#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

After years of planning two major projects were completed for cemetery expansion. The back & side portions of Wilkins were cleared of brush & tree stumps and hauled away. The total area was brought up to the grade to the rest of the cemetery and now gives us an additional 15,000 square feet of space for expansion. In addition to the grading, top soil was brought in & seeded. Lots in this section will be sold when remaining lots already mapped are sold. Expansion of the rear portion of East Deering was also completed, adding almost a third of an acre of space. This portion of expansion will be called the Edna Yeaple Annex as it was a gift to the town by Mrs. Yeaple.

The newly created sections will be mapped according to the needs rather than premapping 4 or 6 grave lots. In addition, strict restrictions on stones and ornamentation (plantings) will be instituted to cut maintenance costs. We also anticipate a price increase for the lots and perpetual care so that added labor costs will not have to be covered by additional appropriations by the town.

The restoration work on the town cemeteries also continued with the complete restoration of Goodall Cemetery on Driscoll Farm Road, involving the repair of 65 stones. Restoration work for the coming year will include the small cemetery on Reservoir Road and the Patten Cemetery on Clement Hill Road. It is hoped that the granite enclosure (within East Deering) can be repaired at this time.

The board has been in discussion with the Town of Hillsboro to see if there is a way to resolve the lack of maintenance of Butler & Appleton lots currently in the hands of the town of Hillsboro.

- ARTICLE 2. It was voted to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, V and VI for an optional Veteran's exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for veterans seeking the exemption. The optional veteran's exemption is \$100, rather than \$50. (Yes 221; No 48)
- ARTICLE 3. It was voted to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:35, IV for an optional property tax exemption on residential property for a service-connected total disability. The optional disability exemption is \$1,400, rather than \$700. (Yes 210; No 64)
- ARTICLE 4. It was voted to change the term of the Town Clerk/Tax Collector from one year to three (3) years, beginning with the term of the town clerk/tax collector to be elected at next year's regular town meeting. (Yes 214; No 69)
- ARTICLE 5. It was voted to adopt the "Deering Dog Ordinance", as proposed by the Chief of Police and supported by the Selectmen. (Yes 140; No 131)
- ARTICLE 6. It was voted to adopt the Amendment to the Deering Zoning Ordinance as follows: "The establishment of an Aquifer Protection District in order to protect, preserve, and maintain potential groundwater supplies and related groundwater recharge areas within known aquifers identified by the Town. The objectives of the Aquifer Protection District are: to protect the public health and general welfare of the citizens of Deering; to prevent development and land use practices that would contaminate or reduce the recharge to the identified aquifers; to assure the availability of public and private water supplies for future growth of the Town in accordance with the Master Plan; to encourage uses that can appropriately and safely be located in the aquifer recharge areas." (Yes 178; No 102)

At 7:30 PM Charles A. Gaides, Moderator, opened the meeting with a salute to the flag. At this time the moderator presented a certificate of appreciation and a gift of money to Marjorie Heath who has completed 50 years as Town Auditor. The Moderator then read the following Rules for the Town Meeting:

- 1. If you wish to be recognized, just raise your hand.
- 2. When you are recognized, please stand and state your full name.
- 3. You now have the floor and may speak without interruptions.
- 4. You must address the issue at hand or you will be considered out of order.
- 5. If others desire to comment on what is being said they should raise their hands and when the person speaking is finished they will be recognized.
- 6. Everyone will have an opportunity to speak and with this in mind the motion to close debate will not be recognized.
- 7. If you are making a motion or an amendment the Moderator must receive a printed copy.
- 8. There shall be no more than two (2) amendments at one time. Once we have two we will vote on them.
- 9. To question a ruling of the Moderator requires seven (7) voters.

- 10. Only one (1) reconsideration of an article will be recognized.
- 11. There shall be no substantive motions on the last article.
- ARTICLE 7. It was voted to pass over Article 7 to a recessed Town Meeting on May 15, 1990 at 7:30PM.
- ARTICLE 8. It was voted to accept the reports of the Town Officials, Agents, Committees and Auditors for the year 1989.
- ARTICLE 9. It was voted to pass over Article 9 to a recessed Town Meeting on May 15, 1990 at 7:30PM.

ARTICLE 21. It was voted to postpone indefinitely authorizing the use of a portion of the town owned "Hotel Lot" as the building site for the proposed new Company 3 Fire Station.

ARTICLE 22. This article was tabled.

