TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyme in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Church Hall in said Lyme on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 2. To see what action the Town will take upon the budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- Art. 3. To see what compensation the Town will allow its officers and what price will be paid for work on the highways for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes paid before November 1, 1953, at the same rate as the Town pays for money borrowed in anticipation of taxes.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Regional Association (not recommended by the Budget Committee).
- Art. 7. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

I will have to report about the same as last year. The road work we do is about the same each year. We went over all the roads once with the road machine and a good share of them the second time. We put on about one thousand yards of gravel on the roads patching up mud holes and wash outs.

Put in \$1,000.00 worth of culvert pipe same as last year.

We repaired and planked several bridges.

Went over nearly all of the roads with tractor mower and cut the bushes back five or six feet. There are several quite good sized bridges that are much in need of repair, which I think has been taken up with the Budget Committee.

School District of Lyme

To the Inhabitants of the School District of Lyme qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Church Hall on the tenth day of March, 1953, at 1:30 P. M. to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To choose Agents, Auditors, Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant and fix their salaries.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of said district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,782.14 as a deficiency fund to be made available immediately for the use of the school board on the current 1952-53 budget. Said amount being the difference between the amount of money actually received for state aid and the estimated amount presented at the school district meeting in March, 1952; recommended by budget committee.

Article 9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to be placed in Capital Reserve for the purpose of installing a new heating system in the Lyme Plain School at a future date; recommended by budget committee.

Article 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate \$475.00 for the purpose of engaging a teacher of art for the school year 1953-54; submitted by the budget committee without recommendation.

Article 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyme:

I hereby submit my fifth annual report as your superintendent of schools.

Many people, parents, citizens and taxpayers, are becoming more and more interested and concerned about their public schools. There is little question but what the costs of public schools have been rising, and may continue to rise, not only in Lyme but all over this country. What people forget is that everything else, as well as schools, costs more than it did. Then we have people who think the schools are too progressive and others who think they are not progressive enough. Actually we try to take the middle road in the Lyme Schools. However, all this talk and interest about the schools is a healthy sign and eventually will lead to improved education. Fortunately we are still living in a democracy and in the end the people will have the kind of schools they want and are willing to pay for.

Teachers and Teaching

I think we can indeed feel very fortunate to have our complete teaching staff return from last year. There are very few school systems in which this would have been true. The shortage of elementary teachers becomes more acute each year because (1) the older teachers are dying off or leaving the profession faster than new teachers can be trained and (2) a larger number of pupils enters the first grade than entered the year before (this will continue for some years to come because more children were born in the U. S. last year than any year in its history.) If and when any of our present staff leave us we will probably have difficulty finding capable replacements.

Although we never plan startling major revisions in the courses of study we, nevertheless, always try to make minor changes which will lead to improved opportunities for boys and girls. At present the whole staff is working on possible revisions in the social studies curriculum which may bring us more into line with the program sug-

gested by the State Department a year ago. In an effort to produce better handwriting among the pupils we introduced the Zaner-Bloser Handwriting System into the first four grades. This will serve to unify this instruction and provide the proper transfer from manuscript to cursive writing.

Due to the resignation of Mrs. Horton, who wished to continue her studies for a degree, we were unable to have any music instruction during the first half year. In February Mrs. H. R. MacGinnis assumed the duties of music teacher for the Lyme Schools. She is a well trained teacher who has been serving as a teacher of art and music in the Orford Schools during the fall season. As Mrs. MacGinnis is qualified to teach art and would be available, I hope that it will be possible to provide instruction for the pupils of Lyme, in this field, next year.

We are continuing our regular testing program which is developed with the idea in mind that everything we do is directed towards helping the pupils. At present we are giving intelligence tests in grades 4 and 7, Reading tests in grades 2 and 7, and achievement tests in grades 5, 6 and 8. The teachers will be glad to talk over the results of these tests, or any other matter, with the parents of the children concerned.

Buildings and Repairs

Although all of our buildings are old we try to do a little repair work each year so that the general appearance of the rooms and outside will be steadily improved. The major job done this year was to repaint the outside of the Plain School. Running hot water was added to both the Plain School and the Center School. In addition, a lot of minor repair work was done to each of the three buildings.

The heating system at the Plain School has never been satisfactory. It is often either too hot or too cold. Reliable advice from heating experts seems to indicate that an oil burning furnace with forced hot air would be the most reasonable and most satisfactory system to install. The total cost of such an installation would be about \$3,000.00. There is even a good possibility that the savings made by such an installation might pay for its total cost over a period of a few years.

