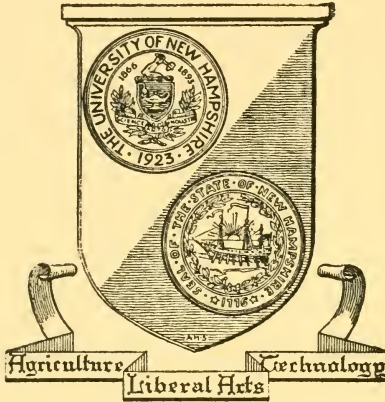

## VALEDICTORY ADDRESS

by

HON. T. JEWETT CHESLEY

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Delivered January 3, 1934.

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GENTLEMEN OF THE CITY COUNCILS AND FELLOW CITIZENS:

It is my purpose and my privilege today to review the accomplishments and achievements of the past five years, during which period, I have served the City of Dover as its chief executive. I have no desire or right to delve into the future any more than my successor has the right to review the past.

The problems that have presented themselves have been met as the need arose. If the solution of those problems has stood the test of time I am humbly grateful. All situations must be faced as they appear at the moment they arise, not as viewed after the test of time.

To the members of the city councils and the various committees and commissions who have acted with me in whatever has been accomplished in the way of achievement I desire to render my sincere appreciation.

What the accomplishments, other than those of a routine nature, have been, can be placed in two classes: the first those visible; the second the invisible.

Under the first class I would call attention to the Central Avenue cement construction for nearly its entire length, the newly constructed sidewalks, the development of Henry Law Park, the beautification of the lawn in front of Pine Hill Cemetery, the triangular section be-

tween Central and Stark Avenues, the new walks around the High School and the Public Library, the new street and sidewalk construction in various parts of the city.

The accomplishments of the invisible class include completion of the Berry Brook sewer, the Main Street sewer, Fourth and Washington Street sewer, the Court street sewer, Oak Street, Ela Street, Hill Street, Florence Street, Rose Street, and also the water pipe that has been laid under the supervision of the Water Department during the time of my administration. Thirty-five thousand, one hundred ninety-three feet, or six and three-fifths miles of water mains have been installed. This does not include the Dover Point project which is being completed. One of the different items is that of the Main Street sewer, laid through 300 feet of solid ledge.

Our city has suffered heavy losses. Miss Caroline H. Garland, Librarian in our Public Library was in herself an institution. She was recognized because of her long service of nearly 50 years and her brilliant abilities as one of the best anywhere.

Our beautiful City Hall burned. We have recognized as have other communities in their messages, the greatness of that loss.

Arthur Davis, Collector of Taxes for eight years, by his sacrificial toil and his accurate handling of affairs, came to a foremost place as an outstanding citizen and official.

City Clerk Fred E. Quimby for more than forty years efficient, courteous, unselfish, ready to help all who were in trouble gave us a unique place among the cities of our state.

We can replace the City Hall. Already the fire debris has been removed, over 900,000 bricks have been salvaged, plans and specifications have been drawn for a new building and for Police Headquarters on Orchard

Street. The plans to make the Orchard Street headquarters suitable are already being executed.

We cannot replace our personal losses. These three great figures in the life of our city have gone and we are poorer for their going but vastly richer because we have been privileged to be associated with them in our municipality.

The Henry Law Park has been developed far beyond the expectation of the Park Commissioners and the donor. Guppy Park has been especially improved and improvements have also been made in Woodman Park.

None of these achievements would have been possible without the cooperation of the city councils and the various commissions.

During my administration the Eliot Bridge has been freed, and the City has secured a ground well and water supply at only a small fraction of the expected cost.

This year has been one of the busiest at the Wentworth Hospital and under the direction of the efficient Superintendent, Miss Grace P. Haskell, its future is secure. Our Library closes the year with the largest circulation of books in its history. This speaks well for our city.

The financial condition of the city owing to the serious illness of the City Treasurer, cannot at this time be recorded in detail. Suffice it to say that the City of Dover has a cash balance in its treasury of approximately \$158,000.

We have been through a very serious depression, with two years of the most serious times ever seen, yet we have been able to maintain a low tax rate and to keep the credit of the city high, while at the same the tax rate diminished.

Our welfare work is out of city management, having been taken over by the state according to the law of New Hampshire.

I believe Dover to be outstanding among all the cities of its size in the country and as I hand over to my successor the administration of our municipality, I give him my pledge of loyalty as a citizen of Dover, the city great in its traditions, but never stronger or finer than now.

## INAUGURAL ADDRESS

by

**HON. F. CLYDE KEEFE**

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**Delivered January 3, 1934.**

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GENTLEMEN OF THE CITY COUNCILS:

With gratitude to our fellow citizens for the high honor conferred upon us at the recent election, and with full knowledge of the responsibilities which go with the honor, we today assume the duties of the government of the city of Dover for the years 1934 and 1935.

By law and by precedent our city is governed on the same partisan political basis as is our state and our nation. Therefore, during the next two years the administrative offices will be held by the members of the great political party to which the mayor and a majority of the city councils belong, excepting, of course, those officials who are to be selected on a bi-partisan basis under the charter or the city ordinances. This will, no doubt, in some cases, cause the removal of efficient officials, but there is no alternative, because it is imperative that those who occupy the administrative offices should be in sympathy with, and loyal to, the executive and legislative branches of our city government. In no other way, under our present set-up, can a new administration be held strictly accountable to the electorate. With this in mind I call upon the members of the majority party to elect city officials of integrity and ability. I urge those chosen to have a deep regard for the trust imposed in them, to devote all their energy and all their talents to the faith-

ful discharge of their duties, and extend every courtesy to the general public.