ARTICLE 23. By a hand vote (Yes - 76, No - 75) it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$41,592 for the Police Department current operating expense.

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Taxes are an issue this year, even more than years previously. Rising costs, greater demand for expanded services and deteriorating road surface conditions are placing a stress on all towns ability to operate within a budget. Deering is under this stress as well.

The fire department has no unexpected budget needs this year. They have, however, enhanced their ability to provide fast professional service by the addition of a new fire house. We owe a vote of appreciation to Ed Naile for many hours of dedicated service. Many other volunteers got behind this project to make it a reality.

Waste disposal and transfer has occupied a lot of time and effort. The situation is under control for this year, but the subject will be an issue in the near future.

The police department has been totally reorganized this year. The hiring of a new chief and subsequent patrolmen have placed the Deering department on par with the best in Hillsboro County.

The selectmen look forward to the final sale of the Hawthorne property and the subsequent use of the airport property.

Thanks goes out to those many volunteers who chair and serve on the many boards that make operating the Town possible.

(Deering's share to be determined by dividing the sum of the equalized evaluation of both Deering & Hillsboro into the cost of the landfill's operation and multiplying the result by Deering's equalized evaluation)

3. Lake refuse removal & expenses 700.00

ARTICLE 28. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,350 for the following membership dues and expenses:

1. NH Resource Recovery Assn' dues 100.00

2. Hillsboro Septic Contract fee 2,000.00

3. CNH Solid Waste District dues 250.00

ARTICLE 29. It was voted to have the Selectmen appoint a five member Historic District Commission to determine what, if any, areas of the Town of Deering should receive special protection. (This article corrects the warrant article approved at the 1989 Town Meeting.)

ARTICLE 30. By amendment it was voted to accept as Class V town roads the roads in the so-called Deering Green subdivision as said roads are depicted on sheets 1, 2, and 3 of the plan entitled "Subdivision Plan of Land on East Deering Road, Deering, New Hampshire, prepared for Hill Country Development, Deering, New Hampshire," by G & Underwood Engineers, INC., Thomas R. Stevens, L.L.S., said plan having been approved by the Deering Planning Board on July 9, 1987, and recorded as Plan 20909, Drawer 87 of the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds. Provided, however, that said roads shall not be declared Class V roads until such time as the Selectmen certify that the roads have been built to Class V standards as set forth in the Town of Deering Subdivision regulations. The Selectmen shall require the developer of the "Land on East Deering Road Subdivision" to pay for the cost of the Town hiring an engineer to investigate and report on the condition of roads in question.

ARTICLE 31. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money.

ARTICLE 32. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept or purchase with appropriated monies, on behalf of the Town any Federal or State surplus fire, police, or highway equipment.

ARTICLE 33. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to trade, sell or otherwise dispose of any surplus Town property, such monies to be deposited into the general fund.

ARTICLE 34. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept any land or interest in land donated to the Town.

ARTICLE 35. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to accept in the name of the Town, donations of conservation land or interest in conservation land to be used as the local matching funds required under the NH Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-A; and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP and appropriate these funds for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land.

ARTICLE 36. It was voted to designate and proclaim April 22, 1990, as Earth Day 1990, encouraging public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and to suggest that every citizen in Deering make at least one change in their lifestyle that will improve the environment.

At this time it was voted to not reconsider all articles previously acted upon by the Town Meeting at the recessed Town Meeting scheduled for May 15, 1990 and agree only to consider Articles 7, 9, and 26 on May 15, 1990.

ARTICLE 37. It was voted to pass a resolution asking the state's congressional delegation to cut military spending and redirect the money to education, environmental protection, deficit reduction and social services.

#### ARTICLE 38.:

- 1. A motion was made by Evangeline Klee Poling, and it was voted that a Study Commission be activated under the jurisdiction of the Selectmen to determine ways to include the youth of Deering to be involved in the Town Affairs with the possibility of receiving credit toward their High School diploma, or graduation. The purpose of this action is to motivate our Deering youth in a Service Program to develop their individual, unique potential, and to say "No" to alcohol and drugs.
- 2. It was strongly urged that the Selectmen consider bonding the remainder of the highway plan presented by the Road Agent and to keep the annual payments at an affordable level.
- 3. It was asked if the Selectmen would declare the 1st Tuesday in March as Voter Information Day and to provide the Town Hall for residents to review the candidates and information regarding Town Meeting.
- 4. Mr. Peter Beane was thanked for his years of service as Selectman.
- 5. It was asked if there was any objection to having Town Meeting on a Saturday rather than Tuesday night.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:30PM to be reconvened on May 15, 1990 to consider Articles 7, 9, and 26.

