2. Are you in favor of amending Article XIII Administration, Section 133-56 of the Henniker Zoning Ordinance to read as follows: "No fee shall be charged for a permit under this article if the reasonable cost to complete construction, reconstruction, repair, alteration or similar activity will be less than \$1000. **Recommended by the Planning Board.**

3. Are you in favor of adding a new section after section 133-21 of the Henniker Zoning Ordinance, to read as follows: "Construction of an in-ground swimming pool shall include safety fencing of at least four feet in height. The gate shall have a locking mechanism to deter unauthorized or unsupervised use of the swimming pool area." **Recommended by the Planning Board.**

4. Are you in favor of amending the Henniker Zoning Ordinance to provide that “bed and breakfast” homes are permitted by special exception in every district other than heavy commercial. To obtain the special exception and the requirements and procedures of Article XVI; the applicant must also demonstrate to the Planning Board that the proposed site satisfies all the requirements of site plan review. (Article Regulations are on file at the Town Clerk’s office for viewing.) **Recommended by the Planning Board.**

The Meeting reconvened at the Henniker Community School Cafetorium on Wednesday, March 14, 2001 at 7:00 PM. The Moderator, Wayne Colby, reminded everyone to check in with the Supervisors of the Checklist, so they could receive their voter card which would be used for voting. The Girl Scouts conducted a flag ceremony. The Moderator explained the procedure to be followed at the Town Meeting. The Moderator read the results from voting on Tuesday, March 13, 2001 and then declared the meeting open.

5. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of up to Five Hundred Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$575,000.00) for the purpose of constructing an in-ground storage tank for additional storage of 500,000 gallons of water for the Cogswell Springs Water Works to be located on land known as 14 Davison Road, Map 2, Lot#96-H and ; furthermore, to authorize the issuance of not more than \$575,000.00 in bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act RSA Chapter 33 and; to authorize the Selectmen and Commissioners to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and determine the rate of interest thereon. Revenues from water department fees will offset cost of said project. (2/3 vote required for passage). **Water Commissioners Recommend. Selectmen Recommend..**

6. **VOTED** to authorize the selectmen to accept a donation from the Henniker Masonic Organization of a building located on Tax Map 2, (Lot #242B Rear of Community Park of Main Street, known as the Masonic Temple (Formerly the Methodist Church). This building will be accepted with conditions that it be used as a community center for use by general community minded organizations in addition to Town committees, boards and departments, and on such further terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen shall determine are in the best interest of the town. The Selectmen shall hold a hearing prior to final acceptance. **Selectmen Recommend.**

7. To see is the Town will vote to accept and approve the preliminary engineering design and allow construction of a bicycle/pedestrian path on Old Concord Road as stipulated in Article 26 of the 2000 Town Meeting. (Action on this article is required per an amendment to Article 26 which stipulates, “Actual construction of the pathway shall not occur until approved at a Town Meeting.”). **Selectmen Recommend.**

AMENDMENT to Article 7 to ask voters to approve continued work and investigation on the issues raised and to bring the issue back next year for Town Meeting approval after all.

AMENDMENT FAILED

FAILED to accept and approve the preliminary engineering design and allow construction of a bicycle/pedestrian path on Old Concord Road as stipulated in Article 26 of the 2000 Town Meeting. (Action on this article is required per an amendment to Article 26 which stipulates, "Actual construction of the pathway shall not occur until approved at a Town Meeting."). **Selectmen Recommend.**

8. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Seventy-One Thousand Two Hundred Thirty Three Dollars (\$171,233 for the Rescue Squad and Fire Department. **Selectmen Recommend.**

A rate of \$8.00 per hour for the call members of the Rescue Squad and Fire Department was included in the totals above.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-Four Thousand Six Hundred Twenty-Seven Dollars (\$64,627) to provide salaries, benefits and other related expenses including training and clothing allowance for TWO combination full time Fire/Rescue paramedic personnel; the purpose for this request is to fill the critical shortage of on call personnel during the daytime hours and to provide the necessary emergency services to better serve the public in an emergency fire or medical situation and; furthermore, to include inspection services and fire safety education to the schools and general public. The full time personnel will be under the supervision of the Henniker Fire Chief. This is a non-lapsing article per RSA 32:7 and will not lapse before one (1) year or upon completion of the project, whichever comes first. **Selectmen Recommend.**

AMENDMENT VOTED to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-Four Thousand Six Hundred Twenty Seven Dollars (\$64,627) to provide salaries, benefits and other related expenses including training and clothing allowance for TWO full time Fire/Paramedics or ONE Firefighter/EMT I personnel: the purpose for this request is to fill the critical shortage of "on call" personnel during the daytime hours and to provide the necessary emergency services to better serve the public in an emergency fire or medical situation

and; furthermore, to include inspection services and fire safety education to the schools and general public. This is a non-lapsing article per RSA 32:7 and will not lapse before one (1) year or upon completion of the project, whichever comes first.

10. **THE ARTICLE WAS WITHDRAWN** to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$12,500) for the purpose of funding mutual aid “interceptor” fees for Paramedics. The sum of \$500.00 per intercept will be charged to the Town of Henniker for each “intercept” the town Rescue Squad requests from a mutual aid town. This service is estimated for approximately twenty five cases of transport requesting this service. **Selectmen Recommend.**

(Note: If previous article is passed this article will be withdrawn.)

11. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) to be added to the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund established in 1988 under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of an ambulance for the Rescue Squad.. **Selectmen Recommend.**
12. **VOTED** to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 to be known as The Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new fire truck and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) to be placed in this fund. **Selectmen Recommend.**
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) for the purpose of restoring the Town’s 1929 Seagrave Fire Engine. This is a non-lapsing article per RSA 32:7 and will not lapse before two (2) years or upon the completion of the project, whichever comes first **Selectmen Recommend.**

After some discussion on the original article, there was an **AMENDMENT** to change the amount to be raised to \$20,000.00, with the additional \$20,000.00 to be raised by donations of fund-raising events.

The AMENDMENT PASSED.

14. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) to be added to the already established Fire and Rescue Maintenance Fund for the purpose of maintaining the station facility in case of unanticipated repairs to the building. This is an Expendable Trust Fund established under the provisions of RSA 31:19-A. **Selectmen Recommend.**
15. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Fifty-Six Thousand Four Hundred Sixty-Eight Dollars (\$856,468) for general municipal operations. **Selectmen Recommend.**

16. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars (\$2,700) to be placed in the Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36-A:5 to be used for the purpose of continuing work on an inventory of the Town's natural resources as required by State law. These funds are necessary to complete the second year of a two year project. The final inventory will provide data for the Town's master plan. **Selectmen Recommend.**

Motion made to restrict reconsideration on Articles 5 through 16 in accordance with RSA 40:10, Paragraphs 1 and 5. **PASSED**

17. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Thirty Eight Thousand Seven Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$538,760) for the Highway Department and Street Lights. **Selectmen Recommend.**

18. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty-Nine Thousand Three Hundred Ninety-One Dollars (\$129,391) for road improvements, contingent upon the receipt of the Town's share of the State of New Hampshire's Highway Block Grant. This is a non-lapsing appropriation for five (5) years. **Selectmen Recommend.**
19. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifteen Thousand Eight Hundred Forty Dollars (\$115,840) to replace a Highway Department year 1994 dump truck and purchase a year 2001 teen wheel dump truck with a twelve foot body, spreader, plow and wing and furthermore, to turn the 1994 dump truck over to the Henniker Fire Department for retrofitting into a forestry truck. **Selectmen Recommend.**
20. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000) for the purpose of reconstructing, repairing, reclamation and re-paving of town roads in need of such repair; to include any design and necessary preparation work such as culverts and drains. **Selectmen Recommend.**
21. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Three Thousand Dollars (\$53,000) for the purpose of purchasing and installing approximately 21 lamp posts in the central business district from the town center south on Route 114. Fifteen-Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) to be raised by local taxation and; furthermore, to allow the selectmen to accept any grants, donations from individuals, corporations, in-kind donations of labor and materials, organizations or private trusts, and/or private charities or associations and any other pursuant to RSA 31:19-A, for the remaining Thirty-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000). This is a non-lapsing article per RSA 32:7 and will not lapse before three (3) years or upon the completion of the project, whichever comes first. **Selectmen Recommend.**

(The State of New Hampshire DOT has committed a work order change on the Edna Dean Proctor Bridge of Sixty Thousand Dollars to complete the restoration of some sidewalks and electrical assistance in preparing the locations for said lamp posts.)

22. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Forty-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$648,000) for the Police Department and Animal Control. **Selectmen Recommend .**

23. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (7,200) for the purchase of two defibrillators to be located in the Police Cruisers. **Selectmen Recommend.**
24. **VOTED** to establish an expendable general trust fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Police Department Building Maintenance Fund, for the purpose of repairing and maintaining the Police Department Building and to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) towards this purpose. **Selectmen Recommend.**
25. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Eighty-Two Thousand Seven Hundred Forty-Six Dollars (\$382,746) solid waste disposal for the ensuing year. **Selectmen Recommend.**
26. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) for the purpose of constructing a 12 foot by 36 foot building for the purpose of storing recyclables and parks maintenance equipment. This storage building will be located at the Transfer Station facility. This is a non-lapsing article per RSA 32:7 and will not lapse before two (2) years or upon the completion of the project, whichever comes first. **Selectmen Recommend.**
27. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$98,000) for the Truck Free Library. **Trustees of the Tucker Free Library Recommend. Selectmen Recommend.**
28. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the already established Tucker Free Library Fund for the purpose of repairing and maintaining the library building. This is an Expendable Trust Fund established in 1999 under the provisions of RSA 31:19-A with the Trustees designated as agents to expend. **Trustees of the Tucker Free Library Recommend. Selectmen Recommend.**

Motion made to restrict reconsideration of Articles 17 thru 28 in accordance with RSA 40:10, Paragraphs 1 and 5. **PASSED**

29. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Fifty-Eight Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty-Eight (\$358,728) for the operating expenses of the Wastewater Treatment Plant. This sum is to be funded by the sewer assessment. **Sewer Commissioners Recommend. Selectmen Recommend.**
30. **VOTED** to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety-Nine Thousand Four Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$199,420) for the operating expenses of the Cogswell Spring Water Works. This sum is to be funded by the water assessments. **Water Commissioners Recommend. Selectmen Recommend.**
31. **VOTED** to authorize the Selectmen to sell property located at 9 Stonehenge Drive (Map 1, Lot 588B-7) to Wesley Grant in exchange for all back taxes, interest and costs due on the property plus legal fees incurred in this transaction. **Selectmen Recommend.**

To transact any other business that may legal come before this meeting.

Report of the Town Administrator

As I enter my third year as Town Administrator I take great pride in the many projects that the Town has embarked on and completed. The town meeting of 2001 provided the various departments with the necessary funding to continue the momentum of providing the quality services that we can expect. The Parks and Properties Department continues to help our town look attractive with the meticulous care that is given to the soccer and baseball fields and upkeep of town buildings and downtown enhancement such as the repainting of the lamp posts along main street and maintaining the many flowers which they plant in the spring.

The Highway Department continues its road rebuilding program throughout many sections of town and with the completion of Bear Hill Road and Quaker Street we now have greatly improved the safety and road conditions for motor vehicles.

Another major improvement was the installation of approximately 21 new lamp posts along bridge street along with the dozen purchased by New England College which bring the route of new lamps up Bridge Street and around the new CIE Center on Grove Street. This was a joint venture between the college, NH State DOT, Town of Henniker and the Downtown Civic organization.

Also many major infrastructure improvements have come to fruition including a new compacter system at the transfer station and major overhauling of a pump at the waste water treatment plant.

Another major infrastructure addition was the construction of a new 500,000 gallon water tank which was constructed last summer at the Cogswell Springs Water Works headquarters on Davison Road.

In bringing these projects forward I would like to give special thanks for the support given by the Budget Advisory Committee, Board of Selectmen and the Department heads and staff whose expertise and dedication have been so important in successfully maintaining a town government.

All of the above accomplishments have been provided without an increase in the municipal portion of the tax rate setting. This has been a goal of the Selectmen for the last three years and has met with a success due to the level rate for this period. Again this year we hope to have a level rate and by all indications in the budget projections we should accomplish this goal.

I look forward to another productive year as your Town Administrator and I will work hard to fulfill the goals and objectives of your Board of Selectmen this coming year.

THE YEAR AHEAD

The year 2002 should bring many new goals and projects for the Selectmen and myself which will include a plan to revitalize the old paper mill site in West Henniker (Western Avenue). This project has been in the works for about two years and this coming year should bring forward a plan to clean up the contaminated areas and provide an area for recreation facilities which will focus on fishing and boating. An effort by the federal, state and local governments along with private boating groups are developing a plan that will be practical and financially feasible to construct and maintain. As part of this plan the early indications are that the recommendation of the Federal and State is to remove the old dam but preserve the canal that used to pass through the old mill site.

The Parks and Properties department is scheduling a planting of many new trees to compensate for the removal of many dead trees in the downtown area last year. Several are going to be planted in the town baseball field area and Community Park area.

The Town Clerk/Tax Collector has requested a new computer system for updating her equipment to provide faster billing and easier record keeping service. This equipment will be installed in 2002 pending approval at town meeting and customer service will also benefit from this enhancement.

The Selectmen are seeking to establish a fund to engage in the hiring of an engineer to explore and advise on the possible construction of traffic signals in the center of town. This is not the same plan as suggested by the State DOT in previous years but any new plan will have a goal as not to remove available parking spaces to any businesses in the area. *Estimated cost: \$15,000.00*

The Selectmen are also seeking funding to repaint the Grange Hall on Western Avenue. There is no question as to the need for a paint job and anyone can attest to that fact just by observing the building as you ride by. *Estimated cost: \$12,000.00*

◆ Capital Reserve Funds

Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund: As in other years the Town of Henniker receives revenue from receipts on billings for service. In 2001, the revenue collected was much higher than the previous year having reached a record high billing of \$95,000.00. This is due to the added service of a paramedic on the Henniker Fire/Rescue Department and the ability to assist neighboring communities with a new service referred to as 'Intercept' which provides paramedic availability to give advanced medical attention. As in previous years a \$25,000.00 amount is set aside for the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund already established. The remainder is placed back into the general fund.

Fire /Rescue/Police Station General Fund Expendable Trust Funds: We continue to plan for emergency maintenance issues to come to these buildings from time to time and in order not to

encroach on the operating budgets of these departments we will be in a position to have emergency funding to maintain property in the event of emergency situations.

Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund

At the 2001 Town Meeting the town voted to establish a fire truck fund and raised \$100,000.00 to be placed in reserve. Again this year the selectmen are asking for another \$100,000.00 to be raised in order to make less of an impact in the ultimate purchase of such a vehicle.

◆ **New Equipment**

Highway Department: Continuing the long-range planning of the capital spending plan the highway department is seeking a new backhoe tractor to replace an older 1978 model. The purchase is not to add another vehicle to the fleet but only to replace. *Estimated cost: \$78,000.00*

◆ **Road and Public Works Issues**

This past year we were able to bring to closure the issues of Bear Hill Road and Quaker Street. In 2002 we are faced with the never ending "catch-up" of maintaining the roads in Henniker. The selectmen continue to take the bull by the horn, so to speak, and ask your support in funding an additional \$90,000 to use for road improvements, to include reconstruction, reclaiming, and repaving some of our town roads that are in the greatest need for such repairs. This cost will also be used to construct culverts, drains and piping where necessary. This request is to be funded by tax dollars on the year 2002 budget, but it is a necessary request in order not to let our roads fall into such deplorable condition as not to be able to catch up. We are still in a position to receive the state road aid grant for \$132,152.00 which is to be used for our normal schedule of road maintenance. *Requested: \$90,000 as projected by highway study plan.*

Another project which was initially funded in a previous town meeting is the Old Concord Road Pathways (sidewalk) project. This project is 80% funded by the state (\$245,000) and a total of \$49,000 (20%) has been funded by the Town of Henniker. A previous town meeting already funded an amount totaling \$12,500 and approximately \$9,000 was raised through donations. At the 2001 town meeting the project did not meet with the approval of the voters and was placed on the drawing board for another year. This year another less extensive plan will be presented and no further funding will be necessary. It will be of lesser cost and whatever funding we will need to complete the project, should be available from the original grant approval. It must be made clear, however, that a new plan must be accepted by the NH DOT before any funding will be reimbursed to the town.

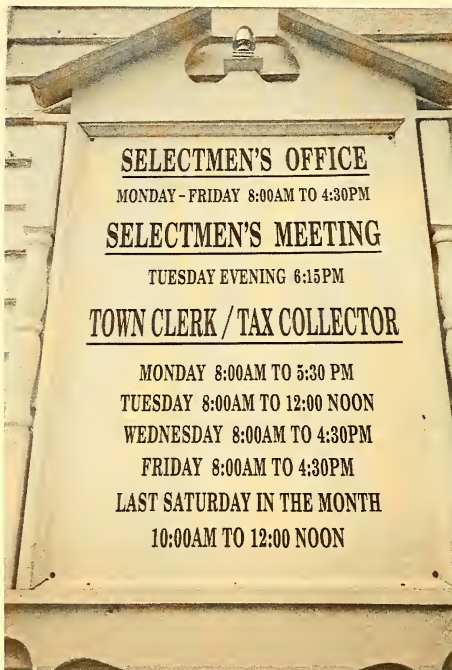
OVERALL 2002 BUDGET

Based on the year 2002 appropriation requests it is estimated that the municipal rate could possibly remain under \$10.00 per thousand dollars but this will be determined as our revenue projections get more accurate toward Town Meeting time. The most difficult task for town selectmen and town administrator is trying to keep the upcoming year a prudent one financially. It is always a concern to live within the budget and be able to carry out the tasks which undoubtedly will have a major price tag. In preparing a municipal budget we are always aware of the fact that the tax impact is of so much importance to the taxpayer.