I want it to be distinctly understood that I have a wholesome respect for the rights of the minority in legislative bodies, and I believe that members of the minority party should be represented on every committee. In order that this privilege of minority representation may be guaranteed, a resolution will be offered today to change the rules under which this city government has functioned. I sincerely hope it will be adopted and never changed in the future by either party.

The city of Dover is a municipal corporation with assets in the form of taxable property of over fifteen million dollars, and with an annual overhead of over six hundred thousand dollars. A good business man, assuming the office of chairman of the board of directors of that size, would naturally request a careful audit, to the end that he might obtain a minute statement of the exact financial status of each and every department. That is what I propose to do and authority for an audit will shortly be requested from the city councils. I seek this audit, not in a spirit of possible criticism of any of the preceding administrations, but solely for the purpose of determining the present assets and liabilities of our city. Also, I hope to obtain the necessary information which will enable us to initiate a modern system of bookkeeping and accounting at a time when the city will construct a new municipal building and install new fixtures, new filing systems, and a new system of municipal finance and control.

I propose to issue a monthly statement during the next two years of the exact financial status of each department, showing the amount of expenditures and the balance remaining from each departmental appropriation. This will be of great assistance to the department heads

and will keep the public fully informed as to municipal finances.

During the past year the city sustained a great loss in the destruction of the city hall. A new municipal building must be erected. I understand that plans and specifications have been approved. Before the contracts are signed, I trust that the plans will be altered so as to include the police station and municipal court room on the Locust Street side of the new building. I am unalterably opposed to the project that would place the police station on Orchard Street. I maintain that the interests of safety and economy require the police department to be in the city building. In order to accomplish this I shall ask the city government for a new city hall committee to include the finance committee and four citizens to be appointed by the Mayor. This committee should immediately confer with the architect and the contractor now working on the Orchard Street building, and ascertain whether some feasible plan can be adopted to solve this troublesome problem. The recommendations of the committee should be submitted to a special meeting of the city councils for approval or rejection. No time should be lost as it is most desirable to start the new building at once.

An honest effort will be made to keep down municipal expenses with a lower tax rate as our goal. However, we face the fact that our citizens must be assisted over this period of national depression. We do not know how long this condition will continue but I can see a rainbow of hope arising from the peace-time trenches where the army of civilian workers is now toiling on the projects of the civil works administration which are financed by the federal government. The patriotic spirit of these men speaks volumes; it is absolute proof that America is still safe, and that the will to work is the way to win the terrific fight. I have an abiding faith that victory



is in sight. This faith comes to me from the inspiration I receive from the radiant faces of the American manhood which smile out from the trenches and the ditches and the roads and the bridges. They shine as a beacon light to point the way to a new and better day. Hope comes to me as I raise my eyes to the happy, smiling, kindly man who stands at the helm at Washington—the great leader of the new deal, Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Under his leadership let us pray that the day will soon come when want and privation shall be vanished from our fair city. May we soon see all our people working short hours, under proper conditions, for adequate wages, with good food and good shelter, warm and comfortable, well-fed, well-clothed, prosperous and happy.

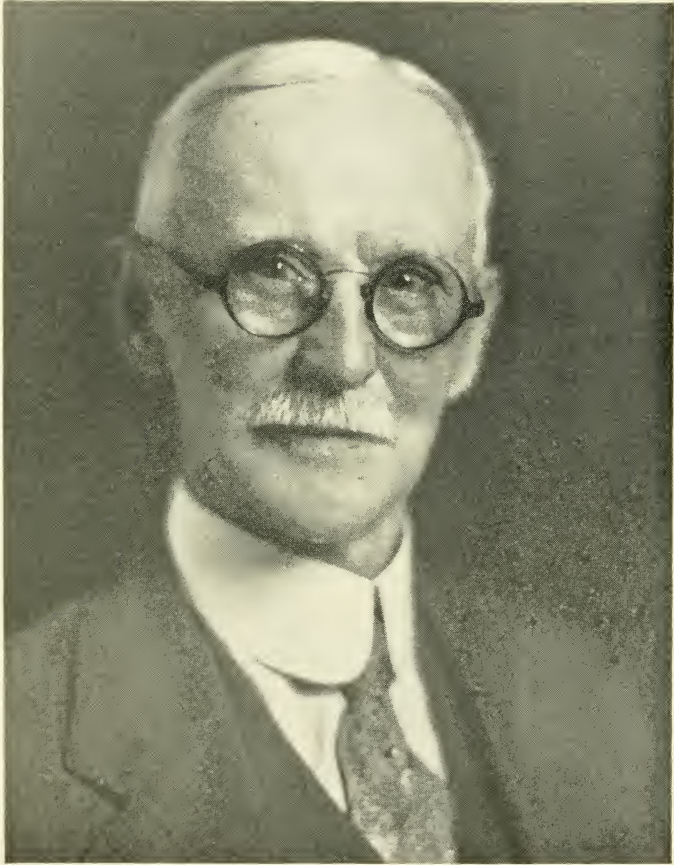

The deficit in the department expenditures is largely attributable to the disastrous fire of the City Hall Building August 3, 1933. The number of patients admitted during the past year ranks first, numerically, in the tabulation of admissions for the past twenty-eight years, yet it heads the list in the number of those who received free or partially free service. The ratio of free patients treated reached a total of 29 per cent of the total registration. Some conception of the charitable work performed by the hospital may be gathered from the fact that the equivalent of fifteen years' continuous service was rendered impecunious patients during the past twelve months, exclusive of those who were treated for less than the regular rates.

