brush and small trees have been cut and stacked for burning in the spring. Over the bank towards the east wall is now clear of all brush.
- f. <u>Pinnacle:</u> Several head and foot stones straightened and positioned in their proper place. Volunteers; Steve and Judy Cunningham and "Bert" Smith uncovered two (2) mounds of broken and chipped head and foot stones. These have been stored until proper identification can be made and placed in their proper place.
- g. <u>Putnam:</u> Large pine tree fell into the cemetery from the Ruger property and damaged the south wall. Consequently, several stones had to be taken up and replaced in their proper position.
 - h. <u>Under the Mountain:</u> No change from last year (See
- disappointments)

 i. <u>Winter Hill</u>: Two (2) Foot stones repositioned and realigned with the proper headstone.
 - 4. There were two (2) internment's in Croydon's cemeteries in
 - One (1) East Village (Full Burial)

2. Disappointments:

1. While one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) was approved last year to finish the survey of Under The Mountain Cemetery, the surveyor could not find reference either at the Cheshire and/or Sullivan County Registras Office to indicate how the cemetery became the property of Croydon. So far, history hasn't clarified ownership. Comments:

The following warrant article (cemetery) for year ending December 31, 2007 was as follows:

Article 6: (To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand (\$12,000) for general cemetery maintenance for the 2007 season. The funds to support this article are to be removed from interest earned in the Henry J. Sawyer Memorial Fund. (Recommended by the Selectmen) (This Article passed)

Actual expenditures were Nine Thousand Three Hundred Forty Eight Dollars and Sixty One Cents (\$9,348.61). The Trustees of Trust Funds and Cemeteries were Two Thousand Six Hundred Fifty One Dollars and Sixty One Cents (\$2,651.39) under budget.

CROYDON POLICE DEPARTMENT TOWN REPORT FOR THE YEAR 2007

This year, as last, was a busy one for the Croydon Police Department. The calls are actually down this year from last with 734 calls in 2007 as compared to 833 in 2006.

The big change this year is in our dispatching services. The dispatch center was changed from Newport, who was the dispatch center for Croydon for more than 30 years, to New London Police. The change was talked about during several town meetings, with complaints about the high cost and lack of service.

The Croydon Board of Selectmen and I researched New London Dispatch center for a possible dispatch service and found some very positive things. One was a lower cost for dispatch services, another, a compatible computer system with my reporting system, this being CRIMESTAR, and what I feel is better service. I now have a designated shooting range to utilize. The new number to call for the Croydon Police is 863-5116 and your call will be answered, Croydon Dispatch.

I applied for the Highway Enforcement Grant again in 2007 and it was granted. This is continually very successful, where I have been running speed enforcement on N.H. Route 10 in the mornings and afternoons, with a noticeable statistical drop in the number of speeding tickets being issued and motor vehicle stops being made. The hours have been up to 60 hours, all paid for by the grant monies.

The Town of Croydon now has it's own web site and the Police Department is on there. As soon as Steve Cunningham shows me how to access it and I become proficient in it's use, there will be police logs posted on a monthly basis, a specific statute will be discussed each month and there will be other law enforcement/citizen related information posted.

The cruiser is in good shape. I have been keeping up with routine maintenance, such as oil changes and the like. New tires were put on the cruiser this year. The new dispatch numbers have been placed on the cruiser.

The Lunch with the Chief program at the school was a great success with the children and I. We had a lot of good talks and had good participation from the students during the classes that I presented. Again, parents, you should be proud of your children, I find them to be very intelligent from their interaction during these presentations.

If you have reviewed the police budget in this report, you will see that the budget is down from last year.

Again, thank you for allowing me to serve you in 2007 and I am looking forward to doing the same in 2008.

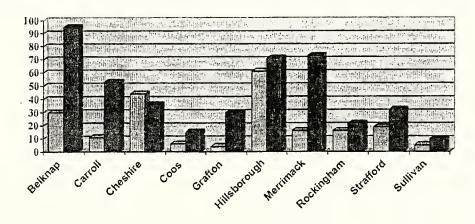
Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

Fire activity was very busy during the spring of the 2007, particularly late April into early May. As the forests and fields greened up in later May the fire danger decreased. However, a very dry late summer created very high fire danger again from August into September, with fire danger reaching very high on Labor Day weekend. Even with the dry conditions, the acreage burned was less than half that of 2006. The largest forest fire during the 2007 season burned approximately 26 acres on the side of Wantastiquet Mountain in Chesterfield during the month of May. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2007 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

This year, 2007, was a very busy year for the Historical Society. The Morse House committee, Clayton Phillips as Chairman, has made numerous improvements since last spring. Much of the abundant shrubbery has been removed, trimmed or repositioned by Jan Michel and helpers, now allowing clear visibility to the home, and yard access. Cynthia Phillips planted an annual bed of flowers along with some perennial placement, with plans to expand this and we'll reseed the lawn this next spring. The front and sides of the house have received a thorough painting and the back has been primed on much needed clapboard replacement. You missed it. Meetings will resume in May on the second Saturday of the month until December. Many weekend events are planned so please come join us.

