



## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING MARCH 12, 1929

### One Hundred Ninety-Eighth Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Durham on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1929, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk (*Chas. Wentworth*), one Selectman for a term of three years (*Fred E. Davis*), a Town Treasurer (*George D. Stevens*), a Collector of Taxes (*Esther Y. Burnham*), two Auditors (*C. Moran, L. W. Hitchcock*), and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years (*F. W. Taylor*).
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:
- (1) Trunk Line Maintenance. (See budget.) Carried.
- (2) State Aid Maintenance. (See budget.) Carried.
- (3) Trunk Line Construction. (See budget.) Carried.

- 4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget.) *Voted \$6000,00*.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current Maintenance expenses, including State and County Taxes as required. (See budget.) *Carried*.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for permanent improvement of village streets. *Carried*.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for town officers as required by law. *Carried*.
- 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. *Carried*.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvements in the Durham Cemetery. *Carried*, \$500.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:
  - 2% if paid on or before July 1.
  - 1% if paid on or before September 1. Carried.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for grading and beautifying the triangle at the intersection of Mill Road and Main Street. *Killed*.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the bequest of \$500.00 from the late Forest S. Smith for the care and maintenance of the cemetery on the Smith farm. *Carried*.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote for the installation of three additional street lights on Madbury Road between the residences of L. W. Hitchcock and H. M. Bisbee. *Carried*.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to continue the work of White Pine Blister Rust control. *Carried*.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the University of New Hampshire or an individual, relative to the distribution of water through the Town water main and arrange the terms for the same. *Carried*.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

#### WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

#### March 11, 1930

#### One Hundred Ninety-Ninth Annual Meeting

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Durham on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, A. D. 1930, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, and all other Town officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds, for a term of three years.
- 3. To choose a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
- 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to obtain State Aid on the following:
  - (1) Trunk Line Maintenance (See Budget).
  - (2) State Aid Maintenance (See Budget).
  - (3) State Aid Construction (See Budget).

- 5. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair of Town Highways and Bridges. (See Budget.)
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses, including State and County Taxes as required. (See Budget.)
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvements in the Durham Cemetery.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the temporary Cemetery Committee, (consisting of the three selectmen and the three trustees of Trust Funds) to serve as a permanent committee to administer and supervise the business and affairs of the Durham Cemetery.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100 or such part as the Cemetery Committee may deem reasonable, of the purchase price of the lots in the Durham Cemetery as an endowment fund for the perpetual care of said lots.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of installing pipe and catch basins in the triangle at the intersection of Mill Road and Main Street.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended in the Town Hall so that it may be used by the school children for basketball.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to cooperate with the University in buying a fire engine and pump.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$800 for the construction of a granolithic sidewalk along the southerly side of Garrison Avenue, beginning at Madbury Road and extending as far as the money appropriated will permit.

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350 for planting and improving shade trees in the Town.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for town officers as required by law.
- 16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation by law.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to allow discounts for prompt payment of taxes as follows:

2% if paid on or before July 1.

1% if paid on or before September 1.

18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapters 25 and 26 of the revised Laws of New Hampshire of 1925 so far as such acts refer to the election of town officers, and raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars, (\$25.00) to defray the expense of putting the same into operation at the Annual Town Meeting 1931; and to further instruct the Selectmen to thereafter include in the Annual Town Budget an amount sufficient to meet the expense involved.

19. To see if the Town will vote to establish and set the bounds to land belonging to the Town on a part of which stands the Sullivan Monument and raise and appropriate sufficient money for same.

### HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

February 21, 1930.

To the Town of Durham:

The Children's Room of the Hamilton Smith Library is doubtless of more interest to more townspeople than any other department, so this present report will be devoted chiefly to the changes that have been made there.

When the present Librarian looked over the Children's Room he found the books old in content; dirty and repelling in appearance. These conditions he has started to remedy by spending the entire appropriation of \$100 made by the Town of Durham on the Children's Room. This policy should be followed for at least five years, at the end of which time the collection will be up to date. The new books have already attracted the children, as an increase in circulation shows.