Of the 1293 patients admitted, 858 were from Dover; 48 from South Berwick; 81 from Durham; 71 from Somersworth; 14 from Rollinsford; 28 from North Berwick; 9 from Rochester; 12 from Portsmouth and the remaining 172 were from widely separated towns and cities in New Hampshire, Maine, Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, Vermont, Connecticut, New Jersey, Illinois, South Carolina, Michigan, North Carolina, and the District of Columbia.

During the year, through the generosity of the trustees of a fund established by Albert Norton Parlin of Everett, Mass., but a summer resident of New Hampshire, who established a trust, the interest thereof to be devoted to free beds in hospitals in Massachusetts and New Hampshire, the Wentworth Hospital received the sum of \$20,000 as a gift which is to be invested as a permanent fund and the interest to be expended each year for the purposes designated in Mr. Parlin's will.

By the will of Lydia Rollins, late of Dover, the hospital received the sum of \$1,067.14.

From the Estate of Charles A. Fairbanks the hospital received the sum of \$7,034.47.

From the Estate of Abbie I. Lane the hospital received \$5,009.20.

From the Estate of Lydia H. Dame the hospital received \$756.81.

The above bequests and gifts clearly indicate the interest of some of our citizens and others in the operation of the hospital and the great amount of effective work that is being done within its walls.

From those who have received the benefits of the care and nursing and comfort come words of praise that such an institution is within our borders.

To those who need its help, it presents a wonderful opportunity for treatment unexcelled elsewhere.

Its finances are not such as to develop it to its fullest extent, but its needs merit the interests of every person who is able to give assistance to those in sickness and suffering.

The past year has been a strenuous one for the Superintendent of the hospital, and her corps of assistants, yet the consciousness that those long and weary hours of service ultimately brought restored health to those entrusted to their charge and hope and happiness to the family circles from whence they came, in a large measure overshadows the memory of those days of sacrificing toil which they were called upon to perform.

On the thirteenth day of October 1933, Mr. Fred E. Quimby, Clerk of the Board of Trustees of the Wentworth Hospital, answered the final summons and entered into eternal life. He was ever faithful to his duties not only on this board, but in all other positions of trust which he held. In private life he was a wise and devoted parent and a loyal friend.

For particular details as to the financial management of the hospital, as well as for all information relative to internal administration, you are respectfully referred to the detailed reports of the superintendent and other department officials hereto attached and made a part of this report.

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The year 1933 shows the largest number of patients admitted in any one year since the Hospital opened its doors to the sick. It has been necessary to exercise the greatest economy consistent with the proper care of the patients because of the business depression which has seriously affected all institutions, hospitals especially. The average person has had great difficulty in meeting financial obligations because of decreased income largely due to lack of employment. The hospital has cooperated to the utmost in assisting this class of patients to whom sickness means a very heavy financial burden. It is a fact that the very poor and the rich seek hospital care at once, while the great middle class which is so vital a part of our national life hesitates to either ask for aid or to assume more debts.

Accident patients especially those resulting from automobile accidents present a very grave problem to all hospitals. It is the exception when these accounts are settled when a patient leaves the hospital. Many patients remain weeks and such cases are oftener than not in-

volved in litigation which means a long time before settlements are reached.

The need for repair work and painting is very great inside the hospital. I respectfully urge the Board of Trustees to give this matter their consideration. We have had work done in the basement, sealing all cracks in the concrete which is constantly watched due to the infestation of the grounds with termites.

In the midst of our very busy year we have graduated thirteen nurses. This has made it necessary to engage more graduates for general duty. Hospitals throughout the country are decreasing the numbers in the Training School in order to employ graduate nurses and thus relieve the unemployment situation. Three hospitals in New Hampshire have decided to abolish their Training Schools or at least not to admit student nurses for some time.

We have given employment these last weeks to a number of people on the C. W. A. relief. There are six young women who are being trained as attendants. One graduate nurse making surgical dressings. One school teacher instructing Harvey and one woman sewing. This group is employed in doing work actually needing to be done and can be given the employment because the Wentworth Hospital is owned by the City of Dover. The training given these young women acting as attendants will be to them of the greatest value.

The reports of the Pathologist and Technician, also that of the Roentgenologist are attached to this report. A comparison of these reports with those of last year shows an interesting increase of work in both departments.

The Staff have held their usual monthly meetings and have done a great amount of record work. The records being entirely finished for the year 1933 which is a record in itself. The time and thought which this devoted group of men give to the sick in the Hospital can-

not be over estimated. We are grateful for immediate response made to all calls sent from the Hospital.

Dr. Louis Flanders has resigned from the Training School Committee after having served since 1906. We shall miss him and are very grateful for his long term of service and feel that his instruction and influence have been of inestimable value.

My grateful thanks are due to the Board of Trustees for the kindness and courtesy extended me through this year. It is one of the things that compensate for the many hard things that one faces in Hospital work.

