

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MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING Lincoln, New Hampshire March 11, 1980

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Frederick Branscombe promptly at 9:00 am. Kalene Roberts offered a motion to recess meeting to take up balloting until 6:00 p.m. with the business part of the meeting to commence at 7:30 p.m. Motion seconded by Martha Patterson. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

At 6:00 p.m. Kalene Roberts moved that balloting cease with regular business to be taken up at 7:30 p.m. Motion was seconded by Helena O'Rourke. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative.

The business meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by the Moderator. Leslie Sargent moved that the reading of the warrant be dispensed with. Seconded by David Thompson. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE #2: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Leslie Sargent offered motion to pass over this article and take up individual articles. Seconded by David Thompson. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #3: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officer's salaries.

David Thompson moved that \$7,700 be raised and appropriated for Town Officer's salaries. Seconded by Roger Landry. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #4: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officer's Expenses.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$22,678 be raised and appropriated for Town Officer's Expenses. Seconded by Philip Gravink. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #5: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Election and Registration Expenses.

Daniel Bourassa moved that \$990 be raised and appropriated for Election and Registration Expenses. Seconded by Clifton Dauphine. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #6: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for District Court Expenses.

Roland Bourassa moved that \$16,545 be raised and appropriated for District Court Expenses. Seconded by Clifton Dauphine. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #7: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation and maintenance of the Town Building.

David Thompson moved that \$8,370 be raised and appropriated for the operation and maintenance of the Town Building. Seconded by Earl Rannacher. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #8: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.

Roger Landry moved that the sum of \$85,479.74 be raised and appropriated with \$25,000 from Revenue Sharing applied against the total. Seconded by Philip Gravink. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #9: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$7,755 be raised and appropriated for the Fire Department. Seconded by Clifton Dauphine. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #10: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Planning and Zoning.

David Thompson moved that \$1,461 be raised and appropriated for Planning and Zoning. Seconded by Wallace Peltier. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #11 To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all forms of insurance.

Wallace Peltier moved that \$26,200 be raised and appropriated for payment of all forms of insurance. Seconded by David Thompson. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #12: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.

Clifton Dauphine moved that \$300 be raised and appropriated for Civil Defense. Seconded by Roger Landry. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #13: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Communications Center.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$33,815 be raised and appropriated for the Communications Center. Seconded by Clifton Dauphine. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #14: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Health Department.

Roland Bourassa moved that \$17,272 be raised and appropriated for the Health Department. Seconded by Wallace Peltier. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #15: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation and maintenance of the Solid Waste Facility.

David Thompson moved that \$49,000 be raised and appropriated for the operation and maintenance of the Solid Waste Facility. Seconded by Roger Thompson. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #16 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$182.41, the State to contribute \$1,216.04 for Town Road Aid.

David Thompson moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$182.41, with the State to contribute \$1,216.04 for Town Road Aid. Seconded by Earl Rannacher. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #17: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Maintenance.

Daniel Bourassa moved that \$49,672.04 be raised and appropriated for Town Maintenance. Seconded by Roland Bourassa. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #18: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street lighting.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$22,000 be raised and appropriated for street lighting. Seconded by Roger Landry. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #19: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Public Library.

Roger Stewart moved that \$8,066 be raised and appropriated for the Town Public Library. Seconded by Wallace Peltier. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #20: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Town Poor.

David Thompson moved that \$10,000 be raised and appropriated for the support of Town Poor. Seconded by Earl Rannacher. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #21: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

David Thompson moved that \$3,800 be raised and appropriated for Old Age Assistance. Seconded by Clifton Dauphine. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #22: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Patriotic Purposes.

Roland Bourassa moved to accept the Recommendation of the Budget Committee not to appropriate any money for Patriotic Purposes. Seconded by Daniel Bourassa. Majority vote in the negative carried. Recommendation by Selectman George McGee to raise and appropriate \$1,000 for Patriotic Purposes. So moved by same. Seconded by Roger Landry. Majority vote in the affirmative carried.

ARTICLE #23: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Recreation.

James Beaudin, Sr. moved that \$6,330 be raised and appropriated for Recreation. Seconded by Earl Rannacher. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #24: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation and maintenance of the Sewer Department.

David Thompson moved that \$33,817.44 be raised and appropriated for the operation and maintenance of the Sewer Department. Seconded by Daniel Bourassa. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #25: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to operate and maintain the Water System.