I feel that again this year we have the confidence to move ahead and progress with all of our departments and committees and bring to completion the many ongoing and future needs of the Town.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Henniker in the County of Merrimack in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Henniker Community School Gymnasium in Henniker on **Tuesday the Twelfth (12) day of March next, at seven of the clock in the morning (7:00 a.m.)** to act upon the following:

1. To choose the following Town Officers for the ensuing year.

- One Selectmen for a term of three years
- One Town Treasurer for a term of one year
- One Cemetery Trustee for a term of three years
- One Trustee of the Trust Funds for a term of three years
- Two Trustees of the Tucker Free Library for a term of three years
- One Water Commissioner for a term of three years
- Two Planning Board members for a term of three years
- One Planning Board member for a term of one year
- One Moderator for term of two years
- One Town Clerk/Tax Collector for term of three years
- One Supervisor of the Checklist for a term of six years

To vote on the following:

2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to the Henniker Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, to modify the conditions for granting a variance under Article XV, section 133-60? The purpose of the amendment is to bring the ordinance into compliance with the New Hampshire Supreme Court's recent ruling in Simplex Technologies v. Town of Newington. The amendment would, as required by the Simplex ruling, change the standard for establishing a "hardship," which is one of the prerequisites to the granting of a variance. Under the amendment, a hardship would be deemed to exist if the applicant can demonstrate that (a) because of unique physical circumstances or conditions of the applicant's property, the zoning restriction interferes with the reasonable use of the property; (b) no fair and substantial relationship of the applicant's property; and (c) the variance would not injure the rights of others. The applicant would also be required to demonstrate that the variance would be consistent with the spirit of the ordinance, would do substantial justice, and would not diminish the value of surrounding properties. Under the current ordinance, the hardship requirement is satisfied only if the applicant demonstrates that, because of the property's unique physical circumstances or conditions, there is no possibility that the property can be

used in strict conformity with the zoning ordinance. **Recommended by the Planning Board.**

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to the Henniker Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, to replace Article XXVI, regarding wireless communications towers? The new article would allow personal wireless service facilities (commonly known as cell towers) in all zoning districts except residential village (RV) and commercial village (CV), subject to significant restrictions and site plan approval by the Planning Board. The proposed restrictions include, among other things: (a) a setback requirement equal to 125 percent of the tower's height in most cases; (b) a height limitation of 150 feet in all cases; (c) a requirement that towers in wooded areas not project higher than 20 feet above surrounding trees; (d) a requirement that all towers be adequately camouflaged to blend in with the surrounding area, and be visually compatible and in scale with the rural character of the town; (e) a provision that priority for the location of new wireless facilities be given to concealed or camouflaged locations within existing structures; (f) a bonding requirement for new facilities; and (g) a requirement that abandoned facilities be removed by the owner. **Recommended by the Planning Board.** (Complete text of Article is on file at the Town Clerk's Office for viewing.)

4. Are you in favor of Amendment No. 3 to the Henniker Zoning Ordinance, submitted by citizen petition, granting an exemption from building permits, fees, and inspections? The amendment is as follows: "[To] provide all homeowners with an exemption from building permits, building permit fees, building inspections and building permit oversight by any and all Town of Henniker officials for all home improvements with a materials value of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) or less. The exemption will also apply to work performed by the homeowner or his agent and specifically will allow all labor (of any value) to be exempted. The homeowner will be relied upon to affirm the materials cost if the Board of Selectmen vote to request that specific affirmation in the open session of a regular meeting of the board. Only elected board members may make the affirmation request, and the authority for this purpose may not be delegated. One formal majority vote by the board for each request to each homeowner is also required. The homeowner's receipts for those materials will constitute proof. No additional requirements shall be made. The purpose of this exemption is to allow homeowners to make improvements that the homeowner deems reasonable to their property without interference from the Town." **Submitted by citizen petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board.**

This is a non-lapsing appropriation for five (5) years. *Selectmen recommend.*
18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate Seventy Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$78,900.) to replace a 1989 Ford backhoe which will be traded or sold. This backhoe will be a 2002 model which will include all wheel drive, extendable hoe, hydraulic thumb and a multi-purpose front bucket. *Selectmen recommend.*

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000) for the purpose of reconstructing, repairing, reclamation and re-paving of town roads in need of such repair; to include any design and necessary preparation work such as culverts and drains. *Selectmen recommend.*
20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Twenty Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty One Dollars (\$427,981) for solid waste disposal for the ensuing year. *Selectmen recommend.*
21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ten Thousand Eight Hundred Forty Six Dollars (\$110,846) for the Tucker Free Library. *Trustees of the Tucker Free Library Recommend. Selectmen recommend.*
22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Seventy Two Thousand One Hundred Four Dollars (\$372,104) for the operating expenses of the Wastewater Treatment Plant. This sum is to be funded by the sewer assessment. *Sewer Commissioners Recommend. Selectmen recommend.*

The cost of an adequate education is determined by the Department of Education based on weighted average daily membership in residence each school district. Each school district's percentage of total is then calculated. Each percentage is then multiplied by the Town's share of the state education tax amount to allocate a portion of the state education taxes to each school district.

Pay Directly to State

The difference between the adequate education for each school district and each school district's share of the state education taxes becomes the adequate education grant for each school district.

Highway Department

Many of the roads in town, (probably most roads), were at one time cart paths for horse and buggy travel. Over the years the roads have been widened to accommodate modern transportation. In most cases the sub-base of these roads were simply covered with a minimal layer of gravel, then paved. After many years of increased traffic, and repeat patching, the roads need extensive reconstruction. Each year we try to rebuild a section, and make improvements to our town roads. A good road surface makes for better snow removal, and safer driving conditions year round.

Our major project for this summer was reconstruction of paved sections on Bear Hill Road and Quaker Street. The project included recycling of the old pavement. About 3 miles of badly deteriorated roadway was completely rebuilt.

Other upgrades included hot top shimming on Stonehenge Drive, Gulf Road, and Western Avenue. One thousand two hundred fifty feet of new guard rail was installed on Gulf Road. A new concrete box culvert replaced the old stone culvert on Butter Road, thus eliminating the 6 ton status and improving safety at this difficult area. A new section of sidewalk was installed on Grove Street. The Patterson Hill Road bridge project was finished and opened to traffic.

We continue to make use of town's gravel pit, and have processed about 35,000 cubic yards of material since the pit was opened 5 years ago. This year we screened 4,500 cubic yards of sand for winter maintenance and sealing. We also crushed 7,000 cubic yard of gravel for road base.

Health Officer

The Henniker Health Department had a busy year in 2001, investigating nearly 9 calls for service since May. The Health Officer is responsible for enforcing local and state public health laws and regulations. Some of the more common types of calls the Health Officer would respond to include:

- Enforcing minimum standards for rental housing
- Inspecting new daycare centers, foster homes and health facilities
- Investigating complaints of public nuisances such as odor, garbage, insects, rodents and other instances that may endanger public health
- Conducting tests of air and water quality
- Ensuring that town septic systems are not in failure and in compliance with the NH Department of Environmental Services.

This year as Health Officer I will work to make information more readily available to the citizens of Henniker on issues such as rabies, West Nile Virus and septic system and private well maintenance. Please feel free to contact me with questions on any of the above issues.

Police Department

2001 was an incredibly busy year for the department. Please take a moment to review the annual statistics that are included as part of this report. However, I would like to take this opportunity to focus on the many positive accomplishments we had for the year.

GRANTS

NIGHT VISION EQUIPEMENT - During the year we received a grant for night vision equipment. Our application was approved in the early spring and we received approximately \$10,000.00 worth of night vision equipment from the Department of Defense at no cost to the Town. Officer Neal Martin attended a week long training class in San Antonio, Texas and was taught how to properly utilize the equipment. Officer Martin has since trained the rest of the department. Again, the cost of this travel and training was paid for by the grant. We anticipate using this equipment if we have someone lost in the woods at night or if someone were to flee from us and we felt it was necessary to apprehend the person without delay.

MISSING AND EXPLOITED CHILDREN - The department was awarded a grant from the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children which is based in Alexandria, Virginia. The grant is for a complete Dell Optiplex Business computer system which also includes a high-resolution scanner, printer, and customized software. This system will be capable of quickly generating and receiving posters of missing children. We will be able to distribute these posters nationwide in a very short time span. When a child is reported missing, time is one of law enforcement's greatest enemies. One of the greatest challenges when this happens is collecting and disseminating the child's descriptive information quickly. Statistically, when pictures of missing children or abductors are made available to the public, one in six children are recovered as a direct result. In addition to creating and receiving posters of missing children, the system we are receiving includes templates for more than 100 different types of posters such as missing persons, wanted persons and crime alerts. Our department was selected as a host site by the State Police and the National Center for Missing Children. If any of our surrounding communities have missing children or need to use any of the other services provided, we have agreed to assist them with this equipment. We are very pleased to have been awarded this grant and feel that it is recognition for our progressive efforts in these areas. We expect that this system will be up and running by the end of February.