The cost of this work was \$7,127.77. 1,787 loads of gravel, 47 loads of fill, 197 loads of cinders, 1 load of sand,  $13\frac{1}{2}$  loads of cold patch, 37 loads of stone dust, 6 loads of ledge chips and  $\frac{1}{2}$  bag of cement.

The streets, roads and sidewalks have been broken out when necessary, at a cost of \$2,168.65.

The snow was hauled from the streets, 1,895 loads, costing \$1,175.81.

Twenty-one catch basins have been repaired and six new catch basins put in at a cost of \$786.08.

Driveways and drains have been repaired and one driveway paved at a cost of \$44.14.

The sidewalks were sanded and cinders and gravel put on the streets where necessary, using 141 loads of sand and 37 loads of cinders at a cost of \$888.25.

The streets have been cleaned, hauling off 862 loads at a cost of \$2,468.58.

Catch basins were cleaned, hauling off 138 loads at a cost of \$431.11. The gutters were cleaned, hauling off 71 loads at a cost of \$186.02. One gutter paved at a cost of \$6.84.

732 loads of leaves were hauled off at a cost of \$520.27.

Sand and cinders have been stored for use on streets during the winter.

Cost of putting up snow fences in outside districts was \$71.92.

Four trucks have been newly painted at a total cost of \$364.33.

The streets have been patched with cold patch and hot top patch using 93½ loads of patch, 5 of cinders, 15 of fill and sand, 76 of gravel and 25 of stone dust in the work at a cost of \$1,612.25.

In maintenance oiling of the streets, 8 loads of stone, 112 of gravel, 8 of fill, 292 of sand, 141 of cold patch, 70,992 gallons of oil and 25 tons of calcium chloride were used at a cost of \$12,439.16.

**ANNUAL REPORT**  
**of the**  
**SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

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*To the School Committee:*

I have the honor to submit to you my sixteenth annual report.

According to custom, there are submitted at this time reports from the Finance Committee, of the School Committee,—the Headmaster of the High School, the teachers of special subjects, and the school nurse. These reports show in a more or less detailed form the classroom work and condition of the schools, including the usual statistical data.

My purpose in this report is to direct your attention and thought to the basic plan and structure of our school system, rather than to a review of the detailed work of the classroom.

You are, in effect, a board of directors, whose judgment determines what changes shall be made in our school system. You decide, within certain limits, what subjects shall be taught and what special activities shall be carried on in our schools. Our splendid Mechanic Arts department, in which we may take a justifiable pride, is the result of your interest and effort in its behalf. Our fine gymnasium and department of physical education came into being because you considered such activities a vital part of the education of the modern boy and girl. The same is true of many other parts of our school system. And it is true that back of your action, lie the economic changes and demands of human life itself, which exert great influence in shaping the structure which we call our school

system. In a low state of civilization, these demands are simple and few. We live in a high state of civilization, where these demands are many and complex. Education is broader and more universal in its application. The non-essentials of yesterday are the essentials of today. This is only another way of saying that human life continues to grow more and more complex, and demands more and more highly trained intelligences to maintain and develop its possibilities.

The economic changes now taking place in the industrial world are full of significance to those who are interested in schools. The machine age is here. The production of food, clothing and shelter in abundance for all, now requires but a fraction of the hours of labor necessary only a few years ago. This is bound to have a vital effect on the educational equipment with which we must prepare our boys and girls for life. We have been emphasizing the need of industrial training; we must now train them for the proper use of leisure—the leisure that has suddenly been thrust upon the young people who are through their school life, and who cannot find employment in gainful occupation. And let nobody think that this will be no vital feature of the education of tomorrow. Our schools can and should have much to do with the manner in which men and women of tomorrow will spend the leisure to which they have so suddenly fallen heir.

The wise use of this spare time may transform it into a precious inheritance, while its misuse will result in the formation of habits detrimental to both the individual and to society. Hours of leisure should mean hours of pleasure—of enjoyment. What form shall it take? We should not attempt to dictate in this field—but we may provide wise, thoughtful guidance. Such guidance should aid the youth of the country in avoiding the worthless, futile, trashy forms of entertainment, which can add nothing whatever to the enrichment of life or character.



What an opportunity lies here, to make or mar life. The schools should be alive to the situation. This need not mean the establishment of new courses. We already have the courses necessary to fit the occasion. Music, art, literature—health activities—these must be brought to the front, equipped and developed as never before. The mind which is satisfied with the average radio program is sadly lacking in real musical appreciation. Such a taste is immature—undeveloped.

Let us have our radios, our orchestras, our bands. Let's have real music, music that will stir our souls to noble thought and action. Music that is worth while!

And what shall be said of the mind which finds satisfaction in the average moving pictures of today? Is the fault wholly with the producers, or is it with an uncultivated or degenerate public taste? We may be certain that a large part of the leisure time of the people will be spent in the moving picture theatres. A sincere and concerted demand by the general public for wholesome, normal, clean pictures, should result in a real improvement in the quality of entertainment provided.

What about the results of school work in literature? The vital questions for us to answer, are these: Have our pupils developed a real love of reading and of good literature? Do they continue to read after graduation, and what do they read?

Physical training should stress a love of nature. Outdoor sports are mentally, morally and spiritually beneficial, and the book of nature is material for a life-time of study and delight. We should have more of botany, forestry, zoology, presented in a broader, more interesting way than in the short text-book portion of such subjects usually included in a high school course. The works of John Burroughs and Henry Thoreau should be required reading in such a course of study.