Speaking of joining us, we hope to have you all become members of the society, your individual annual dues of \$10, will help us with funds for the paintings restoration and other preservation and storage costs, but it could also help us WIN a \$25,000 private grant for increasing our membership in record numbers. Our goal is 400 new members at \$10, \$4000 toward preservation and a great possibility of the \$25,000 with this kind of a number. Will you help us out?

Our annual Christmas ball sale, t-shirts, raffle tickets, two very successful pie sales coordinated by Gayle, our best yard sale ever, and roast pork dinner with the Ladies Auxiliary at the fire department, have had good support from you. We have to thank Carol Marsh, head cook for the dinner, and the ladies and firemen for all the help! The fire department also donated chairs to us that we use at the house for meetings.

We are saddened by the loss this year of members Patricia (Tee) Keller and Dr. William Hickey, and William Hutchins. We also miss the participation of Dot Ballou and Dottie Smith who are now living at the Clough Center in New London.

I would like to thank all the Historical Society members, Selectmen, Fire Department and Auxiliary, Highway Department, Coniston Store, Croydon Church and all the other individuals that have made my tenure as President of the Croydon Historical Society a very pleasant and productive three years.

Lake Sunapee Region VNA & HOSPICE is grateful for the opportunity to provide home health, hospice and community services for residents of Croydon. Each year our focus is to provide the kinds of services that people in the community need in order to recover from an illness or injury, cope with chronic illnesses or deal with life events including births and deaths.

We invest in technology and training for staff to ensure the highest level of competence; and hire staff who go about their work with a high degree of caring and compassion. We continually seek feedback from patients, families, other health care providers and the community to help us improve our services.

During the past year, Lake Sunapee Region VNA and Hospice increased our volume of services in all programs by more than 10 per cent. In addition, the following accomplishments will help the organization remain a provider of choice in this region:

- > Achieved a patient satisfaction rate at the 94th percentile
- > Eliminated all long-term debt except the building mortgage
- > Improved nursing productivity by .5 visits per day
- > Implemented an electronic newsletter for Friends of the VNA
- Hired a Hospice Facilities Coordinator to improve communication, satisfaction and consistency in our work with nursing homes and assisted living facilities
- > Exceeded our annual fundraising goal by 16%

- Initiated discussions with New London Hospital to contract for increased Hospice Medical Director time to improve staff support, communication with primary physicians and improve patient care
- > Implemented specific care plans for certain chronic illnesses with associated patient education to improve communication and consistency with patients and help achieve positive patient goals

These actions and many more were undertaken so that Lake Sunapee Region VNA and Hospice will be in the best position to provide the kind of care you expect and deserve.

More than 84 residents of Croydon received care and services through one or more programs of Lake Sunapee Region VNA and Hospice. Over 51 residents participated in our community clinics including influenza, pneumonia, foot care and blood pressure. Factoid About Meals-on-Wheels

History

The Meals-on-Wheels (MOW) program delivered its first meal in Philadelphia, PA in 1954. The program was modeled after a similar program that was started in England to support seniors during World War II. In 1972, the federal government made the program a permanent program through the implementation of the Older American's Act. The act provides a basis for providing meals to seniors (60 years or older) or people with qualifying disabilities. As an integral part of the act, the framework for funding not only involved federal support but also monies from local sources. The general formula put forth by the grant is 75 to 80% garnered from federal sources, 15 to 20% to be raised from local support (counties & municipalities) with the balance derived through private donations. Obviously these are general guidelines, but it points out that community participation and personal commitment are key elements.

