

THE TOWN WARRANT State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Loudon in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Loudon on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Polls will open at 9:00~A.~M. and close not earlier than 7:00~P.~M.

- 3. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on all property taxes paid within thirty days after presentation of tax bill.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums of money not to exceed in the aggregate more than 75% of the anticipated amount to be collected in taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town of Loudon negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in 1970 from taxes collected during the current municipal year.

- 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$219.00 for the Concord Hospital to help defray their estimated deficit for the year 1970.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Fire Department's Capital Reserve Fund as set up in the 1963 Town Meeting.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of \$500.00 for the next three years for use by the Bicentennial Committee to help finance the coming celebration.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to use available Capital Reserve Funds for the purpose of replacing the town truck if necessary before the end of the current year.
- 10. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$50.00 (Social Security Coverage).
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,802.00 for ambulance service by the Center Barnstead Fire Department for one year. This amount is needed to cover our share of the cost of hiring two men for day-time coverage and will maintain a 24 hour service now accomplished by volunteers. This amount computed to be \$1.29 per person.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

All of the town officers, by working as closely as they do in town affairs, see a need to prepare for the future, and this year the passage of the ordinance put before you will start the ball rolling.

We have kept a tight rein on our expenses and cut costs wherever possible. However, we can do this only in the realm of town expenses, the school and county portion being exempted from our control.

The board wishes to extend thanks to Town Officers, and others who have donated their skills and time in town works, also to those who send in their town property inventories. Please fill in detailed information, acreage, description of buildings, etc.

The Bicentennial committee has a report. This is the year for commitment on what you want to do with it. Many people in Loudon have volunteered to take part in a celebration. The committee wants to hear from all residents this year who wish to take part in it. This could be a great volunteer effort to make Loudon show its best side. A small sum of money could be appropriated for the next three years to make it possible for prizes and expenses. This amount will reflect just how much you wish to extend your participation in such a celebration.

REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

Following is a 1969 project report of the Loudon Highway Dept.

Along with the regular maintenance work, the ditches were cleaned on Pleasant Street, and portions of the Ridge Road and Lower Ridge Road. Tarring programs included Pleasant St., Lower Ridge, and Mugett Hill Road. Bushes were mowed on nearly 40 miles of town roads this year.

Winter expenses ran higher than usual last year, primarily because of the extreme amount of snow. Cost of road salt ran 40% more than the previous year. The rising cost of materials such as Asphalt, Salt, also rental of machinery, parts and labor have been increasing each year. This has happened with no substantial budget-increase, and can only mean a curtailment of projects and necessary maintenance.

This year the T.R.A. Funds completed a .9 mile section of Oak Hill Road leaving about .6 left to do.

Also a new aluminum sectional arch type culvert has been installed at Rickers Bridge. This culvert is wide enough to handle any future change in road construction and is safe enough for any heavy trucks or buses using this road.

REPORT OF BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

The 1969 Town Meeting authorized the Selectmen to appoint an initial committee to consider plans for Loudon's Bicentennial celebration in 1973.

That's a long way off. But there's much to be considered, pondered, discussed and weighed for this 200th year of our being cut from Canterbury and made into a town in 1773, just before the Revolutionary War.

More important than all else, the support, advice and counsel of all Loudon citizens — old and young — is needed, and solicited.

The Selectmen joined with Judge Stanley Prescott in asking Mrs. Lucy Ladd to help launch this community project, as general chairman. Mrs. Pauline Perreault is secretary, and Fred Hackett is treasurer. Their husbands are also on the committee, along with Mrs. Hackett. Other members include Judge and Mrs. Prescott; Mrs. Marion Marshall, Mr. and Mrs. Lauris Moore and Mr. and Mrs. Sivonen.

This committee is feeling its way. No decisions as to the Bicentennial details will be made for some time, and then not until sharing the pros and cons in general community discussion.

This note, in the form of information, is a friendly attempt to let you neighbors know about our doings, however little they are so far.

First off, to perhaps stimulate interest, the committee is considering a Loudon Town Seal. It might tie into the Bicentennial, for production, for instance, of commemorative coins, to help finance the celebration.

We are asking Loudon's school children, and all others, to give thought to what the seal might comprise, or commemorate in Loudon history. The committee welcomes ideas.

There is no history of Loudon, and historians have not given much space to our town, down through the years. Several copies of a 22-page sketch of Loudon history, taken from Hurd's 1885 history of Merrimack County, are being placed in the Town Library by Leon Anderson, the legislative historian and now a Loudonite. Committee members also have copies and a few will be available for the town's school children.

So let's hear from one or all, as time plows us through the winter months! And we hope teachers will support this Seal project.

We hope to continue these reports of progress. We have some two years in which to work out the Bicentennial details, so there is no rush.

We trust that all Loudon neighbors will feel free to consider themselves a part of this town project, and share thoughts and ideas. What's the best weekend, for example, for celebrating the town's founding by the Colonial Legislature on January 22, 1773?