JUVENILE OFFENDER LOCATOR TEAM (JOLT) - During 2001 we teamed up with the Hopkinton Police Department and our local Juvenile Probation and Parole Officer (JPPO) to start a program known as JOLT, as defined above. When a juvenile is placed on probation there are usually terms of probation that the juvenile must follow such as a curfew, doing well in school, staying drug and alcohol free, etc. Generally, once a week an officer from either our agency or the Hopkinton Police Department will team up with the JPPO and do home visits in both communities, usually in the evening. The purpose of these visits is to ensure that the juvenile is abiding by the rules of probation and quite frankly that the parents are ensuring that the juvenile is abiding by them as well. It also gives the officers and the JPPO an opportunity to meet with both the juvenile and parents in a more informal atmosphere. We have been very pleased thus far with the positive results of this program and anticipate it will continue for many years.

GOOD MORNING HENNIKER - Our Good Morning Henniker program has been a rousing success. However, we are still a little disappointed that more of our community members are not taking advantage of the program. As I hope you know, the program is designed for the elderly who may live alone or for persons who are disabled and live alone. When a person enters the program, that person agrees to call the police station Monday through Friday between 9:00 and 11:00 AM. If we do not hear from the person, we will call to ensure they are okay. If they do not answer the phone we go to their residence and physically check their welfare. The program is also used by the participants for advice on road conditions and other issues. If you are interested in the program or know someone that may be, please stop by or call us and we will be happy to explain the program in more detail.

NEW EQUIPMENT - This year we purchased two automated external defibrillators which have been placed in the cruisers. Tom and Varyl French from the Henniker Rescue Squad did a great job training the officers and we are now certified to use them. We are sure that someplace down the line this equipment and training will pay great dividends. We also purchased digital cameras for the cruisers and our processing room. The cameras are working out very well and providing quite a savings on film and development costs.

INTERNSHIPS - During the past year we had students from area colleges complete internships with the department. Generally, the interns are interested in becoming either a police officer or serving in some other field within the criminal justice system. The program usually lasts an entire semester and the intern must complete a 120 hour, structured, program. Some of the activities they participate in is visiting our dispatch center, spending time at the County Attorneys office, riding in the cruiser, doing prisoner transports with the County Sheriffs department, observing at the 911 emergency communications center, as well as many other aspects of the criminal justice system. The program has been very successful.

In October, Patrol Officer James Brace left to join the Hooksett Police Department. Jim was well known in the community. In addition to working as a patrol officer, he was also one of our DARE officers and coached some of the local youth baseball teams. He was here for five years and will be missed. He was replaced by Michael Martin who has spent two years as a part-time officer in Bradford and a couple of months with us before being selected to replace Officer Brace in the full time position. He is 35 years old and the father of one young son. He currently resides in Loudon and will be attending the police academy in April. We believe he will be a great addition of our staff and our community. He is most anxious to meet and interact with the citizens of our community. When you see him in the community please try to take a moment or two to say hello.

Finally, we had some tragedies in our community this year. We had four fatal accidents that killed five people. We investigated many serious crimes including domestic violence, sexual assaults, burglaries and felony physical assaults. We are addressing these issues and will be taking some measures this year to try to reduce these types of crimes. We look to you for support in our initiatives because these issues affect all of us. Please remember, we are your police department and we are always open to suggestions as to how we can keep our community a safe place for all.

Animal Control

Henniker Animal Control continues to be busy. Lost dogs, strays, abandoned dogs, dog/cat bites, nuisance animals (domestic and wild) and the list goes on.

Town License and Rabies Tags required on all dogs...

Rabies (an incurable deadly disease) is still a threat to warm blooded animals and people with the raccoons, foxes and bats still carrying the virus. The numbers diagnosed positive for rabies were down for 2001. All animals must continue to be vaccinated and care must be taken when dealing with all animals. It is to your advantage and will be more cost effective for you to take this initiative.

West Nile Virus (WNV) was diagnosed in New Hampshire (none in Henniker) again in 2001 with 83 positive birds, three positive mosquito pools and two horses (only one survived).

There is a vaccine for horses for WNV. It requires two shots and it takes about six weeks after the second shot for good immunity.

Animal control has and will pick up dead birds for testing by USDA-APHIS Wildlife Services.

The monitoring of the animals in our community can tell us a lot about our environment, thus it is worth while to monitor their condition.

Rescue Squad

The year 2001 was a very exciting and challenging one for the Rescue Squad. We were very fortunate to have the town vote in favor of hiring two new full time fire/rescue employees. This task was completed in June and we welcomed Mick Costello and Steve Solomon to their new job on July 2, 2001. This change came at a very good time considering the sharp increase in call volume we've experienced. We responded to 455 calls for assistance this year, which represents an increase of 20% from the year before. Of these calls, 209 were for trauma related emergencies.

The Rescue Squad would like to express its appreciation to Police Chief Tim Russell and all the officers for their assistance this year. The Police Department purchased the new automated external defibrillators (AED's) and were given nationally standardized training on them by Rescue Squad Deputy Chief, Tom French. We are extremely grateful for this equipment and the important training the police officers went through. The AED's were placed into service on October 2, 2001 and were utilized before year end.

Through the generosity of the Lions Club, the Fire Department and Rescue Squad were able to purchase two full sets of the Fire Prevention program books for our local schools. The new program "Risk Watch" will assist the kids from pre-school to eighth grade in learning to stay safe in eight different aspects of everyday living. They include information from poisonings to bike and helmet safety. This program will be instituted in September of 2002 in place of "Learn Not To Burn".

The Rescue Squad gratefully accepts donations and we perform fund raising throughout the year. This year we were able to use the money dated to The Friends of Henniker Rescue along with money raised through the 911 Demolition Derby for the purchase of a new 12 lead diagnostic cardiac monitor. This machine is capable of determining if someone is having a significant cardiac event, which is extremely important for early, appropriate intervention. This new equipment allows rescue personnel to offer the best possible cardiac care and shows Henniker's commitment to delivering cutting edge treatment for all of our patients. We would like to thank all those individuals that have given so generously to the squad.

The events of September 11, 2001 have changed the lives of so many Americans and especially the lives of Emergency Service Personnel. The Henniker Rescue Squad members are well trained and dedicated members of our community. If you are interested in becoming an EMT, please talk to any member of the department or write to us at P.O. Box 91.

I would like to thank the people of Henniker for their continued support throughout 2001. I would also like to thank the members of the Henniker Rescue Squad for all the work they do. At the conclusion of 2001, membership included:

Fire Department

The Henniker Fire Department responded to 248 calls during the year 2001. Most calls were for accidents, although there were more structure fires last year than in a normal year.

Steve Soloman and Michael Costello were hired July 1, 2001 as full-time fire and rescue personnel. They are on duty weekdays from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.. This arrangement has worked out very well in daytime coverage for rescue calls, with volunteers filling in nights and weekends. The volunteer firemen respond any time for fire calls.

A one-ton truck acquired from the Highway Department has been converted into a forestry truck. This replaces the forestry truck which we had leased from the State of New Hampshire for several years.

Work on refurbishing the Old Seagraves has begun and is about three-quarters completed. More donations are needed to complete the work. Thanks to Bill Belanger for the time and effort he has put in procuring donations for this cause. The Old Seagraves can be seen on display at the fire station.

We wish to thank the community of Henniker for its continued support throughout the past year.

Forest Fire Warden/State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands cooperate and coordinate to reduce the risk of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ALL outside burning. Fire permits are mandatory for any open burning unless the ground where the burning is to be done (and surrounding areas) is completely covered with snow. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs. Open burning is a privilege, **NOT** a right. Help us to protect you and our forest resource! Build small brush piles that can be quickly burned and extinguished.

New Hampshire experienced over 940 wildland fires in 2001. Most of the fires were human caused. Due to dry conditions fires spread quickly impacting more than 20 structures. Transfer Station/Recycling Center

The year 2001 was a good year for recycling; the recycling percentage went from 15 percent in 2000 up to 19.1 percent in 2001. The bad part is the market was down about 50 percent for the year. We also added 71.5 tons over and above our contract weight of 2750 tons making a total of 2,8121.5 tons, this increase in tonnage added \$9,586.95 to the costs of disposing of the trash. There will no increase in the cost per ton and Triple L Trucking has kept the transportation costs the same as in 2001. We had to raise our guaranteed trash tonnage from 2,750 tons in 2001 to 2,900 tons for 2002.

Thanks to those who recycle. For those who do not, please look at the numbers. Recycling would cut the tonnage charge and the transportation cost.

We shipped 256.6 tons of building debris in 2001 in 54 containers at a cost \$81 per ton and \$175 per container. Our Household Hazardous Waste day did very well in 2001, bringing in \$8,502.23 from other towns and a state grant.

PARKS & PROPERTIES DEPARTMENT

It was a busy year for the parks department employees, who also double as transfer station employees. Some of the major projects are noted below:

- Planted the trees and built a fence in the back of the Old Concord Road soccer fields, as requested by the Army Corps of Engineers.
- Removed nine dead and very dangerous trees from the town hall and Community Park areas.
- Removed eleven stumps.
- Replaced several picnic tables and park benches.
- Made several repairs to the Town Hall and the Police Station.
- Repainted and replaced the glass in all of the old streetlights in the Main Street and riverside parking lot areas.
- Constructed an addition to the loader barn built to store the parks department equipment.