Financial

Why should schools cost so much? Why should the price we pay for our schools continue to increase? These are very logical questions and deserve logical answers.

There are three large items in the budget which account for most of the expenditures. Teachers' salaries \$18,900.00, Transportation \$5,490.00 and Tuition \$13,945.00 a total of \$38,335.00 in a total budget of \$48,073.69. The remaining items in the budget are all necessary and have been carried by the school board at a minimum, consistent with good school policy. Returning to the question of teachers' salaries. Due to the shortage of teachers, the salaries of teachers over the nation have been steadily rising over the past few years. Although the people of Lyme have granted small increases each year to our teaching staff these increases have not been as large as those in many other places with the result that we are still paying all of our teachers less than most of the beginning teachers from the Teachers Colleges (without any experience) actually received this year. Thus we are still paying our teachers some of the lowest salaries in the state.

Now for Transportation. By law we must transport all children living two or more miles from school. For every bus, except the Chesley School bus, the routes are established to carry children who are over two miles from school. It is my understanding that because of peculiar conditions the Chesley School pupils have received special consideration. In some cases we pick up children on the other routes who live less than two miles from school but this is only when there is extra room in the bus and it is at no added expense to the school. The bus contracts have been carefully negotiated and all pupils are being transported at reasonable rates.

Finally we consider Tuition. By law the school district of Lyme must pay for the tuition of all Lyme pupils who attend an approved high school or academy, assuming that this tuition rate does not exceed the average cost of tuition in the state for the previous year. In no case does the tuition rate being paid exceed this average cost in the state. There will be more pupils attending high school next year and the rate of tuition is going up.

There is only one way in which a town like Lyme can be helped and that is through increased state aid to education. For the current school year we received nearly \$1800 less in state aid than we had planned upon and will have to ask the school district to raise this amount to see us through the 1952-53 school year. This reduction was due to the fact that we actually had fewer pupils in our schools during 1951-52 than we did in 1950-51. For the next school year, 1953-54, the Commissioner of Education is asking that state aid be doubled. The Governor is recommending that state aid be increased by 50%. If the past is any indication of what may happen in the future, we may be lucky to obtain the same amount in state aid that we received this year.

Many people are concerned about what will happen to pupils who wish to attend Hanover High School in the future. The following statements are the facts as they exist at the present time.

(1) No decision has been made by the Hanover School Board or the Hanover School District in regard to the question.

(2) Tuition pupils will be accepted up until the fall of 1955 anyway. Those who have been accepted will probably be allowed to finish their four years of high school at Hanover.

(3) The Hanover School Board has been discussing and considering this problem with the Norwich School Board and through your superintendent, with the Lyme School Board for several months. The Hanover School Board recognizes the advantages to be obtained from a larger school which tuition pupils would create but cannot ask the Hanover School District to bear the full expense of a new addition for the sole purpose of taking care of tuition pupils. They suggest three possibilities of taking care of this (a) an addition to the tuition rate (b) a lump sum capital contribution or (c) some form of joint school district. There may be other solutions which they would be glad to consider. They conclude their statement with:

“We want the Lyme School Board to know that the Hanover School Board is not approaching this matter with any pre-conceived ideas but is open to suggestions both from your Board and the residents of your community. — The final decision, no doubt, will rest with the voters of the towns.”

General

I want to take this opportunity to thank the Grange for their splendid contributions to the three schools for the purpose of improving their recreational facilities. At the Plain School sufficient funds were provided to purchase some large outdoor equipment. In all schools, games and toys were purchased so that the children would have something to do on long rainy noon hours.

The serving of hot lunches continues to be a problem. At present a group of parents are providing excellent hot meals to the upper four grades at the Plain School during the winter months. The pupils and teachers take care of the serving and cleaning up. No other pupils in the district are being served hot lunches. No real solution will ever be achieved until a suitable place is provided to cook and serve these hot lunches.

The Commissioner of Education, in conjunction with superintendents and school board members, is preparing a revision of supervisory unions for the state. Under the currently proposed plan this supervisory union would lose Enfield which would be attached to the Lebanon Supervisory Union. For various reasons this plan may not be adopted. However, it would be very helpful to me as we now have the largest number of teachers of any supervisory in the state and even more than several of the cities. Some of the Supervisory Unions have less than half as many teachers as there are in this one. At present this supervisory union consists of Hanover, Orford, Lyme and Enfield.

Your Parent-Teacher Association is making a real effort to produce good programs which will serve to create better understanding between parents and teachers that will eventually produce better learning situations for your children. Their efforts are really appreciated and I hope they continue through the years.