The Loudon Planning Board held eleven regular meetings and two special meetings. At these meetings the board reviewed and then reported to the Selectmen its recommendation on several applications for permits for mobile parks, motels, meeting halls, junk yards, and one animal farm.

The Board held many informal meetings starting in midsummer and still occurring, to work on the zoning ordinance, building regulations, and sub-division regulations which were prepared at the request of the selectmen. After much discussion, thought, and more discussion, the ordinances were put together to form what the board feels is something that will promote an orderly growth to the town and its tax base, and will therefore check the rate of tax increase that has been occurring at an ever increasing rate.

LOUDON CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

The Loudon Civil Defense organization was reactivated in July, 1969. Since that time there has been considerable progress. All of the units of the organization have been activated and all personnel assigned. These units include the following; Administrative, Warning and Communication, Welfare and Refugee, Firefighting and rescue, Police, Engineering, Transportation, Medical, Hospital, First Aid Nursing, Health and Sanitation, Radiological Monitoring and Supply. It would be well to point out that all of these services are manned by voluntary help. In other words, people who are interested enough in the welfare of their community to donate their time and services. Since the reactivation of the Loudon Civil Defense, the town has been able to purchase several thousand dollars worth of equipment which is used daily by the Fire Dept., Police Dept. and Highway Dept. as well as the Selectmen's office and Town Clerk. This equipment is purchased as government surplus property through the N. H. Distributing Agency and the only cost to the Town is the payment of handling costs and this amounts to only a fraction of the actual value of the equipment. This is only one of the benefits of having an active Civil Defense Organization. It should be pointed out that Civil Defense is authorized to function not only in the event of Nuclear attack but also in the event of natural disasters such as forest fires, floods, hurricanes, etc. A community shelter program has been started and when it is completed, every citizen of Loudon will have a brochure advising him where to go and what to do in case of any type disaster. This will be done at Government expense and will not cost this community anything. The shelters will be stocked with emergency food and medical supplies also at federal government expense.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

We have just completed another exceptional year for the Loudon Fire Department. This year our number of calls has dropped to an all time low of 29. We have had a number of potentially very bad fires start this year, but their damage was held to a minimum, because of the quick response and fast action of the Volunteer men in the Loudon Fire Department.

A breakdown of calls for the past year are: Building Fires — 5, Brush Fires — 9, Car Fires — 3, Chimney Fires — 2, Mutual Aid Calls — 1, Mutual Aid Drill Calls — 1, and Miscellaneous Calls — 8.

This year we have purchased a new Back-Pak Portable Pump. This pump is very light weight and can be carried to spot brush fires that are inaccessible to trucks or motor vehicles. Through the cooperation of the State Forestry Department, and at no cost to the town, we have acquired a Jeep-type trailer which has been equipped with a portable pump, hose, and miscellaneous hand tools, that can be attached to a truck or car and quickly dispatched to a brush fire.

I want to appeal to everyone to be especially careful with fires this coming year. Prevention practices in the home are the first place to stop that dreaded fire we all worry about. Make sure electrical sockets are not over crowded, rubbish and debris are picked up and disposed of, and most important, keep matches in a safe place away from small children.

At this time I want to thank everyone that has worked with and for the Fire Department this past year. From the emergency fire calls, to the routine maintenance jobs. Complete cooperation has made this a Voluntary Fire Department for everyone to be most proud.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking material and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follows:

Fire Permit

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.

Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

Penalties

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.

- 2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
- 3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
- 4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine is \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

POLICE REPORT

In reviewing the activities of the Police Department during the past year, it again shows an increase in daily complaints and calls. Details of a lot of these complaints are known only by the department.

This last year our town was one of only a few that had less breaks with loss of property than previous years. On a number of occasions while on patrol private property and business places were found unlocked, and on two occasions attempted breaks were believed to have been interrupted while patrols were in the process of checking property. We believe that patrols are a great necessity for this reason alone. We have had to rely on our department because of a lack of coverage by the state.

More accidents were covered again this year, with loss of property and injury to people still growing at an alarming rate. This year we were unfortunate to have one fatal accident on motorcycle weekend.

Our court records showed that the department had 74% of the total court docket, working only on a part-time basis. Total number of cases was 231 with the town having 172 and the state having 59, with 25 of their total being on motorcycle weekend.

In an attempt to keep up with modern ways to combat and investigate crimes, we purchased a new finger print kit. A new typewriter was purchased with half its cost being paid for by the police association.

We feel with the increase in population, which makes for more complaints and calls that the town should start to look to the future when the department has to have a full time man. We believe this will have to come in the next three to five years.

Again we would like to remind you, the people, that it is you that call and report 90% of the complaints and observe the offense or crime being committed. Please be sure to give full information of your call and your name before you hang up, this being a big must for us to answer any call.