## MARKS

The average person accepts "marks" or "grades" at face value, without much thought as to what they really mean. Your boy or girl achieves a mark of 90 in some subject and you are elated. But if the mark be 50, you are cast down. There may be weeping and wailing, disappointment and discouragement—a stormy session between parent and child. Blame, recrimination and criticism for the child, his teacher and everything connected with his school life. And all for a mark of 50!

Now just exactly what does a mark of 50 or 90 mean? Ask some teacher to show the method by which she arrives at these marks. You will find as many different methods as there are teachers.

These marks should mean that the boy or girl has *learned* 90 per cent or 50 per cent of something, but they do not, and cannot mean anything of the sort. When learning takes place it is a completed process. There is no 50 per cent or 90 per cent to it.

It is difficult, within the limited space of a report of this kind, to define learning and its evaluation. We have accepted our conventional markings on a percentile basis for so long, that any abrupt break with it would entail a long discussion. There are so many different views of it, even among those of us who are forced to use it, that there is no agreement as to what it really means, how it should be reckoned, or what it tells. I believe it to be neither honest nor fair.

What can be said of the reliability of a marking system in which a group of teachers rated a paper, and the marks given ranged from 25 to 95. And this was a paper in arithmetic!

Suppose a pupil received a mark of 25 as his rating on this paper, what would it mean? 25 per cent of what? Perhaps he would receive a mark of 95 from another teacher, what of that? What would it mean, what sig-

nificance has it? It is clear to me, after long experience with the process, that it is not based on anything scientific, and because of the many elements of chance involved, is unfair to pupils.

The chief trouble with our percentage ratings of pupils' work is that they do not tell what real permanent values the pupils have acquired. At best they indicate only the measure of success with which pupils have performed a memory game, in which chance plays an important part. Some very intelligent pupils cannot play this memory game well, and are marked as failures, when, in fact, they are nothing of the kind. Permanent values they can and do acquire, but receive no credit for doing so. All this makes a pretty strong indictment of our marking system. Another evil feature of it is that pupils are in competition with one another for a high showing of marks, which fosters an unhealthy, pseudo-intellectual snobbery.

The city of Newton, Massachusetts has registered its dissatisfaction with such a system by abolishing all marks in the grade schools. This may be going to an extreme length in order to rid themselves of an unsatisfactory condition of affairs. It is my opinion that this solution is not the best one to be found. What we must do, is to discover and record all permanent values which pupils acquire.

#### CHANGES IN THE TEACHING FORCE

With the closing of the school year in June, Mr. Charles L. Wallace, Headmaster of our High School completed fifteen years of faithful, devoted service here, and retired from active life. Mr. Wallace, through the long years of his work as an educator, has won an enviable place among school leaders in this state, where most of his life-work has been done. An able and efficient administrator, disciplinarian and instructor, he has always given the utmost of time, strength and thought to his work. His

standards have been high, and he has required and obtained, from teachers and pupils alike, the best they have to give in their school work. We are fortunate in having had so many years of service, from the full experience and ripe wisdom of Mr. Wallace's life as an educator, and it is our sincere hope that the quiet life to which he has retired may bring him peace and happiness for many years to come.

In looking for a new Headmaster for our High School, the first name to suggest itself for our consideration, was that of Mr. Clifton H. Dustin, the most suitable candidate, it seemed, for the position. Mr. Dustin was formerly sub-master in the Dover High School, and head of the Mechanic Arts Department. From here he was called to a position of responsibility in the State Department at Concord, where he was Supervisor of Trades and Industries, and in which position he achieved a marked success. When the State Department, with great reluctance, released Mr. Dustin, he accepted the position of Headmaster in our High School.

With the advent of Mr. Dustin, there was no break in the general administration, no sense of re-adjustment which usually follows when a new man takes the helm. The school work continued with unbroken smoothness, aided greatly by the warm welcome and friendly spirit of cooperation shown by the entire faculty to the new Headmaster, in which feeling the entire student body joined. Mr. Dustin's first year in his new position has already given ample assurance that we have the right man for the place.

Other changes occurring in the teaching force this year are as follows: Miss Victoria Grinnell, resigning from the High School faculty, was replaced at the beginning of the year by Miss Cynthia Corson.

Miss Elizabeth Hatch, whose first grade class at the Sherman school was closed on account of the small regis-

tration, was transferred to a new sixth grade opened in the same building. Miss Hatch was later elected to the second grade vacancy in the Hale school, and Miss Mary Daley was elected to the Sherman school sixth grade.

In December we were saddened by the loss of one of our best-known and most beloved teachers, when death suddenly came to Miss Edith Gowen. For many years her sweet personality, her kind, gentle guidance of the little ones who came under her care, made her rare character as a teacher something to be remembered, and several generations in Dover will unite in the reverent memory of Miss Gowen.

In a financial way, the School Department has made a remarkable showing this year, by completing the year without a deficit. This is as surprising as it is commendable, in view of the fact that there was a cut of \$5,000 made in the appropriation. Following that, came the disastrous city hall fire, which entailed a heavy loss of school supplies, office furniture and equipment, on which the insurance of \$500 was far from adequate.