The meeting was reconvened on May 15, 1990 at 7:30PM. After the Pledge of Allegience, the rules of the meeting were re-read.

It was voted to consider Article 7 after Article 26.

ARTICLE 26. This article was defeated.

ARTICLE 7. By a ballot vote (Yes - 5, No - 70) this article, as amended, to see if the Town would vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase or take by eminent domain the Hawthorne College Airport, and to appropriate the sum of \$500,000 for this purpose, was defeated.

ARTICLE 9. By amendment it was voted to authorize the Selectmen to establish a five member Airport Advisory Board in accordance with RSA 422, 423, and 424.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:37PM.

The fire department and about a dozen volunteers from the community have working very hard to complete the new Company 3 It is nearing completion, and is an addition to the town we can all be proud of. As chief of the fire department, I would like to express a special thanks to volunteers from town who put in many long hours, and gave the technical help we needed to achieve this goal.

The fire department, as always, depends on your support and input. The Deering fire department wishes to take this chance to thank the community for their continued support, and looks forward to working with you this year to make this a safer town to live in. # DEERING RESCUE SOUAD REPORT

The Deering Rescue Squad responded to 48 calls in 1990, approximately half of these were medical emergencies and the other half made up of trauma cases, Mutual Aid to neighboring towns, and in support of the Fire Department at major fires.

We continued to raise funds throughout the year, and we are pleased to announce that we have placed on order a Heart Monitor/Defibrillator unit that will greatly enhance our capabilities. We have estimated that we will use this item on

seventy percent of our calls.

We will be fundraising again in the upcoming year, but that will be in more of a self-supporting nature rather than for one single large expenditure. In 1991 we are focusing our attention on even more extensive in-house training for our personnel, striving to ensure that the townspeople of Deering continue to receive the best possible patient care that we can provide.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

The three leading causes of forest fires were fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden, children, and debris burning fires that escaped control. All of these causes are preventable, but only with your help. By NH State Law (RSA 224:27), no person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire, except when the ground is covered with snow without first obtaining a written permit from the forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.

In order to eliminate false alarms, it is advisable to notify your local fire department whenever you intend to do any outdoor burning. Violations of RSA 224:27 are a misdemeanor and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression costs (RSA 224:28 and RSA 224:36).

## TRANSFER STATION STUDY COMMITTEE

This committees work covered much more than just where the town could place a transfer station. The size of a station to fit Deering's needs had to be determined. The amount of room needed for brush burning, recycling and the actual size of a compactor and containers were all investigated. From discussion with state officials of what we would be required to have it is understood that we could be placed almost anywhere traffic could easily get to and where there was an adequate electrical supply. Public hearings would have to be held to get residents input on where it could be situated. Making a final decision would most likely be a long and difficult process.

Our committee had a rather large budget to work with but it was the goal of the committee to research as much as possible on our own, since the decision to build had not been voted on and approved.

Members of the committee divided into groups to try to cover as much of this complicated issue as possible. Fifteen different towns were visiting to glean the best of their systems. Volumes of material on equipment, regulations, recycling and waste

streams were collected and reviewed so was our contract with Hillsboro and the Co-Operative. Several contractors in the

waste management field came and gave their input also.

Waste removal is going to become a large portion of Deering's tax bill now and in the near future. The days of dumping mixed trash into landfills are over. The one major asset we have is the 20 year contract with the waste to energy Wheelabrator Plant through the Co-Op. Whether we run our own transfer station recycling center in the future will probably be determined in the next few years as the costs from closing Hillsboro landfill become a reality.

### PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Deering Planning Board received 10 applications as of November in 1990. Of the 10 applications, four were for lot line adjustments, one was for recording purposes only, and five were for subdivision review. Four of the 5 subdivision applications were for minor subdivisions, (3 lots or less) and one was for a subdivision of 4 lots. The 5 subdivisions created 9 new building lots. All applications received approval.

Other business conducted by the planning board in 1990 included public hearings on the master plan and the floodplain development ordinance which is to be adopted into the zoning regulations. The master plan is nearly complete and is expected to be adopted in early 1991.