The Librarian has printed reviews of children's books in the "Library Lantern" so that the new books will be brought to the attention of the parents of the children at least.

The people of Durham have approved of the new policy of making the periodicals and new books more accessible, since the circulation for the period of July to February 1929-30 shows an increase of 1,143 over the same period for 1928-29.

The Librarian wishes to acknowledge the able assistance of Miss Mary H. Falt of the Library staff, to whose good judgment in children's books he feels the strengthening of the collection is chiefly due. Miss Falt has shown her interest in the Children's Room by arranging an exhibit for Children's Book Week and by keeping the room as attractive as possible at all times.

Mrs. Edward Griffiths has cooperated with the Library as before by offering her house as a branch where the people of Packer's Falls can come to get books.

### REPORT OF THE CEMETERY COMMITTEE

### Durham, New Hampshire

During the year 1929 the Cemetery Committee constructed about 1250 feet or nearly a quarter mile of gravel road 14 feet wide. This road gives access to two sections of lots. A 10 x 12 tool house set on concrete posts and painted white was also constructed. Tools like shovels, a rake, a mattock, an axe, a wheelbarrow, a scythe and a lawnmower were purchased. Five of the lots 20 feet square were spaded up, fertilized and seeded.

Four lots were sold during the year to the following parties: Thomas Smith, Mrs. Hamilton F. Allen, Mrs. Edward T. Fairchild, and James S. Chamberlin. One monument was erected on the lot of Charles S. Langley. In September the remains of Edward T. Fairchild, late President of the University, were transferred from the Fairchild lot in the Dover cemetery. The hay from the cemetery was sold standing to the University.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Somersworth, New Hampshire, February 5, 1930

To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

Last July the State Board of Education reorganized several supervisory unions and the present union of which your district is a member, consists of Somersworth, Durham, Rollinsford and Madbury and is known as Supervisory Union, No. 56. I take pleasure in presenting my first report.

Taking over the work on the first of July I found all the teachers engaged, plans for repairs and the reopening of the schools already made. I found an excellent school system based on the Junior High School plan and with a well trained corps of teachers.

It was found necessary to place two teachers in charge of grades one and two because of the large number of pupils. The district must realize that very soon the existing schools will be crowded out of this building. Some better plans of relieving the crowded condition should be worked out before another September. Former Superintendent Felch in his last report urged upon the district either the remodeling of the present building or the erection of a new one and I cannot express the need in better terms than he has already done. He also recommended the employment of a full time janitor and this I believe would be a

good thing to do, especially during the winter months. More responsibility for good heating is being placed on the headmaster than he should be asked to carry.

Since the Christmas vacation the work in Manual Training has been carried on in the shops of the University. This generous help from the University authorities has saved the school district many dollars because the basement of the village school building is without sufficient heat. The atmosphere under which the boys now work is conducive to better work.

A great many children were reported as bringing their lunches to school and with the cooperation of the Home Economics Department of the University and the Parent-Teachers' Association, one hot dish of food is being provided each day at a cost of five cents per serving, but at no expense to the district. The success of this venture depends largely upon parental cooperation, as in fact does everything connected with our schools. I feel that we are getting that cooperation in Durham and that it is due in great measure to your active Parent-Teachers' Association.

At Packer's Falls we have a nice school of the first six grades. A good janitor and a coal fire, with proper chemical toilets, make a rural school building pleasant in which to teach.

The attendance record so far in all schools has been good and there has been little sickness except at Packer's Falls. The work of the school nurse, Miss Ina M. Marden, has helped and the results of the Toxin-Anti Toxin Test were gratifying.

Miss Elsie Gerrish, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music and now taking special

courses in public school music under Prof. Mantin has been engaged to carry on the work in music in all the schools. The work is going with enthusiasm.

The statistics given are for the school year ending July 1, 1929, except the table of enrollment, which is for the present year.

The district is paying tuition for one pupil in the schools of Madbury, for ten pupils in the elementary schools of Newmarket, for one pupil in Austin-Cate Academy, for five pupils in Newmarket High School and twelve pupils in Dover High School.

I deeply appreciate the unvarying courtesy and assistance given me by the School Board and the Teaching force.