We had a little larger income from tuition than usual, but the main reason for our good financial condition was the 10 per cent salary contribution to the Department by all school employees from April 1 to December 1. Had this not been done, it would have been necessary to reduce salaries or drop some department of school work, in order to keep within our budget. Let us hope that with the passing of the peak of the depression, it may not be necessary for either of these catastrophes to take place. Let us not lose our sense of values, however hard the times may be. Let us not fail to be just and fair, more than that, if possible, to these children who can do nothing to secure for themselves that which is their right, a good public school education, which will prepare them for happy, useful manhood and womanhood.

Economy must be practised, thrift must be stressed in every department of our national and civic life, but let us not make the mistake of taking too much from these young people. Remember that they can do nothing about it, they must take what they are given. Let us see to it that there is no bitter feeling of resentment in the young people of tomorrow, because they were deprived of just treatment in their educational opportunities.

GENTLEMEN:—I have the pleasure of presenting the forty-sixth annual report of the Superintendent, showing the present condition of the department, the extensions and improvements made, together with a statement in detail of the financial condition of the department for the year ending December 31, 1933.

The Extensions of the mains for the year were as follows:

Dover Point Road, 10,560 feet of 8-inch pipe and one hydrant.

Grove Street, 500 feet of 6-inch pipe.

In conclusion I would recommend that a centrifugal pump direct connected to a Sterling gasoline engine be installed on the foundation of the old electric driven pump which has seen several years service and cannot be depended upon; this pump to be used for a stand-by only.

Steps should be taken as soon as possible to connect the Layne well direct with the reservoir, thus saving the expense of one pumping. Also for better protection in case of a bad fire by having two ways of pumping direct into the system, also for protection against any accident which might happen to our pumps at the Lowell Avenue station.

The reservoir will have to be cleaned out and new strainers put in during the coming summer; also the filter sand will have to be renewed this coming year.

State laws require that all milk producers and dealers who make a business of selling milk, skim milk, or cream, unless a license has first been obtained, shall be fined not more than ten dollars for the first offense and for any subsequent offence he shall be fined fifty dollars.

The sum of two dollars is required for a dealer's license.

## INCINERATOR

The value of the incinerator in destroying obnoxious matter of every description is being more and more appreciated each year.

The destruction of dead animals, the removal of cats and dogs from the streets, the destruction of bedding, old book accounts, paper and rubbish from business establishments is conducted under the supervision of experienced men.

A Joint Special Committee appointed by the City Councils to improve conditions, contracted with the Morse Boulger Destructor Company of New York, N. Y., for the building of a new Incinerator. Accepted December 9, 1933.

The Incinerator Committee consisted of Frank J. Grimes, Chairman, Leo Carroll, Jos. F. Keenan, Alonzo G. Wiland, John D. Grady.

The destruction of material from the Beckwith Mfg. Co., is proving to be a serious problem to care for. Accumulates in large quantities. Unsafe to handle rapidly.

The following resolution passed by concurrent vote of the City Councils, Dec. 7, 1933.

That all ashes are to be kept and placed for collection in separate containers, also that waste material shall be wrapped in paper and placed for collection in the same container with waste paper and tin cans.

This should be done, in order that the material can be taken care of more efficiently at the incinerator plant.

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### DENTAL CLINIC

The Dental Clinic operated by the District Nursing Association continues to care for the mouths of underprivileged children.

341 children were admitted during the year 1933 and 844 treatments rendered.

The demands on the clinic increase each year and it is hoped that some means may be found to finance this increased demand.

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### N. H. TUBERCULOSIS ASSOCIATION, INC., REPORT FOR DOVER, N. H., 1933

The New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association held 11 clinics in Dover during 1933, with an average attendance of 15 patients at each clinic.

All suspicious and active cases were followed-up by the association's nurse, for advice regarding rest, diet and home treatment under tuberculosis regime.

Patients were advised sanatorium treatment when practical, and if willing, were admitted to the sanatorium as soon as vacancies occurred.

The work of the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association is financed wholly, by the sale of Christmas seals and

contributions, made by the people of New Hampshire, and despite a much reduced income, the association was able to carry on its case-finding and prevention program as before.

We thank the City of Dover for providing us with suitable clinic rooms, and trust it will continue to do so.