Roger Thompson moved that \$14,842.44 be raised and appropriated for the operation and maintenance of the Water System. Seconded by James Beaudin. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #26: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Cemetery.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$3,400 be raised and appropriated for the Cemetery. Seconded by James Beaudin. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #27: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Legal Expenses.

Roland Bourassa moved that \$2,500 be raised and appropriated for Legal Expenses. Seconded by James Beaudin. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #28: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Advertising and Regional Associations.

Wallace Peltier moved that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,000 for advertising and regional associations. Seconded by Roger Stewart. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #29: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Employees' Retirement and Social Security Taxes.

David Thompson moved that \$13,700 be raised and appropriated for Employees' Retirement and Social Security Taxes. Seconded by Daryl Lavigne. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #30: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a Contingency Fund.

Earl Rannacher moved that the Town raise and appropriate \$500 for a Contingency Fund. Seconded by Roger Stewart. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #31: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for payment of all Debt Retirement Schedules due during the ensuing year.

James Beaudin moved that the Town raise and appropriate \$92,990 for payment of all Debt Retirement Schedules due during the ensuing year. Seconded by David Thompson. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #32: To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Mustard Seed Summer Youth Program.

George McGee moved that \$1,320 be raised and appropriated for the Mustard Seed Summer Youth Program. Seconded by Roger Thompson. Motion carried by a majority vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #33: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new copy machine.

George McGee moved that the Town raise and appropriate \$1,895 for the purchase of a new copy machine. Wallace Peltier seconded. Vote in the affirmative. Carried by majority.

ARTICLE #34: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a 1980 Police Cruiser.

Earl Rannacher moved that \$6,338.41 be raised and appropriated for the purchase of a 1980 Police Cruiser. Seconded by Clifton Dauphine. Vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #35: To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new maintenance pick-up truck.

George McGee moved that \$9,500 be raised and appropriated for the purchase of a new maintenance pick-up truck. Clifton Dauphine seconded. Motion carried a majority vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #36: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money; provided; (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies; and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditures of Town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95b.

So moved by David Thompson. Seconded by Roland Bourassa. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #37: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to act as the "franchising authority" for the Town in franchising and regulating cable television systems in the Town with the authority and powers set fourth in RSA Chapter 53-C; and further to ratify and confirm any prior actions of the Selectmen re franchise agreements with New England Cablevision, Inc.

So moved by Daniel Bourassa. Seconded by Roger Landry. Motion carried by a majority in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #38 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction or advertised sealed bid or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

So moved by Earl Rannacher. Seconded by Clifton Dauphine. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #39: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$520,000.00 for the purpose of constructing an 850,000 gallon concrete water storage reservoir and 2,800 feet of 14 inch connecting water main. This will qualify the Town for federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial Bonds of Notes not to exceed \$210,000 under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (NH RSA 33.1 et. seq., as amended) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Lincoln and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the auspicious of the Farmers Home Administration, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

James Beaudin moved that the Town raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$520,000 for the purpose of constructing an 850,000 gallon water storage reservoir and 2,800 feet of 14 inch connecting water main, also to authorize the Selectmen to issue Serial Notes or Bonds not to exceed \$210,000 and to take any other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the

best interest of the Town of Lincoln. Seconded by Roland Bourassa. Vote was unanimous in the affirmative with 65% of voters present voting in the affirmative with none opposed.

ARTICLE #40: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed five hundred thousand (\$500,000) and appropriate an additional sum not to exceed one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000) for the purpose of constructing improvements to the sewerage treatment plant which is a requirement contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C., Sec., 1251 et. seq.) and will qualify the Town for Federal funds; such sums to be generated as follows:

Five hundred thousand (\$500,000) to be raised by general taxation, four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) of which will be reimbursed to the Town of Lincoln by the State of New Hampshire in accordance with RSA 149-B:1.

One million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000) to be provided by the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants Section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33, U.S.C. Sec. 1251 et seq.).

And to further allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants Section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33, U.S.C., Sec. 1251 et. seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

So moved by David Thompson. Seconded by Philip Gravink. Vote in the affirmative with two-thirds of the voters present and none opposed.

ARTICLE #41: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.

So moved by Earl Rannacher. Seconded by Wallace Peltier. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #42: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to expend on projects, and/or Debt

Retirement Schedules voted in this Warrant that may develop from monies paid in the Town by the State or Federal Government.