There are plans to start a tree-replacement program in 2002 and to build a gate in the back of the Old Concord Road soccer fields. We will be liming and spreading fertilizer on all the fields and continuing a feed and disease prevention program for the trees, adding cables to a few trees so as to make them safer and give them a longer life expectancy.

Tucker Free Library

During a time when society in general is experiencing revolutionary changes in life styles due to the new electronic era, the Tucker Free Library continues to strive to provide conventional library services in conjunction with the latest in informational technology.

In response to an increase in the usage of the public computers, the Library updated both public access stations by adding faster machines and new software. The Robert N. Fitch Memorial provided funds for a new printer and a flat screen monitor, while a local business contributed a new computer.

Although considerable time is spent on maintaining and upgrading the electronic services, even more hours are devoted to reviewing and selecting reading and audiovisual materials. This is important because a large segment of the population still rely on libraries as their primary resource for reading matter.

Varied programs are yet another aspect of services that patrons have become accustomed to and enjoy. The Tucker Free Library listens and responds to the needs of the patrons and tries to deliver a balance of materials, services and programs to meet the requirements of all segments of the Town. With this in mind, the Library recently introduced a new program to deliver books to people who are physically unable to come to the Library; and also emphasized the availability of the Talking Book program for visually impaired people. There has been an increase in the demand to provide books for discussion groups. Presently the Library is delighted to supplying four different groups; that certainly shows that reading is alive and well in our community.

As in past years, some of the most popular programs are the children's summer sessions. Registration for the various story hours and reading programs totaled 283 participants. Special recognition is due to our excellent volunteer presenters who include Debbie Aucoin, Patte Bowser, Rhonda Cooper, Maureen Corsetti and Laurie Goldberg. It is so rewarding to see the enthusiasm that accompanies these summer programs and continues through the year with the weekly Pre-School Story Time and the Read-To-Me sessions. Volunteer Marilyn Knapp, has proven to be a wonderful co-coordinator by providing a welcoming atmosphere for toddlers and parents attending the Pre-School sessions.

Throughout the year, the Library received unflagging support from its many volunteers, especially the officers of the Friends of the Tucker Free Library; Janine Bates, Mary Corsetti, Susan Gauthier, Laurie Goldberg and Lorraine Myers. They continue to work tirelessly with the staff to ensure the success of the summer programs and the annual book sale. In spite of inclement weather this year, the sale raised over fifteen hundred dollars. In the recent past, the Friends have used their funds to finance the children's summer programs and to purchase various custom-made furnishings for the Library.

As in previous years, the Library was fortunate to receive donations of various kinds including money, books, videos, puzzles, CD's, magazines, and historical items. The Library was especially honored to be the recipient of funds with which to buy books in memory of Lester Connor, Simone R. Dwyer, Gwen Hall, Mae Hogg, Michael Logan, Thelma St. Laurence, Linda Tenhave, and Carolyn West.

Proceeds from long established funds continue to greatly benefit the operation of the Library and

Wastewater Treatment Plant

In 2001 the Wastewater Treatment Plant processed 72 million gallons of wastewater and 154,000 gallons of septage, which produced 245 tons of biosolids. The biosolids were taken to the Merrimack NH Composting Facility for further treatment.

In February of 2001 the State of New Hampshire, Department of Environmental Services approved Henniker's revised Sewer Use Ordinance. This ordinance was last revised in 1990. Many changes were made to the ordinance to bring us into the new millennium with the tools we need to help control what flows into the treatment plant.

As we proceed into our 26th year of operation we continue to repair and replace some of our aging equipment. In 2001 3 of the 5 pump station pumps were replaced with new ones and the 2 remaining pumps will be replaced in 2002, a water booster pump for the belt filter press was also replaced.

Cogswell Spring Water Works

This year was a very busy for the water department for along with the regular work schedule there was the completion of the new water storage tank on Davison Road. Some of the items I worked on included the replacement of two broken fire hydrants, one hit by a plow truck during the winter and the other hit by a citizen in a pick-up truck, repairs also had to be made to the float system which controls the water level in the storage tanks twice. I also installed two new service lines, one being an eight-inch line on Bridge Street and the other being a two-inch line on Weare Road. One broken water main on Old Hillsboro Road had to be repaired after it ruptured due to stress.

With the completion of the Edna Dean Procter Bridge rehabilitation project the last of the work around the water main and service lines in that area has hopefully been completed. This certainly has required more of the water department's attention than expected.

Much time was also spent monitoring the Patterson Hill Bridge Rehabilitation project and how it affected the water main river crossing within the construction zone. Fortunately we were able to work with the contractor to minimally impact the water department's appliances.

Lastly, but most importantly the completion of the new 500,000-gallon water storage tank on Davison Road. I would like to thank William Hall Jr. P.E., Vice President and Regional Director for Sterns and Wheeler, LLC Environmental Engineers And Scientists, for all his help in seeing this project to completion. The Water Commissioners, Mr. Hall and myself have been working on this project for some time. We have already seen the benefits from having the increased storage capability. This summer we hope to install four thousand feet of ten inch water main west on Davison Road to tie into the already existing main on Liberty Hill Road. This will help supply West Henniker during times of high demand.

This year has marked a change in leadership at the water department. First, I would like to thank David C. Arnold for his service to the water department, while serving as water commissioner. His leadership and knowledge of the industry was invaluable. Second, we would like to welcome Ronald Taylor as the new commissioner joining Joseph Darnour and Donald Blanchard.

Emergency Management

To borrow a phrase from my longtime employee, neither rain, sleet, snow nor gloom of night will stay us our rounds. Well, in the last few years the people of Henniker have endured through flooding, ice storms, severe snowstorms, dangerous heat and humidity, and the famous Y2K.

I am pleased to report that during 2001, the year began with some major snowstorms, unlike the winter of 2001/2002. Your highway crew, police department, fire and rescue departments were there for you every inch of the storm.

Because of our excellent record keeping, the town qualified for more than \$13,000 in federal aid, to help offset the extraordinary expense of the week of snow.

Also, during 2001 the town received more than \$7,000 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the U.S. Fire Administration to help offset the cost of the forestry truck.

Nobody could prepare us as individuals or as a nation for the events of September 11, but we do know we must always be vigilant in our personal safety and security to avoid being taken advantage of, by people with uncivilized agendas.

Any resident of Henniker that is interested in personal safety and security guidelines can send a request for information to me at Town Hall. I'll be happy to send a booklet.

2002 will most likely bring a new challenge to Henniker. I have been getting reports of citizens experiencing problems related to drought and dry wells. Relief from this problem is available in the form of low interest loans and low income grants, to mitigate issues related to dug wells. Any Henniker resident experiencing drought related issues are encouraged to write to me at the Town Hall. I'll assist you in any way possible.

Planning Board

The Planning Board is responsible for, among other things, reviewing and updating the town's master plan, recommending amendments to the zoning ordinance, reviewing site plans, subdivision plans, excavation plans, and updating the capital improvements plan. The board consists of six elected members and one ex-officio selectman member. The Board may appoint up to three alternate members. The Board is currently seeking applicants to be alternate members. Interested people should contact the town hall office (428-3221) or speak with a board member.

The past year has been a busy one for the Planning Board. The Board approved 10 Site Plan Review applications, 2 SPR Waiver Requests, 5 Minor Subdivision applications, 4 Boundary Line Adjustments, and reviewed 2 Voluntary Mergers.

In conjunction with the Central NH Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC), the Board completed its second year in a three-year contract to update the town's master plan. Under New Hampshire law, the Planning Board is required to "prepare and amend from time to time a master plan to guide the development of the municipality." Typically, master plans are updated at least every ten years; Henniker's has not been updated since 1988.

The board will be looking for interested citizens to participate in the subcommittee work on chapters of the master plan. The Henniker Web site (www.henniker.org) has a link to the CNHRPC pages that hold information on the master plan update process, as it pertains to state statute and the Town of Henniker. Drafts of master plan chapters are reviewed at public Planning Board meetings. Upon completion of the chapters, the entire plan will be presented at a public hearing, then will be considered by the Board for approval.

The Board holds regular meetings on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month at 7 p.m. in the Town Hall. Agendas, public hearing notices and the meeting schedule are posted at the town hall, Tucker Free Library, the post office, and on the town website. We reserve time at the beginning of each meeting for informal discussions and anyone with questions or concerns is urged to notify the planning board office (428-3221) to be placed on the agenda. The clerk, Gail Abramowicz, holds office hours every Tuesday from 12:00 noon to 2:00 p.m. You may also leave a message at this number, with the best time for her to return your call.

Zoning Board of Adjustment

The powers and duties of the ZBA

Like every municipal board or official, zoning boards of adjustment have only those powers specifically granted to them by state statute. The state legislature has defined the ZBA's basic role as that of: 1) hearing appeals from an administrative decision; 2) hearing appeals which request the grant of one or more variances from the terms of the zoning ordinance; or 3) hearing appeals which request the grant of a special exception.