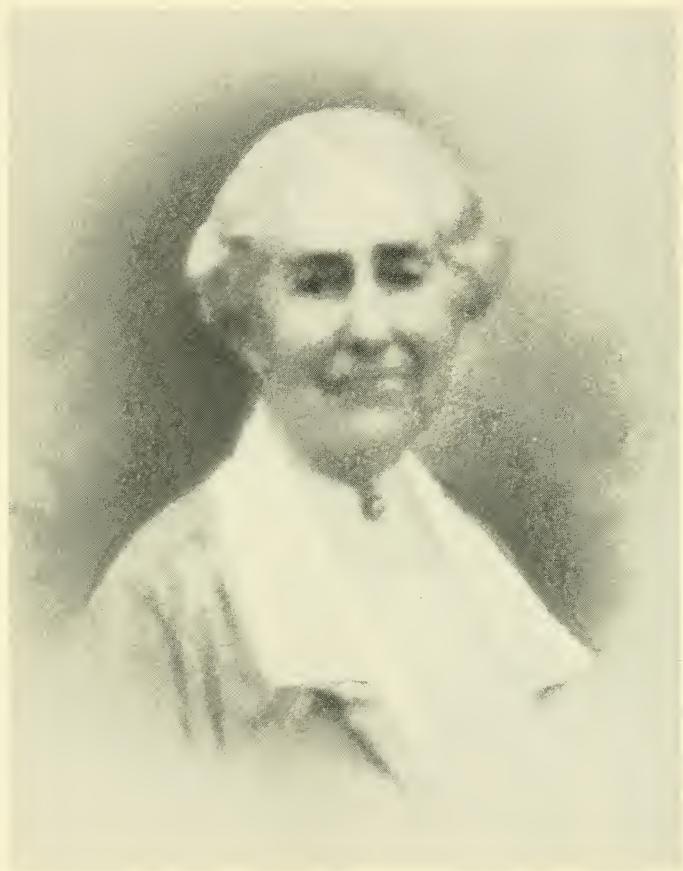

*To the City Councils of the City of Dover:*

The Trustees during the past year have given faithful attention to all matters pertaining to the work of the library. Their meetings, which were held monthly, except in July and August, have been attended by the full Board.

In June the library met with a great loss in the death of Miss Caroline H. Garland who had given distinguished service for nearly fifty years. To fill the vacancy Miss Beatrice M. G. Jenkins was elected Librarian and Miss Anne E. Leach was elected Assistant Librarian, and we feel assured that under the guidance of the Librarian and her efficient staff of assistants the library will continue to progress and maintain its position as second to none of its size.

The library has received by a bequest left by the will of Miss Abbie F. Lane the sum of \$272.17 which is deposited in the Merchants Savings Bank of Dover, N. H.

The library has been somewhat handicapped by the decrease in the financial appropriation made necessary by the financial depression. However, the circulation of books has increased and for the past year has been the largest of any year since the library was established.

For full details of the work for the past year we call your attention to the reports of the Librarian and Treasurer, appended to and made a part of this report.

## REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

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*To the Board of Trustees of the Dover Public Library:*

GENTLEMEN:—The report of the librarian showing the work of the library for the year 1933 is herewith presented.

### THE YEAR'S WORK

If the circulation is an index of its vigor and usefulness then the Dover Public Library can take pride in the following figures:

During the year there were sent out for home use 79,505 volumes, of which 13,818 volumes were from the Children's Room. This shows the remarkable gain of 5,875 over last year, and is the largest circulation in the history of the Library. It is in keeping with the gains made by other libraries, partly due no doubt to the depression, during which libraries throughout the country

have been called upon in many ways to help keep up the courage and morale of the public.

This has meant not only more charging and discharging of books, but more repair work, greater supervision of the shelves, and more personal help to those who want books by certain authors or on certain subjects, or who like readable books suggested to them. It doesn't take into account the volumes used in the Library and not taken from the building. Many such groups are reserved for the use of the High School students, and not infrequently visitors to the Reading Room ask for books to supplement the magazines and newspapers.

The daily attendance also has been large, especially in the Children's Room where 13,177 boys and girls, teachers and parents have come to the room for books or to sit at the tables and read or use the picture puzzles. Visitors to the Reading Room, including a large proportion of High School students, numbered 12,200. Few days have gone by without the resources of the Historical Room having been used by people—often from distant cities—who were interested in genealogy, and who came to consult the Dover and other records. New registrations have numbered 679, seventeen more than last year. Twenty-three of these were out of town borrowers who availed themselves of the annual subscription privilege.

Due to serious illness the assistant librarian, Miss Jenkins, was out of the Library for three months, and for two months more was unable to take her full time. This threw much additional work on the librarian, Miss Garland, and on the other assistants. Miss Morrill took over much of the classifying and accessioning, and Miss Parker and Miss Morrison with devotion and efficiency helped the Library to carry on its routine work. Miss Junkins, who as substitute for a number of years had always held herself ready for library calls, gave valuable service.

On June 24th the Library lost by death its honored and

beloved librarian, Miss Caroline H. Garland, and the assistant librarian, Miss Beatrice M. G. Jenkins, was placed in charge. At the October meeting of the Board of Trustees, Miss Jenkins was elected librarian, and Miss Anne E. Leach reference librarian of the Perth Amboy, New Jersey Public Library was elected assistant librarian.

The Library is most fortunate in securing the services of a young woman with the education, training and experience that Miss Leach brings to her work.

In all of its activities since June it has been the one purpose of the Library to maintain the policy and carry forward the plans of Miss Garland.

To facilitate the work with the High School, early in the school year there was revived the custom of giving talks to the Freshman Class on the use and resources of the Library. This was done on three days of each week in the hour before library opening time. There were thus over 200 students who were shown something about the card catalogue; where the different classes of books were shelved in the stack room; and how biographical and other material connected with their studies could most readily be found in encyclopedias, magazine indexes and other books of reference.

In order to make room for newly bound magazines and to ease up the crowded shelves of the Smithsonian publications, it became necessary to move all the bound periodicals and certain non-fiction classes that were shelved in the basement of the stack room. It was a large piece of work, as there were approximately 15,000 volumes, exclusive of the unbound, but tied-up magazines. It took some time to accomplish, but it was carried out with very small expense to the Library as the actual shifting was most efficiently done by the janitor, Mr. Alonzo G. Willand and an assistant, Merrill Hall.

In addition to the daily activities of the Library, books have been sent to the Wentworth Home, weekly notices

of new book additions, and from time to time a column of Library Notes have been prepared for the local paper, Foster's Daily Democrat.