So moved by Earl Rannacher. Seconded by Wallace Peltier. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #43 To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to select either the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration, Division of Municipal Services or a private accredited or professionally capable auditing firm to audit the Town of Lincoln's books.

So moved by David Thompson. Seconded by Roger Landry. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #44: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to apply to budget items the interest received on taxes and deposits.

So moved by David Thompson. Seconded by Roland Bourassa. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #45: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for and expend any monies that may be forthcoming from the Federal Emergency Manpower or CETA programs.

So moved by Daniel Bourassa. Seconded by Wallace Peltier. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #46: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the improvement of the Municipal Water Systems, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in NH RSA 33: 7-B et. seq., as amended and to pass any vote relating thereto.

So moved by Earl Rannacher. Seconded by David Thompson. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #47: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take an option or options on any and all lands which may in the opinion of the majority of the Board of Selectmen be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln and to do all things incidental thereto.

So moved by Jane Duguay. Seconded by Roger Thompson. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #48: To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to apply to budget items a sum of money, if necessary, from the unappropriated surplus as may be required to maintain a reasonable tax rate.

So moved by David Thompson. Seconded by Earl Rannacher. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

ARTICLE #49: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Being none, David Thompson moved for adjournment at 9:20. Seconded by Daryl Lavigne. Vote unanimous in the affirmative.

- 40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 41. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to expend on the projects, and/or Debt Retirement Schedules voted in this Warrant that may develop from monies paid in the Town by the State of Federal Government.
- 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to select either the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration, Division of Municipal Services or a private accredited or professionally capable auditing firm to audit the Town of Lincoln's books.
- 43. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to apply to budget items the interest received on taxes and deposits.
- 44. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for and expend any monies that may be forthcoming for the Federal Emergency Manpower or CETA programs.
- 45. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate, and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State, or other assistance as may be available for the improvement and enlargement of the Municipal Water Systems, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of said assistance as outlined in NH RSA 33:7-B et. seq., as amended, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take an option or options on any and all lands which may, in the opinion of the majority of the Board of Selectmen, be in the best interest of the Town of Lincoln and to do all things incidental thereto.
- 47. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not-to-exceed Two Hundred and Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$260,000) for the purpose of constructing improvements to the Municipal Water System including storage tanks, pumping stations and connecting mains, and other related facilities, such sum to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds under and in compliance

48. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Drug Paraphernalia Ordinance:

Article 1 (Definitions)

The term "drug paraphernalia" means all equipment, products, and materials of any kind which are used, intended for use, or designed for use, in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing into the human body a controlled substance in violation of this Ordinance. It includes, but is not limited to:

- (1) Kits used, intended for use, or designed for use in planting, propagatin, cultivating, growing or harvesting of any species of plant which is a controlled substance or from which a controlled substance can be derived;
- (2) Kits used, intended for use, or designed for use in manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, or preparing controlled substances;
- (3) Isomerization devices used, intended for use, or designed for use in increasing the potency of any species of plant which is a controlled substance;
- (4) Testing equipment used, intended for use, or designed for use in identifying or in analyzing the strength, effectiveness or purity of controlled substances;
- (5) Scales and balances used, intended for use, or designed for use in weighing or measuring controlled substances;

- (6) Diluents and adulterants, such as quinine hydrochloride, mannitol, mannite, dextrose and lactose, used, intended for use, or designed for use in cutting controlled substances;
- (7) Separation gins and sifters used, intended for use, or designed for use in removing twigs and seeds from, or in otherwise cleaning or refining marihuana;
- (8) Blenders, bowls, containers, spoons and mixing devices used, intended for use, or designed for use in compounding controlled substances;
- (9) Capsules, balloons, envelopes and other containers used, intended for use, or designed for use in packaging small quantities of controlled substances;
- (10) Containers and other objects used, intended for use, or designed for use in storing or concealing controlled substances;
- (11) Hypodermic syringes, needles and other objects used, intended for use, or designed for use in parenterally injected controlled substances into the human body;
- (12) Objects used, intended for use, or designed for use in ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing marihuana, cocaine, hashish, or hashish oil into the human body, such as:
 - (a) Metal, wooden, acrylic, glass, stone, plastic, or ceramic pipes with or without screens, permanent screens, hashish heads, or punctured metal bowls;
 - (b) Water pipes;
 - (c) Carburetion tubes and devices;
 - (d) Smoking and carburetion masks;
 - (e) Roach clips: meaning objects used to hold burning material, such as a marihuana cigarette, that has become too small or too short to be held in the hand;
 - (f) Miniature cocaine spoons and cocaine vials;
 - (g) Chamber pipes;
 - (h) Carburetor pipes;
 - (i) Electric pipes;