Administrative Decision: An administrative decision appeal, for example, is when the Board of Selectmen decide that a permit request for a certain commercial use is not allowed in a district and deny the permit. The applicant can appeal the decision to the ZBA for interpretation or application of the terms of the ordinance to have the decision reversed.

Special Exception: In our local zoning ordinance there are two columns of uses for each district. One column specifies what is permitted and the other column lists what is permitted by "special exception". The application for a special exception lists 11 items of criteria that must be met. Some of the criteria include: appropriate location, compatibility with the neighborhood, public interest, property values, affect of health and safety, whether it will constitute a nuisance, and if it is within the spirit and intent of the ordinance. All 11 items must pass by majority vote.

Variance: A variance is requested, for example, when an applicant proposes to build an addition to their home and the new addition does not meet the required setback distance to the side property line. The applicant must then prove "hardship" of the land, and why they should be granted the variance. A variance is similar to asking permission to not comply with the local ordinance.

A recent New Hampshire Supreme Court decision in Simplex Technologies v. Town of Newington has resulted in the need to change the current variance ordinance. Since that decision changed the long standing directions of the Supreme Court on the "hardship criteria", the Board has had to follow that decision even though it is in contradiction to the current ordinance. The Board has proposed an amendment on this year's warrant to bring the town's ordinance into compliance with the court's ruling. The result of this change is to "reduce the difficulty" in obtaining a variance. This year the Board held seven hearings for appeals requesting a variance, granting four, denying three.

The Board holds a monthly meeting on the third Wednesday in the Town Hall at 7 p.m. Applications may be submitted at the Board of Selectmen's office Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. The Board's clerk, Gail Abramowicz, holds office hours every Tuesday from 12:00 to 2:00 p.m. Posting locations for agendas, minutes, public hearings and the schedule are Town Hall, the Tucker Free Library, the post office, and the town website, www.henniker.org.

Central NH Regional Planning Commission

Established in accordance with state law, the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) is a voluntary association of 20 towns in Merrimack and Hillsborough Counties and the City of Concord. The Town of Henniker is a member in good standing of the Commission.

The Commission's mission is to improve, through education, training and planning assistance, the ability of the municipalities of the region to prepare and implement municipal plans; to prepare a plan for effective and appropriate development and utilization of the resources of the region; and to assist municipalities in carrying out the regional plan.

The Commission provides a variety of planning services, including consultations on planning issues; planning research; the development of sample ordinances, regulations, and other planning projects such as local master plans, capital improvement programs and corridor studies; circuit rider planner assistance; the compilation of local and regional demographic information; review and comment on planning documents; development review; and education programs, models; data and access to data sources; grant information; review and comment on planning documents; development review; and educational programs. .

During 2001, Commission staff continued to assist the Planning Board in the development of the Henniker Master Plan. The Community Facilities chapter, Transportation chapter, and Conservation, Preservation, and Open Space chapter were each complete and conditionally approved by the Planning Board pending a final public hearing on the overall document in fall 2002. .

Beyond master plan related activities, CNHRPC staff plotted natural resource inventory (NRI) maps for the Conservation Commission and compiled information for the Planning Board related to Telecommunications Ordinances.

In addition to the local services described above, in 2001 the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission:

- Provided general local planning assistance to member municipalities and responded to inquiries regarding zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations, and site plan review regulation revisions. Prepared a calendar and narrative describing critical dates in preparation for Town Meeting 2002.
- Held four meetings of the CNHRPC Regional Resource Conservation Committee (R2C2), which seeks to bring representatives of each of the region's communities together to work on conservation issues that affect the overall region.
- Completed and distributed the Guide to a Municipal Open Space Trail System Plan.
- Completed the update of the FY 2003-2012 CNHRPC Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
- Conducted approximately 240 traffic counts throughout the region.
- Organized and hosted five meetings of the CNHRPC Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC).
- Provided assistance to municipalities, groups and interested individuals regarding the Transportation Enhancements (TE) and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) programs.

- Provided assistance to local communities in the development of Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) proposals.
- Continued work on the update of the CNHRPC Regional Transportation Plan and preparation of the Regional Multi-Use Trail Plan.
- Provided continuing technical assistance to the Upper Merrimack River Local Advisory Committee (UMRLAC) and the Contoocook and North Branch Rivers Local Advisory Committee (CNBRLAC).
- Completed the update of the CNHRPC Regional Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan and the draft Regional Open Space Plan.
- Provided assistance to CNHRPC member and non-member towns regarding National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) participation and compliance.

Cemetery Report

As this is the first report on the cemeteries in a while, we would like to bring everyone up to date on what has been happening. First, you need to know the players. There are three cemetery committees in Henniker:

1) *Abandoned Cemetery Committee*: This committee is made up of four members appointed by the Selectmen. They are responsible for making decisions on the seven or so cemeteries that are no longer in use. This committee has been relatively inactive over the past years.

2) *Cemetery Trustees*: Three residents serve as Henniker Cemetery Trustees, one is voted on each year for a three year term. The trustees are responsible for making sure that there is a cemetery available in which to bury people and are responsible for disbursing the cemetery money budgeted and voted on each year at town meeting.

3) *New Cemetery Association Board of Directors*: This committee oversees the "New Cemetery" located on both sides of Old Concord Road. The New Cemetery owned by the private New Cemetery Association. You must own a plot in this cemetery to be on this Board.

For some years now the Henniker Cemetery Trustees have pooled the town cemetery appropriation (\$5,000) with New Cemetery Association money. The Association reviews bids and approves a contractor to mow and maintain the New Cemetery, the Old Cemetery behind Town Hall, the First Burial Yard on Depot Hill, the Plummer Cemetery and the Quaker Cemetery. Both groups have been able to save money with this arrangement and the Henniker Trustees would like to publicly thank the New Cemetery Association for all of their effort in securing the contracts for this work.

For the past two years the town has authorized additional funds (\$1,500 each year) to be used for repairing broken and cracked stones and resetting stones that were badly tipped. Below you will find a list of the work that has been completed during these two years.

Work completed by Perry Brothers Monument Company:

- Old Cemetery (reset 23/repared 17)
- First Burial Yard (reset 40/repared 5)
- Plummer Cemetery (repared 2)

Work done by volunteers:

- Old Cemetery (repared 16)
- First Burial Yard (reset 13)
- Plummer Cemetery (repared 5/cleaned all marble, some slate and some granite stones)
- Quaker Cemetery (all repairs done by the Friends' Meeting)

The Trustees are asking for \$2,000 this year to be used for the repair and replacement of gravestones. Replacement is used as a last resort and two stones are slated for replacement this year along with more repairs and resetting of stones.

Most of the work has been completed in the largest and most accessible of the cemeteries. Now we will be turning our attention to the smaller abandoned graveyards that have a higher percentage of damaged stones.

Human Services

Housing continues to be the major reason residents seek assistance. Rent payments almost doubled in 2001 for a total of \$24,823; and for the first time a family had to go to a shelter in Concord, because they lost their apartment and had nowhere to live.

The Town assisted 25 families: 33 adults and 26 children last year. Heating costs totaled \$3013.00, electricity was \$2,130.00, and medical costs were \$772.00.

The Henniker Food Pantry continues to help families in need and some residents receive fuel assistance through the Community Action Program.

Conservation Commission

The Commission had a very busy year in 2001. Its members attended the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions where the workshops were quite informative. They worked closely with the Planning Board and the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission to help draft the "Conservation, Preservation, and Open Space" chapter of the new Master Plan. They attended quarterly meetings of the Regional Resource Conservation Committee. They performed several site visits to assess the impacts of logging and other development on wetlands as part of the state's wetlands permitting procedure. They also devoted many hours to the following projects:



French Pond Episode Assessment Project

Working with the French Pond Association, the Department of Environmental Services, New England College, and local volunteers, the Commission collected water samples and hydrologic measurements from French Pond and its tributaries every two weeks from May 15 to December 8, 2001. The purpose of the project is to determine the sources of phosphorus that are contributing to algal blooms in French Pond and the downstream, Keyser Pond. This is the first phase of a larger project addressing the remediation of French Pond. Due to a very dry summer and fall, additional samples and measurements will be collected in the spring of 2002. This work is funded with a \$7,245 grant provided by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services' Non-point Source Local Initiative Grant Program and a \$675 local match provided by lab services and equipment provided by New England College and local volunteer hours.

Natural Resources Inventory

Working with a consultant and local volunteers, the Commission continued to collect and map information for the inventory. New England College supplied a computer with a GIS (Geographic Information System) for the mapping. Information was obtained from the Central NH Regional Planning Commission, the Department of Environmental Services, the Society for the Protection of NH Forests, and the NH GRANITE system of the University of New Hampshire. The Commission expects to have the final report available for review in the summer of 2002. The project was funded through two warrant articles supported by the townspeople of Henniker.