Sullivan County Nutrition Services (SCNS) started its participation in the Meals-on-Wheels program in 1972, and operated out of a department store's basement in Newport. The initial program served 25 meals per day and had an initial operating budget of \$20,000. In 1980, the program established meal sites in Claremont and Charlestown to meet an ever growing need for service. 30 years later we are serving over 100,000 meals per year with an operating budget of \$650,000. All but three communities in Sullivan County receive meal services through this program (Acworth, Plainfield, and Langdon). We have not received any requests from these communities. Should there be a request we would make every accommodation to service the request.

Community Support

SCNS requests each community that is being served to support the MOW program. Our request reflects the number of meals and individuals that have been served in your community during the past year and the historical trend that has been experienced. If your community is not served, no money is requested. If your community has few meals and people being served historically, then it is conceivable that your requested support would be reduced. Should your community have an increase in meals served, a modest increase is often requested. The bottom line is that we simply ask for support that is commensurate with the degree of service provided and seldom is equal to the total cost of service. Any difference is raised through private donations, and is consistent with the funding formula that was put forth by the Older American's Act.

SCNS

Sullivan County Nutrition Services is a part of the Newport Senior Center, a 501(c) 3 organization. SCNS operates three congregate meal sites in Newport, Earl Bourdon Centré (Claremont) and at the Town Office Complex in Charlestown. We have an annual independent audit performed each year and must comply with all aspects of the program grant guidelines. Oversight is provided by the State of N.H., Department of Elder and Adult Services. We encourage communities to visit us and to discuss any questions they have about any aspect of the program. From 2004 to 2006, the Department had 2 Diversion Hearing dates per month; now, the department regularly schedules 3 or 4 Diversion Hearing dates per month—consequently hearing fifteen to twenty cases per month.

We at Sullivan County Hospice are requesting \$250 from the Town of Croydon.

Sullivan County Hospice has been in existence since 1984. We are a volunteer agency, governed by a 12 member Board of Directors, all of whom reside in Sullivan County.

Our mission is to provide practical and emotional support to terminally ill patients and their families within Sullivan County. The majority of the individuals we serve are home hospice patients, who have decided to remain at home under the care of their families. It is in this setting that we provide most of our services. However, we have the flexibility to follow and serve our patients and their families in a hospital or nursing home setting, as well. Our volunteers are fully trained in areas such as death and dying, the grieving process, active listening and universal precautions. A few of the ways our volunteers provide practical support include respite for caregivers, running errands and light meal preparation. Our volunteers also provide emotional support to both the patient and their family, by being available to listen and offer reassurance and encouragement.

Our referrals come from doctors, nurses, visiting nurse associations, discharge planners, as well as from family members or patients themselves. Our only requirements for service are that the patient be terminally ill and that they reside in Sullivan County. We accept all referrals on that basis and there is never a charge for our service.

In addition to providing volunteer services, Sullivan County Hospice offers a bereavement support group. This group is scheduled for six sessions a year, each lasting a period of five weeks. These groups are open to anyone working through the grieving process.

We thank you in advance for your consideration. We hope that you will continue to support our work with your financial contribution, as we continue in our efforts to support the terminally ill and their families in Sullivan County.

In FY 2007, West Central Behavioral Health provided \$18,702 of free or reduced cost mental and behavioral health services to residents of Croydon who are uninsured or underinsured. We are committed to making quality mental health services available regardless of ability to pay to all communities in our service area, and are asking the cities and towns we serve to help us sustain that commitment to many of our most vulnerable neighbors. In order to achieve this goal we are requesting a FY 2008 appropriation of \$742.

West Central Behavioral Health is the NH designated Community Mental Health Center for Croydon, as well as Sullivan and Southern Grafton Counties. Our mission is: "to promote, preserve, and strengthen the mental health and quality of life for individuals and their communities through the delivery of integrated, comprehensive services." Our consumers suffer from a range of disorders and illnesses: life threatening severe, chronic mental illness such as psychosis, schizophrenia, and bipolar disorder; all forms of addiction; as well as anxiety, depression, divorce or relationship related stress, and other impairing, but highly treatable, conditions. We work with all ages in outpatient clinics, homes, nursing homes, schools, and residential supported living programs, offering a broad variety of counseling, psychiatric services, case management, and emergency consultations.

Some of the services provided to residents of Croydon this year include:

- 13 Children and their families received 243 therapy sessions at our outpatient clinics in Newport, Lebanon, and Claremont.
- 15 Adult residents received 42 sessions of outpatient counseling for depression, anxiety, addictions, family issues, and other critical issues.
- 4 Resident contacted our Emergency Services, available 24 hours, 7 days a week.
- 10 Residents received 270 sessions of other services such as case management, medication management, child respite, and vocational supports.