- (j) Air-driven pipes;
- (k) Chillums;
- (l) Bongs;
- (m) Ice pipes or chillers;

In determining whether an object is drug paraphernalia, a court or other authority should consider, in addition to all other logically relevant factors, the following:

- (1) Statements by an owner or by anyone in control of the object concerning its use;
- (2) Prior convictions, if any, of an owner, or of anyone in control of the object, under any State or Federal law relating to any controlled substance;
- (3) The proximity of the object, in time and space, to a direct violation of this Ordinance;
- (4) The proximity of the object to controlled substances;
- (5) The existence of any residue of controlled substances on the object;
- (6) Direct or circumstantial evidence of the intent of an owner, or of anyone in control of the object, to deliver it to persons who he knows, or should reasonable know, intend to use the object to facilitate a violation of this Ordinance; the innocence of an owner, or of anyone in control of the object, as to a direct violation of this Ordinance should not prevent a finding that the object is intended for use, or designed for use as drug paraphernalia;
- (7) Instructions, oral or written, provided with the object concerning its use;
- (8) Descriptive materials accompanying the object which explain or depict its use;
- (9) National and local advertising concerning its use;
- (10) The manner in which the object is displayed for sale;
- (11) Whether the owner, or anyone in control of the object, is a legitimate supplier of like or related items to the

- 36. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Revenue Sharing Fund and transfer to the general administration account \$40,000 to be applied to the maintenance and administration of the Police Department.
- 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction or advertised sealed bid or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.
- 38. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive, and expend Federal or State grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money; provided; (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies; and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to the limitation and expenditure of Town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95-b.
- 39. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court, to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual in-

community, such as a licensed distributor or dealer of tobacco products;

- (12) Direct or circumstantial evidence of the ratio of the sales of the object(s) to the total sales of the business enterprise;
- (13) The existence and scope of legitimate uses for the object in the community;
- (14) Expert testimony concerning its use.

Article II (Offenses and Penalties) SECTION A (Possession of Drug Paraphernalia)

It is unlawful for any person to use, or to possess with intent to use, drug paraphernalia to plant, propagate, cultivate, grow, harvest, manufacture, compound, convert, produce, process, prepare, test, analyze, pack, repack, store, contain, conceal, inject, ingest, inhale or otherwise introduce into the human body a controlled substance in violation of this Ordinance. Any person who violates this section, upon conviction, shall be fined not more than \$100.00, no portion of which may be suspended.

SECTION B (Manufacture or Delivery of Drug Paraphernalia)

It is unlawful for any persons to deliver, possess, with intent to deliver, or manufacture with intent to deliver, drug paraphernalia, knowing, or under circumstances where one reasonably should know, that it will be used to plant, propagate, cultivate, grow, harvest, manufacture, compound, convert, produce, process, prepare, test, analyze, pack, repack, store, contain, conceal, inject, ingest, inhale, or otherwise introduce into the human body a controlled substance, in violation of this Ordinance. Any person who violates this section, upon conviction, shall be fined not more than \$100.00, no portion of which may be suspended.

SECTION C (Delivery of Drug Paraphernalia to a Minor)

Any person 18 years of age or over who violates Section B by delivering drug paraphernalia to a person under 18 years of age who is a least 3 years his junior, upon conviction, shall be fined not more than \$100.00, no portion of which may be suspended.

SECTION D (Advertisement of Drug Paraphernalia)

It is unlawful for any person to place in any newspaper, magazine, handbill, or other publication any advertisement, knowing, or under circumstances where one reasonably should know, that the purpose of the advertisement, in whole or in part, is to promote the sale of objects designed or intended for use as drug paraphernalia. Any person who violates this section, upon conviction, shall be fined not more than \$100.00, no portion of which may be suspended.

Article III (Civil Forfeiture)

All drug paraphernalia as defined above shall be, upon proof of a violation as set forth above, subject to civil seizure and forfeiture.

Article IV (Severability)

If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or application of the Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Ordinance are severable.

REPORT OF THE LINCOLN POLICE DEPT.