Annual Water Quality Sampling

Working with local volunteers and New England College, the Commission completed its second annual water quality sampling. Samples and measurements were taken in 11 of the town's lakes and ponds. Dissolved oxygen, temperature, and clarity were measured in each pond and water samples were collected and tested for phosphorous, chlorophyll A, specific conductivity, pH, and turbidity. The information collected will be included in the Natural Resources Inventory and in the "Conservation, Preservation, and Open Space" chapter of the Master Plan.

Historical Society

During the past year we have answered 60 requests for research about families formerly of Henniker. Many people have visited the Society asking for help with research and we continue to receive donations to our collection.

Our annual Cookie Sale was a success. Thanks to Cabin Fever for the space they allowed us to use and the many volunteers making the cookies and our sales people.

We have added two more ornaments to our collection for sale. They are the Ocean Born Mary House and the Catholic Church.

We continue to be open on Thursday and Saturday from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM or by appointment. All visitors are welcome.

HIGHWAY SAFETY COMMITTEE

The Highway Safety Committee serves as an advisory committee to the Board of Selectmen. When an issue or a complaint is submitted to the Board of Selectmen or the Town Administrator regarding highway or pedestrian safety, the Board of Selectmen will either act on the complaint immediately or refer it to our committee for further review. Upon reviewing the issue, the committee will make a recommendation to the Board of Selectmen relative to how they may address it. The Board is not bound to accept the recommendations of the committee and may choose to implement all or some of the recommendations of the committee.

The Committee also has been assigned the task of reviewing any house numbering issues that arise within the town. There are roadways in our town where there is no rhyme nor reason to the house numbering sequence. As you can imagine, this problem could be a serious issue for any emergency department trying to locate a residence where there is an existing emergency. Again, as the committee becomes aware of house numbering issues, we review the problem and make a recommendation to the Board of Selectmen who may or may not adopt our recommendation.

The Committee is comprised of representatives from each emergency department as well as representatives from the community at large. For a list of the committee members please review the committee assignments listed in the beginning portion of this town report.

The Committee does not meet on a regularly scheduled day or time. We meet as the need dictates which is usually three or four times a year. The meetings are usually held at the police station.

Recycling Committee

The Henniker Recycling Committee (HRC) assists and advises the selectmen, and works with the head of the Transfer Station/Recycling Center - Bob Pennock, to decrease waste disposal and increase recycling in town. In addition, the HRC offers residents information on the materials that they may recycle at the Transfer Station/Recycling Center and encourages residents to decrease waste and increase recycling on an individual basis. The committee is striving to increase recycling to decrease the environmental impact of our waste (non-recyclables) and to decrease the growing cost of disposing of that waste. Recycling materials generates revenue for the town and decreases the weight of our waste, which in turn reduces cost.

This past year, the HRC worked with the Transfer Station/Recycling Center to host another very successful Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day at which dangerous household chemicals and other substances were collected from residents of Henniker and surrounding towns for safe disposal. Committee members have worked with individuals and groups in both the Henniker Community School and John Stark Regional High School (JSRHS) to involve students and faculty in recycling awareness and the reduction of waste. The focus of efforts at JSRHS, made by committee members Joan O'Connor and Max Cohen, is increased paper recycling. During the spring the HRC again took part in a statewide effort to increase composting by offering plastic composting bins for sale. This year approximately 125 bins were sold and distributed at the Transfer Station/Recycling Center in June, along with information about composting and recycling.

The HRC continues to research ways to increase recycling and reduce waste and cost with help from the NH Governor's Recycling Program and the NH Department of Environmental Services' Waste Management Division. The committee focus has been on a unit-based system known as Pay As You Throw (PAYT) which is being adopted across the state. This system, the cost of which is direct and based on the amount of waste (non-recyclables) each individual disposes of, is aimed to help reduce waste disposal costs for the town and increase recycling (as individuals are not charged for disposal of recyclables). In addition, the committee is looking at other alternatives and in 2002 is planning to survey and work with businesses and individuals in town to better understand Henniker's solid waste stream and the feasibility of these proposed systems in our community. The cost of waste disposal and the amount of waste disposed of by Henniker residents continued to increase in 2001. The HRC is looking forward to working cooperatively with residents to effect a reduction in these numbers and an increase in recycling.

In July of 2001, Larry Parrish stepped down as committee co-chair and the committee elected Lia Houk as the HRC Chair, with Joan O'Connor and Ron Lavallee serving as vice co-chairs. Rod Pimentel was appointed as the HRC ex-officio member representing the selectmen. We are always looking for the involvement of new members who are welcome to join our monthly meeting at 7 PM on the first Wednesday of every month in the Grange Hall. Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (CRVNA) continues to offer comprehensive health services to the residents of Henniker. The following is a description of these services:

Home Care Services respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and para-professional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting. Patients who receive services range from children who have a complex medical condition to frail elders who require supportive assistance to stay in their own homes.

Hospice Services provide professional and para-professional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping the patient remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical, emotional and spiritual needs.

CRVNA's Hospice House provides residential care to terminally ill patients who have no primary caregiver or need a supported residential setting. Oftentimes patients are transferred into the Hospice House when a caregiver is exhausted and unable to care for them at home any longer. To date, this House has provided a home to approximately 500 terminally ill residents.

Community Health Services include health education, health maintenance, and preventive health services. The program includes preventive care, adult and senior health, child health, Baby's First Homecoming, immunizations for all ages, supportive services to school districts, parent education and support, health education, and nutritional counseling.

Community health includes health promotion services which focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families, and individuals through early intervention and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting include child health, adult screening, and immunizations. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior health services are provided at congregate housing sites.

Over the past two years, Senior Health Clinics have expanded to reach out to seniors who may require a monthly check by a nurse of their blood sugar, blood pressure, and/or diabetes management. The expansion of these services was in response to the decrease in Medicare services to seniors.

Professional and para-professional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Health education and instruction are part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Henniker may request service – patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. The nurse who completes an assessment will coordinate with the patient's physician a plan of care to meet the patient's specific needs. If the patient does not have a physician, the nurse will assist the patient to identify one and schedule a visit. The agency has developed a program with the NH-Dartmouth Family Practice Residency Program to coordinate a house call visit by a resident to a frail elder's home who is unable to leave his/her home.

A call to Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (1-800-924-8620) is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. The CRVNA office is open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. A nurse is on call 24 hours a day. The On-Call Nurse can be reached by calling 1-800-924-8620.

The community health services are provided to residents oftentimes free of charge. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of New Hampshire, accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO) with commendation, and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

White Birch Community Center

White Birch Community Center is committed to providing members of the Henniker community with programs to meet the needs of all generations. This responsibility is firmly entrenched in every decision made by the Board of Directors and White Birch representatives.

White Birch Community Center is a private, non-profit organization that focuses on the educational, social, and recreational needs of the community so as to enable people to create a balance of work and leisure. In addition to offering the programs highlighted below, the Center also provides licensed child care for children aged 18 months to 12 years.

This last year was exciting! White Birch Community Center expanded programs for Senior Adults to include computer classes, a reading club, social activities, and weekly movie presentations on site. Our ability to increase the activity schedule is a result of adding the White House to our space. The White House is adjacent to the Red Barn. The new addition and other major renovations to our children's areas were contributed by devoted community benefactors.

SENIOR ADULT PROGRAMS

Each month, White Birch sends information about Senior Adult programs to more than 450 members of the community. For much of last year, monthly trips and activities were scheduled. Participants enjoyed day trips, special events, monthly luncheons, and holiday activities. Our annual picnic at Tall Pines Cottages on Keyser Pond was a wonderful chance for people to come together at the end of the Summer. Abundant kudos must be given to our volunteers who are committed to making these activities continue. A wonderful celebration was held in November for the 25th anniversary of the monthly luncheon. Special honorees were founders Jolene Schillinger-Erikson and Marguerite Damour.

With the help of the Belknap-Merrimack Community Action Program, we have had a temporary staff member to work with the Senior Adult programs five hours a day, five days a week. She teaches computer classes, assists with Dial-a-Ride, and, generally, works to satisfy the needs of the Senior Center. The Town of Henniker has provided additional funding for a person mostly to coordinate off site activities. Participation increases on a weekly basis; White Birch is gradually encouraging the Center as a social hub for Senior Adults.

YOUTH PROGRAMS

The White Birch flagship program, Crayon College nursery school, began its 27th year of operation with an almost full enrollment. Crayon College is a partial day program geared to three and four year old children. A developmentally appropriate, hands on approach to early childhood education is offered in a stimulating environment of small classes.

In collaboration with the Henniker Community school, the Henniker Police Department, SAU 24, White Birch operates the After School Activities Program (ASAP), for children in fifth and sixth grade at the Community School. The program offers learning activities in conjunction with regularly scheduled field trips. Extensive opportunities are given for peer social interactions. ASAP is partially-funded through a state grant and seeks to reduce high risk behaviors, including youth crime, violence, drug, alcohol, and tobacco use. Very special thanks go to the Henniker Community School and MaryEllen Schule of White Birch for their commitment to promoting excellent programs for Henniker's youth.

From July through August, the Center held Summer Day Camps for elementary-age children. Camp programs were conducted eight weeks this past year. A different theme each week gave variety and new excitement throughout the summer.