Croydon School Board Chair's Message

She has created a fun learning environment for all the students. Amanda Simon, our kindergarten teacher from last year, moved into the little red school house to be the lead teacher. All three School Boards have worked diligently to keep each SAU cost effective, as well as, operate efficiently.

It has been my pleasure to work with the Croydon School Board, teachers, support staff, parents and students for the past five years. I leave confident that SAU#43 will move forward with a newly formed administrative team to guide Croydon and Newport districts through the 2008-2009 school - year.

I am grateful to the staff, the parents, and students for allowing me to voice my beliefs, observations, pleasures, and displeasures. All were important if I was going to be true to myself and be effective in my position.

Croydon Budget FY2009



The death of Ruel Durkee was at his home in Croydon at 6 o'clock on Thursday morning after an illness of a few weeks. He had made arrangements to be in Concord at the opening of the legislature, as had been his custom for nearly forty years, and overworked probably on the last week in May, which caused his illness that proved fatal On Sunday, May 31st, he was taken seriously ill, and medical attendance was called from Newport, and from this city (Concord) a day or two following for consultation. Relief was obtained and hopes were entertained of his recovery, but these were never to be realized. For several days past he had been ailing and his end was felt to be near at hand. Medical skill and the best of care proved unavailing, and he passed away quietly in his comfortable home under the shadow of Croydon Mountain so typical of his rugged strength of character and influence.

The funeral of the late Ruel Durkee of Croydon was held in the little church at the East Village, which was crowded to overflowing, the yard being thronged with scores unable to gain admission. The casket was a magnificent one with broadcloth and silver trimmings, and there was a most elaborate and profuse floral display, the contributions of friends from many different points. Rev. James Noyes, of the Newport M. E. church, delivered an appropriate discourse, dwelling at length on the remarkable qualities of the strong man stricken in death. There were many distinguished New Hampshire men present, including Senator H. W. Blair, ex-Secretary Wm E Chandler, H. P. Rolfe, Esq., of Concord, Hon. Chester Pike, President of the State Senate, Col. Thomas P. Cheney, U. S. Pension Agent at Concord, R. P. Claggett, Esq., Sheriff of Sullivan County, Hon's. L. W. Barton and S. L. Bowers and Geo. R. Brown Esq., of Newport and Hon. Geo. H. Fairbanks of Newport acting as conductor. At the close of the discourse, Senator Blair, ex-Secretary Chandler, and Mr. Rolfe with fitting words spoke of their appreciation of the sterling qualities of the deceased.

For those readers who do not know where the Durkee residence once stood, start up Loverin Hill across from the firehouse and at the sharp right turn, his house stood on the right. The remains of the cellar hole still exist. The property is now owned by the Croydon Volunteer Fire Department.

The house was occupied and empty by turns for years and slowly deteriorated. In 1956, having become unfit for habitation, the owners had it torn down. Those who would have preserved it learned of the plans too late to save it or were financially unable to buy and repair it.

If passing the East Village Cemetery on Cash Street, you will notice just inside the first gate (on left) a large Vermont red marble monument that is inscribed with these words; Ruel Durkee; A lifelong advocate of human freedom. A patriotic citizen, good neighbor, devoted husband, and a faithful friend of those associates who have erected this monument to his memory. His wife - Polly S. (Barton) Durkee.

The Croydon Historical Society has recently acquired 2 large portraits of Ruel and Polly Durkee shown on the front cover of your town report. We, of the Society, were overwhelmed with these historic portraits donated by Edwin H. and Leslie E. Hall and Robert D. and Deborah E. Hall. These portraits measuring 34 inches wide by 39 inches high have a 4 inch thick frame. They are very ornate with gold trim and have been in the Hall family for many years. For many years, unfortunately, they were stored in an old unheated house on East Mountain Road in Newport since the death of Bessie (Hall) (Baine) Kidder. These are the same portraits that Rita Gross and Jane Chworowsky photographed in 1965 for the Croydon Bicentennial Booklet in 1966 and can be seen on page 56. Bessie Kidder; at the age of 100, passed away in 1986 and is buried in Croydon's East Village Cemetery.

These portraits are not in the best of shape as they are dusty and dirty and Ruel's has a 2 inch hole in the upper right hand corner. Hopefully, by the time you read this, they have been restored, and will be hung in the Morse House during the summer months for all to see. During the winter months, they will have to be stored in a warm dry area.