During the past few years we have seen a rise in the crime rate in rural areas, Lincoln is no exception. But we are happy to report slightly fewer crimes than last year. The following statistics tell our story:

Many will note the dramatic rise in the number of criminal investigations made this year versus last. This number is so high because of a new crime reporting system of the state which causes us to file our cases differently than in previous years. In actuality there appears no significant rise in this catagory. Data on the motor vehicle summons that were issued is not available at this writing as all court material has not been completely returned from the court as some are still pending trial. We are proud to report that the number of motor vehicle accidents that occured in Lincoln during 1980 was way down from 1979, down about 22%. We must report one negative note though, of the 84 accidents, one involved a fatality. This was the first fatal accident in Lincoln in 4½ years.

During the year the department saw some changes in personnel. In April Patrolman Philip English resigned from the department to take a position with the Henniker NH Police Department. In May Lawrence Drew was promoted to Patrolman First Class to replace English. Also that month Clifton Dauphine was promoted to Patrolman First Class and given the duties of Auxiliary Supervisor. In late May Drew was given the duties of the department equipment officer and Jeffrey Mayhew was made the Training Officer. In late August Mayhew was moved to the position of full-time patrolman, filling the vacancy in the full-time officer roster.

In April Jeffrey Mayhew successfully completed a course in Criminalistics offered by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council. In July Mayhew became one of the first 42 of the state's 1,500 part-time officers to be certified by the Police Training Council, after successfully completing a nine part equivilency examination. In October the Lincoln and Woodstock Police Departments jointly sponsored a training course for area Part-Time Officers to meet state training requirements. The course was the first of its type to be conducted in the state. After nine weeks in the classroom, 18 area part-time officers successfully passed the course.

In July the department received it's new police cruiser, a 1980 Ford L.T.D. The vehicle was specially equipped for use by Officer Larry Drew, who installed the lights, radio, siren system, etc. In looking at new cruisers, the department looked towards vehicles that would give better fuel economy. Also smaller engine size was considered. In addition to looking towards a smaller cruiser and fuel conservation, the department began a fuel conservation program of it's own. The result was less gas being eaten up by travelling less and by obtaining better gas mileage.

Throughout the year the department presented special programs to various classes at the area schools on the different functions of the police department. In the spring, in conjunction with the Woodstock Police Department, a bicycle safety and registration clinic was run. This fall the department began working with a group of concerned citizens and parents on the problem of drug use amongst children. A newsletter on ski theft prevention has been developed and we are in hopes of soon getting it printed and out on the street. A crime prevention program for homeowners is in the developmental process. On December 1st the first anniversary of OPERATION: Good Morning was celebrated. The program is a cooperative effort with the Communications Center to check daily on the elderly. The Forest Service recently donated a sign for the P.D. to be put on the street, showing where the station is located.

Again this year the department worked in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service and the Loon Mountain Recreation Area/Village of Loon Mountain to provide special police services.

Also this year the department has worked out mutual assistance agreements with the Woodstock and Plymouth Police Departments should an emergency arise. These agreements allow for department officers to have full law enforcement powers during an emergency situation.

The police department would like to take this time to thank the members of our community, the town fathers, and all the rest who have helped us and made our job a little easier to perform. If at any time during the year you have a question or need help stop by or call us, we are most eager and happy to help whenever possible.

REPORT OF THE LINCOLN FIRE DEPARTMENT

In 1980 we were called out a total of twenty-four times. The break-down is as follows: seven chimney fires, six car fires, four structure fires, three grass fires, and four miscellaneous calls. This does not include fourteen calls responded to on Halloween night. All in all, however, we had relatively little dollar damage and certainly hope this trend continues.

Twice monthly we have training meetings during which we test our equipment, and do general maintenance and cleaning. During good weather we often go out for "hands-on" practice at different locations around town. For instance, last March an expert form Petrolane Gas Company came and instructed us on the proper techniques of fighting propane fires.

Last summer we held our second Fireman's Parade and Muster which was a big success. We feel that it is a great way to improve firefighting skills while having a good time competing against area firemen. At the same time we were able to raise money for the Kancamagus Recreation Area.

Currently we are trying to improve our communications, which at best are very poor. Our radios are only able to reach one or two miles and are very unreliable. We have set up a Radio Fund at Granite State Trust Company in order to purchase a new radio system. We held a raffle for this purpose and each of the firemen have pledged one-half of this year's pay as their contribution. Many people and businesses have donated to this cause and we are very grateful.