ASAP Outdoor Adventure Days for youth in grades 5-8 had ten great trips this summer. Participants enjoyed all the activities with highlights being rock climbing and deep sea fishing.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

White Birch also sponsors various community-wide children's events such as our "Children's Fall Festival," and "Breakfast with Santa." The Center wishes to acknowledge the efforts and hard work of Tammy Conroy who coordinated the Fall event. We also thank all community volunteers, the Office of Community Service at New England College for their valuable assistance in making these events possible, and the many John Stark and Henniker Community School students who volunteer their time and talents to our community events.

Through White Birch, free swimming lessons were offered to Henniker children, ages six to twelve years, for a two week period. A Red Cross-certified instructor worked with more than 50 children concentrating on the basics of swim safety and advanced skills.

Two initiatives, begun by White Birch in 1999, were in full operation in 2001: Dial-a-Ride and the Henniker Community Outlook. Dial-a-Ride, which offers rides to Henniker residents aged 55 or over to and from needed appointments, had major increases in month to month use from the previous year.

To assist with coordination of information for area citizens, White Birch distributes The Henniker Community Outlook for the Town. Each month, this newsletter highlights Town events and information for Henniker residents to make everyone feel a part of the great Henniker community.

Henniker Rotary Club

We are grateful for the enormous support from the people and businesses in the communities of Henniker, Hillsborough and Weare. Without your support of our Annual Auction, Rotary Raffle Calendar and other projects, we would not be successful. We share the accomplishments of 2001 with our communities and thank you for helping us achieve "service above self."

In 2001 the Henniker Rotary Club raised and distributed more than \$13,000 in scholarship assistance and grants to local organizations; community improvement activities in the Henniker and Hillsborough areas and throughout Rotary District 7870 (southern NH/VT) and internationally.

Local projects included maintaining and adding new benches and a sign at Amey Brook Park; second year funding for Hillsborough Project Pride, and purchasing a bench at Butler Park; conducting quarterly Adopt-a-Highway trash pick ups; hanging new holiday wreaths for the Henniker business district and conducting the 11th Annual Rotary Rabies Clinic and Pet Care Day. As part of a District Wide Service Day, the club conducted a downtown Henniker clean up on September 15th with club members tackling a 4 block area in the central square including trash pick-up, street sweeping, weed removal and spraying the streets with water.

Our Club places a major emphasis on youth development, supporting projects that encourage community service, provide opportunities to develop leadership skills and offer financial assistance for educational endeavors. The club awarded scholarships to 3 graduating seniors: Matthew Corsetti and Kelsi Doscher, John Stark and Juliana Spence, Hillsborough High School, funded 30 Henniker and Hillsborough 7th and 8th grade students in Ropes Course Adventure Learning activities at Child and Family Services' Camp Spaulding; awarded Service Above Self Awards to Molly Bopp of Henniker and Maegan Gagnon and Christa Kalipolitis of Hillsborough for exemplary community service; sponsored six John Stark and Hillsborough High School students to attend the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards Institute; provided campership assistance for 8 Henniker and Hillsborough boys and girls to attend 2-weeks of overnight camp at Camp Spaulding and began a monthly children's book collection and distribution project to benefit Hillsborough Literacy Projects.

Community grants were awarded to a number of local youth and non-profit agencies including Hillsboro Arts Council, the Domestic Violence Prevention program and the food pantries. In the aftermath of the terrorist attacks on September 11th, we sent contributions to NYC for disaster relief. Following the closing of the paper mills in Berlin, we sent a contribution to the White Mountain Rotary Club in Berlin for assistance to local families.

Internationally we support Rotary's worldwide polio eradication and pure water projects and the Help to Honduras program. For the second year we are lending financial assistance to an international student attending New England College. Our most ambitious international project in recent years is joining the Rotary Orphan Train Project in supporting third world orphanages. **The Henniker Rotary Club is the first club to sponsor an orphanage in China.** We are providing the Shenyang Orphanage funding to purchase formula, cover medical services and foster care subsidies for up to 10 children to help provide the socialization, education and stimulation they need to become candidates for adoption. The club recently received a Rotary International Helping grant to match the funds raised by the club for this project.

We extend an invitation to interested business and professional members of our community to attend one of our meetings and learn more about how Rotary is serving our community. The club meets weekly

on Thursday mornings from 7:30 - 8:30 AM at the Congregational Church Parish Hall. 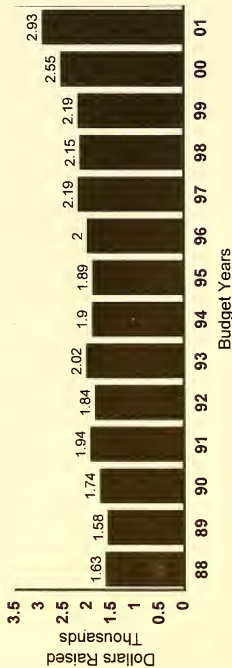

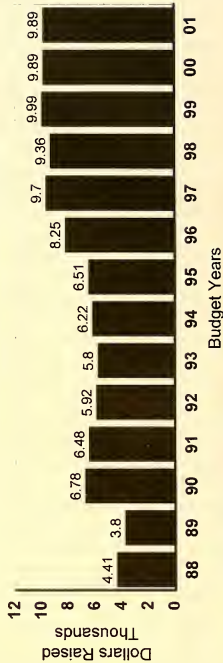

County Taxes Tax Dollars Raised for County



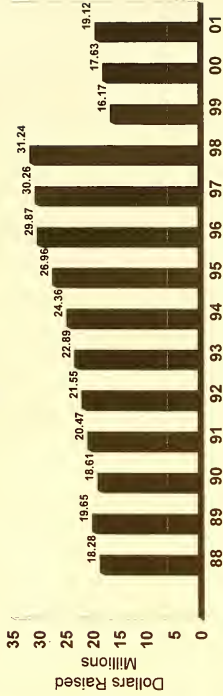

Town Taxes Tax Dollars Raised for Town



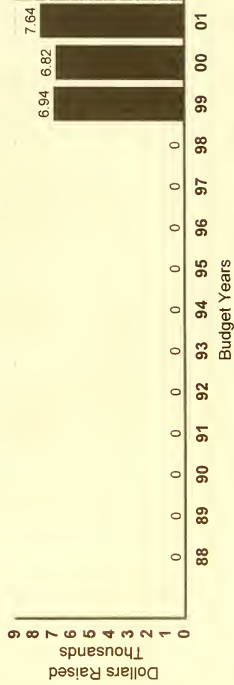

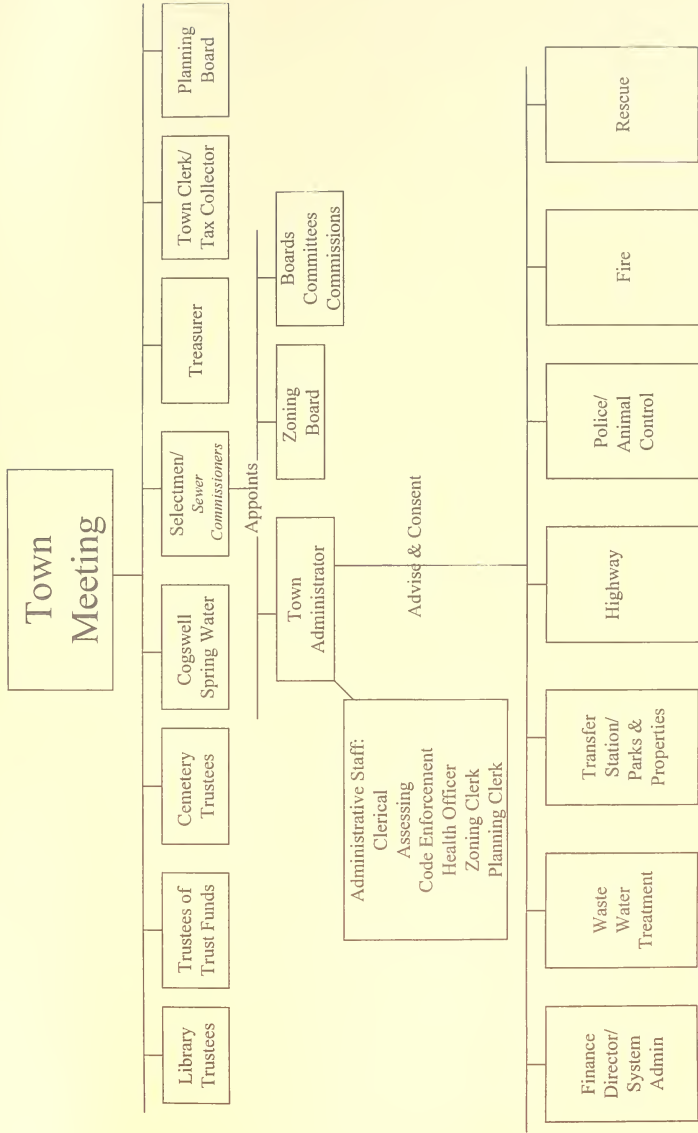