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# ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 1990

The Deering Board of Adjustment received only four petitions during 1990. Three for special exceptions -- tanning salon, beauty parlor and bed & breakfast -- were granted. One appeal for a variance, to build a cabin on an undersized lot on Deering Lake, was denied. A request for rehearing was also denied, because it did not contain new information for consideration by the Board.

In all four cases, applicants came before the Board for a preliminary consultation. The Board feels that this system has helped assure the submission of adequate site plans and driveway and parking arrangements conforming to the Zoning Ordinance. Potential applicants have also been spared the trouble and expense of filing unneeded or inadvisable petitions, such as a golf course under consideration early in the year.

The fee structure for applications to the ZBA was changed to reflect current costs and to make sure that fees collected cover all costs to the Town.

Working with the Deering Zoning Ordinance, it is obvious that a significant overhaul will eventually be necessary. Some needed changes are indicated in the Deering Master Plan, now in draft form. Much will depend, however, on whether a proposed Hillsboro by-pass highway goes through Deering. The provision for home industries should also be clarified, including provision for services as well as home products.

The ZBA presently has a full compliment of five members plus two alternate members and a paid clerk.

## CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Conservation Commission concentrated its efforts during 1990 on several key areas in its function of protecting Deering's natural resources. Essential work continued on: monitoring and providing input to dredge and fill permit applications through the State's Wetlands Board and reporting on violations; monitoring of Deering Lake in cooperation with the Deering Association through the state's Volunteer Lake Assessment Program; cosponsoring a camper to the Forest Society's Conservation Camp at Interlocken (Tracey Clark); coordinating a clean-up day in April; completion of the Water Resources Management & protection section and continued work on the Conservation & Recreation Sections of the Master Plan; participation on both the Contoocook River Coordinating Committee and Piscataquog River Greenway Committee; investigating and reporting on violations of local ordinances and state laws affecting the Town's natural resources.

New initiatives during 1990 included: an Earth Day project which involved Deering high school students working on conservation, clean-up and environmental awareness projects in recognition of Earth Day 19909 in april; the conclusion of the commission's work on the Aquifer Protection Ordinance with the Planning Board with the successful adoption by voters at Town Meeting in March 1990; participation on the Transfer Station Committee and Recycling Committee. The Commission also participated in a complete door to door canvassing of the shorefront landowners on Deering Lake to provide information about the conservation of the Lake and the need for fully functioning septic sys-Initial work has begun on identifying possible wetlands for adoption as prime wetlands at the 1992 town meeting.

Other new projects included the completion of a land protection project with the help of a \$68,000 grant from the state's Land Conservation Investment Program. Tow other conservation easements, both with frontage on Dudley Brook in East Deering, were donated to the Town with help from the Commission. This brings the total number of conservation easements held by the Town to four as 1991 begins. Tow of the easements, one on the Sutherland Farm on East Deering Road and the other on land at Shepherd's Crossing Development also on East Deering Road, were successfully monitored to assure that no violations have occurred. This will be an annual activity.

The Commission identified, and began work on restoring the property boundaries on the Gregg-Sleeper town conservation land. This work will continue into 1991.

# DEERING LAND TRUST TASK FORCE ANNUAL REPORT

Following over 2 years of work in cooperation with the Conservation Commission, the Deering Land Trust Task Force, a sub-committee of the Commission, successfully concluded a conservation grant application to the state's Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP). With support from the Selectmen, the Town applied for, and received, a \$68,000 grant to purchase a conservation easement on the 13 acre Joseph & Beverly Lindquist property which provides the outstanding view west at the intersection of

Route 149 and Old County Road. The easement forever protects the land from development while allowing the property to still be owned and managed for conservation uses by the Lindquist family and provide property tax revenue to the Town. The easement is

binding on all future owners of the property.

Making the grant possible was a generous donation of a conservation easement to the Town on 40 acres of the Sutherland Farm by Richard Leghorn in late 1989. This donation provided the 50% match which the Town needed in order to be eligible to apply for the grant under the LCIP's rules. Just over \$2,000 of the \$5,000 from the conservation fund appropriated at the 1988 town meeting was used to complete the project, (for surveys & title work) - worth over \$150,000 in purchased & donated easement value.

The Task Force wished to thank the Selectmen for their support of this worthwhile land conservation project and the landowners for their willingness to cooperate. Deering citizens can breath easy that "the view" fro Rt. 149 will always be there.