We would like to remind all those of you who heat with wood to use common sense and check your chimney often.

REPORT OF THE COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

During 1980 we saw no major changes in the Communications Center, but again it's use by the public increased by leaps and bounds. The statistics tell the story:

You will note the reduction in the number of CB Radio calls. This is the second year we have seen this, and we attribute it to the end of the CB fad.

In March the voters in Woodstock, at their town meeting, voted to contribute funds to the operation of the Communication Center.

In the fall the Fire Department began a drive to raise funds for radio pagers, to help keep the dispatchers in closer touch with all the firemen. The new pagers can be incorporated into the existing paging system used by the ambulance service. Once in service the new pagers will allow for a faster and more efficient response of the fire department to the scene of a fire.

On December 1st our program, OPERATION: Good Morning, celebrated it's first anniversary. The program provides a daily check on area senior citizens who live alone. After several false alarms the system was put to a test. On December 31st no contact could be made with one of the ladies in the program. A police officer was dispatched to her house to check on her. On his arrival the officer found the lady lying on the floor in her home, unable to move after suffering a possible massive stroke. Medical personnel were quickly summoned to the scene and she was wisked off to the hospital. Without this program we wonder how long it might have been before this lady received help. All feel that was well worth the time put into it to be able to have helped just this one person.

Board of Selectmen Town Office Lincoln, New Hampshire 03251

Members of the Board:

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Lincoln for the year ended December 31, 1979 and have issued our report thereon dated May 22, 1980. As a part of our examination, we reviewed and tested the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing and extent of other auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements. Such study and evaluation disclosed the following conditions that we believe to be material weaknesses.

Inventory of Fixed Assets:

As is the practice with many New Hampshire municipalities, the Town has not maintained a record of its fixed assets. In order to adequately maintain control of its existing fixed assets, we recommend the Town conduct an inventory of these assets as soon as is practical. As part of their long-term policies, Town officials should initiate fixed asset records. Cost or consideration given is the generally accepted method for valuing fixed assets, and should be recorded on all new acquisitions. Where adequate documentation of cost is unavailable for existing fixed assets, an estimate of original cost is an acceptable standard under accounting principals for governmental entities. The existance of fixed asset records will not only aid Town officials in their control of these assets, but should be an invaluable tool in long range planning.

Mailing of Vendor Checks:

Vendor checks are currently mailed out by the same individual who prepares the checks. To strengthen this aspect of internal control, we recommend that the individual preparing vendor checks submit to the Treasurer not only the checks but also preaddressed envelopes for the Treasurer to mail.

Mutilation of Paid Invoices:

Our tests disclosed that paid vendor invoices did not bear any distinguishing marks that indicated the invoice was paid. It is recommended that all invoices be effectively cancelled upon payment to avoid the possibility of duplicate payment.

Incompatibility of Offices:

Under RSA 41:4 "No person shall at the same time hold any two of the following offices: selectmen, treasurer, collector of taxes, auditor and highway agent . . ." We are aware that tax collector also serves as administrative assistant to the selectmen performing many of their functions in their behalf for several years. We believe that this is not only a violation of RSA 41:4 but serves to weaken internal controls in the area of taxes. Under sound business practices, no one person should have access to tax assessment records and be able to record collection of these taxes. Our comment in no way is intended to cast any dispersions over the work of the current tax collector/administrative assistant. Our examination did not disclose any problem in this regard. However, generally accepted auditing standards require us to disclose such deviation from legal requirements and weaknesses in internal control such as this. Therefore, we suggest that the selectmen consider steps to bring town operations into compliance with state statutes.

Other:

The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived

and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgment by management.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgment, carelessness or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally by management with respect either to the execution and recording of transactions or with respect to the estimates and judgments required in the preparation of financial statements. Further, projection of any evaluation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that the procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control for the year ended December 31, 1979, which was set forth in the first paragraph, would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system.

It should be noted that a letter of this type is critical in nature and that we do not intend to imply that our review failed to disclose commendable features in the present accounting and operating procedures of the Town.

Publication Requirements:

The provisions of RSA 71-A:21 require that only this letter be published in the next annual Town Report.

However, we suggest that you consider the publication of the entire report which includes auditor's opinion, financial statements and notes to financial statements. No portion of either the auditor's opinion, financial statements or notes to financial statements may be published separately.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the Town of Lincoln for their assistance during the course of our audit.