Children's Book Week was observed by an unusually large display of attractive new books, and on the closing Saturday a play was given by the children of the seventh and eighth grades of the Central School through the kindness, and under the direction of Mrs. E. M. Folsom, Miss Fannie Morrison, Miss Myrtle Allen, and Miss Pauline Costerackis. After the play stories were told by Miss Edith G. Brewster of the Dover Neighborhood House.

A generous number of gifts have been received through the year. Most noteworthy was a bequest from Miss Abbie F. Lane of \$272.17, the interest of which is to be spent for books. This is valued not only for the additional money thus provided for book purchases, but because it was given by one who for many years used and enjoyed the Library. Among the other gifts are photographs of historic value, periodicals, original manuscripts and books. Through the courtesy of societies, clubs, religious bodies and individuals many magazines come regularly to the Reading Room. From the Government many hundreds of valuable bound volumes and pamphlets have been received, and from the State have come the annual reports of the various departments. From this last source an especially noteworthy gift is the last volume of State Papers, containing the Probate Records of the Province of New Hampshire 1730-1753. It carries on the Records that have already been published in three volumes beginning with the dates 1635-1717. Edited by Otis G. Hammond, Director of the New Hampshire Historical Society, it has been years in preparation and will make an invaluable addition to the genealogical records in the Historical Room. The Library has all four volumes. From the City there were received, after the disastrous fire which burned the City Hall, over one hundred annual reports of New Hamp-

shire cities. They will help fill gaps in the Library files. An especially welcome gift came from Mrs. Philip Brown. This consisted of 124 volumes, including books by such authors as Prescott, Irving, Hume, Emerson, and others of equal rank, and a number of novels by popular authors. Through the courtesy of the publishers, Foster's Daily Democrat and Foster's Weekly Democrat come to the Library regularly. Besides being among the most popular newspapers on the Reading Room tables, they are of the greatest importance as bound volumes in the Historical Room.

In the report for 1932 there was shown something of the progress made by the Library in the nearly fifty years of its history. It is fitting that in this succeeding report a debt should be acknowledged and a tribute paid to one who did so much to make that progress possible.

Elected as librarian in her young womanhood, Miss Garland, with her tastes, education and standards influenced by scholarly ideals in her home, brought to her work enthusiasm, a fine mind, and an unusual breadth of view. The Library to her was not only a professional responsibility; it was an absorbing interest, and from the first she felt a hope for its future that time has amply fulfilled.

In all the years of her service she was actuated by the conviction that public libraries should come to be of great practical educational importance, and it was her constant aim to fit the library over which she presided to meet the needs of a changing and growing public. To aid in carrying out this purpose, she kept in touch with the leaders in the library profession by attending national, regional, and other meetings, and by visiting the most progressive libraries and studying their methods.

That she came to have a recognized place in the library world is made evident by the honors paid her. Besides holding offices in the New Hampshire Library Associa-

tion of which she was at one time president, she was elected second vice president of the American Library Association for 1905-1906, an unusual honor to be paid a woman, and some years later was offered the position of assistant librarian in the Cleveland Public Library. She read notable papers before national and other library meetings and was the first editor of the A. L. A. Booklist, a pioneer publication for the use of librarians. In 1893 she was chosen as one of the librarians to represent New Hampshire at the World's Fair and for some months had charge of its library exhibit.

Though the needs and work of her own library were exacting, she gave generously of her time and experience to the librarians of the smaller libraries in the surrounding towns, leading the way in forming a regional club that was for many years an inspiration to its members.

Quick to avail herself of new ideas, she appreciated the improved tools and helps that were developed in library science as time went on, and as fast as possible added them to the equipment of the Library.

But in all her methods and policy she never lost sight of the general public—the average user of the Library. In the printed catalogues, and the card catalogue with its wealth of subject references, hundreds of which she wrote before the days of the typewriter; in the flexible classification and arrangement of books on the shelves in the different departments; in the wide range of magazines and newspapers provided for the Reading Room; and especially in the purchase of books she kept in mind not only one part of the community but the whole.

When radical changes were called for in the interests of growth, with the co-operation of the trustees they were made. Thus free access to the shelves, longer hours of opening, and the Sunday use of the Reading Room were introduced while many other libraries were hesitating to make these innovations.



Very early Miss Garland realized the importance of preserving state and local historical material, and by her interest helped to establish by gift and purchase the present admirably equipped Historical Room.

A lover of the out-door world herself and a student of birds and flowers, she sought in many ways to stimulate the study of this field of knowledge. The newest and best books were bought. Pictures of wild flowers were acquired and displayed. Young people were encouraged to bring in specimens from the woods and fields for identification, a collection of pressed ferns was made, and for many years a record of bird arrivals in the spring as reported by observers has been kept on colored pictures of the birds that were put up in the Children's Room as the birds arrived. Before the Boy Scouts and other organizations of young people became popular Miss Garland organized two boys' clubs for nature study, even lending a corner in the Library for the observation of butterfly development.

Because of her wide interests, her ideals of service to the public, and her far-sighted vision, the Library has been built up on a foundation broad enough to meet such changing demands as the future may bring.

In concluding this report I wish to express my gratitude to the Board of Trustees for their kindness and confidence, and to the assistants whose friendship and skill have made it possible to carry forward the work of the Library in these past months.
